We have performed audits of the accompanying financial statements of Inland Marine Service 401(k) Plan, an employee benefit plan subject to the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (ERISA), as permitted by ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) [ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) audit]. The financial statements comprise the statements of net assets available for benefits as of December 31, 2023 and 2022, and the related statements of changes in net assets available for benefits for the years then ended, and the related notes to the financial statements.

Management, having determined it is permissible in the circumstances, has elected to have the audits of Inland Marine Service 401(k) Plan's financial statements performed in accordance with ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) pursuant to 29 CFR 2520.103-8 of the Department of Labor's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA. As permitted by ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C), our audits need not extend to any statements or information related to assets held for investment of the plan (investment information) by a bank or similar institution or insurance carrier that is regulated, supervised, and subject to periodic examination by a state or federal agency, provided that the statements or information regarding assets so held are prepared and certified to by the bank or similar institution or insurance carrier in accordance with 29 CFR 2520.103-5 of the Department of Labor's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA (qualified institution).

Management has obtained certifications from Voya Institutional Trust Company as of December 31, 2023 and for the period from March 6, 2023 to December 31, 2023, and Empower Trust Company, LLC as of December 31, 2022 and for the period from January 1, 2022 to March 5, 2023, stating that the certified investment information, as described in the Certified Investments note to the financial statements, is complete and accurate.

Opinion

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS**

NOTE 1 - DESCRIPTION OF THE PLAN

The following description of the Inland Marine Service 401(k) Plan (the Plan) provides only general information. Participants should refer to the Plan document and the summary plan description for a more complete description of the Plan's provisions.

General

The Plan is a defined contribution plan covering all eligible employees of Inland Marine Service, Inc. (the Company) who have completed six months of service and are at least 21 years of age. Deckhand employees that were hired on or after January 1, 2014 are excluded from the Plan. As of March 6, 2023, employees have the opportunity to become a participant once the employee satisfies those requirements listed above. Prior to March 6, 2023, employees had the opportunity to become a participant on the first "entry date", January 1, April 1, July 1, or October 1 of each year, once the employee satisfied those requirements listed above. The Plan is subject to the provisions of the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (ERISA). The Retirement Plan Committee oversees governance of the Plan and determines appropriateness of the Plan's investment offerings and monitors investment performance.

Inland Marine Harbor Services, Inc., related employer, that has adopted the provisions of the Plan

Participant Contributions

Each year, participants may contribute up to limits as defined in the Plan, not to exceed amounts determined by the Internal Revenue Service. Participants who have attained age 50 before the end of the Plan year are eligible to make catch-up contributions. Participants may also contribute amounts representing distributions from certain other retirement plans as described in the Plan document (rollovers). Participants direct the investment of their contributions into any combination of several investment options offered by the Plan.

Employer Contributions

The Company may make matching contributions, as well as profit sharing contributions to the Plan. Prior to March 6, 2023, in order to receive these contributions, the employee must be employed on the last day of the year. As of and after March 6, 2023, the employee is not required to be employed on the last day of the year to receive the discretionary matching contributions. For the years ended December 31, 2023 and 2022, the Company did not make any matching contributions. There was no profit sharing contributions for either 2023 or 2022. Contributions are subject to certain statutory limitations.

Participant Accounts

Each participant's account is credited with the participant's contributions and allocations of (a) Plan earnings (losses), including a charge for an allocation of administrative expenses paid by the Plan, and (b) employer contributions. Allocations are based on participant earnings, account balances, or specific participant transactions, as defined in the Plan. The benefit to which a participant is entitled is the benefit that can be provided from the participant's vested account.

Notes Receivable from Participants

Participants may borrow from their accounts a minimum of \$1,000 up to a maximum equal to the lesser of \$50,000 or 50% of their vested account balance. The notes are secured by the balance of the participant's account. The interest rate on these notes is set at 1.0% above the prime rate and is reviewed by the Plan administrator on a regular basis. Principal and interest is paid ratably through payroll deductions.

