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**Note 1 DESCRIPTION OF THE PLAN**

The following description of the Wilson Tool International, Inc. Profit Sharing Plan (the Plan) provides only general information. Participants should refer to the Plan agreement for a more complete description of the Plan's provisions.

GENERAL

The Plan is a defined contribution plan covering all eligible employees of the participating companies (collectively the Company). Employees are eligible to participate in deferrals on the date of their employment. Those who have 1,000 hours are eligible to receive the Company safe harbor and discretionary contributions as defined in the Plan. The Plan is subject to the provisions of the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (ERISA). The Investment Committee determines the appropriateness of the Plan's investment offerings and monitors investment performance.

Companies covered by the Plan are as follows:

- Wilson Tool International, Inc.
- Wilson Tool Enterprises, Inc.
- Wilson Golf Group Limited Partnership and its subsidiaries
- Doering Company, LLC
- aspectLED, Inc.

CONTRIBUTIONS

Each year, participants are allowed to make pre-tax or Roth elective deferral contributions up to 80 percent of eligible compensation, as defined by the Plan. Participants who have attained age 50 before the end of the Plan year are eligible to make catch-up contributions. Participants may also contribute amounts representing distributions from other qualified defined benefit or defined contribution plans (rollover). Participants direct the investment of their contributions into various investment options offered by the Plan. The Plan includes an auto-enrollment provision whereby all newly eligible employees are automatically enrolled in the Plan unless they affirmatively elect not to participate in the Plan. Automatically enrolled participants have their deferral rate set at 6 percent of eligible compensation with annual increases of 1 percent, up to 10 percent, and their contributions invested in a designated balanced fund until changed by the participant. The Company annually contributes 3 percent of participants' eligible compensation as a safe harbor contribution. The Company may also make an annual matching contribution and an annual discretionary non-elective profit sharing contribution. Participants must have 1,000 hours of service and be employed on the last day of the plan year to share in employer matching and discretionary non-elective contributions. The amount of such contributions is determined by the Board of Directors of the Company prior to the end of the Plan year. During 2024, the Company contributed \$2,795,987 of discretionary non-elective profit sharing contributions. Contributions are subject to certain IRS limitations.

PARTICIPANT ACCOUNTS

Each participant's account is credited with the participant's contributions and the allocations of Company contributions and plan earnings. Allocations are based on participant earnings, account balances, or specific participant transactions, as defined. The benefit to which a participant is entitled is the benefit that can be provided from the participant's vested account.

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VESTING

Participants are vested immediately in their participant contributions, safe harbor contributions and Company matching contributions plus actual earnings thereon. Vesting in discretionary non-elective contributions, forfeitures and earnings thereon is based on years of service. A participant is 100 percent vested after five years of credited service.

NOTES RECEIVABLE FROM PARTICIPANTS

Participants may borrow from their fund accounts a minimum of \$1,000 up to a maximum equal to the lesser of \$50,000 or 50 percent of their vested account balance. The loans are secured by the balance in the participant's account and bear interest at rates ranging from 4.25 to 9.50 percent, which are commensurate with local prevailing rates. The term of a loan cannot exceed five years. Principal and interest is paid ratably through payroll deductions.

PAYMENT OF BENEFITS

Upon retirement, death, disability, or termination of service, subject to the terms of the Plan, a participant may receive a single lump-sum payment amount equal to the value of the participant's vested interest in his or her account, or installment payments. Active participants may withdraw their employee contributions and vested non-elective contributions under the hardship provisions as defined by the Plan.

FORFEITED ACCOUNTS

At December 31, 2024 and 2023, forfeited nonvested accounts totaled \$82,752 and \$59,411, respectively. These accounts will be used to reduce future Company contributions. During 2024, Company contributions were reduced by \$30,000 from forfeited nonvested accounts.

**Note 2 SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES**

BASIS OF ACCOUNTING

The accompanying financial statements have been prepared on a modified cash basis of accounting, which is a comprehensive basis of accounting other than accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America. That basis differs from accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America in that contributions are recognized when received and payments of benefits and expenses are recognized when paid.

USE OF ESTIMATES

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with the modified cash basis of accounting requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and changes therein, and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities. Actual results could differ from such estimates.

CONTRIBUTIONS

Contributions from Plan participants and Company contributions are recorded in the year in which the contributions are received into the Plan.

