For information included in the supplemental schedule that agreed to or is derived from the certified investment information, we compared such information to the related certified investment information.

NOTE A: DESCRIPTION OF THE PLAN

The following description of The Synergy Global Solutions, Inc. 401(k) Plan (the “Plan”) provides only general information. Participants should refer to the Plan agreement for a more complete description of the Plan's provisions.

General

The Plan is a defined contribution plan covering all eligible employees of Synergy IT Solutions of NYS, Inc. (the “Company”). The Company was formerly known as and continues to do business under the name Synergy Global Solutions, Inc. Participation in the Plan is elective at the discretion of the employee. The requirements, as defined by the Plan agreement, are that an employee must be 21 years of age, have completed at least three months of service, and are not covered under collective bargaining agreements. The Plan is subject to the provisions of the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (ERISA).

Contributions

Participants may contribute up to 80% of their pre-tax annual compensation, as defined by the Plan, subject to Internal Revenue Service limitations. Participants can also roll over amounts representing distributions from other qualified plans. Participants are also permitted to make after-tax Roth contributions to the Plan.

Newly eligible employees who have otherwise not affirmatively opted out of enrolling in the Plan are automatically enrolled. Employees enrolled as a result of this provision must defer 3% of their compensation to the Plan. There is also an auto-escalation provision whereby deferrals are increased by 1% each year, until reaching a maximum of 80%, if the employee does not elect otherwise.

The employer may make discretionary contributions. No discretionary contributions were made during 2024 or 2023.

Participant accounts

Each participant's account is credited with the participant's contribution, employer discretionary matching contributions and the Plan's earnings or loss. The benefit to which a participant is entitled is the benefit that can be provided from the participant's account. Participants may direct the investment of their account balances into various investment options offered by the Plan. At December 31, 2024 and 2023, all amounts allocated to accounts of participants who have withdrawn from the Plan have been paid.

Vesting

Participants are immediately vested in their elective contributions, any QNEC contributions, and actual earnings thereon. Participants vest in employer discretionary matching contributions and actual earnings and losses thereon at a rate of 20% per annum upon completion of the second year of service. Participants are fully vested in employer discretionary matching contributions after six years of service.

Forfeitures

Any forfeitures arising under the Plan can be used to pay plan expenses. At December 31, 2024, there was no balance in the forfeitures account. At December 31, 2023, there was a balance of \$37 in the forfeitures account, which was used to pay plan expenses during 2024.

Payment of benefits

A participant's entire interest in the Plan is payable upon death, attainment of normal retirement age, becoming disabled, as defined, or termination of service. A participant may elect to receive a lump-sum amount equal to the vested portion of the participant's account. Any distribution greater than \$1,000 that is made to a Participant without the Participant's consent before the Participant's Normal Retirement Age (or age 62, if later) will be rolled over to an individual retirement plan designated by the Plan Administrator. Withdrawals from the Plan may also be made upon circumstances of financial hardship, in accordance with provisions specified in the Plan.

Notes receivable – participant loans

Participants are entitled to borrow from their accounts subject to certain limitations. In general, participants may borrow up to half of their account balances, but not more than \$50,000 and not less than \$1,000 subject to restrictions set forth in the Plan document. Notes receivable bear interest at the prevailing commercial rate and generally must be repaid over a maximum term of five years. Notes receivable from participants are measured at their unpaid principal balance plus any accrued but unpaid interest. Delinquent notes are reclassified as distributions based upon the terms of the Plan document.

Administrative expenses

The Plan's expenses are paid either by the Plan or the Company, as provided by the plan document. Expenses that are paid directly by the Company are excluded from these financial statements. Certain expenses incurred in connection with the general administration of the Plan that are paid by the Plan are recorded as deductions in the accompanying statement of changes in net assets available for benefits. In addition, certain investment related expenses are included in net appreciation or depreciation of fair value of investments presented in the accompanying statement of changes in net assets available for benefits.

NOTE B: SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of accounting

The financial statements and supplemental schedule are prepared under the accrual method of accounting.

Investment value and income recognition

Investments held by the Plan are reported at fair value. Fair value is defined as the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. See Note D for further discussion of fair value measurements.

Purchases and sales of investments are recorded on a trade-date basis. Interest income is accrued when earned. Dividend income is recorded on the ex-dividend date. Net appreciation and depreciation includes the Plan's gains and losses on investments bought and sold during the year as well as held during the year.