Vesting

Participants are immediately vested in their 401(k) elective deferrals and rollover contributions plus actual earnings thereon. Vesting in the remainder of their accounts, plus actual earnings thereon, is based on years of service as defined in the Plan. Vesting for matching contributions and profit sharing contributions begins upon the completion of the second year of service, and a participant is 100% vested after 5 years of credited service.

NOTE 1 - DESCRIPTION OF THE PLAN (Continued)**Forfeitures**

If a participant is not fully vested on their termination date, the non-vested amount of their account is forfeited. Forfeitures on non-vested account balances will be used to reduce future employer contributions or to pay Plan expenses.

Payment of Benefits

On termination of service due to death, disability, retirement or termination of employment from the Company, a participant may elect to receive either a lump sum amount equal to the value of the participant's vested interest in his or her account or any other form of payment included in the Plan document. However, participants with a vested balance of less than \$5,000 will receive a distribution equal to the vested portion of their account upon termination. Participants with a vested balance in excess of \$5,000 may remain in the Plan, but they may not make additional contributions.

NOTE 2 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES**Basis of Accounting**

The financial statements of the Plan are prepared on the accrual basis of accounting.

Use of Estimates

The process of preparing financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America (U.S. GAAP) requires the use of estimates and assumptions regarding certain types of assets, liabilities, revenues, and expenses. Certain estimates relate to unsettled transactions and events as of the date of the financial statements. Other estimates relate to assumptions about the ongoing operations and may impact future periods. Accordingly, upon settlement, actual results may differ from estimated amounts.

Investment Valuation and Income Recognition

Investments are reported at fair value. Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. The Plan's Retirement Plan Committee determines the Plan's valuation policies utilizing information provided by the investment advisers and trustee (see the Fair Value Measurements note).

Purchases and sales of securities are recorded on a trade-date basis. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Dividends are recorded on the ex-dividend date. Net appreciation (depreciation) in fair value of investments includes the Plan's gains and losses on investments bought and sold, as well as held during the year.

Notes Receivable from Participants

Notes receivable from participants are measured at their unpaid principal balance plus any accrued but unpaid interest. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Related fees are charged directly to the borrowing participant's account and are included in administrative expenses when incurred. If a participant does not make loan payments and the Plan administrator considers the participant loan to be in default, the loan balance is reduced, and the delinquent participant note receivable is recorded as a benefit payment based on the terms of the Plan document.

Excess Contribution Payable

Amounts payable to participants for contributions in excess of amounts allowed by the Internal Revenue Service are recorded as a liability with a corresponding reduction to contributions. The Plan distributed 2023 excess contributions to the applicable participants by the IRS prescribed deadline. The Plan distributed the 2022 excess contributions after the 2 ½ month deadline, but within the 12-month period and paid a 10% excise tax on excess contributions.

Payment of Benefits

Payments of benefits are recorded when paid.

NOTE 2 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Continued)**Administrative Expenses**

Certain expenses of maintaining the Plan are paid by the Plan, unless otherwise paid by the Company. Expenses paid by the Company are excluded from these financial statements. Investment-related expenses are included in net appreciation (depreciation) in fair value of investments. Fees for the administration of notes receivable from participants are included in administrative expenses and charged directly to the participant's account.

Net Assets Available for Benefits

Net assets available for benefits at both December 31, 2023 and 2022 included \$-0- allocated to the accounts of persons who, prior to that date, had withdrawn from participating in earnings and operations of the Plan.

Tax Status

The Plan is currently operating under a prototype plan document that has been accepted under Section 401 of the Internal Revenue Code for use by employers for the benefit of their employees. This prototype document received a favorable opinion letter from the Internal Revenue Service, dated June 30, 2020. The Plan has been amended since receiving this opinion letter. A determination letter has not been received specific to the Inland Marine Service 401(k) Plan. However, the Plan administrator believes the Plan is currently designed and being operated in compliance with the applicable requirements of the Internal Revenue Code, and therefore believes that the Plan is qualified, and the related trust is tax-exempt.

