INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

To the Plan Administrator
Lighthouse Worldwide Solutions, Inc. 401(k) Retirement
Savings Plan

Scope and Nature of the ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) Audits

We have performed audits of the accompanying financial statements of Lighthouse Worldwide Solutions, Inc. 401(k) Retirement Savings Plan, an employee benefit plan subject to the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (ERISA), as permitted by ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) ("ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) audit"). The financial statements comprise the statements of net assets available for benefits as of December 31, 2024 and 2023, and the related statement of changes in net assets available for benefits for the year ended December 31, 2024, and the related notes to the financial statements.

Management, having determined it is permissible in the circumstances, has elected to have the audits of Lighthouse Worldwide Solutions, Inc. 401(k) Retirement Savings Plan's financial statements performed in accordance with ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) pursuant to 29 CFR 2520.103-8 of the Department of Labor's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA. As permitted by ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C), our audits need not extend to any statements or information related to assets held for investment of the plan (investment information) by a bank or similar institution or insurance carrier that is regulated, supervised, and subject to periodic examination by a state or federal agency, provided that the statements or information regarding assets so held are prepared and certified to by the bank or similar institution or insurance carrier in accordance with 29 CFR 2520.103-5 of the Department of Labor's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA (qualified institution).

Management has obtained certifications from a qualified institution as of December 31, 2024 and 2023, and for the year ended December 31, 2024, stating that the certified investment information, as described in Note 3 to the financial statements, is complete and accurate.

Opinion

In our opinion, based on our audits and on the procedures performed as described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audits of the Financial Statements section:

- the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements referred to above, other than those agreed to or derived from the certified investment information, are presented fairly, in all material respects, in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.
- the information in the financial statements referred to above related to assets held by and certified to by a qualified institution agrees to, or is derived from, in all material respects, the information prepared and certified by an institution that management determined meets the requirements of ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C).

Basis for Opinion

We conducted our audits in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audits of the Financial Statements section of our report. We are required to be independent of Lighthouse Worldwide Solutions, Inc. 401(k) Retirement Savings Plan and to meet our other ethical responsibilities, in accordance with the relevant ethical requirements relating to our audits. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinion.

Responsibilities of Management for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America, and for the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error. Management's election of the ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) audits does not affect management's responsibility for the financial statements.

In preparing the financial statements, management is required to evaluate whether there are conditions or events, considered in the aggregate, that raise substantial doubt about Lighthouse Worldwide Solutions, Inc. 401(k) Retirement Savings Plan's ability to continue as a going concern within one year after the date that the financial statements are available to be issued.

Management is also responsible for maintaining a current plan instrument, including all plan amendments, administering the plan, and determining that the plan's transactions that are presented and disclosed in the financial statements are in conformity with the plan's provisions, including maintaining sufficient records with respect to each of the participants, to determine the benefits due or which may become due to such participants.

Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance but is not absolute assurance and therefore is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control. Misstatements are considered material if there is a substantial likelihood that, individually or in the aggregate, they would influence the judgment made by a reasonable user based on the financial statements.

In performing audits in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards, we:

Accordingly, the objective of an ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) audit is not to express an opinion about whether the financial statements as a whole are presented fairly, in all material respects, in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

We are required to communicate with those charged with governance regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audits, significant audit findings, and certain internal control related matters that we identified during the audits.

Other Matter - Supplemental Schedules Required by ERISA

The supplemental schedules of delinquent participant contributions for the year ended December 31, 2024, and of assets (held at end of year) as of December 31, 2024, (collectively, the "supplemental schedules") are presented for purposes of additional analysis and are not a required part of the financial statements but are supplementary information required by the Department of Labor's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA. Such information is the responsibility of management and was derived from and relates directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements. The information included in the supplemental schedules, other than that agreed to or derived from the certified investment information, has been subjected to auditing procedures applied in the audits of the financial statements and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements or to the financial statements themselves, and other additional procedures in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards. For information included in the supplemental schedules that agreed to or is derived from the certified investment information, we compared such information to the related certified investment information.

In forming our opinion on the supplemental schedules, we evaluated whether the supplemental schedules, other than the information agreed to or derived from the certified investment information, including their form and content, are presented in conformity with the Department of Labor's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA.

1. DESCRIPTION OF THE PLAN

The following description of Lighthouse Worldwide Solutions, Inc. 401(k) Retirement Savings Plan (the "Plan") provides only general information. Participants should refer to the plan document for a more complete description of the Plan's provisions.

General

The Plan, a defined contribution savings plan sponsored by Lighthouse Worldwide Solutions, Inc. (the "Plan Sponsor," the "Company" or the "Employer"), pursuant to Section 401(a) and related provisions of the Internal Revenue Code ("IRC"), was restated on November 10, 2021, and amended on November 1, 2023. The Plan is designed to provide participants with a means to defer a portion of their compensation for retirement and to provide benefits in the event of disability, death, termination or financial hardship. The Plan covers most employees of the Company who meet certain eligibility requirements. The Plan is subject to the provisions of the Department of Labor's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 ("ERISA") and subsequent amendments and the IRC.

The Plan allows employees from Northstar, LLC and Jung SuWon Martial Arts Academy, which are entities under the common ownership of the Employer, to participate in the Plan, subject to meeting the Plan's eligibility requirements.

