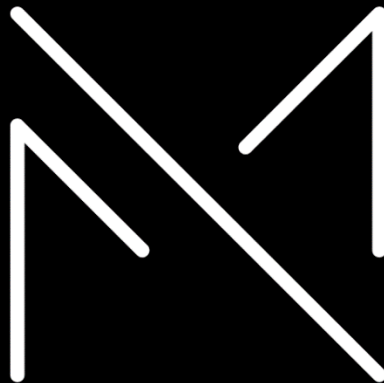

Scope and Nature of the ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) Audit

We have performed audits of the financial statements of TSR Concrete Coatings LLC 401(k) Plan (the Plan), an employee benefit plan subject to the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (ERISA), as permitted by ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) (ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) audit). The financial statements comprise the statements of net assets available for benefits as of February 01, 2023 and December 31, 2022, and the related statement of changes in net assets available for benefits for the period from January 01, 2023 to February 01, 2023, and the related notes to the financial statements.

Our opinion is not modified with respect to this matter.

Responsibilities of Management for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in accordance with GAAP, and for the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error. Management's election of the ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) audit does not affect management's responsibility for the financial statements.

In preparing the financial statements, management is required to evaluate whether there are conditions or events, considered in the aggregate, that raise substantial doubt about the Plan's ability to continue as a going concern within one year after the date that the financial statements are issued or available to be issued.

Note 1 – Description of the Plan

The following description of the TSR Concrete Coatings LLC 401(k) Plan (the Plan) provides only general information. Participants should refer to the Plan agreement for a complete description of Plan provisions.

General

Effective January 30, 2023, the Trustee of the Plan authorized a merger of the Plan with the Secure Your Retirement 401(k) Plan (Secure Plan). Effective February 1, 2023, the Company adopted the Secure Plan and became a participating employer in the Secure Plan. During 2023, the Plan assets were transferred to the Secure Plan.

The provisions below describe the Plan prior to the merger

The Plan is a defined contribution plan originally effective January 1, 2022, covering substantially all employees of TSR Concrete Coatings LLC (the Company) who are age 18 or older. Excluded employees include employees whose employment is governed by a collective bargaining agreement under which retirement benefits were subject to good faith bargaining, nonresident aliens with no US source income, and leased employees. Employees can enter the Plan immediately on meeting the eligibility requirements. The Plan is subject to the provisions of the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (ERISA). The Plan engages Benefit Trust Company (the Custodian), to hold and invest Plan assets and execute Plan transactions, and Guideline, Inc. to act as the recordkeeper for the Plan.

Contributions

Each year, participants may contribute up to 100% of their annual compensation, as defined in the Plan, into a pre-tax deferral account and/or 50% of their annual compensation into an after-tax Roth account. Participants who have attained age 50 before the end of the Plan year are eligible to make catch up contributions. Participants may also contribute amounts representing distributions (rollovers) from other qualified plans. Participants are automatically enrolled in the Plan at a 5% deferral rate unless they affirmatively elect not to participate in the Plan.

The Company makes a safe harbor matching contribution equal to 100% of the participant's deferrals up to 3% of eligible compensation, and 50% of additional deferrals over 3% up to 5% of eligible compensation. The Plan also allows the Company to make discretionary nonelective contributions. To be eligible for the discretionary nonelective contribution, a participant must be employed at year end. No discretionary nonelective contributions were made during the period presented.

Contributions are subject to regulatory limitations.

Investment Elections

Participants direct the investment of their and the Company's contributions into various investment options offered by the Plan that are designated by the Plan's Administrative Committee. Participants can change their investment elections daily.

Participant Accounts

Each participant's account is credited with the participant's contribution, allocations of the Company's contributions, and Plan earnings. Participant accounts are charged with an allocation of administrative expenses and any related transaction fees for loans and distributions that are paid by the Plan. Allocations are made based on participant earnings, account balances, or specific participant transactions, as defined. The benefit to which a participant is entitled is the benefit that can be provided from the participant's vested account.

Vesting

Participants are immediately vested in their deferrals and Company contributions, plus actual earnings thereon.

