Management is also responsible for maintaining a current plan instrument, including all plan amendments, administering the plan, and determining that the plan's transactions that are presented and disclosed in the financial statements are in conformity with the plan's provisions, including maintaining sufficient records with respect to each of the participants, to determine the benefits due or which may become due to such participants.

Auditors' Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements

Except as described in the Scope and Nature of the ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) Audit section of our report, our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance but is not absolute assurance and therefore is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with GAAS will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control. Misstatements are considered material if, there is a substantial likelihood that, individually or in the aggregate, they would influence the judgment made by a reasonable user based on the financial statements.

In performing an audit in accordance with GAAS, we:

- Exercise professional judgment and maintain professional skepticism throughout the audit.
- Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error, and design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks. Such procedures include examining, on a test basis, evidence regarding the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements.
- Obtain an understanding of internal controls relevant to the audit in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the Plan's internal controls. Accordingly, no such opinion is expressed.
- Evaluate the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluate the overall presentation of the financial statements.
- Conclude whether, in our judgment, there are conditions or events, considered in the aggregate, that raise substantial doubt about the Plan's ability to continue as a going concern for a reasonable period of time.



Auditors' Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements (continued)

Our audits did not extend to the certified investment information, except for obtaining and reading the certification, comparing the certified investment information with the related information presented and disclosed in the financial statements, and reading the disclosures relating to the certified investment information to assess whether they are in accordance with the presentation and disclosure requirements of accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Accordingly, the objective of an ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) audit is not to express an opinion about whether the financial statements as a whole are presented fairly, in all material respects, in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America. We are required to communicate with those charged with governance regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit, significant audit findings, and certain internal control-related matters that we identified during the audit.

Other Matter—Supplemental Schedule Required by ERISA

The supplemental schedule, including the Schedule H, Line 4i— Schedule of Assets (Held at End of Year) as of December 31, 2024, is presented for purposes of additional analysis and is not a required part of the financial statements but is supplementary information required by the Department of Labor's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA. Such information is the responsibility of management and was derived from and relates directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements. The information included in the supplemental schedule, other than that agreed to or derived from the certified investment information, has been subjected to auditing procedures applied in the audit of the financial statements and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements or to the financial statements themselves, and other additional procedures in accordance with GAAS. For information included in the supplemental schedule that agreed to or is derived from the certified investment information, we compared such information to the related certified investment information.

In forming our opinion on the supplemental schedule, we evaluated whether the supplemental schedule, other than the information agreed to or derived from the certified investment information, including its form and content, is presented in conformity with the Department of Labor's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA.

1. Description of Plan

The following description of the UnitedLex 401(k) Plan (the “Plan”) provides only general information. Participants should refer to the plan document for a more complete description of the Plan’s provisions.

General

The Plan is a defined contribution plan that has been established to provide retirement benefits to eligible employees of UnitedLex Corporation (the “Company” or “Plan Sponsor”). Related employers who also participate in the Plan include ULX Partners, LLC, UnitedLex Professional Services, LLC and iRunway, LLC. The Plan was established September 1, 2010, and is subject to the provisions of the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (“ERISA”).

Effective January 14, 2022, the Plan was amended to allow predecessor service to Blackstone Discovery upon the acquisition date.

Effective January 27, 2024, the Plan was amended to allow predecessor service to Marshall Denning, PLLC, upon the acquisition date.

SECURE 2.0 Act

On December 23, 2022, Congress passed the Consolidated Appropriations Act of 2023, which included the Setting Every Community Up Retirement Act (“SECURE”) 2.0 Act. SECURE Act 2.0 contains over 90 new retirement provisions, with varying effective dates through 2033. Since the provisions of SECURE Act 2.0 include both required and optional elements, applicable provisions will be evaluated and implemented in accordance with accompanying regulations and guidance prior to the deadline, December 31, 2026. Effective January 1, 2023, the age requirement for minimum distributions was raised to 73 from 72 for any participant who turns 72 on or after January 1, 2023. Certain provisions became effective for 2024, including changes to long-term part-time eligibility. These changes had no material impact on the Plan’s 2024 financial statements.

