We have audited the financial statements of the TSA Consulting Group, Inc. Profit Sharing and Retirement Investment Plan (the Plan), an employee benefit plan subject to the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (ERISA), for the year ended December 31, 2021, and have issued our report thereon dated January 16, 2023. Professional standards require that we provide you with information about our responsibilities under generally accepted auditing standards, as well as certain information related to the planned scope and timing of our audit. We have communicated such information in our letter to you dated May 31, 2022. Professional standards also require that we communicate to you the following information related to our audit.

Significant Audit Findings

Qualitative Aspects of Accounting Practices

Management is responsible for the selection and use of appropriate accounting policies. The significant accounting policies used by the Plan are described in Note 2 to the financial statements. No new accounting policies were adopted, and the application of existing policies was not changed during 2021. We noted no transactions entered into by the plan during the year for which there is a lack of authoritative guidance or consensus. All significant transactions have been recognized in the financial statements in the proper period.

Accounting estimates are an integral part of the financial statements prepared by management and are based on management's knowledge and experience about past and current events and assumptions about future events. Certain accounting estimates are particularly sensitive because of their significance to the financial statements and because of the possibility that future events affecting them may differ significantly from those expected. In our judgment, based on procedures performed during our audit, the Plan's accounting policies and estimates have been followed consistently and appear reasonable.

The financial statement disclosures are neutral, consistent, and clear.

Form 5500 Procedures

We are required to obtain and read a substantially complete draft of Form 5500 prior to dating our auditor's report. The purpose of this procedure is to identify any material inconsistencies between the draft Form 5500 and the Plan's financial statements. We identified no material inconsistencies in performing and completing our audit.

Difficulties Encountered in Performing the Audit

We encountered no difficulties in dealing with management in performing and completing our audit.

Corrected and Uncorrected Misstatements

Professional standards require us to accumulate all misstatements identified during the audit, other than those that are clearly trivial, and communicate them to the appropriate level of management. There were no such misstatements.

Disagreements with Management

For purposes of this letter, a disagreement with management is a financial accounting, reporting, or auditing matter, whether or not resolved to our satisfaction, that could be significant to the financial statements or the auditors' report. We are pleased to report that no such disagreements arose during the course of our audit.

Management Representations

We have requested certain representations from management that are included in the management representation letter dated January 16, 2023.

Management Consultations with Other Independent Accountants

In some cases, management may decide to consult with other accountants about auditing and accounting matters, similar to obtaining a "second opinion" on certain situations. If a consultation involves application of an accounting principle to the Plan's financial statements or a determination of the type of auditors' opinion that may be expressed on those statements, our professional standards require the consulting accountant to check with us to determine that the consultant has all the relevant facts. To our knowledge, there were no such consultations with other accountants.

Other Audit Findings or Issues

We generally discuss a variety of matters, including the application of accounting principles and auditing standards, with management each year prior to retention as the Plan's auditors. However, these discussions occurred in the normal course of our professional relationship and our responses were not a condition to our retention.

Other Matters

With respect to the supplementary information accompanying the financial statements, we made certain inquiries of management and evaluated the form, content, and methods of preparing the information to determine that the information complies with the DOL's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA, the method of preparing it has not changed from the prior period, and the information is appropriate and complete in relation to our audit of the financial statements. We compared and reconciled the supplementary information to the underlying accounting records used to prepare the financial statements or to the financial statements themselves.

This information is intended solely for the use of the Board of Directors, Plan Administrator and management of the TSA Consulting Group, Inc. Profit Sharing and Retirement Investment Plan and is not intended to be, and should not be, used by anyone other than these specified parties.

Scope and Nature of the ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) Audit

We have performed an audit of the accompanying financial statements of TSA Consulting Group, Inc. Profit Sharing and Retirement Investment Plan (the Plan), an employee benefit plan subject to the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (ERISA), as permitted by ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) [ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) audit]. We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. We are required to be independent of the Plan and to meet our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with the relevant ethical requirements relating to our audit. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) audit opinion.

Responsibilities of Management for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America, and for the design, implementation and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error. Management's election of the ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) audit does not affect management's responsibility for the financial statements.

In preparing the financial statements, management is required to evaluate whether there are conditions or events, considered in the aggregate, that raise substantial doubt about the Plan's ability to continue as a going concern for one year after the date the financial statements are available to be issued.

