Scope and Nature of the ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) Audit

We have performed audits of the accompanying financial statements of Roman, Inc. Profit Sharing and 401(k) Plan, an employee benefit plan subject to the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (ERISA), as permitted by ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C). The financial statements comprise the statements of net assets available for benefits as of December 31, 2024 and 2023, and the related statement of changes in net assets available for benefits for the year ended December 31, 2024, and the related notes to the financial statements.

Management, having determined it is permissible in the circumstances, has elected to have the audits of Roman, Inc. Profit Sharing and 401(k) Plan's financial statements performed in accordance with ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) pursuant to 29 CFR 2520.103-8 of the Department of Labor's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA. As permitted by ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C), our audits need not extend to any statements or information related to assets held for investment of the Plan (investment information) by a bank or similar institution or insurance carrier that is regulated, supervised, and subject to periodic examination by a state or federal agency, provided that the statements or information regarding assets so held are prepared and certified to by the bank or similar institution or insurance carrier in accordance with 29 CFR 2520.103-5 of the Department of Labor's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA (qualified institution).

Management has obtained certifications from a qualified institution as of December 31, 2024 and 2023, and for the year ended December 31, 2024, stating that the certified investment information, as described in Note 3 to the financial statements, is complete and accurate.

Opinion

In our opinion, based on our audits and on the procedures performed as described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements section -

- the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements referred to above, other than those agreed to or derived from the certified investment information, are presented fairly, in all material respects, in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

- the information in the financial statements referred to above related to assets held by and certified to by a qualified institution agrees to, or is derived from, in all material respects, the information prepared and certified by an institution that management determined meets the requirements of ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C).

Basis for Opinion

We conducted our audits in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements section of our report. We are required to be independent of Roman, Inc. Profit Sharing and 401(k) Plan and to meet our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with the relevant ethical requirements relating to our audits. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) audit opinion.

Responsibilities of Management for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America, and for the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error. Management's election of the ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) audit does not affect management's responsibility for the financial statements.

In preparing the financial statements, management is required to evaluate whether there are conditions or events, considered in the aggregate, that raise substantial doubt about Roman, Inc. Profit Sharing and 401(k) Plan's ability to continue as a going concern for one year after the date the financial statements are available to be issued.

Management is also responsible for maintaining a current plan instrument, including all plan amendments; administering the plan; and determining that the plan's transactions that are presented and disclosed in the financial statements are in conformity with the plan's provisions, including maintaining sufficient records with respect to each of the participants, to determine the benefits due or which may become due to such participants.

Except as described in the Scope and Nature of the ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) Audit section of our report, our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance but is not absolute assurance and therefore is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control. Misstatements are considered material if there is a substantial likelihood that, individually or in the aggregate, they would influence the judgment made by a reasonable user based on the financial statements.

Accordingly, the objective of an ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) audit is not to express an opinion about whether the financial statements as a whole are presented fairly, in all material respects, in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Note 1 – Description of Plan

The following description of the Roman, Inc. Profit Sharing and 401(k) Plan (the Plan) provides general information only. Participants should refer to the Plan agreement for a more complete description of the Plan's provisions.

General

The Plan is a defined contribution plan covering all employees of Roman, Inc. (the Company) who have attained 21 years of age. The Plan is subject to the provisions of the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (ERISA).

Contributions

Each year, participants may contribute the lesser of \$23,000 and \$22,500 in 2024 and 2023, respectively, or up to 20% of their pretax annual compensation (elective contribution). Participants are also permitted to designate that a portion or all elective contributions be classified as Roth contributions in which the deferral would be included in the participant's gross income at the time of the deferral. Participants may also contribute amounts representing distributions from other qualified plans. Plan participants who are eligible to make salary deferrals and have attained age 50 by December 31 of a calendar year may make "catch-up" salary deferrals in addition to regular salary deferrals for that year. The limit for catch-up contributions is \$7,500 in 2024 and 2023. Participants may also contribute an additional 15% of their annual after-tax compensation to the Plan. The Company may make a matching 401(k) contribution not to exceed 50% of the participant's first 2% of compensation contributed as pre-tax or after-tax contributions and/or a profit sharing contribution at the discretion of its Board of Directors. The company made an employer match of \$34,843 and \$38,416 for the years ended December 31, 2024 and 2023, respectively. The Company made profit sharing contributions of \$50,000 for the years ended December 31, 2024 and 2023.

