Notes to Financial Statements

December 31, 2024 and 2023

Note A – Description of Plan

The following description of the Signature Brands, LLC 401(k) Savings Plan (the “Plan”) provides only general information. Participants should refer to the Plan document for a more complete description of the Plan’s provisions.

General

The Plan is a defined contribution plan sponsored by Signature Brands, LLC and its participating employers (collectively, the “Employer”) covering all eligible full-time employees who have attained the age of 18 and have completed 1 month of service. The Plan was established effective January 1, 1988, and most recently amended on March 25, 2025. The Plan is subject to the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (“ERISA”).

Effective March 25, 2024, any distribution greater than \$5,000 made without participant consent before normal retirement age will be automatically rolled over. The rollover will be directed to an individual retirement plan chosen by the Plan Administrator.

Administration of the Plan

The accounting records are maintained by the Employer. The Plan’s assets were held and managed by Fidelity Management Trust Company (the “Trustee”). Contributions are held by Fidelity Management Trust Company, who invests cash received, interest and dividend income, as directed by the participant, and makes distributions to participants.

Contributions

Participants may contribute up to 60% of pretax annual compensation, as defined in the Plan, subject to Internal Revenue Code (“IRC”) limitations. The maximum participant deferral for the year ended December 31, 2024 was \$22,500. A participant who has attained the age of 50 may also make catch up contributions, subject to IRS limitations of \$7,500 for the year ended December 31, 2024. Participants may also contribute amounts representing distributions from other qualified defined benefit or contribution plans, as well as Roth contributions.

The Plan includes an auto-enrollment provision whereby all newly eligible employees are automatically enrolled in the Plan unless they affirmatively elect not to participate in the Plan. Automatically enrolled participants have their deferral rate set at 3% of eligible compensation until changed by the participant.

The Employer will make a matching contribution equal to 50% of the deferral made by each participant up to the first 5% of eligible compensation. In addition, the Company may make a discretionary profit-sharing contribution to the Plan. There was no discretionary profit-sharing contribution made to the Plan for the year ended December 31, 2024.

Participant Accounts

Each participant’s account is credited with the participant’s contribution and the Employer’s matching contribution and performance sharing amounts, if applicable. Each participant’s account shall be allocated earnings, gains, expenses, and losses with respect to the investments of the participant’s account. Allocations of Plan earnings or losses are based on each participant’s investment fund balance in proportion to the total investment fund balance.

Vesting

Participants are immediately vested in their voluntary contributions plus actual earnings thereon. Vesting in the in the Employer’s nondiscretionary matching and discretionary profit-sharing contributions is based on years of continuous service.

A participant who reaches normal retirement age 59.5, becomes totally disabled, or dies, whichever comes first while under the Company's employment, shall be 100% vested on such date.

Notes Receivable from Participants

Participants may borrow from their fund accounts a minimum of \$1,000 up to a maximum equal to the lesser of \$50,000 or 50% of their vested account balance. The notes are secured by the balance in the participant's account, or other acceptable collateral, and bear interest at a rate equal to 1% above the Prime rate. The maximum note repayment period is five years unless the note is for the purchase of a primary residence in which case the repayment schedule may be for a term in excess of five years. Principal and interest payments with respect to the notes are credited solely to the account of the borrowing participant from which the note was made.

Notes receivable from participants are measured at their unpaid principal balances plus any accrued but unpaid interest. In the event of default, the unpaid portion of the participant's loan will be treated as a taxable distribution as of the first day of the second calendar quarter following the calendar quarter in which the participant failed to make a required installment payment.

Distribution of Benefits

In the event of termination of service, death, disability or retirement, a participant may elect to receive either a lump-sum amount equal to the value of the participant's vested interest in his or her account or partial withdrawals, as defined in the Plan agreement, less any applicable taxes. If a participant's vested balance is \$5,000 or less, the Company may distribute the entire vested account balance to the participant without their consent. Participants may also request in-service distributions at age 59 ½. Benefits may be received when a participant demonstrates a situation of financial hardship as defined in the Plan.