Eligibility

Employees who have attained the age of 21 are eligible to participate in the Plan upon hire.

Contributions

Participant Contributions

Each year, participants may contribute up to 85% of pretax annual compensation, as defined by the Plan, subject to Internal Revenue Service (“IRS”) limitations. Participants who have attained age 50 before the end of the Plan year are eligible to make catch-up contributions. Participants may also contribute amounts representing distributions from other qualified defined benefit or defined contribution plans (“rollover”). Participants have the option of designating a portion of their elective deferral contributions as after-tax (“Roth”) contributions. Participants direct the investment of their contributions into various investment options offered by the Plan.

Contributions (continued)

Participant Contributions (continued)

The Plan includes an auto-enrollment provision whereby all newly eligible employees are automatically enrolled in the Plan unless they affirmatively elect not to participate in the Plan. Automatically enrolled participants have their deferral rate set at 5% of eligible compensation and their contributions invested in a designated balanced fund until changed by the participant. The automatic deferral percentage will increase by 1% per year up to a maximum of 15% of eligible plan compensation.

Employer Matching Employer Contributions

At the discretion of the Company, the Company may contribute and credit employer matching contributions to eligible participant accounts, up to a maximum of \$3,000. For the year ended December 31, 2024, the Company authorized discretionary matching contributions equal to 50% of each participant's deferrals, up to a 6% of eligible compensation.

Qualified Nonelective Employer Contributions

At the discretion of the Company, the Company may make a Qualified Nonelective Employer Contribution ("QNEC"). Participants are immediately 100% vested in such a contribution. QNEC contributions of \$70,857 are included in employer contributions receivable on the statement of net assets available for benefits as of December 31, 2023.

Contributions from Plan participants and the associated matching contributions from the Company are recorded in the year in which the employee contributions are withheld from compensation.

Participant Accounts

Each participant's account is credited with the participant's contributions, the Company's contributions, and Plan earnings. Participant accounts are charged with an allocation of administrative expenses that are paid by the Plan. Allocations are based on participant earnings, account balances, or specific participant transactions, as defined. The benefit to which a participant is entitled is the benefit that can be provided from the participant's vested account.

Vesting

Participants are vested immediately in their contributions plus actual earnings thereon. Vesting in the Company's matching contribution portion of their accounts is based on years of continuous service. A participant becomes 100% vested after three years of continuous service.

Notes Receivable from Participants

Participants may borrow from their fund accounts a minimum of \$1,000 up to a maximum equal to the lesser of \$50,000 or 50% of their vested account balance, reduced by the highest outstanding loan balance in their account during the immediate preceding 12 month period. The loans are secured by the balance in the participant's account. The loan interest rate is set at 1% above the prime rate, as defined. Participants may have a maximum of one loan outstanding at one time. Loan terms may not exceed five years, unless for the purchase of a primary residence. Principal and interest is paid ratably through payroll deductions.

1. Description of Plan (continued)

Payment of Benefits

Upon termination of service due to death, disability or retirement, a participant may elect to receive a lump sum amount equal to the value of the participant's vested interest in his or her account. For termination of service due to other reasons, a participant may receive the value of the vested interest in his or her account as a lump-sum distribution, subject to minimum balance distribution requirements. A participant may withdraw all or part of the vested interest in his or her account upon attainment of age 59 1/2, subject to Plan provisions. The Plan also permits hardship distributions to participants that can demonstrate an immediate and heavy financial need. Upon separation from the Company, participants with account balances less than \$5,000, a single lump sum payment will be made automatically into an individual retirement account of the plan administrator's choosing. The Plan document further stipulates that account balances less than \$1,000 are to be automatically paid to the participant, without consent.