Participant Accounts

Individual accounts are maintained for each Plan participant. Each participant's account is credited with the participant's contribution, the Company's discretionary matching contribution, the Company's discretionary additional contribution, Plan earnings, Plan losses, and administrative expenses. Allocations are based on participant compensation or account balances, as defined. Earnings include interest, dividends, realized gains or losses on sale of investments and the net change in unrealized appreciation or depreciation of investments. All investment accounts of the Plan are directed by the participants. The benefit to which a participant is entitled is the benefit that can be provided from the participant's vested account.

Vesting

Participants are 100% vested immediately in their contributions and investment earnings thereon. A participant is 100% vested in the Company's matching and profit sharing contributions upon completing six years of credited service. In the event of death, disability or retirement at designated ages, participants become fully vested.

Investment Options

Participants may direct contributions in a variety of investment choices as more fully described in the Plan agreement. Participants may change their investments daily.

Notes Receivable from Participants

Participants may borrow from their fund accounts a minimum of \$1,000 and up to a maximum of \$50,000 or 50% of their vested account balance, whichever is less. The loans are secured by the balance in the participant's account and bear interest at rates that range from 3.25% to 8.50%, which is commensurate with local prevailing rates as determined quarterly by the Plan Administrator. Principal and interest are paid ratably through payroll deductions.

Payment of Benefits

On termination of service due to death, disability, or retirement, a participant may elect to receive either a lump-sum amount equal to the value of the participant's vested interest in his or her account, or annual installments over a period of time. For termination of service for other reasons, a participant may receive the value of the vested interest in his or her account as a lump-sum distribution.

Forfeited Accounts

At December 31, 2024 and 2023, forfeited nonvested accounts totaled \$2,625 and \$53,332, respectively. These accounts will be used to reduce future Company contributions. In 2024 and 2023, the amounts of forfeitures allocated to participants' accounts were \$54,558 and \$174 from forfeited nonvested accounts.

Administrative Expenses

Certain administrative operating expenses of the Plan are paid by the Company, as provided in the Plan agreement.

Note 2 – Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Basis of Accounting

The financial statements of the Plan are prepared on the accrual method of accounting in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and changes therein, and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Investment Valuation and Income Recognition

Investments are reported at fair value. Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. See Note 8 for discussion of fair value measurements.

Purchases and sales of securities are recorded on a trade-date basis. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Dividends are recorded on the ex-dividend date. Net appreciation includes the Plan's gains and losses on investments bought and sold as well as held during the year.

Notes Receivable from Participants

Notes receivable from participants are measured at their unpaid principal balance plus any accrued but unpaid interest. Delinquent notes receivable from participants are reclassified as distributions based upon terms of the Plan agreement.

Payment of Benefits

Benefits are recorded when paid. Net assets available for benefits at December 31, 2023, include \$549,958 allocated to the account of a participant as of or prior to that date who had withdrawn from participating in the earnings and operations of the plan. The \$549,958 was paid to the former participant in January 2024.

Note 4 –Tax Status

The Internal Revenue Service ruled on June 30, 2020 that the Non-Standardized Prototype for Profit-Sharing Plan with CODA (the prototype Plan of the Trust Company upon which the Plan is based) qualifies under Section 401(a) of the Internal Revenue Code (“IRC”) and the related trust is, therefore, not subject to tax under present income tax law. The Plan is required to operate in conformity with the IRC to maintain its qualification. The Plan Administrator is not aware of any course of action or series of events that have occurred that might adversely affect the Plan’s qualified status.

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require Plan management to evaluate tax positions taken by the Plan and recognize a tax liability (or asset) if the Plan has taken an uncertain position that more likely than not would not be sustained upon examination by the Internal Revenue Service. The Plan Administrator has analyzed the tax positions taken by the Plan, and has concluded that as of December 31, 2024, there are no uncertain tax positions taken or expected to be taken that would require recognition of a liability (or asset) or disclosure in the financial statements. The Plan is subject to routine audits by taxing jurisdictions; however, there are currently no audits for any tax periods in progress.

Note 5 – Plan Termination

Although it has not expressed any intention to do so, the Company has the right under the Plan to discontinue its contributions at any time and to terminate the Plan subject to the provisions set forth in ERISA. In the event of Plan termination, participants would become 100% vested in their account.

Note 6 – Related-Party Transactions

Certain Plan investments are shares of registered investment companies that are managed by Bank of America, N.A. Bank of America, N.A. is the Trustee as defined by the Plan, and therefore, these transactions qualify as party-in-interest transactions. The notes receivable from participants are also party-in-interest transactions. Fees paid by the Plan for investment management services were included as a reduction of the return earned on each fund.

