NOTE A--PLAN DESCRIPTION

The following description of the Wolfspeed, Inc. 401(k) Plan (“the Plan”) provides only general information. Participants should refer to the Plan document for a more complete description of the Plan’s provisions, a copy of which is available to each participant from the plan administrator, the Employee Benefits Committee of Wolfspeed, Inc.

General: The Plan is a 401(k) defined contribution plan covering all employees of Wolfspeed, Inc., formerly known as Cree, Inc. and designated subsidiaries (“the Company” or Plan Sponsor). The Plan is subject to the provisions of the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (“ERISA”). Fidelity Management Trust Company serves as the Plan’s trustee and recordkeeper.

Effective January 1, 2022, the Plan changed its name to Wolfspeed, Inc. 401(k) Plan.

Eligibility for Participation: Employees of the Company become eligible to participate in the Plan upon completion of one month of service. Effective January 2022, employees become eligible to participate in the Plan upon hire.

Directed Investment Accounts: The Plan permits every participant to direct the investment of their account balance under the Plan. Participants may invest their Plan accounts in any or all of the investment funds offered by the Plan. The Plan offers a brokerage option, BrokerageLink, whereby participants can elect to invest a portion of their Plan accounts in numerous publicly traded securities and mutual funds not offered directly by the Plan.

Contributions: Each year, participants may contribute up to 75% of pretax annual compensation, as defined in the Plan document, subject to limitations imposed by the Internal Revenue Code (the Code). Participants are also allowed to make Roth contributions to the Plan in accordance with Plan provisions. Participants are allowed to make catch-up contributions and after-tax contributions within IRS guidelines. Participants may also contribute amounts representing distributions from other qualified plans.

The Company must make matching contributions on behalf of each participant in an amount equal to 100% of the first 1% of eligible employee compensation and 50% of the next 5%. The Company made employer matching contributions of \$12,938,996 in 2024.

The Plan has adopted a Qualified Automatic Contribution Arrangement (“QACA”) safe harbor provided by the Code. As a result, pretax and Roth contributions are deemed proportionate and are not limited for highly compensated employees. However, if after-tax contributions of highly compensated employees are disproportionate to the contributions of other employees, the Company would have to limit contributions of highly compensated employees in the given plan year.

Unless an election as defined by the Plan is made, employees are automatically enrolled in the Plan and deemed to have elected to contribute 3% of eligible compensation. The 3% contribution increases by 1% annually in accordance with Plan provisions, until the before-tax contribution reaches 10% of eligible compensation. Participants may stop or change this election at any time.

Participant Accounts: Each participant’s account is credited with the participant’s and Company’s contributions and allocation of earnings. The participant’s account is charged with benefit payments, transaction fees related to notes receivable from participants and distributions, and an allocation of losses and administrative expenses. Allocations are based on participant earnings or account balances, as defined. The benefit to which a participant is entitled is the benefit that can be provided from the participant’s vested account.

Forfeitures: The nonvested portion of a terminated participant’s account balance derived from employer contributions is forfeited on the earlier of the last day of the vesting computation period in which the participant first incurs a Forfeiture Break in Service or the distribution of the vested portion of the participant’s account. Forfeitures are first used to offset plan expenses and then to offset employer contributions. Forfeitures of approximately \$968,602 were allocated in 2024. At December 31, 2024 and 2023, forfeited nonvested accounts totaled \$45,231 and \$30,825, respectively.

NOTE A--PLAN DESCRIPTION--Continued

Vesting: Participants are immediately 100% vested in the value of their contributions, plus earnings thereon, and become 100% vested in the value of the employer safe harbor contributions, if any, upon completion of years of service according to the following schedule:

<u>Years of Service</u>	<u>Vesting %</u>
1	20%
2 or greater	100%

For matching contributions (non-elective and discretionary) made prior to the adoption of safe-harbor matching contributions, participants vest after six years of service (non-elective) and five years of service (discretionary).

