Scope and Nature of the ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) Audit

We have performed audits of the financial statements of Ichor Systems, Inc. NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS
DECEMBER 31, 2024 AND 2023

1. Description of Plan

The following description of the Ichor Systems, Inc. Retirement Savings Plan (the "Plan") provides only general information. Participants should refer to the Plan document for a more complete description of the Plan's provisions.

a. General

The Plan is a defined contribution savings and profit sharing plan established November 16, 2009 by Ichor Systems, Inc. (the "Company") under the provisions of Section 401(a) of the Internal Revenue Code ("IRC"), which includes a qualified cash or deferred arrangement as described in Section 401(k) of the IRC, for the benefit of eligible employees of the Company. The Plan is administered by the Company. The Plan is subject to the provisions of the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 ("ERISA"), as amended. The Plan is administered by the Ichor Systems, Inc. Investment Committee.

b. Eligibility

Employees of the Company are eligible to participate in the Plan upon employment (except employees covered by a collective bargaining agreement, independent contractors, leased employees, residents of Puerto Rico, nonresident aliens and temporary employees). There are no age or service requirements to participate in the Plan.

c. Participant Contributions

Unless an eligible employee affirmatively elects otherwise, the employee is automatically enrolled in the Plan at a deferral rate of 3%. Participants that make their contribution election may defer up to 75% of their eligible compensation, limited by requirements of the IRC. Upon reaching the age of 50, eligible employees may make additional catch-up contributions as allowed by the IRC. Participants may also roll over amounts representing distributions from other qualified defined benefit or defined contribution plans into the Plan.

d. Employer Contributions

The Company matches 50% of the first 8% deferred. The Company may also make additional contributions to the Plan at the discretion of the Company's board of directors, subject to the limits of the IRC. No additional discretionary contributions were made during 2024 or 2023.

e. Participant Accounts

Individual accounts are maintained for each of the Plan's participants to reflect the participant's contributions, the Company's contributions, and an allocation of the Plan's earnings and expenses. Participants can direct their account into a variety of investments offered by Vanguard. The benefit to which a participant is currently entitled is the benefit that can be provided from the participant's vested account

f. Vesting

Participants are fully vested at all times in the portion of their accounts attributable to their own contributions, employer matching contributions, discretionary contributions and employer

nonelective contributions and earnings thereon. Prior to August 7, 2018, participants became 34% vested in the portion of their accounts attributable to Company matching and discretionary contributions and earnings thereon after one year of service, 67% vested after two years of service and were fully vested after three years of service. A participant becomes fully vested in the event a participant attains normal retirement age while an employee, becomes disabled or dies.

g. Payment of Benefits

Upon reaching retirement age or ten years of Plan participation, termination of service, disability or death, a participant or beneficiary may be paid a lump-sum amount equal to all or part of the participant's vested account balance, or may elect to receive substantially equal installments. Account balances less than \$5,000 but greater than \$1,000, may be distributed in the form of a direct rollover to an individual retirement account designated by the Plan Administrator. Account balances less than \$1,000 are distributed in a single lump-sum cash payment to the participant or beneficiary.

h. Hardship Withdrawals

Upon certain conditions, participants, while still employed by the Company, are permitted to withdraw, in a single sum, a portion of their vested account balance as a result of an immediate and heavy financial need. These conditions include unreimbursed medical expenses, the purchase of the participant's principal residence, the payment of post-secondary education tuition, the payment of burial or funeral costs of immediate family members, the payment of expenses for the repair of damage to a participant's principal residence that would qualify for the casualty deduction under IRC, the payment of natural disaster clean-up on the participant's principal residence or to prevent eviction or foreclosure from the participant's principal residence.

i. Notes Receivable from Participants

Participants may borrow the lesser of \$50,000 or 50% of their vested account balance, subject to certain restrictions. Loans are secured by the vested account balance of the participant. Loans are repayable through payroll deductions over periods ranging up to five years, unless the loan is used to acquire a principal residence, in which case the loan term may be extended to fifteen years. The interest rate on participant loans is a rate consistent with similar type loans and is fixed at the inception of the loan. The interest rates on outstanding loans at December 31, 2024 ranged from 1.00% to 9.50% and mature through 2049.

j. Forfeitures

The forfeited accounts of non-vested terminated participants may be used to pay administrative expenses of the Plan or to reduce future Company contributions. There were no forfeitures utilized to pay employer contributions in 2024 and \$36,000 utilized in 2023. Forfeitures available to reduce future contributions or to pay administrative expenses were approximately \$18,000 and \$8,000 at December 31, 2024 and 2023, respectively.

2. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

a. Basis of Accounting

The accompanying financial statements have been prepared on the accrual basis of accounting in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America ("GAAP").

b. Use of Estimates

The preparation of the financial statements in conformity with GAAP requires management of the Plan to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and changes therein, and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

c. Investment Valuation and Income Recognition

Investments are reported at fair value. Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. See Note 4 for a discussion of fair value measurements.

Net appreciation in fair value of investments consists of the net change in unrealized gains or losses during the year and the realized gain or loss on investments sold during the year. Purchases and sales of securities are recorded on a trade-date basis. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis and dividends are recorded on the ex-dividend date.

d. Notes Receivable from Participants

Notes receivable from participants are recorded at their unpaid principal balance plus any accrued but unpaid interest. Delinquent notes receivable from participants may be treated as a distribution based on the terms of the Plan document.

e. Payment of Benefits

Benefits are recorded when paid.

f. Expenses

Administrative costs, including trustee, recordkeeping, legal and accounting fees, are paid by the Company. Direct expenses totaling approximately \$163,000 and \$180,000 were paid by the Plan during 2024 and 2023, respectively. Certain expenses are included in the transaction prices of investments bought and sold and cannot be separately quantified.

g. Subsequent Events

The Plan has evaluated subsequent events with respect to the Plan through July 21, 2025, the date the financial statements were available for issuance.

3. Investments

Plan investment assets are held by Vanguard. Participants can direct their accounts among a money market fund, various mutual funds, a pooled separate account and self-directed brokerage accounts.

The New York Life Anchor Account IV Fund (the “Anchor Account”) is a pooled separate account group annuity contract, primarily investing in fixed income securities. The Plan’s interest in the Anchor Account is equal to the contributions made to the account, plus interest and dividends, less expenses and distributions. New York Life Investors LLC accrues interest earnings based on the daily interest rate which is reflective of the underlying separate account investments. In no event will such effective annual interest rate be less than 0%. Participants may ordinarily direct the withdrawal or transfer of all or a portion of their investment in the Anchor Account at net asset value (“NAV”) which equals the contract value. The Plan’s group annuity contract specifies certain conditions under which distributions from the contract would be payable at amounts below contract value. These conditions are in the contract and include events initiated by the Plan sponsor including, but not limited to, plan termination, layoffs, early retirement programs, or bankruptcy. Earnings from the investment in the pooled separate account are included in dividends and interest income on the accompanying statements of changes in net assets available for benefits.

4. Fair Value Measurements

Accounting Standards Codification (“ASC”) 820, *Fair Value Measurement*, establishes a framework for fair value measurement, which provides a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. The hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (Level 1 measurements) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (Level 3 measurements). The three levels of the fair value hierarchy under ASC 820 are described below:

Level 1 – Inputs to the valuation methodology are unadjusted quoted prices for identical assets or liabilities in active markets that the Plan has the ability to access.

Level 2 – Inputs to the valuation methodology include:

- Quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities in active markets;
- Quoted prices for identical or similar assets or liabilities in inactive markets;
- Inputs other than quoted prices that are observable for the asset or liability;
- Inputs that are derived principally from or corroborated by observable market data by correlation or other means.

If the asset or liability has a specified (contractual) term, the Level 2 input must be observable for substantially the full term of the asset or liability.

Level 3 – Inputs to the valuation methodology are unobservable and significant to the fair value measurement.

The asset’s or liability’s fair value measurement level within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of any input that is significant to the fair value measurement. Valuation techniques used need to maximize the use of observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs.

The following is a description of the valuation methodologies used for investment assets measured at fair value. There have been no changes in the methodologies used at December 31, 2024 and 2023.

Money market fund and mutual funds: Valued at fair value based on quoted market prices at year end.

Self-directed brokerage accounts: The underlying investments held in the self-directed brokerage accounts are common stocks, mutual funds, and a money market fund and are valued at fair value based on quoted market prices at year end.

Pooled separate account: The Plan's interest in the pooled separate account is based on the fair value of the underlying investments as based on information reported by the investment advisor using the daily reported NAV of the pooled separate account at year-end. The NAV is used as a practical expedient to estimate fair value.

The objective of the pooled separate account is to seek the preservation of capital and to provide a competitive level of income over time that is consistent with the preservation of capital. To achieve its investment objective, the pooled separate account invests in assets (typically fixed-income securities or bond funds and may include derivative instruments such as futures contracts and swap agreements), enters into wrap contracts issued by third-parties and invests in cash equivalents represented by shares in money market funds.

