We have performed audits of the financial statements of Data Systems International, Inc. 401(k) Salary Savings Plan (the Plan) an employee benefit plan subject to the *Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974* (ERISA), as permitted by ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) (ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) audit). Note 1: Description of the Plan

General

The following description of Data Systems International, Inc. 401(k) Salary Savings Plan (the Plan) provides only general information. Participants should refer to the Plan Document for a complete description of the Plan's provisions.

The Plan is a defined contribution plan sponsored by Data Systems International, Inc. (the Company) for the benefit of its employees who have attained age 21. In December 2021, the Company was acquired by NextWorld. The Plan is subject to the provisions of the *Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974* (ERISA). Fidelity Management Trust Company is the trustee of the Plan and serves as plan custodian.

Contributions

The Plan permits eligible employees through a salary deferral election to have the Company make annual contributions of up to 60 percent of eligible compensation. Employee rollover contributions are also permitted. Participants who have attained age 50 before the end of the plan year are eligible to make catch-up contributions. Contributions are subject to certain limitations.

The Plan Document also includes an automatic deferral feature whereby a participant is treated as electing to defer 6 percent of eligible compensation, increasing 1 percent annually until a deferral rate of 10 percent is reached, unless the participant makes an affirmative election otherwise.

The Plan also permits a discretionary matching contribution. In 2022 and 2021, the Company matched employee contributions equal to 100 percent of the first 3 percent of eligible compensation and 50 percent of the next 2 percent of eligible compensation up to a maximum 4 percent of that participants' total compensation. The Company has made total matching contributions of \$615,930 and \$605,199, respectively, for the years ended December 31, 2022 and 2021.

The Company may make annual discretionary profit sharing contributions in an amount determined by the Company's board of directors. Profit sharing contributions are allocated based on eligible compensation. Participants must complete at least 1,000 hours of service during the plan year and be employed as of the last day of the plan year to be eligible for any profit sharing contributions. The Company did not make a profit sharing contribution for the years ended December 31, 2022 and 2021.

Participant Investment Account Options

Investment account options available include various mutual funds, exchange-traded funds and money market mutual funds. Each participant has the option of directing their contributions into any of the separate investment accounts and may change the allocation daily.

Employer matching or profit-sharing contributions to the Plan are invested in the same options directed by each participant.

Participant Accounts

Each participant's account is credited with the participant's contributions (including rollover contributions, if any), the employer contributions and plan earnings and is charged with an allocation of administrative expenses. Participants' accounts are valued daily. Allocations are based on participant earnings or account balances, as defined. The benefits to which a participant is entitled is the benefit that can be provided from the participant's vested account.

Forfeitures

Forfeited nonvested accounts are used to pay administrative expenses. Any remaining amounts are used to reduce Company contributions. At December 31, 2022 and 2021, forfeited nonvested accounts totaled \$15,671 and \$10,188, respectively. Forfeitures were not used to reduce employer contributions during 2022 or 2021.

Vesting

Participants are immediately vested in their voluntary pre-tax contributions and rollover contributions plus earnings thereon. Vesting in the Company's contributions portion of their accounts plus earnings thereon is based on completed years of service. A participant is fully vested immediately related to the new employer match contributions. However, if the employee terminated from the Plan prior to the beginning of the employer match, a different vesting schedule exists which states a participant becomes fully vested after six years of credited service. In relation to the nonelective employer contributions, a participant is fully vested after six years of credited service. Participants with employer contributions from previous employment with eNSYNC, who merged into the Plan effective April 1, 2017, are fully vested in the merged employer contributions after three years of credited service.

Notes Receivable from Participants

Participants may borrow from their fund accounts a minimum of \$1,000 up to a maximum of \$50,000 or 50 percent of their vested account balance. Participants may only have one loan outstanding at any given time and cannot apply for another loan until the existing balance is paid in full. The loans are secured by the balance in the participant's account and bear a reasonable rate of interest. The maximum loan term is five years or for a reasonable period of time, which may exceed five years for the purchase of a primary residence. All loans are repayable through payroll withholdings unless the participant is paying the loan in full. Interest on the loans is based on prevailing rates as determined by the Plan Administrator.

