## Notes to Financial Statements

December 31, 2024

### **1. Description of the Plan**

The following brief description of the Woburn Pediatric Associates Savings Plan, (the Plan) provides only general information. Participants should refer to the Plan Adoption Agreement and Summary Plan Description for a more complete description of the Plan's provisions.

#### **Organization and Eligibility**

The Plan, established September 1, 1994 and most recently amended and restated May 27, 2021, is a defined contribution plan, covering employees of Woburn Pediatric Associates and Woburn Pediatric Psychological Services, PLLC (Company), who have attained the age of 21, except residents of Puerto Rico, nonresident aliens, leased employees and employees covered by a collective bargaining agreement. Eligible employees participate in employee deferrals immediately upon hire.

The Plan is subject to the provisions of the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (ERISA).

#### **Contributions and Funding**

Eligible employees may contribute from 1% to 60% of their annual compensation, subject to the Internal Revenue Code (Code) limitations. Participants who have attained age fifty before the end of the Plan year are eligible to make catch-up contributions. Participants may also contribute amounts representing distributions from other qualified defined benefit or defined contribution plans. Participants direct their contributions into various investment options offered by the Plan.

The Plan permits Roth elective deferrals. Roth elective deferrals shall be treated in the same manner as participant elective deferrals, except that Roth elective deferrals are not "pre-tax" deferrals as defined in the Code.

The Company may make a discretionary matching contribution. To be eligible for the discretionary matching contribution the Plan requires a year of service, defined as 1,000 hours of service, and be employed at the end of the year. For the years ended December 31, 2024 and 2023, the Company made a \$176,865 and \$166,863 discretionary matching contribution, respectively.

## Notes to Financial Statements (continued)

### 1. Description of the Plan (continued)

#### Contributions and Funding (continued)

The Company may also make a non-elective employer contribution. To be eligible for the non-elective employer contribution, the Plan requires a year of service, defined as 1,000 hours of service, and be employed at the end of the year. For the years ended December 31, 2024 and 2023, the Company made \$798,004 and \$728,665 non-elective contributions, respectively.

#### Participant Accounts

Each participant's account is credited with the participant's contribution, allocations of the employer's contribution, if any, Plan earnings (losses), and administrative expenses, as applicable. The benefit to which a participant is entitled is the benefit that can be provided from the participant's vested account.

#### Vesting

Participants are immediately vested in their contributions plus actual earnings thereon.

Vesting in the Company's discretionary matching and non-elective contributions is based on years of continuous service. A participant is 100% vested after two years of credited service. In the event of death, permanent disability or retirement, a participant's account becomes fully vested.

#### Forfeitures

If participants terminate service prior to being fully vested in the employer's contribution account, they forfeit the amount which is not vested. Forfeitures are used to offset future employer contributions to the Plan and pay plan expenses. The balance in the forfeiture account at December 31, 2024 and 2023 respectively, was \$70,233 and \$17. During the years ended December 31, 2024 and 2023, forfeitures of \$70,699 and \$-0- were used to offset employer contributions or pay plan expenses.

#### Notes Receivable from Participants

Participants may borrow from their vested account, a minimum of \$1,000 up to a maximum of \$50,000 or 50% of their vested balance. Only one loan can be outstanding at a time. Loan terms range from 1-5 years or up to 10 years for the purchase of a primary residence. The loans are secured by the balance in the participant's account and bear interest at prime plus 1% effective October 22, 2024 and previously at a rate commensurate with local prevailing rates as determined by the plan administrator. Principal and interest are paid ratably through payroll deductions.

## Notes to Financial Statements (continued)

### 1. Description of the Plan (continued)

#### Payment of Benefits

Under the Plan, withdrawals may be made from a participant's account for qualified purposes, as defined. If service is terminated, the participant may elect to receive the entire amount of his or her salary deferral and the vested portion of his or her employer contributions. If service is terminated by retirement, death or disability, the entire balance in both accounts is distributable. The form of payment is a lump sum or an annuity payment – minimum of \$1,000. In-service withdrawals are available for employees age 59 ½ and older.

#### Plan Termination

Although it has not expressed any intent to do so, the Company has the right to alter, amend or terminate the Plan by action of its investment committee, subject to the provisions of ERISA. In the event of termination, each participant will automatically become 100% vested in his or her account balance and distributions shall be made in accordance with the Plan document.