5. Risks and Uncertainties

The Plan assets are invested in a variety of investments. Investment securities, in general, are exposed to various risks, such as interest rate, credit, foreign currency and overall market volatility risks. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investment securities, it is reasonably possible that changes in the values of investment securities will occur in the near term and that such changes could materially affect the amounts reported in the statements of net assets available for benefits, and therefore participant account balances.

6. Information Certified by the Trustee

The Plan Administrator has elected the method of annual reporting compliance permitted by 29 CFR 2520.103-8 of the Department of Labor's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA. The following information included in the financial statements and supplemental schedule was provided and certified by Vanguard Fiduciary Trust Company, the trustee, as of December 31, 2024 and 2023 and for the years then ended as complete and accurate.

- Notes receivable from participants
- Investment income
- Interest on notes receivable from participants
- Schedule of assets (held at end of year)

7. Party-in-interest Transactions

Certain Plan investment funds are managed by Vanguard Investments, an affiliate of Vanguard. Vanguard is the trustee, as defined by the Plan. Certain investment fees are paid by the trustee and are reflected in the investment income for the year. The Plan also issues loans to participants that are secured by the vested balance in the participants' accounts. As such, these transactions qualify as party-in-interest transactions, which are exempt from the prohibited transaction rules.

Additionally, the Plan sponsor, Ichor Systems, Inc., is a party-in-interest to the Plan. The transactions between the Plan and the Plan sponsor included funding of contributions to the Plan and payment of certain administrative expenses of the Plan, which are exempt transactions.

8. Tax Status

Effective January 1, 2022, the Plan was restated using the Vanguard Fiduciary Trust Company Volume Submitter 401(k) Profit Sharing Plan document. Vanguard received an opinion letter from the Internal Revenue Service ("IRS") on June 30, 2020 in which the IRS stated that the Plan, as then designed, was in compliance with the applicable requirements of the IRC. Management of the Plan believes the Plan is currently designed and being operated in compliance with the applicable requirements of the IRC. Therefore, they believe that the Plan is qualified and the related trust is tax exempt as of and for the years ended December 31, 2024 and 2023.

Assuming it meets certain initial and ongoing requirements, the Plan is generally exempt from federal and state income taxes. However, GAAP requires Plan management to evaluate tax positions taken by the Plan and recognize a tax liability (or asset) if the Plan has taken an uncertain position that more likely than not would not be sustained upon examination by the IRS. The Plan Administrator has analyzed the tax positions taken by the Plan and has concluded that as of December 31, 2024, there are no uncertain positions taken or expected to be taken that would require recognition of a liability (or asset) or disclosure in the financial statements. The Plan is subject to routine audits by taxing jurisdictions; however, there are currently no audits for any tax periods in progress.

9. Plan Termination

Although it has not expressed any intention to do so, the Company may terminate the Plan at any time subject to the provisions of ERISA. In the event of Plan termination, participants will become fully vested in their accounts.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS
DECEMBER 31, 2024 AND 2023

1. Description of Plan

The following description of the Ichor Systems, Inc. Retirement Savings Plan (the "Plan") provides only general information. Participants should refer to the Plan document for a more complete description of the Plan's provisions.

a. General

The Plan is a defined contribution savings and profit sharing plan established November 16, 2009 by Ichor Systems, Inc. (the "Company") under the provisions of Section 401(a) of the Internal Revenue Code ("IRC"), which includes a qualified cash or deferred arrangement as described in Section 401(k) of the IRC, for the benefit of eligible employees of the Company. The Plan is administered by the Company. The Plan is subject to the provisions of the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 ("ERISA"), as amended. The Plan is administered by the Ichor Systems, Inc. Investment Committee.

b. Eligibility

Employees of the Company are eligible to participate in the Plan upon employment (except employees covered by a collective bargaining agreement, independent contractors, leased employees, residents of Puerto Rico, nonresident aliens and temporary employees). There are no age or service requirements to participate in the Plan.

c. Participant Contributions

Unless an eligible employee affirmatively elects otherwise, the employee is automatically enrolled in the Plan at a deferral rate of 3%. Participants that make their contribution election may defer up to 75% of their eligible compensation, limited by requirements of the IRC. Upon reaching the age of 50, eligible employees may make additional catch-up contributions as allowed by the IRC. Participants may also roll over amounts representing distributions from other qualified defined benefit or defined contribution plans into the Plan.