Forfeitures

Non-vested benefits of terminated participants are forfeited on the date the participant receives a complete distribution of vested benefits. Forfeitures are used to reduce the Company's Plan administration costs and Employer contributions. During the year ended December 31, 2024, the Plan utilized approximately \$69,000 of forfeitures from participant accounts. For the years ended December 31, 2024 and 2023, forfeited non-vested accounts totaled approximately \$8,000 and \$2,000, respectively.

Plan Termination

Although it has not expressed any intent to do so, the Employer has the right under the Plan to discontinue its contributions at any time and terminate the Plan subject to the provisions of ERISA. In the event of termination of the Plan, each participant's account will become fully vested and non-forfeitable. All appropriate accounting provisions of the Plan will continue to apply until the accounts of all participants have been distributed.

Note B – Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Basis of Presentation

The accompanying financial statements are presented on the accrual basis of accounting in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America (“U.S. GAAP”).

Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with U.S. GAAP requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of net assets available for benefits and the changes in net assets available for benefits and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from these estimates.

Investment Valuation and Income Recognition

The Plan’s investments are stated at fair value. If available, quoted market prices are used to value investments. Purchases and sales of securities are recorded on a trade-date basis. Interest income is recorded on an accrual basis. Dividends are recorded at the ex-dividend date.

Payment of Benefits

Benefits are recorded when paid.

Administrative Expenses

Certain expenses of maintaining the Plan are paid by the Plan, unless otherwise paid by the Employer. Expenses that are paid by the Employer are excluded from these financial statements. Fees related to the administration of notes receivable from participants are charged directly to the participant’s account and are included in administrative expenses. Investment related expenses are included in net depreciation of fair value of investments.

Fair Value Measurements

The FASB has established a framework for measuring fair value in ASC 820, *Fair Value Measurements*. That framework provides a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. The hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (level 1 measurements) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (level 3 measurements).

The three levels of the fair value hierarchy are described below:

Level 1 Inputs to the valuation methodology are unadjusted quoted prices for identical assets or liabilities in active markets that the Plan has the ability to access.

Level 2 Inputs to the valuation methodology include:
Quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities in active markets;
Quoted prices for identical or similar assets or liabilities in inactive markets;
Inputs other than quoted prices that are observable for the asset or liability;
Inputs that are derived principally from or corroborated by observable market data by correlation or other means.

If the asset or liability has a specified (contractual) term, the Level 2 input must be observable for substantially the full term of the asset or liability.

Level 3 Inputs to the valuation methodology are unobservable and significant to the fair value measurement.

Fair Value Measurements (continued)

The asset's or liability's fair value measurement level within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of any input that is significant to the fair value measurement. Valuation techniques used need to maximize the use of observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs.

Following is a description of the valuation methodologies used for assets measured at fair value. There have been no changes in the methodologies used at December 31, 2024 and 2023.

Mutual funds: Mutual funds are valued at the daily closing price as reported by the fund. Mutual funds held by the Plan are open-end mutual funds that are registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission. These funds are required to publish their daily net asset value ("NAV") and to transact at that price. The mutual funds held by the Plan are deemed to be actively traded.

Money market funds: These are open-ended money market mutual funds valued at a \$1.00 stable NAV for reporting purposes, and transact at \$1.00 for subscription and redemption activity. However, on a daily basis the funds NAV is calculated using the amortized cost (not market value) of the securities held in the fund.

Self-directed investments: Valued at the closing price reported on the active market on which the individual securities are traded.

The methods described above may produce a fair value calculation that may not be indicative of net realizable value or reflective of future fair values. Furthermore, while the Plan believes its valuation methods are appropriate and consistent with other market participants, the use of different methodologies or assumptions to determine the fair value of certain financial instruments could result in a different fair value measurement at the reporting date.

Investments measured using the NAV as a practical expedient are exempt from being presented in the fair value hierarchy.