Payment of Benefits

A participant is entitled to a benefit equal to the full value in the participant's account upon retirement at age 65, early retirement at age 55 and completion of five years of service, permanent disability or death prior to termination of employment. In the event of resignation or discharge before any of the above events, the benefits will be dependent on the Plan's vesting schedule. Benefits are payable in a lump sum or in installments, subject to certain provisions as defined by the Plan Document. The Plan allows for an immediate distribution of a terminated employee's account if the balance was less than \$1,000. For accounts of terminated employees between \$1,000 and \$5,000, any distribution made without the participant's consent before the normal retirement age will be rolled over to an individual retirement account. In the event of death, benefits are payable to the designated beneficiary. Distributions to participants are recognized in the statements of changes in net assets available for benefits when paid to participants.

The Plan permits hardship withdrawals. To qualify for a hardship withdrawal, the participant must demonstrate immediate and heavy financial needs, as defined in the Plan Document, subject to a minimum of \$500.

Note 2: Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Basis of Accounting

The financial statements of the Plan are maintained on the accrual basis of accounting.

Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of net assets and changes in net assets and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Investment Valuation and Income Recognition

Investments are reported at fair value. Quoted market prices, if available, are used to value the investments. Mutual funds are valued at the published net asset value (NAV) of shares held by the Plan at year end. Common stock is valued based on the publicly available quoted stock price at year end.

Purchases and sales of securities are recorded on a trade-date basis. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Dividends are recorded on the ex-dividend date. Net appreciation (depreciation) in the fair value of investments includes the Plan's gains and losses on investments bought and sold as well as held during the year.

Notes Receivable from Participants

Notes receivable from participants are measured at their unpaid principal balance plus any accrued but unpaid interest. Delinquent participant loans are reclassified as distributions based upon the terms of the Plan Document.

Payment of Benefits

Benefit payments to participants are recorded upon distribution.

Administrative Expenses

Administrative expenses may be paid by the Company or the Plan, at the Company's discretion.

Note 3: Plan Amendments

Effective November 11, 2021, the Plan was amended to allow participants to make voluntary, non-deductible, after-tax contributions.

Note 4: Certification of Plan Trustee

The Plan Administrator has elected the method of annual reporting compliance permitted by ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) pursuant to 29 CFR 2520.103-8 of the Department of Labor's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA. Accordingly, Fidelity Management Trust Company, a qualified institution, has certified the following investment information included in the accompanying financial statements and ERISA-required supplemental schedule is complete and accurate:

- Investments and notes receivable from participants as shown in the statements of net assets available for benefits as of December 31, 2022 and 2021.
- Investment income (loss) and interest income from notes receivable from participants as shown in the statements of changes in net assets available for benefits for the years ended December 31, 2022 and 2021.
- Investment information and notes receivable from participants included in the accompanying schedule of assets (held at end of year) as of December 31, 2022.

Note 5: Related-Party and Party-in-Interest Transactions

Party-in-interest transactions include those with fiduciaries or employees of the Plan, any person who provides services to the Plan, an employer whose employees are covered by the Plan, an employee organization whose members are covered by the Plan, a person who owns 50 percent or more of such an employer or employee association or relatives of such persons.

Certain plan investments are shares of mutual funds managed by Fidelity Management Trust Company. Fidelity Management Trust Company is the trustee and custodian as defined by the Plan and, therefore, these transactions qualify as party-in-interest transactions. Fees paid by the Plan for investment management services are included in net appreciation in fair value of investments, as they are paid through revenue sharing, rather than a direct payment. The plan sponsor pays directly any other fees related to the Plan's operations.

The Plan paid \$44,512 and \$64,885 of fees to Fidelity Management Trust Company during 2022 and 2021, respectively.

