Scope and Nature of the ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) Audit

We have performed audits of the financial statements of Main Street Capital Corporation 401(k) Savings Plan (the "Plan"), an employee benefit plan subject to the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 ("ERISA"), as permitted by ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) ("ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) audit"). The financial statements comprise the statements of net assets available for benefits as of December 31, 2024 and 2023, the related statement of changes in net assets available for benefits for the year ended December 31, 2024, and the related notes to the financial statements.

Management, having determined it is permissible in the circumstances, has elected to have the audits of the Plan's financial statements performed in accordance with ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) pursuant to 29 CFR 2520.103-8 of the Department of Labor's ("DOL") Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA. As permitted by ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C), our audits need not extend to any statements or information related to assets held for investment of the Plan ("investment information") by a bank or similar institution or insurance carrier that is regulated, supervised, and subject to periodic examination by a state or federal agency, provided that the statements or information regarding assets so held are prepared and certified to by the bank or similar institution or insurance carrier in accordance with 29 CFR 2520.103-5 of the DOL's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA ("qualified institution").

Management has obtained certifications from a qualified institution as of December 31, 2024 and 2023, and for the year ended December 31, 2024, stating that the certified investment information described in Note 4 to the financial statements is complete and accurate.

Opinion

In our opinion, based on our audits and on the procedures performed as described in the *Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements* section of our report:

- The amounts and disclosures in the accompanying financial statements, other than those agreed to or derived from the certified investment information, are presented fairly, in all material respects, in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America ("GAAP").
- The information in the accompanying financial statements related to assets held by and certified to by a qualified institution agrees to, or is derived from, in all material respects, the information prepared and certified by an institution that management determined meets the requirements of ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C).

Basis for Opinion

We conducted our audits in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America ("GAAS"). Note 1 – Plan Description

The following description of the Main Street Capital Corporation 401(k) Savings Plan (“Plan”) provides only general information. Participants should refer to the Plan Agreement or Summary Plan Description for a more complete description of the Plan’s provisions.

General

The Plan is a defined contribution 401(k) plan that provides retirement savings benefits to eligible employees of Main Street Capital Corporation (the “Company” or “Employer”). The Plan, which commenced effective October 1, 1997, was amended and restated effective May 25, 2021, to comply with the latest rules and regulations. The Plan is subject to the provisions of the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (“ERISA”) and the Internal Revenue Code (“IRC”).

Plan Custodian and Trustee

Fidelity Management Trust Company (“Fidelity,” the “Trustee,” or “Custodian”) is the Custodian maintaining custody of all investments held by the Plan, maintaining the Plan’s participant account balances, and providing recordkeeping services to the Plan. Among other duties, the Custodian receives contributions, holds and invests the fund assets in accordance with the directions of participants, and makes distributions as directed by the Plan Administrator. Fidelity also serves as the Plan’s Trustee.

Eligibility and Plan Entrance Date

Union employees covered by a collective bargaining agreement, nonresident aliens, leased, and temporary employees are not eligible to participate in the Plan. All other employees of the Company are eligible to participate in the Plan after the employee has reached 21 years of age. Eligible employees are permitted to enter the Plan on the first day of each month after which the employee has satisfied the eligibility requirements.

Participant Contributions

The Plan permits eligible employees to contribute, on a before-tax or Roth basis, up to 90% of annual compensation as defined in the Plan, up to the maximum amount allowed for deferral annually by the IRC. The deferral limit for 2024 was \$23,000. Participants who have reached 50 years of age before the end of the Plan year are eligible to make catch-up contributions up to the maximum amount allowed annually by the IRC, which was \$7,500 for 2024. Participants also may contribute amounts representing distributions from other qualified defined benefit or defined contribution plans (“rollover”).

Employer Contributions

The Plan provides for a Safe Harbor Employer matching contribution equal to 100% of the first 3% of the participant's eligible compensation contributed to the Plan and 50% of the next 3% of the participant's eligible compensation contributed. The Plan uses a year-end true-up matching contribution feature to allow participants to receive the maximum matching contribution available by making up any loss in matching contributions resulting from the participant’s individual savings strategies. Contributions are subject to certain Internal Revenue Service (“IRS”) limitations.

