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## INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

To the Administrative Committee

### **Scope and Nature of the ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) Audits**

We have performed audits of the accompanying financial statements of BILL 401(k) Plan, an employee benefit plan subject to the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (ERISA), as permitted by ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) ("ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) audit"). The financial statements comprise the statements of net assets available for benefits as of December 31, 2024 and 2023, and the related statement of changes in net assets available for benefits for the year ended December 31, 2024, and the related notes to the financial statements.

Management, having determined it is permissible in the circumstances, has elected to have the audits of BILL 401(k) Plan's financial statements performed in accordance with ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) pursuant to 29 CFR 2520.103-8 of the Department of Labor's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA. As permitted by ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C), our audits need not extend to any statements or information related to assets held for investment of the plan (investment information) by a bank or similar institution or insurance carrier that is regulated, supervised, and subject to periodic examination by a state or federal agency, provided that the statements or information regarding assets so held are prepared and certified to by the bank or similar institution or insurance carrier in accordance with 29 CFR 2520.103-5 of the Department of Labor's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA (qualified institution).

Management has obtained certifications from a qualified institution as of December 31, 2024 and 2023, and for the year ended December 31, 2024, stating that the certified investment information, as described in Note 3 to the financial statements, is complete and accurate.

Management's election of the ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) audits does not affect management's responsibility for the financial statements.

Accordingly, the objective of an ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) audit is not to express an opinion about whether the financial statements as a whole are presented fairly, in all material respects, in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

We are required to communicate with those charged with governance regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audits, significant audit findings, and certain internal control related matters that we identified during the audits.

Such information is the responsibility of management and was derived from and relates directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements. The information included in the supplemental schedules, other than that agreed to or derived from the certified investment information, has been subjected to auditing procedures applied in the audits of the financial statements and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements or to the financial statements themselves, and other additional procedures in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards. For information included in the supplemental schedules that agreed to or is derived from the certified investment information, we compared such information to the related certified investment information.

1. DESCRIPTION OF THE PLAN

The following description of BILL 401(k) Plan (Formerly Bill.com, LLC 401(k) Plan), (the "Plan") provides only general information. Participants should refer to the plan documents for a more complete description of the Plan's provisions.

General

The Plan, a defined contribution plan sponsored by BILL Holdings, Inc. (Formerly Bill.com, LLC), (the "Company" or "Employer"), qualifies under Section 401(a) and related provisions of the Internal Revenue Code ("IRC"). The Plan was established on January 1, 2007, and effective July 1, 2023, the Plan was restated and the Plan name was changed to BILL 401(k) Plan. Additionally, upon restatement the Plan Sponsor became BILL Holdings, Inc. The Plan is designed to provide eligible participants with a means to defer a portion of their compensation for retirement and to provide benefits in the event of disability, death, termination, or financial hardship. The Plan is subject to the provisions of the Department of Labor's ("DOL") Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 ("ERISA") and subsequent laws.

An expansion of Setting Every Community Up for Retirement Enhancement Act of 2019 ("SECURE 2.0") was signed into law on December 29, 2022, as part of the Consolidated Appropriations Act of 2023. The effective dates of provisions within SECURE 2.0 vary through 2026. The Company has until the end of the first Plan year beginning on or after January 1, 2026, to amend the Plan for the changes related to SECURE 2.0. The Plan has not been formally amended to adopt these provisions as of the date the financial statements were available to be issued.

Plan administration

The Company has designated the Administrative Committee (the "Committee") as the administrator of the Plan and, as such, the Committee carries out the duties imposed by ERISA. The Company has contracted with Fidelity Management Trust Company ("Fidelity" or "Trustee") to act as the Trustee and an affiliate of Fidelity to perform the Plan's recordkeeping services.

Eligibility

With the exception of nonresident aliens who do not receive any earned income from the Company which constitutes United States-sourced income, leased employees, employees covered by a collective bargaining agreement, and individuals classified as interns, all employees of the Company who have attained age 21 are immediately eligible to begin participating in the Plan.

