Basis for Opinion

Our audits did not extend to the certified investment information, except for obtaining and reading the certification, comparing the certified investment information with the related information presented and disclosed in the financial statements, and reading the disclosures relating to the certified investment information to assess whether they are in accordance with the presentation and disclosure requirements of accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Accordingly, the objective of an ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) audit is not to express an opinion about whether the financial statements as a whole are presented fairly, in all material respects, in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

We are required to communicate with those charged with governance regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit, significant audit findings, and certain internal control-related matters that we identified during the audit.



NOTE 1 – DESCRIPTION OF PLAN

BitGo, Inc. 401(k) Plan (the Plan) is a qualified retirement plan, covering substantially all eligible employees of BitGo, Inc. (the Company). The Plan was originally adopted by the Company effective July 25, 2018, to provide employees with the opportunity to save for retirement on a tax-advantaged basis. The Plan was most recently amended and restated effective June 20, 2023. The Plan is subject to the provisions of the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (ERISA) and is administered by the Company.

The summary of significant provisions of the Plan presented below provides general information. Participants should refer to the terms of the plan document for a more complete description of the Plan's provisions.

Eligibility: All non-excluded employees of the Company who have attained age 18 are eligible to participate in the Plan. Eligible employees may enter the Plan on the first day of each month coinciding with or next following the date the eligibility requirements are met.

Contributions: Participants may elect to reduce their compensation by a specific percentage or dollar amount and have that amount contributed to the Plan as a salary deferral, not to exceed the dollar limit which is set by law. There are two types of salary deferrals: pre-tax 401(k) deferrals and Roth 401(k) deferrals. Participants who are at least age 50 or will attain age 50 before the end of a calendar year may elect to defer additional amounts called catch-up contributions. The Plan also has an automatic enrollment feature in which a participant will be automatically enrolled at 1% approximately 30 days after the eligibility requirements are met.

The Company will make a safe-harbor employer contribution equal to a uniform percentage of participants' salary deferrals. For 2024, the safe-harbor matching percentage was 100% of employee deferrals that do not exceed 3% of compensation plus 50% of employee deferrals between 3% and 5% of compensation.

The Company may make a safe harbor enhanced matching contribution, safe harbor nonelective contribution, or a discretionary profit-sharing contribution to the Plan. For 2024, the Company did not make any such contributions to the Plan.

Participants are permitted to deposit into the Plan distributions received from other retirement plans or certain IRAs as rollover contributions.

Participant Accounts: Each participant's account is credited with the participant's contributions and an allocation of (a) the Company's contributions, (b) Plan earnings and losses and is charged with his or her withdrawals and an allocation of administrative expenses. Allocations are based on participant contributions, eligible compensation, participant account balances, or specific participant transactions, as defined. The benefit to which a participant is entitled is the benefit that can be provided from the participant's vested account. Each participant directs the investment of his or her account to any of the investment options available under the Plan.

Retirement, Death, and Disability: A participant is entitled to 100% of his or her account balance upon retirement, death, or disability.

Vesting: Participants are always 100% vested in their salary deferrals including pre-tax and Roth 401(k) deferrals, catch-up contributions, rollovers, safer harbor contributions, profit sharing contributions and any earnings thereon.

Payment of Benefits: Participants may receive a distribution of the vested portion of some or all of their accounts in the Plan following termination of employment, normal retirement, disability, or death. If the vested account balance does not exceed \$5,000, then the vested account balance may only be distributed in a single lump-sum payment. If the vested account balance exceeds \$5,000, the participant must consent to any distribution before it is made. The distribution can be a single lump-sum payment, installments, or partial withdrawals. All benefit payments will generally be paid in cash.

Participants may receive a distribution from the Plan from certain accounts prior to their termination of employment provided they have attained age 59 ½. A hardship distribution may also be made to satisfy certain immediate and heavy financial needs that a participant has.

Notes Receivable From Participants: Participants may borrow from their fund accounts a minimum of \$1,000 up to a maximum of \$50,000 or 50% of their vested account balance, whichever is less. The loans are secured by the balance in the participant's account and bear interest at rates that are commensurate with market rates for similar loans. All loans are covered by demand notes and are repayable through payroll deductions.

