Scope and Nature of the ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) Audits

We have performed audits of the accompanying financial statements of Tarbut V'Torah 403(b) Plan, an employee benefit plan subject to the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (ERISA), as permitted by ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) ("ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) audit"). The financial statements comprise the statements of net assets available for benefits as of June 30, 2024 and 2023, and the related statement of changes in net assets available for benefits for the year ended June 30, 2024, and the related notes to the financial statements.

Management, having determined it is permissible in the circumstances, has elected to have the audits of Tarbut V'Torah 403(b) Plan's financial statements performed in accordance with ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) pursuant to 29 CFR 2520.103-8 of the Department of Labor's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA. As permitted by ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C), our audits need not extend to any statements or information related to assets held for investment of the plan (investment information) by a bank or similar institution or insurance carrier that is regulated, supervised, and subject to periodic examination by a state or federal agency, provided that the statements or information regarding assets so held are prepared and certified to by the bank or similar institution or insurance carrier in accordance with 29 CFR 2520.103-5 of the Department of Labor's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA (qualified institution).

Such information is the responsibility of management and was derived from and relates directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements. The information included in the supplemental schedules, other than that agreed to or derived from the certified investment information, has been subjected to auditing procedures applied in the audits of the financial statements and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements or to the financial statements themselves, and other additional procedures in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards. For information included in the supplemental schedules that agreed to or is derived from the certified investment information, we compared such information to the related certified investment information.

1. DESCRIPTION OF THE PLAN

The following description of the Tarbut V'Torah 403(b) Plan (the "Plan") provides only general information. Participants should refer to the plan document for a more complete description of the Plan's provisions.

General

The Plan, a defined contribution savings plan sponsored by Tarbut V'Torah Community Day School, Naomi Gelman Weiss Memorial (the "School" or "Employer") pursuant to Section 403(b) and related provisions of the Internal Revenue Code (IRC), was established effective September 1, 1999, and most recently amended effective July 12, 2022. The Plan is designed to provide participants with a means to defer a portion of their compensation for retirement and to provide benefits in the event of disability, death, termination of employment, military active duty call-up, or financial hardship. The Plan covers all eligible employees of the School upon employment and is subject to the provisions of the Department of Labor's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (ERISA).

An expansion of Setting Every Community Up for Retirement Enhancement Act of 2019 ("SECURE 2.0") was signed into law on December 29, 2022, as part of the Consolidated Appropriations Act of 2023. The effective dates of provisions within SECURE 2.0 vary through 2026. The Plan Sponsor has until the end of the first Plan year beginning on or after January 1, 2026, to amend the Plan for the changes related to SECURE 2.0. The Plan has not been formally amended to adopt these provisions as of June 30, 2024.

Plan administration

The School is the administrator of the Plan and, as such, carries out the duties imposed by ERISA. The School has delegated certain responsibilities for the operation and administration of the Plan. Teachers Insurance and Annuity Association of America (TIAA) and College Retirement Equities Fund (CREF), and as agent for TIAA, FSB from July 1, 2022 to July 14, 2023, and thereafter TIAA Trust, N.A, (collectively, the "Custodians") are responsible for the custody and management of the Plan's assets and an affiliate of the Custodians is responsible for maintaining participant accounts and transactions related to participant initiated activity.

Eligibility

All employees are eligible to make elective deferrals beginning on their first day of employment. Participants who normally work 20 or more hours per week and have completed a minimum of 1,000 hours of service during the Plan year may receive Employer nonelective contributions.

Participant accounts

Each participant's account is credited with the participant's contributions or rollovers and allocations of School contributions, if any, and investment earnings, and charged with an allocation of investment losses and administrative expenses not paid directly by the School. Allocations of investment earnings are based strictly on the participant's selection of investments and timing of purchases. Other allocations are based on participant earnings or account balances, as defined by the Plan. The benefit to which a participant is entitled is the benefit that can be provided from the participant's vested account balance.

Contributions

Participants may elect to contribute through payroll deduction amounts up to 100% of their annual compensation, as defined by the plan document, on a tax-deferred or after-tax basis (as Roth contributions), up to a maximum amount allowed by the IRC. Participants who have attained age 50 before the end of the Plan year are eligible to make catch-up contributions. Participants may also contribute amounts representing distributions from other qualified employer-sponsored retirement plans (rollovers). Participants direct the investment of all their contributions into various investment options offered by the Plan.

