Note 1 – Description of Plan

The following description of Hitch Enterprises, Inc. 401(k) Plan (the Plan) provides only general information. Participants should refer to the plan agreement for a more complete description of the Plan's provisions.

Termination of the Plan

The Company terminated the Plan effective August 7, 2023. In accordance with Plan provisions, all benefit accruals ceased, all participants became fully vested in their accounts, and all contributions ceased. The Company directed the distribution of participant's accounts in a manner permitted by the Plan. All participant accounts were distributed by September 30, 2023.

General

The Plan was a defined contribution plan established by Hitch Enterprises, Inc. (the Plan Sponsor and Company) under the provisions of Section 401(a) of the United States Internal Revenue Code (the IRC), which includes a qualified cash or deferred arrangement as described in Section 401(k) of the IRC, for the benefit of eligible employees of the Company and any adopting participating employers. The Plan was subject to the provisions of the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (ERISA), as well as certain provisions of the federal income tax laws.

The following adopting employers were allowed to participate in the Plan:

- Hitch Feeders I Inc.
- Hitch Feeders II. Inc.
- Henry C. Hitch Feedlot. Inc.
- Hitch Farms Inc. {Ranch}
- Hitch Mills Inc.
- Hitch Commodities Inc.
- Hitch Pork Producers Inc.
- Hitch Farms Partnership

All employees of the Company and any participating affiliates were subject to the following eligibility requirements:

- Age: 18
- Service: 2 months
- Status Exclusions:
 - a. None

Upon satisfying the eligibility requirements, employees could participate in the Plan on the first day of the next month.

The Plan was funded through employee elective deferrals and Company contributions. Each year, participants could elect to contribute a portion of their compensation, subject to certain maximum limitations imposed by Section 402(g) of the IRC. At the discretion of the Plan Administrator, participants were permitted to deposit or “roll over” into the Plan distributions they had received from other plans and certain Individual Retirement Accounts (IRAs). Participants who had attained age 50 before the end of the Plan year were eligible to make catch-up contributions. The following contribution types were allowed by the Plan:

- Elective deferrals
- Roth deferrals
- Employer safe harbor
- Rollover contributions
- Employer profit sharing

Participants could direct the investment of their contributions into various investment options offered by the Plan.

The Plan had an automatic enrollment provision (3% salary deferral) whereby employees elected out of the Plan if they did not wish to participate.

The Company elected to operate the Plan as a safe harbor 401(k) plan, which made the plan exempt from certain compliance testing requirements. The Company made a safe harbor matching contribution of 100% of the participant's deferral up to 3% plus 50% of deferrals from the next 2% of compensation.

The Company could make discretionary profit sharing contributions which will be allocated in accordance with the plan document provisions.

Participant Accounts

Each participant's account was credited with the participant's contribution, allocation of the Company's contributions, and Plan earnings or losses and charged with an allocation of administrative expenses that are paid by the Plan. Allocations may have been charged based on participant earnings, account balances, or specific participant transactions. The benefit to which a participant was entitled was the benefit that could be provided from the participant's vested account.

Vesting

Participants were immediately 100% vested in their elective deferrals including catch-up contributions, rollover contributions from other plans, and actual earnings thereon. The method for crediting vesting service for Company matching and discretionary profit sharing contributions was based on vesting periods of service. Participants were credited with a period of service for 1,000 hours earned. If participants were employed on or after their Normal Retirement Age or if they terminated employment on account of death or disability, they were 100% vested in their Company matching and discretionary profit sharing contributions.

Participants were always 100% vested in their safe harbor matching contributions. The following schedule is only applicable if the Company makes discretionary profit sharing contributions.

Forfeited Accounts

Forfeitures represent unvested portions of terminated participants' accounts. The Plan allowed forfeitures of non-vested Company contributions to be used as follows:

- Pay Administrative Expenses
- Reduce Company Contributions
- Reallocated As Company Contributions

As August 7, 2023 and December 31, 2022, forfeited non-vested accounts totaled \$0 and \$80, respectively. During the period ended August 7, 2023, forfeited non-vested accounts of \$132 were used.