Payment of Benefits

On termination of service due to any reason, participants with vested account balances of \$1,000 or less receive an automatic lump-sum distribution, unless the participant requests that it be rolled-over to an Individual Retirement Account (IRA) provider or another qualified retirement plan. Participants with vested account balances of less than \$5,000 and more than \$1,000 receive a lump sum distribution or an automatic distribution to an IRA. Participants with vested account balances of \$5,000 or more may elect to receive their benefits in any way permitted by the Plan, choose to rollover their balance into another qualified retirement plan or IRA, or leave their balance in the Plan. Participants may also take in-service or hardship distributions subject to the terms of the Plan and Internal Revenue Service (IRS) regulations.

Notes Receivable from Participants

The Plan allows participants to borrow against their vested account balances. Loans may not be made for less than \$1,000 and may not exceed the lesser of \$50,000 or 50% of a participant's vested account balance. The loans are secured by the balance in the participant's account and bear interest at the Wall Street Journal prime rate plus 1%. Participants may have one loan outstanding at a time. Principal and interest are paid ratably through payroll deductions not to exceed 5 years.

Note 2 – Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Basis of Accounting

The financial statements of the Plan are prepared on the accrual basis of accounting.

Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America (GAAP) requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and changes therein, and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Investment Valuation and Income Recognition

Investments are reported at fair value. Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. See Note 5 for discussion of fair value measurements.

Purchases and sales of securities are recorded on a trade-date basis. Interest income (if applicable) is recorded on the accrual basis. Dividends are recorded on the ex-dividend date. Net appreciation in fair value of investments includes the Plan's gains and losses on investments bought and sold as well as held during the year.

Payment of Benefits

Benefits are recorded when paid.

Administrative Expenses

Certain administrative functions are performed by officers or employees of the Company. No such officer or employee receives compensation from the Plan. The Plan permits the payment of Plan expenses to be made from the Plan's assets. Fees are charged to participants on a pro rata basis, equally to participant accounts, or to a participant's account for transactions specifically related to that participant.

Certain investment management fees and other charges paid to the Custodian are offset against fund performance in the net appreciation in fair value of investments on the statement of changes in net assets available for benefits and are not, therefore, separately reflected as administrative expenses. Certain Plan expenses are paid directly by the Company and therefore are excluded from these financial statements.

Notes Receivable from Participants

Notes receivable from participants are measured at their unpaid principal balance plus any accrued but unpaid interest. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Related fees are recorded as administrative expenses and expensed as they are incurred. No allowance for credit losses has been recorded as of February 01, 2023 and December 31, 2022. Delinquent participant loans are reclassified as distributions based on the terms of the Plan document.

Risks and Uncertainties

The Plan holds various investments. Investments are exposed to various risks, such as interest rate, market, and credit risks. Market risks include global events which could impact the value of investment securities, such as a pandemic or international conflict. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investment securities, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in the values of investment securities will occur in the near term and that such changes could materially affect participants' account balances and the amounts reported in the statements of net assets available for benefits.

Subsequent Events

The Plan has evaluated subsequent events through October 18, 2024, the date the financial statements were available to be issued.

Contributions

Contributions from Plan participants and the Company, when applicable, are recorded in the year in which the employee contributions are withheld from compensation.

Note 3 – Certified Information

Certain information disclosed in the accompanying financial statements, including investments held and notes receivable from participants at February 01, 2023 and December 31, 2022, net appreciation in fair value of investments, interest and dividends, and interest income on notes receivable from participants for the period from January 01, 2023 to February 01, 2023, was obtained by management and agreed to or derived from information certified as complete and accurate by Benefit Trust Company, the Custodian of the Plan.

Note 4 – Tax Status

The IRS has determined and informed by a letter for the prototype plan adopted by the Plan, dated November 18, 2020 that the prototype plan is designed in accordance with applicable sections of the IRC. The Plan has not requested its own determination letter from the IRS. The Plan Administrator believes that the Plan is designed, and is currently being operated, in compliance with the applicable requirements of the IRC. Therefore, no provision for income taxes has been included in the Plan's financial statements.