The School makes an annual discretionary nonelective contribution equal to a percentage of each qualifying participant's compensation. The Employer nonelective contribution was 7.0% of qualifying participant compensation for the year ended June 30, 2024.

Vesting

Participants are vested immediately in their voluntary contributions, plus actual earnings thereon. Participants become fully vested in Employer contributions, plus actual earnings thereon, upon completion of two years of service based upon a cliff vesting schedule. Participants become 100% vested in Employer contributions if termination occurs due to death or full permanent disability.

Forfeited accounts

If a participant terminates employment with the School prior to becoming fully vested, the unvested portion of the Employer contributions and earnings thereon are forfeited. Forfeited accounts totaled \$8,645 and \$43,755 as of June 30, 2024 and 2023, respectively. Forfeited accounts may be used to reduce Employer contributions or pay Plan expenses. Forfeitures of \$43,755 were used to reduce Employer contributions for the Plan year ended June 30, 2024.

Notes receivable

Participants may borrow against their accounts a minimum of \$1,000 up to a maximum equal to the lesser of \$50,000 or 50% of their vested account balance. Notes receivable terms are generally five years or less, but may exceed five years if the purpose of the loan is to purchase a principal residence. The notes receivable are secured by the remaining balance in the participant's account and bear a reasonable rate of interest determined by the Plan administrator at origination. The notes receivable bear an interest rate of 4.25% to 8.75%, and mature at various dates through March 2032, as of June 30, 2024.

Plan loans

Plan loans, which were no longer offered as of December 31, 2019, were available to participants through TIAA, subject to certain limitations. Plan loans were issued directly from funds owned by TIAA, and loan proceeds were not deducted from a participant's account balance. However, a portion of a participant's TIAA Traditional Annuity account balance is reserved, or held as collateral, to cover the outstanding loan amount for the period of time the loan is outstanding. Plan loans could not exceed the present value of the participant's Voluntary Participant Plan Contributions, and there was no limit to the number of Plan loans a participant may have outstanding at any time. For active loans, investments equal to 110% of the outstanding loan amount are included in the investments within the statements of net assets available for benefits and serve as a collateral for the loan. As of June 30, 2024 and 2023, there were no Plan loans in default.

The loan interest rate on these Plan loans may be fixed or variable and the initial rate is determined by the terms of the controlling contract, as are the rate adjustment details and frequency. For loans that have collateral held in a Group Supplemental Retirement Annuity (GSRA) contract, principal repayments increase the amount of the TIAA Traditional Annuity funds available for the participant's use. For all Plan loans, interest is paid directly to TIAA, and Plan loans are not reflected in the statements of net assets available for benefits. As of June 30, 2024 and 2023, outstanding Plan loan balances due to TIAA were \$0 and 1,321, respectively.

Payment of benefits

Distributions and withdrawals are payable to participants upon retirement, termination, attainment of age 59 ½, financial hardship, being called to active military duty, disability, or death. If the terminated participant's total vested accrued benefit is equal to or less than \$1,000, the Plan may distribute the account to the participant in a lump sum payment without the participant's consent. If the terminated participant's total vested accrued benefit is greater than \$1,000 and less than or equal to \$5,000, the Plan may distribute the account to the participant by rolling the amount over into an individual retirement account designated by the plan administrator without the participant's consent. Participants with a total vested accrued benefit of greater than \$5,000, may also elect to receive a lump-sum amount equal to the value of the participant's vested interest in his or her account, partial payment, installment payment, or annuity contract.

Hardship and qualified reservist distributions are permitted under limited circumstances if approved by the plan administrator.

Administrative expenses and investment fees

Certain administrative expenses of the Plan, including record-keeping and audit fees, were paid by the School for the year ended June 30, 2024. Investment fees, which may vary according to the individual funds selected, are paid indirectly out of the assets of the Plan and impact Plan earnings.

Participants may be charged for some or all of the costs and expenses of operating the Plan. Such expenses include, but are not limited to investment expenses and costs to process distributions and domestic relations orders. Generally, the School pays for administrative expenses of the Plan.

2. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of accounting and financial statement presentation

The financial statements of the Plan are prepared on the accrual basis of accounting in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America (U.S. GAAP).