U.S. GAAP requires the Plan administrator to evaluate tax positions taken by the Plan and recognize a tax liability (or asset) if the Plan has taken an uncertain position that more than likely would not be sustained upon examination by the Internal Revenue Service. The Plan administrator has analyzed the tax positions taken by the Plan, and has concluded that as of both December 31, 2023 and 2022, there are no uncertain tax positions taken or expected to be taken that would require recognition of a liability (or asset) or disclosure in the financial statements. Currently, the prior three years are open under Federal statutes of limitations and remain subject to review and change. The Plan is not currently under audit. In 2023, the Plan was contacted by the Department of Labor regarding late remittances.

NOTE 3 - FAIR VALUE MEASUREMENTS

The framework for measuring fair value provides a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. The hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (Level 1 measurements) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (Level 3 measurements). The three levels of the fair value hierarchy under FASB ASC 820 are described as follows:

LEVEL 1 – Inputs to the valuation methodology are unadjusted quoted prices for identical assets or liabilities in active markets that the Plan has the ability to access at the measurement date.

LEVEL 2 – Inputs to the valuation methodology include quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities in active markets, quoted prices for identical or similar assets or liabilities in inactive markets, inputs other than quoted prices that are observable for the asset or liability, and inputs that are derived principally from or corroborated by observable market data by correlation or other means. If the asset or liability has a specified (contractual) term, the Level 2 input must be observable for substantially the full term of the asset or liability.

LEVEL 3 – Inputs to the valuation methodology are unobservable and significant to the fair value measurement.

The Plan uses appropriate valuation techniques based on available inputs to measure the fair value of its investments. The asset's or liability's fair value measurement level within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of any input that is significant to the fair value measurement. Valuation techniques used need to maximize the use of observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs.

NOTE 3 - FAIR VALUE MEASUREMENTS (Continued)

The following are descriptions of the valuation methodologies used for assets measured at fair value. There have been no changes in the methodologies used at either December 31, 2023 or 2022.

Mutual Funds (including Money Market Funds) – Valued at the daily closing price as reported by the fund. Mutual funds held by the Plan are open-end mutual funds that are registered with the SEC. These funds are required to publish their daily net asset value and to transact at that price. The mutual funds held by the Plan are deemed to be actively traded.

Interest in Common Collective Trust – Comprised primarily of a diversified portfolio of stable value investment contracts issued by life insurance companies, banks, and other financial institutions that are valued at the net asset value (NAV) of units. The NAV is used as a practical expedient to estimate fair value. The NAV is based on the fair value of the underlying investments held by the fund less its liabilities. This practical expedient would not be used if it is determined to be probable that the fund will sell the investment for an amount different from the reported NAV.

Funds Held in Insurance Company General Account – The Plan invests in the Voya Fixed Account, which is an obligation of the Voya Retirement Insurance and Annuity Company’s general account, which supports all its insurance and annuity commitments. The objective of this fund is stability of principal. The value of the Voya Fixed Account is determined by the daily crediting rate of interest, which is subject to minimum contractual guarantees.

The preceding methods described may provide a fair value calculation that may not be indicative of net realizable value or reflective of future fair values. Furthermore, although the Plan believes its valuation methods are appropriate and consistent with other market participants, the use of different methodologies or assumptions to determine the fair value of certain financial instruments could result in a different fair value measurement at the reporting date.

NOTE 4 - CERTIFIED INVESTMENTS

Certain information related to investments and notes receivable from participants disclosed in the accompanying financial statements and ERISA-required supplementary schedules, including investments and notes receivable from participants held at both December 31, 2023 and 2022, and the net appreciation (depreciation) in fair value of investments, interest and dividends, and interest income on notes receivable from participants for the years then ended, was obtained by management and agreed to or derived from information certified as complete and accurate by Voya Institutional Trust Company and Empower Trust Company, LLC, the trustees of the Plan.

