We have audited the financial statements of the Hannahville Indian Community 401(k) Plan, an employee benefit plan subject to the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (ERISA), as permitted by ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) [ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) audit] for the year ended September 30, 2024, and we will issue our report thereon dated July 10, 2025. As permitted by ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C), our audit did not extend to any statements or information related to assets held for investment of the Plan (investment information) by John Hancock Life Insurance Company (U.S.A), the recordkeeper, which is a bank or similar institution or insurance carrier that is regulated, supervised, and subject to periodic examination by a state or federal agency, that prepared and certified the statements or information regarding assets so held in accordance with 29 CFR 2520.103-5. Our audit did not extend to the certified investment information, except for obtaining and reading the certification, comparing the certified investment information with the related information presented and disclosed in the financial statements and ERISA-required supplemental schedules, and reading the disclosures relating to the certified investment information to assess whether they are in accordance with the presentation and disclosure requirements of GAAP. Accordingly, the objective of an ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) audit is not to express an opinion about whether the financial statements as a whole are presented fairly, in all material respects, in accordance with GAAP. Professional standards require that we provide you with information about our responsibilities under generally accepted auditing standards, as well as certain information related to the planned scope and timing of our audit. We have communicated such information in our letter to you dated June 17, 2025. Professional standards also require that we communicate to you the following information related to our audit.

Significant Audit Matters

Qualitative Aspects of Accounting Practices

Management is responsible for the selection and use of appropriate accounting policies. The significant accounting policies used by the Hannahville Indian Community 401(k) Plan are described in Note B to the financial statements. No new accounting policies were adopted and the application of existing policies was not changed during 2024. We noted no transactions entered into by the Plan during the year for which there is a lack of authoritative guidance or consensus. All significant transactions have been recognized in the financial statements in the proper period.

Accounting estimates are an integral part of the financial statements prepared by management and are based on management's knowledge and experience about past and current events and assumptions about future events. Certain accounting estimates are particularly sensitive because of their significance to the financial statements and because of the possibility that future events affecting them may differ significantly from those expected. The most sensitive estimate affecting the financial statements was:

Management's estimate of the fair value of shares in pooled investment accounts is based on quoted share prices of the underlying mutual fund shares held by the pooled account. We evaluated the key factors and assumptions to develop the fair value of the shares in pooled investment accounts in determining that it is reasonable in relation to the financial statements taken as a whole.

The financial statement disclosures are neutral, consistent, and clear.

Form 5500 Procedures

We are required to obtain and read a substantially complete draft of Form 5500 prior to dating our auditor's report. The purpose of this procedure is to identify any material inconsistencies between the draft Form 5500 and the Plan's financial statements. We identified no material inconsistencies in performing and completing our audit.

Difficulties Encountered in Performing the Audit

We encountered no significant difficulties in dealing with management in performing and completing our audit.

Disagreements with Management

For purposes of this letter, a disagreement with management is a disagreement on a financial accounting, reporting, or auditing matter, whether or not resolved to our satisfaction, that could be significant to the financial statements or the auditor's report. We are pleased to report that no such disagreements arose during the course of our audit.

Management Representations

We have requested certain representations from management that are included in the management representation letter dated July 10, 2025.

Management Consultations with Other Independent Accountants

In some cases, management may decide to consult with other accountants about auditing and accounting matters, similar to obtaining a "second opinion" on certain situations. If a consultation involves application of an accounting principle to the Plan's financial statements or a determination of the type of auditor's opinion that may be expressed on those statements, our professional standards require the consulting accountant to check with us to determine that the consultant has all the relevant facts. To our knowledge, there were no such consultations with other accountants.

Other Audit Findings or Issues

We generally discuss a variety of matters, including the application of accounting principles and auditing standards, with management each year prior to retention as the Plan's auditors. However, these discussions occurred in the normal course of our professional relationship and our responses were not a condition to our retention.

Except as discussed in the first paragraph, in planning and performing our audit of the financial statements of the Hannahville Indian Community 401(k) Plan, an employee benefit plan subject to the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (ERISA), as of and for the year ended September 30, 2024, in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America, we considered the Hannahville Indian Community 401(k) Plan's system of internal control over financial reporting (internal control) as a basis for designing audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances for the purpose of expressing our opinion on the financial statements, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the Plan's internal control. Accordingly, we do not express an opinion on the effectiveness of the Plan's internal control. Our audit also did not include a consideration of internal control relating to the investment information.

