Note 1 - Plan Description

The following description of the Rover.com 401(k) Plan (the Plan) provides only general information. Participants should refer to the plan document for a more complete description of the Plan's provisions.

General - The Plan is a defined contribution plan established by A Place For Rover, Inc. (the Company) under the provisions of Section 401(a) of the Internal Revenue Code (IRC). All employees become eligible to participate in the Plan upon reaching age 18 and after completion of one month of service. The Plan is subject to the provisions of the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (ERISA), as amended.

Contributions - Employees may elect to defer up to 85% of their compensation as pre-tax or Roth contributions. The Plan has adopted an automatic enrollment feature under which new employees are enrolled with a 4% pre-tax deferral with annual 1% increases up to 10% unless they formally waive participation or elect a different participation level. Participants who have attained age 50 before the end of the plan year are eligible to make catch-up contributions. Participants may also contribute amounts representing distributions from other eligible defined benefit or defined contribution plans (rollover).

The Company may make discretionary employer matching. Effective January 1, 2022, the Company elected to match 100% of the first 4% of eligible compensation, with a minimum match of \$750 if a participant defers a minimum of 4% of eligible compensation.

The Company may also make discretionary nonelective contributions. There were no nonelective contributions made for the plan year ended December 31, 2022.

Contributions are subject to certain Internal Revenue Service (IRS) limitations.

Participant Accounts - Each participant's account is credited with the participant's contributions and matching contributions, as well as allocations of the Company's nonelective contributions (if any) and plan earnings. Participant accounts are charged with an allocation of administrative expenses that are paid by the Plan. Allocations are based on participant earnings, account balances, or specific participant transactions, as defined. The benefit to which a participant is entitled is the benefit that can be provided from the participant's vested account. Participants direct the investment of their account into various investment options offered by the Plan.

Vesting - Participants are immediately vested in their salary deferral contributions, Company matching and nonelective contributions plus actual earnings thereon.

Forfeitures - At December 31, 2022 and 2021, forfeited nonvested accounts totaled \$15,583 and \$1,990, respectively. These accounts will be used to reduce future Company contributions or pay administrative expenses of the Plan. During 2022, no forfeited nonvested accounts were used as described above.

Payment of Benefits - Upon termination of service, retirement, death, or disability, a participant or beneficiary may elect to receive a lump-sum distribution equal to the value of the participant's vested interest in his or her account. Participants who have attained age 59 ½ may also elect to receive a distribution of all or any portion of their account balance prior to termination of employment (in-service withdrawals). If a participant has terminated service and has a vested account balance of \$5,000 or less, then the participant is subject to an involuntary distribution, subject to certain automatic rollover provisions.

Note 1 - Continued

Notes Receivable From Participants - A participant may borrow the lesser of \$50,000 or 50% of his or her vested balance, with a minimum loan of \$1,000. Loan terms range from one to five years and plan loans will bear a reasonable interest rate determined by the plan administrator. Principal and interest are paid ratably through payroll deductions.

Note 2 - Significant Accounting Policies

Basis of Accounting - The financial statements of the Plan are prepared on the accrual basis of accounting.

Use of Estimates - The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America (GAAP) requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amount of assets and liabilities and changes therein, and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Investment Valuation and Income Recognition - Investments are reported at fair value (except for fully benefit-responsive investment contracts, which are reported at contract value). Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. See Note 3 for discussion of fair value measurements. Purchases and sales are recorded on a trade-date basis. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Dividends are recorded on the ex-dividend date. Net appreciation or depreciation in fair value of investments represents the change in fair value of assets from one period to the next and realized gains and losses on investments.

Notes Receivable From Participants - Notes receivable from participants are measured at their unpaid principal balance. Accrued but unpaid interest, if any, would not have a material impact on the Plan's financial statements. If a participant ceases to make loan repayments and the plan administrator deems the participant loan to be in default, the participant loan balance is reduced and a benefit payment is recorded. No allowance for credit losses has been recorded as of December 31, 2022 and 2021.