d. Employer Contributions

The Company matches 50% of the first 8% deferred. The Company may also make additional contributions to the Plan at the discretion of the Company's board of directors, subject to the limits of the IRC. No additional discretionary contributions were made during 2024 or 2023.

e. Participant Accounts

Individual accounts are maintained for each of the Plan's participants to reflect the participant's contributions, the Company's contributions, and an allocation of the Plan's earnings and expenses. Participants can direct their account into a variety of investments offered by Vanguard. The benefit to which a participant is currently entitled is the benefit that can be provided from the participant's vested account

f. Vesting

Participants are fully vested at all times in the portion of their accounts attributable to their own contributions, employer matching contributions, discretionary contributions and employer

nonelective contributions and earnings thereon. Prior to August 7, 2018, participants became 34% vested in the portion of their accounts attributable to Company matching and discretionary contributions and earnings thereon after one year of service, 67% vested after two years of service and were fully vested after three years of service. A participant becomes fully vested in the event a participant attains normal retirement age while an employee, becomes disabled or dies.

g. Payment of Benefits

Upon reaching retirement age or ten years of Plan participation, termination of service, disability or death, a participant or beneficiary may be paid a lump-sum amount equal to all or part of the participant's vested account balance, or may elect to receive substantially equal installments. Account balances less than \$5,000 but greater than \$1,000, may be distributed in the form of a direct rollover to an individual retirement account designated by the Plan Administrator. Account balances less than \$1,000 are distributed in a single lump-sum cash payment to the participant or beneficiary.

h. Hardship Withdrawals

Upon certain conditions, participants, while still employed by the Company, are permitted to withdraw, in a single sum, a portion of their vested account balance as a result of an immediate and heavy financial need. These conditions include unreimbursed medical expenses, the purchase of the participant's principal residence, the payment of post-secondary education tuition, the payment of burial or funeral costs of immediate family members, the payment of expenses for the repair of damage to a participant's principal residence that would qualify for the casualty deduction under IRC, the payment of natural disaster clean-up on the participant's principal residence or to prevent eviction or foreclosure from the participant's principal residence.

i. Notes Receivable from Participants

Participants may borrow the lesser of \$50,000 or 50% of their vested account balance, subject to certain restrictions. Loans are secured by the vested account balance of the participant. Loans are repayable through payroll deductions over periods ranging up to five years, unless the loan is used to acquire a principal residence, in which case the loan term may be extended to fifteen years. The interest rate on participant loans is a rate consistent with similar type loans and is fixed at the inception of the loan. The interest rates on outstanding loans at December 31, 2024 ranged from 1.00% to 9.50% and mature through 2049.

j. Forfeitures

The forfeited accounts of non-vested terminated participants may be used to pay administrative expenses of the Plan or to reduce future Company contributions. There were no forfeitures utilized to pay employer contributions in 2024 and \$36,000 utilized in 2023. Forfeitures available to reduce future contributions or to pay administrative expenses were approximately \$18,000 and \$8,000 at December 31, 2024 and 2023, respectively.

2. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

a. Basis of Accounting

The accompanying financial statements have been prepared on the accrual basis of accounting in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America ("GAAP").

b. Use of Estimates

The preparation of the financial statements in conformity with GAAP requires management of the Plan to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and changes therein, and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

c. Investment Valuation and Income Recognition

Investments are reported at fair value. Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. See Note 4 for a discussion of fair value measurements.

Net appreciation in fair value of investments consists of the net change in unrealized gains or losses during the year and the realized gain or loss on investments sold during the year. Purchases and sales of securities are recorded on a trade-date basis. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis and dividends are recorded on the ex-dividend date.

d. Notes Receivable from Participants

Notes receivable from participants are recorded at their unpaid principal balance plus any accrued but unpaid interest. Delinquent notes receivable from participants may be treated as a distribution based on the terms of the Plan document.

e. Payment of Benefits

Benefits are recorded when paid.

f. Expenses

Administrative costs, including trustee, recordkeeping, legal and accounting fees, are paid by the Company. Direct expenses totaling approximately \$163,000 and \$180,000 were paid by the Plan during 2024 and 2023, respectively. Certain expenses are included in the transaction prices of investments bought and sold and cannot be separately quantified.

g. Subsequent Events

The Plan has evaluated subsequent events with respect to the Plan through July 21, 2025, the date the financial statements were available for issuance.

3. Investments

Plan investment assets are held by Vanguard. Participants can direct their accounts among a money market fund, various mutual funds, a pooled separate account and self-directed brokerage accounts.

