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INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

To the Retirement Plan Committee
The Brandeis School of San Francisco Retirement Plan

Scope and Nature of the ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) Audits

We have performed audits of the accompanying financial statements of The Brandeis School of San Francisco Retirement Plan, an employee benefit plan subject to the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (ERISA), as permitted by ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) ("ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) audit"). The financial statements comprise the statements of net assets available for benefits as of June 30, 2024 and 2023, and the related statement of changes in net assets available for benefits for the year ended June 30, 2024, and the related notes to the financial statements.

Management, having determined it is permissible in the circumstances, has elected to have the audits of The Brandeis School of San Francisco Retirement Plan's financial statements performed in accordance with ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) pursuant to 29 CFR 2520.103-8 of the Department of Labor's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA. As permitted by ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C), our audits need not extend to any statements or information related to assets held for investment of the plan (investment information) by a bank or similar institution or insurance carrier that is regulated, supervised, and subject to periodic examination by a state or federal agency, provided that the statements or information regarding assets so held are prepared and certified to by the bank or similar institution or insurance carrier in accordance with 29 CFR 2520.103-5 of the Department of Labor's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA (qualified institution).

Management has obtained certifications from qualified institutions as of June 30, 2024 and 2023, and for the year ended June 30, 2024, stating that the certified investment information, as described in Note 3 to the financial statements, is complete and accurate.

Opinion

In our opinion, based on our audits and on the procedures performed as described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audits of the Financial Statements section:

- the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements referred to above, other than those agreed to or derived from the certified investment information, are presented fairly, in all material respects, in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.
- the information in the financial statements referred to above related to assets held by and certified to by a qualified institution agrees to, or is derived from, in all material respects, the information prepared and certified by an institution that management determined meets the requirements of ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C).

Basis for Opinion

We conducted our audits in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audits of the Financial Statements section of our report. We are required to be independent of The Brandeis School of San Francisco Retirement Plan and to meet our other ethical responsibilities, in accordance with the relevant ethical requirements relating to our audits. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) audit opinion.

Responsibilities of Management for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America, and for the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error. Management's election of the ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) audits does not affect management's responsibility for the financial statements.

In preparing the financial statements, management is required to evaluate whether there are conditions or events, considered in the aggregate, that raise substantial doubt about The Brandeis School of San Francisco Retirement Plan's ability to continue as a going concern within one year after the date that the financial statements are available to be issued.

Management is also responsible for maintaining a current plan instrument, including all plan amendments, administering the plan, and determining that the plan's transactions that are presented and disclosed in the financial statements are in conformity with the plan's provisions, including maintaining sufficient records with respect to each of the participants, to determine the benefits due or which may become due to such participants.

Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audits of the Financial Statements

Except as described in the Scope and Nature of the ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) Audits section of our report, our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance but is not absolute assurance and therefore is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control. Misstatements are considered material if there is a substantial likelihood that, individually or in the aggregate, they would influence the judgment made by a reasonable user based on the financial statements.

In performing audits in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards, we:

- Exercise professional judgment and maintain professional skepticism throughout the audits.

Such procedures include examining, on a test basis, evidence regarding the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements.

- Obtain an understanding of internal control relevant to the audits in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of The Brandeis School of San Francisco Retirement Plan's internal control. Accordingly, no such opinion is expressed.
- Evaluate the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluate the overall presentation of the financial statements.
- Conclude whether, in our judgment, there are conditions or events, considered in the aggregate, that raise substantial doubt about The Brandeis School of San Francisco Retirement Plan's ability to continue as a going concern for a reasonable period of time.

Our audits did not extend to the certified investment information, except for obtaining and reading the certification, comparing the certified investment information with the related information presented and disclosed in the financial statements, and reading the disclosures relating to the certified investment information to assess whether they are in accordance with the presentation and disclosure requirements of accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Accordingly, the objective of an ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) audit is not to express an opinion about whether the financial statements as a whole are presented fairly, in all material respects, in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

We are required to communicate with those charged with governance regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audits, significant audit findings, and certain internal control related matters that we identified during the audits.