Effective March 2020, the Plan administratively adopted the provisions of the Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security ("CARES") Act, related to participant loans and distributions. The Company has until December 31, 2026, to amend the Plan for changes allowed by the CARES Act. The Plan has not been formally amended to adopt these provisions as of December 31, 2024.

An expansion of Setting Every Community Up for Retirement Enhancement Act of 2019 ("SECURE 2.0") was signed into law on December 29, 2022, as part of the Consolidated Appropriations Act of 2023. The effective dates of provisions within SECURE 2.0 vary through 2026. The Plan Sponsor has until the end of the first Plan year beginning on or after January 1, 2026, to amend the Plan for the changes related to SECURE 2.0. The Plan has not been formally amended to adopt these provisions as of the date the financial statements were available to be issued.

Plan administration

The Company is the administrator of the Plan and, as such, carries out the duties imposed by ERISA. The Company has delegated certain responsibilities for the operation and administration of the Plan. The Company has appointed Fidelity Management Trust Company (the "Trustee") to serve as the Plan's directed trustee and asset custodian (Note 3). Fidelity Workplace Services LLC, an affiliate of the Trustee, provides record-keeping services and manages participant accounts and participant related transactions.

Eligibility

All employees, except residents of Puerto Rico, become eligible to make elective deferral contributions after reaching the age of 18. Eligible employees will receive Employer contributions after completing three months of service, as defined in the Plan.

Participant contributions

Participants may elect to contribute through payroll deductions amounts up to 60% of their compensation to the Plan, subject to calendar year contribution limits set forth by the IRC. Participant contributions may be made on a pre-tax annual compensation or, effective November 1, 2023, after tax as Roth contributions, as defined in the Plan. Participants who have attained age 50 before the end of the Plan year are eligible to make catch-up contributions up to IRC limits. Participants may also contribute amounts representing distributions or rollovers from other qualified defined benefit or defined contribution plans. Contributions are subject to regulatory limitations.

Employer contributions

The Company makes safe-harbor matching contributions equal to 100% of eligible participant's elective deferral up to 5% of the participant's eligible compensation, as defined by the Plan. The Company has the option to make additional matching contributions on behalf of the eligible participants. The Company also has the option to make non-elective discretionary contributions. For 2024, Employer safe-harbor contributions amounted to \$532,001. There were no additional matching or non-elective discretionary contributions in 2024.

Participant accounts

Each participant's account is credited with the participant's contributions, Employer safe-harbor matching contributions and Employer additional matching or discretionary non-elective contributions, if any, as well as Plan earnings. Participant accounts are charged with Plan losses and an allocation of administrative expenses that are paid by the Plan, unless paid by the Plan Sponsor. Allocations are based on participant earnings, account balances, or specific participant transactions, as defined. The benefit to which a participant is entitled is the benefit that can be provided from the participant's vested account. Participants direct the investment of their account into various investment options offered by the Plan.

Vesting

Participants are immediately vested in their contributions and safe-harbor matching contributions plus earnings thereon. Vesting in the Company's additional matching and discretionary contributions, plus earnings thereon, is based on years of vesting service, as defined. In the event of death, disability or attaining normal retirement age, participants are immediately vested in all Company contributions.

Notes receivable from participants

Participants may borrow against their accounts a minimum of \$1,000 up to a maximum equal to the lesser of \$50,000 or 50% of their vested account balance. Notes receivable (or "loan") terms are generally five years or less, but may exceed five years if the purpose of the loan is to purchase a principal residence. Participants may only have one loan outstanding at any time. The notes receivable are secured by the remaining balance in the participant's account and bear interest at the prime lending rate plus 1%. Interest rates ranged from 4.25% and 9.50% as of December 31, 2024. Notes receivable from participants mature at various dates through November 2034.

Payment of benefits

Distributions and withdrawals are payable upon retirement, termination, financial hardship, disability, or death. If a participant's account balance is equal to or less than \$1,000 upon participant's termination of employment, the balance is distributed immediately in a lump-sum cash payment unless a direct rollover into another qualified benefit plan is requested. Balances greater than \$1,000 but less than or equal to \$5,000 will be rolled over to an individual retirement plan designated by the administrator if the participant has not requested a lump-sum cash payment or a direct rollover into another qualified benefit plan upon participant's termination of employment. If the account balance is over \$5,000, the participant can consent to either a distribution paid in the form of a lump-sum cash payment, a direct rollover into another qualified plan or postpone payment to a later date and remain in the Plan as described in the plan documents. Hardship withdrawals of at least \$500 from the participant's deferral contribution account are permissible upon immediate and heavy financial need, as defined by the plan document.

Forfeitures

Forfeitures of non-vested accounts of terminated participants can be used to reduce Employer contributions or to pay administrative expenses. As of December 31, 2024 and 2023, the forfeiture balance held by the Plan was \$296 and \$290, respectively. No forfeitures were utilized to reduce Employer contributions or to pay administrative expenses.

2. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of accounting and financial statement presentation

The financial statements of the Plan are prepared on the accrual basis of accounting in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America (U.S. GAAP).

Use of estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with U.S. GAAP requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and changes therein, and disclosure of contingent liabilities. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Risks and uncertainties

The Plan invests in various investment securities. Investment securities are exposed to various risks such as interest rate, market and credit risks. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investment securities, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in the values of investment securities will occur in the near term and that such changes could materially affect participants' account balances and the amounts reported in the statements of net assets available for benefit and changes therein.