Participant contributions

Participants are allowed to contribute up to 90% of their eligible pre-tax or after-tax (as Roth contributions) compensation, as defined in the plan documents, up to the annual contribution limit as defined in the IRC. The Plan also permits the automatic enrollment of newly eligible employees into the Plan with an initial pre-tax contribution rate of 4% which increases 1% annually up to a maximum of 10%, unless affirmatively elected otherwise.

Plan participants who have attained age 50 or older before the end of a calendar year are allowed to make additional contributions called "catch-up contributions" to the Plan, up to the annual contribution limit as defined in the IRC.

Participants are also allowed to make rollover contributions of amounts received from other tax qualified employer-sponsored retirement plans and individual retirement accounts. All contributions are deposited in the appropriate investment funds in accordance with the participant's direction and the Plan's provisions.

Employer contributions

The Plan allows the Company to make discretionary matching contributions and discretionary nonelective contributions to the Plan. All participants are eligible to receive discretionary matching contributions and only participants who are employed by the Company as of the last day of the Plan year are eligible to receive discretionary nonelective contributions for the Plan year. The Company did not make any discretionary matching contributions or discretionary nonelective contributions during the year ended December 31, 2024. The Company made corrective Employer contributions of \$479 for the year ended December 31, 2024.

Participant accounts

Each participant's account is credited with the participant's contributions, rollover contributions, Company's discretionary matching contributions, discretionary nonelective contributions, if any, and Plan earnings, and charged with Plan losses and an allocation of administrative expenses. Allocations are based on participant earnings or account balances, as defined in the plan document. The benefit to which a participant is entitled is the benefit that can be provided from the participant's vested account. Participants direct the investment of their contributions into various investment options offered by the Plan.

Vesting

Participants are immediately 100% vested in their contributions to the Plan, plus actual earnings thereon. Participants vest ratably in the Company's discretionary matching contributions and discretionary nonelective contributions, if any, after being credited with four years of service, as defined in the plan documents.

Notes receivable from participants

Participants may borrow not less than \$1,000 and up to a maximum equal to the lesser of \$50,000 or 50% of their vested account balance. Notes receivable from participants ("participant loans") must be repaid within five years, unless the participant's loan is used to acquire a primary residence, in which case the repayment term may exceed five years. Participant loans are secured by the respective participant's account balance. Participant loans bear interest at a rate of prime plus 1%. Principal and interest are generally paid ratably through payroll deductions with payments made each pay period. As of December 31, 2024, participant loans outstanding carried interest rates between 4.25% and 9.50% and mature at various dates through July 2034.

Administrative expenses

Administrative expenses are generally paid by the Company, but may, at the discretion of the plan administrator, be paid by the Plan. Transaction fees for certain participant-initiated activity are charged to the specific account of the participant initiating any such transaction. The Plan is not required to reimburse the Company for expenses paid on its behalf.

Payment of benefits

Distributions and withdrawals are payable upon retirement, termination of employment, attainment of age 59 ½, disability or death. If a participant's vested account balance is equal to or less than \$1,000, the balance is immediately distributed as a lump-sum payment. Upon termination of employment, if a participant's vested account balance is greater than \$1,000 and less than or equal to \$5,000, their balance shall be automatically rolled over into an individual retirement account designated by the plan administrator, unless otherwise elected. If the account balance is greater than \$5,000 upon termination, the participant can consent to either a distribution paid in the form of a lump sum cash payment, a direct rollover into another qualified plan, or postpone payment to a later date and remain in the Plan as described in the plan documents.

Upon attaining the age of 59 ½, the participant may, while still employed by the Company, request a withdrawal from their account balance. Hardship and qualified reservist distributions are permitted under limited circumstances as described in the plan documents.

2. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of accounting and financial statement presentation

The financial statements of the Plan are prepared on the accrual basis of accounting in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America ("U.S. GAAP").

Use of estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with U.S. GAAP requires the plan administrator to make estimates and assumptions that affect certain reported amounts and disclosures. Accordingly, actual results may differ from those estimates. Significant items subject to such estimates and assumptions include the fair value of investments.

Risks and uncertainties

The Plan invests in various investment securities. Investment securities are exposed to various risks such as interest rate, market, and credit risks. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investment securities, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in the values of investment securities could occur in the near term and that such changes could materially affect participants' account balances and the amounts reported in the statements of net assets available for benefit.

Investment valuation and income recognition

The Plan's investments are reported at fair value. Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date (Note 4).

Purchases and sales of securities are recorded on a trade-date basis. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Dividends are recorded on the ex-dividend date. Net appreciation (depreciation) includes the Plan's gains and losses on sale on investments bought and sold as well as held during the year.

Notes receivable from participants

Notes receivable from participants are measured at their unpaid principal balances plus any accrued but unpaid interest. Interest income on notes receivable from participants is recorded when it is earned. Delinquent participant loans are recorded as deemed distributions based upon the terms of the plan document.

Contributions and receivables

Contributions from participants are recorded based on the date the contributions have been separated from a participant's pay by the Company, which is the pay date. The Plan records Employer contributions receivable based upon the contributions recorded in the Plan year but received by the Plan subsequent to year end. Rollover contributions from participants are recorded based on the date the rollover contribution are received by the Trustee.

Payment of benefits

Benefit payments are recorded when paid.

Administrative expenses

Administrative expenses are recorded when incurred.

Subsequent events

The Plan has evaluated subsequent events through September 2, 2025, the date the financial statements were available to be issued. Effective March 1, 2025, the Plan was amended to allow for after-tax contributions and in-Plan Roth contributions.

No other subsequent events have occurred that would have a material impact on the presentation of the Plan's financial statements.

3. INFORMATION PREPARED AND CERTIFIED BY THE TRUSTEE (UNAUDITED)

The plan administrator, having determined it is permissible in the circumstances, has elected to have the audits of the Plan's financial statements performed in accordance with ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) pursuant to 29 CFR 2520.103-8 of ERISA. Accordingly, the Trustee, determined to be a qualified institution by the plan administrator, has certified to the completeness and accuracy of:

- Investments and notes receivable from participants reflected on the accompanying statements of net assets available for benefits as of December 31, 2024 and 2023;
- Net appreciation in fair value of investments, dividends and interest, and interest income on notes receivable from participants reflected on the accompanying Statement of Changes in Net Assets Available for Benefits for the year ended December 31, 2024;
- Investments and notes receivable from participants reflected on the schedule of assets (held at end of year) as of December 31, 2024.

Accordingly, as requested by the Plan administrator, the Plan's independent auditor performed no audit procedures on the certified information other than to agree the certified information to the related information included in the financial statements and supplemental schedule.

4. FAIR VALUE MEASUREMENTS

Accounting standards establish a framework for measuring fair value. The framework provides a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. The hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (Level 1 measurements) and the lowest priority to measurements involving significant unobservable inputs (Level 3 measurements). The three levels of the fair value hierarchy are as follows:

- *Level 1* - Inputs to the valuation methodology are unadjusted quoted prices for identical assets or liabilities the Plan has the ability to access at the measurement date.
- *Level 2* - Inputs other than Level 1 that are observable, either directly or indirectly, such as quoted prices in active markets for similar assets or liabilities, quoted prices for identical or similar assets or liabilities in markets that are not active, or other inputs that are observable or can be corroborated by observable market data for substantially the full term of the assets or liabilities.
- *Level 3* - Inputs are unobservable inputs for the asset or liability and significant to the fair value measurement.

The asset or liability's fair value measurement level within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of any input that is significant to the fair value measurement. Valuation techniques maximize the use of relevant observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs.

