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INDEPENDENT AUDITORS' REPORT

To the Plan Sponsor of Procureability, Inc.401(k) Profit Sharing Plan and Trust
Truckee, California.

Scope and Nature of the ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) Audit

We have performed an audit of the financial statements of Procureability, Inc.401(k) Profit Sharing Plan and Trust, an employee benefit plan subject to the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (ERISA), as permitted by ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) (ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) audit). The financial statements comprise the statement of net assets available for benefits as of December 31, 2022, and the related statement of changes in net assets available for benefits for the year then ended December 31, 2022, and the related notes to the financial statements.

Management, having determined it is permissible in the circumstances, has elected to have the audit of Procureability, Inc.401(k) Profit Sharing Plan and Trust's financial statements performed in accordance with ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) pursuant to 29 CFR 2520.103-8 of the Department of Labor's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA. Management has obtained a certification from a qualified institution as of December 31, 2022, stating that the certified investment information, as described in Note 3 to the financial statements, is complete and accurate.

Opinion

Basis for Opinion

We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America (GAAS). Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements section of our report. We are required to be independent of Procureability, Inc. 401(k) Profit Sharing Plan and Trust and to meet our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with the relevant ethical requirements relating to our audit. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) audit opinion.

Responsibilities of Management for the Financial Statements

The information included in the supplemental schedules, other than that agreed to or derived from the certified investment information, has been subjected to auditing procedures applied in the audit of the financial statements and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements or to the financial statements themselves, and other additional procedures in accordance with GAAS. 

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS
DECEMBER 31, 2022 AND 2021

NOTE 1: DESCRIPTION OF PLAN

The following description of the Procureability, Inc. 401(k) Profit Sharing Plan and Trust (the Plan) is provided for general information purposes only. Participants should refer to the Plan document for a more complete description of the Plan's provisions.

General

The Plan is a participant directed defined contribution plan covering all eligible employees of Procureability, Inc. with retirement benefits in accordance with section 401(k) of the Internal Revenue Code (the IRC). The Plan is subject to the provisions of the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (ERISA). The Plan was established on January 1, 2004.

On December 22, 2022, the Senate passed the Consolidated Appropriations Act of 2023 (the "CAA") to fund the government through September 30, 2023. Division T of the legislation is the SECURE 2.0 Act of 2022 ("SECURE 2.0"), which builds upon 2019's Setting Every Community Up for Retirement Enhancement Act (the "SECURE Act"). SECURE 2.0 contains 90 provisions aimed at modernizing the retirement system, encouraging additional retirement savings, and easing administrative requirements. Most of SECURE 2.0's provisions take effect on or after 2024.

Eligibility

To be eligible to participate in the Plan, employees must have attained 21 years of age and have completed three consecutive months of service with the Company. Employees covered by collective bargaining agreements, nonresident aliens, and employees who become employees through acquisition, merger, or similar transaction are excluded from participation in the Plan. Eligible employees shall enter the Plan immediately upon meeting age and service requirements.

Contributions

Participant Contributions: Participants elect to have amounts withheld from their paychecks and contributed to the Plan by the Company. Participants may contribute the up to 90% of their annual compensation in pre-tax or Roth deferrals as defined in the Plan and by the Internal Revenue Service. Participants who have attained age 50 before the end of the Plan year are eligible to make catch-up contributions. Participants may also contribute amounts representing distributions from other qualified defined benefit or defined contribution plans.

Employer Contributions:

- Profit Sharing Contributions: The Company may make discretionary profit-sharing contributions in an amount as determined by the Company. To receive an allocation of Company profit sharing contributions, participants must have completed one year of service and have been employed by the Company on the last day of the Plan year. Company contributions are made in the ratio that each participants compensation bears to the compensation of all eligible participants.

