**Notes to Financial Statements**

**December 31, 2024 and 2023**

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**1. Description of the Plan**

The following description of the DeliverHealth Solutions, LLC 401(k) Plan (the “Plan”) provides only general information. Participants should refer to the Plan Agreement for a more complete description of the Plan’s provisions.

General

The Plan is a defined contribution plan covering all employees of DeliverHealth Solutions, LLC (the Company). The Plan was adopted on March 1, 2021 and is subject to the provisions of the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (ERISA). The Plan was amended in February 2024 to remove all eligibility requirements.

Contributions

Participants may contribute up to 75% of their annual pre-tax and post-tax compensation, as defined in the Plan. Participants who have attained age 50 before the end of the plan year are eligible to make catch-up contributions. Participants may also contribute amounts representing distributions from other qualified retirement plans (rollover). The Company contributes 100% of the first 3%, and 50% of the next 2% of compensation that a participant contributes to the Plan. Additional discretionary matching and profit-sharing amounts may be contributed at the Company’s discretion subject to certain limitations. Contributions are subject to certain IRS limitations.

Participant Accounts

Each participant's account is credited with the participant's contribution and allocations of (a) the Company's contribution and (b) plan earnings and losses, and charged with an allocation of administrative expenses, if applicable. Allocations are based on participant earnings, account balances, or other specific participant transactions, as defined. The benefit to which a participant is entitled is the benefit that can be provided from the participant's vested account.

Vesting

Participants are immediately vested in their voluntary and employer matching contributions plus earnings thereon. The vested percentage of the nonelective employer contributions are based on the years of service, as described in the following schedule.

Payment of Benefits

Upon retirement, disability, death, or termination of employment, a participant (or participant’s beneficiary in the event of death) receives a lump-sum equal to the value of the participant’s vested interest. In addition, hardship and in-service distributions are permitted if certain criteria are met.

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#### 1. Description of the Plan (Continued)

##### Notes Receivable from Participants

Participants may borrow a minimum of \$1,000 up to a maximum equal to the lesser of \$50,000 or 50% of their vested account balance. Loan terms range up to 5 years, or longer if for the purchase of a primary residence. The loans are secured by the balance in the participant's account and bear interest at the then prevailing interest rate charged by persons in the business of lending money for loans which would be made under similar circumstances. Principal and interest is paid ratably through payroll deductions. A participant may only have one loan outstanding at any time.

##### Forfeited Accounts

When terminations of participation in the Plan occur, the non-vested portion of a participant's account, as defined by the Plan, represents a forfeiture. However, if the participant is re-employed and fulfills certain requirements, as defined by the Plan, the participant's account will be reinstated. At December 31, 2024 and 2023, forfeited nonvested accounts totaled \$403 and \$102, respectively. Forfeited amounts can be used to reduce future employer contributions or pay expenses of the Plan. No company contributions were paid from forfeited non-vested accounts during the year ended December 31, 2024. Plan expenses in the amount of \$86 were paid from forfeited non-vested accounts during the year ended December 31, 2024.

##### Investments

Upon enrollment in the Plan, participants direct employee and employer contributions into any combination of various investment options offered. Participants may change their investment options at any time.

#### 2. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

##### Basis of Accounting

The financial statements of the Plan are prepared using the accrual method of accounting.

Investments held by a defined contribution plan are required to be reported at fair value, except for fully benefit-responsive investment contracts. Contract value is the relevant measure for the portion of net assets available for benefits of a defined contribution plan attributable to fully benefit-responsive investment contracts because contract value is the amount participants normally would receive if they were to initiate permitted transactions under the terms of the Plan.

##### Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires the Plan Administrator to make estimates and assumptions that affect certain reported amounts and disclosures. Accordingly, actual results may differ from these estimates.

##### Investment Valuation and Income Recognition

Investments are reported at fair value, except for fully benefit-responsive investment contracts, which are measured at contract value. Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. See Note 7. Purchases and sales of securities are recorded on a trade-date basis. Interest income is recorded on an accrual basis. Dividends are recorded on the ex-dividend date. Net investment gain includes the Plan's gains and losses on investments bought and sold as well as held during the year. Capital gain distributions are included in dividend income.

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## **2. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (Continued)**

### Notes Receivable from Participants

Notes receivable from participants are measured at their unpaid principal balance plus any accrued but unpaid interest. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Delinquent participant loans are reclassified as distributions based upon the terms of the plan document.

### Payment of Benefits

Benefits are recorded when paid.