Plan Termination: The Company reserves the right to terminate the Plan at any time. Each participant in the Plan upon termination will automatically become 100% vested in their account balance.

Administrative Expenses: Certain expenses of maintaining the Plan are paid directly by the Company and are excluded from these financial statements. Plan recordkeeping and trustee fees are paid by the Plan and are reflected in the financial statements as administrative expenses. Fees related to the administration of notes receivable from participants are charged directly to the participant's account and are included in administrative expenses. Investment management fees are charged to the Plan as a reduction of investment return and included in the investment income reported by the Plan.

Subsequent Events: Plan management has evaluated subsequent events for recognition and disclosure through July 18, 2025, which is the date the financial statements were available to be issued.

NOTE 2 – SUMMARY OF ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of Accounting: The financial statements of the Plan are prepared on the accrual basis of accounting.

Estimates: The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires the Plan administrator to make estimates and assumptions that affect certain reported amounts and disclosures, and actual results could differ from those estimates.

Risks and Uncertainties: The Plan holds various investments. Investments are exposed to various risks such as interest rate, market, liquidity, credit risks, and global events risks. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investments and the sensitivity of certain fair value estimates to changes in valuation assumptions, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in the fair values of investments will occur in the near term and that such changes could materially affect participants' account balances and the amounts reported in the statement of net assets available for benefits.

NOTE 2 – SUMMARY OF ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Continued)

Investment Valuation and Income Recognition: Investments are reported at fair value. Fair value is the price that would be received by the Plan for an assets or paid by the Plan to transfer a liability (an exit price) in an orderly transaction between market participants on the measurement date in the Plan's principal or most advantageous market for the asset or liability. The Company determines the Plan's valuation policies utilizing information provided by the trustee. See Note 4 for discussion of fair value measurements.

Purchases and sales of securities are recorded on a trade-date basis. Interest is recorded on the accrual basis. Dividends are recorded on the ex-dividend date. Net appreciation includes the Plan's gains and losses on investments bought and sold as well as held during the year.

Notes Receivable From Participants: Notes receivable from participants are measured at their unpaid principal balance plus any accrued but unpaid interest, with no allowance for credit losses, as repayments of principal and interest are received through payroll deductions and the notes are collateralized by the participants' account balances. Notes receivable from participants have maturity dates through 2033. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Related fees are recorded as administrative expenses and are expensed when they are incurred.

Payment of Benefits: Benefits are recorded when paid.

NOTE 3 – CERTIFIED INFORMATION

Certain information related to investments and notes receivable from participants disclosed in the accompanying financial statements and ERISA-required supplemental schedules, including investments and notes receivable from participants held at December 31, 2024 and 2023, net appreciation in fair value of investments, interest and dividends, and interest income on notes receivable from participants for the year ended December 31, 2024, was obtained by management and agreed to or derived from information certified as complete and accurate by Fidelity Management Trust Company.

NOTE 4 – FAIR VALUE MEASUREMENTS

The framework for measuring fair value provides a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. The hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (Level 1) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (Level 3).

The three levels of the fair value hierarchy under Financial Accounting Standards Board Accounting Standards Codification 820 are described as follows:

Level 1: Inputs to the valuation methodology are unadjusted quoted prices for identical assets or liabilities in active markets that the Plan has the ability to access.

Level 2: Inputs to the valuation methodology include quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities in active markets; quoted prices for identical or similar assets or liabilities in inactive markets; inputs other than quoted prices that are observable for the asset or liability; and inputs that are derived principally from or corroborated by observable market data by correlation or other means. If the asset or liability has a specified (contractual) term, the Level 2 input must be observable for substantially the full term of the asset or liability.

Level 3: Inputs to the valuation methodology are unobservable and significant to the fair value measurement. As of December 31, 2024 and 2023, the Plan had no Level 3 assets.

The asset or liability's fair value measurement level within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of any input that is significant to the fair value measurement. Valuation techniques maximize the use of relevant observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs.

Following is a description of the valuation methodologies used for assets measured at fair value. There have been no changes in the methodologies used at December 31, 2024 and 2023.