A deficiency in internal control exists when the design or operation of a control does not allow management or employees, in the normal course of performing their assigned functions, to prevent, or detect and correct, misstatements on a timely basis. A material weakness is a deficiency, or a combination of deficiencies in internal control, such that there is a reasonable possibility that a material misstatement of the Plan's financial statements will not be prevented, or detected and corrected, on a timely basis.

Our consideration of internal control was for the limited purpose described above and was not designed to identify all deficiencies in internal control that might be material weaknesses. In addition, because of inherent limitations in internal control, including the possibility of management override of controls, misstatements due to error or fraud may occur and not be detected by such controls. Given these limitations, during our audit we did not identify any deficiencies in internal control that we consider to be material weaknesses. However, material weaknesses may exist that have not been identified.

During our audit, we also became aware of deficiencies in internal control other than significant deficiencies or material weaknesses, or other matters that are opportunities for strengthening internal controls. They are as follows:

Census data – During testing of the census data we noted one or more instances when the census data, such as birth date or termination date, did not agree with the participant records or was not updated with the

recordkeeper. While the clerical errors did not result in improper payments or benefit eligibility, it is imperative that the census data be accurate for each participant. We recommend management review the controls around reporting and maintaining census data and update as deemed necessary.

Other Matters

Our responsibility for the ERISA-required supplemental schedules accompanying the financial statements is to perform adequate procedures to evaluate whether the form and content of the ERISA-required supplemental schedules, other than that agreed to or derived from the certified investment information, is presented in compliance with the DOL's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA, and whether the information in the supplemental schedules related to assets held by and certified to by a qualified institution agrees to, or is derived from, in all material respects, the information prepared and certified by an institution that management determined meets the requirements of ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C).

- 17) We acknowledge that administrative expenses paid by the Plan sponsor on behalf of the Plan will not be reimbursed by the Plan.
- 18) We will notify you in advance of our intent to include your report, in whole or in part, in any document other than Form 5500 filed with a regulatory agency or printed, in whole or in part, for any reason, and you will have the opportunity to review such matter before its filing or issuance.
- 19) We acknowledge our election to have an ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) audit does not affect our responsibility for the financial statements and for determining the following:
 - a) The circumstances permit an ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) audit.
 - b) A qualified institution has prepared and certified the investment information as described in 29 CFR 2520.103-8.
 - c) The certification meets the 29 CFR 2520.103-5 requirements.
 - d) The certified investment information is appropriately measured, presented, and disclosed in accordance with U.S. GAAP.

 - a) Management,
 - b) Employees who have significant roles in internal control, or
 - c) Others where the fraud could have a material effect on the financial statements.
- 24) We have no knowledge of any allegations of fraud or suspected fraud affecting the Plan's financial statements communicated by employees, former employees, participants, regulators, beneficiaries, service providers, third-party administrators, or others.
- 25) We have no knowledge of any instances of noncompliance or suspected noncompliance with laws and regulations (including ERISA, DOL, and IRS regulations) whose effects should be considered when preparing financial statements.
- 26) We have disclosed to you the names of all of the Plan's related parties and parties in interest and all the related-party and party-in-interest relationships and transactions, including any side agreements.
- 27) The Plan has satisfactory title to all owned assets, which are recorded at fair value, and all liens, encumbrances, or security interests requiring disclosure in the financial statements have been properly disclosed.

