Opinion

Note A: Description of Plan

The following description of the Washington Financial Bank Group Health Care Plan (the Plan) provides only general information. Participants should refer to the Plan agreement for a complete description of the Plan's provisions.

General

The Plan provides access to medical benefits covering all eligible employees of Washington Financial Bank. The Plan was established on September 1, 2013. It is subject to the provisions of the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (ERISA), as amended. On September 1, 2013, the Plan established a trust with an initial accounting period September 1, 2013 to September 30, 2013.

Consortium

The Plan belongs to a Consortium, which is designed to provide cost effective employee benefit programs for members and is a self-funded group-purchasing consortium that offers medical and prescription drug coverage for its members. Coverage programs are developed specific to each member's healthcare needs and the related premiums for coverage are determined through the application of uniform underwriting criteria. Variable plan options are available to members. These plans vary primarily by deductibles, coinsurance levels, office visit co-pays, and out-of-pocket maximums.

The Consortium is a self-insured program with stop loss and aggregate reimbursement arrangements in place to limit the liability of its members. The premium charged and collected from each of the members is fully funded.

The members pay fees that are based on the number of employees enrolled. These fees are charged to cover professional fees and other administrative expenses.

Members sign an agreement, which provides that each member agrees to pay all funding rates associated with the coverage it selects; as such, funding rates are set and billed to the members by various carriers, and premiums are billed and paid on a monthly basis. The assigned funding rates consist of administrative fees, stop loss and aggregate premium expense, expected claim costs, and reserves.

The Consortium has an agreement with Webber Advisors to provide agent management, underwriting, claims management, risk management, accounting, and system support services. Webber Advisors, in turn, has a Consulting Services Agreement with the Benecon Group, Inc. to provide insurance brokerage services for the Consortium.

Consortium members have an obligation to reimburse for all paid claims (less than the specific stop loss) up to the cumulative maximum liability limit (aggregate). The obligation to reimburse for any excess over the cumulative maximum liability limit is only to the extent that in any month there is a positive difference (monthly surplus) between cumulative paid claims and the cumulative maximum liability limit (aggregate). There is no obligation to pay any excess to the aggregate (cumulative monthly liability limit) other than through this funding arrangement. Monthly timing of paid claims may be such that a Consortium member may need to advance a payment that exceeds cumulative claims funds deposited to date until an aggregate claim reimbursement is received. Anticipated stop loss reimbursements are recorded as an operating receivable.

Note A: Description of Plan (Continued)

Benefits

The Plan provides access to medical benefits to eligible participants (with at least 30 hours of work per week) and to their beneficiaries and covered dependents.

Medical benefits of active participants, dependents, and beneficiaries under the Plan are provided through insurance policies within the trust.

Contributions

Generally, the cost of the Plan will be paid in part by the employer out of its general assets and in part by participants with pre-tax contributions.

Note B: Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Date of Management's Review

Subsequent events were evaluated through July 11, 2025, which is the date the financial statements were available to be issued.

Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America ("GAAP") requires the plan administrator to make estimates and assumptions that affect certain reported amounts of assets and liabilities and changes therein, and disclosures of contingent assets and liabilities. Accordingly, actual results may differ from those estimates.

Valuation of Investments

The Plan's investments are stated at fair value.

Other Plan Benefits

Plan obligations at September 30, for medical claims incurred by active participants but not reported at that date, are estimated by the Plan's actuary in accordance with accepted actuarial principles.

Basis of Accounting

The financial statements of the Plan are prepared on the accrual basis of accounting.

Note C: Other Matters

The trust established under the Plan to hold the Plan's assets is intended to qualify pursuant to Section 501(c)(9) of the Internal Revenue Code and, accordingly, the trust's net investment income is exempt from income taxes. The Plan as amended has not applied nor received a tax ruling determination letter from the IRS. The Plan sponsor believes that the trust, as amended, continues to qualify and to operate in accordance with applicable provisions of the Internal Revenue Code.

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require the plan administrator to evaluate tax positions taken by the Plan and recognize a tax liability for any uncertain position that more likely than not would not be sustained upon examination

by the IRS. The Plan is subject to routine audits by tax authorities; however, there are currently no audits for any tax periods in progress. The Plan administrator believes the Plan is no longer subject to income tax examinations for years prior to 2021.