Note 6: Disclosures About Fair Value of Plan Assets

Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. Fair value measurements must maximize the use of observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs. There is a hierarchy of three levels of inputs that may be used to measure fair value:

- Level 1** Quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities
- Level 2** Observable inputs other than Level 1 prices, such as quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities; quoted prices in markets that are not active; or other inputs that are observable or can be corroborated by observable market data for substantially the full term of the assets or liabilities
- Level 3** Unobservable inputs supported by little or no market activity and are significant to the fair value of the assets or liabilities

Note 9: Plan Tax Status

The Plan operates under a nonstandardized adoption agreement in connection with a prototype retirement plan and trust/custodial document sponsored by Fidelity Management & Research Company. This prototype plan document has been filed with the appropriate agency. The prototype plan obtained its latest determination letter on June 30, 2020, in which the Internal Revenue Service stated that the prototype plan, as then designed, was in compliance with the applicable requirements of the Internal Revenue Code. The Plan has not obtained or requested a determination letter. However, the Plan Administrator believes that the Plan is currently designed and being operated in compliance with the applicable requirements of the Internal Revenue Code and that the Plan was qualified and the related trust was tax-exempt as of the financial statement date.

Note 10: Risks and Uncertainties

The Plan invests in various investment securities. Investment securities are exposed to various risks such as interest rate, market and credit risks. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investment securities, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in the values of investment securities will occur in the near term and that such changes could materially affect the participants' account balances and the amounts reported in the statements of net assets available for benefits.

Note 11: Subsequent Events

Subsequent events have been evaluated through October 13, 2023, which is the date the financial statements were available to be issued.

During the 2023 plan year, Data Systems International, Inc., having been acquired by NextWorld in 2021, elected to merge into the NextWorld 401(k) Plan. An aggregate of \$24,463,107 was transferred out of the Plan and into the NextWorld 401(k) Plan between January 1, 2023 and April 30, 2023.

In planning and performing our audit of the financial statements of Data Systems International, Inc. 401(k) Salary Savings Plan (the Plan) as of and for the year ended December 31, 2022, in accordance with GAAS, we considered the Plan's internal control over financial reporting (internal control).

This consideration served as a basis for designing our audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstance for the purpose of expressing our opinion on the financial statements.

However, this consideration was **not** for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the Plan's internal control.

Accordingly, we do not express an opinion on the effectiveness of the Plan's internal control.

Our consideration of internal control was for the limited purpose described in the preceding paragraphs and was not designed to identify all deficiencies in internal control that might be material weaknesses or significant deficiencies and, therefore, material weaknesses or significant deficiencies may exist that were not identified.

Categorizing Deficiencies by Severity

Deficiency

A deficiency in internal control exists when the design or operation of a control does not allow management or employees, in the normal course of performing their assigned functions, to prevent or detect and correct misstatements on a timely basis.



Significant Deficiency

A significant deficiency is a deficiency, or combination of deficiencies, in internal control that is less severe than a material weakness, yet important enough to merit attention by those charged with governance.



Material Weakness

A material weakness is a deficiency, or a combination of deficiencies, in internal control, such that there is a reasonable possibility that material misstatements of the Plan's financial statements will not be prevented or detected and corrected on a timely basis.



Identified Deficiencies

We identified certain deficiencies in internal control that we consider to be deficiencies.

Deficiencies

- Formal Review Processes
 - We observed that the Plan does not have back-end controls in place to review distributions sent out by the service organization after requested by participants. This leaves the Plan open to risk of distributions not within plan provisions if a mistake is made by the service organization. We recommend a formal review and approval of these distributions by an appropriate level of management on a regular basis.
 - In addition, we noted the plan sponsor did not review, in detail, the SOC 1 report of the service organization. Since a significant amount of the processing of plan transactions is performed by service organizations, it is imperative that plan management review the procedures at these service organizations on a consistent basis and document such review in detail as part of due diligence in operating the Plan.
- Documentation of Participant Elections
 - We observed the plan sponsor, or the TPA, does not maintain proper documentation regarding participant elections to not withhold taxes on distributions. We recommend the Plan retain proper documentation of these elections by Plan participants to ensure that proper tax withholdings are withheld, or not withheld, from distributions taken by participants.
- Incorrect Calculation of Employee Deferrals and Employer Contributions
 - During our audit, we noted one participant that had an additional deferral deducted from payroll and remitted to the Plan in error along with a matching contribution remitted from the plan sponsor to the Plan in error. Although the error appears to be isolated, we recommend formal review of status change reports and payroll reports to ensure the correct amounts are being deducted from employee's pay on a payroll run basis.