Mutual Funds: Valued at the daily closing price as reported by the fund. Mutual funds held by the Plan are open-end mutual funds that are registered with the SEC. These funds are required to publish their daily net asset value and to transact at that price. The mutual funds held by the Plan are deemed to be actively traded.

Stable Value Fund and Bitgo Digital Asset Fund: Valued at NAV of units held. The NAV is used as a practical expedient to estimate fair value. The NAV is based on the fair value of the underlying investments held by the fund less its liability. This practical expedient is not used when it is determined to be probable that the fund will sell the investment for an amount different than the reported NAV.

The fair value amounts presented in the hierarchy tables for such investments are intended to permit reconciliation of the fair value hierarchy to the investments at fair value line item presented in the statement of net assets available for benefits.

NOTE 5 – PARTY-IN-INTEREST TRANSACTIONS

Parties-in-interest are defined under Department of Labor's regulations as any fiduciary of the Plan, any party rendering service to the Plan, the employer, and certain others. Certain administrative functions are performed by officers or employees of the Company. No such officer or employee receives compensation from the Plan. Some administrative expenses of the Plan are paid directly by the Company. The Plan holds certain funds managed by Fidelity Management Trust Company. Fidelity Management Trust Company is a service provider to the Plan and, therefore, these transactions and the Plan's payment of fees to Fidelity Management Trust Company qualify as party-in-interest transactions. Notes receivable from participants also reflect party-in-interest transactions

NOTE 6 – TAX STATUS

The Internal Revenue Service issued an opinion letter dated June 30, 2020 indicating that the non-standardized pre-approved profit sharing plan adopted by the Plan, as then designed, was in compliance with applicable requirements of the Internal Revenue Code. Although the Plan has been amended from the original non-standardized pre-approved profit sharing plan document, Plan management believes that the Plan is currently being operated in accordance with the Internal Revenue Code.

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require plan management to evaluate tax positions taken by the Plan. The plan administrator has analyzed the tax positions taken by the Plan, and has concluded that as of December 31, 2024 and 2023, there are no uncertain positions taken or expected to be taken that would require recognition of a liability (or asset) or disclosure in the financial statements. The Plan is subject to routine audits by taxing jurisdictions; however, there are currently no audits for any tax periods in progress. The plan administrator believes it is no longer subject to income tax examinations for years prior to 2021.

Scope and Nature of the ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) Audit

We have performed audits of the financial statements of BitGo, Inc. 401(k) Plan (the Plan), an employee benefit plan subject to the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (ERISA), as permitted by ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) (ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) audit). The financial statements comprise the statements of net assets available for benefits as of December 31, 2024 and 2023, and the related statement of changes in net assets available for benefits for the year ended December 31, 2024, and the related notes to the financial statements.

Management, having determined it is permissible in the circumstances, has elected to have the audits of the Plan's financial statements performed in accordance with ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) pursuant to 29 CFR 2520.103-8 of the Department of Labor's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA. As permitted by ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C), our audits need not extend to any statements or information related to assets held for investment of the plan (investment information) by a bank or similar institution or insurance carrier that is regulated, supervised, and subject to periodic examination by a state or federal agency, provided that the statements or information regarding assets so held are prepared and certified to by the bank or similar institution or insurance carrier in accordance with 29 CFR 2520.103-5 of the Department of Labor's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA (qualified institution).

Management has obtained certifications from qualified institutions as of December 31, 2024 and 2023 and for the year ended December 31, 2024, stating that the certified investment information, as described in Note 3 to the financial statements, is complete and accurate.

Basis for Opinion

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) audit opinion.

Responsibilities of Management for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America, and for the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error. Management's election of the ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) audit does not affect management's responsibility for the financial statements.

In preparing the financial statements, management is required to evaluate whether there are conditions or events, considered in the aggregate, that raise substantial doubt about the Plan's ability to continue as a going concern for one year from the date the financial statements are available to be issued.

Management is also responsible for maintaining a current plan instrument, including all plan amendments, administering the plan, and determining that the plan's transactions that are presented and disclosed in the financial statements are in conformity with the plan's provisions, including maintaining sufficient records with respect to each of the participants, to determine the benefits due or which may become due to such participants.

Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements

Except as described in the Scope and Nature of the ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) Audit section of our report, our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance but is not absolute assurance and therefore is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with GAAS will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. Our audits did not extend to the certified investment information, except for obtaining and reading the certification, comparing the certified investment information with the related information presented and disclosed in the financial statements, and reading the disclosures relating to the certified investment information to assess whether they are in accordance with the presentation and disclosure requirements of accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Accordingly, the objective of an ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) audit is not to express an opinion about whether the financial statements as a whole are presented fairly, in all material respects, in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

We are required to communicate with those charged with governance regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit, significant audit findings, and certain internal control-related matters that we identified during the audit.



NOTE 1 – DESCRIPTION OF PLAN

BitGo, Inc. 401(k) Plan (the Plan) is a qualified retirement plan, covering substantially all eligible employees of BitGo, Inc. (the Company). The Plan was originally adopted by the Company effective July 25, 2018, to provide employees with the opportunity to save for retirement on a tax-advantaged basis. The Plan was most recently amended and restated effective June 20, 2023. The Plan is subject to the provisions of the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (ERISA) and is administered by the Company.

The summary of significant provisions of the Plan presented below provides general information. Participants should refer to the terms of the plan document for a more complete description of the Plan's provisions.

Eligibility: All non-excluded employees of the Company who have attained age 18 are eligible to participate in the Plan. Eligible employees may enter the Plan on the first day of each month coinciding with or next following the date the eligibility requirements are met.

Contributions: Participants may elect to reduce their compensation by a specific percentage or dollar amount and have that amount contributed to the Plan as a salary deferral, not to exceed the dollar limit which is set by law. There are two types of salary deferrals: pre-tax 401(k) deferrals and Roth 401(k) deferrals. Participants who are at least age 50 or will attain age 50 before the end of a calendar year may elect to defer additional amounts called catch-up contributions. The Plan also has an automatic enrollment feature in which a participant will be automatically enrolled at 1% approximately 30 days after the eligibility requirements are met.

The Company will make a safe-harbor employer contribution equal to a uniform percentage of participants' salary deferrals. For 2024, the safe-harbor matching percentage was 100% of employee deferrals that do not exceed 3% of compensation plus 50% of employee deferrals between 3% and 5% of compensation.

The Company may make a safe harbor enhanced matching contribution, safe harbor nonelective contribution, or a discretionary profit-sharing contribution to the Plan. For 2024, the Company did not make any such contributions to the Plan.

Participants are permitted to deposit into the Plan distributions received from other retirement plans or certain IRAs as rollover contributions.

Participant Accounts: Each participant's account is credited with the participant's contributions and an allocation of (a) the Company's contributions, (b) Plan earnings and losses and is charged with his or her withdrawals and an allocation of administrative expenses. Allocations are based on participant contributions, eligible compensation, participant account balances, or specific participant transactions, as defined. The benefit to which a participant is entitled is the benefit that can be provided from the participant's vested account. Each participant directs the investment of his or her account to any of the investment options available under the Plan.

Retirement, Death, and Disability: A participant is entitled to 100% of his or her account balance upon retirement, death, or disability.

Vesting: Participants are always 100% vested in their salary deferrals including pre-tax and Roth 401(k) deferrals, catch-up contributions, rollovers, safer harbor contributions, profit sharing contributions and any earnings thereon.

Payment of Benefits: Participants may receive a distribution of the vested portion of some or all of their accounts in the Plan following termination of employment, normal retirement, disability, or death. If the vested account balance does not exceed \$5,000, then the vested account balance may only be distributed in a single lump-sum payment. If the vested account balance exceeds \$5,000, the participant must consent to any distribution before it is made. The distribution can be a single lump-sum payment, installments, or partial withdrawals. All benefit payments will generally be paid in cash.

Participants may receive a distribution from the Plan from certain accounts prior to their termination of employment provided they have attained age 59 ½. A hardship distribution may also be made to satisfy certain immediate and heavy financial needs that a participant has.

Notes Receivable From Participants: Participants may borrow from their fund accounts a minimum of \$1,000 up to a maximum of \$50,000 or 50% of their vested account balance, whichever is less. The loans are secured by the balance in the participant's account and bear interest at rates that are commensurate with market rates for similar loans. All loans are covered by demand notes and are repayable through payroll deductions.