NOTE 5 - PLAN TERMINATION

Although it has not expressed any intent to do so, the Company has the right under the Plan to discontinue its contributions at any time and to terminate the Plan subject to the provisions of ERISA. In the event of Plan termination, participants will become 100% vested in their employer contributions.

NOTE 6 - FORFEITURES

For both the years ended December 31, 2023 and 2022, no forfeitures were used to pay Plan expenses or to offset employer contributions. As of December 31, 2023 and 2022, there was \$26,904 and \$9,311, respectively, in unallocated forfeitures.

NOTE 7 - RELATED-PARTY TRANSACTIONS AND PARTY-IN-INTEREST TRANSACTIONS

The Plan's investments are under the custody of Voya Institutional Trust Company and Empower Trust Company, LLC. Voya Institutional Trust Company and Empower Trust Company, LLC are the trustees and the record-keepers for the Plan and, therefore, these transactions qualify as party-in-interest transactions as defined under ERISA guidelines. Fees paid by the Plan to the trustees and other Plan service providers are included in either administrative expenses or net appreciation (depreciation) in fair value of investments. The Company pays directly certain other fees related to the Plan's operations as well.

These party-in-interest transactions are exempt from the prohibited transaction rule of ERISA.

Several employees of the Company provide administrative services to the Plan, such as day to day administration and oversight. The Company does not charge the Plan for these services.

NOTE 10 - RISKS AND UNCERTAINTIES

The Plan invests in various investment securities. Investment securities are exposed to various risks such as interest rate, market, and credit risks. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investment securities, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in the values of investment securities will occur in the near term and that such changes could materially affect participants' account balances, and the amounts reported in the statements of net assets available for benefits.

NOTE 11 - DELINQUENT REMITTANCES

During 2023, 2022 and 2021, the Company failed to timely remit to the Plan's trustee certain participant contributions and loan repayments totaling \$105,585, \$57,258 and \$143,239, respectively, within the period prescribed by the Department of Labor regulations. The Company intends to reimburse the Plan for the lost interest and earnings during 2024.

NOTE 12 - SUBSEQUENT EVENTS

The Plan has evaluated subsequent events through October 10, 2024, which is the date the financial statements were available to be issued.

In September 2024, the Plan sponsor laid off the majority of their employees, which the Plan sponsor has determined will result in a partial plan termination occurring in 2024. All affected Plan participants will become fully vested in their accounts.

The financial statements comprise the statements of net assets available for benefits as of December 31, 2023 and 2022, and the related statements of changes in net assets available for benefits for the years then ended, and the related notes to the financial statements.

Opinion

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS**

NOTE 1 - DESCRIPTION OF THE PLAN

The following description of the Inland Marine Service 401(k) Plan (the Plan) provides only general information. Participants should refer to the Plan document and the summary plan description for a more complete description of the Plan's provisions.

General

The Plan is a defined contribution plan covering all eligible employees of Inland Marine Service, Inc. (the Company) who have completed six months of service and are at least 21 years of age. Deckhand employees that were hired on or after January 1, 2014 are excluded from the Plan. As of March 6, 2023, employees have the opportunity to become a participant once the employee satisfies those requirements listed above. Prior to March 6, 2023, employees had the opportunity to become a participant on the first "entry date", January 1, April 1, July 1, or October 1 of each year, once the employee satisfied those requirements listed above. The Plan is subject to the provisions of the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (ERISA). The Retirement Plan Committee oversees governance of the Plan and determines appropriateness of the Plan's investment offerings and monitors investment performance.

Inland Marine Harbor Services, Inc., related employer, that has adopted the provisions of the Plan

Participant Contributions

Each year, participants may contribute up to limits as defined in the Plan, not to exceed amounts determined by the Internal Revenue Service. Participants who have attained age 50 before the end of the Plan year are eligible to make catch-up contributions. Participants may also contribute amounts representing distributions from certain other retirement plans as described in the Plan document (rollovers). Participants direct the investment of their contributions into any combination of several investment options offered by the Plan.