Payment of Benefits - Benefits are recorded when paid.

Administrative Expenses - Certain expenses of maintaining the Plan are paid by the Plan, unless otherwise paid by the Company. Expenses that are paid by the Company are excluded from these financial statements. Transaction based fees for notes receivable from participants and benefit payments are charged directly to participant accounts. Certain investment related expenses are charged directly against the fund's investment performance and, therefore, are not separately disclosed in the accompanying financial statements.

Subsequent Events - The Plan's management has evaluated subsequent events through October 12, 2023, the date on which the Plan's financial statements were available to be issued.

Note 3 - Fair Value Measurements

GAAP provides the framework for measuring fair value. That framework provides a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. The hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (Level 1) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (Level 3).

The three levels of the fair value hierarchy are described as follows:

Level 1 - Unadjusted quoted prices for identical assets or liabilities in active markets that the Plan has the ability to access.

Level 2 - Quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities in active markets, quoted prices for identical or similar assets or liabilities in inactive markets, inputs other than the quoted prices that are observable for the asset or liability, and inputs that are derived principally from or corroborated by observable market data by correlation or other means. If the asset or liability has a specified (contractual) term, the Level 2 input must be observable for substantially the full term of the asset or liability.

Level 3 - Unobservable inputs that are significant to the fair value measurement.

A financial instrument's level within the fair value hierarchy is based upon the lowest level of any input that is significant to the fair value measurement. Valuation techniques used need to maximize the use of observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs.

Following is a description of the valuation methodologies used for assets measured at fair value. There have been no changes in the methodologies used at December 31, 2022 and 2021.

Mutual Funds - Valued at the daily closing price as reported by the fund. Mutual funds held by the Plan are open-end mutual funds that are registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission. These funds are required to publish their daily net asset value and to transact at that price. The mutual funds held by the Plan are deemed to be actively traded.

Note 4 - Fully Benefit-Responsive Investment Contracts

The Plan entered into a fully benefit-responsive investment contract with The Standard Insurance Company (The Standard). The Standard maintains the contributions in a general account. The account is credited with earnings on the underlying investments and charged for participant withdrawals and administrative expenses. The Standard is contractually obligated to repay the principal and a specified interest rate that is guaranteed to the Plan. The crediting rate is based on a formula established by The Standard which will never be below 1.0% annually. The crediting rate is reviewed on a quarterly basis for resetting.

This contract meets the fully benefit-responsive criteria and therefore is reported at contract value. Contract value is the relevant measure for fully benefit-responsive investment contracts because this is the amount received by participants if they were to initiate permitted transactions under the terms of the Plan. Contract value represents contributions made under the contract, plus earnings, less participant withdrawals and administrative expenses. Participants may ordinarily direct the withdrawal or transfer of all or a portion of their investment at contract value.

The Plan's ability to receive amounts due is dependent on the issuer's ability to meet its financial obligations. The issuer's ability to meet its contractual obligations may be affected by future economic and regulatory developments.

Certain events might limit the ability of the Plan to transact at contract value with the issuer. Such events include (1) amendments to the Plan documents (including complete or partial Plan termination or merger with another plan), (2) changes to the Plan's prohibition on competing investment options or deletion of equity wash provisions, (3) bankruptcy of the plan sponsor or other plan sponsor events (for example, divestitures or spin-offs of a subsidiary) that cause a significant withdrawal from the Plan, or (4) the failure of the trust to qualify for exemption from federal income taxes or any required prohibited transaction exemption under ERISA (5) premature termination of the contract. No events are probable of occurring that might limit the ability of the Plan to transact at contract value with the contract issuer and that also would limit the ability of the plan to transact at contract value with the participants.

In addition, certain events allow the issuer to terminate the contract with the Plan and settle at an amount different from contract value. Such events include (1) an uncured violation of the Plan's investment guidelines, (2) a breach of material obligation under the contract, (3) a material misrepresentation, (4) a material amendment to the agreement without the consent of the issuer.