- 28) We have no—
- a) Plans or intentions that may materially affect the carrying value or classification of assets and liabilities.
 - b) Intentions to terminate the Plan.
- 29) Amendments to the Plan instrument, if any, have been properly recorded or disclosed in the financial statements.
- 30) The Plan has complied with all aspects of debt and other contractual agreements that would have a material effect on the financial statements in the event of noncompliance.
- 31) The methods and significant assumptions used to estimate fair values of financial instruments, including nonreadily marketable securities, are as follows: quoted share prices for the pooled accounts. The methods and significant assumptions used result in a measure of fair value appropriate for financial measurement and disclosure purposes.
- 32) We are responsible for the estimation methods and assumptions used in measuring assets and liabilities reported or disclosed at fair value, including information obtained from brokers, pricing services, or other third parties. Our valuation methodologies have been consistently applied from period to period. The fair value measurements reported or disclosed represent our best estimate of fair value as of the measurement date in accordance with the requirements of Financial Accounting Standards Board (*FASB Accounting Standards Codification (ASC) 820, Fair Value Measurement* . In addition, our disclosures related to fair value measurements are consistent with the objectives outlined in [FASB ASC 820](#) .
- 33) All required amendments to and filings of plan documents with the appropriate agencies have been made. The Plan obtained its latest determination letter on February 7, 2022, in which the Internal Revenue Service stated that the Plan, as then designed, was in compliance with the applicable requirements of the Internal Revenue Code. The Plan has been amended since receiving the determination letter. However, the Plan administrator and the Plan’s tax counsel believe that the Plan is currently designed and being operated in compliance with the applicable requirements of the Internal Revenue Code. Therefore, they believe that the Plan was qualified and the related trust was tax-exempt as of the financial statement date.
- 34) The Plan (and the trust established under the Plan) is qualified under the appropriate section of the Internal Revenue Code and we intend to continue them as a qualified plan (and trust). The Plan sponsor has operated the Plan (and trust) in a manner that did not jeopardize this tax status. Required nondiscrimination testing related to Code Section 401(k) and 401(m) arrangements, as applicable, has been completed for the Plan, and any excess deferrals or contributions have been disposed of in accordance with regulations.
- 35) The Plan has complied with the DOL’s regulations concerning the timely remittance of participant contributions to trusts containing assets for the Plan.
- 36) The Plan has complied with the fidelity bonding requirements of ERISA.
- 37) We have apprised you of all communications, whether written or oral, with regulatory agencies concerning the operation of the Plan.
- 38) We have obtained appropriate fee disclosures from covered service providers and have concluded the fees are reasonable. The Plan is in compliance with DOL regulations regarding ERISA Section 408(b)(2).
- 39) We acknowledge that the engagement for the years ended September 30, 2024 and 2023 are distinct and separate engagements.

- 40) We believe the form and content of the supplemental schedule is presented in conformity with the DOL’s Rules and Regulations of Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA.

Scope and Nature of the ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) Audit

We have performed audits of the accompanying financial statements of the Hannahville Indian Community 401(k) Plan, an employee benefit plan subject to the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (ERISA), as permitted by ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) [ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) audit]. The financial statements comprise the statements of net assets available for benefits as of September 30, 2024 and 2023, and the related statements of changes in net assets available for benefits for the years ended September 30, 2024 and 2023, and the related notes to the financial statements.

Management, having determined it is permissible in the circumstances, has elected to have the audits of the Hannahville Indian Community 401(k) Plan's financial statements performed in accordance with ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) pursuant to 29 CFR 2520.103-8 of the Department of Labor's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA. As permitted by ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C), our audits need not extend to any statements or information related to assets held for investment of the plan (investment information) by a bank or similar institution or insurance carrier that is regulated, supervised, and subject to periodic examination by a state or federal agency, provided that the statements or information regarding assets so held are prepared and certified to by the bank or similar institution or insurance carrier in accordance with 29 CFR 2520.103-5 of the Department of Labor's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA (qualified institution).

Management has obtained certifications from a qualified institution as of September 30, 2024 and 2023, and for the years ended September 30, 2024 and 2023, stating that the certified investment information, as described in Note E to the financial statements, is complete and accurate.

Opinion

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS**

NOTE A – DESCRIPTION OF PLAN

The following description of the Hannahville Indian Community 401(k) Plan provides only general information. Participants should refer to the Plan document for a more complete description of the Plan's provisions.

General – The Plan is a defined contribution plan covering all eligible employees of Hannahville Indian Community Business-Type activities (“Employer”). Eligible employees are regular employees who have 1,000 hours of service during a relevant counting period not to exceed 12 months and have attained the age of 18. The Plan is subject to the provisions of the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (ERISA). The Plan was established October 1, 2006. Beginning with the 2024 fiscal plan year, long term part time employees who meet reduced eligibility requirements will be eligible to defer contributions to the plan. Long term part time employees will not be eligible for employer match or discretionary contributions.

Contributions – Participants may contribute to the Plan by means of a wage deferral agreement. They may defer, in whole percentages, up to the maximum amount permitted by the applicable federal pension law, \$23,000 and \$22,500 for 2024 and 2023, respectively; with an additional catch-up amount of \$7,500 for both 2024 and 2023 for individuals aged 50 and over. Participants may also contribute amounts representing distributions from other qualified plans.