Forfeited and Unallocated Accounts

As of December 31, 2024 and 2023, forfeited nonvested accounts totaled \$59,587 and \$51,976, respectively. For the year ended December 31, 2024, participants forfeited \$47,670 in previously contributed nonvested amounts. During the year ended December 31, 2024, \$43,704 of forfeited amounts were used to reduce Company contributions.

2. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Basis of Accounting

The financial statements of the Plan are prepared on the accrual basis of accounting in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America ("U.S. GAAP").

Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with U.S. GAAP requires plan management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and changes therein, and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Investment Valuation and Income Recognition

Investments are reported at fair value. The common collective trust fund is stated at net asset value ("NAV") as determined by the trustee at the end of the plan year. The NAV, as provided by the trustee, is used as a practical expedient to estimate fair value. Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability (an exit price) in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. The Company determines the Plan's valuation policies utilizing information provided by the investment advisers and trustee. Refer to Note 4 for discussion of fair value measurements.

Purchases and sales of securities are recorded on a trade-date basis. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Dividends are recorded on the ex-dividend date. Net appreciation (depreciation) includes the Plan's gains and losses on investments bought and sold as well as held during the year.

Notes Receivable from Participants

Notes receivable from participants are measured at their unpaid principal balance plus any accrued but unpaid interest. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Related fees are recorded as administrative expenses and are expensed when they are incurred. No allowance for credit losses has been recorded as of December 31, 2024 and 2023. If a participant ceases to make loan repayments and the plan administrator deems the participant loan to be in default, the participant loan balance is reduced, and a benefit payment is recorded.

Benefit Payments

Benefits are recorded when paid.

Expenses

The Company pays certain administrative expenses incurred by the Plan. Certain investment and administration fees are deducted directly from participant's investment returns. Transaction costs borne by the Plan are charged to the individual participant who initiated the transaction to which the charge relates by reducing the participant's account balance.

Administrative expenses are reported net of \$9,500 in revenue credits. The revenue credit relates to a portion of fees paid by certain investment managers and is shared with the Plan record-keeper and used to offset the normal costs of general Plan recordkeeping and administration. When those shared fees exceed the normal recordkeeping and administration costs, the record-keeper returns those funds to the Plan in the form of a revenue credit, which may be used to pay for certain qualified expenses.

Average Deferral Percentage Test Failure

The Plan failed to pass the Average Deferral Percentage ("ADP") test for the for the Plan year ended December 31, 2023. As permitted under applicable IRS guidance, the Company opted to correct the non-discrimination failure by making a QNEC to certain non-highly compensated employees. As of December 31, 2023, the statements of net assets available for benefits includes an employer receivable of \$70,857 related to the QNEC.

Recently Adopted and New Accounting Principles

In June 2016, the Financial Accounting Standards Board issued Accounting Standards Update ("ASU") No. 2016-13, *Financial Instruments - Credit Losses (Topic 326): Measurement of Credit Losses on Financial Instruments*, and subsequent amendments to the initial guidance, ASU 2019-10. This accounting standard changes the methodology for measuring credit losses on financial instruments and the timing of when such losses are recorded. ASU No. 2016-13 is effective for fiscal years, and interim periods within those years, beginning after December 15, 2022. The Plan adopted the provisions of ASU 2016-13 for the year ended December 31, 2023. The adoption of this standard did not have a material impact on the Plan's financial statements.

Subsequent Events

Subsequent events have been evaluated through the date of the report of independent auditors, which is the date the financial statements were available to be issued. There were no items that would require recognition in the financial statements or disclosure in the notes to the financial statements.

3. Information Certified by the Trustee (unaudited)

Certain information related to investments and notes receivable from participants disclosed in the accompanying financial statements and ERISA-required supplementary information, including investments and notes receivable from participants held at December 31, 2024 and 2023, and net appreciation (depreciation) in fair value of investments and interest and dividends for the year ended December 31, 2024, was obtained by management and agreed to or derived from information certified as complete and accurate by Fidelity Management Trust Company, the trustee of the Plan.