#### Administrative Expenses

Effective February 1, 2025, the Plan entered into fixed basis point pricing with Fidelity Workplace Services, LLC. The fees related to recordkeeping services are fixed at 6.5 basis points and subject to certain offsets as described in the service agreement. These fees are billed to participant accounts quarterly.

Certain other administrative expenses such as participant loan processing fees and other participant specific fees are deducted directly from participant accounts. Participant specific fees of \$600 and \$800, respectively, were charged to participant accounts for the years ended December 31, 2024 and 2023.

### 2. Summary of Accounting Policies

#### Basis of Presentation

The financial statements are prepared on the accrual basis of accounting.

### **2. Summary of Accounting Policies (continued)**

#### **Investments and Income Recognition**

The Plan's investments are stated at fair value. Fair value is defined as the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date (an exit price). See Note 4 for discussion of fair value measurements.

Purchases and sales of securities are recorded on a trade-date basis. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Dividends are recorded on the ex-dividend date. Net appreciation (depreciation) includes the Plan's gains and losses on investments bought and sold as well as held during the year.

Management fees and operating expenses charged to the Plan for the management of investments are deducted from income earned on a daily basis and are not separately reflected. Consequently, management fees and operating expenses are reflected as a reduction of investment return for such investments.

#### **Notes Receivable from Participants**

Notes receivable from participants are measured at their unpaid principal balance plus any accrued but unpaid interest. Interest income on notes receivable from participants is recorded when it is earned. Delinquent participant loans are reclassified as distributions based upon the terms of the plan document.

#### **Use of Estimates**

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the amounts reported in the financial statements and accompanying notes. Accordingly, actual results may differ from those estimates.

#### **Payment of Benefits**

Benefits are recorded when paid.

#### 3. Certified Investments

Certain information related to investments and notes receivable from participants disclosed in the accompanying financial statements and ERISA-required supplemental schedule, including investments and notes receivable from participants held at December 31, 2024 and 2023, and net appreciation (depreciation) in fair value of mutual funds, interest, dividends, and interest income on notes receivable from participants for the years then ended, was obtained by management and agreed to or derived from information certified as complete and accurate by Fidelity Management Trust Company, the trustee of the Plan.

#### 4. Fair Value Measurements

The fair value framework establishes a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. The fair value hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets and liabilities (Level 1) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (Level 3). The three levels of the fair value hierarchy are described below.

Level 1 – Unadjusted quoted prices in active markets that are accessible to the reporting entity at the measurement date for identical assets and liabilities.

Level 2 – Inputs other than quoted prices in active markets for identical assets and liabilities that are observable either directly or indirectly for substantially the full term of the asset or liability. Level 2 inputs include the following:

- Quoted prices for similar assets and liabilities in active markets
- Quoted prices for identical or similar assets or liabilities in markets that are not active
- Observable inputs other than quoted prices that are used in the valuation of the asset or liabilities (e.g., interest rate and yield curve quotes at commonly quoted intervals)
- Inputs that are derived principally from or corroborated by observable market data by correlation or other means

If the asset or liability has a specified (contractual) term, the level 2 input must be observable for substantially the full term of the asset or liability.

### Notes to Financial Statements (continued)

#### 4. Fair Value Measurements (continued)

Level 3 – Unobservable inputs for the asset or liability (i.e., supported by little or no market activity). Level 3 inputs include management’s own assumption about the assumptions that market participants would use in pricing the asset or liability (including assumptions about risk).

The level in the fair value hierarchy within which the fair value measurement is classified is determined based on the lowest level input that is significant to the fair value measure in its entirety.

The following is a description of the valuation methodologies used by the Plan. There have been no changes in the valuation methodologies at December 31, 2024 and 2023.

*Mutual funds* are valued daily at the closing price per share, as reported by the fund. These funds are required to publish their daily net asset value (NAV) and to transact at that price. The mutual funds held by the Plan are deemed to be actively traded.

The valuation methods described above may produce a fair value calculation that may not be indicative of net realizable value or reflective of future fair values. Furthermore, while plan management believes the valuation methods are appropriate and consistent with other market participants, the use of different methodologies or assumptions to determine the fair value of certain financial instruments could result in a different fair value measurement at the reporting date.