Use of estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with U.S. GAAP requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities, and changes therein, and disclosure of contingent liabilities. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Risks and uncertainties

The Plan invests in various investment securities. Investment securities are exposed to various risks such as interest rate, market, and credit risks. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investment securities, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in the values of investment securities will occur in the near-term and that such changes could materially affect participants' account balances and the amounts reported in the statements of net assets available for benefits and changes therein.

Investment valuation and income recognition

The Plan's investments are reported at fair value, except for fully benefit-responsive investment contracts, which are reported at contract value. The Custodians certify the value of all investments.

Investment valuation and income recognition (continued)

Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. See Note 4 for a description of fair value measurements.

Contract value is the relevant measurement for assets invested in fully benefit-responsive investment contracts because contract value is the amount participants normally receive if they were to initiate permitted transactions under the terms of the Plan. See Note 5 for discussion of the Plan's fully benefit-responsive investment contracts.

Purchases and sales of securities are recorded on a trade-date basis. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Dividends are recorded on the ex-dividend date. Net appreciation includes the Plan's gains and losses on investments bought and sold, as well as held, during the year.

Contributions and contributions receivable

Contributions from participants are recorded based on the date the contributions have been separated from a participant's pay by the School, which is the pay date. Employer contributions are recorded in the year they are earned and to coincide with the year in which the School records the contribution in its general ledger. The Plan records receivables for contributions based upon the contributions recognized, less amounts received by the Plan as of the last day of the Plan year.

Contributions representing participant rollovers from other qualified defined benefit or defined contribution plans are recorded when received by the Custodian.

Notes receivable from participants

Notes receivable are carried and presented at their unpaid balance plus any accrued but unpaid interest. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. If a participant ceases to make repayments and the plan administrator deems the participant note to be a distribution, the note receivable balance is reduced, and a benefit payment is recorded. No allowance for credit losses has been recorded as of June 30, 2024 and 2023.

Payment of benefits

Benefit payments are recorded when paid.

Administrative expenses

Expenses are recorded when incurred.

Subsequent events

The Plan has evaluated subsequent events through April 14, 2025, the date the financial statements were available to be issued. There are no subsequent events which are material and would require recognition or disclosure in the financial statements.

3. INFORMATION PREPARED AND CERTIFIED BY THE CUSTODIANS (UNAUDITED)

The plan administrator, having determined it is permissible in the circumstances, has elected to have the audit of the Plan's financial statements performed in accordance with ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) pursuant to 29 CFR 2520.103-8 of ERISA. Accordingly, the Custodians, determined to be qualified institutions by the plan administrator, have certified to the completeness and accuracy of:

- Investments and notes receivable from participants reflected on the accompanying statements of net assets available for benefits as of June 30, 2024 and 2023;
- Net appreciation in fair value of investments, interest and dividends, and other income as shown on the accompanying statement of changes in net assets available for benefits for the year ended June 30, 2024; and,
- Investments and notes receivable from participants reflected on the schedule of assets (held at end of year) ("supplemental schedule") as of June 30, 2024.

Accordingly, as requested by the plan administrator, the Plan's independent auditor performed no procedures on the certified information other than to agree the certified information to the related information included in the financial statements and supplemental schedule.

4. FAIR VALUE MEASUREMENTS

Accounting standards establish a framework for measuring fair value. That framework provides a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. The hierarchy gives the highest priority to the unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (Level 1 measurements) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (Level 3 measurements).

The fair value hierarchy consists of three levels of inputs that may be used to measure fair value as follows:

- *Level 1* - inputs to the valuation methodology are unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities that the Plan has the ability to access at the measurement date.

- *Level 2* - inputs to the valuation methodology include quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities in active markets; quoted prices for identical or similar assets or liabilities in inactive markets, inputs other than quoted prices that are observable for the asset or liability; and inputs that are derived principally from or corroborated by observable market data by correlation or other means. If the asset or liability has a specified (contractual) term, the Level 2 input must be observable for substantially the full term of the asset or liability; or
- *Level 3* - inputs to the valuation methodology are unobservable and significant to the fair value measurement of the assets or liabilities.

The asset's fair value measurement level within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of any input that is significant to the fair value measurement. Valuation techniques used need to maximize the use of observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs.

The following is a description of the valuation methodologies used for assets measured at fair value. There have been no changes to the methodologies used as of June 30, 2024 and 2023.