Note 7 – Risks and Uncertainties

The Plan invests in various investment securities. Investment securities are exposed to various risks such as interest rate, market and credit risks. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investment securities, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in the values of the investment securities will occur in the near term and that such changes could materially affect participants' account balances and the amounts reported in the statement of net assets available for benefits.

Note 8 – Fair Value Measurements

Financial Accounting Standards Board Accounting Codification (ASC) 820, Fair Value Measurements and Disclosures, establishes a framework for measuring fair value. That framework provides a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. The hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (level 1 measurements) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (level 3 measurements). The three levels of the fair value hierarchy under FASB ASC 820 are described as follows:

Level 1 Inputs to the valuation methodology are unadjusted quoted prices for identical assets or liabilities in active markets that the Plan has the ability to access.

Level 2 Inputs to the valuation methodology includes:

- Quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities in active markets;
- Quoted prices for identical or similar assets or liabilities in inactive markets;
- Inputs other than quoted prices that are observable for the asset or liability;
- Inputs that are derived principally from or corroborated by observable market data by correlation or other means.
- If the asset or liability has a specified (contractual) term, the level 2 input must be observable for substantially the full term of the asset or liability.

Level 3 Inputs to the valuation methodology are unobservable and significant to the fair value measurement.

The asset's or liability's fair value measurement level within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of any input that is significant to the fair value measurement. Valuation techniques used need to maximize the use of observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs.

Following is a description of the valuation methodologies used for assets measured at fair value. There have been no changes in the methodologies used at December 31, 2024 and 2023.

Registered investment companies: Valued at the net asset value ('NAV') of shares held by the Plan at year-end.

Common / collective trust: Valued at the net asset value practical expedient (‘NAV practical expedient’) of units of the common trust fund. The NAV practical expedient as provided by the Trustee, is based on the fair value of the underlying investments held by the fund less its liabilities. This practical expedient is not used when it is determined to be probable that the fund will sell the investment for an amount different than the reported NAV. Plan transactions (issuances and redemptions) may occur daily. Were the Plan to initiate a full redemption of the common trust fund, the investment advisor reserves the right to temporarily delay withdrawal from the trust in order to ensure that securities liquidations will be carried out in an orderly business manner.

The preceding methods described may produce a fair value calculation that may not be indicative of net realizable value or reflective of future fair values. Furthermore, while the Plan believes its valuation methods are appropriate and consistent with other market participants, the use of different methodologies or assumptions to determine the fair value of certain financial instruments could result in a different fair value measurement at the reporting date.

Basis for Opinion

We conducted our audits in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. Responsibilities of Management for the Financial Statements

Profit Sharing and 401(k) Plan's ability to continue as a going concern for one year after the date the financial statements are available to be issued.

Management is also responsible for maintaining a current plan instrument, including all plan amendments; administering the plan; and determining that the plan's transactions that are presented and disclosed in the financial statements are in conformity with the plan's provisions, including maintaining sufficient records with respect to each of the participants, to determine the benefits due or which may become due to such participants.

Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance but is not absolute assurance and therefore is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control. Misstatements are considered material if there is a substantial likelihood that, individually or in the aggregate, they would influence the judgment made by a reasonable user based on the financial statements.

In performing an audit in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards, we:

- Exercise professional judgment and maintain professional skepticism throughout the audit.
- Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error, and design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks. Our audits did not extend to the certified investment information, except for obtaining and reading the certification, comparing the certified investment information with the related information presented and disclosed in the financial statements, and reading the disclosures relating to the certified investment information to assess whether they are in accordance with the presentation and disclosure requirements of accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Accordingly, the objective of an ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) audit is not to express an opinion about whether the financial statements as a whole are presented fairly, in all material respects, in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

We are required to communicate with those charged with governance regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit, significant audit findings, and certain internal control-related matters that we identified during the audit.

The supplemental Schedule H, Line 4i- Schedule of Assets (Held at End of Year) is presented for purposes of additional analysis and is not a required part of the financial statements but is supplementary information required by the Department of Labor's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA. The information included in the supplemental schedule, other than that agreed to or derived from the certified investment information, has been subjected to auditing procedures applied in the audit of the financial statements and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements or to the financial statements themselves, and other additional procedures in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards. For information included in the supplemental schedule that agreed to or is derived from

the certified investment information, we compared such information to the related certified investment information.