Plan Termination: The Company reserves the right to terminate the Plan at any time. Each participant in the Plan upon termination will automatically become 100% vested in their account balance.

Administrative Expenses: Certain expenses of maintaining the Plan are paid directly by the Company and are excluded from these financial statements. Plan recordkeeping and trustee fees are paid by the Plan and are reflected in the financial statements as administrative expenses. Fees related to the administration of notes receivable from participants are charged directly to the participant's account and are included in administrative expenses. Investment management fees are charged to the Plan as a reduction of investment return and included in the investment income reported by the Plan.

Subsequent Events: Plan management has evaluated subsequent events for recognition and disclosure through July 18, 2025, which is the date the financial statements were available to be issued.

NOTE 2 – SUMMARY OF ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of Accounting: The financial statements of the Plan are prepared on the accrual basis of accounting.

Estimates: The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires the Plan administrator to make estimates and assumptions that affect certain reported amounts and disclosures, and actual results could differ from those estimates.

Risks and Uncertainties: The Plan holds various investments. Investments are exposed to various risks such as interest rate, market, liquidity, credit risks, and global events risks. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investments and the sensitivity of certain fair value estimates to changes in valuation assumptions, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in the fair values of investments will occur in the near term and that such changes could materially affect participants' account balances and the amounts reported in the statement of net assets available for benefits.

NOTE 2 – SUMMARY OF ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Continued)

Investment Valuation and Income Recognition: Investments are reported at fair value. Fair value is the price that would be received by the Plan for an assets or paid by the Plan to transfer a liability (an exit price) in an orderly transaction between market participants on the measurement date in the Plan's principal or most advantageous market for the asset or liability. The Company determines the Plan's valuation policies utilizing information provided by the trustee. See Note 4 for discussion of fair value measurements.

Purchases and sales of securities are recorded on a trade-date basis. Interest is recorded on the accrual basis. Dividends are recorded on the ex-dividend date. Net appreciation includes the Plan's gains and losses on investments bought and sold as well as held during the year.

Notes Receivable From Participants: Notes receivable from participants are measured at their unpaid principal balance plus any accrued but unpaid interest, with no allowance for credit losses, as repayments of principal and interest are received through payroll deductions and the notes are collateralized by the participants' account balances. Notes receivable from participants have maturity dates through 2033. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Related fees are recorded as administrative expenses and are expensed when they are incurred.

Payment of Benefits: Benefits are recorded when paid.

NOTE 3 – CERTIFIED INFORMATION

Certain information related to investments and notes receivable from participants disclosed in the accompanying financial statements and ERISA-required supplemental schedules, including investments and notes receivable from participants held at December 31, 2024 and 2023, net appreciation in fair value of investments, interest and dividends, and interest income on notes receivable from participants for the year ended December 31, 2024, was obtained by management and agreed to or derived from information certified as complete and accurate by Fidelity Management Trust Company.

NOTE 4 – FAIR VALUE MEASUREMENTS

The framework for measuring fair value provides a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. The hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (Level 1) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (Level 3).

The three levels of the fair value hierarchy under Financial Accounting Standards Board Accounting Standards Codification 820 are described as follows:

Level 1: Inputs to the valuation methodology are unadjusted quoted prices for identical assets or liabilities in active markets that the Plan has the ability to access.

Level 2: Inputs to the valuation methodology include quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities in active markets; quoted prices for identical or similar assets or liabilities in inactive markets; inputs other than quoted prices that are observable for the asset or liability; and inputs that are derived principally from or corroborated by observable market data by correlation or other means. If the asset or liability has a specified (contractual) term, the Level 2 input must be observable for substantially the full term of the asset or liability.

Level 3: Inputs to the valuation methodology are unobservable and significant to the fair value measurement. As of December 31, 2024 and 2023, the Plan had no Level 3 assets.

The asset or liability's fair value measurement level within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of any input that is significant to the fair value measurement. Valuation techniques maximize the use of relevant observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs.