Other Matters

Although not considered material weaknesses, significant deficiencies, or deficiencies in internal control over financial reporting, we also observed other matters and offer these comments and suggestions with respect to matters which came to our attention during the course of the audit of the financial statements. Our audit procedures are designed primarily to enable us to form an opinion on the financial statements and, therefore, may not bring to light all weaknesses in policies and procedures that may exist.

However, these other matters are offered as constructive suggestions for the consideration of management as part of the ongoing process of modifying and improving financial and administrative practices and procedures.

We can discuss these matters further at your convenience and may provide implementation assistance for changes or improvements.

SECURE Act 2.0

The *Setting Every Community Up for Retirement Enhancement Act 2.0* was passed on December 29, 2022. Better known as “**SECURE 2.0**”, this sweeping legislation has a significant impact on individuals planning for retirement as well as plan administrators. Certain changes are effective in 2023 while other provisions are phased in over the next several years.

Nearer term provisions of the SECURE 2.0 Act impacting qualified retirement plans:

- **Student Loan Payments & Matching Contributions** – In an effort to allow those paying down student debt to also save for retirement, the SECURE 2.0 Act allows an employee to receive available matching contributions by way of paying down student loan debt. Employers are permitted to make matching contributions under 401(k), 403(b) or SIMPLE IRAs with respect to “qualified student loan payments.” This provision will generally begin in 2024.
- **Early Withdrawals** – Currently, withdrawals from retirement plans prior to age 59 ½ are subject to a 10 percent penalty on top of any income tax due on the withdrawal. Starting in 2024, the legislation allows for certain exceptions (with limitations) to be exempt from the additional penalty:
 - Terminally ill account holders (some administrative questions are an issue including if self-certification is allowed)
 - Domestic abuse survivors (self-certification allowed)
 - Payment of specific types of long-term care policy premiums
 - Survivors of federally declared disasters
- **Increase in Mandatory Cash Out Limit** – Effective in 2024, the mandatory cash out amount will increase from \$5,000 to \$7,000. This is an optional provision but should help employers manage the number of terminated participants in the Plan.

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- **Roth Employer Matching Contributions** – Participants may now elect for their employer matching contributions to be on a Roth basis. There are many procedural questions regarding the administrative challenges of updating payroll systems to handle the payroll tax implications of this type of arrangement. This provision is effective in 2024.
- **Roth Catch-Up Contributions** – Beginning in 2024, certain highly-compensated employees will be required to have their catch-up contributions classified as Roth contributions.
- **Employee Self-Certification of Hardships** – Participants are allowed to self-certify their hardship to qualify for a hardship withdrawal. This provision is effective for plan years beginning after the date of the enactment of SECURE 2.0.
- **Emergency Savings Provision** – One of the most impactful changes is the provision that is effective January 1, 2024, which allows employers to establish retirement plan linked emergency savings accounts for non-highly compensated employees. Employers will be able to automatically enroll participants up to a 3 percent participant Roth contribution (maximum limit of \$2,500). Employers could elect to set the maximum contribution at a lower dollar amount. Employers may also match the contributions (subject to the same \$2,500 cap); however, those contributions would have to flow into their retirement account and not the account for the emergency fund. Participants are limited to four withdrawals within a calendar plan year. Upon separation of service, the benefits are not taxable given their Roth nature.
- **Improved Self Correction of Auto Enrollment Errors** – Starting in 2024, plan sponsors are given more flexibility to correct errors. Plan management will have up to 9.5 months after the end of the year when the error occurred to correct the issue. The update also extends to auto-increase provisions as well.
- **De Minimis Financial Incentives** – Employers can incentivize participants to enroll in retirement plans with gift cards. Employers will need to assess the impact of the incentives on their plan's definition of eligible compensation. This feature is essentially effective in 2023.