The New York Life Anchor Account IV Fund (the “Anchor Account”) is a pooled separate account group annuity contract, primarily investing in fixed income securities. The Plan’s interest in the Anchor Account is equal to the contributions made to the account, plus interest and dividends, less expenses and distributions. New York Life Investors LLC accrues interest earnings based on the daily interest rate which is reflective of the underlying separate account investments. In no event will such effective annual interest rate be less than 0%. Participants may ordinarily direct the withdrawal or transfer of all or a portion of their investment in the Anchor Account at net asset value (“NAV”) which equals the contract value. The Plan’s group annuity contract specifies certain conditions under which distributions from the contract would be payable at amounts below contract value. These conditions are in the contract and include events initiated by the Plan sponsor including, but not limited to, plan termination, layoffs, early retirement programs, or bankruptcy. Earnings from the investment in the pooled separate account are included in dividends and interest income on the accompanying statements of changes in net assets available for benefits.

4. Fair Value Measurements

Accounting Standards Codification (“ASC”) 820, *Fair Value Measurement*, establishes a framework for fair value measurement, which provides a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. The hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (Level 1 measurements) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (Level 3 measurements). The three levels of the fair value hierarchy under ASC 820 are described below:

Level 1 – Inputs to the valuation methodology are unadjusted quoted prices for identical assets or liabilities in active markets that the Plan has the ability to access.

Level 2 – Inputs to the valuation methodology include:

- Quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities in active markets;
- Quoted prices for identical or similar assets or liabilities in inactive markets;
- Inputs other than quoted prices that are observable for the asset or liability;
- Inputs that are derived principally from or corroborated by observable market data by correlation or other means.

If the asset or liability has a specified (contractual) term, the Level 2 input must be observable for substantially the full term of the asset or liability.

Level 3 – Inputs to the valuation methodology are unobservable and significant to the fair value measurement.

The asset’s or liability’s fair value measurement level within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of any input that is significant to the fair value measurement. Valuation techniques used need to maximize the use of observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs.

The following is a description of the valuation methodologies used for investment assets measured at fair value. There have been no changes in the methodologies used at December 31, 2024 and 2023.

Money market fund and mutual funds: Valued at fair value based on quoted market prices at year end.

Self-directed brokerage accounts: The underlying investments held in the self-directed brokerage accounts are common stocks, mutual funds, and a money market fund and are valued at fair value based on quoted market prices at year end.

Pooled separate account: The Plan's interest in the pooled separate account is based on the fair value of the underlying investments as based on information reported by the investment advisor using the daily reported NAV of the pooled separate account at year-end. The NAV is used as a practical expedient to estimate fair value.

The objective of the pooled separate account is to seek the preservation of capital and to provide a competitive level of income over time that is consistent with the preservation of capital. To achieve its investment objective, the pooled separate account invests in assets (typically fixed-income securities or bond funds and may include derivative instruments such as futures contracts and swap agreements), enters into wrap contracts issued by third-parties and invests in cash equivalents represented by shares in money market funds.

5. Risks and Uncertainties

The Plan assets are invested in a variety of investments. Investment securities, in general, are exposed to various risks, such as interest rate, credit, foreign currency and overall market volatility risks. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investment securities, it is reasonably possible that changes in the values of investment securities will occur in the near term and that such changes could materially affect the amounts reported in the statements of net assets available for benefits, and therefore participant account balances.

6. Information Certified by the Trustee

The Plan Administrator has elected the method of annual reporting compliance permitted by 29 CFR 2520.103-8 of the Department of Labor's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA. The following information included in the financial statements and supplemental schedule was provided and certified by Vanguard Fiduciary Trust Company, the trustee, as of December 31, 2024 and 2023 and for the years then ended as complete and accurate.

- Investments, at fair value
- Notes receivable from participants
- Investment income
- Interest on notes receivable from participants
- Schedule of assets (held at end of year)

7. Party-in-interest Transactions

Certain Plan investment funds are managed by Vanguard Investments, an affiliate of Vanguard. Vanguard is the trustee, as defined by the Plan. Certain investment fees are paid by the trustee and are reflected in the investment income for the year. The Plan also issues loans to participants that are secured by the vested balance in the participants' accounts. As such, these transactions qualify as party-in-interest transactions, which are exempt from the prohibited transaction rules.