Funding Policy: The employer is generally required to pay its contribution to the Plan for each Plan year within the time prescribed by law, including extensions of time for the filing of the employer's federal income tax return for the fiscal year. However, employee elective contributions accumulated through payroll deductions shall be paid to the custodian as of the earliest date on which contributions can reasonably be segregated from the employer's general assets, but in any event, within the time prescribed by law. Furthermore, any additional employer contributions which are allocable to participants' accounts for a Plan year shall be paid to the Plan no later than the twelve-month period immediately following the close of such Plan year.

Payment of Benefits: Upon termination of employment, retirement, death or disability, participants generally may elect to receive either a lump-sum payment of their account balance or equivalent annuity payments over their remaining life expectancy if the participant's vested interest exceeds \$1,000.

Notes Receivable from Participants: Loans are granted at a minimum of \$1,000 up to a maximum of \$50,000 or 50% of the vested account balance, whichever is less, and bear interest at the prime rate. The loans are secured by the balance in the participant's account with principal and interest to be paid ratably through payroll deductions. All loans must be repaid within five years unless the loan is for the purchase of the participant's principal residence. Then, the loan must be repaid within a ten-year period. Interest rates range from 5.25% to 10.50% at December 31, 2024. Principal and interest payments are paid ratably through payroll deductions.

Hardship Withdrawals: Withdrawals due to financial hardship are permitted with the approval of the Administrative Committee for the following reasons: medical expenses, purchase of primary residence, post-secondary tuition payment, eviction from or foreclosure on principal residence, funeral expenses, or as otherwise provided by the Plan. Hardship withdrawals are limited to employee elective deferrals and earnings thereon.

Rollover Contributions: The Plan provides for rollover contributions from other qualified retirement plans.

NOTE B--SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of Accounting: The financial statements of the Plan are prepared on the accrual basis of accounting.

Investment Valuation and Income Recognition: Investments are reported at fair value. Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. The Plan's Administrative Committee determines the Plan's valuation policies. See Note C for discussion of fair value measurements.

Purchases and sales of securities are recorded on a trade-date basis. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Dividends are recorded on the ex-dividend date. Net depreciation includes the Plan's gains and losses on investments bought and sold as well as held during the year.

Investment Options: The investments of the Plan are held by Fidelity Management Trust Company ("Fidelity"), trustee of the Plan. Fidelity executes investment transactions within the guidelines adopted for each fund. At December 31, 2024, participants could direct the investment of their account balances in the following mutual funds: BG Emerging Markets Equity Fund, Dodge & Cox Income Fund, Vanguard US Growth Fund, JPM Small Cap Growth Fund, ABF Small Cap Value Fund, American Century Mid-Cap Value Fund, Artisan Int'l Value Fund, MFS Value Fund, NB Mid-Cap Growth Fund, Fidelity Freedom Index Income Fund, Fidelity Freedom 2020 Fund, Fidelity Freedom 2025 Fund, Fidelity Freedom 2030 Fund, Fidelity Freedom 2035 Fund, Fidelity Freedom 2040 Fund, Fidelity Freedom 2045 Fund, Fidelity Freedom 2050 Fund, Fidelity Freedom 2055 Fund, Fidelity Freedom 2060 Fund, Fidelity Freedom 2065 Fund, Fidelity Freedom 2070 Fund, Harding Loevner International Equity Fund, Lazard Int'l Strategic Equity Fund, Fidelity Government Money Market Fund, Fidelity US Bond Index Fund, Fidelity 500 Index Institutional Fund, Fidelity Mid-Cap Index Fund, Fidelity Small-Cap Index Fund, Fidelity International Index Fund, and Fidelity BrokerageLink.

Notes Receivable from Participants: Notes receivable from participants are measured at their unpaid principal balance plus any accrued but unpaid interest. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Related fees are recorded as administrative expenses and are expensed when they are incurred. No allowance for credit losses has been recorded as of December 31, 2024 or 2023. If a participant ceases to make loan repayments and the plan administrator deems the participant loan to be in default, the participant loan balance is reduced and a benefit payment is recorded.