Investment valuation and income recognition

The Plan's investments are stated at fair value. Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. See Note 4 for discussion of fair value measurements.

Purchases and sales of securities are recorded on a trade-date basis. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Dividends are recorded on the ex-dividend date. Net appreciation includes the Plan's gains and losses on investments bought and sold as well as held during the year.

Notes receivable from participants

Notes receivable from participants are measured at their unpaid principal balance plus any accrued but unpaid interest. Interest income on notes receivable from participants is recorded when it is earned. Delinquent participant loans are recorded as deemed distributions based upon the terms of the plan document. No allowance for credit losses has been recorded as of December 31, 2024 and 2023.

Contributions and contributions receivable

Contributions from participants are recorded based on the date the contributions have been separated from participants' pay (pay date). Contributions from the Employer are recorded in the year earned to coincide with the year in which the Employer records the contributions to its general ledger. The Plan records receivables for contributions based upon contributions recorded in the Plan year but received by the Plan subsequent to year end. Rollover contributions from participants are recorded based on the date the contributions are received by the Trustee.

Payment of benefits

Benefit payments are recorded when paid.

Administrative expenses

Administrative expenses are recorded when incurred.

Subsequent events

The Plan has evaluated subsequent events through September 2, 2025, the date the financial statements were available for issuance. No subsequent events have occurred that would have a material impact on the presentation of the Plan's financial statements.

3. INFORMATION PREPARED AND CERTIFIED BY THE TRUSTEE (UNAUDITED)

The plan administrator, having determined it is permissible in the circumstances, has elected to have the audit of the Plan's financial statements performed in accordance with ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) pursuant to 29 CFR 2520.103-8 of ERISA. Accordingly, the Trustee (Note 1), determined to be a qualified institution by the plan administrator, has certified to the completeness and accuracy of:

- Investments and notes receivable from participants reflected on the accompanying statements of net assets available for benefits as of December 31, 2024 and 2023.
- Investment income and interest income on notes receivable from participants reflected on the accompanying statement of changes in net assets available for benefits for the year ended December 31, 2024; and,

- Investments and notes receivable from participants reflected on the schedule of assets (held at end of year) as of December 31, 2024 ("supplemental schedule").

Accordingly, as requested by the Plan administrator, the Plan's independent auditor performed no audit procedures on the certified information other than to agree the certified information to the related information included in the Plan's financial statements and supplemental schedule.

4. FAIR VALUE MEASUREMENTS

Accounting standards establish a framework for measuring fair value. The framework provides a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. The hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (Level 1 measurements) and the lowest priority to measurements involving significant unobservable inputs (Level 3 measurements).

The three levels of the fair value hierarchy are described as follows:

- *Level 1* - inputs to the valuation methodology are unadjusted quoted prices for identical assets or liabilities the Plan has the ability to access at the measurement date.
- *Level 2* - inputs other than Level 1 that are observable, either directly or indirectly, such as quoted prices in active markets for similar assets or liabilities, quoted prices for identical or similar assets or liabilities in the markets that are not active, or other inputs that are observable or can be corroborated by observable market data for substantially the full term of the assets or liabilities; or
- *Level 3* - inputs are unobservable inputs for the assets or liabilities and significant to the fair value measurement.

The assets or liabilities' fair value measurement level within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of any input that is significant to the fair value measurement. Valuation techniques maximize the use of relevant observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs.

Mutual funds: Valued at the daily closing price as reported on the open market. Mutual funds held by the Plan are open-end mutual funds that are registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission. These funds are required to publish their daily net asset value (NAV) and to transact at that price. The mutual funds held by the Plan are deemed to be actively traded.

Common/collective trust fund (CCT): Valued at the NAV of units of a collective trust. The NAV is used as a practical expedient to estimate fair value. The NAV is based on the fair value of the underlying assets held by the fund, less its liabilities, divided by the number of outstanding shares. This practical expedient is not used when it is determined to be probable that the fund will sell the investment for an amount different than the reported NAV.

The preceding method described may produce a fair value calculation that may not be indicative of net realizable value or reflective of future values. Furthermore, although the Plan believes its valuation method is appropriate and consistent with other market participants, the use of different methodologies or assumptions to determine the fair value of certain financial instruments could result in a different fair value measurement at the reporting date.

* In accordance with Subtopic 820-10, certain investments that were measured at net asset value per share (or its equivalent) have not been classified in the fair value hierarchy. 5. TAX STATUS

The Plan adopted the Fidelity Volume Submitter Profit Sharing Plan (the "volume submitter plan"). The Internal Revenue Service has issued an opinion letter dated June 30, 2020, stating that the volume submitter plan is designed in accordance with the applicable sections of the IRC and is appropriate for use by employers for the benefit of their employees. The plan administrator believes that the Plan is currently designed and being operated in compliance with the applicable requirements of the IRC and therefore, believes that the Plan is qualified and is tax-exempt. Therefore, no provision for income taxes has been included in the Plan's financial statements.

6. PLAN TERMINATION

Although it has not expressed any intent to do so, the Company has the right under the Plan to discontinue its contributions at any time and to terminate the Plan subject to the provisions of ERISA.

7. RELATED PARTIES AND PARTIES-IN-INTEREST

ERISA defines party-in-interest similar to a related party under U.S. GAAP, except that ERISA's definition is broader and includes all entities and individuals that provide services to the Plan; however, these entities may not necessarily be related parties. Plan management did not identify any related parties to the Plan that were not also considered to be parties-in-interest.

