Scope and Nature of the ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) Audit

We have performed audits of the financial statements of Stonehill Franciscan Services 401(k) Retirement Plan, an employee benefit plan subject to the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (ERISA), as permitted by ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) (ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) audit). The financial statements comprise the statements of net assets available for benefits as of June 30, 2024 and 2023, and the related statement of changes in net assets available for benefits for the year then ended, and the related notes to the financial statements.

Management, having determined it is permissible in the circumstances, has elected to have the audits of Stonehill Franciscan Services 401(k) Retirement Plan's financial statements performed in accordance with ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) pursuant to 29 CFR 2520.103-8 of the Department of Labor's (DOL) Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA. Opinion

- the information in the accompanying financial statements related to assets held by and certified to by a qualified institution agrees to, or is derived from, in all material respects, the information prepared and certified by an institution that management determined meets the requirements of ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C).

Basis for Opinion

We conducted our audits in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America (GAAS). Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements section of our report. We are required to be independent of Stonehill Franciscan Services 401(k) Retirement Plan and to meet our other ethical responsibilities, in accordance with the relevant ethical requirements relating to our audits. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) audit opinion.

Responsibilities of Management for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America, and for the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error. Management's election of the ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) audit does not affect management's responsibility for the financial statements.

In preparing the financial statements, management is required to evaluate whether there are conditions or events, considered in the aggregate, that raise substantial doubt about Stonehill Franciscan Services 401(k) Retirement Plan's ability to continue as a going concern for one year after the date that the financial statements are available to be issued.

Note 1 - Description of Plan

The following brief description of the Stonehill Franciscan Services 401(k) Retirement Plan (Plan) is provided for general information purposes only. Participants should refer to the Plan Document for a more complete description of the Plan's provisions.

General

The Plan is a defined contribution plan covering qualified employees of Stonehill Franciscan Services, Inc. (Organization). Sisters of St. Francis are excluded from all contributions. The Plan is subject to the provisions of the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (ERISA).

The Finance Committee determines the appropriateness of the Plan's investment offerings, and monitors investment performance.

Eligibility

Employees are eligible to participate in the Plan if they have completed 30 days of service and are 21 years of age. Employees are eligible to receive employer contributions when they have completed 12 months of service and are 21 years of age. In order to share in the employer contribution an employee must be employed on the last day of the Plan year and complete 1,000 hours of service during the Plan year.

Entry Date

Employees may enter the Plan on the first day of the month coinciding with or following the date they satisfy the Plan's eligibility requirements.

Contributions

Each year, participants may contribute an amount each pay period of their pretax annual compensation, as defined in the Plan Document. Contributions are subject to certain Internal Revenue Code (IRC) limitations. Participants who have attained age 50 before the end of the Plan year are eligible to make catch-up contributions. The Plan allows participants to designate contributions as Roth 401(k) contributions. Participants may also contribute amounts representing distributions from other qualified plans (rollovers). The Organization makes discretionary matching contributions to the Plan. The Organization contributed 50% of the first 6% of base compensation that a participant contributed to the Plan for the year ended June 30, 2024.

The Plan includes an auto-enrollment provision whereby all existing employees who were eligible on or after July 1, 2017, are automatically enrolled in the Plan unless they affirmatively elect not to participate in the Plan. Automatically enrolled participants have their deferral rate set at 3% of eligible compensation and their contributions invested in a designated ATDynamic Fund (based on the participants date of birth) until changed by the participant. The deferral rate will increase by 1% each plan year until the amount withheld from the employee's paycheck reaches 8% of compensation unless a contrary election is made.

Participant Accounts

Each participant's account is credited with the participant's contributions and the Organization's matching contributions, as well as an allocation of Plan earnings. Participant accounts are charged with an allocation of administrative expenses that are paid by the Plan. Allocations are based on participant's earnings, account balances or specific transactions, as defined by the Plan Document. The benefit to which a participant is entitled is the benefit that can be provided from the participant's vested account.

Investment Options

Upon enrollment to the Plan, a participant may direct deferrals and employer contributions in any of the funds offered by the Plan. Participants may change their investment options daily.