Contributions: Employer and employee contributions are accrued in the Plan year to which they relate.

Benefit Payments: Benefit payments are recorded when paid.

Expenses: Certain expenses of maintaining the Plan are paid directly by the Company and are excluded from these financial statements. Fees related to the administration of notes receivable from participants are charged directly to the participant's account and are included in administrative expenses. Investment related expenses are included in net appreciation of fair value of investments.

Use of Estimates: The preparation of financial statements in conformity with U.S. generally accepted accounting principles requires the Plan administrator to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements, and the reported amounts of changes in net assets during the reporting period. Accordingly, actual results may differ from those estimates.

Date of Management's Review of Subsequent Events: Plan management has evaluated events through August 14, 2025, the date which the financial statements were available to be issued.

NOTE C--FAIR VALUE MEASUREMENTS

The framework for measuring fair value provides a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. The hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (Level 1) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (Level 3). The three levels of the fair value hierarchy under Financial Accounting Standards Board Accounting Standards Codification (FASB ASC) 820, *Fair Value Measurement* are as described as follows:

Level 1	Inputs to the valuation methodology are unadjusted quoted prices for identical assets or liabilities in active markets that the Plan has the ability to access.
Level 2	Inputs to the valuation methodology include <ul style="list-style-type: none">• quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities in active markets;• quoted prices for identical or similar assets or liabilities in inactive markets;• inputs other than quoted prices that are observable for the asset or liability;• inputs that are derived principally from or corroborated by observable market data by correlation or other means. If the asset or liability has a specified (contractual) term, the Level 2 input must be observable for substantially the full term of the asset or liability.
Level 3	Inputs to the valuation methodology are unobservable and significant to the fair value measurement.

The asset or liability's fair value measurement level within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of any input that is significant to the fair value measurement. Valuation techniques maximize the use of relevant observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs.

Following is a description of the valuation methodologies used for assets measured at fair value. There have been no changes in the methodologies used at December 31, 2024 and 2023.

Mutual funds: Valued at the daily closing price as reported by the fund. Mutual funds held by the Plan are open-end mutual funds that are registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission. These funds are required to publish their daily net asset value (NAV) and to transact at that price. The mutual funds held by the Plan are deemed to be actively traded.

BrokerageLink: Valued at the closing price as reported by the applicable stock exchange. The BrokerageLink account includes investments in common stock, preferred stock, funds, and certificates of deposits.

NOTE D--RELATED PARTY TRANSACTIONS

Certain Plan investments are shares of mutual funds managed by Fidelity. Fidelity is the trustee and contract administrator of the Plan, therefore, related transactions qualify as exempt party-in-interest transactions. Fees paid by the Plan for the investment management services were \$472,698 for the year ended December 31, 2024.

NOTE E--TAX STATUS

The Internal Revenue Service (IRS) has ruled by a letter dated June 2020, that the nonstandardized prototype plan adopted by the Company qualified under the appropriate sections of the Code. Although, the Plan has been amended since receiving the determination letter, the Plan administrator believes that the Plan is designed and is currently being operated in compliance with the applicable requirements of the Internal Revenue Code and, therefore, believes that the Plan is qualified and the related trust is tax-exempt.

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require the plan administrator to evaluate tax positions taken by the plan and recognize a tax liability if the organization has taken an uncertain position that more likely than not would not be sustained upon examination by the IRS. The Plan is subject to routine audits by tax authorities; however, there are currently no audits for any tax periods in progress. The Plan administrator believes it is no longer subject to income tax examinations for years prior to 2021.

NOTE F--PLAN TERMINATION

While the Company has not expressed an intent to terminate the Plan, it is free to do so at any time subject to the provisions of ERISA. The Company also reserves the right to amend the Plan as conditions may require. However, neither through amendment, nor by termination, may any part of the Plan assets ever be returned to the Company. All assets of the Plan must be used for the exclusive benefit of participants.