Following is a description of the valuation methodologies used for assets measured at fair value. There have been no changes in the methodologies used at December 31, 2024 and 2023.

Mutual Funds: Valued at the daily closing price as reported by the fund. Mutual funds held by the Plan are open-end mutual funds that are registered with the SEC. These funds are required to publish their daily net asset value and to transact at that price. The mutual funds held by the Plan are deemed to be actively traded.

Stable Value Fund and Bitgo Digital Asset Fund: Valued at NAV of units held. The NAV is used as a practical expedient to estimate fair value. The NAV is based on the fair value of the underlying investments held by the fund less its liability. This practical expedient is not used when it is determined to be probable that the fund will sell the investment for an amount different than the reported NAV.

*Investments measured at fair value using net asset value per share (or its equivalent) as a practical expedient have not been classified in the fair value hierarchy. The fair value amounts presented in the hierarchy tables for such investments are intended to permit reconciliation of the fair value hierarchy to the investments at fair value line item presented in the statement of net assets available for benefits.

NOTE 5 – PARTY-IN-INTEREST TRANSACTIONS

Parties-in-interest are defined under Department of Labor's regulations as any fiduciary of the Plan, any party rendering service to the Plan, the employer, and certain others. Certain administrative functions are performed by officers or employees of the Company. No such officer or employee receives compensation from the Plan. Some administrative expenses of the Plan are paid directly by the Company. The Plan holds certain funds managed by Fidelity Management Trust Company. Fidelity Management Trust Company is a service provider to the Plan and, therefore, these transactions and the Plan's payment of fees to Fidelity Management Trust Company qualify as party-in-interest transactions. Notes receivable from participants also reflect party-in-interest transactions

NOTE 6 – TAX STATUS

The Internal Revenue Service issued an opinion letter dated June 30, 2020 indicating that the non-standardized pre-approved profit sharing plan adopted by the Plan, as then designed, was in compliance with applicable requirements of the Internal Revenue Code. Although the Plan has been amended from the original non-standardized pre-approved profit sharing plan document, Plan management believes that the Plan is currently being operated in accordance with the Internal Revenue Code.

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require plan management to evaluate tax positions taken by the Plan. The plan administrator has analyzed the tax positions taken by the Plan, and has concluded that as of December 31, 2024 and 2023, there are no uncertain positions taken or expected to be taken that would require recognition of a liability (or asset) or disclosure in the financial statements. The Plan is subject to routine audits by taxing jurisdictions; however, there are currently no audits for any tax periods in progress. The plan administrator believes it is no longer subject to income tax examinations for years prior to 2021.



NOTE 1 – DESCRIPTION OF PLAN

BitGo, Inc. 401(k) Plan (the Plan) is a qualified retirement plan, covering substantially all eligible employees of BitGo, Inc. (the Company). The Plan was originally adopted by the Company effective July 25, 2018, to provide employees with the opportunity to save for retirement on a tax-advantaged basis. The Plan was most recently amended and restated effective June 20, 2023. The Plan is subject to the provisions of the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (ERISA) and is administered by the Company.

The summary of significant provisions of the Plan presented below provides general information. Participants should refer to the terms of the plan document for a more complete description of the Plan's provisions.

Eligibility: All non-excluded employees of the Company who have attained age 18 are eligible to participate in the Plan. Eligible employees may enter the Plan on the first day of each month coinciding with or next following the date the eligibility requirements are met.

Contributions: Participants may elect to reduce their compensation by a specific percentage or dollar amount and have that amount contributed to the Plan as a salary deferral, not to exceed the dollar limit which is set by law. There are two types of salary deferrals: pre-tax 401(k) deferrals and Roth 401(k) deferrals. Participants who are at least age 50 or will attain age 50 before the end of a calendar year may elect to defer additional amounts called catch-up contributions. The Plan also has an automatic enrollment feature in which a participant will be automatically enrolled at 1% approximately 30 days after the eligibility requirements are met.

The Company will make a safe-harbor employer contribution equal to a uniform percentage of participants' salary deferrals. For 2024, the safe-harbor matching percentage was 100% of employee deferrals that do not exceed 3% of compensation plus 50% of employee deferrals between 3% and 5% of compensation.