Vesting

Participants are vested immediately in their contributions, plus actual earnings thereon. Vesting in the Organization's contribution portion of their accounts is based on years of continuous service as set forth in the following table:

Forfeitures

At June 30, 2024 and 2023, forfeited non-vested accounts totaled \$14,502 and \$9,717, respectively. These accounts will be used to pay future Plan expenses or reduce employer contributions. During the year ended June 30, 2024, no forfeited non-vested accounts were used.

Notes Receivable from Participants

Participants may borrow from their fund accounts, a minimum of \$1,000 up to a maximum equal to the lesser of \$50,000 or 50% of their vested account balance less any Roth 401(k) deferrals. The notes are secured by the balance in the participant's account. The loan interest rate is set at 1% above the Wall Street Journal prime rate. Principal and interest is paid ratably through payroll deductions over a period not to exceed five years, unless the proceeds of the note were used to acquire the participant's residence, in which case the loan terms can range up to 15 years. Direct payments outside payroll deductions from participants to the trustee are also allowed. A participant may have no more than one outstanding note at any one time.

Payment of Benefits

Participants may elect to receive either a lump-sum amount equal to the value of their vested interest or installments as defined in the Plan Document upon retirement, termination of service, death or disability. A terminated employee with a balance of less than \$5,000 may be automatically paid out by the Plan if their balance is rolled into a qualified Individual Retirement Account. Distributions may be made at the participant's election prior to termination upon attainment of age 59½ or hardship as defined by the Plan Document.

Plan Termination

Although it has not expressed any intent to do so, the Organization has the right under the Plan to discontinue its contributions at any time and to terminate the Plan subject to the provisions set forth in ERISA. In the event of Plan termination, participants would become 100% vested in their employer contributions.

Note 2 - Significant Accounting Policies

Basis of Accounting

The financial statements of the Plan are prepared on the accrual basis of accounting.

Use of Estimates

The preparation of the financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect certain reported amounts of assets and liabilities and changes therein, and disclosures of contingent assets and liabilities. Actual results may differ from those estimates.

Investment Valuation and Income Recognition

The Plan's investments are reported at fair value. Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. See Note 3 for discussion of fair value measurements.

Purchases and sales of securities are recorded on a trade-date basis. Dividends are recorded on the ex-dividend date. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Net appreciation includes the Plan's gains and losses on investments bought and sold as well as those held during the year.

The classification of investment earnings reported in the statement of changes in net assets available for benefits may differ from the classification of earnings on Form 5500 due to different reporting requirements on Form 5500.

Contributions

Participant contributions and the related employer contributions are recorded in the year in which the employee contributions are withheld from compensation.

Notes Receivable from Participants

Notes receivable from participants are measured at their unpaid principal balance plus any accrued but unpaid interest. Related fees are recorded as administrative expenses and are expensed when they are incurred. Delinquent notes receivables are reclassified as distributions based upon the terms of the Plan Document.

Payments of Benefits

Benefit payments to participants are recorded upon distribution.

Expenses

The Plan's expenses are paid by either by the Plan or the Organization, as provided by the Plan Document. Expenses that are paid directly by the Organization are excluded from these financial statements. Certain expenses incurred in connection with the general administration of the Plan that are paid by the Plan are recorded as deductions in the accompanying statement of changes in net assets available for benefits. In addition, certain investment related expenses are included in net appreciation of fair value of investments presented in the accompanying statement of changes in net assets available for benefits.

Subsequent Events

The Organization has evaluated subsequent events through March 25, 2025, the date which the financial statements were available to be issued.

Note 3 - Fair Value Measurements

The framework for measuring fair value provides a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. The hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (Level 1) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (Level 3). The three levels of the fair value hierarchy under FASB ASC 820 are described as follows:

Level 1 – Inputs to the valuation methodology are unadjusted quoted prices for identical assets or liabilities in active markets that the Plan has the ability to access.