NOTE A--PLAN DESCRIPTION

The following description of the Wolfspeed, Inc. 401(k) Plan (“the Plan”) provides only general information. Participants should refer to the Plan document for a more complete description of the Plan’s provisions, a copy of which is available to each participant from the plan administrator, the Employee Benefits Committee of Wolfspeed, Inc.

General: The Plan is a 401(k) defined contribution plan covering all employees of Wolfspeed, Inc., formerly known as Cree, Inc. and designated subsidiaries (“the Company” or Plan Sponsor). The Plan is subject to the provisions of the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (“ERISA”). Fidelity Management Trust Company serves as the Plan’s trustee and recordkeeper.

Effective January 1, 2022, the Plan changed its name to Wolfspeed, Inc. 401(k) Plan.

Eligibility for Participation: Employees of the Company become eligible to participate in the Plan upon completion of one month of service. Effective January 2022, employees become eligible to participate in the Plan upon hire.

Directed Investment Accounts: The Plan permits every participant to direct the investment of their account balance under the Plan. Participants may invest their Plan accounts in any or all of the investment funds offered by the Plan. The Plan offers a brokerage option, BrokerageLink, whereby participants can elect to invest a portion of their Plan accounts in numerous publicly traded securities and mutual funds not offered directly by the Plan.

Contributions: Each year, participants may contribute up to 75% of pretax annual compensation, as defined in the Plan document, subject to limitations imposed by the Internal Revenue Code (the Code). Participants are also allowed to make Roth contributions to the Plan in accordance with Plan provisions. Participants are allowed to make catch-up contributions and after-tax contributions within IRS guidelines. Participants may also contribute amounts representing distributions from other qualified plans.

The Company must make matching contributions on behalf of each participant in an amount equal to 100% of the first 1% of eligible employee compensation and 50% of the next 5%. The Company made employer matching contributions of \$12,938,996 in 2024.

The Plan has adopted a Qualified Automatic Contribution Arrangement (“QACA”) safe harbor provided by the Code. As a result, pretax and Roth contributions are deemed proportionate and are not limited for highly compensated employees. However, if after-tax contributions of highly compensated employees are disproportionate to the contributions of other employees, the Company would have to limit contributions of highly compensated employees in the given plan year.

Unless an election as defined by the Plan is made, employees are automatically enrolled in the Plan and deemed to have elected to contribute 3% of eligible compensation. The 3% contribution increases by 1% annually in accordance with Plan provisions, until the before-tax contribution reaches 10% of eligible compensation. Participants may stop or change this election at any time.

Participant Accounts: Each participant’s account is credited with the participant’s and Company’s contributions and allocation of earnings. The participant’s account is charged with benefit payments, transaction fees related to notes receivable from participants and distributions, and an allocation of losses and administrative expenses. Allocations are based on participant earnings or account balances, as defined. The benefit to which a participant is entitled is the benefit that can be provided from the participant’s vested account.

Forfeitures: The nonvested portion of a terminated participant’s account balance derived from employer contributions is forfeited on the earlier of the last day of the vesting computation period in which the participant first incurs a Forfeiture Break in Service or the distribution of the vested portion of the participant’s account. Forfeitures are first used to offset plan expenses and then to offset employer contributions. Forfeitures of approximately \$968,602 were allocated in 2024. At December 31, 2024 and 2023, forfeited nonvested accounts totaled \$45,231 and \$30,825, respectively.

NOTE A--PLAN DESCRIPTION--Continued

Vesting: Participants are immediately 100% vested in the value of their contributions, plus earnings thereon, and become 100% vested in the value of the employer safe harbor contributions, if any, upon completion of years of service according to the following schedule:

<u>Years of Service</u>	<u>Vesting %</u>
1	20%
2 or greater	100%

For matching contributions (non-elective and discretionary) made prior to the adoption of safe-harbor matching contributions, participants vest after six years of service (non-elective) and five years of service (discretionary).