The Company may make a safe harbor enhanced matching contribution, safe harbor nonelective contribution, or a discretionary profit-sharing contribution to the Plan. For 2024, the Company did not make any such contributions to the Plan.

Participants are permitted to deposit into the Plan distributions received from other retirement plans or certain IRAs as rollover contributions.

Participant Accounts: Each participant's account is credited with the participant's contributions and an allocation of (a) the Company's contributions, (b) Plan earnings and losses and is charged with his or her withdrawals and an allocation of administrative expenses. Allocations are based on participant contributions, eligible compensation, participant account balances, or specific participant transactions, as defined. The benefit to which a participant is entitled is the benefit that can be provided from the participant's vested account. Each participant directs the investment of his or her account to any of the investment options available under the Plan.

Retirement, Death, and Disability: A participant is entitled to 100% of his or her account balance upon retirement, death, or disability.

Vesting: Participants are always 100% vested in their salary deferrals including pre-tax and Roth 401(k) deferrals, catch-up contributions, rollovers, safer harbor contributions, profit sharing contributions and any earnings thereon.

Payment of Benefits: Participants may receive a distribution of the vested portion of some or all of their accounts in the Plan following termination of employment, normal retirement, disability, or death. If the vested account balance does not exceed \$5,000, then the vested account balance may only be distributed in a single lump-sum payment. If the vested account balance exceeds \$5,000, the participant must consent to any distribution before it is made. The distribution can be a single lump-sum payment, installments, or partial withdrawals. All benefit payments will generally be paid in cash.

Participants may receive a distribution from the Plan from certain accounts prior to their termination of employment provided they have attained age 59 $\frac{1}{2}$. A hardship distribution may also be made to satisfy certain immediate and heavy financial needs that a participant has.

Notes Receivable From Participants: Participants may borrow from their fund accounts a minimum of \$1,000 up to a maximum of \$50,000 or 50% of their vested account balance, whichever is less. The loans are secured by the balance in the participant's account and bear interest at rates that are commensurate with market rates for similar loans. All loans are covered by demand notes and are repayable through payroll deductions.

Plan Termination: The Company reserves the right to terminate the Plan at any time. Each participant in the Plan upon termination will automatically become 100% vested in their account balance.

Administrative Expenses: Certain expenses of maintaining the Plan are paid directly by the Company and are excluded from these financial statements. Plan recordkeeping and trustee fees are paid by the Plan and are reflected in the financial statements as administrative expenses. Fees related to the administration of notes receivable from participants are charged directly to the participant's account and are included in administrative expenses. Investment management fees are charged to the Plan as a reduction of investment return and included in the investment income reported by the Plan.

Subsequent Events: Plan management has evaluated subsequent events for recognition and disclosure through July 18, 2025, which is the date the financial statements were available to be issued.

NOTE 2 – SUMMARY OF ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of Accounting: The financial statements of the Plan are prepared on the accrual basis of accounting.

Estimates: The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires the Plan administrator to make estimates and assumptions that affect certain reported amounts and disclosures, and actual results could differ from those estimates.

Risks and Uncertainties: The Plan holds various investments. Investments are exposed to various risks such as interest rate, market, liquidity, credit risks, and global events risks. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investments and the sensitivity of certain fair value estimates to changes in valuation assumptions, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in the fair values of investments will occur in the near term and that such changes could materially affect participants' account balances and the amounts reported in the statement of net assets available for benefits.

NOTE 2 – SUMMARY OF ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Continued)

Investment Valuation and Income Recognition: Investments are reported at fair value. Fair value is the price that would be received by the Plan for an assets or paid by the Plan to transfer a liability (an exit price) in an orderly transaction between market participants on the measurement date in the Plan's principal or most advantageous market for the asset or liability. The Company determines the Plan's valuation policies utilizing information provided by the trustee. See Note 4 for discussion of fair value measurements.

Purchases and sales of securities are recorded on a trade-date basis. Interest is recorded on the accrual basis. Dividends are recorded on the ex-dividend date. Net appreciation includes the Plan's gains and losses on investments bought and sold as well as held during the year.