The employer may make discretionary contributions as determined annually by the Hannahville Indian Community Tribal Council. Such contributions will be allocated among eligible participants in proportion to each participant's W-2 compensation received during the plan year, excluding tips. The current discretionary contribution rate is five percent for plan years 2024 and 2023, respectively. The employer may also make matching contributions; none were made in 2024 or 2023.

Participant Accounts – Each participant's account is credited with the participant's contribution, plan earnings (losses), the annual discretionary employer contribution, if applicable, and charged with an allocation of any administrative expenses paid by the plan. Allocations are based on participant earnings, account balances, or specific participant transactions, as defined. Participants designate the investment options into which contributions are allocated. The benefit to which a participant is entitled is the benefit that can be provided from the participant's vested account.

Refunds – The Plan is subject to the discrimination testing required per ERISA. Pursuant to the ERISA testing, excess contributions made by highly compensated employees, if any, will be refunded according to IRS requirements.

NOTE A – DESCRIPTION OF PLAN (continued)

Vesting – Participants are immediately vested in their deferral contributions plus actual earnings thereon. Vesting in the Employer’s discretionary contribution portion of their accounts plus actual earnings thereon is based on years of continuous service. Participants will be vested as follows:

Years of Service	Vested Percentage	Forfeited Percentage

Investment Options – Upon enrollment in the Plan, a participant may direct employee and employer discretionary contributions among forty-nine investment options. Participants may redirect their investment options any time via the telephone or internet directly with the record keeper.

Notes Receivable from Participants – Under the plan, participants may borrow up to 50% of the balance, to which they are 100% vested, up to a maximum of \$50,000. The notes are secured by the balance in the participant’s account and bear interest at rates ranging from 4.25% - 9.50%, which are commensurate with local prevailing rates as determined by the Plan administrator. The loan requires level amortization payments over not more than 5 years or if the loan is used to acquire a dwelling unit the repayment period shall not exceed 15 years.

Payment of Benefits – Upon termination of service, a participant may elect to receive either the entire value of their account as a lump-sum distribution of cash or a direct transfer to another qualified retirement plan, a Code Section 403(b) tax deferred annuity, a governmental 457 plan or an IRA. In-service distributions are allowed upon attaining age 59 1/2.

Forfeited Account - For the years ended September 30, 2024 and 2023, there was \$19,669 and \$9,871, respectively, in forfeited non-vested accounts which will be used to reduce the employer’s discretionary contributions when paid in the subsequent year. In 2024 and 2023, \$10,217 and \$7,669 respectively, was used to offset the employer’s discretionary contribution as it related to the amount recorded as accrued employer contributions receivable as of September 30, 2023 and 2022.

NOTE A – DESCRIPTION OF PLAN (concluded)

Plan Expenses – The attorney, accountant, and auditor expenses necessary to administer the Plan were paid by the Employer, and are therefore excluded from these financial statements. To both reduce fees being charged to participants and improve transparency, in 2018 the Plan switched from John Hancock Class 5 funds to Class 0 funds. This change discontinued the netting of fees with returns and instead lowered the expense ratio per fund while directly charging participants an asset based fee for platform, third-party administration, and investment advisor fees. Effectively, this grossed up investment returns and plan expenses instead of netting them together. Additionally, it reduced net fees by an average of 20 basis points across all funds. During plan year 2024 and 2023, \$107,761 and \$93,007, respectively, of expenses were paid from participant accounts.

NOTE B – SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Use of Estimates – The preparation of financial statements in conformity with U.S. generally accepted accounting principles requires the plan administrator to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of net assets available for benefits and changes therein. Accordingly, actual results may differ from those estimates.

Basis of Accounting - The financial statements of the Plan are prepared using the accrual method of accounting.

Subsequent Events – Management evaluates events occurring subsequent to the date of the financial statements in determining the accounting for and disclosure of transactions and events that affect the financial statements. Subsequent events have been evaluated through July 10, 2025, the date of the accompanying independent auditors’ report, which is the date the financial statements were available to be issued.

Fair Value Determination - As described in FASB ASC 962-325, investment contracts held by a defined-contribution plan are required to be reported at fair value. However, contract value is the relevant measurement attribute for that portion of the net assets available for benefits of a defined-contribution plan attributable to fully benefit-responsive investment contracts because contract value is the amount participants would receive if they were to initiate permitted transactions under the terms of the plan. The plan invests in mutual funds through Pooled Separate Accounts under a group annuity contract. The group annuity contract is not “fully benefit responsive” as defined by FASB ASC 962-325. Therefore, for financial statement purposes, these contracts are carried at fair value. The Statement of Changes in Net Assets Available for Benefits is also prepared on a fair value basis.