Employer Contributions

The Company may make matching contributions, as well as profit sharing contributions to the Plan. Prior to March 6, 2023, in order to receive these contributions, the employee must be employed on the last day of the year. As of and after March 6, 2023, the employee is not required to be employed on the last day of the year to receive the discretionary matching contributions. For the years ended December 31, 2023 and 2022, the Company did not make any matching contributions. There was no profit sharing contributions for either 2023 or 2022. Contributions are subject to certain statutory limitations.

Participant Accounts

Each participant's account is credited with the participant's contributions and allocations of (a) Plan earnings (losses), including a charge for an allocation of administrative expenses paid by the Plan, and (b) employer contributions. Allocations are based on participant earnings, account balances, or specific participant transactions, as defined in the Plan. The benefit to which a participant is entitled is the benefit that can be provided from the participant's vested account.

Notes Receivable from Participants

Participants may borrow from their accounts a minimum of \$1,000 up to a maximum equal to the lesser of \$50,000 or 50% of their vested account balance. The notes are secured by the balance of the participant's account. The interest rate on these notes is set at 1.0% above the prime rate and is reviewed by the Plan administrator on a regular basis. Principal and interest is paid ratably through payroll deductions.

Vesting

Participants are immediately vested in their 401(k) elective deferrals and rollover contributions plus actual earnings thereon. Vesting in the remainder of their accounts, plus actual earnings thereon, is based on years of service as defined in the Plan. Vesting for matching contributions and profit sharing contributions begins upon the completion of the second year of service, and a participant is 100% vested after 5 years of credited service.

NOTE 1 - DESCRIPTION OF THE PLAN (Continued)**Forfeitures**

If a participant is not fully vested on their termination date, the non-vested amount of their account is forfeited. Forfeitures on non-vested account balances will be used to reduce future employer contributions or to pay Plan expenses.

Payment of Benefits

On termination of service due to death, disability, retirement or termination of employment from the Company, a participant may elect to receive either a lump sum amount equal to the value of the participant's vested interest in his or her account or any other form of payment included in the Plan document. However, participants with a vested balance of less than \$5,000 will receive a distribution equal to the vested portion of their account upon termination. Participants with a vested balance in excess of \$5,000 may remain in the Plan, but they may not make additional contributions.

NOTE 2 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES**Basis of Accounting**

The financial statements of the Plan are prepared on the accrual basis of accounting.

Use of Estimates

The process of preparing financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America (U.S. GAAP) requires the use of estimates and assumptions regarding certain types of assets, liabilities, revenues, and expenses. Certain estimates relate to unsettled transactions and events as of the date of the financial statements. Other estimates relate to assumptions about the ongoing operations and may impact future periods. Accordingly, upon settlement, actual results may differ from estimated amounts.

Investment Valuation and Income Recognition

Investments are reported at fair value. Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. The Plan's Retirement Plan Committee determines the Plan's valuation policies utilizing information provided by the investment advisers and trustee (see the Fair Value Measurements note).

Purchases and sales of securities are recorded on a trade-date basis. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Dividends are recorded on the ex-dividend date. Net appreciation (depreciation) in fair value of investments includes the Plan's gains and losses on investments bought and sold, as well as held during the year.

Notes Receivable from Participants

Notes receivable from participants are measured at their unpaid principal balance plus any accrued but unpaid interest. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Related fees are charged directly to the borrowing participant's account and are included in administrative expenses when incurred. If a participant does not make loan payments and the Plan administrator considers the participant loan to be in default, the loan balance is reduced, and the delinquent participant note receivable is recorded as a benefit payment based on the terms of the Plan document.