Party-in-interest transactions include those with fiduciaries or employees of the Plan, any person who provides services to the Plan, an employer whose employees are covered by the Plan, an employee organization whose members are covered by the Plan, and a person who owns 50% or more of such an employer or employee association or relatives of such persons.

Transactions conducted by the Trustee and its affiliates qualify as party-in-interest transactions. Also, the Company pays certain fees and expenses on behalf of the Plan. These transactions qualify as party-in-interest transactions.

The Trustee retains as compensation for services provided to the Plan, any interest (or "float") on amounts earned, while certain transactions are pending. This applies to contributions, distributions and transfers made between funds. Earnings are at institutional money market rates.

Scope and Nature of the ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) Audits

We have performed audits of the accompanying financial statements of Lighthouse Worldwide Solutions, Inc. 401(k) Retirement Savings Plan, an employee benefit plan subject to the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (ERISA), as permitted by ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) ("ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) audit"). The financial statements comprise the statements of net assets available for benefits as of December 31, 2024 and 2023, and the related statement of changes in net assets available for benefits for the year ended December 31, 2024, and the related notes to the financial statements.

Management, having determined it is permissible in the circumstances, has elected to have the audits of Lighthouse Worldwide Solutions, Inc. 401(k) Retirement Savings Plan's financial statements performed in accordance with ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) pursuant to 29 CFR 2520.103-8 of the Department of Labor's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA. Management has obtained certifications from a qualified institution as of December 31, 2024 and 2023, and for the year ended December 31, 2024, stating that the certified investment information, as described in Note 3 to the financial statements, is complete and accurate.

Opinion

1. DESCRIPTION OF THE PLAN

The following description of Lighthouse Worldwide Solutions, Inc. 401(k) Retirement Savings Plan (the "Plan") provides only general information. Participants should refer to the plan document for a more complete description of the Plan's provisions.

General

The Plan, a defined contribution savings plan sponsored by Lighthouse Worldwide Solutions, Inc. (the "Plan Sponsor," the "Company" or the "Employer"), pursuant to Section 401(a) and related provisions of the Internal Revenue Code ("IRC"), was restated on November 10, 2021, and amended on November 1, 2023. The Plan is designed to provide participants with a means to defer a portion of their compensation for retirement and to provide benefits in the event of disability, death, termination or financial hardship. The Plan covers most employees of the Company who meet certain eligibility requirements. The Plan is subject to the provisions of the Department of Labor's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 ("ERISA") and subsequent amendments and the IRC.

The Plan allows employees from Northstar, LLC and Jung SuWon Martial Arts Academy, which are entities under the common ownership of the Employer, to participate in the Plan, subject to meeting the Plan's eligibility requirements.

Effective March 2020, the Plan administratively adopted the provisions of the Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security ("CARES") Act, related to participant loans and distributions. The Company has until December 31, 2026, to amend the Plan for changes allowed by the CARES Act. The Plan has not been formally amended to adopt these provisions as of December 31, 2024.

An expansion of Setting Every Community Up for Retirement Enhancement Act of 2019 ("SECURE 2.0") was signed into law on December 29, 2022, as part of the Consolidated Appropriations Act of 2023. The effective dates of provisions within SECURE 2.0 vary through 2026. The Plan Sponsor has until the end of the first Plan year beginning on or after January 1, 2026, to amend the Plan for the changes related to SECURE 2.0. The Plan has not been formally amended to adopt these provisions as of the date the financial statements were available to be issued.

Plan administration

The Company is the administrator of the Plan and, as such, carries out the duties imposed by ERISA. The Company has delegated certain responsibilities for the operation and administration of the Plan. The Company has appointed Fidelity Management Trust Company (the "Trustee") to serve as the Plan's directed trustee and asset custodian (Note 3). Fidelity Workplace Services LLC, an affiliate of the Trustee, provides record-keeping services and manages participant accounts and participant related transactions.

Eligibility

All employees, except residents of Puerto Rico, become eligible to make elective deferral contributions after reaching the age of 18. Eligible employees will receive Employer contributions after completing three months of service, as defined in the Plan.

Participant contributions

Participants may elect to contribute through payroll deductions amounts up to 60% of their compensation to the Plan, subject to calendar year contribution limits set forth by the IRC. Participant contributions may be made on a pre-tax annual compensation or, effective November 1, 2023, after tax as Roth contributions, as defined in the Plan. Participants who have attained age 50 before the end of the Plan year are eligible to make catch-up contributions up to IRC limits. Participants may also contribute amounts representing distributions or rollovers from other qualified defined benefit or defined contribution plans. Contributions are subject to regulatory limitations.

Employer contributions

The Company makes safe-harbor matching contributions equal to 100% of eligible participant's elective deferral up to 5% of the participant's eligible compensation, as defined by the Plan. The Company has the option to make additional matching contributions on behalf of the eligible participants. The Company also has the option to make non-elective discretionary contributions. For 2024, Employer safe-harbor contributions amounted to \$532,001. There were no additional matching or non-elective discretionary contributions in 2024.