Level 2 – Inputs to the valuation methodology include:

- Quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities in active markets;
- Quoted prices for identical or similar assets or liabilities in inactive markets;
- Inputs other than quoted prices that are observable for the asset or liability;
- Inputs that are derived principally from or corroborated by observable market data by correlation or other means.

If the asset or liability has a specified (contractual) term, the Level 2 input must be observable for substantially the full term of the asset or liability.

Level 3 – Inputs to the valuation methodology are unobservable and significant to the fair value measurement.

The asset's or liability's fair value measurement level within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of any input that is significant to the fair value measurement. Valuation techniques used need to maximize the use of observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs.

The following is a description of the valuation methodologies used for assets measured at fair value. There have been no changes in the methodologies used at June 30, 2024 and 2023.

Mutual funds – Valued at the daily closing price as reported by the fund. Mutual funds held by the Plan are open-ended mutual funds that are registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission. These funds are required to publish their daily net asset value (NAV) and to transact at that price. The mutual funds held by the plan are deemed to be actively traded.

Common collective trusts – Valued at fair value based on the NAV of units held of the collective fund. The NAV, as provided by the trustee is used as a practical expedient to estimate fair value. The NAV is based on the observable market prices of the underlying investments within the fund less liabilities. This practical expedient is not used when it is determined to be probable that the fund will sell the investment for an amount different than the reported NAV.

The AT Stable Value II - ZZ Fund's objective is to preserve principal value while providing current income. The Fund primarily invests in a portfolio of Guaranteed Interest Contracts issued by high quality financial institutions to help provide stability of principal and a smooth credited rate of interest. The Fund may also hold Insurance Company Separate Accounts, cash or cash equivalents, bonds and shares or units in stable value and/or bond collective trust funds.

The American Trust Stable Value Fund's objective is to generate a rate of return higher than money market funds while minimizing fluctuation in the value of the assets managed. Investments currently utilized to achieve this goal are FDIC insured bank certificates of deposit and guaranteed investment contract funds backed by the assets of the issuing insurance companies.

The ATDynamic Conservative Fund's objective is to provide current income, with long-term capital growth as a secondary objective. The fund invests the majority of funds in fixed income assets with a minority of the assets in equities. It is designed for investors who have low risk tolerance and have a short-term time horizon with liquidity requirements.

The ATDynamic Moderately Conservative Fund's objective is to provide a balance between current income and capital growth, with current income as its primary objective. The fund invests a modest majority of funds in fixed income investments and the remainder in equities. It is designed for investors who have a moderate to low risk tolerance and have a short-term to moderate-term time horizon with minimal liquidity requirements.

The ATDynamic Moderate Fund's objective is to provide a balance between capital growth and current income, with capital growth as its primary objective. The fund invests a modest majority of the assets in equity investments and the remainder in fixed income. It is designed for investors who have a moderate risk tolerance and have a moderate time horizon with minimal liquidity requirements.

The ATDynamic Moderately Aggressive Fund's objective is to provide long-term capital growth, with current income as a secondary objective. The fund invests the majority of the funds in equity investments with a minority of the funds in fixed income. It is designed for investors who have a high-risk tolerance and have a long-term time horizon with little to no liquidity requirements.

The ATDynamic Aggressive Fund's objective is to provide aggressive long-term capital growth. The fund invests all of the funds primarily in equity investments, with a small portion in fixed income. It is designed for investors who have a significantly high-risk tolerance and have a long-term time horizon with no liquidity requirements.

Note 4 - Certified Information

Certain information related to investments and notes receivable from participants disclosed in the accompanying financial statements and ERISA-required supplemental information, including investments and notes receivable from participants held at June 30, 2024 and 2023, and net appreciation in fair value of investments, interest and dividends, and interest income on notes receivable from participants for the year ended June 30, 2024, was obtained by management and agreed to or derived from information certified as complete and accurate by American Trust Company (the trustee and custodian of the Plan).