Following is a description of the valuation methodologies used for assets measured at fair value. There have been no changes in the methodologies used as of December 31, 2024 and 2023.

*Mutual and money market funds:* Valued at the daily closing price as reported on an open exchange. Mutual funds and money market funds held by the Plan are open-end funds that are registered with the U.S. Securities and Exchange Commission. These funds are required to publish their daily net asset value and to transact at that price. The mutual funds and money market funds held by the Plan are deemed to be actively traded.

*Self-directed brokerage accounts:* Accounts primarily consists of money market funds and common stocks that are valued on the basis of readily determinable market prices.

The preceding methods described above may produce a fair value calculation that may not be indicative of net realizable value or reflective of future fair values. Furthermore, while the Plan believes its valuation methods are appropriate and consistent with other market participants, the use of different methodologies or assumptions to determine the fair value of certain financial instruments could result in a different fair value measurement at the reporting date.

5. PLAN TERMINATION

Although the Company has not expressed any intent to do so, the Company has the right under the Plan to discontinue its contributions at any time and to terminate the Plan subject to the provisions of ERISA. If the Plan is terminated, amounts allocated to a participants' account become fully vested.

6. TAX STATUS

The Plan has adopted a Non-Standardized Pre-Approved Profit Sharing Plan. The IRS has issued an opinion letter dated June 30, 2020, stating that the written form of the Plan document is designed in accordance with the applicable sections of the IRC, and is appropriate for use by employers for the benefit of their employees. The plan administrator believes that the Plan is currently designed and being operated in compliance with the applicable requirements of the IRC and therefore, believes that the Plan is qualified and is tax-exempt. Therefore, no provision for income taxes has been included in the Plan's financial statements.

7. RELATED PARTY AND PARTY-IN-INTEREST TRANSACTIONS

ERISA defines parties-in-interest similarly to the definition of a related party under U.S. GAAP, except that ERISA's definition is broader and includes all entities and individuals that provide services to the Plan; however, these entities may not necessarily be related parties. Management did not identify any related parties to the Plan that were not also considered to be parties-in-interest.

Party-in-interest transactions include those with fiduciaries or employees of the Plan, any person who provides services to the Plan, an employer whose employees are covered by the Plan, and an employee organization whose members are covered by the Plan, a person who owns 50% or more of such an employer or employee association or relatives of such persons.

The Plan has included in its investment options certain funds managed by the Trustee or its affiliates. The Trustee, and its affiliates, provide services and manage the Plan's investments and, therefore, these transactions qualify as exempt party-in-interest transactions.

The Trustee utilizes omnibus accounts at unaffiliated banks to facilitate transactions for the plans services and commingles funds in transit to or from the Plan, including other funds similarly in transit to or from other plans. These omnibus account balances are invested in short-term investments with the aim of earning a rate approximating the Target Federal Funds Rate and/or money market rates. The Trustee uses these earnings to pay bank fees associated with the Plan's transactions and retains any float earnings that exceed such fees and adjustments as compensation for its services. The Trustee will pay any fees to the extent they exceed float earnings.

Effective May 1, 2024, the Plan was amended to allow the recordkeeper to credit the Plan in recognition of the recordkeeper's compensation for Plan services to be allocated to an ERISA crediting account.

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## INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

To the Administrative Committee  
BILL 401(k) Plan

### **Scope and Nature of the ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) Audits**

We have performed audits of the accompanying financial statements of BILL 401(k) Plan, an employee benefit plan subject to the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (ERISA), as permitted by ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) ("ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) audit"). The financial statements comprise the statements of net assets available for benefits as of December 31, 2024 and 2023, and the related statement of changes in net assets available for benefits for the year ended December 31, 2024, and the related notes to the financial statements.