Mutual funds and pooled separate account: registered investment companies (mutual fund investments) are valued at the net asset value (NAV) of shares held by the Plan at year-end which are quoted in active markets. The investment in a pooled separate account consists of units containing real estate properties and real estate-related investments. Investments are valued using market quotations or prices obtained from independent pricing services utilized daily to calculate an accumulation unit value. The mutual funds and pooled separate account held by the Plan are deemed to be actively traded and have a readily-determinable fair value and are classified within Level 1 of the fair value hierarchy.

TIAA Variable Annuities consist of CREF Accounts and TIAA Access Accounts:

- CREF Accounts consist of eight investment portfolios: the Stock, Global Equities, Growth, Equity Index, Bond Market, Inflation Linked Bond, Social Choice and Money Market accounts. The fair values of accumulation units held by the Plan in CREF Accounts are primarily valued using market quotations or prices obtained from independent pricing sources. CREF Accounts are deemed actively traded. Data for values are available daily to plan administrators and client investors on TIAA's website, and provide sufficient corroborative evidence to ascertain the relationship between each fund's value and the values of individual underlying holdings. Underlying holdings include mutual funds and are primarily valued using market quotations or prices obtained from independent pricing sources. CREF Accounts are classified within level 1 of the fair value hierarchy.

- TIAA Access Accounts are variable annuity products that are funded through the TIAA Separate Account VA-3, a separate investment account of TIAA. VA-3 invests in proprietary and nonproprietary mutual funds through various sub-accounts. The fair values of sub-account units held by the Plan in TIAA Access Accounts are calculated daily by the issuer and the underlying investments are generally valued using market quotations obtained from independent pricing sources. Data for values are available daily to plan administrators and client investors on TIAA's website, and provide sufficient corroborative evidence to ascertain the relationship between each fund's value and the values of individual underlying holdings. TIAA Access Accounts are classified within level 1 of the fair value hierarchy.

Fixed Annuity Contracts - TIAA Traditional Annuities: The Plan's investments in the TIAA Traditional Annuities are reported by TIAA at contract value, which approximates fair value. As these investments are contract-based, observable prices for identical or similar investments do not exist and, accordingly, these investments are valued using unobservable inputs. TIAA Traditional Annuities are segregated into non-fully benefit-responsive and fully benefit-responsive categories. The Plan's investments in the non-fully benefit-responsive contracts are presented as level 3 fair value investments in the fair value hierarchy. For the year ending June 30, 2024, purchases of level 3 investments totaled \$61,633, sales of level 3 investments totaled \$104,603 and net interfund transfers into level 3 investments totaled \$40,463. The fully benefit-responsive contracts are not categorized within the fair value hierarchy as they are measured at contract value (Note 5).

The preceding methods described may produce a fair value calculation that may not be indicative of net realizable value or reflective of future fair values. Furthermore, although Plan management believes its valuation methods are appropriate and consistent with other market participants, the use of different methodologies or assumptions to determine the fair value of certain financial instruments could result in a different fair value measurement at the reporting date.

As of June 30, 2024 and 2023, there were no restrictions on redemptions or unfunded commitments for any of the major types of assets.

5. GUARANTEED ANNUITY CONTRACT WITH TIAA

The TIAA Traditional Annuity is a guaranteed fixed annuity contract available as an investment option to Plan participants. The TIAA Traditional Annuity is offered through a variety of contract types. The Plan invests in the Group Retirement Annuity (GRA), the Group Supplemental Retirement Annuity (GSRA), and Retirement Choice (RC) under the TIAA Traditional Annuity. The type of contract through which a participant invests in the TIAA Traditional Annuity determines the applicability of certain account features, such as the guaranteed minimum interest rate, additional interest declarations, the degree of liquidity of the participant's account and the options for receiving income upon retirement.

The GSRA is considered a fully benefit-responsive contract. The GRA and RC are considered non-fully benefit-responsive contracts.

The GSRA is fully and unconditionally guaranteed by TIAA, which meets the fully benefit-responsive investment contract criteria and therefore is reported at contract value. The contractual value of the GSRA totaled \$889,378 and \$972,660 as of June 30, 2024 and 2023, respectively. Contract value represents accumulated cash contributions made under the contract, plus interest credited to the contracts, less participant withdrawals and transfers. Participants may ordinarily direct the withdrawal or transfer of all or a portion of their investments at contract value.