NOTE B—SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (concluded)

Notes Receivable from Participants – Notes receivable from participants are reported at their unpaid principal balances plus any accrued but unpaid interest. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Related fees are charged directly to the borrowing participant's account and are included in administrative expenses when incurred. As of September 30, 2024 and 2023, no allowance for credit losses has been recorded. If a participant does not make loan payments and the plan administrator considers the participant loan to be in default, the loan is reduced, and the delinquent participant note receivable is recorded as a benefit payment based on the terms of the Plan document.

Investment Valuation and Income Recognition – The Plan's investments are stated at fair value. Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. The Plan's interest in the group annuity contract is based on the fair value of the group annuity contract's underlying investments as based on information reported by the investment advisor using the audited financial statements of the group annuity contract at year-end. Purchases and sales of securities are recorded on a trade-date basis. Interest and dividend income is recorded at the sub-account level and is not applicable to the group annuity contract holdings and are therefore not recorded at the participant level.

Payment of Benefits – Benefits are recorded when paid.

NOTE C – PLAN TERMINATION

Although it has not expressed any intent to do so, the Employer has the right under the Plan to discontinue its contributions at any time and to terminate the Plan subject to the provisions of ERISA. In the event of Plan termination, participants will become 100% vested in their accounts.

NOTE D – TAX STATUS

The IRS has determined and informed the Plan sponsor by a letter dated February 7, 2022, that the Plan and related trust are designed in accordance with applicable sections of the Internal Revenue Code (IRC). Although the Plan may have been amended since receiving the determination letter, the Plan administrators and the Plan's attorney believe that the Plan is designed, and is currently being operated, in compliance with the applicable requirements of the IRC and, therefore, believe that the Plan is qualified, and the related trust is tax-exempt.

NOTE D – TAX STATUS (concluded)

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require the plan administrator to evaluate tax positions taken by the Plan and recognize a tax liability for any uncertain position that more likely than not would not be sustained upon examination by the IRS. The Plan is subject to routine audits by tax authorities; however, there are currently no audits for any tax periods in progress. The Plan administrator believes the Plan is no longer subject to income tax examinations for years prior to 2020.

The following information included in the accompanying financial statements and supplemental schedule was obtained from data prepared and certified to as complete and accurate by John Hancock Life Insurance Company (U.S.A.).

NOTE F – CONTRIBUTIONS RECEIVABLE

The employer may make discretionary contributions as determined annually by the Hannahville Indian Community Tribal Council. For Plan year 2024 and 2023, the discretionary contribution was set at 5% of each eligible participant’s W-2 compensation received during the plan year, excluding tips. A discretionary contribution in the amount of \$837,678 and \$824,155 respectively, was accrued at September 30, 2024 and 2023.

NOTE G – RISKS AND UNCERTAINTIES

The Plan invests in various investment securities. Investment securities are exposed to various risks such as interest rate, market, and credit risks. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investment securities, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in the values of investment securities will occur in the near term and that such changes could materially affect participants' account balances and the amounts reported in the statement of net assets available for benefits.

NOTE H – NOTES RECEIVABLE FROM PARTICIPANTS

During 2024 and 2023 there were 37 and 25 loans issued in the amounts of \$478,656 and \$194,621, respectively. During 2024, there were 11 loans that defaulted in the amount of \$49,778. There were 12 loans that defaulted in 2023 in the amount of \$31,588. At September 30, 2024 and 2023, \$723,067 and \$580,169 respectively, remained outstanding. Delinquent notes receivable from participants are recorded as a distribution based upon the terms of the plan document.

NOTE I – INVESTMENT CONTRACT WITH INSURANCE COMPANY

In 2007, the Plan entered into a non benefit-responsive group annuity contract with John Hancock Life Insurance Company (John Hancock USA). Contributions under the contract are allocated to sub-accounts which invest solely in shares of an underlying mutual fund. These sub-accounts offer investment options that invest in mutual funds managed by unaffiliated mutual fund companies or mutual funds managed by John Hancock Investment Management Services, LLC and sub-advised by MFC Global Investment Management or unaffiliated third parties.

As described in Note B, the John Hancock USA ARA group annuity contract is not fully benefit-responsive, because contract provisions allow that certain transactions, depending on the investment options chosen by the participant, the withdrawal amount, and the reason for the withdrawal, may be subject to a market value adjustment at withdrawal. Therefore, for financial statement purposes, these contracts must be carried at fair value.