Additionally, the Plan sponsor, Ichor Systems, Inc., is a party-in-interest to the Plan. The transactions between the Plan and the Plan sponsor included funding of contributions to the Plan and payment of certain administrative expenses of the Plan, which are exempt transactions.

8. Tax Status

Effective January 1, 2022, the Plan was restated using the Vanguard Fiduciary Trust Company Volume Submitter 401(k) Profit Sharing Plan document. Vanguard received an opinion letter from the Internal Revenue Service ("IRS") on June 30, 2020 in which the IRS stated that the Plan, as then designed, was in compliance with the applicable requirements of the IRC. Management of the Plan believes the Plan is currently designed and being operated in compliance with the applicable requirements of the IRC. Therefore, they believe that the Plan is qualified and the related trust is tax exempt as of and for the years ended December 31, 2024 and 2023.

Assuming it meets certain initial and ongoing requirements, the Plan is generally exempt from federal and state income taxes. However, GAAP requires Plan management to evaluate tax positions taken by the Plan and recognize a tax liability (or asset) if the Plan has taken an uncertain position that more likely than not would not be sustained upon examination by the IRS. The Plan Administrator has analyzed the tax positions taken by the Plan and has concluded that as of December 31, 2024, there are no uncertain positions taken or expected to be taken that would require recognition of a liability (or asset) or disclosure in the financial statements. The Plan is subject to routine audits by taxing jurisdictions; however, there are currently no audits for any tax periods in progress.

9. Plan Termination

Although it has not expressed any intention to do so, the Company may terminate the Plan at any time subject to the provisions of ERISA. In the event of Plan termination, participants will become fully vested in their accounts.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS
DECEMBER 31, 2024 AND 2023

1. Description of Plan

The following description of the Ichor Systems, Inc. Retirement Savings Plan (the "Plan") provides only general information. Participants should refer to the Plan document for a more complete description of the Plan's provisions.

a. General

The Plan is a defined contribution savings and profit sharing plan established November 16, 2009 by Ichor Systems, Inc. (the "Company") under the provisions of Section 401(a) of the Internal Revenue Code ("IRC"), which includes a qualified cash or deferred arrangement as described in Section 401(k) of the IRC, for the benefit of eligible employees of the Company. The Plan is administered by the Company. The Plan is subject to the provisions of the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 ("ERISA"), as amended. The Plan is administered by the Ichor Systems, Inc. Investment Committee.

b. Eligibility

Employees of the Company are eligible to participate in the Plan upon employment (except employees covered by a collective bargaining agreement, independent contractors, leased employees, residents of Puerto Rico, nonresident aliens and temporary employees). There are no age or service requirements to participate in the Plan.

c. Participant Contributions

Unless an eligible employee affirmatively elects otherwise, the employee is automatically enrolled in the Plan at a deferral rate of 3%. Participants that make their contribution election may defer up to 75% of their eligible compensation, limited by requirements of the IRC. Upon reaching the age of 50, eligible employees may make additional catch-up contributions as allowed by the IRC. Participants may also roll over amounts representing distributions from other qualified defined benefit or defined contribution plans into the Plan.

d. Employer Contributions

The Company matches 50% of the first 8% deferred. The Company may also make additional contributions to the Plan at the discretion of the Company's board of directors, subject to the limits of the IRC. No additional discretionary contributions were made during 2024 or 2023.

e. Participant Accounts

Individual accounts are maintained for each of the Plan's participants to reflect the participant's contributions, the Company's contributions, and an allocation of the Plan's earnings and expenses. Participants can direct their account into a variety of investments offered by Vanguard. The benefit to which a participant is currently entitled is the benefit that can be provided from the participant's vested account

f. Vesting

Participants are fully vested at all times in the portion of their accounts attributable to their own contributions, employer matching contributions, discretionary contributions and employer

nonelective contributions and earnings thereon. Prior to August 7, 2018, participants became 34% vested in the portion of their accounts attributable to Company matching and discretionary contributions and earnings thereon after one year of service, 67% vested after two years of service and were fully vested after three years of service. A participant becomes fully vested in the event a participant attains normal retirement age while an employee, becomes disabled or dies.

g. Payment of Benefits

Upon reaching retirement age or ten years of Plan participation, termination of service, disability or death, a participant or beneficiary may be paid a lump-sum amount equal to all or part of the participant's vested account balance, or may elect to receive substantially equal installments. Account balances less than \$5,000 but greater than \$1,000, may be distributed in the form of a direct rollover to an individual retirement account designated by the Plan Administrator. Account balances less than \$1,000 are distributed in a single lump-sum cash payment to the participant or beneficiary.