4. Fair Value Measurements

The framework for measuring fair value hierarchy provides a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. The hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (level 1) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (level 3).

The three levels of the fair value hierarchy under FASB accounting guidance are described below:

Level 1 Inputs to the valuation methodology are unadjusted quoted prices for identical assets or liabilities in active markets that the Plan has the ability to access.

Level 2 Inputs to the valuation methodology include:

- Quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities in active markets;
- Quoted prices for identical or similar assets or liabilities in inactive markets;
- Inputs other than quoted prices that are observable for the asset or liability;
- Inputs that are derived principally from or corroborated by observable market data by correlation or other means.

If the asset or liability has a specified (contractual) term, the Level 2 input must be observable for substantially the full term of the asset or liability.

Level 3 Inputs to the valuation methodology are unobservable and significant to the fair value measurement.

The asset or liability's fair value measurement level within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of any input that is significant to the fair value measurement. Valuation techniques used need to maximize the use of observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs.

The following is a description of the valuation methodologies used for assets measured at fair value. There have been no changes in the methodologies used at December 31, 2024 and 2023.

Money market fund: Valued at the daily closing price as reported by the fund. The money market fund held by the Plan is an open-end money market fund that is registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission ("SEC"). This fund is required to publish its daily NAV and to transact at that price. The money market fund held by the Plan is deemed to be actively traded.

4. Fair Value Measurements (continued)

Mutual funds: Valued at the daily closing price as reported by the fund. Mutual funds held by the Plan are open-end mutual funds that are registered with the SEC. These funds are required to publish their daily NAV and to transact at that price. The mutual funds held by the Plan are deemed to be actively traded.

Common collective trust fund: The Plan invests in the Putnam Stable Value Fund and is measured at NAV. The NAV, as provided by the trustee, is used as a practical expedient to estimate fair value. The NAV is based on the fair value of the underlying investments held by the fund, less its liabilities. The practical expedient is not used when it is determined to be probable that the fund will sell the investment for an amount different from the reported NAV.

Self-directed brokerage account: This asset category represents a separate brokerage account that offers a wide range of investment opportunities including mutual funds and common stocks listed on major U.S. exchanges and fixed-income securities. The fair value of common stocks and other exchange traded investments that are publicly traded is based on the closing price per the principal stock exchange on which they are traded. The fair value of mutual funds is based on the net asset values of shares held at year-end.

The methods described above may produce a fair value calculation that may not be indicative of net realizable value or reflective of future fair values. Furthermore, while the Plan believes its valuation methods are appropriate and consistent with other market participants, the use of different methodologies or assumptions to determine the fair value of certain financial instruments could result in a different fair value measurement at the reporting date.

5. Related-Party and Party-in-Interest Transactions

Certain Plan investments are shares of mutual funds and a self-directed brokerage account provided through or managed by Fidelity. Fidelity Trust Company is the trustee for the Plan and, therefore, these transactions qualify as party-in-interest transactions. All investment fund earnings or losses posted to each Plan participant's account are net of investment management fees charged by each investment fund under the Plan.

Fees incurred by the Plan for the investment management services are included in net appreciation (depreciation) in fair value of the investment, as they are paid through revenue sharing, rather than a direct payment. During the year ended December 31, 2024, the Plan also made direct payments to the record-keeper and advisor totaling \$68,978. These costs incurred by the Plan are included in administrative expenses on the statement of changes in net assets available for benefits. The Company pays directly any other fees related to the Plan's operations.

6. Plan Termination

Although it has not expressed any intent to do so, the Company has the right under the Plan to discontinue its contributions at any time and to terminate the Plan subject to the provisions of ERISA. In the event of Plan termination, participants would become 100% vested in their employer contributions. During the year ended December 31, 2023, the Company experienced a decline in active participants due to certain employees accepting an offer from another employer. After further investigation, Plan management and ERISA counsel determined that a partial plan termination did not occur.