### Payment of Expenses

All expenses of administration may be paid out of the Plan unless paid by the Company. Such expenses shall include any expenses incident to the functioning of the Administrator, including but not limited to, fees of accountants, counsel, and other specialists and their agents, and other costs of administering the Plan. The Company elected to pay a portion of the expenses of the Plan for the year ended December 31, 2024.

## **3. Tax Status**

The Internal Revenue Service (IRS) has determined and informed the Company by a letter dated June 30, 2020, that the pre-approved plan prototype and related trust are designed in accordance with applicable sections of the Internal Revenue Code (IRC). Although the Plan has been amended since receiving the determination letter, the Plan administrator and the Plan's tax counsel believe that the Plan is designed and is currently being operated in compliance with the applicable requirements of the IRC and therefore believe that the Plan is qualified and the related trust is tax-exempt.

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require the plan administrator to evaluate tax positions taken by the Plan and recognize a tax liability for any uncertain position that more likely than not would not be sustained upon examination by the IRS. The Plan is subject to routine audits by tax authorities; however, there are currently no audits for any tax periods in progress.

## **4. Risks and Uncertainties**

The Plan invests in various investment options. These investment options are exposed to various risks, such as interest rate, credit and market risks. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investments, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in the values of investments will occur in the near term and that such changes could materially affect the participants' account balances and the amounts reported in the statements of net assets available for benefits.

## **5. Plan Termination**

Although it has not expressed any intent to do so, the Company has the right under the Plan to discontinue its contributions at any time and to terminate the Plan subject to the provisions of ERISA. In the event of Plan termination, participants would become 100% vested in their employer contributions.

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#### **6. Related Party Transactions**

Certain Plan investments are managed by Fidelity Management Trust Company. Fidelity Management Trust Company is the trustee and recordkeeper for the Plan and, therefore, these transactions qualify as party in interest transactions.

Fidelity Management Trust Company receives revenue from mutual fund service providers for services provided to the funds. This revenue is used to offset amounts owed to Fidelity Management Trust Company for its services.

If the revenue received by Fidelity Management Trust Company from such mutual fund service providers exceeds their fees, Fidelity Management Trust Company remits the excess to the Plan's trust on a quarterly basis. Such amounts may be applied to pay Plan administrative expenses or allocated to the accounts of the participants. Excess revenues in the amount of \$8,499 were allocated to participants for the year ended December 31, 2024. The Plan or Plan sponsor may make a payment to Fidelity Management Trust Company for administrative expenses not covered by revenue sharing.

#### **7. Fair Value Measurements**

Plan investments are reported at fair value in the accompanying statements of net assets available for benefits. The methods used to measure fair value may produce an amount that may not be indicative of net realizable value or reflective of future fair values. Furthermore, although the Plan believes its valuation methods are appropriate and consistent with other market participants, the use of different methodologies or assumptions to measure the fair value of certain financial instruments could result in a different fair value measurement at the reporting date.

The fair value measurement accounting literature establishes a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. The hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (level 1) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (level 3). The three levels of inputs used to measure fair value under this accounting standard are described as follows:

- Level 1 - Quoted prices in active markets that are accessible at the measurement date for identical or similar assets or liabilities.
- Level 2 - Observable inputs other than quoted prices included within Level 1. Inputs that are principally derived from or corroborated by observable market data by correlation or other means. If the asset or liability has a specified (contractual) term, the level 2 input must be observable for substantially the full term of the asset or liability.
- Level 3 - Unobservable inputs that are supported by little or no market activity and that are significant to the fair value measurement of the assets or liabilities. These include certain pricing models, discounted cash flow methodologies and similar techniques that use significant unobservable inputs.

The asset or liability's fair value measurement level within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of any input that is significant to the fair value measurement. Valuation techniques maximize the use of relevant observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs. The following is a description of the valuation methodologies the Plan used for assets measured at fair value:

Money market funds: Valued at the daily closing price as reported by the fund. These funds are required to publish their daily net asset value and to transact at that price. The funds held by the Plan are deemed to be actively traded.

Registered investment companies (mutual funds): Valued at the daily closing price as reported by the fund. Mutual funds held by the Plan are open-end mutual funds that are registered with the U.S. Securities and Exchange Commission. Mutual funds are required to publish their daily net asset value and to transact at that price. The mutual funds held by the Plan are deemed to be actively traded.