NOTE 1: DESCRIPTION OF PLAN (CONTINUED)

Contributions (Continued)

- *Safe Harbor Matching Contributions:* The Company makes matching safe-harbor contributions in an amount equal to 100% of the first 3% of the participant's contribution, plus 50% of participants' elective deferrals that exceeds 3% but not in excess of 4 % of the participant's contribution. Participants are required to contribute to their account in order to qualify for the match. During the Plan year ended December 31, 2022, the Plan made safe-harbor matching contributions of \$205,825.
- *Qualified Nonelective Contributions (QNECs):* The Company may make QNECs to Non-Highly Compensated Employees (NHCEs) for the Plan year in an amount as determined by the Company.

All of the foregoing contributions are subject to limits as set by federal law.

Participant Accounts

Each participant's account is credited with the participant's own contributions, an allocation of the Company's contribution, and an allocation of net earnings from investments and changes in investment values. Allocations are based on each participant's contributions, earnings, or account balances, as defined by the Plan agreement. The benefit to which a participant is entitled is limited to the benefit that can be provided from the participant's account. Participant accounts are charged with an allocation of administrative expenses that are paid by the Plan.

Investment Options

Participants may direct the investment of all contributions into various investment options offered by the Plan and Mid Atlantic Trust Company.

Vesting

Participants are always fully vested in their own contributions, Company's safe-harbor contributions, QNECs, and all earnings thereon. Participants vest in Company's profit-sharing contributions at the rate of 20% for each year of service until fully vested, beginning on second anniversary after date of hire. Participants are fully vested in Company contributions after six years of credited service.

Participant Loans

Loans to participants consist of promissory notes received from participants in exchange for the distribution of cash from the Plan. A participant is allowed to borrow a minimum of \$1,000, up to one half of the vested balance of their Plan account, up to a maximum of \$50,000. The maximum number of outstanding loans allowed at any time is three. Loans must be repaid over no more than a five-year period with the exception of a loan for the participants' principal residence that may have a repayment period beyond five years up to ten years. Principal and interest are paid ratably through payroll deductions. Loans to participants are stated at the principal amount outstanding, which approximates fair value.

NOTE 1: DESCRIPTION OF PLAN (CONTINUED)

Payment of Benefits

Upon termination of service due to death, disability, or retirement, a participant may elect to receive either a lump-sum amount equal to the value of the participant's vested interest in his or her account or may elect to take partial withdrawals, annuity contracts, and installments over a period of time. Terminated participants whose balances are less than \$5,000 will be automatically distributed. For such balances exceeding \$5,000, subject to certain requirements, participants may leave their account balance in the Plan. For termination of service for other reasons, a participant may receive the value of the vested interest in his or her account as a lump-sum distribution, or in annual installments over a period of time. Participants may request withdrawal from their contribution accounts for financial hardship or after attaining the age of 59½. The distribution of the participant's account must commence no later than April 1 following the calendar year in which the participant attains age 72.

Forfeitures

Forfeitures of nonvested employer contributions, if any, shall be used to reduce employer contributions and can be applied to reduce administrative expenses charged to the Plan, for the plan year in which they occurred or thereafter. However, if the participant is reemployed and fulfills certain requirements, as defined in the Plan, the participant's account will be reinstated. As of December 31, 2022, there was \$980 in forfeiture non-vested accounts available for future use.

NOTE 2: SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of Accounting

The accompanying financial statements are prepared using the accrual basis of accounting.

Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions which affect the reported amounts of net assets available for benefits at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of changes in net assets available for benefits during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Notes Receivable from Participants

Notes receivable from participants are measured at their unpaid Principal balance plus any accrued but unpaid interest. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Related fees are recorded as administrative expenses and are expensed when they are incurred. No allowance for credit losses has been recorded as of December 31, 2022 and 2021.

NOTE 2: SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

Investment Valuation and Income Recognition

Investments are reported at fair value. Fair Value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. The Plan's Investment Committee determines the Plan's valuation policies utilizing information provided by its investment advisors, custodians, and insurance Company. See Note 4 for a discussion of fair value measurements. Purchases and sales of securities are recorded on a trade-date basis. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis.

Net depreciation includes the Plan's gains and losses on investments bought and sold as well as held during the year.

Payment of Benefits

Benefits are recorded when paid.