Note 5 - Certified Information

The plan administrator has elected the method of compliance permitted by 29 CFR 2520.103-8 of the Department of Labor's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA. Investments held at December 31, 2022 and 2021, investment income or loss for the year ended December 31, 2022, that is disclosed in the accompanying financial statements and supplementary information, were obtained or derived from information supplied to the plan administrator and certified as complete and accurate by Fidelity Management Trust Company (Fidelity). The Plan's independent accountants did not perform auditing procedures with respect to this information, except for comparing such information to the related information included in the financial statements and supplementary information.

Note 6 - Party-in-Interest Transactions

Certain Plan investments are managed by Fidelity and its affiliates. Fidelity is the trustee for the Plan and, therefore, transactions with such investments are party-in-interest transactions. The Plan pays certain expenses related to plan operations to various service providers and also issues loans to participants. These transactions are party-in-interest transactions.

Note 7 - Plan Termination

Although it has not expressed any intent to do so, the Company has the right under the plan to discontinue its contributions at any time and to terminate the Plan subject to the provisions of ERISA.

Note 8 - Income Tax Status

The Company adopted an FMR LLC pre-approved plan document. FMR LLC received an approval letter from the IRS dated June 30, 2020, which states that the form of the plan document satisfies the applicable provisions of the IRC. The Plan itself has not received a determination letter from the IRS; however, the Plan's management believes that the Plan is currently designed and being operated in compliance with the applicable requirements of the IRC. Therefore, no provision for income tax has been included in the Plan's financial statements. The Plan is subject to audits by the IRS; however, there are currently no audits for any tax periods in progress.

Note 9 - Risks and Uncertainties

The Plan invests in various investment securities. Investment securities are exposed to various risks, such as interest rate, market, and credit risks. Market risks include global events such as a pandemic or international conflict which could impact the value of investment securities. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investment securities, it is reasonably possible that changes in the values of investment securities will occur in the near term and that such changes could materially affect participants' account balances and the amounts reported in the statements of net assets available for benefits.

Note 10 - Delinquent Contributions

During 2021, there were two instances in which participant deferral contributions and loan repayments were not deposited by the Company as plan assets within the time limitation stipulated under the Department of Labor's regulations. In total, \$179,940 of deferral contributions and loan repayments were identified as delinquent and considered nonexempt prohibited transactions.

Scope and Nature of the ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) Audit

We have performed audits of the financial statements of Rover.com 401(k) Plan (the Plan), an employee benefit plan subject to the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (ERISA), as permitted by ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C). The financial statements comprise the statements of net assets available for benefits as of December 31, 2022 and 2021, and the related statement of changes in net assets available for benefits for the year ended December 31, 2022, and the related notes to the financial statements.

Management, having determined it is permissible in the circumstances, has elected to have the audits of the Plan's financial statements performed in accordance with ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) pursuant to 29 CFR 2520.103-8 of the Department of Labor's (DOL) Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA (ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) audit). Note 1 - Plan Description

The following description of the Rover.com 401(k) Plan (the Plan) provides only general information. Participants should refer to the plan document for a more complete description of the Plan's provisions.

General - The Plan is a defined contribution plan established by A Place For Rover, Inc. (the Company) under the provisions of Section 401(a) of the Internal Revenue Code (IRC). All employees become eligible to participate in the Plan upon reaching age 18 and after completion of one month of service. The Plan is subject to the provisions of the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (ERISA), as amended.

Contributions - Employees may elect to defer up to 85% of their compensation as pre-tax or Roth contributions. The Plan has adopted an automatic enrollment feature under which new employees are enrolled with a 4% pre-tax deferral with annual 1% increases up to 10% unless they formally waive participation or elect a different participation level. Participants who have attained age 50 before the end of the plan year are eligible to make catch-up contributions. Participants may also contribute amounts representing distributions from other eligible defined benefit or defined contribution plans (rollover).

The Company may make discretionary employer matching. Effective January 1, 2022, the Company elected to match 100% of the first 4% of eligible compensation, with a minimum match of \$750 if a participant defers a minimum of 4% of eligible compensation.