#### 8. Fully Benefit-Responsive Investment Contracts

The Plan has a fully benefit-responsive guaranteed investment contract with New York Life Insurance Company (New York Life). New York Life maintains the contributions in a general account. The account is credited with earnings on the underlying investments and charged for participant withdrawals and administrative expenses. The guaranteed investment contract issuer is contractually obligated to repay the principal and a specified interest rate that is guaranteed to the Plan. The guaranteed investment contract does not permit the insurance company to terminate the agreement prior to the scheduled maturity date.

The contract meets the fully-benefit responsive investment contract criteria and therefore is reported at contract value. Contract value is the relevant measure for fully benefit-responsive investment contracts because this is the amount received by participants if they were to initiate permitted transactions under the terms of the Plan. Contract value, as reported to the Plan by New York Life, represents contributions made under the contract, plus earnings, less participant withdrawals, and administrative expenses. Participants may ordinarily direct the withdrawal or transfer of all or a portion of their investment at contract value.

The Plan's ability to receive amounts due is dependent on the issuer's ability to meet its financial obligations. The issuer's ability to meet its contractual obligations may be affected by future economic and regulatory developments.

Certain events limit the Plan's ability to transact at contract value with New York Life. Such events include the following: (a) amendments to the plan document (including complete or partial plan termination or merger with another plan), (b) changes to the Plan's prohibition on competing investment options or deletion of equity wash provisions, (c) bankruptcy of the Plan sponsor or other Plan sponsor events (for example, divestitures or spin-offs of a subsidiary) that causes a significant withdrawal from the Plan, (d) the failure of the trust to qualify for exemption from federal income taxes or any required prohibited transactions exemption under ERISA, or (e) premature termination of the contract. The Plan administrator does not believe that any events that would limit the Plan's ability to transact at contract value with Plan participants or the issuer are probable of occurring.

In addition, certain events would allow the issuer to terminate the contract with the Plan and settle at an amount different from contract value. Examples of such events include (a) an uncured breach of the Plan's investment guidelines, (b) a breach of material obligation under the contract, (c) a material misrepresentation, and (d) a material amendment to the agreement without the consent of the issuer.

The average yield earned by the Plan is derived by averaging the quarterly gross interest rates for the fund over the year. That average for 2024 was 4%. The actual average yield earned by the Plan is derived by averaging the Plan's quarterly interest rates. That average for 2024 was 3.49%.

#### **9. Certified Investments**

The information related to investments that is included throughout the Plan's financial statements and schedule of assets held for investment purposes at end of year as of December 31, 2024 and 2023, and for the year ended December 31, 2024, was prepared by or derived from information provided by the trustee and furnished to the Plan administrator. The Plan administrator has obtained certification from the trustee that information provided to the Plan administrator by the trustee related to these assets is complete and accurate.

Fidelity Management Trust Company, the Trustee, also certified to the completeness and accuracy of \$1,656,583 of net investment gain from registered investment companies, \$434,819 of dividends and interest from registered investment companies, \$1,821 of dividends and interest from the general investment account, and \$11,529 of interest on notes receivable from participants for the year ended December 31, 2024.

#### **10. Subsequent Events**

Management evaluated the activity of the Plan through June 11, 2025 (the date the financial statements were available to be issued) and concluded that no subsequent events have occurred that would require recognition in the financial statements or disclosure in the notes to the financial statements.

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**1. Description of the Plan**

The following description of the DeliverHealth Solutions, LLC 401(k) Plan (the “Plan”) provides only general information. Participants should refer to the Plan Agreement for a more complete description of the Plan’s provisions.

General

The Plan is a defined contribution plan covering all employees of DeliverHealth Solutions, LLC (the Company). The Plan was adopted on March 1, 2021 and is subject to the provisions of the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (ERISA). The Plan was amended in February 2024 to remove all eligibility requirements.

Contributions

Participants may contribute up to 75% of their annual pre-tax and post-tax compensation, as defined in the Plan. Participants who have attained age 50 before the end of the plan year are eligible to make catch-up contributions. Participants may also contribute amounts representing distributions from other qualified retirement plans (rollover). The Company contributes 100% of the first 3%, and 50% of the next 2% of compensation that a participant contributes to the Plan. Additional discretionary matching and profit-sharing amounts may be contributed at the Company’s discretion subject to certain limitations. Contributions are subject to certain IRS limitations.

Participant Accounts

Each participant's account is credited with the participant's contribution and allocations of (a) the Company's contribution and (b) plan earnings and losses, and charged with an allocation of administrative expenses, if applicable. Allocations are based on participant earnings, account balances, or other specific participant transactions, as defined. The benefit to which a participant is entitled is the benefit that can be provided from the participant's vested account.