Excess Contributions Payable

Amounts payable to participants for contributions in excess of amounts allowed by the IRS are recorded as a liability with a corresponding reduction to contributions. The Plan distributed the 2022 excess contributions to the applicable participants after December 31, 2022.

NOTE 3: INFORMATION CERTIFIED BY THE CUSTODIAN (UNAUDITED)

The Plan administrator has elected the method of compliance permitted by 29 CFR 2520.103-8 of the Department of Labor's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosures under ERISA. Accordingly, Mid Atlantic Trust Company, the custodian of the Plan, has certified as being complete and accurate the following information as of December 31, 2022, and for the year ended December 31, 2022.

- Investments and notes receivable from participants are reflected on the accompanying statements of net assets available for benefits
- Net depreciation in fair value of investments, dividends, interest, and interest income on notes receivable from participants are reflected on the accompanying statement of changes in net assets available for benefits
- Investments are reflected on the schedule of assets (held at end of year)

NOTE 4: FAIR VALUE MEASUREMENTS

Financial Accounting Standards Board (FASB) Accounting Standards Codification (ASC) Topic 820, Fair Value Measurements and Disclosures, provides the framework for measuring fair value. That framework provides a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. The hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (level 1 measurements) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (level 3 measurements). The three levels of the fair value hierarchy under FASB ASC Topic 820 are described as follows:

- Level 1) Inputs to the valuation methodology are unadjusted quoted prices for identical assets or liabilities in active markets.
- Level 2) Inputs to the valuation methodology include quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities in active markets; quoted prices for identical or similar assets or liabilities in inactive markets; inputs other than quoted prices that are observable for the asset or liability; inputs that are derived principally from or corroborated by observable market data by correlation or other means. If the asset or liability has a specified (contractual) term, the level 2 input must be observable for substantially the full term of the asset or liability.
- Level 3) Inputs to the valuation methodology are unobservable and significant to the fair value measurement.

The asset or liability's fair value measurement level within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of any input that is significant to the fair value measurement. Valuation techniques used need to maximize the use of observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs.

Following is a description of the valuation methodologies used for assets measured at fair value. There have been no changes in the methodologies used at December 31, 2022 and 2021.

Interest-bearing cash: Valued at the daily closing price as reported by the fund.

Registered investment companies (mutual funds): Valued at the daily closing as reported by the fund. Mutual funds held by the Plan are open-end mutual funds that are registered with the SEC. These funds are required to publish their daily NAV and transact at that price. The mutual funds held by the Plan are deemed to be actively traded.

The valuation methods used by the Plan may produce a fair value calculation that may not be indicative of net realizable value or reflective of future fair values. Furthermore, although the Plan believes its valuation methods are appropriate and consistent with other market participants, the use of different methodologies or assumptions to determine the fair value of certain financial instruments could result in a different fair value measurement at the reporting date.

Net depreciation in fair value of investments includes net unrealized and net realized gains and losses on investments during the year and is presented net of investment expenses. Investment income is allocated to individual participant accounts based upon the participant's share of the investment fund.

NOTE 5: PLAN TERMINATION

Although the Company expects to continue the Plan indefinitely, it has the right under the Plan to suspend its contributions at any time and to terminate the Plan subject to the provisions of ERISA. In the event of Plan termination, all accounts become fully vested and non-forfeitable. Plan assets would first be used to pay any expenses properly charged to the Plan. The remaining Plan assets would then be distributed to participants.

NOTE 6: TAX STATUS

The Company has adopted the Non-Standardized Pre-Approved Profit-Sharing Plan With CODA. The Internal Revenue Service ("IRS") has informed the Paychex, Inc. in a letter dated August 31, 2020, that its non-standardized pre-approved profit-sharing plan is designed in accordance with applicable sections of the IRC, and any Plan sponsor adopting this form of the non-standardized pre-approved profit-sharing plan will be considered to have a plan qualified under applicable sections of the IRC. Therefore, the Plan and related trust are tax-exempt, and once qualified, the Plan is required to operate in conformity with the IRC to maintain its qualification. The Plan administrator believes that the Plan is designed, and is currently being operated, in compliance with the applicable requirements of the IRC and, therefore, believes the Plan is qualified as a tax-exempt trust.