Management, having determined it is permissible in the circumstances, has elected to have the audits of BILL 401(k) Plan's financial statements performed in accordance with ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) pursuant to 29 CFR 2520.103-8 of the Department of Labor's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA. As permitted by ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C), our audits need not extend to any statements or information related to assets held for investment of the plan (investment information) by a bank or similar institution or insurance carrier that is regulated, supervised, and subject to periodic examination by a state or federal agency, provided that the statements or information regarding assets so held are prepared and certified to by the bank or similar institution or insurance carrier in accordance with 29 CFR 2520.103-5 of the Department of Labor's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA (qualified institution).

Management has obtained certifications from a qualified institution as of December 31, 2024 and 2023, and for the year ended December 31, 2024, stating that the certified investment information, as described in Note 3 to the financial statements, is complete and accurate.

### **Opinion**

In our opinion, based on our audits and on the procedures performed as described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audits of the Financial Statements section:

## **Responsibilities of Management for the Financial Statements**

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America, and for the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error. Management's election of the ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) audits does not affect management's responsibility for the financial statements.

In preparing the financial statements, management is required to evaluate whether there are conditions or events, considered in the aggregate, that raise substantial doubt about BILL 401(k) Plan's ability to continue as a going concern within one year after the date that the financial statements are available to be issued.

Management is also responsible for maintaining a current plan instrument, including all plan amendments, administering the plan, and determining that the plan's transactions that are presented and disclosed in the financial statements are in conformity with the plan's provisions, including maintaining sufficient records with respect to each of the participants, to determine the benefits due or which may become due to such participants.

Our audits did not extend to the certified investment information, except for obtaining and reading the certification, comparing the certified investment information with the related information presented and disclosed in the financial statements, and reading the disclosures relating to the certified investment information to assess whether they are in accordance with the presentation and disclosure requirements of accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Accordingly, the objective of an ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) audit is not to express an opinion about whether the financial statements as a whole are presented fairly, in all material respects, in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

We are required to communicate with those charged with governance regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audits, significant audit findings, and certain internal control related matters that we identified during the audits.

#### **Other Matter - Supplemental Schedules Required by ERISA**

The supplemental schedules of delinquent participant contributions for the year ended December 31, 2024, and of assets (held at end of year) as of December 31, 2024, (collectively, "supplemental schedules") are presented for purposes of additional analysis and are not a required part of the financial statements but are supplementary information required by the Department of Labor's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA. Such information is the responsibility of management and was derived from and relates directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements. The information included in the supplemental schedules, other than that agreed to or derived from the certified investment information, has been subjected to auditing procedures applied in the audits of the financial statements and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements or to the financial statements themselves, and other additional procedures in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards. 1. DESCRIPTION OF THE PLAN

The following description of BILL 401(k) Plan (Formerly Bill.com, LLC 401(k) Plan), (the "Plan") provides only general information. Participants should refer to the plan documents for a more complete description of the Plan's provisions.

General

The Plan, a defined contribution plan sponsored by BILL Holdings, Inc. (Formerly Bill.com, LLC), (the "Company" or "Employer"), qualifies under Section 401(a) and related provisions of the Internal Revenue Code ("IRC"). The Plan was established on January 1, 2007, and effective July 1, 2023, the Plan was restated and the Plan name was changed to BILL 401(k) Plan. Additionally, upon restatement the Plan Sponsor became BILL Holdings, Inc. The Plan is designed to provide eligible participants with a means to defer a portion of their compensation for retirement and to provide benefits in the event of disability, death, termination, or financial hardship. The Plan is subject to the provisions of the Department of Labor's ("DOL") Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 ("ERISA") and subsequent laws.

An expansion of Setting Every Community Up for Retirement Enhancement Act of 2019 ("SECURE 2.0") was signed into law on December 29, 2022, as part of the Consolidated Appropriations Act of 2023. The effective dates of provisions within SECURE 2.0 vary through 2026. The Company has until the end of the first Plan year beginning on or after January 1, 2026, to amend the Plan for the changes related to SECURE 2.0. The Plan has not been formally amended to adopt these provisions as of the date the financial statements were available to be issued.