Note 1 – Plan Description (continued)

Participant-Directed Investments

All assets of the Plan are participant-directed investments. Participants have the option of directing their account balances to one or more investment options offered by the Plan. The Plan has selected various investment options, as more fully described in the Plan Document, to which participants may designate the allocation of their account balances. The investment options vary in types of investments, rates of return, and investment risk.

Participant Accounts

Each participant's account is credited with the participant's contributions, Safe Harbor Employer matching contributions, plus allocations of Plan earnings, and charged with an allocation of administrative expenses. Allocations are based on participant earnings, account balances, or specific participant transactions, as defined. The benefit to which a participant is entitled is the benefit that can be provided from the participant's vested account.

Vesting

Participants are vested immediately in their contributions and Safe Harbor Employer matching contributions plus actual earnings thereon.

Notes Receivable from Participants

Participants may borrow from their fund accounts a minimum of \$1,000 up to a maximum equal to the lesser of \$50,000 or 50% of their account balance. A participant may only have one outstanding loan at a time. Loans are secured by the balance in the participant's account. Effective December 5, 2024, interest is charged at Prime plus 2%. Prior to December 5, 2024, the loan interest rate was set at commercially reasonable rates of interest, as defined. Principal and interest are paid ratably through payroll deductions and are due in equal installments not less frequently than quarterly.

Payment of Benefits

Upon separation of service due to death, disability, normal retirement, or termination of employment, a participant may elect to receive a lump sum payment from the vested portion of their account balance. Distributions to a terminated employee with a vested account balance equal to or less than \$5,000 are made as a lump sum distribution as soon as administratively possible following the participant's termination of employment. The participant may elect whether to receive the distribution directly or to rollover the distribution into another retirement plan. If the vested account balance is less than or equal to \$1,000, the Plan permits involuntary lump sum cash distributions. If a terminated employee has an account balance exceeding \$5,000, the participant may elect to take a distribution of less than the entire vested account balance.

A participant may withdraw all or a portion of their vested account balance in the event of a financial hardship, as defined by the Plan. Additionally, in-service withdrawals are permitted upon attainment of age 59 ½.

Note 2 – Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Basis of Accounting

The Plan's financial statements are prepared on the accrual basis of accounting in conformity with the accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America ("GAAP").

Note 2 – Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (continued)

Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in accordance with GAAP requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities, changes in those assets and liabilities, and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Investment Valuation and Income Recognition

Investments are reported at fair value. Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. See Note 3 for discussion of fair value measurements.

Purchases and sales of securities are recorded on a trade-date basis. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Dividends are recorded on the ex-dividend date. Net appreciation includes the Plan's gains and losses on investments bought and sold, as well as held, during the year.

Notes Receivable from Participants

Notes receivable from participants are measured at their unpaid principal balance, plus any accrued but unpaid interest. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Related fees are recorded as administrative expenses and are expensed when they are incurred. No allowance for credit losses has been recorded as of December 31, 2024 and 2023. Delinquent participant loans are recorded as distributions on the basis of the terms of the Plan Agreement.

Payment of Benefits

Benefit payments to participants are recorded when paid.

Administrative Expenses

Certain expenses of maintaining the Plan are paid by the Plan, unless otherwise paid by the Company. Expenses that are paid by the Company are excluded from these financial statements. Certain expenses specifically incurred by, or attributable to, a participant will be paid from that participant's account and are included in administrative expenses. Investment related expenses are included in net appreciation of fair value of investments.

Note 3 – Fair Value Measurements

The framework for measuring fair value provides a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. The hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (level 1), and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (level 3). The three levels of the fair value hierarchy under Financial Accounting Standards Board ("FASB") Accounting Standards Codification ("ASC") Topic 820 are described as follows:

- **Level 1** – Inputs to the valuation methodology are quoted prices (unadjusted) in active markets for identical assets or liabilities that the Plan has the ability to access at the measurement date.
- **Level 2** – Inputs to the valuation methodology include quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities in active markets; quoted prices for identical or similar assets or liabilities in inactive markets; inputs other than quoted prices that are observable for the asset or liability; or inputs that are derived principally from or corroborated by observable market data by correlation or other means. If the asset or liability has a specified (contractual) term, the level 2 input must be observable for substantially the full term of the asset or liability.
- **Level 3** – Inputs to the valuation methodology are unobservable and significant to the fair value measurement.