Vesting

Participants are immediately vested in their voluntary and employer matching contributions plus earnings thereon. The vested percentage of the nonelective employer contributions are based on the years of service, as described in the following schedule.

Payment of Benefits

Upon retirement, disability, death, or termination of employment, a participant (or participant’s beneficiary in the event of death) receives a lump-sum equal to the value of the participant’s vested interest. In addition, hardship and in-service distributions are permitted if certain criteria are met.

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#### 1. Description of the Plan (Continued)

##### Notes Receivable from Participants

Participants may borrow a minimum of \$1,000 up to a maximum equal to the lesser of \$50,000 or 50% of their vested account balance. Loan terms range up to 5 years, or longer if for the purchase of a primary residence. The loans are secured by the balance in the participant's account and bear interest at the then prevailing interest rate charged by persons in the business of lending money for loans which would be made under similar circumstances. Principal and interest is paid ratably through payroll deductions. A participant may only have one loan outstanding at any time.

##### Forfeited Accounts

When terminations of participation in the Plan occur, the non-vested portion of a participant's account, as defined by the Plan, represents a forfeiture. However, if the participant is re-employed and fulfills certain requirements, as defined by the Plan, the participant's account will be reinstated. At December 31, 2024 and 2023, forfeited nonvested accounts totaled \$403 and \$102, respectively. Forfeited amounts can be used to reduce future employer contributions or pay expenses of the Plan. No company contributions were paid from forfeited non-vested accounts during the year ended December 31, 2024. Plan expenses in the amount of \$86 were paid from forfeited non-vested accounts during the year ended December 31, 2024.

##### Investments

Upon enrollment in the Plan, participants direct employee and employer contributions into any combination of various investment options offered. Participants may change their investment options at any time.

#### 2. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

##### Basis of Accounting

The financial statements of the Plan are prepared using the accrual method of accounting.

Investments held by a defined contribution plan are required to be reported at fair value, except for fully benefit-responsive investment contracts. Contract value is the relevant measure for the portion of net assets available for benefits of a defined contribution plan attributable to fully benefit-responsive investment contracts because contract value is the amount participants normally would receive if they were to initiate permitted transactions under the terms of the Plan.

##### Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires the Plan Administrator to make estimates and assumptions that affect certain reported amounts and disclosures. Accordingly, actual results may differ from these estimates.

##### Investment Valuation and Income Recognition

Investments are reported at fair value, except for fully benefit-responsive investment contracts, which are measured at contract value. Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. See Note 7. Purchases and sales of securities are recorded on a trade-date basis. Interest income is recorded on an accrual basis. Dividends are recorded on the ex-dividend date. Net investment gain includes the Plan's gains and losses on investments bought and sold as well as held during the year. Capital gain distributions are included in dividend income.

### Notes Receivable from Participants

Notes receivable from participants are measured at their unpaid principal balance plus any accrued but unpaid interest. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Delinquent participant loans are reclassified as distributions based upon the terms of the plan document.

### Payment of Benefits

Benefits are recorded when paid.

### Payment of Expenses

All expenses of administration may be paid out of the Plan unless paid by the Company. Such expenses shall include any expenses incident to the functioning of the Administrator, including but not limited to, fees of accountants, counsel, and other specialists and their agents, and other costs of administering the Plan. The Company elected to pay a portion of the expenses of the Plan for the year ended December 31, 2024.

## **3. Tax Status**

The Internal Revenue Service (IRS) has determined and informed the Company by a letter dated June 30, 2020, that the pre-approved plan prototype and related trust are designed in accordance with applicable sections of the Internal Revenue Code (IRC). Although the Plan has been amended since receiving the determination letter, the Plan administrator and the Plan's tax counsel believe that the Plan is designed and is currently being operated in compliance with the applicable requirements of the IRC and therefore believe that the Plan is qualified and the related trust is tax-exempt.

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require the plan administrator to evaluate tax positions taken by the Plan and recognize a tax liability for any uncertain position that more likely than not would not be sustained upon examination by the IRS. The Plan is subject to routine audits by tax authorities; however, there are currently no audits for any tax periods in progress.

## **4. Risks and Uncertainties**

The Plan invests in various investment options. These investment options are exposed to various risks, such as interest rate, credit and market risks. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investments, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in the values of investments will occur in the near term and that such changes could materially affect the participants' account balances and the amounts reported in the statements of net assets available for benefits.

## **5. Plan Termination**

Although it has not expressed any intent to do so, the Company has the right under the Plan to discontinue its contributions at any time and to terminate the Plan subject to the provisions of ERISA. In the event of Plan termination, participants would become 100% vested in their employer contributions.