Plan administration

The Company has designated the Administrative Committee (the "Committee") as the administrator of the Plan and, as such, the Committee carries out the duties imposed by ERISA. The Company has contracted with Fidelity Management Trust Company ("Fidelity" or "Trustee") to act as the Trustee and an affiliate of Fidelity to perform the Plan's recordkeeping services.

Eligibility

With the exception of nonresident aliens who do not receive any earned income from the Company which constitutes United States-sourced income, leased employees, employees covered by a collective bargaining agreement, and individuals classified as interns, all employees of the Company who have attained age 21 are immediately eligible to begin participating in the Plan.

Participant contributions

Participants are allowed to contribute up to 90% of their eligible pre-tax or after-tax (as Roth contributions) compensation, as defined in the plan documents, up to the annual contribution limit as defined in the IRC. The Plan also permits the automatic enrollment of newly eligible employees into the Plan with an initial pre-tax contribution rate of 4% which increases 1% annually up to a maximum of 10%, unless affirmatively elected otherwise.

Plan participants who have attained age 50 or older before the end of a calendar year are allowed to make additional contributions called "catch-up contributions" to the Plan, up to the annual contribution limit as defined in the IRC.

Participants are also allowed to make rollover contributions of amounts received from other tax qualified employer-sponsored retirement plans and individual retirement accounts. All contributions are deposited in the appropriate investment funds in accordance with the participant's direction and the Plan's provisions.

Employer contributions

The Plan allows the Company to make discretionary matching contributions and discretionary nonelective contributions to the Plan. All participants are eligible to receive discretionary matching contributions and only participants who are employed by the Company as of the last day of the Plan year are eligible to receive discretionary nonelective contributions for the Plan year. The Company did not make any discretionary matching contributions or discretionary nonelective contributions during the year ended December 31, 2024. The Company made corrective Employer contributions of \$479 for the year ended December 31, 2024.

Participant accounts

Each participant's account is credited with the participant's contributions, rollover contributions, Company's discretionary matching contributions, discretionary nonelective contributions, if any, and Plan earnings, and charged with Plan losses and an allocation of administrative expenses. Allocations are based on participant earnings or account balances, as defined in the plan document. The benefit to which a participant is entitled is the benefit that can be provided from the participant's vested account. Participants direct the investment of their contributions into various investment options offered by the Plan.

Vesting

Participants are immediately 100% vested in their contributions to the Plan, plus actual earnings thereon. Participants vest ratably in the Company's discretionary matching contributions and discretionary nonelective contributions, if any, after being credited with four years of service, as defined in the plan documents.

Notes receivable from participants

Participants may borrow not less than \$1,000 and up to a maximum equal to the lesser of \$50,000 or 50% of their vested account balance. Notes receivable from participants ("participant loans") must be repaid within five years, unless the participant's loan is used to acquire a primary residence, in which case the repayment term may exceed five years. Participant loans are secured by the respective participant's account balance. Participant loans bear interest at a rate of prime plus 1%. Principal and interest are generally paid ratably through payroll deductions with payments made each pay period. As of December 31, 2024, participant loans outstanding carried interest rates between 4.25% and 9.50% and mature at various dates through July 2034.

Administrative expenses

Administrative expenses are generally paid by the Company, but may, at the discretion of the plan administrator, be paid by the Plan. Transaction fees for certain participant-initiated activity are charged to the specific account of the participant initiating any such transaction. The Plan is not required to reimburse the Company for expenses paid on its behalf.