NOTE 6: TAX STATUS (CONTINUED)

GAAP requires Plan management to evaluate tax positions taken by the Plan and recognizes tax liability (or asset) if the Plan has taken an uncertain position that more likely than not would not be sustained upon examination by the applicable authorities. The Plan is subject to routine audits by taxing jurisdictions; however, there are currently no audits for any tax periods in progress. The Plan administrator believes it is no longer subject to income tax examination for years prior to 2019.

NOTE 7: PARTY-IN-INTEREST TRANSACTIONS

Certain Plan investments are managed by Mid Atlantic Trust Company. Mid Atlantic Trust Company is the custodian, as defined by the Plan, and therefore, these transactions qualify as party-in-interest. Any purchase and sales of investments in the custodian are open market transactions at fair market value. Fees incurred by the Plan for investment management services included in net depreciation in fair value of investments. These fees are paid to the investment fund manager and may include certain revenue sharing fees that are paid to The Mid Atlantic Trust Company, other investment custodians, and investment advisors.

Additionally, the Plan sponsor, Procureability, Inc, is a party-in-interest to the Plan; however, there were no transactions with the Plan sponsor other than the funding of contributions to the Plan and payment of certain administrative expenses of the Plan. The Plan also allows for the issuance of notes receivable to participants in accordance with the related regulations. Such transactions are permitted under the provisions of the Plan and are exempt from the prohibition of party-in-interest transactions under ERISA.

NOTE 9: RISKS AND UNCERTAINTIES

The Plan invests in various investment securities. Investment securities are exposed to various risks such as interest rate, market, and credit risks. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investment securities, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in the values of investment securities will occur in the near term and that such changes could materially affect participants' account balances and the amounts reported in the statement of net assets available for benefits.

NOTE 10: SUBSEQUENT EVENTS

Subsequent events are events or transactions that occur after the statement of net assets available for benefits date but before the financial statements are available to be issued. The Plan recognizes in the financial statements the effects of all subsequent events that provide additional evidence about conditions that existed at the date of the statement of net assets available for benefits, including the estimates inherent in the process of preparing the financial statements. The Plan's financial statements do not recognize subsequent events that provide evidence about conditions that did not exist at the date of the statement of net assets available for benefits but arose after the statement of net assets available for benefits date and before the financial statements are available to be issued.

The plan has evaluated subsequent events through October 12, 2023, the date the financial statements were available to be issued.

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INDEPENDENT AUDITORS' REPORT

To the Plan Sponsor of Procureability, Inc.401(k) Profit Sharing Plan and Trust
Truckee, California.

Scope and Nature of the ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) Audit



NOTE 1: DESCRIPTION OF PLAN

The following description of the Procureability, Inc. 401(k) Profit Sharing Plan and Trust (the Plan) is provided for general information purposes only. Participants should refer to the Plan document for a more complete description of the Plan's provisions.

General

The Plan is a participant directed defined contribution plan covering all eligible employees of Procureability, Inc. with retirement benefits in accordance with section 401(k) of the Internal Revenue Code (the IRC). The Plan is subject to the provisions of the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (ERISA). The Plan was established on January 1, 2004.

On December 22, 2022, the Senate passed the Consolidated Appropriations Act of 2023 (the "CAA") to fund the government through September 30, 2023. Division T of the legislation is the SECURE 2.0 Act of 2022 ("SECURE 2.0"), which builds upon 2019's Setting Every Community Up for Retirement Enhancement Act (the "SECURE Act"). SECURE 2.0 contains 90 provisions aimed at modernizing the retirement system, encouraging additional retirement savings, and easing administrative requirements. Most of SECURE 2.0's provisions take effect on or after 2024.