The Company may also make discretionary nonelective contributions. There were no nonelective contributions made for the plan year ended December 31, 2022.

Contributions are subject to certain Internal Revenue Service (IRS) limitations.

Participant Accounts - Each participant's account is credited with the participant's contributions and matching contributions, as well as allocations of the Company's nonelective contributions (if any) and plan earnings. Participant accounts are charged with an allocation of administrative expenses that are paid by the Plan. Allocations are based on participant earnings, account balances, or specific participant transactions, as defined. The benefit to which a participant is entitled is the benefit that can be provided from the participant's vested account. Participants direct the investment of their account into various investment options offered by the Plan.

Vesting - Participants are immediately vested in their salary deferral contributions, Company matching and nonelective contributions plus actual earnings thereon.

Forfeitures - At December 31, 2022 and 2021, forfeited nonvested accounts totaled \$15,583 and \$1,990, respectively. These accounts will be used to reduce future Company contributions or pay administrative expenses of the Plan. During 2022, no forfeited nonvested accounts were used as described above.

Payment of Benefits - Upon termination of service, retirement, death, or disability, a participant or beneficiary may elect to receive a lump-sum distribution equal to the value of the participant's vested interest in his or her account. Participants who have attained age 59 ½ may also elect to receive a distribution of all or any portion of their account balance prior to termination of employment (in-service withdrawals). If a participant has terminated service and has a vested account balance of \$5,000 or less, then the participant is subject to an involuntary distribution, subject to certain automatic rollover provisions.

Notes Receivable From Participants - A participant may borrow the lesser of \$50,000 or 50% of his or her vested balance, with a minimum loan of \$1,000. Loan terms range from one to five years and plan loans will bear a reasonable interest rate determined by the plan administrator. Principal and interest are paid ratably through payroll deductions.

Note 2 - Significant Accounting Policies

Basis of Accounting - The financial statements of the Plan are prepared on the accrual basis of accounting.

Use of Estimates - The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America (GAAP) requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amount of assets and liabilities and changes therein, and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Investment Valuation and Income Recognition - Investments are reported at fair value (except for fully benefit-responsive investment contracts, which are reported at contract value). Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. See Note 3 for discussion of fair value measurements. Purchases and sales are recorded on a trade-date basis. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Dividends are recorded on the ex-dividend date. Net appreciation or depreciation in fair value of investments represents the change in fair value of assets from one period to the next and realized gains and losses on investments.

Notes Receivable From Participants - Notes receivable from participants are measured at their unpaid principal balance. Accrued but unpaid interest, if any, would not have a material impact on the Plan's financial statements. If a participant ceases to make loan repayments and the plan administrator deems the participant loan to be in default, the participant loan balance is reduced and a benefit payment is recorded. No allowance for credit losses has been recorded as of December 31, 2022 and 2021.

Payment of Benefits - Benefits are recorded when paid.

Administrative Expenses - Certain expenses of maintaining the Plan are paid by the Plan, unless otherwise paid by the Company. Expenses that are paid by the Company are excluded from these financial statements. Transaction based fees for notes receivable from participants and benefit payments are charged directly to participant accounts. Certain investment related expenses are charged directly against the fund's investment performance and, therefore, are not separately disclosed in the accompanying financial statements.

Subsequent Events - The Plan's management has evaluated subsequent events through October 12, 2023, the date on which the Plan's financial statements were available to be issued.

Note 3 - Fair Value Measurements

GAAP provides the framework for measuring fair value. That framework provides a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. The hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (Level 1) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (Level 3).

The three levels of the fair value hierarchy are described as follows:

Level 1 - Unadjusted quoted prices for identical assets or liabilities in active markets that the Plan has the ability to access.

Level 2 - Quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities in active markets, quoted prices for identical or similar assets or liabilities in inactive markets, inputs other than the quoted prices that are observable for the asset or liability, and inputs that are derived principally from or corroborated by observable market data by correlation or other means. If the asset or liability has a specified (contractual) term, the Level 2 input must be observable for substantially the full term of the asset or liability.