Payment of benefits

Distributions and withdrawals are payable upon retirement, termination of employment, attainment of age 59 ½, disability or death. If a participant's vested account balance is equal to or less than \$1,000, the balance is immediately distributed as a lump-sum payment. Upon termination of employment, if a participant's vested account balance is greater than \$1,000 and less than or equal to \$5,000, their balance shall be automatically rolled over into an individual retirement account designated by the plan administrator, unless otherwise elected. If the account balance is greater than \$5,000 upon termination, the participant can consent to either a distribution paid in the form of a lump sum cash payment, a direct rollover into another qualified plan, or postpone payment to a later date and remain in the Plan as described in the plan documents.

Upon attaining the age of 59 ½, the participant may, while still employed by the Company, request a withdrawal from their account balance. Hardship and qualified reservist distributions are permitted under limited circumstances as described in the plan documents.

2. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of accounting and financial statement presentation

The financial statements of the Plan are prepared on the accrual basis of accounting in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America ("U.S. GAAP").

Use of estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with U.S. GAAP requires the plan administrator to make estimates and assumptions that affect certain reported amounts and disclosures. Accordingly, actual results may differ from those estimates. Significant items subject to such estimates and assumptions include the fair value of investments.

Risks and uncertainties

The Plan invests in various investment securities. Investment securities are exposed to various risks such as interest rate, market, and credit risks. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investment securities, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in the values of investment securities could occur in the near term and that such changes could materially affect participants' account balances and the amounts reported in the statements of net assets available for benefit.

Investment valuation and income recognition

The Plan's investments are reported at fair value. Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date (Note 4).

Purchases and sales of securities are recorded on a trade-date basis. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Dividends are recorded on the ex-dividend date. Net appreciation (depreciation) includes the Plan's gains and losses on sale on investments bought and sold as well as held during the year.

Notes receivable from participants

Notes receivable from participants are measured at their unpaid principal balances plus any accrued but unpaid interest. Interest income on notes receivable from participants is recorded when it is earned. Delinquent participant loans are recorded as deemed distributions based upon the terms of the plan document.

Contributions and receivables

Contributions from participants are recorded based on the date the contributions have been separated from a participant's pay by the Company, which is the pay date. The Plan records Employer contributions receivable based upon the contributions recorded in the Plan year but received by the Plan subsequent to year end. Rollover contributions from participants are recorded based on the date the rollover contribution are received by the Trustee.

Payment of benefits

Benefit payments are recorded when paid.

Administrative expenses

Administrative expenses are recorded when incurred.

Subsequent events

The Plan has evaluated subsequent events through September 2, 2025, the date the financial statements were available to be issued. Effective March 1, 2025, the Plan was amended to allow for after-tax contributions and in-Plan Roth contributions.

No other subsequent events have occurred that would have a material impact on the presentation of the Plan's financial statements.

3. INFORMATION PREPARED AND CERTIFIED BY THE TRUSTEE (UNAUDITED)

The plan administrator, having determined it is permissible in the circumstances, has elected to have the audits of the Plan's financial statements performed in accordance with ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) pursuant to 29 CFR 2520.103-8 of ERISA. Accordingly, the Trustee, determined to be a qualified institution by the plan administrator, has certified to the completeness and accuracy of:

- Investments and notes receivable from participants reflected on the accompanying statements of net assets available for benefits as of December 31, 2024 and 2023;
- Net appreciation in fair value of investments, dividends and interest, and interest income on notes receivable from participants reflected on the accompanying Statement of Changes in Net Assets Available for Benefits for the year ended December 31, 2024;
- Investments and notes receivable from participants reflected on the schedule of assets (held at end of year) as of December 31, 2024.

Accordingly, as requested by the Plan administrator, the Plan's independent auditor performed no audit procedures on the certified information other than to agree the certified information to the related information included in the financial statements and supplemental schedule.