7. Income Tax Status

The Plan is based on a prototype plan developed by Fidelity which received a favorable opinion letter dated June 30, 2020, from the IRS stating that the prototype plan constitutes a qualified plan under Section 401 of the Internal Revenue Code (“IRC”). Although the Plan has been amended since receiving the determination letter, the Plan Administrator believes the Plan, as adopted and amended, is operating within the guidelines of the IRC and continues to be tax exempt. Accordingly, no provision for federal income taxes has been provided in the accompanying financial statements.

U.S. GAAP requires plan management to evaluate tax positions taken by the plan and recognize a tax liability if the plan has taken an uncertain position that more likely than not would not be sustained upon examination by the IRS. The Plan is subject to routine audits by taxing jurisdictions; however, there are currently no audits for any tax periods in progress. The plan administrator believes it is no longer subject to income tax examinations for years prior to 2021.

8. Risk and Uncertainties

The Plan invests in various investment securities. Investment securities are exposed to various risks, such as interest rate, market, and credit risks. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investment securities, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in the values of investment securities will occur in the near term and that such changes could materially affect participants' account balances and the amounts reported in the statements of net assets available for benefits.

1. Description of Plan

The following description of the UnitedLex 401(k) Plan (the “Plan”) provides only general information. Participants should refer to the plan document for a more complete description of the Plan’s provisions.

General

The Plan is a defined contribution plan that has been established to provide retirement benefits to eligible employees of UnitedLex Corporation (the “Company” or “Plan Sponsor”). Related employers who also participate in the Plan include ULX Partners, LLC, UnitedLex Professional Services, LLC and iRunway, LLC. The Plan was established September 1, 2010, and is subject to the provisions of the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (“ERISA”).

Effective January 14, 2022, the Plan was amended to allow predecessor service to Blackstone Discovery upon the acquisition date.

Effective January 27, 2024, the Plan was amended to allow predecessor service to Marshall Denning, PLLC, upon the acquisition date.

SECURE 2.0 Act

On December 23, 2022, Congress passed the Consolidated Appropriations Act of 2023, which included the Setting Every Community Up Retirement Act (“SECURE”) 2.0 Act. SECURE Act 2.0 contains over 90 new retirement provisions, with varying effective dates through 2033. Since the provisions of SECURE Act 2.0 include both required and optional elements, applicable provisions will be evaluated and implemented in accordance with accompanying regulations and guidance prior to the deadline, December 31, 2026. Effective January 1, 2023, the age requirement for minimum distributions was raised to 73 from 72 for any participant who turns 72 on or after January 1, 2023. Certain provisions became effective for 2024, including changes to long-term part-time eligibility. These changes had no material impact on the Plan’s 2024 financial statements.

Eligibility

Employees who have attained the age of 21 are eligible to participate in the Plan upon hire.

Contributions

Participant Contributions

Each year, participants may contribute up to 85% of pretax annual compensation, as defined by the Plan, subject to Internal Revenue Service (“IRS”) limitations. Participants who have attained age 50 before the end of the Plan year are eligible to make catch-up contributions. Participants may also contribute amounts representing distributions from other qualified defined benefit or defined contribution plans (“rollover”). Participants have the option of designating a portion of their elective deferral contributions as after-tax (“Roth”) contributions. Participants direct the investment of their contributions into various investment options offered by the Plan.

Contributions (continued)

Participant Contributions (continued)

The Plan includes an auto-enrollment provision whereby all newly eligible employees are automatically enrolled in the Plan unless they affirmatively elect not to participate in the Plan. Automatically enrolled participants have their deferral rate set at 5% of eligible compensation and their contributions invested in a designated balanced fund until changed by the participant. The automatic deferral percentage will increase by 1% per year up to a maximum of 15% of eligible plan compensation.