In forming our opinion on the supplemental schedule, we evaluated whether the supplemental schedule, other than the information agreed to or derived from the certified investment information, including its form and content, is presented in conformity with the Department of Labor's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA.

Note 1 – Description of Plan

The following description of the Roman, Inc. Profit Sharing and 401(k) Plan (the Plan) provides general information only. Participants should refer to the Plan agreement for a more complete description of the Plan's provisions.

General

The Plan is a defined contribution plan covering all employees of Roman, Inc. (the Company) who have attained 21 years of age. The Plan is subject to the provisions of the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (ERISA).

Contributions

Each year, participants may contribute the lesser of \$23,000 and \$22,500 in 2024 and 2023, respectively, or up to 20% of their pretax annual compensation (elective contribution). Participants are also permitted to designate that a portion or all elective contributions be classified as Roth contributions in which the deferral would be included in the participant's gross income at the time of the deferral. Participants may also contribute amounts representing distributions from other qualified plans. Plan participants who are eligible to make salary deferrals and have attained age 50 by December 31 of a calendar year may make "catch-up" salary deferrals in addition to regular salary deferrals for that year. The limit for catch-up contributions is \$7,500 in 2024 and 2023. Participants may also contribute an additional 15% of their annual after-tax compensation to the Plan. The Company may make a matching 401(k) contribution not to exceed 50% of the participant's first 2% of compensation contributed as pre-tax or after-tax contributions and/or a profit sharing contribution at the discretion of its Board of Directors. The company made an employer match of \$34,843 and \$38,416 for the years ended December 31, 2024 and 2023, respectively. The Company made profit sharing contributions of \$50,000 for the years ended December 31, 2024 and 2023.

Participant Accounts

Individual accounts are maintained for each Plan participant. Each participant's account is credited with the participant's contribution, the Company's discretionary matching contribution, the Company's discretionary additional contribution, Plan earnings, Plan losses, and administrative expenses. Allocations are based on participant compensation or account balances, as defined. Earnings include interest, dividends, realized gains or losses on sale of investments and the net change in unrealized appreciation or depreciation of investments. All investment accounts of the Plan are directed by the participants. The benefit to which a participant is entitled is the benefit that can be provided from the participant's vested account.

Note 1 – Description of Plan (Continued)

Vesting

Participants are 100% vested immediately in their contributions and investment earnings thereon. A participant is 100% vested in the Company's matching and profit sharing contributions upon completing six years of credited service. In the event of death, disability or retirement at designated ages, participants become fully vested.

Investment Options

Participants may direct contributions in a variety of investment choices as more fully described in the Plan agreement. Participants may change their investments daily.

Notes Receivable from Participants

Participants may borrow from their fund accounts a minimum of \$1,000 and up to a maximum of \$50,000 or 50% of their vested account balance, whichever is less. The loans are secured by the balance in the participant's account and bear interest at rates that range from 3.25% to 8.50%, which is commensurate with local prevailing rates as determined quarterly by the Plan Administrator. Principal and interest are paid ratably through payroll deductions.

Payment of Benefits

On termination of service due to death, disability, or retirement, a participant may elect to receive either a lump-sum amount equal to the value of the participant's vested interest in his or her account, or annual installments over a period of time. For termination of service for other reasons, a participant may receive the value of the vested interest in his or her account as a lump-sum distribution.

Forfeited Accounts

At December 31, 2024 and 2023, forfeited nonvested accounts totaled \$2,625 and \$53,332, respectively. These accounts will be used to reduce future Company contributions. In 2024 and 2023, the amounts of forfeitures allocated to participants' accounts were \$54,558 and \$174 from forfeited nonvested accounts.

Administrative Expenses

Certain administrative operating expenses of the Plan are paid by the Company, as provided in the Plan agreement.

Note 2 – Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Basis of Accounting

The financial statements of the Plan are prepared on the accrual method of accounting in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Note 2 – Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (Continued)

Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and changes therein, and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Investment Valuation and Income Recognition

Investments are reported at fair value. Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. See Note 8 for discussion of fair value measurements.

Purchases and sales of securities are recorded on a trade-date basis. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Dividends are recorded on the ex-dividend date. Net appreciation includes the Plan's gains and losses on investments bought and sold as well as held during the year.

Notes Receivable from Participants

Notes receivable from participants are measured at their unpaid principal balance plus any accrued but unpaid interest. Delinquent notes receivable from participants are reclassified as distributions based upon terms of the Plan agreement.