The asset or liability's fair value measurement level within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of any input that is significant to the fair value measurement. Valuation techniques maximize the use of relevant observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs.

The following is a description of the valuation methodologies used for assets measured at fair value. There have been no changes in the methodologies used at December 31, 2024 and 2023.

- **Mutual Funds** – Valued at the daily closing price as reported by the fund. Mutual funds held by the Plan are open-end mutual funds that are registered with the United States Securities and Exchange Commission. These funds are required to publish their daily net asset value (“NAV”) and to transact at that price. Mutual funds held by the Plan are deemed to be actively traded.
- **Money Market Fund** – This investment is recorded at cost, which approximates fair value and is classified within level 1 of the valuation hierarchy.

Note 5 – Related Party and Party-in-Interest Transactions

Certain Plan investments are shares of mutual funds managed by the Trustee; as such, these transactions qualify as party-in-interest transactions as defined by ERISA. Such transactions are permitted under the provisions of the Plan and are exempt from the prohibition of party-in-interest transactions under ERISA. There have been no known prohibited transactions with parties-in-interest. As described in Note 2, the Plan paid certain expenses related to Plan operations and investment activity to service providers.

The Plan has notes receivable from participants as of December 31, 2024 and 2023. These receivables and related transactions qualify as party-in-interest transactions and are exempt from being prohibited by ERISA.

Note 6 – Plan Termination

Although it has not expressed any intent to do so, the Company has the right under the Plan to discontinue its contributions at any time, and to terminate the Plan subject to the provisions of ERISA. In the event of Plan termination, participants would become 100% vested in their Employer contributions.

Note 7 – Tax Status

The Plan adopted a non-standardized, preapproved profit-sharing plan sponsored by FMR, LLC. The IRS has determined and informed FMR, LLC by a letter, dated June 30, 2020, that the Plan and related trust are designed in accordance with applicable sections of the IRC. The Plan has not filed individually with the IRS for a letter regarding the Plan’s qualified tax status; however the Plan Administrator believes that the Plan is designed and currently being operated in compliance with the applicable requirements of the IRC, and thus believes that the Plan is qualified, and the related trust is tax-exempt.

GAAP requires Plan management to evaluate tax positions taken by the Plan and recognize a tax liability if the Plan has taken an uncertain position that more likely than not would not be sustained upon examination by the IRS. The Plan is subject to routine audits by taxing jurisdictions; however, there are currently no audits for any tax periods in progress.

Note 8 – Risks and Uncertainties

The Plan invests in various investment securities. Investment securities are exposed to various risks, such as interest rates, market, and credit risks. Because of the level of risk associated with certain investment securities, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in the values of investment securities will occur in the near term, and that such changes could materially affect participants' account balances and the amounts reported in the statements of net assets available for benefits.

Scope and Nature of the ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) Audit

We have performed audits of the financial statements of Main Street Capital Corporation 401(k) Savings Plan (the "Plan"), an employee benefit plan subject to the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 ("ERISA"), as permitted by ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) ("ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) audit"). The financial statements comprise the statements of net assets available for benefits as of December 31, 2024 and 2023, the related statement of changes in net assets available for benefits for the year ended December 31, 2024, and the related notes to the financial statements.

Management, having determined it is permissible in the circumstances, has elected to have the audits of the Plan's financial statements performed in accordance with ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) pursuant to 29 CFR 2520.103-8 of the Department of Labor's ("DOL") Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA. As permitted by ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C), our audits need not extend to any statements or information related to assets held for investment of the Plan ("investment information") by a bank or similar institution or insurance carrier that is regulated, supervised, and subject to periodic examination by a state or federal agency, provided that the statements or information regarding assets so held are prepared and certified to by the bank or similar institution or insurance carrier in accordance with 29 CFR 2520.103-5 of the DOL's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA ("qualified institution").

Management has obtained certifications from a qualified institution as of December 31, 2024 and 2023, and for the year ended December 31, 2024, stating that the certified investment information described in Note 4 to the financial statements is complete and accurate.