Eligibility

To be eligible to participate in the Plan, employees must have attained 21 years of age and have completed three consecutive months of service with the Company. Employees covered by collective bargaining agreements, nonresident aliens, and employees who become employees through acquisition, merger, or similar transaction are excluded from participation in the Plan. Eligible employees shall enter the Plan immediately upon meeting age and service requirements.

Contributions

Participant Contributions: Participants elect to have amounts withheld from their paychecks and contributed to the Plan by the Company. Participants may contribute the up to 90% of their annual compensation in pre-tax or Roth deferrals as defined in the Plan and by the Internal Revenue Service. Participants who have attained age 50 before the end of the Plan year are eligible to make catch-up contributions. Participants may also contribute amounts representing distributions from other qualified defined benefit or defined contribution plans.

Employer Contributions:

- Profit Sharing Contributions: The Company may make discretionary profit-sharing contributions in an amount as determined by the Company. To receive an allocation of Company profit sharing contributions, participants must have completed one year of service and have been employed by the Company on the last day of the Plan year. Company contributions are made in the ratio that each participants compensation bears to the compensation of all eligible participants.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS
DECEMBER 31, 2022 AND 2021

NOTE 1: DESCRIPTION OF PLAN (CONTINUED)

Contributions (Continued)

- *Safe Harbor Matching Contributions:* The Company makes matching safe-harbor contributions in an amount equal to 100% of the first 3% of the participant's contribution, plus 50% of participants' elective deferrals that exceeds 3% but not in excess of 4 % of the participant's contribution. Participants are required to contribute to their account in order to qualify for the match. During the Plan year ended December 31, 2022, the Plan made safe-harbor matching contributions of \$205,825.
- *Qualified Nonelective Contributions (QNECs):* The Company may make QNECs to Non-Highly Compensated Employees (NHCEs) for the Plan year in an amount as determined by the Company.

All of the foregoing contributions are subject to limits as set by federal law.

Participant Accounts

Each participant's account is credited with the participant's own contributions, an allocation of the Company's contribution, and an allocation of net earnings from investments and changes in investment values. Allocations are based on each participant's contributions, earnings, or account balances, as defined by the Plan agreement. The benefit to which a participant is entitled is limited to the benefit that can be provided from the participant's account. Participant accounts are charged with an allocation of administrative expenses that are paid by the Plan.

Investment Options

Participants may direct the investment of all contributions into various investment options offered by the Plan and Mid Atlantic Trust Company.

Vesting

Participants are always fully vested in their own contributions, Company's safe-harbor contributions, QNECs, and all earnings thereon. Participants vest in Company's profit-sharing contributions at the rate of 20% for each year of service until fully vested, beginning on second anniversary after date of hire. Participants are fully vested in Company contributions after six years of credited service.

Participant Loans

Loans to participants consist of promissory notes received from participants in exchange for the distribution of cash from the Plan. A participant is allowed to borrow a minimum of \$1,000, up to one half of the vested balance of their Plan account, up to a maximum of \$50,000. The maximum number of outstanding loans allowed at any time is three. Loans must be repaid over no more than a five-year period with the exception of a loan for the participants' principal residence that may have a repayment period beyond five years up to ten years. Principal and interest are paid ratably through payroll deductions. Loans to participants are stated at the principal amount outstanding, which approximates fair value.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

NOTE 1: DESCRIPTION OF PLAN (CONTINUED)

Payment of Benefits

Upon termination of service due to death, disability, or retirement, a participant may elect to receive either a lump-sum amount equal to the value of the participant's vested interest in his or her account or may elect to take partial withdrawals, annuity contracts, and installments over a period of time. Terminated participants whose balances are less than \$5,000 will be automatically distributed. For such balances exceeding \$5,000, subject to certain requirements, participants may leave their account balance in the Plan. For termination of service for other reasons, a participant may receive the value of the vested interest in his or her account as a lump-sum distribution, or in annual installments over a period of time. Participants may request withdrawal from their contribution accounts for financial hardship or after attaining the age of 59½. The distribution of the participant's account must commence no later than April 1 following the calendar year in which the participant attains age 72.