Excess Contribution Payable

Amounts payable to participants for contributions in excess of amounts allowed by the Internal Revenue Service are recorded as a liability with a corresponding reduction to contributions. The Plan distributed 2023 excess contributions to the applicable participants by the IRS prescribed deadline. The Plan distributed the 2022 excess contributions after the 2 ½ month deadline, but within the 12-month period and paid a 10% excise tax on excess contributions.

Payment of Benefits

Payments of benefits are recorded when paid.

NOTE 2 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Continued)**Administrative Expenses**

Certain expenses of maintaining the Plan are paid by the Plan, unless otherwise paid by the Company. Expenses paid by the Company are excluded from these financial statements. Investment-related expenses are included in net appreciation (depreciation) in fair value of investments. Fees for the administration of notes receivable from participants are included in administrative expenses and charged directly to the participant's account.

Net Assets Available for Benefits

Net assets available for benefits at both December 31, 2023 and 2022 included \$-0- allocated to the accounts of persons who, prior to that date, had withdrawn from participating in earnings and operations of the Plan.

Tax Status

The Plan is currently operating under a prototype plan document that has been accepted under Section 401 of the Internal Revenue Code for use by employers for the benefit of their employees. This prototype document received a favorable opinion letter from the Internal Revenue Service, dated June 30, 2020. The Plan has been amended since receiving this opinion letter. A determination letter has not been received specific to the Inland Marine Service 401(k) Plan. However, the Plan administrator believes the Plan is currently designed and being operated in compliance with the applicable requirements of the Internal Revenue Code, and therefore believes that the Plan is qualified, and the related trust is tax-exempt.

U.S. GAAP requires the Plan administrator to evaluate tax positions taken by the Plan and recognize a tax liability (or asset) if the Plan has taken an uncertain position that more than likely would not be sustained upon examination by the Internal Revenue Service. The Plan administrator has analyzed the tax positions taken by the Plan, and has concluded that as of both December 31, 2023 and 2022, there are no uncertain tax positions taken or expected to be taken that would require recognition of a liability (or asset) or disclosure in the financial statements. Currently, the prior three years are open under Federal statutes of limitations and remain subject to review and change. The Plan is not currently under audit. In 2023, the Plan was contacted by the Department of Labor regarding late remittances.

NOTE 3 - FAIR VALUE MEASUREMENTS

The framework for measuring fair value provides a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. The hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (Level 1 measurements) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (Level 3 measurements). The three levels of the fair value hierarchy under FASB ASC 820 are described as follows:

LEVEL 1 – Inputs to the valuation methodology are unadjusted quoted prices for identical assets or liabilities in active markets that the Plan has the ability to access at the measurement date.

LEVEL 2 – Inputs to the valuation methodology include quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities in active markets, quoted prices for identical or similar assets or liabilities in inactive markets, inputs other than quoted prices that are observable for the asset or liability, and inputs that are derived principally from or corroborated by observable market data by correlation or other means. If the asset or liability has a specified (contractual) term, the Level 2 input must be observable for substantially the full term of the asset or liability.

LEVEL 3 – Inputs to the valuation methodology are unobservable and significant to the fair value measurement.

The Plan uses appropriate valuation techniques based on available inputs to measure the fair value of its investments. The asset's or liability's fair value measurement level within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of any input that is significant to the fair value measurement. Valuation techniques used need to maximize the use of observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs.

NOTE 3 - FAIR VALUE MEASUREMENTS (Continued)

The following are descriptions of the valuation methodologies used for assets measured at fair value. There have been no changes in the methodologies used at either December 31, 2023 or 2022.

Mutual Funds (including Money Market Funds) – Valued at the daily closing price as reported by the fund. Mutual funds held by the Plan are open-end mutual funds that are registered with the SEC. These funds are required to publish their daily net asset value and to transact at that price. The mutual funds held by the Plan are deemed to be actively traded.