Excess contributions payable

The Plan had its annual nondiscrimination testing performed which required the Plan to refund \$2,964 of participant contributions as of December 31, 2023, to meet the actual deferral percentage test. The amount is recorded as a liability with a corresponding reduction to employee contributions. These funds were remitted to the affected participants during 2024. There was no refund required for the year ended December 31, 2024.

Payment of benefits

Benefits are recorded when paid.

Use of estimates in the preparation of financial statements

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires the Plan administrator to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and changes therein, and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities. Actual results could differ from those estimates and assumptions.

Subsequent events

The Plan has conducted an evaluation of potential subsequent events occurring after the statement of net assets available for benefits date through July 29, 2025, which is the date the financial statements are available to be issued. See Note J.

NOTE C: CERTIFIED INVESTMENTS (UNAUDITED)

Certain information related to investments disclosed in the accompanying financial statements and ERISA-required supplemental schedule, including investments at fair value and participant notes receivable held at December 31, 2024 and 2023, interest and dividend income, interest from participant notes receivable, and net appreciation in fair value of investments for the year ended December 31, 2024, was obtained by management and agreed to or derived from information certified as complete and accurate by Fidelity Management Trust Company, the trustee of the Plan.

NOTE D: FAIR VALUE MEASUREMENTS

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America establishes a framework for measuring fair value. That framework provides a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. The hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (Level 1 measurements) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (Level 3 measurements). The three levels of the fair value hierarchy are described below:

Level 1 - Quoted prices for identical assets or liabilities in active markets that the Plan has the ability to access.

Level 2 - Quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities in active markets; quoted prices for identical or similar assets or liabilities in inactive markets; inputs other than quoted prices that are observable for the asset or liability; or inputs that are derived principally from or corroborated by observable market data by correlation or other means.

If the asset or liability has a specified (contractual) term, the Level 2 input must be observable for substantially the full term of the asset or liability.

Level 3 - Instruments whose significant inputs are unobservable.

The asset's or liability's fair value measurement level within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of any input that is significant to the fair value measurement. Valuation techniques used need to maximize the use of observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs.

Following is a description of the valuation methodologies used for assets measured at fair value. There have been no changes in the methodologies used at December 31, 2024 and 2023.

Mutual funds: Valued at the daily closing price as reported by the fund. Mutual funds held by the Plan are actively traded open-end mutual funds that are registered with the U.S. Securities and Exchange Commission. These funds are required to report their daily net asset value and to transact at that price.

Common/collective trust: Valued at the net asset value reported by the fund as a practical expedient. There are no unfunded commitments and investments can be redeemed on a daily basis without restriction and are not subject to redemption notification provisions except in the case of a plan-level liquidation.

The preceding methods described may produce a fair value calculation that may not be indicative of net realizable value or reflective of future fair values. Furthermore, while the Plan believes its valuation methods are appropriate and consistent with other market participants, the use of different methodologies or assumptions to determine the fair value of certain financial instruments could result in a different fair value measurement at the reporting date.

Certain investments that are measured at fair value using the net asset value per share (or its equivalent) practical expedient have not been categorized in the fair value hierarchy. The fair value amounts presented in this table are intended to permit reconciliation of the fair value hierarchy to amounts presented in the statements of net assets available for benefits.

NOTE E: PLAN TERMINATION

Although it has not expressed any intent to do so, the Company has the right under the Plan to discontinue its contributions at any time and to terminate the Plan subject to the provisions of ERISA. In the event of Plan termination, participants are 100% vested in their accounts and their accounts will be paid to them as provided by the plan document.

NOTE F: TAX STATUS

The Plan has adopted the provisions of a volume submitter plan developed by Fidelity Management Trust Company. The Plan obtained an advisory letter from the Internal Revenue Service dated June 30, 2020, in which the Internal Revenue Service stated that the form of the volume submitter plan, as designed, was acceptable under the applicable provisions of the Internal Revenue Code (the "Code") for use by employers for the benefit of their employees. The Plan administrator believes that the Plan is designed and is currently being operated in compliance with the applicable requirements of the Internal Revenue Code and that the Plan was qualified and the related trust was tax-exempt as of the financial statement date.

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require plan management to evaluate tax positions taken by the plan and recognize a tax liability if the plan has taken an uncertain position that more likely than not would not be sustained upon examination by the Internal Revenue Service or other applicable taxing authorities. The Plan is subject to routine audits by taxing jurisdictions; however, there are currently no audits for any tax periods in progress.