Level 3 - Unobservable inputs that are significant to the fair value measurement.

A financial instrument's level within the fair value hierarchy is based upon the lowest level of any input that is significant to the fair value measurement. Valuation techniques used need to maximize the use of observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs.

Following is a description of the valuation methodologies used for assets measured at fair value. There have been no changes in the methodologies used at December 31, 2022 and 2021.

Mutual Funds - Valued at the daily closing price as reported by the fund. Mutual funds held by the Plan are open-end mutual funds that are registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission. These funds are required to publish their daily net asset value and to transact at that price. The mutual funds held by the Plan are deemed to be actively traded.

Note 4 - Fully Benefit-Responsive Investment Contracts

The Plan entered into a fully benefit-responsive investment contract with The Standard Insurance Company (The Standard). The Standard maintains the contributions in a general account. The account is credited with earnings on the underlying investments and charged for participant withdrawals and administrative expenses. The Standard is contractually obligated to repay the principal and a specified interest rate that is guaranteed to the Plan. The crediting rate is based on a formula established by The Standard which will never be below 1.0% annually. The crediting rate is reviewed on a quarterly basis for resetting.

This contract meets the fully benefit-responsive criteria and therefore is reported at contract value. Contract value is the relevant measure for fully benefit-responsive investment contracts because this is the amount received by participants if they were to initiate permitted transactions under the terms of the Plan. Contract value represents contributions made under the contract, plus earnings, less participant withdrawals and administrative expenses. Participants may ordinarily direct the withdrawal or transfer of all or a portion of their investment at contract value.

The Plan's ability to receive amounts due is dependent on the issuer's ability to meet its financial obligations. The issuer's ability to meet its contractual obligations may be affected by future economic and regulatory developments.

Certain events might limit the ability of the Plan to transact at contract value with the issuer. Such events include (1) amendments to the Plan documents (including complete or partial Plan termination or merger with another plan), (2) changes to the Plan's prohibition on competing investment options or deletion of equity wash provisions, (3) bankruptcy of the plan sponsor or other plan sponsor events (for example, divestitures or spin-offs of a subsidiary) that cause a significant withdrawal from the Plan, or (4) the failure of the trust to qualify for exemption from federal income taxes or any required prohibited transaction exemption under ERISA (5) premature termination of the contract. No events are probable of occurring that might limit the ability of the Plan to transact at contract value with the contract issuer and that also would limit the ability of the plan to transact at contract value with the participants.

In addition, certain events allow the issuer to terminate the contract with the Plan and settle at an amount different from contract value. Such events include (1) an uncured violation of the Plan's investment guidelines, (2) a breach of material obligation under the contract, (3) a material misrepresentation, (4) a material amendment to the agreement without the consent of the issuer.

Note 5 - Certified Information

The plan administrator has elected the method of compliance permitted by 29 CFR 2520.103-8 of the Department of Labor's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA. Investments held at December 31, 2022 and 2021, investment income or loss for the year ended December 31, 2022, that is disclosed in the accompanying financial statements and supplementary information, were obtained or derived from information supplied to the plan administrator and certified as complete and accurate by Fidelity Management Trust Company (Fidelity). The Plan's independent accountants did not perform auditing procedures with respect to this information, except for comparing such information to the related information included in the financial statements and supplementary information.

Note 6 - Party-in-Interest Transactions

Certain Plan investments are managed by Fidelity and its affiliates. Fidelity is the trustee for the Plan and, therefore, transactions with such investments are party-in-interest transactions. The Plan pays certain expenses related to plan operations to various service providers and also issues loans to participants. These transactions are party-in-interest transactions.

Note 7 - Plan Termination

Although it has not expressed any intent to do so, the Company has the right under the plan to discontinue its contributions at any time and to terminate the Plan subject to the provisions of ERISA.