Payment of Benefits

Benefits are recorded when paid. Net assets available for benefits at December 31, 2023, include \$549,958 allocated to the account of a participant as of or prior to that date who had withdrawn from participating in the earnings and operations of the plan. The \$549,958 was paid to the former participant in January 2024.

Note 4 –Tax Status

The Internal Revenue Service ruled on June 30, 2020 that the Non-Standardized Prototype for Profit-Sharing Plan with CODA (the prototype Plan of the Trust Company upon which the Plan is based) qualifies under Section 401(a) of the Internal Revenue Code (“IRC”) and the related trust is, therefore, not subject to tax under present income tax law. The Plan is required to operate in conformity with the IRC to maintain its qualification. The Plan Administrator is not aware of any course of action or series of events that have occurred that might adversely affect the Plan’s qualified status.

Note 4 – Tax Status (Continued)

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require Plan management to evaluate tax positions taken by the Plan and recognize a tax liability (or asset) if the Plan has taken an uncertain position that more likely than not would not be sustained upon examination by the Internal Revenue Service. The Plan Administrator has analyzed the tax positions taken by the Plan, and has concluded that as of December 31, 2024, there are no uncertain tax positions taken or expected to be taken that would require recognition of a liability (or asset) or disclosure in the financial statements. The Plan is subject to routine audits by taxing jurisdictions; however, there are currently no audits for any tax periods in progress.

Note 5 – Plan Termination

Although it has not expressed any intention to do so, the Company has the right under the Plan to discontinue its contributions at any time and to terminate the Plan subject to the provisions set forth in ERISA. In the event of Plan termination, participants would become 100% vested in their account.

Note 6 – Related-Party Transactions

Certain Plan investments are shares of registered investment companies that are managed by Bank of America, N.A. Bank of America, N.A. is the Trustee as defined by the Plan, and therefore, these transactions qualify as party-in-interest transactions. The notes receivable from participants are also party-in-interest transactions. Fees paid by the Plan for investment management services were included as a reduction of the return earned on each fund.

Note 7 – Risks and Uncertainties

The Plan invests in various investment securities. Investment securities are exposed to various risks such as interest rate, market and credit risks. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investment securities, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in the values of the investment securities will occur in the near term and that such changes could materially affect participants' account balances and the amounts reported in the statement of net assets available for benefits.

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Note 8 – Fair Value Measurements

Financial Accounting Standards Board Accounting Codification (ASC) 820, Fair Value Measurements and Disclosures, establishes a framework for measuring fair value. That framework provides a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. The hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (level 1 measurements) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (level 3 measurements). The three levels of the fair value hierarchy under FASB ASC 820 are described as follows:

Level 1 Inputs to the valuation methodology are unadjusted quoted prices for identical assets or liabilities in active markets that the Plan has the ability to access.

Level 2 Inputs to the valuation methodology includes:

- Quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities in active markets;
- Quoted prices for identical or similar assets or liabilities in inactive markets;
- Inputs other than quoted prices that are observable for the asset or liability;
- Inputs that are derived principally from or corroborated by observable market data by correlation or other means.
- If the asset or liability has a specified (contractual) term, the level 2 input must be observable for substantially the full term of the asset or liability.

Level 3 Inputs to the valuation methodology are unobservable and significant to the fair value measurement.

The asset's or liability's fair value measurement level within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of any input that is significant to the fair value measurement. Valuation techniques used need to maximize the use of observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs.

Following is a description of the valuation methodologies used for assets measured at fair value. There have been no changes in the methodologies used at December 31, 2024 and 2023.

Registered investment companies: Valued at the net asset value ('NAV') of shares held by the Plan at year-end.

Note 8 – Fair Value Measurements (Continued)

Common / collective trust: Valued at the net asset value practical expedient (‘NAV practical expedient’) of units of the common trust fund. The NAV practical expedient as provided by the Trustee, is based on the fair value of the underlying investments held by the fund less its liabilities. This practical expedient is not used when it is determined to be probable that the fund will sell the investment for an amount different than the reported NAV. Plan transactions (issuances and redemptions) may occur daily. Were the Plan to initiate a full redemption of the common trust fund, the investment advisor reserves the right to temporarily delay withdrawal from the trust in order to ensure that securities liquidations will be carried out in an orderly business manner.

The preceding methods described may produce a fair value calculation that may not be indicative of net realizable value or reflective of future fair values. Furthermore, while the Plan believes its valuation methods are appropriate and consistent with other market participants, the use of different methodologies or assumptions to determine the fair value of certain financial instruments could result in a different fair value measurement at the reporting date.