Participant accounts

Each participant's account is credited with the participant's contributions, Employer safe-harbor matching contributions and Employer additional matching or discretionary non-elective contributions, if any, as well as Plan earnings. Participant accounts are charged with Plan losses and an allocation of administrative expenses that are paid by the Plan, unless paid by the Plan Sponsor. Allocations are based on participant earnings, account balances, or specific participant transactions, as defined. The benefit to which a participant is entitled is the benefit that can be provided from the participant's vested account. Participants direct the investment of their account into various investment options offered by the Plan.

Vesting

Participants are immediately vested in their contributions and safe-harbor matching contributions plus earnings thereon. Vesting in the Company's additional matching and discretionary contributions, plus earnings thereon, is based on years of vesting service, as defined. In the event of death, disability or attaining normal retirement age, participants are immediately vested in all Company contributions.

Notes receivable from participants

Participants may borrow against their accounts a minimum of \$1,000 up to a maximum equal to the lesser of \$50,000 or 50% of their vested account balance. Notes receivable (or "loan") terms are generally five years or less, but may exceed five years if the purpose of the loan is to purchase a principal residence. Participants may only have one loan outstanding at any time. The notes receivable are secured by the remaining balance in the participant's account and bear interest at the prime lending rate plus 1%. Interest rates ranged from 4.25% and 9.50% as of December 31, 2024. Notes receivable from participants mature at various dates through November 2034.

Payment of benefits

Distributions and withdrawals are payable upon retirement, termination, financial hardship, disability, or death. If a participant's account balance is equal to or less than \$1,000 upon participant's termination of employment, the balance is distributed immediately in a lump-sum cash payment unless a direct rollover into another qualified benefit plan is requested. Balances greater than \$1,000 but less than or equal to \$5,000 will be rolled over to an individual retirement plan designated by the administrator if the participant has not requested a lump-sum cash payment or a direct rollover into another qualified benefit plan upon participant's termination of employment. If the account balance is over \$5,000, the participant can consent to either a distribution paid in the form of a lump-sum cash payment, a direct rollover into another qualified plan or postpone payment to a later date and remain in the Plan as described in the plan documents. Hardship withdrawals of at least \$500 from the participant's deferral contribution account are permissible upon immediate and heavy financial need, as defined by the plan document.

Forfeitures

Forfeitures of non-vested accounts of terminated participants can be used to reduce Employer contributions or to pay administrative expenses. As of December 31, 2024 and 2023, the forfeiture balance held by the Plan was \$296 and \$290, respectively. No forfeitures were utilized to reduce Employer contributions or to pay administrative expenses.

2. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of accounting and financial statement presentation

The financial statements of the Plan are prepared on the accrual basis of accounting in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America (U.S. GAAP).

Use of estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with U.S. GAAP requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and changes therein, and disclosure of contingent liabilities. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Risks and uncertainties

The Plan invests in various investment securities. Investment securities are exposed to various risks such as interest rate, market and credit risks. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investment securities, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in the values of investment securities will occur in the near term and that such changes could materially affect participants' account balances and the amounts reported in the statements of net assets available for benefit and changes therein.

Investment valuation and income recognition

The Plan's investments are stated at fair value. Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. See Note 4 for discussion of fair value measurements.

Purchases and sales of securities are recorded on a trade-date basis. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Dividends are recorded on the ex-dividend date. Net appreciation includes the Plan's gains and losses on investments bought and sold as well as held during the year.

Notes receivable from participants

Notes receivable from participants are measured at their unpaid principal balance plus any accrued but unpaid interest. Interest income on notes receivable from participants is recorded when it is earned. Delinquent participant loans are recorded as deemed distributions based upon the terms of the plan document. No allowance for credit losses has been recorded as of December 31, 2024 and 2023.

Contributions and contributions receivable

Contributions from participants are recorded based on the date the contributions have been separated from participants' pay (pay date). Contributions from the Employer are recorded in the year earned to coincide with the year in which the Employer records the contributions to its general ledger. The Plan records receivables for contributions based upon contributions recorded in the Plan year but received by the Plan subsequent to year end. Rollover contributions from participants are recorded based on the date the contributions are received by the Trustee.

Payment of benefits

Benefit payments are recorded when paid.

Administrative expenses

Administrative expenses are recorded when incurred.

Subsequent events

The Plan has evaluated subsequent events through September 2, 2025, the date the financial statements were available for issuance. No subsequent events have occurred that would have a material impact on the presentation of the Plan's financial statements.

3. INFORMATION PREPARED AND CERTIFIED BY THE TRUSTEE (UNAUDITED)

The plan administrator, having determined it is permissible in the circumstances, has elected to have the audit of the Plan's financial statements performed in accordance with ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) pursuant to 29 CFR 2520.103-8 of ERISA. Accordingly, the Trustee (Note 1), determined to be a qualified institution by the plan administrator, has certified to the completeness and accuracy of:

- Investments and notes receivable from participants reflected on the accompanying statements of net assets available for benefits as of December 31, 2024 and 2023.
- Investment income and interest income on notes receivable from participants reflected on the accompanying statement of changes in net assets available for benefits for the year ended December 31, 2024; and,

- Investments and notes receivable from participants reflected on the schedule of assets (held at end of year) as of December 31, 2024 ("supplemental schedule").

Accordingly, as requested by the Plan administrator, the Plan's independent auditor performed no audit procedures on the certified information other than to agree the certified information to the related information included in the Plan's financial statements and supplemental schedule.