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#### **6. Related Party Transactions**

Certain Plan investments are managed by Fidelity Management Trust Company. Fidelity Management Trust Company is the trustee and recordkeeper for the Plan and, therefore, these transactions qualify as party in interest transactions.

Fidelity Management Trust Company receives revenue from mutual fund service providers for services provided to the funds. This revenue is used to offset amounts owed to Fidelity Management Trust Company for its services.

If the revenue received by Fidelity Management Trust Company from such mutual fund service providers exceeds their fees, Fidelity Management Trust Company remits the excess to the Plan's trust on a quarterly basis. Such amounts may be applied to pay Plan administrative expenses or allocated to the accounts of the participants. Excess revenues in the amount of \$8,499 were allocated to participants for the year ended December 31, 2024. The Plan or Plan sponsor may make a payment to Fidelity Management Trust Company for administrative expenses not covered by revenue sharing.

#### **7. Fair Value Measurements**

Plan investments are reported at fair value in the accompanying statements of net assets available for benefits. The methods used to measure fair value may produce an amount that may not be indicative of net realizable value or reflective of future fair values. Furthermore, although the Plan believes its valuation methods are appropriate and consistent with other market participants, the use of different methodologies or assumptions to measure the fair value of certain financial instruments could result in a different fair value measurement at the reporting date.

The fair value measurement accounting literature establishes a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. The hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (level 1) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (level 3). The three levels of inputs used to measure fair value under this accounting standard are described as follows:

- Level 1 - Quoted prices in active markets that are accessible at the measurement date for identical or similar assets or liabilities.
- Level 2 - Observable inputs other than quoted prices included within Level 1. Inputs that are principally derived from or corroborated by observable market data by correlation or other means. If the asset or liability has a specified (contractual) term, the level 2 input must be observable for substantially the full term of the asset or liability.
- Level 3 - Unobservable inputs that are supported by little or no market activity and that are significant to the fair value measurement of the assets or liabilities. These include certain pricing models, discounted cash flow methodologies and similar techniques that use significant unobservable inputs.

The asset or liability's fair value measurement level within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of any input that is significant to the fair value measurement. Valuation techniques maximize the use of relevant observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs. The following is a description of the valuation methodologies the Plan used for assets measured at fair value:

Money market funds: Valued at the daily closing price as reported by the fund. These funds are required to publish their daily net asset value and to transact at that price. The funds held by the Plan are deemed to be actively traded.

Registered investment companies (mutual funds): Valued at the daily closing price as reported by the fund. Mutual funds held by the Plan are open-end mutual funds that are registered with the U.S. Securities and Exchange Commission. Mutual funds are required to publish their daily net asset value and to transact at that price. The mutual funds held by the Plan are deemed to be actively traded.

#### 8. Fully Benefit-Responsive Investment Contracts

The Plan has a fully benefit-responsive guaranteed investment contract with New York Life Insurance Company (New York Life). New York Life maintains the contributions in a general account. The account is credited with earnings on the underlying investments and charged for participant withdrawals and administrative expenses. The guaranteed investment contract issuer is contractually obligated to repay the principal and a specified interest rate that is guaranteed to the Plan. The guaranteed investment contract does not permit the insurance company to terminate the agreement prior to the scheduled maturity date.

The contract meets the fully-benefit responsive investment contract criteria and therefore is reported at contract value. Contract value is the relevant measure for fully benefit-responsive investment contracts because this is the amount received by participants if they were to initiate permitted transactions under the terms of the Plan. Contract value, as reported to the Plan by New York Life, represents contributions made under the contract, plus earnings, less participant withdrawals, and administrative expenses. Participants may ordinarily direct the withdrawal or transfer of all or a portion of their investment at contract value.

The Plan's ability to receive amounts due is dependent on the issuer's ability to meet its financial obligations. The issuer's ability to meet its contractual obligations may be affected by future economic and regulatory developments.

Certain events limit the Plan's ability to transact at contract value with New York Life. Such events include the following: (a) amendments to the plan document (including complete or partial plan termination or merger with another plan), (b) changes to the Plan's prohibition on competing investment options or deletion of equity wash provisions, (c) bankruptcy of the Plan sponsor or other Plan sponsor events (for example, divestitures or spin-offs of a subsidiary) that causes a significant withdrawal from the Plan, (d) the failure of the trust to qualify for exemption from federal income taxes or any required prohibited transactions exemption under ERISA, or (e) premature termination of the contract. The Plan administrator does not believe that any events that would limit the Plan's ability to transact at contract value with Plan participants or the issuer are probable of occurring.