Interest in Common Collective Trust – Comprised primarily of a diversified portfolio of stable value investment contracts issued by life insurance companies, banks, and other financial institutions that are valued at the net asset value (NAV) of units. The NAV is used as a practical expedient to estimate fair value. The NAV is based on the fair value of the underlying investments held by the fund less its liabilities. This practical expedient would not be used if it is determined to be probable that the fund will sell the investment for an amount different from the reported NAV.

Funds Held in Insurance Company General Account – The Plan invests in the Voya Fixed Account, which is an obligation of the Voya Retirement Insurance and Annuity Company’s general account, which supports all its insurance and annuity commitments. The objective of this fund is stability of principal. The value of the Voya Fixed Account is determined by the daily crediting rate of interest, which is subject to minimum contractual guarantees.

The preceding methods described may provide a fair value calculation that may not be indicative of net realizable value or reflective of future fair values. Furthermore, although the Plan believes its valuation methods are appropriate and consistent with other market participants, the use of different methodologies or assumptions to determine the fair value of certain financial instruments could result in a different fair value measurement at the reporting date.

NOTE 4 - CERTIFIED INVESTMENTS

Certain information related to investments and notes receivable from participants disclosed in the accompanying financial statements and ERISA-required supplementary schedules, including investments and notes receivable from participants held at both December 31, 2023 and 2022, and the net appreciation (depreciation) in fair value of investments, interest and dividends, and interest income on notes receivable from participants for the years then ended, was obtained by management and agreed to or derived from information certified as complete and accurate by Voya Institutional Trust Company and Empower Trust Company, LLC, the trustees of the Plan.

NOTE 5 - PLAN TERMINATION

Although it has not expressed any intent to do so, the Company has the right under the Plan to discontinue its contributions at any time and to terminate the Plan subject to the provisions of ERISA. In the event of Plan termination, participants will become 100% vested in their employer contributions.

NOTE 6 - FORFEITURES

For both the years ended December 31, 2023 and 2022, no forfeitures were used to pay Plan expenses or to offset employer contributions. As of December 31, 2023 and 2022, there was \$26,904 and \$9,311, respectively, in unallocated forfeitures.

NOTE 7 - RELATED-PARTY TRANSACTIONS AND PARTY-IN-INTEREST TRANSACTIONS

The Plan's investments are under the custody of Voya Institutional Trust Company and Empower Trust Company, LLC. Voya Institutional Trust Company and Empower Trust Company, LLC are the trustees and the record-keepers for the Plan and, therefore, these transactions qualify as party-in-interest transactions as defined under ERISA guidelines. Fees paid by the Plan to the trustees and other Plan service providers are included in either administrative expenses or net appreciation (depreciation) in fair value of investments. The Company pays directly certain other fees related to the Plan's operations as well.

These party-in-interest transactions are exempt from the prohibited transaction rule of ERISA.

Several employees of the Company provide administrative services to the Plan, such as day to day administration and oversight. The Company does not charge the Plan for these services.

NOTE 10 - RISKS AND UNCERTAINTIES

The Plan invests in various investment securities. Investment securities are exposed to various risks such as interest rate, market, and credit risks. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investment securities, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in the values of investment securities will occur in the near term and that such changes could materially affect participants' account balances, and the amounts reported in the statements of net assets available for benefits.

NOTE 11 - DELINQUENT REMITTANCES

During 2023, 2022 and 2021, the Company failed to timely remit to the Plan's trustee certain participant contributions and loan repayments totaling \$105,585, \$57,258 and \$143,239, respectively, within the period prescribed by the Department of Labor regulations. The Company intends to reimburse the Plan for the lost interest and earnings during 2024.

NOTE 12 - SUBSEQUENT EVENTS

The Plan has evaluated subsequent events through October 10, 2024, which is the date the financial statements were available to be issued.

In September 2024, the Plan sponsor laid off the majority of their employees, which the Plan sponsor has determined will result in a partial plan termination occurring in 2024. All affected Plan participants will become fully vested in their accounts.