4. FAIR VALUE MEASUREMENTS

Accounting standards establish a framework for measuring fair value. The framework provides a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. The hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (Level 1 measurements) and the lowest priority to measurements involving significant unobservable inputs (Level 3 measurements).

The three levels of the fair value hierarchy are described as follows:

- *Level 1* - inputs to the valuation methodology are unadjusted quoted prices for identical assets or liabilities the Plan has the ability to access at the measurement date.
- *Level 2* - inputs other than Level 1 that are observable, either directly or indirectly, such as quoted prices in active markets for similar assets or liabilities, quoted prices for identical or similar assets or liabilities in the markets that are not active, or other inputs that are observable or can be corroborated by observable market data for substantially the full term of the assets or liabilities; or
- *Level 3* - inputs are unobservable inputs for the assets or liabilities and significant to the fair value measurement.

The assets or liabilities' fair value measurement level within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of any input that is significant to the fair value measurement. Valuation techniques maximize the use of relevant observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs.

Mutual funds: Valued at the daily closing price as reported on the open market. Mutual funds held by the Plan are open-end mutual funds that are registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission. These funds are required to publish their daily net asset value (NAV) and to transact at that price. The mutual funds held by the Plan are deemed to be actively traded.

Common/collective trust fund (CCT): Valued at the NAV of units of a collective trust. The NAV is used as a practical expedient to estimate fair value. The NAV is based on the fair value of the underlying assets held by the fund, less its liabilities, divided by the number of outstanding shares. This practical expedient is not used when it is determined to be probable that the fund will sell the investment for an amount different than the reported NAV.

The preceding method described may produce a fair value calculation that may not be indicative of net realizable value or reflective of future values. Furthermore, although the Plan believes its valuation method is appropriate and consistent with other market participants, the use of different methodologies or assumptions to determine the fair value of certain financial instruments could result in a different fair value measurement at the reporting date.

5. TAX STATUS

The Plan adopted the Fidelity Volume Submitter Profit Sharing Plan (the "volume submitter plan"). The Internal Revenue Service has issued an opinion letter dated June 30, 2020, stating that the volume submitter plan is designed in accordance with the applicable sections of the IRC and is appropriate for use by employers for the benefit of their employees. The plan administrator believes that the Plan is currently designed and being operated in compliance with the applicable requirements of the IRC and therefore, believes that the Plan is qualified and is tax-exempt. Therefore, no provision for income taxes has been included in the Plan's financial statements.

6. PLAN TERMINATION

Although it has not expressed any intent to do so, the Company has the right under the Plan to discontinue its contributions at any time and to terminate the Plan subject to the provisions of ERISA.

7. RELATED PARTIES AND PARTIES-IN-INTEREST

ERISA defines party-in-interest similar to a related party under U.S. GAAP, except that ERISA's definition is broader and includes all entities and individuals that provide services to the Plan; however, these entities may not necessarily be related parties. Plan management did not identify any related parties to the Plan that were not also considered to be parties-in-interest.

Party-in-interest transactions include those with fiduciaries or employees of the Plan, any person who provides services to the Plan, an employer whose employees are covered by the Plan, an employee organization whose members are covered by the Plan, and a person who owns 50% or more of such an employer or employee association or relatives of such persons.

Transactions conducted by the Trustee and its affiliates qualify as party-in-interest transactions. Also, the Company pays certain fees and expenses on behalf of the Plan. These transactions qualify as party-in-interest transactions.

The Trustee retains as compensation for services provided to the Plan, any interest (or "float") on amounts earned, while certain transactions are pending. This applies to contributions, distributions and transfers made between funds. Earnings are at institutional money market rates.

Scope and Nature of the ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) Audits

1. DESCRIPTION OF THE PLAN

The following description of Lighthouse Worldwide Solutions, Inc. 401(k) Retirement Savings Plan (the "Plan") provides only general information. Participants should refer to the plan document for a more complete description of the Plan's provisions.

General

The Plan, a defined contribution savings plan sponsored by Lighthouse Worldwide Solutions, Inc. (the "Plan Sponsor," the "Company" or the "Employer"), pursuant to Section 401(a) and related provisions of the Internal Revenue Code ("IRC"), was restated on November 10, 2021, and amended on November 1, 2023. The Plan is designed to provide participants with a means to defer a portion of their compensation for retirement and to provide benefits in the event of disability, death, termination or financial hardship. The Plan covers most employees of the Company who meet certain eligibility requirements. The Plan is subject to the provisions of the Department of Labor's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 ("ERISA") and subsequent amendments and the IRC.

The Plan allows employees from Northstar, LLC and Jung SuWon Martial Arts Academy, which are entities under the common ownership of the Employer, to participate in the Plan, subject to meeting the Plan's eligibility requirements.

Effective March 2020, the Plan administratively adopted the provisions of the Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security ("CARES") Act, related to participant loans and distributions. The Company has until December 31, 2026, to amend the Plan for changes allowed by the CARES Act. The Plan has not been formally amended to adopt these provisions as of December 31, 2024.

An expansion of Setting Every Community Up for Retirement Enhancement Act of 2019 ("SECURE 2.0") was signed into law on December 29, 2022, as part of the Consolidated Appropriations Act of 2023. The effective dates of provisions within SECURE 2.0 vary through 2026. The Plan Sponsor has until the end of the first Plan year beginning on or after January 1, 2026, to amend the Plan for the changes related to SECURE 2.0. The Plan has not been formally amended to adopt these provisions as of the date the financial statements were available to be issued.