Note 5 - Tax Status

The Plan uses a pre-approved plan document sponsored by AT Retirement Services, LLC, which received an advisory letter from the Internal Revenue Service (IRS), dated June 30, 2020, stating that the pre-approved document satisfies the applicable provisions of the IRC. The Plan itself has not received a determination letter from the IRS. The document has been amended since receiving the opinion letter, however the Organization and Plan Management believe that the Plan is currently designed and operated in compliance with the applicable requirements of the IRC.

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require Plan management to evaluate tax positions taken by the Plan and recognize a tax liability (or asset) if the Plan has taken an uncertain tax position that more likely than not would not be sustained upon examination by the IRS. The Plan is subject to routine audits by taxing jurisdictions; however, there are currently no audits for any tax periods in progress.

Note 6 - Related Party and Party-in-Interest Transactions

Certain Plan investments are shares of common collective trusts managed by American Trust Retirement a division of American Trust Company, the trustee and custodian as defined by the Plan. As described in Note 2, the Plan paid certain expenses related to Plan operations and investment activity to various service providers. These transactions are exempt party-in-interest transactions under ERISA.

Note 7 - Risks and Uncertainties

The Plan invests in various investment securities. Investment securities are exposed to various risks such as interest rate, market, and credit risks. Market risks include global events which could impact the value of investment securities, such as a pandemic or international conflict. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investment securities, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in the values of investment securities will occur in the near term and that such changes could materially affect participants' account balances and the amounts reported in the statements of net assets available for benefits.

Management is also responsible for maintaining a current plan instrument, including all plan amendments, administering the plan, and determining that the plan's transactions that are presented and disclosed in the financial statements are in conformity with the plan's provisions, including maintaining sufficient records with respect to each of the participants, to determine the benefits due or which may become due to such participants.

Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements

Except as described in the Scope and Nature of the ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) Audit section of our report, our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance but is not absolute assurance and therefore is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with GAAS will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control. Misstatements are considered material if there is a substantial likelihood that, individually or in the aggregate, they would influence the judgment made by a reasonable user based on the financial statements.

In performing an audit in accordance with GAAS, we:

- Exercise professional judgment and maintain professional skepticism throughout the audit.
- Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error, and design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks. Such procedures include examining, on a test basis, evidence regarding the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements.
- Obtain an understanding of internal control relevant to the audit in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of Stonehill Franciscan Services 401(k) Retirement Plan's internal control. Accordingly, no such opinion is expressed.
- Evaluate the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluate the overall presentation of the financial statements.
- Conclude whether, in our judgment, there are conditions or events, considered in the aggregate, that raise substantial doubt about Stonehill Franciscan Services 401(k) Retirement Plan's ability to continue as a going concern for a reasonable period of time.

Our audits did not extend to the certified investment information, except for obtaining and reading the certification, comparing the certified investment information with the related information presented and disclosed in the financial statements, and reading the disclosures relating to the certified investment information to assess whether they are in accordance with the presentation and disclosure requirements of accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Accordingly, the objective of an ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) audit is not to express an opinion about whether the financial statements as a whole are presented fairly, in all material respects, in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

We are required to communicate with those charged with governance regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit, significant audit findings, and certain internal control-related matters that we identified during the audit.

Other Matters - Supplemental Schedule Required by ERISA

The supplemental schedule H, line 4i-schedule of assets held at end of year as of June 30, 2024, is presented for purposes of additional analysis and is not a required part of the financial statements but is supplementary information required by the DOL's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA. Such information is the responsibility of management and was derived from and relates directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements. The information included in the supplemental schedule, other than that agreed to or derived from the certified investment information, has been subjected to auditing procedures applied in the audit of the financial statements and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements or to the financial statements themselves, and other additional procedures in accordance with GAAS. For information included in the supplemental schedule that agreed to or is derived from the certified investment information, we compared such information to the related certified investment information.

In forming our opinion on the supplemental schedule, we evaluated whether the supplemental schedule, other than the information agreed to or derived from the certified investment information, including its form and content, is presented in conformity with the DOL's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA.