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**INVESTMENT VALUATION AND INCOME RECOGNITION**

Investments are reported at fair value. Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. The Plan's Investment Committee determines the Plan's valuation policies utilizing information provided by the investment advisers, custodians and insurance company. See Note 4 for discussion of fair value measurements.

Purchases and sales of securities are recorded on a trade-date basis. Interest income is recorded on the cash basis. Dividends are recorded on the ex-dividend date. Net appreciation includes the Plan's gains and losses on investments bought and sold as well as held during the year.

**NOTES RECEIVABLE FROM PARTICIPANTS**

Notes receivable from participants are recorded at their unpaid principal balance. Interest income is recorded on the cash basis. Related fees are recorded as administrative expenses and are expensed when they are incurred. No allowance for credit losses has been recorded as of December 31, 2024 and 2023. Delinquent participant loans are recorded as distributions based on the terms of the Plan agreement.

**PAYMENT OF BENEFITS**

Benefits are recorded when paid.

**EXPENSES**

Certain expenses of maintaining the Plan are paid by the Plan, unless otherwise paid by the Company. Expenses paid by the Company are excluded from these financial statements. Fees related to the administration of notes receivable from participants are charged directly to the participant's account and are included in administrative expenses. Investment related expenses are included in net appreciation of fair value of investments.

**SUBSEQUENT EVENTS**

Plan management has evaluated subsequent events through September 12, 2025, the date the financial statements were available to be issued.

**Note 3 CERTIFIED INVESTMENTS**

Certain information in the accompanying financial statements and ERISA-required supplemental schedules, related to investments and notes receivable from participants held at December 31, 2024 and 2023, and net appreciation in fair value of investments, interest and dividends, and interest income on notes receivable from participants for the year ended December 31, 2024, was obtained by management and agreed to or derived from information certified as complete and accurate by Fidelity Management Trust Company (the trustee of the Plan), a qualified institution.

**Note 4 FAIR VALUE MEASUREMENTS**

The framework for measuring fair value provides a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. The hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (level 1) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (level 3). The three levels of the fair value hierarchy under FASB ASC 820 are described as follows:

Level 1- Inputs to the valuation methodology are unadjusted quoted prices for identical assets or liabilities in active markets that the Plan has the ability to access.

Level 2- Inputs to the valuation methodology include:

- Quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities in active markets;
- Quoted prices for identical or similar assets or liabilities in inactive markets;
- Inputs other than quoted prices that are observable for the asset or liability;
- Inputs that are derived principally from or corroborated by observable market data by correlation or other means.

If the asset or liability has a specified (contractual) term, the Level 2 input must be observable for substantially the full term of the asset or liability.

Level 3- Inputs to the valuation methodology are unobservable and significant to the fair value measurement.

The asset's or liability's fair value measurement level within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of any input that is significant to the fair value measurement. Valuation techniques maximize the use of relevant observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs.

Following is a description of the valuation methodologies used for assets measured at fair value. There have been no changes to valuation methodologies used at December 31, 2024 and 2023.

*Mutual funds:* Valued at the daily closing price as reported by the fund. Mutual funds held by the Plan are open-end mutual funds that are registered with the SEC. These funds are required to publish their fair net asset value (NAV) and to transact at that price. The mutual funds held by the Plan are deemed to be actively traded.

*Common/collective trust:* Valued at the Net Asset Value (NAV) of units of a bank collective trust. The NAV, as provided by the trustee, is used as a practical expedient to estimate fair value. The NAV is based on the fair value of the underlying investments held by the fund less its liabilities. This practical expedient is not used when it is determined to be probable that the fund will sell the investment for an amount different than the reported NAV. Participant transactions (purchases and sales) may occur daily. Were the Plan to initiate a full redemption of the collective trust, the investment advisor reserves the right to temporarily delay withdrawal from the trust in order to ensure that securities liquidations will be carried out in an orderly business manner.

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**Note 5 RELATED-PARTY AND PARTY-IN-INTEREST TRANSACTIONS**

Certain Plan investments are managed by Fidelity Management Trust Company, the trustee of the Plan. Therefore, these transactions qualify as party-in-interest transactions. As described in Note 2, fees incurred by the Plan for administration of the Plan are included in net appreciation in fair value of the investment, as they are paid through revenue sharing, rather than a direct payment. The Plan made a direct payment to the third party administrators of \$14,357 for the year ended December 31, 2024. The Company pays directly any other fees related to the Plan's operations.