GAAP requires Plan management to evaluate tax positions taken by the Plan and recognize a tax liability (or asset) if the Plan has taken an uncertain position that more likely than not would not be sustained upon examination by the IRS. The Plan is subject to routine audits by taxing jurisdictions; however, there are currently no audits for any tax periods in progress.

Note 5 – Fair Value Measurement

The framework for measuring fair value provides a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. The hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (level 1) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (level 3). The three levels of the fair value hierarchy under Financial Accounting Standards Board (FASB) Accounting Standards Codification (ASC) 820 are described as follows:

If the asset or liability has a specified (contractual) term, the level 2 input must be observable for substantially the full term of the asset or liability.

Level 3 - Inputs to the valuation methodology are unobservable and significant to the fair value measurement.

The asset or liability's fair value measurement level within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of any input that is significant to the fair value measurement. Valuation techniques maximize the use of relevant observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs.

Following is a description of the valuation methodology used for assets measured at fair value. There have been no changes in the methodologies used at February 01, 2023 and December 31, 2022.

Registered Investment Companies (Mutual Funds): Valued at the daily closing price as reported by the fund. Mutual funds held by the Plan are open-end mutual funds that are registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission. These funds are required to publish their daily net asset value (NAV) and to transact at that price. The mutual funds held by the Plan are deemed to be actively traded.

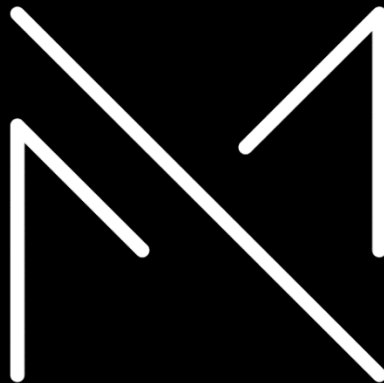

Note 1 – Description of the Plan

The following description of the TSR Concrete Coatings LLC 401(k) Plan (the Plan) provides only general information. Participants should refer to the Plan agreement for a complete description of Plan provisions.

General

Effective January 30, 2023, the Trustee of the Plan authorized a merger of the Plan with the Secure Your Retirement 401(k) Plan (Secure Plan). Effective February 1, 2023, the Company adopted the Secure Plan and became a participating employer in the Secure Plan. During 2023, the Plan assets were transferred to the Secure Plan.

The provisions below describe the Plan prior to the merger

The Plan is a defined contribution plan originally effective January 1, 2022, covering substantially all employees of TSR Concrete Coatings LLC (the Company) who are age 18 or older. Excluded employees include employees whose employment is governed by a collective bargaining agreement under which retirement benefits were subject to good faith bargaining, nonresident aliens with no US source income, and leased employees. Employees can enter the Plan immediately on meeting the eligibility requirements. The Plan is subject to the provisions of the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (ERISA). The Plan engages Benefit Trust Company (the Custodian), to hold and invest Plan assets and execute Plan transactions, and Guideline, Inc. to act as the recordkeeper for the Plan.

Contributions

Each year, participants may contribute up to 100% of their annual compensation, as defined in the Plan, into a pre-tax deferral account and/or 50% of their annual compensation into an after-tax Roth account. Participants who have attained age 50 before the end of the Plan year are eligible to make catch up contributions. Participants may also contribute amounts representing distributions (rollovers) from other qualified plans. Participants are automatically enrolled in the Plan at a 5% deferral rate unless they affirmatively elect not to participate in the Plan.

The Company makes a safe harbor matching contribution equal to 100% of the participant's deferrals up to 3% of eligible compensation, and 50% of additional deferrals over 3% up to 5% of eligible compensation. The Plan also allows the Company to make discretionary nonelective contributions. To be eligible for the discretionary nonelective contribution, a participant must be employed at year end. No discretionary nonelective contributions were made during the period presented.

Contributions are subject to regulatory limitations.

Investment Elections

Participants direct the investment of their and the Company's contributions into various investment options offered by the Plan that are designated by the Plan's Administrative Committee. Participants can change their investment elections daily.