Note 8 - Income Tax Status

The Company adopted an FMR LLC pre-approved plan document. FMR LLC received an approval letter from the IRS dated June 30, 2020, which states that the form of the plan document satisfies the applicable provisions of the IRC. The Plan itself has not received a determination letter from the IRS; however, the Plan's management believes that the Plan is currently designed and being operated in compliance with the applicable requirements of the IRC. Therefore, no provision for income tax has been included in the Plan's financial statements. The Plan is subject to audits by the IRS; however, there are currently no audits for any tax periods in progress.

Note 9 - Risks and Uncertainties

The Plan invests in various investment securities. Investment securities are exposed to various risks, such as interest rate, market, and credit risks. Market risks include global events such as a pandemic or international conflict which could impact the value of investment securities. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investment securities, it is reasonably possible that changes in the values of investment securities will occur in the near term and that such changes could materially affect participants' account balances and the amounts reported in the statements of net assets available for benefits.

Note 10 - Delinquent Contributions

During 2021, there were two instances in which participant deferral contributions and loan repayments were not deposited by the Company as plan assets within the time limitation stipulated under the Department of Labor's regulations. In total, \$179,940 of deferral contributions and loan repayments were identified as delinquent and considered nonexempt prohibited transactions.

Scope and Nature of the ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) Audit

We have performed audits of the financial statements of Rover.com 401(k) Plan (the Plan), an employee benefit plan subject to the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (ERISA), as permitted by ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C). The financial statements comprise the statements of net assets available for benefits as of December 31, 2022 and 2021, and the related statement of changes in net assets available for benefits for the year ended December 31, 2022, and the related notes to the financial statements.

Management, having determined it is permissible in the circumstances, has elected to have the audits of the Plan's financial statements performed in accordance with ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) pursuant to 29 CFR 2520.103-8 of the Department of Labor's (DOL) Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA (ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) audit). Note 1 - Plan Description

The following description of the Rover.com 401(k) Plan (the Plan) provides only general information. Participants should refer to the plan document for a more complete description of the Plan's provisions.

General - The Plan is a defined contribution plan established by A Place For Rover, Inc. (the Company) under the provisions of Section 401(a) of the Internal Revenue Code (IRC). All employees become eligible to participate in the Plan upon reaching age 18 and after completion of one month of service. The Plan is subject to the provisions of the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (ERISA), as amended.

Contributions - Employees may elect to defer up to 85% of their compensation as pre-tax or Roth contributions. The Plan has adopted an automatic enrollment feature under which new employees are enrolled with a 4% pre-tax deferral with annual 1% increases up to 10% unless they formally waive participation or elect a different participation level. Participants who have attained age 50 before the end of the plan year are eligible to make catch-up contributions. Participants may also contribute amounts representing distributions from other eligible defined benefit or defined contribution plans (rollover).

The Company may make discretionary employer matching. Effective January 1, 2022, the Company elected to match 100% of the first 4% of eligible compensation, with a minimum match of \$750 if a participant defers a minimum of 4% of eligible compensation.

The Company may also make discretionary nonelective contributions. There were no nonelective contributions made for the plan year ended December 31, 2022.

Contributions are subject to certain Internal Revenue Service (IRS) limitations.

Participant Accounts - Each participant's account is credited with the participant's contributions and matching contributions, as well as allocations of the Company's nonelective contributions (if any) and plan earnings. Participant accounts are charged with an allocation of administrative expenses that are paid by the Plan. Allocations are based on participant earnings, account balances, or specific participant transactions, as defined. The benefit to which a participant is entitled is the benefit that can be provided from the participant's vested account. Participants direct the investment of their account into various investment options offered by the Plan.

Vesting - Participants are immediately vested in their salary deferral contributions, Company matching and nonelective contributions plus actual earnings thereon.

Forfeitures - At December 31, 2022 and 2021, forfeited nonvested accounts totaled \$15,583 and \$1,990, respectively. These accounts will be used to reduce future Company contributions or pay administrative expenses of the Plan. During 2022, no forfeited nonvested accounts were used as described above.