In our opinion:

- the form and content of the supplemental schedule, other than the information in the supplemental schedule that agreed to or is derived from the certified investment information, is presented, in all material respects, in conformity with the DOL's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA.
- the information in the supplemental schedule related to assets held by and certified to by a qualified institution agrees to, or is derived from, in all material respects, the information prepared and certified by an institution that management determined meets the requirements of ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C).

Note 1 - Description of Plan

The following brief description of the Stonehill Franciscan Services 401(k) Retirement Plan (Plan) is provided for general information purposes only. Participants should refer to the Plan Document for a more complete description of the Plan's provisions.

General

The Plan is a defined contribution plan covering qualified employees of Stonehill Franciscan Services, Inc. (Organization). Sisters of St. Francis are excluded from all contributions. The Plan is subject to the provisions of the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (ERISA).

The Finance Committee determines the appropriateness of the Plan's investment offerings, and monitors investment performance.

Eligibility

Employees are eligible to participate in the Plan if they have completed 30 days of service and are 21 years of age. Employees are eligible to receive employer contributions when they have completed 12 months of service and are 21 years of age. In order to share in the employer contribution an employee must be employed on the last day of the Plan year and complete 1,000 hours of service during the Plan year.

Entry Date

Employees may enter the Plan on the first day of the month coinciding with or following the date they satisfy the Plan's eligibility requirements.

Contributions

Each year, participants may contribute an amount each pay period of their pretax annual compensation, as defined in the Plan Document. Contributions are subject to certain Internal Revenue Code (IRC) limitations. Participants who have attained age 50 before the end of the Plan year are eligible to make catch-up contributions. The Plan allows participants to designate contributions as Roth 401(k) contributions. Participants may also contribute amounts representing distributions from other qualified plans (rollovers). The Organization makes discretionary matching contributions to the Plan. The Organization contributed 50% of the first 6% of base compensation that a participant contributed to the Plan for the year ended June 30, 2024.

The Plan includes an auto-enrollment provision whereby all existing employees who were eligible on or after July 1, 2017, are automatically enrolled in the Plan unless they affirmatively elect not to participate in the Plan. Automatically enrolled participants have their deferral rate set at 3% of eligible compensation and their contributions invested in a designated ATDynamic Fund (based on the participants date of birth) until changed by the participant. The deferral rate will increase by 1% each plan year until the amount withheld from the employee's paycheck reaches 8% of compensation unless a contrary election is made.

Participant Accounts

Each participant's account is credited with the participant's contributions and the Organization's matching contributions, as well as an allocation of Plan earnings. Participant accounts are charged with an allocation of administrative expenses that are paid by the Plan. Allocations are based on participant's earnings, account balances or specific transactions, as defined by the Plan Document. The benefit to which a participant is entitled is the benefit that can be provided from the participant's vested account.

Investment Options

Upon enrollment to the Plan, a participant may direct deferrals and employer contributions in any of the funds offered by the Plan. Participants may change their investment options daily.

Vesting

Participants are vested immediately in their contributions, plus actual earnings thereon. Vesting in the Organization's contribution portion of their accounts is based on years of continuous service as set forth in the following table:

Forfeitures

At June 30, 2024 and 2023, forfeited non-vested accounts totaled \$14,502 and \$9,717, respectively. These accounts will be used to pay future Plan expenses or reduce employer contributions. During the year ended June 30, 2024, no forfeited non-vested accounts were used.

Notes Receivable from Participants

Participants may borrow from their fund accounts, a minimum of \$1,000 up to a maximum equal to the lesser of \$50,000 or 50% of their vested account balance less any Roth 401(k) deferrals. The notes are secured by the balance in the participant's account. The loan interest rate is set at 1% above the Wall Street Journal prime rate. Principal and interest is paid ratably through payroll deductions over a period not to exceed five years, unless the proceeds of the note were used to acquire the participant's residence, in which case the loan terms can range up to 15 years. Direct payments outside payroll deductions from participants to the trustee are also allowed. A participant may have no more than one outstanding note at any one time.