All mutual fund investments held at December 31, 2024 and 2023, are Level 1 within the fair value hierarchy.

#### 5. Parties-In-Interest

Section 3(14) of ERISA defines a party-in-interest to include, among others, fiduciaries or employees of the Plan, any person who provides services to the Plan or an employer whose employees are covered by the Plan. Accordingly, notes receivable from participants and the management of investments held by the trustee are considered party-in-interest transactions.

Certain plan investments are shares of mutual funds managed by an affiliate of Fidelity Management Trust Company, the plan trustee. In addition, Fidelity Workplace Services, LLC is the plan recordkeeper. These investments and transactions are considered to be party-in-interest transactions; however, they are exempt from the prohibited transaction rules under ERISA.

### Notes to Financial Statements (continued)

#### 6. Risks and Uncertainties

The Plan invests in various investment securities. Investment securities are exposed to various risks such as interest rate, market and credit risks. Market risks include global events which could impact the value of investment securities, such as a pandemic or international conflict. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investment securities, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in the values of investment securities will occur in the near term and that such changes could materially affect participants' account balances and the amounts reported in the statements of net assets available for benefits.

#### 7. Income Tax Status

The Plan has adopted the non-standardized pre-approved profit-sharing plan of Fidelity Management & Research LLC. The non-standardized pre-approved profit-sharing plan sponsor received an advisory letter from the IRS dated June 30, 2020 in which the Internal Revenue Service stated that the form of the non-standardized pre-approved profit sharing plan was in compliance with the applicable requirements of the Internal Revenue Code (Code). Although the Plan has been amended since receiving the advisory letter, the plan administrator believes the Plan is being operated in compliance with the applicable requirements of the Code and, therefore, believes that the Plan is qualified, and the related trust is tax exempt.

Accounting standards require recording uncertain income tax positions that exist in the Plan's financial statements. Plan management has determined there are no uncertain tax positions and believes there is no adjustment or disclosure required in the Plan's financial statements. The Plan is subject to routine audits by taxing jurisdictions; however, there are currently no audits for any tax periods in progress.

## Notes to Financial Statements

December 31, 2024

### **1. Description of the Plan**

The following brief description of the Woburn Pediatric Associates Savings Plan, (the Plan) provides only general information. Participants should refer to the Plan Adoption Agreement and Summary Plan Description for a more complete description of the Plan's provisions.

#### **Organization and Eligibility**

The Plan, established September 1, 1994 and most recently amended and restated May 27, 2021, is a defined contribution plan, covering employees of Woburn Pediatric Associates and Woburn Pediatric Psychological Services, PLLC (Company), who have attained the age of 21, except residents of Puerto Rico, nonresident aliens, leased employees and employees covered by a collective bargaining agreement. Eligible employees participate in employee deferrals immediately upon hire.

The Plan is subject to the provisions of the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (ERISA).

#### **Contributions and Funding**

Eligible employees may contribute from 1% to 60% of their annual compensation, subject to the Internal Revenue Code (Code) limitations. Participants who have attained age fifty before the end of the Plan year are eligible to make catch-up contributions. Participants may also contribute amounts representing distributions from other qualified defined benefit or defined contribution plans. Participants direct their contributions into various investment options offered by the Plan.

The Plan permits Roth elective deferrals. Roth elective deferrals shall be treated in the same manner as participant elective deferrals, except that Roth elective deferrals are not "pre-tax" deferrals as defined in the Code.

The Company may make a discretionary matching contribution. To be eligible for the discretionary matching contribution the Plan requires a year of service, defined as 1,000 hours of service, and be employed at the end of the year. For the years ended December 31, 2024 and 2023, the Company made a \$176,865 and \$166,863 discretionary matching contribution, respectively.

## Notes to Financial Statements (continued)

### 1. Description of the Plan (continued)

#### Contributions and Funding (continued)

The Company may also make a non-elective employer contribution. To be eligible for the non-elective employer contribution, the Plan requires a year of service, defined as 1,000 hours of service, and be employed at the end of the year. For the years ended December 31, 2024 and 2023, the Company made \$798,004 and \$728,665 non-elective contributions, respectively.