Opinion

In our opinion, based on our audits and on the procedures performed as described in the *Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements* section of our report:

- The amounts and disclosures in the accompanying financial statements, other than those agreed to or derived from the certified investment information, are presented fairly, in all material respects, in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America ("GAAP").
- The information in the accompanying financial statements related to assets held by and certified to by a qualified institution agrees to, or is derived from, in all material respects, the information prepared and certified by an institution that management determined meets the requirements of ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C).

Basis for Opinion

We conducted our audits in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America ("GAAS"). Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the *Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements* section of our report. We are required to be independent of the Plan and to meet our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with the relevant ethical requirements relating to our audits. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) audit opinion.

Management's Responsibilities for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in accordance with GAAP, and for the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error. Management's election of the ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) audit does not affect management's responsibility for the financial statements.

In preparing the financial statements, management is required to evaluate whether there are conditions or events that, considered in the aggregate, raise substantial doubt about the Plan's ability to continue as a going concern for one year after the date that the financial statements are available to be issued.

Management is also responsible for maintaining a current plan instrument, including all plan amendments, administering the Plan, and determining that the Plan's transactions that are presented and disclosed in the financial statements are in conformity with the Plan's provisions, including maintaining sufficient records with respect to each of the participants, to determine the benefits due or which may become due to such participants.

Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements

Except as described in the *Scope and Nature of the ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) Audit of the Financial Statements* section of our report, our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance, but it is not absolute assurance; therefore, it is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with GAAS will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control. Misstatements are considered material if there is a substantial likelihood that, individually or in the aggregate, they would influence the judgement made by a reasonable user based on the financial statements.

- Evaluate the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluate the overall presentation of the financial statements.
- Conclude whether, in our judgment, there are conditions or events that, considered in the aggregate, raise substantial doubt about the Plan's ability to continue as a going concern for a reasonable period of time.

Our audits did not extend to the certified investment information, except for obtaining and reading the certification, comparing the certified investment information with the related information presented and disclosed in the financial statements, and reading the disclosures relating to the certified investment information to assess whether they are in accordance with the presentation and disclosure requirements of GAAP. Accordingly, the objective of an ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) audit is not to express an opinion about whether the financial statements as a whole are presented fairly, in all material respects, in accordance with GAAP.

We are required to communicate with those charged with governance regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit, significant audit findings, and certain internal control-related matters that we identified during the audit.

Other Matters

Supplemental Information Required by ERISA

The supplemental information listed in the index as of December 31, 2024, is presented for purposes of additional analysis and is not a required part of the financial statements, but is supplemental information required by the DOL's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA. Such information is the responsibility of management and was derived from and relates directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements. The information included in the supplemental information, other than that agreed to or derived from the certified investment information, has been subjected to auditing procedures applied in the audits of the financial statements and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements or to the financial statements themselves, and other additional procedures in accordance with GAAS. For information included in the supplemental information that is agreed to or is derived from the certified investment information, we compared such information to the related certified investment information.

Note 1 – Plan Description

The following description of the Main Street Capital Corporation 401(k) Savings Plan (“Plan”) provides only general information. Participants should refer to the Plan Agreement or Summary Plan Description for a more complete description of the Plan’s provisions.

General

The Plan is a defined contribution 401(k) plan that provides retirement savings benefits to eligible employees of Main Street Capital Corporation (the “Company” or “Employer”). The Plan, which commenced effective October 1, 1997, was amended and restated effective May 25, 2021, to comply with the latest rules and regulations. The Plan is subject to the provisions of the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (“ERISA”) and the Internal Revenue Code (“IRC”).

Plan Custodian and Trustee

Fidelity Management Trust Company (“Fidelity,” the “Trustee,” or “Custodian”) is the Custodian maintaining custody of all investments held by the Plan, maintaining the Plan’s participant account balances, and providing recordkeeping services to the Plan. Among other duties, the Custodian receives contributions, holds and invests the fund assets in accordance with the directions of participants, and makes distributions as directed by the Plan Administrator. Fidelity also serves as the Plan’s Trustee.

Eligibility and Plan Entrance Date

Union employees covered by a collective bargaining agreement, nonresident aliens, leased, and temporary employees are not eligible to participate in the Plan. All other employees of the Company are eligible to participate in the Plan after the employee has reached 21 years of age. Eligible employees are permitted to enter the Plan on the first day of each month after which the employee has satisfied the eligibility requirements.