NOTE G: TRANSACTIONS WITH PARTIES-IN-INTEREST

Fidelity Management Trust Company is the trustee of the Plan's assets, as well as the manager of certain funds in which participants may invest. As such, transactions between Fidelity Management Trust Company and the Plan qualify as party-in-interest transactions. Additionally, notes receivable from participants are party-in-interest transactions. As described in Note A, the Plan paid certain expenses related to plan operations and investment activity to various service providers. These transactions are party-in-interest transactions under ERISA.

NOTE I: RISKS AND UNCERTAINTIES

The Plan invests in various investment securities. Investment securities are exposed to various risks such as interest rate, market, and credit risks. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investment securities, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in the values of investment securities will occur in the near term and that such changes could materially affect participants' account balances and the amounts reported in the statements of net assets available for benefits.

NOTE A: DESCRIPTION OF THE PLAN

The following description of The Synergy Global Solutions, Inc. 401(k) Plan (the “Plan”) provides only general information. Participants should refer to the Plan agreement for a more complete description of the Plan's provisions.

General

The Plan is a defined contribution plan covering all eligible employees of Synergy IT Solutions of NYS, Inc. (the “Company”). The Company was formerly known as and continues to do business under the name Synergy Global Solutions, Inc. Participation in the Plan is elective at the discretion of the employee. The requirements, as defined by the Plan agreement, are that an employee must be 21 years of age, have completed at least three months of service, and are not covered under collective bargaining agreements. The Plan is subject to the provisions of the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (ERISA).

Contributions

Participants may contribute up to 80% of their pre-tax annual compensation, as defined by the Plan, subject to Internal Revenue Service limitations. Participants can also roll over amounts representing distributions from other qualified plans. Participants are also permitted to make after-tax Roth contributions to the Plan.

Newly eligible employees who have otherwise not affirmatively opted out of enrolling in the Plan are automatically enrolled. Employees enrolled as a result of this provision must defer 3% of their compensation to the Plan. There is also an auto-escalation provision whereby deferrals are increased by 1% each year, until reaching a maximum of 80%, if the employee does not elect otherwise.

The employer may make discretionary contributions. No discretionary contributions were made during 2024 or 2023.

Participant accounts

Each participant's account is credited with the participant's contribution, employer discretionary matching contributions and the Plan's earnings or loss. The benefit to which a participant is entitled is the benefit that can be provided from the participant's account. Participants may direct the investment of their account balances into various investment options offered by the Plan. At December 31, 2024 and 2023, all amounts allocated to accounts of participants who have withdrawn from the Plan have been paid.

Vesting

Participants are immediately vested in their elective contributions, any QNEC contributions, and actual earnings thereon. Participants vest in employer discretionary matching contributions and actual earnings and losses thereon at a rate of 20% per annum upon completion of the second year of service. Participants are fully vested in employer discretionary matching contributions after six years of service.

Forfeitures

Any forfeitures arising under the Plan can be used to pay plan expenses. At December 31, 2024, there was no balance in the forfeitures account. At December 31, 2023, there was a balance of \$37 in the forfeitures account, which was used to pay plan expenses during 2024.

Payment of benefits

A participant's entire interest in the Plan is payable upon death, attainment of normal retirement age, becoming disabled, as defined, or termination of service. A participant may elect to receive a lump-sum amount equal to the vested portion of the participant's account. Any distribution greater than \$1,000 that is made to a Participant without the Participant's consent before the Participant's Normal Retirement Age (or age 62, if later) will be rolled over to an individual retirement plan designated by the Plan Administrator. Withdrawals from the Plan may also be made upon circumstances of financial hardship, in accordance with provisions specified in the Plan.

Notes receivable – participant loans

Participants are entitled to borrow from their accounts subject to certain limitations. In general, participants may borrow up to half of their account balances, but not more than \$50,000 and not less than \$1,000 subject to restrictions set forth in the Plan document. Notes receivable bear interest at the prevailing commercial rate and generally must be repaid over a maximum term of five years. Notes receivable from participants are measured at their unpaid principal balance plus any accrued but unpaid interest. Delinquent notes are reclassified as distributions based upon the terms of the Plan document.

Administrative expenses

The Plan's expenses are paid either by the Plan or the Company, as provided by the plan document. Expenses that are paid directly by the Company are excluded from these financial statements. Certain expenses incurred in connection with the general administration of the Plan that are paid by the Plan are recorded as deductions in the accompanying statement of changes in net assets available for benefits. In addition, certain investment related expenses are included in net appreciation or depreciation of fair value of investments presented in the accompanying statement of changes in net assets available for benefits.

NOTE B: SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of accounting

The financial statements and supplemental schedule are prepared under the accrual method of accounting.