Payment of Benefits - Upon termination of service, retirement, death, or disability, a participant or beneficiary may elect to receive a lump-sum distribution equal to the value of the participant's vested interest in his or her account. Participants who have attained age 59 ½ may also elect to receive a distribution of all or any portion of their account balance prior to termination of employment (in-service withdrawals). If a participant has terminated service and has a vested account balance of \$5,000 or less, then the participant is subject to an involuntary distribution, subject to certain automatic rollover provisions.

Note 1 - Continued

Notes Receivable From Participants - A participant may borrow the lesser of \$50,000 or 50% of his or her vested balance, with a minimum loan of \$1,000. Loan terms range from one to five years and plan loans will bear a reasonable interest rate determined by the plan administrator. Principal and interest are paid ratably through payroll deductions.

Note 2 - Significant Accounting Policies

Basis of Accounting - The financial statements of the Plan are prepared on the accrual basis of accounting.

Use of Estimates - The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America (GAAP) requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amount of assets and liabilities and changes therein, and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Investment Valuation and Income Recognition - Investments are reported at fair value (except for fully benefit-responsive investment contracts, which are reported at contract value). Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. See Note 3 for discussion of fair value measurements. Purchases and sales are recorded on a trade-date basis. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Dividends are recorded on the ex-dividend date. Net appreciation or depreciation in fair value of investments represents the change in fair value of assets from one period to the next and realized gains and losses on investments.

Notes Receivable From Participants - Notes receivable from participants are measured at their unpaid principal balance. Accrued but unpaid interest, if any, would not have a material impact on the Plan's financial statements. If a participant ceases to make loan repayments and the plan administrator deems the participant loan to be in default, the participant loan balance is reduced and a benefit payment is recorded. No allowance for credit losses has been recorded as of December 31, 2022 and 2021.

Payment of Benefits - Benefits are recorded when paid.

Administrative Expenses - Certain expenses of maintaining the Plan are paid by the Plan, unless otherwise paid by the Company. Expenses that are paid by the Company are excluded from these financial statements. Transaction based fees for notes receivable from participants and benefit payments are charged directly to participant accounts. Certain investment related expenses are charged directly against the fund's investment performance and, therefore, are not separately disclosed in the accompanying financial statements.

Subsequent Events - The Plan's management has evaluated subsequent events through October 12, 2023, the date on which the Plan's financial statements were available to be issued.

Note 3 - Fair Value Measurements

GAAP provides the framework for measuring fair value. That framework provides a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. The hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (Level 1) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (Level 3).

The three levels of the fair value hierarchy are described as follows:

Level 1 - Unadjusted quoted prices for identical assets or liabilities in active markets that the Plan has the ability to access.

Level 2 - Quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities in active markets, quoted prices for identical or similar assets or liabilities in inactive markets, inputs other than the quoted prices that are observable for the asset or liability, and inputs that are derived principally from or corroborated by observable market data by correlation or other means. If the asset or liability has a specified (contractual) term, the Level 2 input must be observable for substantially the full term of the asset or liability.

Level 3 - Unobservable inputs that are significant to the fair value measurement.

A financial instrument's level within the fair value hierarchy is based upon the lowest level of any input that is significant to the fair value measurement. Valuation techniques used need to maximize the use of observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs.

Following is a description of the valuation methodologies used for assets measured at fair value. There have been no changes in the methodologies used at December 31, 2022 and 2021.

Mutual Funds - Valued at the daily closing price as reported by the fund. Mutual funds held by the Plan are open-end mutual funds that are registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission. These funds are required to publish their daily net asset value and to transact at that price. The mutual funds held by the Plan are deemed to be actively traded.

Note 4 - Fully Benefit-Responsive Investment Contracts

The Plan entered into a fully benefit-responsive investment contract with The Standard Insurance Company (The Standard). The Standard maintains the contributions in a general account. The account is credited with earnings on the underlying investments and charged for participant withdrawals and administrative expenses. The Standard is contractually obligated to repay the principal and a specified interest rate that is guaranteed to the Plan. The crediting rate is based on a formula established by The Standard which will never be below 1.0% annually. The crediting rate is reviewed on a quarterly basis for resetting.