Other Matter - Supplemental Schedules Required by ERISA

The supplemental schedules of delinquent participant contributions for the year ended June 30, 2024, and of assets (held at end of year) as of June 30, 2024, (collectively "supplemental schedules"), are presented for purposes of additional analysis and are not a required part of the financial statements but are supplementary information required by the Department of Labor's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA. Such information is the responsibility of management and was derived from and relates directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements. The information included in the supplemental schedules, other than that agreed to or derived from the certified investment information, has been subjected to auditing procedures applied in the audits of the financial statements and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements or to the financial statements themselves, and other additional procedures in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards. For information included in the supplemental schedules that agreed to or is derived from the certified investment information, we compared such information to the related certified investment information.

In forming our opinion on the supplemental schedules, we evaluated whether the supplemental schedules, other than the information agreed to or derived from the certified investment information, including their form and content, are presented in conformity with the Department of Labor's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA.

1. DESCRIPTION OF THE PLAN

The following description of The Brandeis School of San Francisco Retirement Plan (the "Plan") provides only general information. Participants should refer to the plan documents for a more complete description of the Plan's provisions.

General

The Plan, a defined contribution savings plan sponsored by The Brandeis School of San Francisco (the "School" or "Employer"), previously known as Brandeis Hillel Day School, pursuant to Section 403(b) and related provisions of the Internal Revenue Code (IRC), was established September 1, 1992, and most recently amended on July 12, 2022. The Plan is designed to provide participants with a means to defer a portion of their compensation for retirement and to provide benefits in the event of disability, death, termination of employment, military active duty call-up, or financial hardship. The Plan covers all eligible employees of the School upon employment and is subject to the provisions of the Department of Labor's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (ERISA).

An expansion of Setting Every Community Up for Retirement Enhancement Act of 2019 ("SECURE 2.0") was signed into law on December 29, 2022, as part of the Consolidated Appropriations Act of 2023. The effective dates of provisions within SECURE 2.0 vary through 2026. The Sponsor has until the end of the Plan year beginning on or after January 1, 2026, to amend the Plan for the changes related to SECURE 2.0. The Plan has not been formally amended to adopt the provisions as of the date the financial statements were available to be issued.

Plan administration

The School is the administrator of the Plan, and, as such carries out the duties imposed by ERISA. The School has delegated certain responsibilities for the operation and administration of the Plan. Teachers Insurance and Annuity Association (TIAA) and College Retirement Equities Fund (CREF), and as agent for TIAA, FSB from July 1, 2022 to July 14, 2023, and thereafter TIAA Trust, N.A., (collectively, the "Custodians") of the Plan are responsible for the custody and management of the Plan's assets and an affiliate of the Custodians is responsible for maintaining participant accounts and transactions related to participant initiated activity.

Eligibility

All employees, except for students, are eligible to make elective deferrals beginning the first of the month following their date of hire.

All employees, except students, tutors, substitute teachers, athletic coaches, and enrichment providers, who have attained age 21 and completed one year of service, are eligible to receive Employer contributions. The Plan defines a year of service as the completion of 1,000 hours of actual service during a Plan year. For the purposes of calculating eligibility, participants are credited for prior service to a school or non-profit organization.

Participant accounts

Each participant's account is credited with the participant's contributions or rollovers and adjusted for allocations of (a) School contributions, if any, and (b) Plan earnings or losses, and (c) charged with administrative expenses not paid directly by the School. Allocations of investment earnings are based strictly on the participant's selection of investments and timing of purchase. Other allocations are based on participant earnings or account balances, as defined by the Plan. The benefit to which a participant is entitled is the benefit that can be provided from the participant's vested account balance.

Participant contributions

Participants may elect to contribute through payroll deduction amounts up to 100% of their annual compensation, as defined by the plan documents, on a tax-deferred or after-tax basis (as Roth contributions), up to a maximum amount allowed by the IRC. Participants who have attained age 50 before the end of the Plan year are eligible to make catch-up contributions. Participants may also contribute amounts representing distributions from other qualified employer-sponsored retirement plans (rollovers). Participants direct the investment of all their contributions into various investment options offered by the Plan.

Newly eligible employees are automatically enrolled to defer 1% of their eligible compensation, unless the participant makes a contrary election within 90 days of their hire date.