Note D: Fair Value Measurements

The Plan's investments are reported at fair value in the accompanying statement of net assets available for benefits. The methods used to measure fair value may produce an amount that may not be indicative of net realizable value or reflective of future fair values. Furthermore, although the Plan believes its valuation methods are appropriate and consistent with other market participants, the use of different methodologies or assumptions to determine the fair value of certain financial instruments could result in a different fair value measurement at the reporting date.

The fair value measurement accounting literature establishes a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. This hierarchy consists of three broad levels: Level 1 inputs consist of unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets and have the highest priority, and Level 3 inputs are unobservable and have the lowest priority. The Plan uses appropriate valuation techniques based on the available inputs to measure the fair value of its investments. When available, the Plan measures fair value using Level 1 inputs because they generally provide the most reliable evidence of fair value. No Level 2 or 3 inputs were available to the Plan.

The Plan's policy is to recognize transfer of investments into or out of Level 3 as of the date of the event or change in circumstances that caused the transfer. For the years ended September 30, 2024 and 2023, there were no transfers of investments into or out of Level 3.

There have been no changes in the methodologies used or level designations at September 30, 2024 and 2023.

Premiums collected in advance of applicable coverage years or reimbursements applied to plan costs are classified as deferred revenue.

Note F: Benefit Obligations

Plan Benefits

Plan obligations at September 30, 2024 and 2023 for medical claims incurred by active participants but not reported at that date, for accumulated eligibility of participants, have been estimated by the Plan's actuary in accordance with accepted actuarial principles. Plan obligations at September 30, 2024 and 2023 were estimated at \$293,645 and \$317,954.

Note G: Stop Loss Insurance

The Plan has stop loss insurance coverage with Unimerica Insurance Company.

Note H: Risks and Uncertainties

The Plan invests in various investments. Investments are exposed to various risks such as interest rate, market, and credit risks. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investments, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in the values of investments will occur in the near term and that such changes could materially affect the amounts reported in the statement of net assets available for benefits.

The actuarial present value of benefit obligations is reported based on certain assumptions, which are subject to change. Due to uncertainties inherent in the estimations and assumptions process, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in these estimates and assumptions in the near-term would be material to the financial statements.

Note I: Administrative Expenses

The Plan pays administrative expenses that consist primarily of administrative fees paid to third-party claims administrators, the trustee, and actuary. These expenses are reported on the statement of changes in net assets available for benefits as administrative expenses. Certain administrative expenses are paid by the Company and excluded from these financial statements. (See Note K.)

Note J: Termination of the Plan

Although it has not expressed any intention to do so, the Company has the right under the Plan to modify the benefits provided to and contributions required of participants to discontinue its contributions at any time and to terminate the Plan subject to the provisions of ERISA.

Note K: Related Party and Party-In-Interest Transactions

Certain administrative functions of the Plan are performed by officers or employees of Washington Financial Bank. No such officer or employee receives compensation from the Plan.

The Plan's trust account is with Peoples Security Bank and Trust Company which is used by the consortium and plan.

As described in Notes A and G, the Plan has several arrangements with service providers. These transactions are party-in-interest transactions under ERISA.

Administrative expenses paid by the plan consisted of \$95,059 of administrator fees and \$97,029 of management fees.

Note L: Distribution of Surplus Funds

Each year, after the Annual Aggregate report is completed, a member of the Consortium with surplus funds may or may not elect to distribute those funds in the form of a credit against future monthly funding cost.

Note M: Fidelity Bonding

The Plan Sponsor has been advised by outside counsel that the Plan qualifies for an exemption from the ERISA fidelity bond requirements under both the statute and pursuant to regulation. The regulatory exemption is broader and provides that "banking institutions and trust companies" that are subject to regulations and examination by the OCC, FED, or FDIC are exempt from the requirement to obtain fidelity bond with respect to welfare or pension benefit plans subject to ERISA. Since each consortium member acts as fiduciary for its own plan, and since each member is subject to regulation and examination by one of the federal regulators, the plans are deemed to be exempt from the requirement to obtain and maintain a fidelity bond.

Note N: Concentration of Credit Risk

The Plan maintains investments in a money market account at financial institutions, which at times during the period exceed the federally insured limit of \$250,000. As of September 30, 2024 and 2023, the amount of deposits at the financial institutions in excess of the insured limits was \$21,920 and \$0, respectively.