Participant Accounts

Each participant's account is credited with the participant's contribution, allocations of the Company's contributions, and Plan earnings. Participant accounts are charged with an allocation of administrative expenses and any related transaction fees for loans and distributions that are paid by the Plan. Allocations are made based on participant earnings, account balances, or specific participant transactions, as defined. The benefit to which a participant is entitled is the benefit that can be provided from the participant's vested account.

Vesting

Participants are immediately vested in their deferrals and Company contributions, plus actual earnings thereon.

Certain investment management fees and other charges paid to the Custodian are offset against fund performance in the net appreciation in fair value of investments on the statement of changes in net assets available for benefits and are not, therefore, separately reflected as administrative expenses. Certain Plan expenses are paid directly by the Company and therefore are excluded from these financial statements.

Note 2 – Summary of Significant Accounting Policies, continued

Notes Receivable from Participants

Notes receivable from participants are measured at their unpaid principal balance plus any accrued but unpaid interest. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Related fees are recorded as administrative expenses and expensed as they are incurred. No allowance for credit losses has been recorded as of February 01, 2023 and December 31, 2022. Delinquent participant loans are reclassified as distributions based on the terms of the Plan document.

Risks and Uncertainties

The Plan holds various investments. Investments are exposed to various risks, such as interest rate, market, and credit risks. Market risks include global events which could impact the value of investment securities, such as a pandemic or international conflict. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investment securities, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in the values of investment securities will occur in the near term and that such changes could materially affect participants' account balances and the amounts reported in the statements of net assets available for benefits.

Subsequent Events

The Plan has evaluated subsequent events through October 18, 2024, the date the financial statements were available to be issued.

Contributions

Contributions from Plan participants and the Company, when applicable, are recorded in the year in which the employee contributions are withheld from compensation.

Note 3 – Certified Information

Certain information disclosed in the accompanying financial statements, including investments held and notes receivable from participants at February 01, 2023 and December 31, 2022, net appreciation in fair value of investments, interest and dividends, and interest income on notes receivable from participants for the period from January 01, 2023 to February 01, 2023, was obtained by management and agreed to or derived from information certified as complete and accurate by Benefit Trust Company, the Custodian of the Plan.

Note 4 – Tax Status

The IRS has determined and informed by a letter for the prototype plan adopted by the Plan, dated November 18, 2020 that the prototype plan is designed in accordance with applicable sections of the IRC. The Plan has not requested its own determination letter from the IRS. The Plan Administrator believes that the Plan is designed, and is currently being operated, in compliance with the applicable requirements of the IRC. Therefore, no provision for income taxes has been included in the Plan's financial statements.

GAAP requires Plan management to evaluate tax positions taken by the Plan and recognize a tax liability (or asset) if the Plan has taken an uncertain position that more likely than not would not be sustained upon examination by the IRS. The Plan is subject to routine audits by taxing jurisdictions; however, there are currently no audits for any tax periods in progress.

Note 5 – Fair Value Measurement

The framework for measuring fair value provides a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. The hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (level 1) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (level 3). The three levels of the fair value hierarchy under Financial Accounting Standards Board (FASB) Accounting Standards Codification (ASC) 820 are described as follows:

Level 1 - Inputs to the valuation methodology are unadjusted quoted prices for identical assets or liabilities in active markets that the Plan has the ability to access.

Level 2 - Inputs to the valuation methodology include: 1) quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities in active markets; 2) quoted prices for identical or similar assets or liabilities in inactive markets; 3) inputs other than quoted prices that are observable for the asset or liability; 4) inputs that are derived principally from or corroborated by observable market data by correlation or other means. If the asset or liability has a specified (contractual) term, the level 2 input must be observable for substantially the full term of the asset or liability.

Level 3 - Inputs to the valuation methodology are unobservable and significant to the fair value measurement.

The asset or liability's fair value measurement level within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of any input that is significant to the fair value measurement. Valuation techniques maximize the use of relevant observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs.

Following is a description of the valuation methodology used for assets measured at fair value. There have been no changes in the methodologies used at February 01, 2023 and December 31, 2022.