Employer contributions

The School makes non-elective contributions ranging from 3% to 8% of eligible employee compensation, as defined by the plan documents. Non-elective Employer contribution percentages vary based on each participant's years of eligible service.

Vesting

Participants are immediately vested in all contributions, plus actual earnings thereon.

Forfeited accounts

The forfeiture account totaled \$3,172 and \$1,683 as of June 30, 2024 and 2023, respectively. Forfeitures are generated when Employer contribution overpayments occur. Forfeitures of \$1,683 were used to reduce Employer contributions during the year ended June 30, 2024, in accordance with the provisions of the Plan.

Notes receivable from participants

Notes receivable from participants ("participant loans" or "loans") are issued directly from the participants account balance. Participants may borrow from their accounts a minimum of \$1,000 up to a maximum equal to the lesser of \$50,000 or 50% of their vested account balance. Participant loan terms are generally five years or less but may exceed five years if the purpose of the loan is to purchase a principal residence. The participant loans are secured by the balance in the participants' accounts and bear interest at a rate commensurate with local prevailing rates as determined by the Plan administrator. Participant loans mature at various dates through May 2029, and accrue interest rates from 4.25% to 9.50% as of June 30, 2024.

Payment of benefits

Distributions and withdrawals are payable to participants upon retirement, termination, attainment of age 59 ½, financial hardship, being called to active military duty, disability, or death. If a participant's account balance is equal to or less than \$5,000 upon termination, the balance is distributed in a lump-sum cash payment unless a direct rollover into another qualified benefit plan is requested. If a participant's account balance exceeds \$5,000 upon termination, the participant may elect to receive a lump-sum amount equal to the value of the participant's vested interest in his or her account, partial payment, installment payment, or annuity contract, a direct rollover into another qualified plan, or postpone payment to a later date and remain in the Plan as described in the plan documents.

Upon attaining the age of 59 ½ the participant may, while still employed by the School, request a withdrawal from their account balance. Under certain circumstances of financial hardship, the participant is allowed to withdraw funds from the Plan. Qualified reservist distributions are permitted under limited circumstances if approved by the Plan administrator.

Administrative expenses

Certain administrative expenses of the Plan, including record-keeping and audit fees, were paid by the School for the year ended June 30, 2024. Participants may be charged for some or all of the costs and expenses of operating the Plan. Such expenses include, but are not limited to investment expenses and costs to process distributions, participant loans, and domestic relations orders. Generally, the School pays for administrative expenses of the Plan.

2. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of accounting and financial statement presentation

The financial statements of the Plan are prepared on the accrual basis of accounting in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America (U.S. GAAP).

Use of estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with U.S. GAAP requires the Plan administrator to make estimates and assumptions that affect certain reported amounts and disclosures. Accordingly, actual results may differ from those estimates.

Risk and uncertainties

The Plan invests in various investment securities. Investment securities are exposed to various risks such as interest rate, market, and credit risks. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investment securities, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in the values of investment securities will occur in the near-term and that such changes could materially affect participants' account balances and the amounts reported in the statements of net assets available for benefits and changes therein.

Investment valuation and income recognition

The Plan's investments are reported at fair value, except for fully benefit-responsive investment contracts, which are reported at contract value. The Custodians certify the value of all investments and related activity.

Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. See Note 4 for a description of fair value measurements.

Contract value is the relevant measurement for assets invested in fully benefit-responsive investment contracts because contract value is the amount participants normally receive if they were to initiate permitted transactions under the terms of the Plan. See Note 5 for discussion of the Plan's fully benefit-responsive investment contracts.

Purchases and sales of securities are recorded on a trade-date basis. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Dividends are recorded on the ex-dividend date. Net appreciation includes the Plan's net investment gains and losses on investments bought and sold, as well as held, during the year.

Contributions and contributions receivable

Contributions from participants are recorded based on the date the contributions have been separated from a participant's pay by the Employer, which is the pay date.

Contributions and contributions receivable (continued)

School contributions are recorded in the year they are earned and to coincide with the year in which the Employer records the contribution in its financial statements. Contributions receivable are employee and Employer contributions earned and withheld by the School as of June 30 which were transferred to the Plan subsequent to year end. Rollover contributions from participants are recorded based on the date the rollover contributions have been received by the Custodians.