Participant Contributions

The Plan permits eligible employees to contribute, on a before-tax or Roth basis, up to 90% of annual compensation as defined in the Plan, up to the maximum amount allowed for deferral annually by the IRC. The deferral limit for 2024 was \$23,000. Participants who have reached 50 years of age before the end of the Plan year are eligible to make catch-up contributions up to the maximum amount allowed annually by the IRC, which was \$7,500 for 2024. Participants also may contribute amounts representing distributions from other qualified defined benefit or defined contribution plans (“rollover”).

Employer Contributions

The Plan provides for a Safe Harbor Employer matching contribution equal to 100% of the first 3% of the participant's eligible compensation contributed to the Plan and 50% of the next 3% of the participant's eligible compensation contributed. The Plan uses a year-end true-up matching contribution feature to allow participants to receive the maximum matching contribution available by making up any loss in matching contributions resulting from the participant’s individual savings strategies. Contributions are subject to certain Internal Revenue Service (“IRS”) limitations.

Note 1 – Plan Description (continued)

Participant-Directed Investments

All assets of the Plan are participant-directed investments. Participants have the option of directing their account balances to one or more investment options offered by the Plan. The Plan has selected various investment options, as more fully described in the Plan Document, to which participants may designate the allocation of their account balances. The investment options vary in types of investments, rates of return, and investment risk.

Participant Accounts

Each participant's account is credited with the participant's contributions, Safe Harbor Employer matching contributions, plus allocations of Plan earnings, and charged with an allocation of administrative expenses. Allocations are based on participant earnings, account balances, or specific participant transactions, as defined. The benefit to which a participant is entitled is the benefit that can be provided from the participant's vested account.

Vesting

Participants are vested immediately in their contributions and Safe Harbor Employer matching contributions plus actual earnings thereon.

Notes Receivable from Participants

Participants may borrow from their fund accounts a minimum of \$1,000 up to a maximum equal to the lesser of \$50,000 or 50% of their account balance. A participant may only have one outstanding loan at a time. Loans are secured by the balance in the participant's account. Effective December 5, 2024, interest is charged at Prime plus 2%. Prior to December 5, 2024, the loan interest rate was set at commercially reasonable rates of interest, as defined. Principal and interest are paid ratably through payroll deductions and are due in equal installments not less frequently than quarterly.

Payment of Benefits

Upon separation of service due to death, disability, normal retirement, or termination of employment, a participant may elect to receive a lump sum payment from the vested portion of their account balance. Distributions to a terminated employee with a vested account balance equal to or less than \$5,000 are made as a lump sum distribution as soon as administratively possible following the participant's termination of employment. The participant may elect whether to receive the distribution directly or to rollover the distribution into another retirement plan. If the vested account balance is less than or equal to \$1,000, the Plan permits involuntary lump sum cash distributions. If a terminated employee has an account balance exceeding \$5,000, the participant may elect to take a distribution of less than the entire vested account balance.

A participant may withdraw all or a portion of their vested account balance in the event of a financial hardship, as defined by the Plan. Additionally, in-service withdrawals are permitted upon attainment of age 59 ½.

Note 2 – Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Basis of Accounting

The Plan's financial statements are prepared on the accrual basis of accounting in conformity with the accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America ("GAAP").

Note 2 – Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (continued)

Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in accordance with GAAP requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities, changes in those assets and liabilities, and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Investment Valuation and Income Recognition

Investments are reported at fair value. Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. See Note 3 for discussion of fair value measurements.

Purchases and sales of securities are recorded on a trade-date basis. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Dividends are recorded on the ex-dividend date. Net appreciation includes the Plan's gains and losses on investments bought and sold, as well as held, during the year.

Notes Receivable from Participants

Notes receivable from participants are measured at their unpaid principal balance, plus any accrued but unpaid interest. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Related fees are recorded as administrative expenses and are expensed when they are incurred. No allowance for credit losses has been recorded as of December 31, 2024 and 2023. Delinquent participant loans are recorded as distributions on the basis of the terms of the Plan Agreement.

Payment of Benefits

Benefit payments to participants are recorded when paid.