h. Hardship Withdrawals

Upon certain conditions, participants, while still employed by the Company, are permitted to withdraw, in a single sum, a portion of their vested account balance as a result of an immediate and heavy financial need. These conditions include unreimbursed medical expenses, the purchase of the participant's principal residence, the payment of post-secondary education tuition, the payment of burial or funeral costs of immediate family members, the payment of expenses for the repair of damage to a participant's principal residence that would qualify for the casualty deduction under IRC, the payment of natural disaster clean-up on the participant's principal residence or to prevent eviction or foreclosure from the participant's principal residence.

i. Notes Receivable from Participants

Participants may borrow the lesser of \$50,000 or 50% of their vested account balance, subject to certain restrictions. Loans are secured by the vested account balance of the participant. Loans are repayable through payroll deductions over periods ranging up to five years, unless the loan is used to acquire a principal residence, in which case the loan term may be extended to fifteen years. The interest rate on participant loans is a rate consistent with similar type loans and is fixed at the inception of the loan. The interest rates on outstanding loans at December 31, 2024 ranged from 1.00% to 9.50% and mature through 2049.

j. Forfeitures

The forfeited accounts of non-vested terminated participants may be used to pay administrative expenses of the Plan or to reduce future Company contributions. There were no forfeitures utilized to pay employer contributions in 2024 and \$36,000 utilized in 2023. Forfeitures available to reduce future contributions or to pay administrative expenses were approximately \$18,000 and \$8,000 at December 31, 2024 and 2023, respectively.

2. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

a. Basis of Accounting

The accompanying financial statements have been prepared on the accrual basis of accounting in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America ("GAAP").

b. Use of Estimates

The preparation of the financial statements in conformity with GAAP requires management of the Plan to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and changes therein, and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

c. Investment Valuation and Income Recognition

Investments are reported at fair value. Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. See Note 4 for a discussion of fair value measurements.

Net appreciation in fair value of investments consists of the net change in unrealized gains or losses during the year and the realized gain or loss on investments sold during the year. Purchases and sales of securities are recorded on a trade-date basis. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis and dividends are recorded on the ex-dividend date.

d. Notes Receivable from Participants

Notes receivable from participants are recorded at their unpaid principal balance plus any accrued but unpaid interest. Delinquent notes receivable from participants may be treated as a distribution based on the terms of the Plan document.

e. Payment of Benefits

Benefits are recorded when paid.

f. Expenses

Administrative costs, including trustee, recordkeeping, legal and accounting fees, are paid by the Company. Direct expenses totaling approximately \$163,000 and \$180,000 were paid by the Plan during 2024 and 2023, respectively. Certain expenses are included in the transaction prices of investments bought and sold and cannot be separately quantified.

g. Subsequent Events

The Plan has evaluated subsequent events with respect to the Plan through July 21, 2025, the date the financial statements were available for issuance.

3. Investments

Plan investment assets are held by Vanguard. Participants can direct their accounts among a money market fund, various mutual funds, a pooled separate account and self-directed brokerage accounts.

The New York Life Anchor Account IV Fund (the “Anchor Account”) is a pooled separate account group annuity contract, primarily investing in fixed income securities. The Plan’s interest in the Anchor Account is equal to the contributions made to the account, plus interest and dividends, less expenses and distributions. New York Life Investors LLC accrues interest earnings based on the daily interest rate which is reflective of the underlying separate account investments. In no event will such effective annual interest rate be less than 0%. Participants may ordinarily direct the withdrawal or transfer of all or a portion of their investment in the Anchor Account at net asset value (“NAV”) which equals the contract value. The Plan’s group annuity contract specifies certain conditions under which distributions from the contract would be payable at amounts below contract value. These conditions are in the contract and include events initiated by the Plan sponsor including, but not limited to, plan termination, layoffs, early retirement programs, or bankruptcy. Earnings from the investment in the pooled separate account are included in dividends and interest income on the accompanying statements of changes in net assets available for benefits.

4. Fair Value Measurements

Accounting Standards Codification (“ASC”) 820, *Fair Value Measurement*, establishes a framework for fair value measurement, which provides a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. The hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (Level 1 measurements) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (Level 3 measurements). The three levels of the fair value hierarchy under ASC 820 are described below:

Level 1 – Inputs to the valuation methodology are unadjusted quoted prices for identical assets or liabilities in active markets that the Plan has the ability to access.