Note C – Certified Investments

Certain information related to investments and notes receivable from participants disclosed in the accompanying financial statements and ERISA-required supplemental schedule, including investments and notes receivable from participants held at December 31, 2024 and 2023, and net appreciation in fair value of investments, interest and dividends, and interest income on notes receivable from participants for the year ended December 31, 2024, was obtained by management and agreed to or derived from information certified as complete and accurate by the Fidelity Management Trust Company, a qualified institution. For the year ended December 31, 2024, the Plan Administrator instructed the auditors not to perform any auditing procedures with respect to the information certified by Fidelity Management Trust Company, except for comparing such information to the related information included in the financial statements, as permitted by 29 CFR 2520.103-8 of the DOL's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA.

Note D – Income Tax Status

The IRS has determined that the prototype profit sharing plan is designed in accordance with applicable sections of the IRC and informed the Trustee of such in a letter dated June 30, 2020. Although the Plan has been amended since receiving the opinion letter, the Plan Administrator believes that the Plan and related trust are currently being operated in compliance with the applicable requirements of the IRC.

Plan management has analyzed the tax positions taken by the Plan, and has concluded that as of December 31, 2024, there are no uncertain positions taken or expected to be taken that would require recognition of a liability (or asset) or disclosure in the financial statements. The Plan is subject to audit by taxing jurisdictions; however, there are currently no audits for any tax periods in progress. Plan management believes it is no longer subject to income tax examinations for years prior to 2021.

Note E – Risks and Uncertainties

The Plan invests in various investment securities. Investment securities are exposed to various risks such as interest rate, market, and credit risks. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investment securities, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in the values of investment securities will occur in the near term and that such changes could materially affect participants' account balances and the amounts reported in the statements of net assets available for benefits.

Note F – Party-In-Interest Transactions

Section 3(14) of ERISA defines a party-in-interest to include, among others, fiduciaries or participants of the Plan, any person who provides services to the Plan, or an employer whose employees are covered by the Plan. Certain Plan investments are managed by the Trustee. Transactions related to these investments qualify as party-in-interest transactions. Notes receivable from participants are also considered to be party-in-interest transactions because they are transacted with Plan participants. Fees paid to parties-in-interest by the Plan for services amounted to approximately \$22,000 during the year ended December 31, 2024.

Note A – Description of Plan

The following description of the Signature Brands, LLC 401(k) Savings Plan (the “Plan”) provides only general information. Participants should refer to the Plan document for a more complete description of the Plan’s provisions.

General

The Plan is a defined contribution plan sponsored by Signature Brands, LLC and its participating employers (collectively, the “Employer”) covering all eligible full-time employees who have attained the age of 18 and have completed 1 month of service. The Plan was established effective January 1, 1988, and most recently amended on March 25, 2025. The Plan is subject to the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (“ERISA”).

Effective March 25, 2024, any distribution greater than \$5,000 made without participant consent before normal retirement age will be automatically rolled over. The rollover will be directed to an individual retirement plan chosen by the Plan Administrator.

Administration of the Plan

The accounting records are maintained by the Employer. The Plan’s assets were held and managed by Fidelity Management Trust Company (the “Trustee”). Contributions are held by Fidelity Management Trust Company, who invests cash received, interest and dividend income, as directed by the participant, and makes distributions to participants.

Contributions

Participants may contribute up to 60% of pretax annual compensation, as defined in the Plan, subject to Internal Revenue Code (“IRC”) limitations. The maximum participant deferral for the year ended December 31, 2024 was \$22,500. A participant who has attained the age of 50 may also make catch up contributions, subject to IRS limitations of \$7,500 for the year ended December 31, 2024. Participants may also contribute amounts representing distributions from other qualified defined benefit or contribution plans, as well as Roth contributions.

The Plan includes an auto-enrollment provision whereby all newly eligible employees are automatically enrolled in the Plan unless they affirmatively elect not to participate in the Plan. Automatically enrolled participants have their deferral rate set at 3% of eligible compensation until changed by the participant.

The Employer will make a matching contribution equal to 50% of the deferral made by each participant up to the first 5% of eligible compensation. In addition, the Company may make a discretionary profit-sharing contribution to the Plan. There was no discretionary profit-sharing contribution made to the Plan for the year ended December 31, 2024.