Investment Options

Upon enrollment in the Plan, a participant could direct the contributions made to the Plan, for or on behalf of the participant, to any one or more of the investment funds determined at the discretion of the Plan Administrator and Plan Sponsor and in such multiples as the participant prescribes. A participant could change his or her investment direction with respect to future contributions or redirect the investment of his or her account balances.

Notes Receivable from Participants

Participants who were active employees could borrow against their vested account balances a minimum of \$1,000 up to a maximum equal to the lesser of 50% of their vested account balance or \$50,000. The loans, in the form of promissory notes, were secured by the balance in the participant's account, and bore interest at reasonable rates, which were commensurate with local prevailing rates as determined by the Plan Administrator. Principal and interest were paid ratably through payroll deductions and generally repaid within 5 years.

Benefits Paid to Participants

Upon termination of service, disability, or retirement, a participant was entitled to receive a distribution equal to the value of the participant's vested interest in his or her account. Distribution of a deceased participant's account was made to the designated beneficiary.

The following types of distributions were also allowed by the Plan:

- In service
- Involuntary cash-outs
- Rollover from qualified plan
- Termination partial withdrawal

Plan Expenses

The Plan's expenses were paid by either the Plan or the Company, as provided by the plan document. Expenses paid directly by the Company were excluded from these financial statements. Certain expenses incurred in connection with the general administration of the Plan that were paid by the Plan were recorded as deductions in the accompanying statement of changes in net assets available for benefits. In addition, certain investment-related expenses were included in net appreciation (depreciation) in fair value of investments.

Note 2 – Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Basis of Accounting

The financial statements of the Plan have been prepared on the accrual basis of accounting in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America (U.S. GAAP). Certain prior period disclosures have been revised to conform to current year's presentation. Effective August 7, 2023, the Plan adopted a resolution to terminate the Plan. As a result, the Plan's financial statements as of August 7, 2023 and for the period of January 1, 2023 through August 7, 2023 have been prepared on the liquidation basis, in accordance with U.S. GAAP. This basis of accounting is considered appropriate when, among other things, liquidation of an entity is probable and the net realizable value of assets are reasonably determinable. Under the liquidation basis of accounting, assets are stated at their estimate net realized cash value and liabilities are stated at their anticipated settlement amounts. The estimated net realizable cash value for investments as of August 7, 2023 would be fair value. There were no material changes to the 2023 and 2022 financial statements as a result of using the liquidation basis of accounting.

Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in accordance with U.S. GAAP requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and changes therein, and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Reclassification

Certain reclassifications may have been made to the 2022 financial statement presentation to correspond to the current year's format. Total net assets available for benefits were materially unchanged due to these reclassifications.

Investment Valuation and Income Recognition

Investments were reported at fair value (except for any fully benefit-responsive investment contracts, which are reported at contract value). Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. See Note 4 for discussion of fair value measurements.

Purchases and sales of investments were recorded on the trade-date basis. Interest income was recorded on the accrual basis. Dividends were recorded on the ex-dividend date. Net appreciation (depreciation) in fair value of investments, including realized gains and losses on sales during the year and current changes in unrealized appreciation (depreciation) in the market value of investments held at year end, was presented in the statement of changes in net assets available for benefits.

Contributions

Contributions from Plan participants and employer contributions, if any, were recorded in the year in which the participant contributions were withheld from compensation.

Notes Receivable from Participants

Notes receivable from participants were measured at their unpaid principal balance plus any accrued but unpaid interest. Interest income was recorded on the accrual basis. Related fees were recorded as administrative expenses and were expensed when they are incurred. No allowance for credit losses had been recorded as of August 7, 2023 and December 31, 2022. If a participant ceased to make scheduled repayments and the Plan Administrator deemed the participant note receivable to be in default, the participant note receivable balance was reduced and a benefit payment recorded.

Payment of Benefits

Benefits were recorded when paid.