Administrative Expenses

Certain expenses of maintaining the Plan are paid by the Plan, unless otherwise paid by the Company. Expenses that are paid by the Company are excluded from these financial statements. Certain expenses specifically incurred by, or attributable to, a participant will be paid from that participant's account and are included in administrative expenses. Investment related expenses are included in net appreciation of fair value of investments.

Note 3 – Fair Value Measurements

The framework for measuring fair value provides a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. The hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (level 1), and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (level 3). The three levels of the fair value hierarchy under Financial Accounting Standards Board ("FASB") Accounting Standards Codification ("ASC") Topic 820 are described as follows:

Note 3 – Fair Value Measurements (continued)

- **Level 1** – Inputs to the valuation methodology are quoted prices (unadjusted) in active markets for identical assets or liabilities that the Plan has the ability to access at the measurement date.
- **Level 2** – Inputs to the valuation methodology include quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities in active markets; quoted prices for identical or similar assets or liabilities in inactive markets; inputs other than quoted prices that are observable for the asset or liability; or inputs that are derived principally from or corroborated by observable market data by correlation or other means. If the asset or liability has a specified (contractual) term, the level 2 input must be observable for substantially the full term of the asset or liability.
- **Level 3** – Inputs to the valuation methodology are unobservable and significant to the fair value measurement.

The asset or liability's fair value measurement level within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of any input that is significant to the fair value measurement. Valuation techniques maximize the use of relevant observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs.

The following is a description of the valuation methodologies used for assets measured at fair value. There have been no changes in the methodologies used at December 31, 2024 and 2023.

- **Mutual Funds** – Valued at the daily closing price as reported by the fund. Mutual funds held by the Plan are open-end mutual funds that are registered with the United States Securities and Exchange Commission. These funds are required to publish their daily net asset value (“NAV”) and to transact at that price. Mutual funds held by the Plan are deemed to be actively traded.
- **Money Market Fund** – This investment is recorded at cost, which approximates fair value and is classified within level 1 of the valuation hierarchy.

The Plan’s independent auditor did not perform auditing procedures with respect to this information, except for comparing such information with the related information included in the financial statements and supplemental schedule.

Note 5 – Related Party and Party-in-Interest Transactions

Certain Plan investments are shares of mutual funds managed by the Trustee; as such, these transactions qualify as party-in-interest transactions as defined by ERISA. Such transactions are permitted under the provisions of the Plan and are exempt from the prohibition of party-in-interest transactions under ERISA. There have been no known prohibited transactions with parties-in-interest. As described in Note 2, the Plan paid certain expenses related to Plan operations and investment activity to service providers.

The Plan has notes receivable from participants as of December 31, 2024 and 2023. These receivables and related transactions qualify as party-in-interest transactions and are exempt from being prohibited by ERISA.

Note 6 – Plan Termination

Although it has not expressed any intent to do so, the Company has the right under the Plan to discontinue its contributions at any time, and to terminate the Plan subject to the provisions of ERISA. In the event of Plan termination, participants would become 100% vested in their Employer contributions.

Note 7 – Tax Status

The Plan adopted a non-standardized, preapproved profit-sharing plan sponsored by FMR, LLC. The IRS has determined and informed FMR, LLC by a letter, dated June 30, 2020, that the Plan and related trust are designed in accordance with applicable sections of the IRC. The Plan has not filed individually with the IRS for a letter regarding the Plan’s qualified tax status; however the Plan Administrator believes that the Plan is designed and currently being operated in compliance with the applicable requirements of the IRC, and thus believes that the Plan is qualified, and the related trust is tax-exempt.

GAAP requires Plan management to evaluate tax positions taken by the Plan and recognize a tax liability if the Plan has taken an uncertain position that more likely than not would not be sustained upon examination by the IRS. The Plan is subject to routine audits by taxing jurisdictions; however, there are currently no audits for any tax periods in progress.

Note 8 – Risks and Uncertainties

The Plan invests in various investment securities. Investment securities are exposed to various risks, such as interest rates, market, and credit risks. Because of the level of risk associated with certain investment securities, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in the values of investment securities will occur in the near term, and that such changes could materially affect participants' account balances and the amounts reported in the statements of net assets available for benefits.