4. FAIR VALUE MEASUREMENTS

Accounting standards establish a framework for measuring fair value. The framework provides a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. The hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (Level 1 measurements) and the lowest priority to measurements involving significant unobservable inputs (Level 3 measurements). The three levels of the fair value hierarchy are as follows:

- *Level 1* - Inputs to the valuation methodology are unadjusted quoted prices for identical assets or liabilities the Plan has the ability to access at the measurement date.
- *Level 2* - Inputs other than Level 1 that are observable, either directly or indirectly, such as quoted prices in active markets for similar assets or liabilities, quoted prices for identical or similar assets or liabilities in markets that are not active, or other inputs that are observable or can be corroborated by observable market data for substantially the full term of the assets or liabilities.
- *Level 3* - Inputs are unobservable inputs for the asset or liability and significant to the fair value measurement.

The asset or liability's fair value measurement level within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of any input that is significant to the fair value measurement. Valuation techniques maximize the use of relevant observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs.

Following is a description of the valuation methodologies used for assets measured at fair value. There have been no changes in the methodologies used as of December 31, 2024 and 2023.

*Mutual and money market funds:* Valued at the daily closing price as reported on an open exchange. Mutual funds and money market funds held by the Plan are open-end funds that are registered with the U.S. Securities and Exchange Commission. These funds are required to publish their daily net asset value and to transact at that price. The mutual funds and money market funds held by the Plan are deemed to be actively traded.

*Self-directed brokerage accounts:* Accounts primarily consists of money market funds and common stocks that are valued on the basis of readily determinable market prices.

The preceding methods described above may produce a fair value calculation that may not be indicative of net realizable value or reflective of future fair values. Furthermore, while the Plan believes its valuation methods are appropriate and consistent with other market participants, the use of different methodologies or assumptions to determine the fair value of certain financial instruments could result in a different fair value measurement at the reporting date.

5. PLAN TERMINATION

Although the Company has not expressed any intent to do so, the Company has the right under the Plan to discontinue its contributions at any time and to terminate the Plan subject to the provisions of ERISA. If the Plan is terminated, amounts allocated to a participants' account become fully vested.

6. TAX STATUS

The Plan has adopted a Non-Standardized Pre-Approved Profit Sharing Plan. The IRS has issued an opinion letter dated June 30, 2020, stating that the written form of the Plan document is designed in accordance with the applicable sections of the IRC, and is appropriate for use by employers for the benefit of their employees. The plan administrator believes that the Plan is currently designed and being operated in compliance with the applicable requirements of the IRC and therefore, believes that the Plan is qualified and is tax-exempt. Therefore, no provision for income taxes has been included in the Plan's financial statements.

7. RELATED PARTY AND PARTY-IN-INTEREST TRANSACTIONS

ERISA defines parties-in-interest similarly to the definition of a related party under U.S. GAAP, except that ERISA's definition is broader and includes all entities and individuals that provide services to the Plan; however, these entities may not necessarily be related parties. Management did not identify any related parties to the Plan that were not also considered to be parties-in-interest.

Party-in-interest transactions include those with fiduciaries or employees of the Plan, any person who provides services to the Plan, an employer whose employees are covered by the Plan, and an employee organization whose members are covered by the Plan, a person who owns 50% or more of such an employer or employee association or relatives of such persons.

The Plan has included in its investment options certain funds managed by the Trustee or its affiliates. The Trustee, and its affiliates, provide services and manage the Plan's investments and, therefore, these transactions qualify as exempt party-in-interest transactions.

The Trustee utilizes omnibus accounts at unaffiliated banks to facilitate transactions for the plans services and commingles funds in transit to or from the Plan, including other funds similarly in transit to or from other plans. These omnibus account balances are invested in short-term investments with the aim of earning a rate approximating the Target Federal Funds Rate and/or money market rates. The Trustee uses these earnings to pay bank fees associated with the Plan's transactions and retains any float earnings that exceed such fees and adjustments as compensation for its services. The Trustee will pay any fees to the extent they exceed float earnings.

Effective May 1, 2024, the Plan was amended to allow the recordkeeper to credit the Plan in recognition of the recordkeeper's compensation for Plan services to be allocated to an ERISA crediting account.