Note 4 – Fair Value Measurements

The framework for measuring fair value provides a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. The hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (Level 1) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (Level 3). The three levels of the fair value hierarchy are described as follows:

- Level 1: Inputs to the valuation methodology are unadjusted quoted prices for identical assets or liabilities in active markets that the Plan has the ability to access.
- Level 2: Inputs to the valuation methodology include:
 - Quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities in active markets;
 - Quoted prices for identical or similar assets or liabilities in inactive markets;
 - Inputs other than quoted prices that are observable for the asset or liability; and
 - Inputs that are derived principally from or corroborated by observable market data by correlation or other means.

If the asset or liability has a specified (contractual) term, the Level 2 input must be observable for substantially the full term of the asset or liability.

- Level 3: Inputs to the valuation methodology are unobservable and significant to the fair value measurement.

The asset or liability's fair value measurement level within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of any input that is significant to the fair value measurement. Valuation techniques maximize the use of relevant observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs.

Following is a description of the valuation methodologies used for assets measured at fair value, including the general classification of such instruments pursuant to the valuation hierarchy. There have been no changes in the methodologies used at August 7, 2023 and December 31, 2022.

Mutual Funds

Mutual funds were valued at the net asset value (NAV) of shares held by the Plan at year end based on quoted market prices.

Note 5 – Fully Benefit-Responsive Investment Contracts

The Plan invested in the AUL Stable Value Account, which is a fully benefit-responsive guaranteed investment contract (GIC). This contract meets the fully benefit-responsive investment contract criteria and therefore was reported at contract value. Contract value is the relevant measure for fully benefit-responsive investment contracts because this is the amount received by participants if they were to initiate permitted transactions under the terms of the Plan. Contract value represents contributions made under each contract, plus earnings, less participant withdrawals, and administrative expenses.

The traditional investment contract held by the Plan was a guaranteed investment contract. The contract issuer is contractually obligated to repay the principal and a specified interest rate that is guaranteed to the Plan. The crediting rate was based on a formula established in a contract between the Plan and the contract issuer, which will not fall below 0%. The crediting rate was reviewed on an annual and quarterly basis, respectively, for resetting. The contract cannot be terminated before the scheduled maturity date.

The Plan's ability to receive amounts due in accordance with fully benefit-responsive investment contracts was dependent on the third-party issuer's ability to meet its financial obligations. The issuer's ability to meet its contractual obligations may have been affected by future economic and regulatory developments.

Certain events may have limited the ability of the Plan to transact at contract value with the contract issuer. These events may have been different under each contract. Examples of such events included the following:

1. The Plan's failure to qualify under Section 401(a) of the Internal Revenue Code or the failure of the trust to be tax-exempt under Section 501(a) of the Internal Revenue Code
2. Premature termination of the contracts
3. Amendments to the Plan documents (including complete or partial Plan termination or merger with another plan)
4. Changes to the Plan's prohibition on competing investment options
5. Bankruptcy of the Plan sponsor or other Plan sponsor events (for example, divestitures or spinoffs of a subsidiary) that significantly affect the Plan's normal operations.

In addition, certain events allowed the issuer to terminate the contracts with the Plan and settle at an amount different from contract value. Those events may be different under each contract. Examples of such events included the following:

1. An uncured violation of the Plan's investment guidelines
2. A breach of material obligation under the contract
3. A material misrepresentation
4. A material amendment to the agreements without the consent of the issuer.

Note 6 – Related Party Transactions and Transactions with Parties-in-Interest

A related party is any party who can control or significantly influence Plan management or operating policies. Parties-in-interest are defined under DOL regulations as any employees of the Plan, fiduciaries of the Plan, service providers to the Plan, the employer whose employees are covered by the Plan, and certain significant owners of the employer and their relatives. Service providers may include, but are not limited to, the custodian, trustee, third-party administrator (TPA), investment managers, investment advisors, legal counsel, and Plan auditor.

During the year ended August 7, 2023, the Plan made direct payments of \$23,386 to certain parties-in-interest for administration and investment advisory fees, as allowed by ERISA. The Plan sponsor paid directly any other fees related to the operation of the Plan.

Fees incurred by the Plan for the investment management services were included in the net appreciation (depreciation) in fair value of the related investment, as they are paid using investment earnings rather than a direct payment.