Notes receivable from participants

Participant loans are carried and presented at their unpaid balance plus any accrued but unpaid interest. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. If a participant ceases to make repayments and the plan administrator deems the participant loan to be a distribution, the note receivable balance is reduced, and a benefit payment is recorded. No allowances for credit losses have been recorded as of June 30, 2024 and 2023.

Payment of benefits

Benefit payments are recorded when paid.

Administrative expenses

Expenses are recorded when incurred.

Subsequent events

The Plan has evaluated subsequent events through April 1, 2025, the date the financial statements were available to be issued. Effective July 1, 2024, the Plan document was amended. The amendment updated the excluded employees from Employer non-elective contributions to include camp counselors, seasonal employees, temporary employees, AfterCare supervisors working less than 60% of full time, and AfterCare workers. Additionally, TIAA is implementing the mandatory cash-out distribution increase from \$5,000 to \$7,000 and the expansion of available money types eligible for hardship distributions as part of the SECURE 2.0 provisions passed into law.

There were no other subsequent events that would have a material impact on the presentation of the Plan's financial statements.

3. INFORMATION PREPARED AND CERTIFIED BY THE CUSTODIANS (UNAUDITED)

The plan administrator, having determined it is permissible in the circumstances, has elected to have the audit of the Plan's financial statements performed in accordance with ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) pursuant to 29 CFR 2520.103-8 of ERISA. Accordingly, the Custodians, determined to be qualified institutions by the Plan administrator have certified to the completeness and accuracy of:

- Investments and notes receivable from participants reflected on the accompanying statements of net assets available for benefits as of June 30, 2024 and 2023;
- Net appreciation in fair value of investments, interest and dividends, and other income as shown in the accompanying statement of changes in net assets available for benefits for the year ended June 30, 2024; and,
- Investments and notes receivable from participants reflected on the schedule of assets (held at end of year) as of June 30, 2024 ("supplemental schedule").

Accordingly, as requested by the Plan administrator, the Plan's independent auditor performed no procedures on the certified information other than to agree the certified information to the related information included in the financial statements and supplemental schedule.

4. FAIR VALUE MEASUREMENTS

Accounting standards establish a framework for measuring fair value. That framework provides a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. The hierarchy gives the highest priority to the unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (level 1) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (level 3).

The three levels of fair value hierarchy are as follows:

- *Level 1* - inputs to the valuation methodology are unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities that the Plan has the ability to access at the measurement date.
- *Level 2* - inputs to the valuation methodology include quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities in active markets; quoted prices for identical or similar assets or liabilities in inactive markets, inputs other than quoted prices that are observable for the asset or liability; and inputs that are derived principally from or corroborated by observable market data by correlation or other means. If the asset or liability has a specified (contractual) term, the Level 2 input must be observable for substantially the full term of the asset or liability; or
- *Level 3* - inputs to the valuation methodology are unobservable and significant to the fair value measurement of the assets or liabilities.

Transfers between levels within the fair value hierarchy are recognized when there is a change in the investments within a level or a change in inputs used to value those investments.

4. FAIR VALUE MEASUREMENTS (continued)

The asset or liability's fair value measurement level within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of any input that is significant to the fair value measurement. Valuation techniques used need to maximize the use of observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs.

Following is a description of the valuation methodologies used for assets measured at fair value. There have been no changes to the methodologies used as of June 30, 2024 and 2023.

Mutual funds: Investment securities on security exchanges are valued at the daily closing market prices as of the valuation date. The mutual funds held by the Plan are open-end funds that are registered with the U.S. Securities and Exchange Commission. The funds are deemed to be actively traded and are classified within Level 1 of the fair value hierarchy. The mutual funds held by the Plan are deemed to have a readily determinable fair value.

Pooled separate account: The investment in a pooled separate account consists of underlying investments in real estate properties and real estate-related investments. Units held in the separate account are accumulation units and calculate the contract owner's interest. Such units are valued daily to reflect investment performance and the prorated daily deduction for expense charges. The number of units credited to a participant's account is determined by dividing the dollar amount of the transaction by the unit value the next time value is computed. Units are valued any day the New York Stock Exchange is open for business and may be accessed by plan sponsors and participants via the TIAA website. The pooled separate account is classified within Level 1 of the fair value hierarchy.