Notes Receivable From Participants: Notes receivable from participants are measured at their unpaid principal balance plus any accrued but unpaid interest, with no allowance for credit losses, as repayments of principal and interest are received through payroll deductions and the notes are collateralized by the participants' account balances. Notes receivable from participants have maturity dates through 2033. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Related fees are recorded as administrative expenses and are expensed when they are incurred.

Payment of Benefits: Benefits are recorded when paid.

NOTE 3 – CERTIFIED INFORMATION

Certain information related to investments and notes receivable from participants disclosed in the accompanying financial statements and ERISA-required supplemental schedules, including investments and notes receivable from participants held at December 31, 2024 and 2023, net appreciation in fair value of investments, interest and dividends, and interest income on notes receivable from participants for the year ended December 31, 2024, was obtained by management and agreed to or derived from information certified as complete and accurate by Fidelity Management Trust Company.

NOTE 4 – FAIR VALUE MEASUREMENTS

The framework for measuring fair value provides a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. The hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (Level 1) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (Level 3).

The three levels of the fair value hierarchy under Financial Accounting Standards Board Accounting Standards Codification 820 are described as follows:

Level 1: Inputs to the valuation methodology are unadjusted quoted prices for identical assets or liabilities in active markets that the Plan has the ability to access.

Level 2: Inputs to the valuation methodology include quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities in active markets; quoted prices for identical or similar assets or liabilities in inactive markets; inputs other than quoted prices that are observable for the asset or liability; and inputs that are derived principally from or corroborated by observable market data by correlation or other means. If the asset or liability has a specified (contractual) term, the Level 2 input must be observable for substantially the full term of the asset or liability.

Level 3: Inputs to the valuation methodology are unobservable and significant to the fair value measurement. As of December 31, 2024 and 2023, the Plan had no Level 3 assets.

The asset or liability's fair value measurement level within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of any input that is significant to the fair value measurement. Valuation techniques maximize the use of relevant observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs.

Following is a description of the valuation methodologies used for assets measured at fair value. There have been no changes in the methodologies used at December 31, 2024 and 2023.

Mutual Funds: Valued at the daily closing price as reported by the fund. Mutual funds held by the Plan are open-end mutual funds that are registered with the SEC. These funds are required to publish their daily net asset value and to transact at that price. The mutual funds held by the Plan are deemed to be actively traded.

Stable Value Fund and Bitgo Digital Asset Fund: Valued at NAV of units held. The NAV is used as a practical expedient to estimate fair value. The NAV is based on the fair value of the underlying investments held by the fund less its liability. This practical expedient is not used when it is determined to be probable that the fund will sell the investment for an amount different than the reported NAV.

NOTE 5 – PARTY-IN-INTEREST TRANSACTIONS

Parties-in-interest are defined under Department of Labor's regulations as any fiduciary of the Plan, any party rendering service to the Plan, the employer, and certain others. Certain administrative functions are performed by officers or employees of the Company. No such officer or employee receives compensation from the Plan. Some administrative expenses of the Plan are paid directly by the Company. The Plan holds certain funds managed by Fidelity Management Trust Company. Fidelity Management Trust Company is a service provider to the Plan and, therefore, these transactions and the Plan's payment of fees to Fidelity Management Trust Company qualify as party-in-interest transactions. Notes receivable from participants also reflect party-in-interest transactions

NOTE 6 – TAX STATUS

The Internal Revenue Service issued an opinion letter dated June 30, 2020 indicating that the non-standardized pre-approved profit sharing plan adopted by the Plan, as then designed, was in compliance with applicable requirements of the Internal Revenue Code. Although the Plan has been amended from the original non-standardized pre-approved profit sharing plan document, Plan management believes that the Plan is currently being operated in accordance with the Internal Revenue Code.

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require plan management to evaluate tax positions taken by the Plan. The plan administrator has analyzed the tax positions taken by the Plan, and has concluded that as of December 31, 2024 and 2023, there are no uncertain positions taken or expected to be taken that would require recognition of a liability (or asset) or disclosure in the financial statements. The Plan is subject to routine audits by taxing jurisdictions; however, there are currently no audits for any tax periods in progress. The plan administrator believes it is no longer subject to income tax examinations for years prior to 2021.