Plan administration

The Company is the administrator of the Plan and, as such, carries out the duties imposed by ERISA. The Company has delegated certain responsibilities for the operation and administration of the Plan. The Company has appointed Fidelity Management Trust Company (the "Trustee") to serve as the Plan's directed trustee and asset custodian (Note 3). Fidelity Workplace Services LLC, an affiliate of the Trustee, provides record-keeping services and manages participant accounts and participant related transactions.

Eligibility

All employees, except residents of Puerto Rico, become eligible to make elective deferral contributions after reaching the age of 18. Eligible employees will receive Employer contributions after completing three months of service, as defined in the Plan.

Participant contributions

Participants may elect to contribute through payroll deductions amounts up to 60% of their compensation to the Plan, subject to calendar year contribution limits set forth by the IRC. Participant contributions may be made on a pre-tax annual compensation or, effective November 1, 2023, after tax as Roth contributions, as defined in the Plan. Participants who have attained age 50 before the end of the Plan year are eligible to make catch-up contributions up to IRC limits. Participants may also contribute amounts representing distributions or rollovers from other qualified defined benefit or defined contribution plans. Contributions are subject to regulatory limitations.

Employer contributions

The Company makes safe-harbor matching contributions equal to 100% of eligible participant's elective deferral up to 5% of the participant's eligible compensation, as defined by the Plan. The Company has the option to make additional matching contributions on behalf of the eligible participants. The Company also has the option to make non-elective discretionary contributions. For 2024, Employer safe-harbor contributions amounted to \$532,001. There were no additional matching or non-elective discretionary contributions in 2024.

Participant accounts

Each participant's account is credited with the participant's contributions, Employer safe-harbor matching contributions and Employer additional matching or discretionary non-elective contributions, if any, as well as Plan earnings. Participant accounts are charged with Plan losses and an allocation of administrative expenses that are paid by the Plan, unless paid by the Plan Sponsor. Allocations are based on participant earnings, account balances, or specific participant transactions, as defined. The benefit to which a participant is entitled is the benefit that can be provided from the participant's vested account. Participants direct the investment of their account into various investment options offered by the Plan.

Vesting

Participants are immediately vested in their contributions and safe-harbor matching contributions plus earnings thereon. Vesting in the Company's additional matching and discretionary contributions, plus earnings thereon, is based on years of vesting service, as defined. In the event of death, disability or attaining normal retirement age, participants are immediately vested in all Company contributions.

Notes receivable from participants

Participants may borrow against their accounts a minimum of \$1,000 up to a maximum equal to the lesser of \$50,000 or 50% of their vested account balance. Notes receivable (or "loan") terms are generally five years or less, but may exceed five years if the purpose of the loan is to purchase a principal residence. Participants may only have one loan outstanding at any time. The notes receivable are secured by the remaining balance in the participant's account and bear interest at the prime lending rate plus 1%. Interest rates ranged from 4.25% and 9.50% as of December 31, 2024. Notes receivable from participants mature at various dates through November 2034.

Payment of benefits

Distributions and withdrawals are payable upon retirement, termination, financial hardship, disability, or death. If a participant's account balance is equal to or less than \$1,000 upon participant's termination of employment, the balance is distributed immediately in a lump-sum cash payment unless a direct rollover into another qualified benefit plan is requested. Balances greater than \$1,000 but less than or equal to \$5,000 will be rolled over to an individual retirement plan designated by the administrator if the participant has not requested a lump-sum cash payment or a direct rollover into another qualified benefit plan upon participant's termination of employment. If the account balance is over \$5,000, the participant can consent to either a distribution paid in the form of a lump-sum cash payment, a direct rollover into another qualified plan or postpone payment to a later date and remain in the Plan as described in the plan documents. Hardship withdrawals of at least \$500 from the participant's deferral contribution account are permissible upon immediate and heavy financial need, as defined by the plan document.

Forfeitures

Forfeitures of non-vested accounts of terminated participants can be used to reduce Employer contributions or to pay administrative expenses. As of December 31, 2024 and 2023, the forfeiture balance held by the Plan was \$296 and \$290, respectively. No forfeitures were utilized to reduce Employer contributions or to pay administrative expenses.

2. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of accounting and financial statement presentation

The financial statements of the Plan are prepared on the accrual basis of accounting in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America (U.S. GAAP).

Use of estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with U.S. GAAP requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and changes therein, and disclosure of contingent liabilities. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Risks and uncertainties

The Plan invests in various investment securities. Investment securities are exposed to various risks such as interest rate, market and credit risks. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investment securities, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in the values of investment securities will occur in the near term and that such changes could materially affect participants' account balances and the amounts reported in the statements of net assets available for benefit and changes therein.

Investment valuation and income recognition

The Plan's investments are stated at fair value. Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. See Note 4 for discussion of fair value measurements.

Purchases and sales of securities are recorded on a trade-date basis. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Dividends are recorded on the ex-dividend date. Net appreciation includes the Plan's gains and losses on investments bought and sold as well as held during the year.

Notes receivable from participants

Notes receivable from participants are measured at their unpaid principal balance plus any accrued but unpaid interest. Interest income on notes receivable from participants is recorded when it is earned. Delinquent participant loans are recorded as deemed distributions based upon the terms of the plan document. No allowance for credit losses has been recorded as of December 31, 2024 and 2023.