Under the terms of the contract, "benefit" means any payment to which a participant becomes entitled under the terms of the Plan by reason of death, disability, retirement, termination of employment, or in-service withdrawals as permitted by the Plan in effect as of the effective date of the contract.

NOTE J – RELATED PARTY TRANSACTIONS

Certain Plan investments are shares of mutual funds managed by John Hancock. John Hancock is the record keeper as defined by the Plan and, therefore, these transactions qualify as party-in interest transactions. Total record keeping fees are listed in Note A. Professional fees for the administration and audit of the plan were paid by the Plan Sponsor. All of these party-in-interest transactions are exempt from the prohibited transaction rules of ERISA.

NOTE K – FAIR VALUE MEASUREMENTS

The Plan's investments are reported at fair value in the accompanying statements of net assets available for benefits.

FASB ASC 820-10 establishes a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. This hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (level 1) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (level 3). The three levels of the fair value hierarchy under FASB ASC 820 are described as follows:

Level 1 Inputs to the valuation methodology are unadjusted quoted prices for identical assets or liabilities in active markets that the Plan has the ability to access.

Level 2 Inputs to the valuation methodology include:

- Quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities in active markets
- Quoted prices for identical or similar assets or liabilities in inactive markets;
- Inputs other than quotes prices that are observable for the asset or liability;
- Inputs that are derived principally from or corroborated by observable market data by correlation or other means.

If the asset or liability has a specified (contractual) term, the level 2 input must be observable for substantially the full term of the asset or liability.

Level 3 Inputs to the valuation methodology are unobservable and significant to the fair value measurement

The asset or liability's fair value measurement level within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of any input that is significant to the fair value measurement. Valuation techniques maximize the use of relevant observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs.

Following is a description of the valuation methodologies used for assets measured at fair value. There have been no changes in the methodologies used at September 30, 2024 and 2023.

Mutual Funds: Valued at the daily closing price as reported by the fund. Mutual funds held by the Plan are open-ended mutual funds that are registered with the SEC. These funds are required to publish their daily net asset value (NAV) and to transact at that price. The mutual funds held by the Plan are deemed to be actively traded.

There are no Plan assets requiring the use of Level 2 or Level 3 inputs for the periods presented.

The fair value of the Plan’s shares in pooled separate accounts is based upon quoted share prices of the underlying mutual fund shares held by the pooled account. The pooled accounts value, as determined by the fair value of the underlying mutual fund shares, is allocated by John Hancock, USA into units of the pooled separate account. As dividends are received from the underlying mutual funds, the dividends are reinvested into additional shares of the mutual fund. Similarly, administrative maintenance fees are paid by selling sufficient shares of the respective underlying mutual fund. The charges reduce the price per unit of the subaccount. By reducing the unit price the cost is effectively allocated among all participants, according to the units each hold. Therefore, the unit value of the John Hancock USA sub-accounts differ from the share value of the underlying mutual fund, yet the fair value of the sub-account is directly determined by the quoted market prices of the underlying shares of the respective mutual fund.

Gains and losses (realized and unrealized) included in changes in net assets available for benefits for the years ended September 30, 2024 and 2023 are reported in net appreciation/ (depreciation) in fair value of investments.

NOTE K – FAIR VALUE MEASUREMENTS (concluded)

The Plan's policy is to recognize transfers between Levels 1 and 2 and into and out of Level 3 as of the date of the event or change in circumstances that caused the transfer. For the years ended September 30, 2024 and 2023, there were no transfers between Levels 1 and 2 and no transfers into or out of Level 3.

NOTE L – ERISA BOND REQUIREMENT

The Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (ERISA) requires that every person who handles funds or other property of the Plan be bonded. The bond coverage is to be determined by the balance of the total plan assets and is required to be at least equal to the lesser of 10% of the Plan's assets at the beginning of the plan year or \$500,000. On September 30, 2024 and 2023, the Plan's sponsor maintained bond coverage in the amount of \$500,000 each year.

NOTE M – BENEFIT OBLIGATIONS

Net assets available for benefits at September 30, 2024 and 2023 included \$1,427,933 and \$1,677,067, respectively, allocated to the accounts of persons who as of, or prior to, that date had withdrawn from participating in the operations of the Plan. The affected participants have elected to defer distribution as allowed by the Plan.