Forfeitures

Forfeitures of nonvested employer contributions, if any, shall be used to reduce employer contributions and can be applied to reduce administrative expenses charged to the Plan, for the plan year in which they occurred or thereafter. However, if the participant is reemployed and fulfills certain requirements, as defined in the Plan, the participant's account will be reinstated. As of December 31, 2022, there was \$980 in forfeiture non-vested accounts available for future use.

NOTE 2: SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of Accounting

The accompanying financial statements are prepared using the accrual basis of accounting.

Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions which affect the reported amounts of net assets available for benefits at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of changes in net assets available for benefits during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Notes Receivable from Participants

Notes receivable from participants are measured at their unpaid Principal balance plus any accrued but unpaid interest. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Related fees are recorded as administrative expenses and are expensed when they are incurred. No allowance for credit losses has been recorded as of December 31, 2022 and 2021.

NOTE 2: SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

Investment Valuation and Income Recognition

Investments are reported at fair value. Fair Value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. The Plan's Investment Committee determines the Plan's valuation policies utilizing information provided by its investment advisors, custodians, and insurance Company. See Note 4 for a discussion of fair value measurements. Purchases and sales of securities are recorded on a trade-date basis. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis.

Net depreciation includes the Plan's gains and losses on investments bought and sold as well as held during the year.

Payment of Benefits

Benefits are recorded when paid.

Excess Contributions Payable

Amounts payable to participants for contributions in excess of amounts allowed by the IRS are recorded as a liability with a corresponding reduction to contributions. The Plan distributed the 2022 excess contributions to the applicable participants after December 31, 2022.

NOTE 3: INFORMATION CERTIFIED BY THE CUSTODIAN (UNAUDITED)

The Plan administrator has elected the method of compliance permitted by 29 CFR 2520.103-8 of the Department of Labor's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosures under ERISA. Accordingly, Mid Atlantic Trust Company, the custodian of the Plan, has certified as being complete and accurate the following information as of December 31, 2022, and for the year ended December 31, 2022.

- Investments and notes receivable from participants are reflected on the accompanying statements of net assets available for benefits
- Net depreciation in fair value of investments, dividends, interest, and interest income on notes receivable from participants are reflected on the accompanying statement of changes in net assets available for benefits
- Investments are reflected on the schedule of assets (held at end of year)

NOTE 4: FAIR VALUE MEASUREMENTS

Financial Accounting Standards Board (FASB) Accounting Standards Codification (ASC) Topic 820, Fair Value Measurements and Disclosures, provides the framework for measuring fair value. That framework provides a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. The hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (level 1 measurements) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (level 3 measurements). The three levels of the fair value hierarchy under FASB ASC Topic 820 are described as follows:

- Level 1) Inputs to the valuation methodology are unadjusted quoted prices for identical assets or liabilities in active markets.
- Level 2) Inputs to the valuation methodology include quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities in active markets; quoted prices for identical or similar assets or liabilities in inactive markets; inputs other than quoted prices that are observable for the asset or liability; inputs that are derived principally from or corroborated by observable market data by correlation or other means. If the asset or liability has a specified (contractual) term, the level 2 input must be observable for substantially the full term of the asset or liability.
- Level 3) Inputs to the valuation methodology are unobservable and significant to the fair value measurement.

The asset or liability's fair value measurement level within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of any input that is significant to the fair value measurement. Valuation techniques used need to maximize the use of observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs.

Following is a description of the valuation methodologies used for assets measured at fair value. There have been no changes in the methodologies used at December 31, 2022 and 2021.

Interest-bearing cash: Valued at the daily closing price as reported by the fund.

Registered investment companies (mutual funds): Valued at the daily closing as reported by the fund. Mutual funds held by the Plan are open-end mutual funds that are registered with the SEC. These funds are required to publish their daily NAV and transact at that price. The mutual funds held by the Plan are deemed to be actively traded.

The valuation methods used by the Plan may produce a fair value calculation that may not be indicative of net realizable value or reflective of future fair values. Furthermore, although the Plan believes its valuation methods are appropriate and consistent with other market participants, the use of different methodologies or assumptions to determine the fair value of certain financial instruments could result in a different fair value measurement at the reporting date.