The Plan participated in an expense offset agreement whereby certain third party expenses were paid with rebates received by the Plan from investment managers. During the year ended August 7, 2023, the Plan received investment manager rebates which were offset against recordkeeper fees. The rebates were included as a reduction to administrative expenses in the statement of changes in net assets available for benefits.

Note 7 – Risks and Uncertainties

Prior to plan termination, the Plan invested in various investment securities. Investment securities are exposed to various risks such as interest rate, market, and credit risks. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investment securities, it is, at least, reasonably possible that changes in values of investment securities will occur in the near term and that such changes could materially affect participants' account balances and the amounts reported in the statement of net assets available for benefits.

Note 8 – Tax Status

The Plan sponsor adopted a plan which received a favorable opinion letter, issued to the document provider, from the Internal Revenue Service dated November 30, 2020, which states that the Plan was designed in accordance with the applicable sections of the IRC and is, therefore, not subject to tax under present income tax law. The Plan is required to operate in conformity with the IRC to maintain its qualification. Management is not aware of any course of action or series of events that have occurred that might adversely affect the Plan's qualified status.

U.S. GAAP requires Plan management to evaluate tax positions taken by the Plan and recognize a tax liability if the Plan has taken an uncertain position that more likely than not, based on the technical merits, would not be sustained upon examination by the IRS. The Plan Administrator has analyzed the tax positions taken by the Plan and has concluded that as of September 30, 2023 there are no uncertain positions taken or expected to be taken. The Plan has recognized no interest or penalties related to uncertain tax positions. The Plan is subject to routine audits by taxing jurisdictions; however, there are currently no audits for any tax periods in progress. Generally, the statute of limitations for the IRS to assess taxes on a plan expires three years from the due date of the return or the date on which it was filed, whichever is later.

All participant accounts were distributed by September 30, 2023. Our opinion is not modified with respect to this matter.

Note 1 – Description of Plan

The following description of Hitch Enterprises, Inc. 401(k) Plan (the Plan) provides only general information. Participants should refer to the plan agreement for a more complete description of the Plan's provisions.

Termination of the Plan

The Company terminated the Plan effective August 7, 2023. In accordance with Plan provisions, all benefit accruals ceased, all participants became fully vested in their accounts, and all contributions ceased. The Company directed the distribution of participant's accounts in a manner permitted by the Plan. All participant accounts were distributed by September 30, 2023.

General

The Plan was a defined contribution plan established by Hitch Enterprises, Inc. (the Plan Sponsor and Company) under the provisions of Section 401(a) of the United States Internal Revenue Code (the IRC), which includes a qualified cash or deferred arrangement as described in Section 401(k) of the IRC, for the benefit of eligible employees of the Company and any adopting participating employers. The Plan was subject to the provisions of the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (ERISA), as well as certain provisions of the federal income tax laws.

The following adopting employers were allowed to participate in the Plan:

- Hitch Feeders I Inc.
- Hitch Feeders II. Inc.
- Henry C. Hitch Feedlot. Inc.
- Hitch Farms Inc. {Ranch}
- Hitch Mills Inc.
- Hitch Commodities Inc.
- Hitch Pork Producers Inc.
- Hitch Farms Partnership

All employees of the Company and any participating affiliates were subject to the following eligibility requirements:

- Age: 18
- Service: 2 months
- Status Exclusions:
 - a. None

Upon satisfying the eligibility requirements, employees could participate in the Plan on the first day of the next month.

Contributions

The Plan was funded through employee elective deferrals and Company contributions. Each year, participants could elect to contribute a portion of their compensation, subject to certain maximum limitations imposed by Section 402(g) of the IRC. At the discretion of the Plan Administrator, participants were permitted to deposit or “roll over” into the Plan distributions they had received from other plans and certain Individual Retirement Accounts (IRAs). Participants who had attained age 50 before the end of the Plan year were eligible to make catch-up contributions. The following contribution types were allowed by the Plan:

- Elective deferrals
- Roth deferrals
- Employer safe harbor
- Rollover contributions
- Employer profit sharing

Participants could direct the investment of their contributions into various investment options offered by the Plan.