#### Participant Accounts

Each participant's account is credited with the participant's contribution, allocations of the employer's contribution, if any, Plan earnings (losses), and administrative expenses, as applicable. The benefit to which a participant is entitled is the benefit that can be provided from the participant's vested account.

#### Vesting

Participants are immediately vested in their contributions plus actual earnings thereon.

Vesting in the Company's discretionary matching and non-elective contributions is based on years of continuous service. A participant is 100% vested after two years of credited service. In the event of death, permanent disability or retirement, a participant's account becomes fully vested.

#### Forfeitures

If participants terminate service prior to being fully vested in the employer's contribution account, they forfeit the amount which is not vested. Forfeitures are used to offset future employer contributions to the Plan and pay plan expenses. The balance in the forfeiture account at December 31, 2024 and 2023 respectively, was \$70,233 and \$17. During the years ended December 31, 2024 and 2023, forfeitures of \$70,699 and \$-0- were used to offset employer contributions or pay plan expenses.

#### Notes Receivable from Participants

Participants may borrow from their vested account, a minimum of \$1,000 up to a maximum of \$50,000 or 50% of their vested balance. Only one loan can be outstanding at a time. Loan terms range from 1-5 years or up to 10 years for the purchase of a primary residence. The loans are secured by the balance in the participant's account and bear interest at prime plus 1% effective October 22, 2024 and previously at a rate commensurate with local prevailing rates as determined by the plan administrator. Principal and interest are paid ratably through payroll deductions.

## Notes to Financial Statements (continued)

### 1. Description of the Plan (continued)

#### Payment of Benefits

Under the Plan, withdrawals may be made from a participant's account for qualified purposes, as defined. If service is terminated, the participant may elect to receive the entire amount of his or her salary deferral and the vested portion of his or her employer contributions. If service is terminated by retirement, death or disability, the entire balance in both accounts is distributable. The form of payment is a lump sum or an annuity payment – minimum of \$1,000. In-service withdrawals are available for employees age 59 ½ and older.

#### Plan Termination

Although it has not expressed any intent to do so, the Company has the right to alter, amend or terminate the Plan by action of its investment committee, subject to the provisions of ERISA. In the event of termination, each participant will automatically become 100% vested in his or her account balance and distributions shall be made in accordance with the Plan document.

#### Administrative Expenses

Effective February 1, 2025, the Plan entered into fixed basis point pricing with Fidelity Workplace Services, LLC. The fees related to recordkeeping services are fixed at 6.5 basis points and subject to certain offsets as described in the service agreement. These fees are billed to participant accounts quarterly.

Certain other administrative expenses such as participant loan processing fees and other participant specific fees are deducted directly from participant accounts. Participant specific fees of \$600 and \$800, respectively, were charged to participant accounts for the years ended December 31, 2024 and 2023.

### 2. Summary of Accounting Policies

#### Basis of Presentation

The financial statements are prepared on the accrual basis of accounting.

### **2. Summary of Accounting Policies (continued)**

#### **Investments and Income Recognition**

The Plan's investments are stated at fair value. Fair value is defined as the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date (an exit price). See Note 4 for discussion of fair value measurements.

Purchases and sales of securities are recorded on a trade-date basis. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Dividends are recorded on the ex-dividend date. Net appreciation (depreciation) includes the Plan's gains and losses on investments bought and sold as well as held during the year.

Management fees and operating expenses charged to the Plan for the management of investments are deducted from income earned on a daily basis and are not separately reflected. Consequently, management fees and operating expenses are reflected as a reduction of investment return for such investments.

#### **Notes Receivable from Participants**

Notes receivable from participants are measured at their unpaid principal balance plus any accrued but unpaid interest. Interest income on notes receivable from participants is recorded when it is earned. Delinquent participant loans are reclassified as distributions based upon the terms of the plan document.

#### **Use of Estimates**

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the amounts reported in the financial statements and accompanying notes. Accordingly, actual results may differ from those estimates.

#### **Payment of Benefits**

Benefits are recorded when paid.

#### 3. Certified Investments

Certain information related to investments and notes receivable from participants disclosed in the accompanying financial statements and ERISA-required supplemental schedule, including investments and notes receivable from participants held at December 31, 2024 and 2023, and net appreciation (depreciation) in fair value of mutual funds, interest, dividends, and interest income on notes receivable from participants for the years then ended, was obtained by management and agreed to or derived from information certified as complete and accurate by Fidelity Management Trust Company, the trustee of the Plan.