TIAA Variable Annuities consist of CREF Accounts and TIAA Access Accounts:

- CREF Accounts consist of eight investment portfolios: the Stock, Global Equities, Growth, Equity Index, Core Bond Market, Inflation Linked Bond, Social Choice and Money Market accounts. The fair values of accumulation units held by the Plan in CREF Accounts are primarily valued using market quotations or prices obtained from independent pricing sources. CREF Accounts are deemed actively traded, and thus are classified within level 1 of the fair value hierarchy. Data for values are available daily to plan administrators and client investors on TIAA's website, and provide sufficient corroborative evidence to ascertain the relationship between each fund's value and the values of individual underlying holdings. Underlying holdings include mutual funds and are primarily valued using market quotations or prices obtained from independent pricing sources. CREF Accounts are classified within level 1 of the fair value hierarchy.

- TIAA Access Accounts are variable annuity products that are funded through the TIAA Separate Account VA-3, a separate investment account of TIAA. VA-3 invests in proprietary and nonproprietary mutual funds through various sub-accounts. The fair values of subaccount units held by the Plan in TIAA Access Accounts are calculated daily by the issuer and the underlying investments are generally valued using market quotations obtained from independent pricing sources. Data for values are available daily to plan administrators and client investors on TIAA's website, and provide sufficient corroborative evidence to ascertain the relationship between each fund's value and the values of individual underlying holdings. TIAA Access Accounts are classified within level 1 of the fair value hierarchy.

Fixed Annuity Contracts - TIAA Traditional Annuities: The Plan's investments in the TIAA Traditional Annuities and TIAA Stable Value Fund are reported by TIAA at contract value, which approximates fair value. As these investments are contract-based, observable prices for identical or similar investments do not exist and, accordingly, these investments are valued using unobservable inputs. TIAA Traditional Annuities are segregated into non-fully benefit-responsive and fully benefit-responsive categories. The Plan's investments in the non-fully benefit-responsive contracts are presented as level 3 fair value investments in the fair value hierarchy. The fully benefit-responsive contracts are not categorized within the fair value hierarchy as they are measured at contract value. See Note 5. The Plan sold investments in non-fully benefit-responsive contracts of \$94,422 during the year ended June 30, 2024. Net transfers and purchases on non-fully benefit-responsive contracts totaled \$44,103 and \$177,634, respectively, for the year ended June 30, 2024.

The preceding methods described may produce a fair value calculation that may not be indicative of net realizable value or reflective of future fair values. Furthermore, although Plan management believes its valuation methods are appropriate and consistent with other market participants, the use of different methodologies or assumptions to determine the fair value of certain financial instruments could result in a different fair value measurement at the reporting date.

5. GUARANTEED ANNUITY CONTRACTS WITH TIAA AND CREF

The Plan invests in investment contracts through the TIAA Traditional Annuity and TIAA Stable Value Fund. The TIAA Traditional Annuity and the TIAA Stable Value Fund are guaranteed fixed annuity contracts available as investment options to Plan participants.

The TIAA Traditional Annuity is offered through a variety of contract types. The Plan invests in the Group Retirement Annuity (GRA), Retirement Annuity (RA), Group Supplemental Retirement Annuity (GSRA), Supplemental Retirement Annuity (SRA) and Retirement Choice (RC). The type of contract through which a participant invests in the TIAA Traditional Annuity determines the applicability of certain account features, such as the guaranteed minimum interest rate, additional interest declarations, the degree of liquidity of the participant's account and the options for receiving income upon retirement.

The GSRA and SRA contracts are considered fully benefit-responsive contracts. The GRA, RC and RA contracts are considered non-fully benefit-responsive.

The GSRA and SRA contracts are fully and unconditionally guaranteed by TIAA, which meets the fully benefit-responsive investment contract criteria and therefore are reported at contract value. Contract value represents accumulated cash contributions made under the contract, plus interest credited to the contracts, less participant withdrawals and transfers. Participants may ordinarily direct the withdrawal or transfer of all or a portion of their investments at contract value.