The Plan had an automatic enrollment provision (3% salary deferral) whereby employees elected out of the Plan if they did not wish to participate.

The Company elected to operate the Plan as a safe harbor 401(k) plan, which made the plan exempt from certain compliance testing requirements. The Company made a safe harbor matching contribution of 100% of the participant's deferral up to 3% plus 50% of deferrals from the next 2% of compensation.

The Company could make discretionary profit sharing contributions which will be allocated in accordance with the plan document provisions.

Participant Accounts

Each participant's account was credited with the participant's contribution, allocation of the Company's contributions, and Plan earnings or losses and charged with an allocation of administrative expenses that are paid by the Plan. Allocations may have been charged based on participant earnings, account balances, or specific participant transactions. The benefit to which a participant was entitled was the benefit that could be provided from the participant's vested account.

Vesting

Participants were immediately 100% vested in their elective deferrals including catch-up contributions, rollover contributions from other plans, and actual earnings thereon. The method for crediting vesting service for Company matching and discretionary profit sharing contributions was based on vesting periods of service. Participants were credited with a period of service for 1,000 hours earned. If participants were employed on or after their Normal Retirement Age or if they terminated employment on account of death or disability, they were 100% vested in their Company matching and discretionary profit sharing contributions.

Participants were always 100% vested in their safe harbor matching contributions. The following schedule is only applicable if the Company makes discretionary profit sharing contributions.

Forfeited Accounts

Forfeitures represent unvested portions of terminated participants' accounts. The Plan allowed forfeitures of non-vested Company contributions to be used as follows:

- Pay Administrative Expenses
- Reduce Company Contributions
- Reallocated As Company Contributions

As August 7, 2023 and December 31, 2022, forfeited non-vested accounts totaled \$0 and \$80, respectively. During the period ended August 7, 2023, forfeited non-vested accounts of \$132 were used.

Investment Options

Upon enrollment in the Plan, a participant could direct the contributions made to the Plan, for or on behalf of the participant, to any one or more of the investment funds determined at the discretion of the Plan Administrator and Plan Sponsor and in such multiples as the participant prescribes. A participant could change his or her investment direction with respect to future contributions or redirect the investment of his or her account balances.

Notes Receivable from Participants

Participants who were active employees could borrow against their vested account balances a minimum of \$1,000 up to a maximum equal to the lesser of 50% of their vested account balance or \$50,000. The loans, in the form of promissory notes, were secured by the balance in the participant's account, and bore interest at reasonable rates, which were commensurate with local prevailing rates as determined by the Plan Administrator. Principal and interest were paid ratably through payroll deductions and generally repaid within 5 years.

Benefits Paid to Participants

Upon termination of service, disability, or retirement, a participant was entitled to receive a distribution equal to the value of the participant's vested interest in his or her account. Distribution of a deceased participant's account was made to the designated beneficiary.

The following types of distributions were also allowed by the Plan:

- In service
- Involuntary cash-outs
- Rollover from qualified plan
- Termination partial withdrawal

Plan Expenses

The Plan's expenses were paid by either the Plan or the Company, as provided by the plan document. Expenses paid directly by the Company were excluded from these financial statements. Certain expenses incurred in connection with the general administration of the Plan that were paid by the Plan were recorded as deductions in the accompanying statement of changes in net assets available for benefits. In addition, certain investment-related expenses were included in net appreciation (depreciation) in fair value of investments.

Note 2 – Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Basis of Accounting

The financial statements of the Plan have been prepared on the accrual basis of accounting in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America (U.S. GAAP). Certain prior period disclosures have been revised to conform to current year's presentation. Effective August 7, 2023, the Plan adopted a resolution to terminate the Plan. As a result, the Plan's financial statements as of August 7, 2023 and for the period of January 1, 2023 through August 7, 2023 have been prepared on the liquidation basis, in accordance with U.S. GAAP. This basis of accounting is considered appropriate when, among other things, liquidation of an entity is probable and the net realizable value of assets are reasonably determinable. Under the liquidation basis of accounting, assets are stated at their estimate net realized cash value and liabilities are stated at their anticipated settlement amounts. The estimated net realizable cash value for investments as of August 7, 2023 would be fair value. There were no material changes to the 2023 and 2022 financial statements as a result of using the liquidation basis of accounting.

Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in accordance with U.S. GAAP requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and changes therein, and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Reclassification

Certain reclassifications may have been made to the 2022 financial statement presentation to correspond to the current year's format. Total net assets available for benefits were materially unchanged due to these reclassifications.

Investment Valuation and Income Recognition

Investments were reported at fair value (except for any fully benefit-responsive investment contracts, which are reported at contract value). Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. See Note 4 for discussion of fair value measurements.

Purchases and sales of investments were recorded on the trade-date basis. Interest income was recorded on the accrual basis. Dividends were recorded on the ex-dividend date. Net appreciation (depreciation) in fair value of investments, including realized gains and losses on sales during the year and current changes in unrealized appreciation (depreciation) in the market value of investments held at year end, was presented in the statement of changes in net assets available for benefits.

Contributions

Contributions from Plan participants and employer contributions, if any, were recorded in the year in which the participant contributions were withheld from compensation.

Notes Receivable from Participants

Notes receivable from participants were measured at their unpaid principal balance plus any accrued but unpaid interest. Interest income was recorded on the accrual basis. Related fees were recorded as administrative expenses and were expensed when they are incurred. No allowance for credit losses had been recorded as of August 7, 2023 and December 31, 2022. If a participant ceased to make scheduled repayments and the Plan Administrator deemed the participant note receivable to be in default, the participant note receivable balance was reduced and a benefit payment recorded.

Payment of Benefits

Benefits were recorded when paid.

Note 3 – Certified Investments

Certain information summarized below related to the accompanying financial statements and ERISA-required supplemental schedules was obtained by management and agreed to or derived from information certified as complete and accurate by America United Life Insurance Company, the custodian of the Plan.

Note 4 – Fair Value Measurements

The framework for measuring fair value provides a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. The hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (Level 1) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (Level 3). The three levels of the fair value hierarchy are described as follows:

- Level 1: Inputs to the valuation methodology are unadjusted quoted prices for identical assets or liabilities in active markets that the Plan has the ability to access.
- Level 2: Inputs to the valuation methodology include:
 - Quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities in active markets;
 - Quoted prices for identical or similar assets or liabilities in inactive markets;
 - Inputs other than quoted prices that are observable for the asset or liability; and
 - Inputs that are derived principally from or corroborated by observable market data by correlation or other means.

If the asset or liability has a specified (contractual) term, the Level 2 input must be observable for substantially the full term of the asset or liability.

- Level 3: Inputs to the valuation methodology are unobservable and significant to the fair value measurement.

The asset or liability's fair value measurement level within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of any input that is significant to the fair value measurement. Valuation techniques maximize the use of relevant observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs.

Following is a description of the valuation methodologies used for assets measured at fair value, including the general classification of such instruments pursuant to the valuation hierarchy. There have been no changes in the methodologies used at August 7, 2023 and December 31, 2022.

Mutual Funds

Mutual funds were valued at the net asset value (NAV) of shares held by the Plan at year end based on quoted market prices.

Note 5 – Fully Benefit-Responsive Investment Contracts

The Plan invested in the AUL Stable Value Account, which is a fully benefit-responsive guaranteed investment contract (GIC). This contract meets the fully benefit-responsive investment contract criteria and therefore was reported at contract value. Contract value is the relevant measure for fully benefit-responsive investment contracts because this is the amount received by participants if they were to initiate permitted transactions under the terms of the Plan. Contract value represents contributions made under each contract, plus earnings, less participant withdrawals, and administrative expenses.

The following represents the disaggregation of investment contracts held by the Plan:

The traditional investment contract held by the Plan was a guaranteed investment contract. The contract issuer is contractually obligated to repay the principal and a specified interest rate that is guaranteed to the Plan. The crediting rate was based on a formula established in a contract between the Plan and the contract issuer, which will not fall below 0%. The crediting rate was reviewed on an annual and quarterly basis, respectively, for resetting. The contract cannot be terminated before the scheduled maturity date.