Funding Policy: The employer is generally required to pay its contribution to the Plan for each Plan year within the time prescribed by law, including extensions of time for the filing of the employer's federal income tax return for the fiscal year. However, employee elective contributions accumulated through payroll deductions shall be paid to the custodian as of the earliest date on which contributions can reasonably be segregated from the employer's general assets, but in any event, within the time prescribed by law. Furthermore, any additional employer contributions which are allocable to participants' accounts for a Plan year shall be paid to the Plan no later than the twelve-month period immediately following the close of such Plan year.

Payment of Benefits: Upon termination of employment, retirement, death or disability, participants generally may elect to receive either a lump-sum payment of their account balance or equivalent annuity payments over their remaining life expectancy if the participant's vested interest exceeds \$1,000.

Notes Receivable from Participants: Loans are granted at a minimum of \$1,000 up to a maximum of \$50,000 or 50% of the vested account balance, whichever is less, and bear interest at the prime rate. The loans are secured by the balance in the participant's account with principal and interest to be paid ratably through payroll deductions. All loans must be repaid within five years unless the loan is for the purchase of the participant's principal residence. Then, the loan must be repaid within a ten-year period. Interest rates range from 5.25% to 10.50% at December 31, 2024. Principal and interest payments are paid ratably through payroll deductions.

Hardship Withdrawals: Withdrawals due to financial hardship are permitted with the approval of the Administrative Committee for the following reasons: medical expenses, purchase of primary residence, post-secondary tuition payment, eviction from or foreclosure on principal residence, funeral expenses, or as otherwise provided by the Plan. Hardship withdrawals are limited to employee elective deferrals and earnings thereon.

Rollover Contributions: The Plan provides for rollover contributions from other qualified retirement plans.

NOTE B--SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of Accounting: The financial statements of the Plan are prepared on the accrual basis of accounting.

Investment Valuation and Income Recognition: Investments are reported at fair value. Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. The Plan's Administrative Committee determines the Plan's valuation policies. See Note C for discussion of fair value measurements.

Purchases and sales of securities are recorded on a trade-date basis. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Dividends are recorded on the ex-dividend date. Net depreciation includes the Plan's gains and losses on investments bought and sold as well as held during the year.

Investment Options: The investments of the Plan are held by Fidelity Management Trust Company ("Fidelity"), trustee of the Plan. Fidelity executes investment transactions within the guidelines adopted for each fund. At December 31, 2024, participants could direct the investment of their account balances in the following mutual funds: BG Emerging Markets Equity Fund, Dodge & Cox Income Fund, Vanguard US Growth Fund, JPM Small Cap Growth Fund, ABF Small Cap Value Fund, American Century Mid-Cap Value Fund, Artisan Int'l Value Fund, MFS Value Fund, NB Mid-Cap Growth Fund, Fidelity Freedom Index Income Fund, Fidelity Freedom 2020 Fund, Fidelity Freedom 2025 Fund, Fidelity Freedom 2030 Fund, Fidelity Freedom 2035 Fund, Fidelity Freedom 2040 Fund, Fidelity Freedom 2045 Fund, Fidelity Freedom 2050 Fund, Fidelity Freedom 2055 Fund, Fidelity Freedom 2060 Fund, Fidelity Freedom 2065 Fund, Fidelity Freedom 2070 Fund, Harding Loevner International Equity Fund, Lazard Int'l Strategic Equity Fund, Fidelity Government Money Market Fund, Fidelity US Bond Index Fund, Fidelity 500 Index Institutional Fund, Fidelity Mid-Cap Index Fund, Fidelity Small-Cap Index Fund, Fidelity International Index Fund, and Fidelity BrokerageLink.

Notes Receivable from Participants: Notes receivable from participants are measured at their unpaid principal balance plus any accrued but unpaid interest. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Related fees are recorded as administrative expenses and are expensed when they are incurred. No allowance for credit losses has been recorded as of December 31, 2024 or 2023. If a participant ceases to make loan repayments and the plan administrator deems the participant loan to be in default, the participant loan balance is reduced and a benefit payment is recorded.

Contributions: Employer and employee contributions are accrued in the Plan year to which they relate.