#### 4. Fair Value Measurements

The fair value framework establishes a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. The fair value hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets and liabilities (Level 1) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (Level 3). The three levels of the fair value hierarchy are described below.

Level 1 – Unadjusted quoted prices in active markets that are accessible to the reporting entity at the measurement date for identical assets and liabilities.

Level 2 – Inputs other than quoted prices in active markets for identical assets and liabilities that are observable either directly or indirectly for substantially the full term of the asset or liability. Level 2 inputs include the following:

- Quoted prices for similar assets and liabilities in active markets
- Quoted prices for identical or similar assets or liabilities in markets that are not active
- Observable inputs other than quoted prices that are used in the valuation of the asset or liabilities (e.g., interest rate and yield curve quotes at commonly quoted intervals)
- Inputs that are derived principally from or corroborated by observable market data by correlation or other means

If the asset or liability has a specified (contractual) term, the level 2 input must be observable for substantially the full term of the asset or liability.

### Notes to Financial Statements (continued)

#### 4. Fair Value Measurements (continued)

Level 3 – Unobservable inputs for the asset or liability (i.e., supported by little or no market activity). Level 3 inputs include management’s own assumption about the assumptions that market participants would use in pricing the asset or liability (including assumptions about risk).

The level in the fair value hierarchy within which the fair value measurement is classified is determined based on the lowest level input that is significant to the fair value measure in its entirety.

The following is a description of the valuation methodologies used by the Plan. There have been no changes in the valuation methodologies at December 31, 2024 and 2023.

*Mutual funds* are valued daily at the closing price per share, as reported by the fund. These funds are required to publish their daily net asset value (NAV) and to transact at that price. The mutual funds held by the Plan are deemed to be actively traded.

The valuation methods described above may produce a fair value calculation that may not be indicative of net realizable value or reflective of future fair values. Furthermore, while plan management believes the valuation methods are appropriate and consistent with other market participants, the use of different methodologies or assumptions to determine the fair value of certain financial instruments could result in a different fair value measurement at the reporting date.

All mutual fund investments held at December 31, 2024 and 2023, are Level 1 within the fair value hierarchy.

#### 5. Parties-In-Interest

Section 3(14) of ERISA defines a party-in-interest to include, among others, fiduciaries or employees of the Plan, any person who provides services to the Plan or an employer whose employees are covered by the Plan. Accordingly, notes receivable from participants and the management of investments held by the trustee are considered party-in-interest transactions.

Certain plan investments are shares of mutual funds managed by an affiliate of Fidelity Management Trust Company, the plan trustee. In addition, Fidelity Workplace Services, LLC is the plan recordkeeper. These investments and transactions are considered to be party-in-interest transactions; however, they are exempt from the prohibited transaction rules under ERISA.

### Notes to Financial Statements (continued)

#### 6. Risks and Uncertainties

The Plan invests in various investment securities. Investment securities are exposed to various risks such as interest rate, market and credit risks. Market risks include global events which could impact the value of investment securities, such as a pandemic or international conflict. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investment securities, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in the values of investment securities will occur in the near term and that such changes could materially affect participants' account balances and the amounts reported in the statements of net assets available for benefits.

#### 7. Income Tax Status

The Plan has adopted the non-standardized pre-approved profit-sharing plan of Fidelity Management & Research LLC. The non-standardized pre-approved profit-sharing plan sponsor received an advisory letter from the IRS dated June 30, 2020 in which the Internal Revenue Service stated that the form of the non-standardized pre-approved profit sharing plan was in compliance with the applicable requirements of the Internal Revenue Code (Code). Although the Plan has been amended since receiving the advisory letter, the plan administrator believes the Plan is being operated in compliance with the applicable requirements of the Code and, therefore, believes that the Plan is qualified, and the related trust is tax exempt.

Accounting standards require recording uncertain income tax positions that exist in the Plan's financial statements. Plan management has determined there are no uncertain tax positions and believes there is no adjustment or disclosure required in the Plan's financial statements. The Plan is subject to routine audits by taxing jurisdictions; however, there are currently no audits for any tax periods in progress.

#### 8. Reconciliation of Financial Statements to Form 5500