This contract meets the fully benefit-responsive criteria and therefore is reported at contract value. Contract value is the relevant measure for fully benefit-responsive investment contracts because this is the amount received by participants if they were to initiate permitted transactions under the terms of the Plan. Contract value represents contributions made under the contract, plus earnings, less participant withdrawals and administrative expenses. Participants may ordinarily direct the withdrawal or transfer of all or a portion of their investment at contract value.

The Plan's ability to receive amounts due is dependent on the issuer's ability to meet its financial obligations. The issuer's ability to meet its contractual obligations may be affected by future economic and regulatory developments.

Certain events might limit the ability of the Plan to transact at contract value with the issuer. Such events include (1) amendments to the Plan documents (including complete or partial Plan termination or merger with another plan), (2) changes to the Plan's prohibition on competing investment options or deletion of equity wash provisions, (3) bankruptcy of the plan sponsor or other plan sponsor events (for example, divestitures or spin-offs of a subsidiary) that cause a significant withdrawal from the Plan, or (4) the failure of the trust to qualify for exemption from federal income taxes or any required prohibited transaction exemption under ERISA (5) premature termination of the contract. No events are probable of occurring that might limit the ability of the Plan to transact at contract value with the contract issuer and that also would limit the ability of the plan to transact at contract value with the participants.

In addition, certain events allow the issuer to terminate the contract with the Plan and settle at an amount different from contract value. Such events include (1) an uncured violation of the Plan's investment guidelines, (2) a breach of material obligation under the contract, (3) a material misrepresentation, (4) a material amendment to the agreement without the consent of the issuer.

Note 5 - Certified Information

The plan administrator has elected the method of compliance permitted by 29 CFR 2520.103-8 of the Department of Labor's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA. Investments held at December 31, 2022 and 2021, investment income or loss for the year ended December 31, 2022, that is disclosed in the accompanying financial statements and supplementary information, were obtained or derived from information supplied to the plan administrator and certified as complete and accurate by Fidelity Management Trust Company (Fidelity). The Plan's independent accountants did not perform auditing procedures with respect to this information, except for comparing such information to the related information included in the financial statements and supplementary information.

Note 6 - Party-in-Interest Transactions

Certain Plan investments are managed by Fidelity and its affiliates. Fidelity is the trustee for the Plan and, therefore, transactions with such investments are party-in-interest transactions. The Plan pays certain expenses related to plan operations to various service providers and also issues loans to participants. These transactions are party-in-interest transactions.

Note 7 - Plan Termination

Although it has not expressed any intent to do so, the Company has the right under the plan to discontinue its contributions at any time and to terminate the Plan subject to the provisions of ERISA.

Note 8 - Income Tax Status

The Company adopted an FMR LLC pre-approved plan document. FMR LLC received an approval letter from the IRS dated June 30, 2020, which states that the form of the plan document satisfies the applicable provisions of the IRC. The Plan itself has not received a determination letter from the IRS; however, the Plan's management believes that the Plan is currently designed and being operated in compliance with the applicable requirements of the IRC. Therefore, no provision for income tax has been included in the Plan's financial statements. The Plan is subject to audits by the IRS; however, there are currently no audits for any tax periods in progress.

Note 9 - Risks and Uncertainties

The Plan invests in various investment securities. Investment securities are exposed to various risks, such as interest rate, market, and credit risks. Market risks include global events such as a pandemic or international conflict which could impact the value of investment securities. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investment securities, it is reasonably possible that changes in the values of investment securities will occur in the near term and that such changes could materially affect participants' account balances and the amounts reported in the statements of net assets available for benefits.

Note 10 - Delinquent Contributions

During 2021, there were two instances in which participant deferral contributions and loan repayments were not deposited by the Company as plan assets within the time limitation stipulated under the Department of Labor's regulations. In total, \$179,940 of deferral contributions and loan repayments were identified as delinquent and considered nonexempt prohibited transactions.