Payment of Benefits

Participants may elect to receive either a lump-sum amount equal to the value of their vested interest or installments as defined in the Plan Document upon retirement, termination of service, death or disability. A terminated employee with a balance of less than \$5,000 may be automatically paid out by the Plan if their balance is rolled into a qualified Individual Retirement Account. Distributions may be made at the participant's election prior to termination upon attainment of age 59½ or hardship as defined by the Plan Document.

Plan Termination

Although it has not expressed any intent to do so, the Organization has the right under the Plan to discontinue its contributions at any time and to terminate the Plan subject to the provisions set forth in ERISA. In the event of Plan termination, participants would become 100% vested in their employer contributions.

Note 2 - Significant Accounting Policies

Basis of Accounting

The financial statements of the Plan are prepared on the accrual basis of accounting.

Use of Estimates

The preparation of the financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect certain reported amounts of assets and liabilities and changes therein, and disclosures of contingent assets and liabilities. Actual results may differ from those estimates.

Investment Valuation and Income Recognition

The Plan's investments are reported at fair value. Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. See Note 3 for discussion of fair value measurements.

Purchases and sales of securities are recorded on a trade-date basis. Dividends are recorded on the ex-dividend date. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Net appreciation includes the Plan's gains and losses on investments bought and sold as well as those held during the year.

The classification of investment earnings reported in the statement of changes in net assets available for benefits may differ from the classification of earnings on Form 5500 due to different reporting requirements on Form 5500.

Contributions

Participant contributions and the related employer contributions are recorded in the year in which the employee contributions are withheld from compensation.

Notes Receivable from Participants

Notes receivable from participants are measured at their unpaid principal balance plus any accrued but unpaid interest. Related fees are recorded as administrative expenses and are expensed when they are incurred. Delinquent notes receivables are reclassified as distributions based upon the terms of the Plan Document.

Payments of Benefits

Benefit payments to participants are recorded upon distribution.

Expenses

The Plan's expenses are paid by either by the Plan or the Organization, as provided by the Plan Document. Expenses that are paid directly by the Organization are excluded from these financial statements. Certain expenses incurred in connection with the general administration of the Plan that are paid by the Plan are recorded as deductions in the accompanying statement of changes in net assets available for benefits. In addition, certain investment related expenses are included in net appreciation of fair value of investments presented in the accompanying statement of changes in net assets available for benefits.

Subsequent Events

The Organization has evaluated subsequent events through March 25, 2025, the date which the financial statements were available to be issued.

Note 3 - Fair Value Measurements

The framework for measuring fair value provides a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. The hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (Level 1) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (Level 3). The three levels of the fair value hierarchy under FASB ASC 820 are described as follows:

Level 1 – Inputs to the valuation methodology are unadjusted quoted prices for identical assets or liabilities in active markets that the Plan has the ability to access.

Level 2 – Inputs to the valuation methodology include:

- Quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities in active markets;
- Quoted prices for identical or similar assets or liabilities in inactive markets;
- Inputs other than quoted prices that are observable for the asset or liability;
- Inputs that are derived principally from or corroborated by observable market data by correlation or other means.

If the asset or liability has a specified (contractual) term, the Level 2 input must be observable for substantially the full term of the asset or liability.

Level 3 – Inputs to the valuation methodology are unobservable and significant to the fair value measurement.

The asset's or liability's fair value measurement level within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of any input that is significant to the fair value measurement. Valuation techniques used need to maximize the use of observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs.

The following is a description of the valuation methodologies used for assets measured at fair value. There have been no changes in the methodologies used at June 30, 2024 and 2023.

Mutual funds – Valued at the daily closing price as reported by the fund. Mutual funds held by the Plan are open-ended mutual funds that are registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission. These funds are required to publish their daily net asset value (NAV) and to transact at that price. The mutual funds held by the plan are deemed to be actively traded.

Common collective trusts – Valued at fair value based on the NAV of units held of the collective fund. The NAV, as provided by the trustee is used as a practical expedient to estimate fair value. The NAV is based on the observable market prices of the underlying investments within the fund less liabilities. This practical expedient is not used when it is determined to be probable that the fund will sell the investment for an amount different than the reported NAV.