In addition, certain events would allow the issuer to terminate the contract with the Plan and settle at an amount different from contract value. Examples of such events include (a) an uncured breach of the Plan's investment guidelines, (b) a breach of material obligation under the contract, (c) a material misrepresentation, and (d) a material amendment to the agreement without the consent of the issuer.

The average yield earned by the Plan is derived by averaging the quarterly gross interest rates for the fund over the year. That average for 2024 was 4%. The actual average yield earned by the Plan is derived by averaging the Plan's quarterly interest rates. That average for 2024 was 3.49%.

#### **9. Certified Investments**

The information related to investments that is included throughout the Plan's financial statements and schedule of assets held for investment purposes at end of year as of December 31, 2024 and 2023, and for the year ended December 31, 2024, was prepared by or derived from information provided by the trustee and furnished to the Plan administrator. The Plan administrator has obtained certification from the trustee that information provided to the Plan administrator by the trustee related to these assets is complete and accurate.

Fidelity Management Trust Company, the Trustee, also certified to the completeness and accuracy of \$1,656,583 of net investment gain from registered investment companies, \$434,819 of dividends and interest from registered investment companies, \$1,821 of dividends and interest from the general investment account, and \$11,529 of interest on notes receivable from participants for the year ended December 31, 2024.

#### **10. Subsequent Events**

Management evaluated the activity of the Plan through June 11, 2025 (the date the financial statements were available to be issued) and concluded that no subsequent events have occurred that would require recognition in the financial statements or disclosure in the notes to the financial statements.

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**1. Description of the Plan**

The following description of the DeliverHealth Solutions, LLC 401(k) Plan (the “Plan”) provides only general information. Participants should refer to the Plan Agreement for a more complete description of the Plan’s provisions.

General

The Plan is a defined contribution plan covering all employees of DeliverHealth Solutions, LLC (the Company). The Plan was adopted on March 1, 2021 and is subject to the provisions of the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (ERISA). The Plan was amended in February 2024 to remove all eligibility requirements.

Contributions

Participants may contribute up to 75% of their annual pre-tax and post-tax compensation, as defined in the Plan. Participants who have attained age 50 before the end of the plan year are eligible to make catch-up contributions. Participants may also contribute amounts representing distributions from other qualified retirement plans (rollover). The Company contributes 100% of the first 3%, and 50% of the next 2% of compensation that a participant contributes to the Plan. Additional discretionary matching and profit-sharing amounts may be contributed at the Company’s discretion subject to certain limitations. Contributions are subject to certain IRS limitations.

Participant Accounts

Each participant's account is credited with the participant's contribution and allocations of (a) the Company's contribution and (b) plan earnings and losses, and charged with an allocation of administrative expenses, if applicable. Allocations are based on participant earnings, account balances, or other specific participant transactions, as defined. The benefit to which a participant is entitled is the benefit that can be provided from the participant's vested account.

Vesting

Participants are immediately vested in their voluntary and employer matching contributions plus earnings thereon. The vested percentage of the nonelective employer contributions are based on the years of service, as described in the following schedule.

Payment of Benefits

Upon retirement, disability, death, or termination of employment, a participant (or participant’s beneficiary in the event of death) receives a lump-sum equal to the value of the participant’s vested interest. In addition, hardship and in-service distributions are permitted if certain criteria are met.

##### Notes Receivable from Participants

Participants may borrow a minimum of \$1,000 up to a maximum equal to the lesser of \$50,000 or 50% of their vested account balance. Loan terms range up to 5 years, or longer if for the purchase of a primary residence. The loans are secured by the balance in the participant's account and bear interest at the then prevailing interest rate charged by persons in the business of lending money for loans which would be made under similar circumstances. Principal and interest is paid ratably through payroll deductions. A participant may only have one loan outstanding at any time.

##### Forfeited Accounts

When terminations of participation in the Plan occur, the non-vested portion of a participant's account, as defined by the Plan, represents a forfeiture. However, if the participant is re-employed and fulfills certain requirements, as defined by the Plan, the participant's account will be reinstated. At December 31, 2024 and 2023, forfeited nonvested accounts totaled \$403 and \$102, respectively. Forfeited amounts can be used to reduce future employer contributions or pay expenses of the Plan. No company contributions were paid from forfeited non-vested accounts during the year ended December 31, 2024. Plan expenses in the amount of \$86 were paid from forfeited non-vested accounts during the year ended December 31, 2024.