NOTE 4: FAIR VALUE MEASUREMENTS (CONTINUED)

Net depreciation in fair value of investments includes net unrealized and net realized gains and losses on investments during the year and is presented net of investment expenses. Investment income is allocated to individual participant accounts based upon the participant's share of the investment fund.

NOTE 5: PLAN TERMINATION

Although the Company expects to continue the Plan indefinitely, it has the right under the Plan to suspend its contributions at any time and to terminate the Plan subject to the provisions of ERISA. In the event of Plan termination, all accounts become fully vested and non-forfeitable. Plan assets would first be used to pay any expenses properly charged to the Plan. The remaining Plan assets would then be distributed to participants.

NOTE 6: TAX STATUS

The Company has adopted the Non-Standardized Pre-Approved Profit-Sharing Plan With CODA. The Internal Revenue Service ("IRS") has informed the Paychex, Inc. in a letter dated August 31, 2020, that its non-standardized pre-approved profit-sharing plan is designed in accordance with applicable sections of the IRC, and any Plan sponsor adopting this form of the non-standardized pre-approved profit-sharing plan will be considered to have a plan qualified under applicable sections of the IRC. Therefore, the Plan and related trust are tax-exempt, and once qualified, the Plan is required to operate in conformity with the IRC to maintain its qualification. The Plan administrator believes that the Plan is designed, and is currently being operated, in compliance with the applicable requirements of the IRC and, therefore, believes the Plan is qualified as a tax-exempt trust.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

NOTE 6: TAX STATUS (CONTINUED)

GAAP requires Plan management to evaluate tax positions taken by the Plan and recognizes tax liability (or asset) if the Plan has taken an uncertain position that more likely than not would not be sustained upon examination by the applicable authorities. The Plan is subject to routine audits by taxing jurisdictions; however, there are currently no audits for any tax periods in progress. The Plan administrator believes it is no longer subject to income tax examination for years prior to 2019.

NOTE 7: PARTY-IN-INTEREST TRANSACTIONS

Certain Plan investments are managed by Mid Atlantic Trust Company. Mid Atlantic Trust Company is the custodian, as defined by the Plan, and therefore, these transactions qualify as party-in-interest. Any purchase and sales of investments in the custodian are open market transactions at fair market value. Fees incurred by the Plan for investment management services included in net depreciation in fair value of investments. These fees are paid to the investment fund manager and may include certain revenue sharing fees that are paid to The Mid Atlantic Trust Company, other investment custodians, and investment advisors.

Additionally, the Plan sponsor, Procureability, Inc, is a party-in-interest to the Plan; however, there were no transactions with the Plan sponsor other than the funding of contributions to the Plan and payment of certain administrative expenses of the Plan. The Plan also allows for the issuance of notes receivable to participants in accordance with the related regulations. Such transactions are permitted under the provisions of the Plan and are exempt from the prohibition of party-in-interest transactions under ERISA.

NOTE 9: RISKS AND UNCERTAINTIES

The Plan invests in various investment securities. Investment securities are exposed to various risks such as interest rate, market, and credit risks. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investment securities, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in the values of investment securities will occur in the near term and that such changes could materially affect participants' account balances and the amounts reported in the statement of net assets available for benefits.

NOTE 10: SUBSEQUENT EVENTS

Subsequent events are events or transactions that occur after the statement of net assets available for benefits date but before the financial statements are available to be issued. The Plan recognizes in the financial statements the effects of all subsequent events that provide additional evidence about conditions that existed at the date of the statement of net assets available for benefits, including the estimates inherent in the process of preparing the financial statements. The Plan's financial statements do not recognize subsequent events that provide evidence about conditions that did not exist at the date of the statement of net assets available for benefits but arose after the statement of net assets available for benefits date and before the financial statements are available to be issued.

The plan has evaluated subsequent events through October 12, 2023, the date the financial statements were available to be issued.