Investment value and income recognition

Investments held by the Plan are reported at fair value. Fair value is defined as the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. See Note D for further discussion of fair value measurements.

Purchases and sales of investments are recorded on a trade-date basis. Interest income is accrued when earned. Dividend income is recorded on the ex-dividend date. Net appreciation and depreciation includes the Plan's gains and losses on investments bought and sold during the year as well as held during the year.

Excess contributions payable

The Plan had its annual nondiscrimination testing performed which required the Plan to refund \$2,964 of participant contributions as of December 31, 2023, to meet the actual deferral percentage test. The amount is recorded as a liability with a corresponding reduction to employee contributions. These funds were remitted to the affected participants during 2024. There was no refund required for the year ended December 31, 2024.

Payment of benefits

Benefits are recorded when paid.

Use of estimates in the preparation of financial statements

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires the Plan administrator to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and changes therein, and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities. Actual results could differ from those estimates and assumptions.

Subsequent events

The Plan has conducted an evaluation of potential subsequent events occurring after the statement of net assets available for benefits date through July 29, 2025, which is the date the financial statements are available to be issued. See Note J.

NOTE D: FAIR VALUE MEASUREMENTS

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America establishes a framework for measuring fair value. That framework provides a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. The hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (Level 1 measurements) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (Level 3 measurements). The three levels of the fair value hierarchy are described below:

Level 1 - Quoted prices for identical assets or liabilities in active markets that the Plan has the ability to access.

Level 2 - Quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities in active markets; quoted prices for identical or similar assets or liabilities in inactive markets; inputs other than quoted prices that are observable for the asset or liability; or inputs that are derived principally from or corroborated by observable market data by correlation or other means.

If the asset or liability has a specified (contractual) term, the Level 2 input must be observable for substantially the full term of the asset or liability.

Level 3 - Instruments whose significant inputs are unobservable.

The asset's or liability's fair value measurement level within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of any input that is significant to the fair value measurement. Valuation techniques used need to maximize the use of observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs.

Following is a description of the valuation methodologies used for assets measured at fair value. There have been no changes in the methodologies used at December 31, 2024 and 2023.

Mutual funds: Valued at the daily closing price as reported by the fund. Mutual funds held by the Plan are actively traded open-end mutual funds that are registered with the U.S. Securities and Exchange Commission. These funds are required to report their daily net asset value and to transact at that price.

Common/collective trust: Valued at the net asset value reported by the fund as a practical expedient. There are no unfunded commitments and investments can be redeemed on a daily basis without restriction and are not subject to redemption notification provisions except in the case of a plan-level liquidation.

The preceding methods described may produce a fair value calculation that may not be indicative of net realizable value or reflective of future fair values. Furthermore, while the Plan believes its valuation methods are appropriate and consistent with other market participants, the use of different methodologies or assumptions to determine the fair value of certain financial instruments could result in a different fair value measurement at the reporting date.

Certain investments that are measured at fair value using the net asset value per share (or its equivalent) practical expedient have not been categorized in the fair value hierarchy. The fair value amounts presented in this table are intended to permit reconciliation of the fair value hierarchy to amounts presented in the statements of net assets available for benefits.

NOTE F: TAX STATUS

The Plan has adopted the provisions of a volume submitter plan developed by Fidelity Management Trust Company. The Plan obtained an advisory letter from the Internal Revenue Service dated June 30, 2020, in which the Internal Revenue Service stated that the form of the volume submitter plan, as designed, was acceptable under the applicable provisions of the Internal Revenue Code (the "Code") for use by employers for the benefit of their employees. The Plan administrator believes that the Plan is designed and is currently being operated in compliance with the applicable requirements of the Internal Revenue Code and that the Plan was qualified and the related trust was tax-exempt as of the financial statement date.

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require plan management to evaluate tax positions taken by the plan and recognize a tax liability if the plan has taken an uncertain position that more likely than not would not be sustained upon examination by the Internal Revenue Service or other applicable taxing authorities. The Plan is subject to routine audits by taxing jurisdictions; however, there are currently no audits for any tax periods in progress.

NOTE G: TRANSACTIONS WITH PARTIES-IN-INTEREST

Fidelity Management Trust Company is the trustee of the Plan's assets, as well as the manager of certain funds in which participants may invest. As such, transactions between Fidelity Management Trust Company and the Plan qualify as party-in-interest transactions. Additionally, notes receivable from participants are party-in-interest transactions. As described in Note A, the Plan paid certain expenses related to plan operations and investment activity to various service providers. These transactions are party-in-interest transactions under ERISA.