Employer Matching Employer Contributions

At the discretion of the Company, the Company may contribute and credit employer matching contributions to eligible participant accounts, up to a maximum of \$3,000. For the year ended December 31, 2024, the Company authorized discretionary matching contributions equal to 50% of each participant's deferrals, up to a 6% of eligible compensation.

Qualified Nonelective Employer Contributions

At the discretion of the Company, the Company may make a Qualified Nonelective Employer Contribution ("QNEC"). Participants are immediately 100% vested in such a contribution. QNEC contributions of \$70,857 are included in employer contributions receivable on the statement of net assets available for benefits as of December 31, 2023.

Contributions from Plan participants and the associated matching contributions from the Company are recorded in the year in which the employee contributions are withheld from compensation.

Participant Accounts

Each participant's account is credited with the participant's contributions, the Company's contributions, and Plan earnings. Participant accounts are charged with an allocation of administrative expenses that are paid by the Plan. Allocations are based on participant earnings, account balances, or specific participant transactions, as defined. The benefit to which a participant is entitled is the benefit that can be provided from the participant's vested account.

Vesting

Participants are vested immediately in their contributions plus actual earnings thereon. Vesting in the Company's matching contribution portion of their accounts is based on years of continuous service. A participant becomes 100% vested after three years of continuous service.

Notes Receivable from Participants

Participants may borrow from their fund accounts a minimum of \$1,000 up to a maximum equal to the lesser of \$50,000 or 50% of their vested account balance, reduced by the highest outstanding loan balance in their account during the immediate preceding 12 month period. The loans are secured by the balance in the participant's account. The loan interest rate is set at 1% above the prime rate, as defined. Participants may have a maximum of one loan outstanding at one time. Loan terms may not exceed five years, unless for the purchase of a primary residence. Principal and interest is paid ratably through payroll deductions.

Payment of Benefits

Upon termination of service due to death, disability or retirement, a participant may elect to receive a lump sum amount equal to the value of the participant's vested interest in his or her account. For termination of service due to other reasons, a participant may receive the value of the vested interest in his or her account as a lump-sum distribution, subject to minimum balance distribution requirements. A participant may withdraw all or part of the vested interest in his or her account upon attainment of age 59 1/2, subject to Plan provisions. The Plan also permits hardship distributions to participants that can demonstrate an immediate and heavy financial need. Upon separation from the Company, participants with account balances less than \$5,000, a single lump sum payment will be made automatically into an individual retirement account of the plan administrator's choosing. The Plan document further stipulates that account balances less than \$1,000 are to be automatically paid to the participant, without consent.

Forfeited and Unallocated Accounts

As of December 31, 2024 and 2023, forfeited nonvested accounts totaled \$59,587 and \$51,976, respectively. For the year ended December 31, 2024, participants forfeited \$47,670 in previously contributed nonvested amounts. During the year ended December 31, 2024, \$43,704 of forfeited amounts were used to reduce Company contributions.

2. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Basis of Accounting

The financial statements of the Plan are prepared on the accrual basis of accounting in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America ("U.S. GAAP").

Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with U.S. GAAP requires plan management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and changes therein, and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Investment Valuation and Income Recognition

Investments are reported at fair value. The common collective trust fund is stated at net asset value ("NAV") as determined by the trustee at the end of the plan year. The NAV, as provided by the trustee, is used as a practical expedient to estimate fair value. Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability (an exit price) in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. The Company determines the Plan's valuation policies utilizing information provided by the investment advisers and trustee. Refer to Note 4 for discussion of fair value measurements.

Purchases and sales of securities are recorded on a trade-date basis. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Dividends are recorded on the ex-dividend date. Net appreciation (depreciation) includes the Plan's gains and losses on investments bought and sold as well as held during the year.