The Plan's ability to receive amounts due in accordance with fully benefit-responsive investment contracts was dependent on the third-party issuer's ability to meet its financial obligations. The issuer's ability to meet its contractual obligations may have been affected by future economic and regulatory developments.

Certain events may have limited the ability of the Plan to transact at contract value with the contract issuer. These events may have been different under each contract. Examples of such events included the following:

1. The Plan's failure to qualify under Section 401(a) of the Internal Revenue Code or the failure of the trust to be tax-exempt under Section 501(a) of the Internal Revenue Code
2. Premature termination of the contracts
3. Amendments to the Plan documents (including complete or partial Plan termination or merger with another plan)
4. Changes to the Plan's prohibition on competing investment options
5. Bankruptcy of the Plan sponsor or other Plan sponsor events (for example, divestitures or spinoffs of a subsidiary) that significantly affect the Plan's normal operations.

In addition, certain events allowed the issuer to terminate the contracts with the Plan and settle at an amount different from contract value. Those events may be different under each contract. Examples of such events included the following:

1. An uncured violation of the Plan's investment guidelines
2. A breach of material obligation under the contract
3. A material misrepresentation
4. A material amendment to the agreements without the consent of the issuer.

Note 6 – Related Party Transactions and Transactions with Parties-in-Interest

A related party is any party who can control or significantly influence Plan management or operating policies. Parties-in-interest are defined under DOL regulations as any employees of the Plan, fiduciaries of the Plan, service providers to the Plan, the employer whose employees are covered by the Plan, and certain significant owners of the employer and their relatives. Service providers may include, but are not limited to, the custodian, trustee, third-party administrator (TPA), investment managers, investment advisors, legal counsel, and Plan auditor.

During the year ended August 7, 2023, the Plan made direct payments of \$23,386 to certain parties-in-interest for administration and investment advisory fees, as allowed by ERISA. The Plan sponsor paid directly any other fees related to the operation of the Plan.

Fees incurred by the Plan for the investment management services were included in the net appreciation (depreciation) in fair value of the related investment, as they are paid using investment earnings rather than a direct payment.

The Plan participated in an expense offset agreement whereby certain third party expenses were paid with rebates received by the Plan from investment managers. During the year ended August 7, 2023, the Plan received investment manager rebates which were offset against recordkeeper fees. The rebates were included as a reduction to administrative expenses in the statement of changes in net assets available for benefits.

Note 7 – Risks and Uncertainties

Prior to plan termination, the Plan invested in various investment securities. Investment securities are exposed to various risks such as interest rate, market, and credit risks. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investment securities, it is, at least, reasonably possible that changes in values of investment securities will occur in the near term and that such changes could materially affect participants' account balances and the amounts reported in the statement of net assets available for benefits.

Note 8 – Tax Status

The Plan sponsor adopted a plan which received a favorable opinion letter, issued to the document provider, from the Internal Revenue Service dated November 30, 2020, which states that the Plan was designed in accordance with the applicable sections of the IRC and is, therefore, not subject to tax under present income tax law. The Plan is required to operate in conformity with the IRC to maintain its qualification. Management is not aware of any course of action or series of events that have occurred that might adversely affect the Plan's qualified status.

U.S. GAAP requires Plan management to evaluate tax positions taken by the Plan and recognize a tax liability if the Plan has taken an uncertain position that more likely than not, based on the technical merits, would not be sustained upon examination by the IRS. The Plan Administrator has analyzed the tax positions taken by the Plan and has concluded that as of September 30, 2023 there are no uncertain positions taken or expected to be taken. The Plan has recognized no interest or penalties related to uncertain tax positions. The Plan is subject to routine audits by taxing jurisdictions; however, there are currently no audits for any tax periods in progress. Generally, the statute of limitations for the IRS to assess taxes on a plan expires three years from the due date of the return or the date on which it was filed, whichever is later.