5. GUARANTEED ANNUITY CONTRACT WITH TIAA (continued)

When participants choose to allocate a portion of their retirement savings to the TIAA Traditional Annuity during the accumulation phase of the contract, their contributions purchase a specific amount of lifetime income based on the contractual rate schedule in effect at the time the premium is paid. The participant's principal, plus a minimum specified rate of interest, is guaranteed by TIAA's claims-paying ability. The TIAA Traditional Annuity also provides the potential for additional interest if declared by TIAA's Board of Trustees. Additional interest when declared, remains in effect for the declaration year, which begins each March 1 for accumulating annuities and January 1 for lifetime payout annuities. Additional interest is not guaranteed for future years. Together, the guaranteed minimum and additional amounts make up the crediting interest rate. The crediting interest rate of the GSRA was 4.75% and 5.50% respectively as of June 30, 2024 and 2023. See Note 4 for the crediting interest rates for the contracts that are non-fully benefit-responsive.

When a participant's accumulation in the GSRA is converted to a lifetime payout annuity, the present value of the stream of payments is equal to the accumulated balance, and the entire amount is recorded as a distribution in the statement of changes in net assets available for benefits.

Certain events might limit the ability of the Plan to transact at contract value with TIAA. These events may be different under each contract. Examples of such events include the following: (1) the Plan's failure to qualify under Section 401(a) of the IRC or the failure to qualify for exemption from federal income taxes under Section 501(a) of the IRC; (2) premature termination of the contracts; (3) failure to meet any required or prohibited transaction exemption under ERISA; (4) certain amendments to the plan documents (including complete or partial Plan termination or merger with another plan); or (5) bankruptcy of the Plan Sponsor or other Plan Sponsor events that significantly affect the Plan's normal operations.

No events are probable of occurring that might limit the ability of the Plan to transact at contract value with the contract issuer or would limit the ability of the Plan to transact at contract value with participants.

6. RELATED PARTY AND PARTY-IN-INTEREST TRANSACTIONS

ERISA defines parties-in-interest similarly to related parties within financial accounting standards, except that ERISA's definition is broader and includes all entities and individuals that provide services to the Plan or similar items; however, these entities may not necessarily be related parties. Plan management did not identify any related parties to the Plan that were not also considered to be parties-in-interest. The Plan did not enter into any material related party transactions during the Plan year related to compensation arrangements, expense allowances, or similar items.

Parties-in-interest are defined by ERISA as any fiduciary of the Plan, any party rendering services to the Plan, the Employer and certain others. As such, transactions include those with fiduciaries or employees of the Plan, any person who provides services to the Plan, an employer whose employees are covered by the Plan, an employee organization whose members are covered by the Plan, and a person who owns 50% or more of such an employer or employee association or relatives of such persons. Certain fees and expenses of the Plan are paid by the School. The Plan is not required to repay expenses paid by the School on its behalf.

Certain fund level fees incurred by the funds in which the Plan invests for such services as investment management, shareholder services and sub-transfer agency fees are paid through fund level revenue sharing arrangements. These fees reduce fund earnings thereby impacting Plan revenue applied to participants' accounts. In cases where revenue sharing arrangements provide an amount in excess of the fees, the amount is credited to the Plan and can be used to pay Plan expenses in the future.

The Custodians retain as compensation for services provided to the Plan, any interest on amounts earned while certain transactions are pending. This applies to both contributions and distributions. Earnings are at institutional money market rates.

Certain plan investments are owned and managed by the Custodians; therefore, these investment transactions qualify as exempt party-in-interest transactions.

7. PLAN TERMINATION

Although the School has not expressed any intent to do so, the School has the right under the Plan to discontinue its contributions at any time and to terminate the Plan subject to the provisions of ERISA. In the event of Plan termination, the participants' accounts will become fully vested.

8. TAX STATUS

The Plan has adopted TIAA's ERISA 403(b) Volume Submitter Basic Plan Document #20. The Internal Revenue Service informed TIAA by a letter dated August 7, 2017, that its volume submitter plan was designed in accordance with applicable sections of the IRC and is appropriate for use by employers for the benefit of their employees. Once qualified, the Plan is required to operate in conformity with the IRC to maintain its qualification. The Plan administrator believes that the Plan is being operated in compliance with the applicable requirements of the IRC and, therefore, believes that the Plan is qualified and that it, and the related trust, are tax-exempt.