Notes Receivable from Participants

Notes receivable from participants are measured at their unpaid principal balance plus any accrued but unpaid interest. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Related fees are recorded as administrative expenses and are expensed when they are incurred. No allowance for credit losses has been recorded as of December 31, 2024 and 2023. If a participant ceases to make loan repayments and the plan administrator deems the participant loan to be in default, the participant loan balance is reduced, and a benefit payment is recorded.

Benefit Payments

Benefits are recorded when paid.

Expenses

The Company pays certain administrative expenses incurred by the Plan. Certain investment and administration fees are deducted directly from participant's investment returns. Transaction costs borne by the Plan are charged to the individual participant who initiated the transaction to which the charge relates by reducing the participant's account balance.

Administrative expenses are reported net of \$9,500 in revenue credits. The revenue credit relates to a portion of fees paid by certain investment managers and is shared with the Plan record-keeper and used to offset the normal costs of general Plan recordkeeping and administration. When those shared fees exceed the normal recordkeeping and administration costs, the record-keeper returns those funds to the Plan in the form of a revenue credit, which may be used to pay for certain qualified expenses.

Average Deferral Percentage Test Failure

The Plan failed to pass the Average Deferral Percentage ("ADP") test for the for the Plan year ended December 31, 2023. As permitted under applicable IRS guidance, the Company opted to correct the non-discrimination failure by making a QNEC to certain non-highly compensated employees. As of December 31, 2023, the statements of net assets available for benefits includes an employer receivable of \$70,857 related to the QNEC.

Recently Adopted and New Accounting Principles

In June 2016, the Financial Accounting Standards Board issued Accounting Standards Update ("ASU") No. 2016-13, *Financial Instruments - Credit Losses (Topic 326): Measurement of Credit Losses on Financial Instruments*, and subsequent amendments to the initial guidance, ASU 2019-10. This accounting standard changes the methodology for measuring credit losses on financial instruments and the timing of when such losses are recorded. ASU No. 2016-13 is effective for fiscal years, and interim periods within those years, beginning after December 15, 2022. The Plan adopted the provisions of ASU 2016-13 for the year ended December 31, 2023. The adoption of this standard did not have a material impact on the Plan's financial statements.

Subsequent Events

Subsequent events have been evaluated through the date of the report of independent auditors, which is the date the financial statements were available to be issued. There were no items that would require recognition in the financial statements or disclosure in the notes to the financial statements.

3. Information Certified by the Trustee (unaudited)

Certain information related to investments and notes receivable from participants disclosed in the accompanying financial statements and ERISA-required supplementary information, including investments and notes receivable from participants held at December 31, 2024 and 2023, and net appreciation (depreciation) in fair value of investments and interest and dividends for the year ended December 31, 2024, was obtained by management and agreed to or derived from information certified as complete and accurate by Fidelity Management Trust Company, the trustee of the Plan.

4. Fair Value Measurements

The framework for measuring fair value hierarchy provides a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. The hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (level 1) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (level 3).

The three levels of the fair value hierarchy under FASB accounting guidance are described below:

Level 1 Inputs to the valuation methodology are unadjusted quoted prices for identical assets or liabilities in active markets that the Plan has the ability to access.

Level 2 Inputs to the valuation methodology include:

- Quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities in active markets;
- Quoted prices for identical or similar assets or liabilities in inactive markets;
- Inputs other than quoted prices that are observable for the asset or liability;
- Inputs that are derived principally from or corroborated by observable market data by correlation or other means.

If the asset or liability has a specified (contractual) term, the Level 2 input must be observable for substantially the full term of the asset or liability.

Level 3 Inputs to the valuation methodology are unobservable and significant to the fair value measurement.

The asset or liability's fair value measurement level within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of any input that is significant to the fair value measurement. Valuation techniques used need to maximize the use of observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs.

The following is a description of the valuation methodologies used for assets measured at fair value. There have been no changes in the methodologies used at December 31, 2024 and 2023.