Provisions of the SECURE 2.0 Act that impact plan sponsors further down the road (2025 or later):

- **Increased Catch-Up Contributions for Ages 60-63** – Beginning in 2025, older 401(k) and 403(b) plan participants will be able to contribute more to their plan in catch-up contributions. The amount will be limited to \$10,000 or half of the catch up limit for that applicable year. **The catch-up contribution limit in 2023 for all other 401(k) and 403(b) participants over age 50 is \$7,500.**
- **Auto Enrollment / Auto Increase Required for New Plans** – Starting in 2025, new 401(k) and 403(b) plans will be required to automatically enroll new participants in a range of 3-10 percent, including an auto-increase provision of 1 percent per year up to a cap of 10-15 percent. **Existing plans as well as smaller employers will be grandfathered and not required to make this change.**
- **Department of Labor (DOL) System for Lost Participants** – The DOL is essentially establishing a database for plan participants who have lost track of their retirement savings at various employers to identify the contact person at the applicable plan sponsor or third-party administrator. The goal is for this system to be up and running by the end of 2024.
- **Long-Term Part-Time (LTPT) Employee Participation** – As a follow up to the initial SECURE legislation, the LTPT guidance has been reduced from three years of having 500 hours of service to two years. As this provision only applies to employee deferrals, many employers may loosen up their eligibility requirement but will also need to assess certain excludable employees and whether they should be included as a plan participant.

This legislation is expected to create an additional burden on those in human resources to determine the additional administrative requirements triggered by this Act. Plan amendments generally need not be made until the end of the first plan year beginning on or after January 1, 2025. We would encourage you to consult with your third-party administrator and/or your ERISA legal counsel to amend your plan appropriately for this legislation.

6. We acknowledge our responsibility for administering the Plan and determining that the Plan's transactions that are presented and disclosed in the ERISA plan financial statements are in conformity with the Plan's provisions, including maintaining sufficient records with respect to each of the participants to determine the benefits due or which may become due to such participants.
7. Plan and the trust established under the Plan are qualified under the appropriate section of the Internal Revenue Code, and we intend to continue them as a qualified Plan and trust. We do not have any intention at present to terminate the Plan. Required nondiscrimination testing under the appropriate Code Sections has been completed for the Plan, and any excess contributions have been disposed of in accordance with regulations.

8. The Plan instrument has not been amended during the year.
9. The Plan operates under a nonstandardized adoption agreement in connection with a prototype retirement plan and trust/custodial document sponsored by Fidelity Management & Research Company. This prototype plan document has been filed with the appropriate agency. The prototype plan obtained its latest determination letter on June 30, 2020, in which the Internal Revenue Service stated that the prototype plan, as then designed, was in compliance with the applicable requirements of the Internal Revenue Code. The Plan has not obtained or requested a determination letter. However, the Plan Administrator believes that the Plan is currently designed and being operated in compliance with the applicable requirements of the Internal Revenue Code and that the Plan was qualified and the related trust was tax-exempt as of the financial statement date.
10. The Plan has complied with the fidelity bonding requirements of ERISA.
11. The Plan has made no investments during the year that violate the terms of the Plan or Trust Agreement.
12. We have reviewed the reports of all transactions processed by third-party servicers, and, based on our review, we believe the transactions shown in the reports are valid and in accordance with our instructions to the third-party processor. We also have had no communications from any of the Plan's service organizations regarding any fraud, noncompliance with laws and regulations, or uncorrected misstatements.
13. We have complied with the Department of Labor's regulations concerning the timely remittance of participant contributions and loan repayments.
14. As applicable, we have complied with the Department of Labor's regulations concerning the services provider fee disclosures in accordance with Sec. 408(b)(2).
15. We understand the values of the assets recorded in the financial statements could change rapidly, resulting in material future adjustments to investment values that could negatively impact the Plan. We acknowledge that you have no responsibility for future changes caused by the current economic environment and the resulting impact on the Plan's financial statements. Further, the Plan Sponsor is solely responsible for all aspects of managing the Plan, including questioning the quality and valuation of investments.
16. We have evaluated whether there are conditions or events known or reasonably knowable, considered in the aggregate, that raise substantial doubt about the Plan's ability to continue as a going concern within one year of the date of this letter without consideration of potential mitigating effects of management's plans not yet fully implemented and concluded substantial doubt does not exist.

