Note 1 - Plan Description

The following description of 401(k) Profit-Sharing Plan for Employees of GFL Environmental USA Inc. (the "Plan") provides only general information. Participants should refer to the plan agreement for a more complete description of the Plan's provisions.

General

The Plan is a defined contribution plan covering all employees of GFL Environmental USA, Inc. (the "Company") who have completed three months of service. The Plan is subject to the provisions of the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (ERISA).

Contributions

The Plan provides for employee salary deferral contributions up to a maximum of 100 percent of annual compensation subject to maximum tax-deferred limitations established by the Internal Revenue Code. The Plan includes provisions for automatic enrollment. Unless a participant elects otherwise, the participant's automatic deferral shall be 2 percent. The Plan allows participants to contribute up to 100 percent of their compensation on an after-tax basis. Participants may also make contributions to the Plan in the form of a rollover of funds from another qualified plan.

Vesting

Participants vest in contributions made by the Company 20 percent after two years of service and an additional 20 percent per year thereafter until they become fully vested after six years of service.

Participant Accounts

Each participant's account is credited with the participant's contributions and allocations of the Company's contributions and plan earnings and charged with an allocation of administrative expenses. Allocations are based on participants' compensation or account balances, as defined. The benefit to which a participant is entitled is the benefit that can be provided from the participant's vested account. Participants may direct the investments of their account balances into various investment options offered by the Plan.

Participant Notes Receivable

Participants may borrow from their accounts subject to certain maximum and minimum amounts prescribed in the Plan and in the Internal Revenue Code. Notes receivable are collateralized by the participant's account balance and bear interest at a market rate.

Benefit Payments

Distributions are payable upon retirement; death; disability; termination of employment; or, for in-service distributions, upon attainment of age 59½ in the form of a lump-sum amount equal to the vested balance of a participant's account.

Participants may request that all or a portion of their accounts be distributed in the case of financial hardship, as defined in the plan document. The plan administrator must approve any such hardship withdrawals.

Upon termination of the Plan, participants become 100 percent vested in their account balances.

Various administrative costs are paid by the Company.

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of additions and deductions during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Subsequent Events

The financial statements and related disclosures include evaluation of events up through and including March 19, 2025, which is the date the financial statements were available to be issued.

Note 3 - Certified Information

Mutual of America Life Insurance Company (the "Custodian") holds the Plan's investments and participant notes receivable and executes all investment transactions. The investment balances and participant notes receivable included in the accompanying financial statements are based solely on information certified by the Custodian as of December 31, 2022.

Note 4 - Investment Contracts

The Plan has a benefit-responsive investment contract with Mutual of America Life Insurance Company (Mutual). Mutual maintains the contributions in a general account. The account is credited with earnings on the underlying investments and charged for participant withdrawals and administrative expenses. The investment contract issuer is contractually obligated to repay the principal and a specified interest rate that is guaranteed to the Plan.

Interest is credited on contract balances using a single portfolio rate approach. Under this methodology, a single interest rate is applied to all contributions made to the product, regardless of the timing of those contributions. Interest crediting rates are reviewed on a semiannual basis for resetting but may not be less than 2 percent. When establishing interest crediting rates for this product, Mutual considers many factors, including current economic and market conditions, the general interest rate environment, and both the expected and actual experience of a reference portfolio within the issuer's general account.

Generally, there are no events that could limit the ability of the Plan to transact at contract value paid within 90 days or, in rare circumstances, contract value paid over time. There are no events that allow the issuer to terminate the contract and that require the plan sponsor to settle an amount different than contract value paid either within 90 days or over time.

Note 5 - Tax Status

The Plan uses a preapproved plan. The preapproved plan has received a favorable opinion letter from the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) indicating that the Plan, as designed, is qualified for federal income tax-exempt status. The Plan has not individually sought its own determination letter.

Note 6 - Plan Merger