Level 2 – Inputs to the valuation methodology include:

- Quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities in active markets;
- Quoted prices for identical or similar assets or liabilities in inactive markets;
- Inputs other than quoted prices that are observable for the asset or liability;
- Inputs that are derived principally from or corroborated by observable market data by correlation or other means.

If the asset or liability has a specified (contractual) term, the Level 2 input must be observable for substantially the full term of the asset or liability.

Level 3 – Inputs to the valuation methodology are unobservable and significant to the fair value measurement.

The asset’s or liability’s fair value measurement level within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of any input that is significant to the fair value measurement. Valuation techniques used need to maximize the use of observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs.

The following is a description of the valuation methodologies used for investment assets measured at fair value. There have been no changes in the methodologies used at December 31, 2024 and 2023.

Money market fund and mutual funds: Valued at fair value based on quoted market prices at year end.

Self-directed brokerage accounts: The underlying investments held in the self-directed brokerage accounts are common stocks, mutual funds, and a money market fund and are valued at fair value based on quoted market prices at year end.

Pooled separate account: The Plan's interest in the pooled separate account is based on the fair value of the underlying investments as based on information reported by the investment advisor using the daily reported NAV of the pooled separate account at year-end. The NAV is used as a practical expedient to estimate fair value.

The objective of the pooled separate account is to seek the preservation of capital and to provide a competitive level of income over time that is consistent with the preservation of capital. To achieve its investment objective, the pooled separate account invests in assets (typically fixed-income securities or bond funds and may include derivative instruments such as futures contracts and swap agreements), enters into wrap contracts issued by third-parties and invests in cash equivalents represented by shares in money market funds.

5. Risks and Uncertainties

The Plan assets are invested in a variety of investments. Investment securities, in general, are exposed to various risks, such as interest rate, credit, foreign currency and overall market volatility risks. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investment securities, it is reasonably possible that changes in the values of investment securities will occur in the near term and that such changes could materially affect the amounts reported in the statements of net assets available for benefits, and therefore participant account balances.

6. Information Certified by the Trustee

The Plan Administrator has elected the method of annual reporting compliance permitted by 29 CFR 2520.103-8 of the Department of Labor's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA. The following information included in the financial statements and supplemental schedule was provided and certified by Vanguard Fiduciary Trust Company, the trustee, as of December 31, 2024 and 2023 and for the years then ended as complete and accurate.

- Investments, at fair value
- Notes receivable from participants
- Investment income
- Interest on notes receivable from participants
- Schedule of assets (held at end of year)

7. Party-in-interest Transactions

Certain Plan investment funds are managed by Vanguard Investments, an affiliate of Vanguard. Vanguard is the trustee, as defined by the Plan. Certain investment fees are paid by the trustee and are reflected in the investment income for the year. The Plan also issues loans to participants that are secured by the vested balance in the participants' accounts. As such, these transactions qualify as party-in-interest transactions, which are exempt from the prohibited transaction rules.

Additionally, the Plan sponsor, Ichor Systems, Inc., is a party-in-interest to the Plan. The transactions between the Plan and the Plan sponsor included funding of contributions to the Plan and payment of certain administrative expenses of the Plan, which are exempt transactions.

8. Tax Status

Effective January 1, 2022, the Plan was restated using the Vanguard Fiduciary Trust Company Volume Submitter 401(k) Profit Sharing Plan document. Vanguard received an opinion letter from the Internal Revenue Service ("IRS") on June 30, 2020 in which the IRS stated that the Plan, as then designed, was in compliance with the applicable requirements of the IRC. Management of the Plan believes the Plan is currently designed and being operated in compliance with the applicable requirements of the IRC. Therefore, they believe that the Plan is qualified and the related trust is tax exempt as of and for the years ended December 31, 2024 and 2023.

Assuming it meets certain initial and ongoing requirements, the Plan is generally exempt from federal and state income taxes. However, GAAP requires Plan management to evaluate tax positions taken by the Plan and recognize a tax liability (or asset) if the Plan has taken an uncertain position that more likely than not would not be sustained upon examination by the IRS. The Plan Administrator has analyzed the tax positions taken by the Plan and has concluded that as of December 31, 2024, there are no uncertain positions taken or expected to be taken that would require recognition of a liability (or asset) or disclosure in the financial statements. The Plan is subject to routine audits by taxing jurisdictions; however, there are currently no audits for any tax periods in progress.

9. Plan Termination

Although it has not expressed any intention to do so, the Company may terminate the Plan at any time subject to the provisions of ERISA. In the event of Plan termination, participants will become fully vested in their accounts.