Misappropriation, Misstatements, & Fraud

17. We have informed you of all current risks of a material amount that are not adequately prevented or detected by our procedures with respect to:
 - a. Misappropriation of assets.
 - b. Misrepresented or misstated assets or liabilities.
18. We have no knowledge of fraud or suspected fraud affecting the Plan involving:
 - a. Management or employees who have significant roles in internal control over financial reporting, or

- b. Others when the fraud could have a material effect on the financial statements.
19. We have no knowledge of any allegations of fraud or suspected fraud affecting the Plan received in communications from participants, former participants, regulators, third-party servicers or others.
20. We have assessed the risk that the financial statements may be materially misstated as a result of fraud and disclosed to you any such risk identified.

Related Parties & Parties-In-Interest

21. We have disclosed to you the identity of all of the Plan's related parties and parties-in-interest and all the related-party and party-in-interest relationships of which we are aware.

In addition, we have disclosed to you all related-party transactions and amounts receivable from or payable to related parties of which we are aware, including:

any modifications during the year that were made to related-party transaction agreements which existed prior to the beginning of the year under audit, as well as new related-party transaction agreements that were executed during the year under audit.

Related-party relationships and transactions have been appropriately accounted for and disclosed in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

22. We understand that the term related party refers to:

- Affiliates.
- Entities for which investments are accounted for by the equity method.
- Trusts for the benefits of employees, such as pension and profit-sharing trusts that are managed by or under the trusteeship of management.
- Principal owners and members of their immediate families.
- Management and members of their immediate families.
- Any other party with which the Plan may deal if one party can significantly influence the management or operating policies of the other to an extent that one of the transacting parties might be prevented from fully pursuing its own separate interests.

Another party is also a related party if it can significantly influence the management or operating policies of the transacting parties or if it has an ownership interest in one of the transacting parties and can significantly influence the other to an extent that one or more of the transacting parties might be prevented from fully pursuing its own separate interests.

The term affiliate refers to a party that directly or indirectly controls, or is controlled by, or is under common control with, the Plan.

Also, we are not aware of any litigation or claims, pending or threatened, for which legal counsel should be sought.

24. We have no knowledge of communications, other than those specifically disclosed, from regulatory agencies, governmental representatives, employees, or others concerning investigations or allegations of noncompliance with laws and regulations, deficiencies in financial reporting practices, or other matters that could have a material adverse effect on the financial statements.

In addition, we have no knowledge of concentrations, which refer to volumes of loans, investments, or deposits, existing at the date of the financial statements that would make the Plan vulnerable to the risk of severe impact in the near term that have not been properly disclosed in the financial statements.

- a. The underlying assumptions are reasonable and they appropriately reflect management's intent and ability to carry out its stated course of action.
 - b. The measurement methods and significant assumptions used in determining fair value are appropriate in the circumstances for financial statement measurement and disclosure purposes and have been consistently applied.
 - c. The significant assumptions appropriately reflect market participant assumptions.
 - d. The disclosures related to fair values are complete, adequate, and in conformity with U.S. GAAP.
 - e. There are no subsequent events that require adjustments to the fair value measurements and disclosures included in the financial statements.