Participant Accounts

Each participant’s account is credited with the participant’s contribution and the Employer’s matching contribution and performance sharing amounts, if applicable. Each participant’s account shall be allocated earnings, gains, expenses, and losses with respect to the investments of the participant’s account. Allocations of Plan earnings or losses are based on each participant’s investment fund balance in proportion to the total investment fund balance.

Vesting

Participants are immediately vested in their voluntary contributions plus actual earnings thereon. Vesting in the in the Employer’s nondiscretionary matching and discretionary profit-sharing contributions is based on years of continuous service.

A participant who reaches normal retirement age 59.5, becomes totally disabled, or dies, whichever comes first while under the Company's employment, shall be 100% vested on such date.

Notes Receivable from Participants

Participants may borrow from their fund accounts a minimum of \$1,000 up to a maximum equal to the lesser of \$50,000 or 50% of their vested account balance. The notes are secured by the balance in the participant's account, or other acceptable collateral, and bear interest at a rate equal to 1% above the Prime rate. The maximum note repayment period is five years unless the note is for the purchase of a primary residence in which case the repayment schedule may be for a term in excess of five years. Principal and interest payments with respect to the notes are credited solely to the account of the borrowing participant from which the note was made.

Notes receivable from participants are measured at their unpaid principal balances plus any accrued but unpaid interest. In the event of default, the unpaid portion of the participant's loan will be treated as a taxable distribution as of the first day of the second calendar quarter following the calendar quarter in which the participant failed to make a required installment payment.

Distribution of Benefits

In the event of termination of service, death, disability or retirement, a participant may elect to receive either a lump-sum amount equal to the value of the participant's vested interest in his or her account or partial withdrawals, as defined in the Plan agreement, less any applicable taxes. If a participant's vested balance is \$5,000 or less, the Company may distribute the entire vested account balance to the participant without their consent. Participants may also request in-service distributions at age 59 ½. Benefits may be received when a participant demonstrates a situation of financial hardship as defined in the Plan.

Forfeitures

Non-vested benefits of terminated participants are forfeited on the date the participant receives a complete distribution of vested benefits. Forfeitures are used to reduce the Company's Plan administration costs and Employer contributions. During the year ended December 31, 2024, the Plan utilized approximately \$69,000 of forfeitures from participant accounts. For the years ended December 31, 2024 and 2023, forfeited non-vested accounts totaled approximately \$8,000 and \$2,000, respectively.

Plan Termination

Although it has not expressed any intent to do so, the Employer has the right under the Plan to discontinue its contributions at any time and terminate the Plan subject to the provisions of ERISA. In the event of termination of the Plan, each participant's account will become fully vested and non-forfeitable. All appropriate accounting provisions of the Plan will continue to apply until the accounts of all participants have been distributed.

Note B – Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Basis of Presentation

The accompanying financial statements are presented on the accrual basis of accounting in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America (“U.S. GAAP”).

Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with U.S. GAAP requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of net assets available for benefits and the changes in net assets available for benefits and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from these estimates.

Investment Valuation and Income Recognition

The Plan’s investments are stated at fair value. If available, quoted market prices are used to value investments. Purchases and sales of securities are recorded on a trade-date basis. Interest income is recorded on an accrual basis. Dividends are recorded at the ex-dividend date.

Payment of Benefits

Benefits are recorded when paid.

Administrative Expenses

Certain expenses of maintaining the Plan are paid by the Plan, unless otherwise paid by the Employer. Expenses that are paid by the Employer are excluded from these financial statements. Fees related to the administration of notes receivable from participants are charged directly to the participant’s account and are included in administrative expenses. Investment related expenses are included in net depreciation of fair value of investments.

Fair Value Measurements

The FASB has established a framework for measuring fair value in ASC 820, *Fair Value Measurements*. That framework provides a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. The hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (level 1 measurements) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (level 3 measurements).

The three levels of the fair value hierarchy are described below:

Level 1 Inputs to the valuation methodology are unadjusted quoted prices for identical assets or liabilities in active markets that the Plan has the ability to access.