When participants choose to allocate a portion of their retirement savings to the TIAA Traditional Annuity during the accumulation phase of the contract, their contributions purchase a specific amount of lifetime income based on the contractual rate schedule in effect at the time the premium is paid. The participant's principal, plus a minimum specified rate of interest, is guaranteed by TIAA's claims-paying ability. The TIAA Traditional Annuity also provides the potential for additional interest if declared by TIAA's Board of Trustees. Additional interest when declared, remains in effect for the declaration year, which begins each March 1 for accumulating annuities and January 1 for lifetime payout annuities. Additional interest is not guaranteed for future years. Together, the guaranteed minimum and additional amounts make up the crediting interest rate. The crediting interest rate was 3.00% for both the SRA and GSRA contracts as of June 30, 2024 and 2023. See Note 4 for the crediting interest rates for the contracts that are non-fully benefit-responsive.

Contributions to the TIAA Stable Value Fund are deposited into a non-unitized separate account. The contract provides a guaranteed minimum rate of interest between 1% and 3%. Although the liability to provide contract guarantees and accumulations is backed by the assets in the separate account, any amount to be credited above the minimum guaranteed rate is determined by TIAA.

When a participant's accumulation in the GSRA and SRA contracts are converted to a lifetime payout annuity, the present value of the stream of payments is equal to the accumulated balance, and the entire amount is recorded as a distribution in the statement of changes in net assets available for benefits.

Certain events might limit the ability of the Plan to transact at contract value with TIAA. These events may be different under each contract. Examples of such events include the following: (1) the Plan's failure to qualify under Section 401(a) of the IRC or the failure to qualify for exemption from federal income taxes under Section 501(a) of the IRC; (2) premature termination of the contracts; (3) failure to meet any required or prohibited transaction exemption under ERISA; (4) amendments to the plan documents (including complete or partial Plan termination or merger with another plan); or (5) bankruptcy of the plan sponsor or other plan sponsor events (for example, divestitures or spin-offs of a subsidiary) that significantly affect the Plan's normal operations; (6) changes to the Plan's prohibition on competing investment options or deletion of equity wash provisions.

No events are probable of occurring that might limit the ability of the Plan to transact at contract value with the contract issuer or would limit the ability of the Plan to transact at contract value with participants.

6. RELATED PARTY AND PARTY-IN-INTEREST TRANSACTIONS

ERISA defines a party-in-interest similar to a related party under accounting standards, except that ERISA's definition is broader and includes all entities and individuals that provide services to the Plan; however, these entities may not necessarily be related parties. There were no related parties to the Plan that were not also considered to be parties-in-interest.

Party-in-interest transactions include those with fiduciaries or employees of the Plan, any person who provides services to the Plan, an employer whose employees are covered by the Plan, an employee organization whose members are covered by the Plan, and a person who owns 50% or more of such an employer or employee association or relatives of such persons.

Certain fees and expenses of the Plan are paid by the School. The Plan is not required to repay expenses paid by the School on its behalf.

Certain fund level fees incurred by the funds in which the Plan invests for such services as investment management, shareholder services, and sub-transfer agency fees are paid through fund level revenue sharing arrangements. Revenue sharing totaled \$1,019 for the year ended June 30, 2024, and is included in other income on the statement of changes in net assets available for benefits.

6. RELATED PARTY AND PARTY-IN-INTEREST TRANSACTIONS (continued)

The Custodians retain as compensation for services provided to the Plan, any interest on amounts earned while certain transactions are pending. This applies to both contributions and distributions. Earnings are at institutional money market rates.

Certain Plan investments are owned and managed by the Custodians; therefore, these investment transactions qualify as exempt party-in-interest transactions.

7. PLAN TERMINATION

Although the School has not expressed any intent to do so, the School has the right under the Plan to discontinue its contributions at any time and to terminate the Plan subject to the provisions of ERISA.

8. TAX STATUS

The Plan has adopted the TIAA ERISA 403(b) Volume Submitter Plan Document. The Internal Revenue Service informed TIAA by a letter dated August 7, 2017, that its plan is designed in accordance with the applicable sections of the IRC and is appropriate for use by employers for the benefit of their employees. The plan administrator believes the Plan is designed and is being operated in compliance with the applicable requirements of the IRC and, therefore, believes that the Plan is qualified and that it, and the related trust, are tax-exempt. Therefore, no provision for income taxes has been included in the Plan's financial statements.