Contributions and contributions receivable

Contributions from participants are recorded based on the date the contributions have been separated from participants' pay (pay date). Contributions from the Employer are recorded in the year earned to coincide with the year in which the Employer records the contributions to its general ledger. The Plan records receivables for contributions based upon contributions recorded in the Plan year but received by the Plan subsequent to year end. Rollover contributions from participants are recorded based on the date the contributions are received by the Trustee.

Payment of benefits

Benefit payments are recorded when paid.

Administrative expenses

Administrative expenses are recorded when incurred.

Subsequent events

The Plan has evaluated subsequent events through September 2, 2025, the date the financial statements were available for issuance. No subsequent events have occurred that would have a material impact on the presentation of the Plan's financial statements.

3. INFORMATION PREPARED AND CERTIFIED BY THE TRUSTEE (UNAUDITED)

The plan administrator, having determined it is permissible in the circumstances, has elected to have the audit of the Plan's financial statements performed in accordance with ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) pursuant to 29 CFR 2520.103-8 of ERISA. Accordingly, the Trustee (Note 1), determined to be a qualified institution by the plan administrator, has certified to the completeness and accuracy of:

- Investments and notes receivable from participants reflected on the accompanying statements of net assets available for benefits as of December 31, 2024 and 2023.
- Investment income and interest income on notes receivable from participants reflected on the accompanying statement of changes in net assets available for benefits for the year ended December 31, 2024; and,

- Investments and notes receivable from participants reflected on the schedule of assets (held at end of year) as of December 31, 2024 ("supplemental schedule").

Accordingly, as requested by the Plan administrator, the Plan's independent auditor performed no audit procedures on the certified information other than to agree the certified information to the related information included in the Plan's financial statements and supplemental schedule.

4. FAIR VALUE MEASUREMENTS

Accounting standards establish a framework for measuring fair value. The framework provides a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. The hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (Level 1 measurements) and the lowest priority to measurements involving significant unobservable inputs (Level 3 measurements).

The three levels of the fair value hierarchy are described as follows:

- *Level 1* - inputs to the valuation methodology are unadjusted quoted prices for identical assets or liabilities the Plan has the ability to access at the measurement date.
- *Level 2* - inputs other than Level 1 that are observable, either directly or indirectly, such as quoted prices in active markets for similar assets or liabilities, quoted prices for identical or similar assets or liabilities in the markets that are not active, or other inputs that are observable or can be corroborated by observable market data for substantially the full term of the assets or liabilities; or
- *Level 3* - inputs are unobservable inputs for the assets or liabilities and significant to the fair value measurement.

The assets or liabilities' fair value measurement level within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of any input that is significant to the fair value measurement. Valuation techniques maximize the use of relevant observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs.

Mutual funds: Valued at the daily closing price as reported on the open market. Mutual funds held by the Plan are open-end mutual funds that are registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission. These funds are required to publish their daily net asset value (NAV) and to transact at that price. The mutual funds held by the Plan are deemed to be actively traded.

Common/collective trust fund (CCT): Valued at the NAV of units of a collective trust. The NAV is used as a practical expedient to estimate fair value. The NAV is based on the fair value of the underlying assets held by the fund, less its liabilities, divided by the number of outstanding shares. This practical expedient is not used when it is determined to be probable that the fund will sell the investment for an amount different than the reported NAV.

The preceding method described may produce a fair value calculation that may not be indicative of net realizable value or reflective of future values. Furthermore, although the Plan believes its valuation method is appropriate and consistent with other market participants, the use of different methodologies or assumptions to determine the fair value of certain financial instruments could result in a different fair value measurement at the reporting date.

5. TAX STATUS

The Plan adopted the Fidelity Volume Submitter Profit Sharing Plan (the "volume submitter plan"). The Internal Revenue Service has issued an opinion letter dated June 30, 2020, stating that the volume submitter plan is designed in accordance with the applicable sections of the IRC and is appropriate for use by employers for the benefit of their employees. The plan administrator believes that the Plan is currently designed and being operated in compliance with the applicable requirements of the IRC and therefore, believes that the Plan is qualified and is tax-exempt. Therefore, no provision for income taxes has been included in the Plan's financial statements.

6. PLAN TERMINATION

Although it has not expressed any intent to do so, the Company has the right under the Plan to discontinue its contributions at any time and to terminate the Plan subject to the provisions of ERISA.

7. RELATED PARTIES AND PARTIES-IN-INTEREST

ERISA defines party-in-interest similar to a related party under U.S. GAAP, except that ERISA's definition is broader and includes all entities and individuals that provide services to the Plan; however, these entities may not necessarily be related parties. Plan management did not identify any related parties to the Plan that were not also considered to be parties-in-interest.

Party-in-interest transactions include those with fiduciaries or employees of the Plan, any person who provides services to the Plan, an employer whose employees are covered by the Plan, an employee organization whose members are covered by the Plan, and a person who owns 50% or more of such an employer or employee association or relatives of such persons.

Transactions conducted by the Trustee and its affiliates qualify as party-in-interest transactions. Also, the Company pays certain fees and expenses on behalf of the Plan. These transactions qualify as party-in-interest transactions.

The Trustee retains as compensation for services provided to the Plan, any interest (or "float") on amounts earned, while certain transactions are pending. This applies to contributions, distributions and transfers made between funds. Earnings are at institutional money market rates.