Money market fund: Valued at the daily closing price as reported by the fund. The money market fund held by the Plan is an open-end money market fund that is registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission ("SEC"). This fund is required to publish its daily NAV and to transact at that price. The money market fund held by the Plan is deemed to be actively traded.

4. Fair Value Measurements (continued)

Mutual funds: Valued at the daily closing price as reported by the fund. Mutual funds held by the Plan are open-end mutual funds that are registered with the SEC. These funds are required to publish their daily NAV and to transact at that price. The mutual funds held by the Plan are deemed to be actively traded.

Common collective trust fund: The Plan invests in the Putnam Stable Value Fund and is measured at NAV. The NAV, as provided by the trustee, is used as a practical expedient to estimate fair value. The NAV is based on the fair value of the underlying investments held by the fund, less its liabilities. The practical expedient is not used when it is determined to be probable that the fund will sell the investment for an amount different from the reported NAV.

Self-directed brokerage account: This asset category represents a separate brokerage account that offers a wide range of investment opportunities including mutual funds and common stocks listed on major U.S. exchanges and fixed-income securities. The fair value of common stocks and other exchange traded investments that are publicly traded is based on the closing price per the principal stock exchange on which they are traded. The fair value of mutual funds is based on the net asset values of shares held at year-end.

The methods described above may produce a fair value calculation that may not be indicative of net realizable value or reflective of future fair values. Furthermore, while the Plan believes its valuation methods are appropriate and consistent with other market participants, the use of different methodologies or assumptions to determine the fair value of certain financial instruments could result in a different fair value measurement at the reporting date.

5. Related-Party and Party-in-Interest Transactions

Certain Plan investments are shares of mutual funds and a self-directed brokerage account provided through or managed by Fidelity. Fidelity Trust Company is the trustee for the Plan and, therefore, these transactions qualify as party-in-interest transactions. All investment fund earnings or losses posted to each Plan participant's account are net of investment management fees charged by each investment fund under the Plan.

Fees incurred by the Plan for the investment management services are included in net appreciation (depreciation) in fair value of the investment, as they are paid through revenue sharing, rather than a direct payment. During the year ended December 31, 2024, the Plan also made direct payments to the record-keeper and advisor totaling \$68,978. These costs incurred by the Plan are included in administrative expenses on the statement of changes in net assets available for benefits. The Company pays directly any other fees related to the Plan's operations.

6. Plan Termination

Although it has not expressed any intent to do so, the Company has the right under the Plan to discontinue its contributions at any time and to terminate the Plan subject to the provisions of ERISA. In the event of Plan termination, participants would become 100% vested in their employer contributions. During the year ended December 31, 2023, the Company experienced a decline in active participants due to certain employees accepting an offer from another employer. After further investigation, Plan management and ERISA counsel determined that a partial plan termination did not occur.

7. Income Tax Status

The Plan is based on a prototype plan developed by Fidelity which received a favorable opinion letter dated June 30, 2020, from the IRS stating that the prototype plan constitutes a qualified plan under Section 401 of the Internal Revenue Code (“IRC”). Although the Plan has been amended since receiving the determination letter, the Plan Administrator believes the Plan, as adopted and amended, is operating within the guidelines of the IRC and continues to be tax exempt. Accordingly, no provision for federal income taxes has been provided in the accompanying financial statements.

U.S. GAAP requires plan management to evaluate tax positions taken by the plan and recognize a tax liability if the plan has taken an uncertain position that more likely than not would not be sustained upon examination by the IRS. The Plan is subject to routine audits by taxing jurisdictions; however, there are currently no audits for any tax periods in progress. The plan administrator believes it is no longer subject to income tax examinations for years prior to 2021.

8. Risk and Uncertainties

The Plan invests in various investment securities. Investment securities are exposed to various risks, such as interest rate, market, and credit risks. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investment securities, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in the values of investment securities will occur in the near term and that such changes could materially affect participants' account balances and the amounts reported in the statements of net assets available for benefits.