##### Investments

Upon enrollment in the Plan, participants direct employee and employer contributions into any combination of various investment options offered. Participants may change their investment options at any time.

#### 2. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

##### Basis of Accounting

The financial statements of the Plan are prepared using the accrual method of accounting.

Investments held by a defined contribution plan are required to be reported at fair value, except for fully benefit-responsive investment contracts. Contract value is the relevant measure for the portion of net assets available for benefits of a defined contribution plan attributable to fully benefit-responsive investment contracts because contract value is the amount participants normally would receive if they were to initiate permitted transactions under the terms of the Plan.

##### Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires the Plan Administrator to make estimates and assumptions that affect certain reported amounts and disclosures. Accordingly, actual results may differ from these estimates.

##### Investment Valuation and Income Recognition

Investments are reported at fair value, except for fully benefit-responsive investment contracts, which are measured at contract value. Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. See Note 7. Purchases and sales of securities are recorded on a trade-date basis. Interest income is recorded on an accrual basis. Dividends are recorded on the ex-dividend date. Net investment gain includes the Plan's gains and losses on investments bought and sold as well as held during the year. Capital gain distributions are included in dividend income.

### Notes Receivable from Participants

Notes receivable from participants are measured at their unpaid principal balance plus any accrued but unpaid interest. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Delinquent participant loans are reclassified as distributions based upon the terms of the plan document.

### Payment of Benefits

Benefits are recorded when paid.

### Payment of Expenses

All expenses of administration may be paid out of the Plan unless paid by the Company. Such expenses shall include any expenses incident to the functioning of the Administrator, including but not limited to, fees of accountants, counsel, and other specialists and their agents, and other costs of administering the Plan. The Company elected to pay a portion of the expenses of the Plan for the year ended December 31, 2024.

## **3. Tax Status**

The Internal Revenue Service (IRS) has determined and informed the Company by a letter dated June 30, 2020, that the pre-approved plan prototype and related trust are designed in accordance with applicable sections of the Internal Revenue Code (IRC). Although the Plan has been amended since receiving the determination letter, the Plan administrator and the Plan's tax counsel believe that the Plan is designed and is currently being operated in compliance with the applicable requirements of the IRC and therefore believe that the Plan is qualified and the related trust is tax-exempt.

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require the plan administrator to evaluate tax positions taken by the Plan and recognize a tax liability for any uncertain position that more likely than not would not be sustained upon examination by the IRS. The Plan is subject to routine audits by tax authorities; however, there are currently no audits for any tax periods in progress.

## **4. Risks and Uncertainties**

The Plan invests in various investment options. These investment options are exposed to various risks, such as interest rate, credit and market risks. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investments, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in the values of investments will occur in the near term and that such changes could materially affect the participants' account balances and the amounts reported in the statements of net assets available for benefits.

## **5. Plan Termination**

Although it has not expressed any intent to do so, the Company has the right under the Plan to discontinue its contributions at any time and to terminate the Plan subject to the provisions of ERISA. In the event of Plan termination, participants would become 100% vested in their employer contributions.

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#### **6. Related Party Transactions**

Certain Plan investments are managed by Fidelity Management Trust Company. Fidelity Management Trust Company is the trustee and recordkeeper for the Plan and, therefore, these transactions qualify as party in interest transactions.

Fidelity Management Trust Company receives revenue from mutual fund service providers for services provided to the funds. This revenue is used to offset amounts owed to Fidelity Management Trust Company for its services.

If the revenue received by Fidelity Management Trust Company from such mutual fund service providers exceeds their fees, Fidelity Management Trust Company remits the excess to the Plan's trust on a quarterly basis. Such amounts may be applied to pay Plan administrative expenses or allocated to the accounts of the participants. Excess revenues in the amount of \$8,499 were allocated to participants for the year ended December 31, 2024. The Plan or Plan sponsor may make a payment to Fidelity Management Trust Company for administrative expenses not covered by revenue sharing.

#### **7. Fair Value Measurements**

Plan investments are reported at fair value in the accompanying statements of net assets available for benefits. The methods used to measure fair value may produce an amount that may not be indicative of net realizable value or reflective of future fair values. Furthermore, although the Plan believes its valuation methods are appropriate and consistent with other market participants, the use of different methodologies or assumptions to measure the fair value of certain financial instruments could result in a different fair value measurement at the reporting date.