Benefit Payments: Benefit payments are recorded when paid.

Expenses: Certain expenses of maintaining the Plan are paid directly by the Company and are excluded from these financial statements. Fees related to the administration of notes receivable from participants are charged directly to the participant's account and are included in administrative expenses. Investment related expenses are included in net appreciation of fair value of investments.

Use of Estimates: The preparation of financial statements in conformity with U.S. generally accepted accounting principles requires the Plan administrator to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements, and the reported amounts of changes in net assets during the reporting period. Accordingly, actual results may differ from those estimates.

Date of Management's Review of Subsequent Events: Plan management has evaluated events through August 14, 2025, the date which the financial statements were available to be issued.

NOTE C--FAIR VALUE MEASUREMENTS

The framework for measuring fair value provides a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. The hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (Level 1) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (Level 3). The three levels of the fair value hierarchy under Financial Accounting Standards Board Accounting Standards Codification (FASB ASC) 820, *Fair Value Measurement* are as described as follows:

Level 1	Inputs to the valuation methodology are unadjusted quoted prices for identical assets or liabilities in active markets that the Plan has the ability to access.
Level 2	Inputs to the valuation methodology include <ul style="list-style-type: none">• quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities in active markets;• quoted prices for identical or similar assets or liabilities in inactive markets;• inputs other than quoted prices that are observable for the asset or liability;• inputs that are derived principally from or corroborated by observable market data by correlation or other means. If the asset or liability has a specified (contractual) term, the Level 2 input must be observable for substantially the full term of the asset or liability.
Level 3	Inputs to the valuation methodology are unobservable and significant to the fair value measurement.

The asset or liability's fair value measurement level within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of any input that is significant to the fair value measurement. Valuation techniques maximize the use of relevant observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs.

Following is a description of the valuation methodologies used for assets measured at fair value. There have been no changes in the methodologies used at December 31, 2024 and 2023.

Mutual funds: Valued at the daily closing price as reported by the fund. Mutual funds held by the Plan are open-end mutual funds that are registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission. These funds are required to publish their daily net asset value (NAV) and to transact at that price. The mutual funds held by the Plan are deemed to be actively traded.

BrokerageLink: Valued at the closing price as reported by the applicable stock exchange. The BrokerageLink account includes investments in common stock, preferred stock, funds, and certificates of deposits.

The Plan's policy is to recognize transfers between levels of the fair value hierarchy as of the actual date of the event of change in circumstances that caused the transfer. NOTE D--RELATED PARTY TRANSACTIONS

Certain Plan investments are shares of mutual funds managed by Fidelity. Fidelity is the trustee and contract administrator of the Plan, therefore, related transactions qualify as exempt party-in-interest transactions. Fees paid by the Plan for the investment management services were \$472,698 for the year ended December 31, 2024.

NOTE E--TAX STATUS

The Internal Revenue Service (IRS) has ruled by a letter dated June 2020, that the nonstandardized prototype plan adopted by the Company qualified under the appropriate sections of the Code. Although, the Plan has been amended since receiving the determination letter, the Plan administrator believes that the Plan is designed and is currently being operated in compliance with the applicable requirements of the Internal Revenue Code and, therefore, believes that the Plan is qualified and the related trust is tax-exempt.

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require the plan administrator to evaluate tax positions taken by the plan and recognize a tax liability if the organization has taken an uncertain position that more likely than not would not be sustained upon examination by the IRS. The Plan is subject to routine audits by tax authorities; however, there are currently no audits for any tax periods in progress. The Plan administrator believes it is no longer subject to income tax examinations for years prior to 2021.

NOTE F--PLAN TERMINATION

While the Company has not expressed an intent to terminate the Plan, it is free to do so at any time subject to the provisions of ERISA. The Company also reserves the right to amend the Plan as conditions may require. However, neither through amendment, nor by termination, may any part of the Plan assets ever be returned to the Company. All assets of the Plan must be used for the exclusive benefit of participants.