Level 2 Inputs to the valuation methodology include:
Quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities in active markets;
Quoted prices for identical or similar assets or liabilities in inactive markets;
Inputs other than quoted prices that are observable for the asset or liability;
Inputs that are derived principally from or corroborated by observable market data by correlation or other means.

If the asset or liability has a specified (contractual) term, the Level 2 input must be observable for substantially the full term of the asset or liability.

Level 3 Inputs to the valuation methodology are unobservable and significant to the fair value measurement.

Fair Value Measurements (continued)

The asset's or liability's fair value measurement level within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of any input that is significant to the fair value measurement. Valuation techniques used need to maximize the use of observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs.

Following is a description of the valuation methodologies used for assets measured at fair value. There have been no changes in the methodologies used at December 31, 2024 and 2023.

Mutual funds: Mutual funds are valued at the daily closing price as reported by the fund. Mutual funds held by the Plan are open-end mutual funds that are registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission. These funds are required to publish their daily net asset value ("NAV") and to transact at that price. The mutual funds held by the Plan are deemed to be actively traded.

Money market funds: These are open-ended money market mutual funds valued at a \$1.00 stable NAV for reporting purposes, and transact at \$1.00 for subscription and redemption activity. However, on a daily basis the funds NAV is calculated using the amortized cost (not market value) of the securities held in the fund.

Self-directed investments: Valued at the closing price reported on the active market on which the individual securities are traded.

The methods described above may produce a fair value calculation that may not be indicative of net realizable value or reflective of future fair values. Furthermore, while the Plan believes its valuation methods are appropriate and consistent with other market participants, the use of different methodologies or assumptions to determine the fair value of certain financial instruments could result in a different fair value measurement at the reporting date.

Investments measured using the NAV as a practical expedient are exempt from being presented in the fair value hierarchy.

Note C – Certified Investments

Certain information related to investments and notes receivable from participants disclosed in the accompanying financial statements and ERISA-required supplemental schedule, including investments and notes receivable from participants held at December 31, 2024 and 2023, and net appreciation in fair value of investments, interest and dividends, and interest income on notes receivable from participants for the year ended December 31, 2024, was obtained by management and agreed to or derived from information certified as complete and accurate by the Fidelity Management Trust Company, a qualified institution. For the year ended December 31, 2024, the Plan Administrator instructed the auditors not to perform any auditing procedures with respect to the information certified by Fidelity Management Trust Company, except for comparing such information to the related information included in the financial statements, as permitted by 29 CFR 2520.103-8 of the DOL's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA.

Note D – Income Tax Status

The IRS has determined that the prototype profit sharing plan is designed in accordance with applicable sections of the IRC and informed the Trustee of such in a letter dated June 30, 2020. Although the Plan has been amended since receiving the opinion letter, the Plan Administrator believes that the Plan and related trust are currently being operated in compliance with the applicable requirements of the IRC.

Plan management has analyzed the tax positions taken by the Plan, and has concluded that as of December 31, 2024, there are no uncertain positions taken or expected to be taken that would require recognition of a liability (or asset) or disclosure in the financial statements. The Plan is subject to audit by taxing jurisdictions; however, there are currently no audits for any tax periods in progress. Plan management believes it is no longer subject to income tax examinations for years prior to 2021.

Note E – Risks and Uncertainties

The Plan invests in various investment securities. Investment securities are exposed to various risks such as interest rate, market, and credit risks. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investment securities, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in the values of investment securities will occur in the near term and that such changes could materially affect participants' account balances and the amounts reported in the statements of net assets available for benefits.

Note F – Party-In-Interest Transactions

Section 3(14) of ERISA defines a party-in-interest to include, among others, fiduciaries or participants of the Plan, any person who provides services to the Plan, or an employer whose employees are covered by the Plan. Certain Plan investments are managed by the Trustee. Transactions related to these investments qualify as party-in-interest transactions. Notes receivable from participants are also considered to be party-in-interest transactions because they are transacted with Plan participants. Fees paid to parties-in-interest by the Plan for services amounted to approximately \$22,000 during the year ended December 31, 2024.