The fair value measurement accounting literature establishes a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. The hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (level 1) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (level 3). The three levels of inputs used to measure fair value under this accounting standard are described as follows:

- Level 1 - Quoted prices in active markets that are accessible at the measurement date for identical or similar assets or liabilities.
- Level 2 - Observable inputs other than quoted prices included within Level 1. Inputs that are principally derived from or corroborated by observable market data by correlation or other means. If the asset or liability has a specified (contractual) term, the level 2 input must be observable for substantially the full term of the asset or liability.
- Level 3 - Unobservable inputs that are supported by little or no market activity and that are significant to the fair value measurement of the assets or liabilities. These include certain pricing models, discounted cash flow methodologies and similar techniques that use significant unobservable inputs.

The asset or liability's fair value measurement level within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of any input that is significant to the fair value measurement. Valuation techniques maximize the use of relevant observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs. The following is a description of the valuation methodologies the Plan used for assets measured at fair value:

Money market funds: Valued at the daily closing price as reported by the fund. These funds are required to publish their daily net asset value and to transact at that price. The funds held by the Plan are deemed to be actively traded.

Registered investment companies (mutual funds): Valued at the daily closing price as reported by the fund. Mutual funds held by the Plan are open-end mutual funds that are registered with the U.S. Securities and Exchange Commission. Mutual funds are required to publish their daily net asset value and to transact at that price. The mutual funds held by the Plan are deemed to be actively traded.

#### 8. Fully Benefit-Responsive Investment Contracts

The Plan has a fully benefit-responsive guaranteed investment contract with New York Life Insurance Company (New York Life). New York Life maintains the contributions in a general account. The account is credited with earnings on the underlying investments and charged for participant withdrawals and administrative expenses. The guaranteed investment contract issuer is contractually obligated to repay the principal and a specified interest rate that is guaranteed to the Plan. The guaranteed investment contract does not permit the insurance company to terminate the agreement prior to the scheduled maturity date.

The contract meets the fully-benefit responsive investment contract criteria and therefore is reported at contract value. Contract value is the relevant measure for fully benefit-responsive investment contracts because this is the amount received by participants if they were to initiate permitted transactions under the terms of the Plan. Contract value, as reported to the Plan by New York Life, represents contributions made under the contract, plus earnings, less participant withdrawals, and administrative expenses. Participants may ordinarily direct the withdrawal or transfer of all or a portion of their investment at contract value.

The Plan's ability to receive amounts due is dependent on the issuer's ability to meet its financial obligations. The issuer's ability to meet its contractual obligations may be affected by future economic and regulatory developments.

Certain events limit the Plan's ability to transact at contract value with New York Life. Such events include the following: (a) amendments to the plan document (including complete or partial plan termination or merger with another plan), (b) changes to the Plan's prohibition on competing investment options or deletion of equity wash provisions, (c) bankruptcy of the Plan sponsor or other Plan sponsor events (for example, divestitures or spin-offs of a subsidiary) that causes a significant withdrawal from the Plan, (d) the failure of the trust to qualify for exemption from federal income taxes or any required prohibited transactions exemption under ERISA, or (e) premature termination of the contract. The Plan administrator does not believe that any events that would limit the Plan's ability to transact at contract value with Plan participants or the issuer are probable of occurring.

In addition, certain events would allow the issuer to terminate the contract with the Plan and settle at an amount different from contract value. Examples of such events include (a) an uncured breach of the Plan's investment guidelines, (b) a breach of material obligation under the contract, (c) a material misrepresentation, and (d) a material amendment to the agreement without the consent of the issuer.

The average yield earned by the Plan is derived by averaging the quarterly gross interest rates for the fund over the year. That average for 2024 was 4%. The actual average yield earned by the Plan is derived by averaging the Plan's quarterly interest rates. That average for 2024 was 3.49%.

#### **9. Certified Investments**

The information related to investments that is included throughout the Plan's financial statements and schedule of assets held for investment purposes at end of year as of December 31, 2024 and 2023, and for the year ended December 31, 2024, was prepared by or derived from information provided by the trustee and furnished to the Plan administrator. The Plan administrator has obtained certification from the trustee that information provided to the Plan administrator by the trustee related to these assets is complete and accurate.

Fidelity Management Trust Company, the Trustee, also certified to the completeness and accuracy of \$1,656,583 of net investment gain from registered investment companies, \$434,819 of dividends and interest from registered investment companies, \$1,821 of dividends and interest from the general investment account, and \$11,529 of interest on notes receivable from participants for the year ended December 31, 2024.

#### **10. Subsequent Events**

Management evaluated the activity of the Plan through June 11, 2025 (the date the financial statements were available to be issued) and concluded that no subsequent events have occurred that would require recognition in the financial statements or disclosure in the notes to the financial statements.