The AT Stable Value II - ZZ Fund's objective is to preserve principal value while providing current income. The Fund primarily invests in a portfolio of Guaranteed Interest Contracts issued by high quality financial institutions to help provide stability of principal and a smooth credited rate of interest. The Fund may also hold Insurance Company Separate Accounts, cash or cash equivalents, bonds and shares or units in stable value and/or bond collective trust funds.

The American Trust Stable Value Fund's objective is to generate a rate of return higher than money market funds while minimizing fluctuation in the value of the assets managed. Investments currently utilized to achieve this goal are FDIC insured bank certificates of deposit and guaranteed investment contract funds backed by the assets of the issuing insurance companies.

The ATDynamic Conservative Fund's objective is to provide current income, with long-term capital growth as a secondary objective. The fund invests the majority of funds in fixed income assets with a minority of the assets in equities. It is designed for investors who have low risk tolerance and have a short-term time horizon with liquidity requirements.

The ATDynamic Moderately Conservative Fund's objective is to provide a balance between current income and capital growth, with current income as its primary objective. The fund invests a modest majority of funds in fixed income investments and the remainder in equities. It is designed for investors who have a moderate to low risk tolerance and have a short-term to moderate-term time horizon with minimal liquidity requirements.

The ATDynamic Moderate Fund's objective is to provide a balance between capital growth and current income, with capital growth as its primary objective. The fund invests a modest majority of the assets in equity investments and the remainder in fixed income. It is designed for investors who have a moderate risk tolerance and have a moderate time horizon with minimal liquidity requirements.

The ATDynamic Moderately Aggressive Fund's objective is to provide long-term capital growth, with current income as a secondary objective. The fund invests the majority of the funds in equity investments with a minority of the funds in fixed income. It is designed for investors who have a high-risk tolerance and have a long-term time horizon with little to no liquidity requirements.

The ATDynamic Aggressive Fund's objective is to provide aggressive long-term capital growth. The fund invests all of the funds primarily in equity investments, with a small portion in fixed income. It is designed for investors who have a significantly high-risk tolerance and have a long-term time horizon with no liquidity requirements.

Note 4 - Certified Information

Certain information related to investments and notes receivable from participants disclosed in the accompanying financial statements and ERISA-required supplemental information, including investments and notes receivable from participants held at June 30, 2024 and 2023, and net appreciation in fair value of investments, interest and dividends, and interest income on notes receivable from participants for the year ended June 30, 2024, was obtained by management and agreed to or derived from information certified as complete and accurate by American Trust Company (the trustee and custodian of the Plan).

Note 5 - Tax Status

The Plan uses a pre-approved plan document sponsored by AT Retirement Services, LLC, which received an advisory letter from the Internal Revenue Service (IRS), dated June 30, 2020, stating that the pre-approved document satisfies the applicable provisions of the IRC. The Plan itself has not received a determination letter from the IRS. The document has been amended since receiving the opinion letter, however the Organization and Plan Management believe that the Plan is currently designed and operated in compliance with the applicable requirements of the IRC.

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require Plan management to evaluate tax positions taken by the Plan and recognize a tax liability (or asset) if the Plan has taken an uncertain tax position that more likely than not would not be sustained upon examination by the IRS. The Plan is subject to routine audits by taxing jurisdictions; however, there are currently no audits for any tax periods in progress.

Note 6 - Related Party and Party-in-Interest Transactions

Certain Plan investments are shares of common collective trusts managed by American Trust Retirement a division of American Trust Company, the trustee and custodian as defined by the Plan. As described in Note 2, the Plan paid certain expenses related to Plan operations and investment activity to various service providers. These transactions are exempt party-in-interest transactions under ERISA.

Note 7 - Risks and Uncertainties

The Plan invests in various investment securities. Investment securities are exposed to various risks such as interest rate, market, and credit risks. Market risks include global events which could impact the value of investment securities, such as a pandemic or international conflict. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investment securities, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in the values of investment securities will occur in the near term and that such changes could materially affect participants' account balances and the amounts reported in the statements of net assets available for benefits.