Management is also responsible for maintaining a current Plan instrument, including all Plan amendments; administering the Plan; and determining that the Plan's transactions that are presented and disclosed in the financial statements are in conformity with the Plan's provisions, including maintaining sufficient records with respect to each of the participants, to determine the benefits due or which may become due to such participants.

Auditors' Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements

Except as described in the Scope and Nature of the ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) Audit section of our report, our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditors' report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance but is not absolute assurance and therefore is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations or the override of internal control. Accordingly, the objective of an ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) audit is not to express an opinion about whether the financial statements as a whole are presented fairly, in all material respects, in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

We are required to communicate with those charged with governance regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit, significant audit findings and certain internal control related matters that we identified during the audit.

Supplemental Schedules Required by ERISA

The supplemental schedule of assets (held at end of year) as of December 31, 2021, is presented for purposes of additional analysis and is not a required part of the financial statements but is supplementary information required by the Department of Labor's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA. Their report dated September 20, 2021, indicated that (1) because of the significance of the information that they did not audit, they were not able to obtain sufficient appropriate audit evidence to provide a basis for an audit opinion and accordingly, they did not express an opinion on the financial statements and supplemental schedule, and (2) the form and content of the information included in the financial statements and supplemental schedule other than that derived from the certified information, were presented in compliance with the Department of Labor's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA.

1. DESCRIPTION OF THE PLAN

The following description of TSA Consulting Group, Inc. Profit Sharing and Retirement Investment Plan (the Plan) provides only general information. Participants should refer to the Plan agreement for a more complete description of the Plan's provisions.

General

The Plan is a defined contribution plan available to all employees of TSA Consulting Group, Inc. (the Company) who are at least 21 years of age. Participants can enroll on the first of the month upon obtaining eligibility. The Plan allows participants to have contributions made on their behalf on a pretax basis in accordance with the provisions of Section 401(k) of the Internal Revenue Code (IRC). The Plan is subject to the provisions of the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (ERISA).

Plan Merger

In 2019, the Plan sponsor was acquired. The sponsor successor elected to merge the Plan assets with its existing Plan. Thus, the Plan sponsor elected to merge the Plan effective January 1, 2022, and to transfer all Plan assets as soon as practicable thereafter. The Plan contributions ceased as of December 31, 2021. As of April 29, 2022, all accounts have been distributed to the existing Plan of the sponsor's successor. The following disclosures are applicable prior to the Plan merger.

Contributions

Employees may contribute a specific percentage or dollar amount of their compensation up to the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) limitation established by the IRC. Individuals who attain the age of 50 by the end of the Plan year are permitted to make "catch-up" contributions in accordance with IRC limits. The percentage of contribution may be changed as of the first day of each month. Participants may also contribute amounts representing distributions from other qualified defined benefit or defined contribution plans (rollover).

The Company contributes a Safe Harbor contribution equal to 3% of the participant's compensation for all eligible employees each pay period.

Participant Accounts

Each participant's account is credited with the participant's contribution, the Company's contribution, and an allocation of Plan earnings. Participant accounts are charged with an allocation of administrative expenses that are paid by the Plan. Allocations are based on participant earnings, account balances or specified participant transactions, as defined. The benefit to which a participant is entitled is the benefit that can be provided from the participant's vested account.

Investment Elections

Each participant may direct all contributions into one or more investment options offered by the Plan.

Vesting

Participants are immediately vested in their contributions plus actual earnings thereon and the Company matching contributions, plus actual earnings thereon.

1. DESCRIPTION OF THE PLAN – CONTINUED

Notes Receivable

Participants may borrow from their fund accounts up to a maximum equal to the lesser of \$50,000, or 50% of their account balance. The loans bear interest at the prime rate, as published by the Wall Street Journal as of the first business day of the month in which the loan is requested, plus 1%. Principal and interest are paid on a pro rata basis through payroll deductions.

Payment of Benefits

Upon termination of service or in the event of death, disability or retirement, a participant (or participant's beneficiary in the event of death) may elect to receive an amount equal to the value of the participant's vested interest in his or her account in a lump-sum amount. For termination of service due to other reasons, a participant may receive the value of the vested interest in his or her account as a lump-sum distribution or have the option of a rollover to another qualified plan.

Administrative Expenses

The Plan's administrative expenses are paid by the Company. Expenses recorded in the Plan are related to participant loans and distributions and are paid by the participant. During 2022 and 2021, expenses paid by the Plan and allocated to participant accounts totaled \$2,013 and \$4,465, respectively.

Forfeited Accounts

At April 29, 2022, December 31, 2021 and 2020, there were no forfeited nonvested accounts.

2. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of Accounting

The accompanying financial statements have been prepared on the accrual basis of accounting.

Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires the Plan administrator to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and changes therein, and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Contributions

Participant and employer contributions were recorded in the period during which the Company makes payroll deductions from the participants' Plan earnings.

Payment of Benefits

Benefits are recorded when paid.

2. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES – CONTINUED

Investment Valuation and Income Recognition

Investments are reported at fair value. Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date (the exit price). The Plan’s Benefit Committee determines the Plan’s valuation policies utilizing information provided by Fidelity Management Trust Company (the Trustee and Custodian). See Note 4 for discussion of fair value measurements.

Purchases and sales of securities are recorded on a trade-date basis. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Dividends are recorded on the ex-dividend date.

Subsequent Events

The Plan’s management has evaluated subsequent events from April 29, 2022, through January 16, 2023, the date the financial statements were available to be issued.

3. INFORMATION CERTIFIED BY TRUSTEE

Certain investment information regarding the Plan, as of April 29, 2022, December 31, 2021 and 2020, and for the period ended April 29, 2022, and the year ended December 31, 2021, included in the Plan’s financial statements and supplementary schedule, was prepared by or derived from information provided by the Trustee of the Plan and furnished to the Plan administrator. The Plan administrator has obtained certifications from the Trustee that the following information is complete and accurate:

4. FAIR VALUE MEASUREMENTS

The fair value measurement accounting literature establishes a framework for measuring fair value that provides a fair value hierarchy which prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques to measure fair value. The hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (Level 1 measurement) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (Level 3 measurement.)

- Level 1 – Inputs to the valuation methodology are unadjusted quoted prices for identical assets or liabilities in active markets that the Plan has the ability to access.
- Level 2 – Inputs to the valuation methodology include: quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities in active markets; quoted prices for identical or similar assets or liabilities in inactive markets; inputs other than quoted prices that are observable for the asset or liability; and inputs that are derived principally from or corroborated by observable market data by correlation or other means. If the asset or liability has a specified (contractual) term, the Level 2 input must be observable for substantially the full term of the asset or liability.
- Level 3 – Inputs to the valuation methodology are unobservable and significant to the fair value measurement.

The asset or liability’s fair value measurement level within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of any input that is significant to the fair value measurement. Valuation techniques used need to maximize the use of observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs.

Following is a description of the valuation methodologies used for assets measured at fair value at December 31, 2021 and 2020:

Mutual funds: Valued at the closing price reported in the active market in which the individual mutual funds are traded.

Money market fund: Because of the nature of these assets, carrying amounts approximate fair value.

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5. EXEMPT PARTY-IN-INTEREST TRANSACTIONS

As of April 29, 2022, December 31, 2021 and 2020, there were certain Plan investments managed by Fidelity Management Trust Company. As Fidelity Management Trust Company serves as the Trustee, as defined by the Plan, these transactions qualify as party-in-interest transactions and are exempt from the prohibited transactions rules. Notes receivable from participants are also party-in-interest transactions, which are exempt from the prohibited transaction rules.

6. PLAN TERMINATION

Although it has not expressed any intent to do so, the Company has the right under the Plan to discontinue its contributions at any time and to terminate the Plan subject to the provisions of ERISA. In the event of Plan termination, participants will become fully vested in their accounts in accordance with the terms and provisions of the Plan.

7. RISKS AND UNCERTAINTIES

The Plan invests in a variety of investment funds. Investments in general are exposed to various risks, such as interest rate, market and credit risks. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investments, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in the values of investments will occur in the near term and that such changes could materially affect participants' account balances and the amounts reported in the statements of net assets available for benefits.

8. TAX STATUS

The Plan has adopted a preapproved plan sponsored by FMR, LLC. The IRS has determined and informed FMR, LLC by an advisory letter dated June 30, 2020, that the preapproved plan is designed in accordance with applicable sections of the IRC. The preapproved plan has been amended since receiving the advisory letter; however, the Plan administrator believes that the Plan is designed and is currently being operated in compliance with the applicable requirements of the IRC. Accordingly, no provision for taxes has been included in the Plan's financial statements.

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require Plan management to evaluate tax positions taken by the Plan and recognize a tax liability if the Plan has taken an uncertain position that more likely than not would not be sustained upon examination by the IRS. The Plan is subject to routine audits by taxing jurisdictions; however, there are currently no audits for any tax periods in progress.