**Note 6 PLAN TERMINATION**

Although they have not expressed any intent to do so, the Company has the right under the Plan to discontinue their contributions at any time and to terminate the Plan subject to the provisions of ERISA. In the event of Plan termination, all participants would become 100 percent vested in their employer discretionary non-elective contributions.

**Note 7 INCOME TAX STATUS**

The IRS has determined and informed the Company by a letter dated June 30, 2020, that the Plan and related trust are designed in accordance with applicable sections of the Internal Revenue Code. Although the Plan has been amended since receiving the determination letter; the Plan administrator believes that the Plan is designed, and is currently being operated, in compliance with the applicable requirements of the Internal Revenue Code and, therefore, believe that the Plan is qualified and that the related trust is tax-exempt.

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require plan management to evaluate tax positions taken by the Plan and recognize a liability if the Plan has taken an uncertain position that more likely than not would not be sustained upon examination by the Internal Revenue Service. The Plan is subject to routine audits by taxing jurisdictions; however, there are currently no audits for any tax periods in progress.

**Note 8 RISKS AND UNCERTAINTIES**

The Plan invests in various investment securities. Investment securities are exposed to various risks, such as interest rate, market, and credit risk. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investment securities, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in the values of the investment securities will occur in the near term and that such changes could materially affect participants' account balances and the amounts reported in the statements of net assets available for benefits.

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**Note 1 DESCRIPTION OF THE PLAN**

The following description of the Wilson Tool International, Inc. Profit Sharing Plan (the Plan) provides only general information. Participants should refer to the Plan agreement for a more complete description of the Plan's provisions.

GENERAL

The Plan is a defined contribution plan covering all eligible employees of the participating companies (collectively the Company). Employees are eligible to participate in deferrals on the date of their employment. Those who have 1,000 hours are eligible to receive the Company safe harbor and discretionary contributions as defined in the Plan. The Plan is subject to the provisions of the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (ERISA). The Investment Committee determines the appropriateness of the Plan's investment offerings and monitors investment performance.

Companies covered by the Plan are as follows:

- Wilson Tool International, Inc.
- Wilson Tool Enterprises, Inc.
- Wilson Golf Group Limited Partnership and its subsidiaries
- Doering Company, LLC
- aspectLED, Inc.

CONTRIBUTIONS

Each year, participants are allowed to make pre-tax or Roth elective deferral contributions up to 80 percent of eligible compensation, as defined by the Plan. Participants who have attained age 50 before the end of the Plan year are eligible to make catch-up contributions. Participants may also contribute amounts representing distributions from other qualified defined benefit or defined contribution plans (rollover). Participants direct the investment of their contributions into various investment options offered by the Plan. The Plan includes an auto-enrollment provision whereby all newly eligible employees are automatically enrolled in the Plan unless they affirmatively elect not to participate in the Plan. Automatically enrolled participants have their deferral rate set at 6 percent of eligible compensation with annual increases of 1 percent, up to 10 percent, and their contributions invested in a designated balanced fund until changed by the participant. The Company annually contributes 3 percent of participants' eligible compensation as a safe harbor contribution. The Company may also make an annual matching contribution and an annual discretionary non-elective profit sharing contribution. Participants must have 1,000 hours of service and be employed on the last day of the plan year to share in employer matching and discretionary non-elective contributions. The amount of such contributions is determined by the Board of Directors of the Company prior to the end of the Plan year. During 2024, the Company contributed \$2,795,987 of discretionary non-elective profit sharing contributions. Contributions are subject to certain IRS limitations.

PARTICIPANT ACCOUNTS

Each participant's account is credited with the participant's contributions and the allocations of Company contributions and plan earnings. Allocations are based on participant earnings, account balances, or specific participant transactions, as defined. The benefit to which a participant is entitled is the benefit that can be provided from the participant's vested account.

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VESTING

Participants are vested immediately in their participant contributions, safe harbor contributions and Company matching contributions plus actual earnings thereon. Vesting in discretionary non-elective contributions, forfeitures and earnings thereon is based on years of service. A participant is 100 percent vested after five years of credited service.

NOTES RECEIVABLE FROM PARTICIPANTS

Participants may borrow from their fund accounts a minimum of \$1,000 up to a maximum equal to the lesser of \$50,000 or 50 percent of their vested account balance. The loans are secured by the balance in the participant's account and bear interest at rates ranging from 4.25 to 9.50 percent, which are commensurate with local prevailing rates. The term of a loan cannot exceed five years. Principal and interest is paid ratably through payroll deductions.

PAYMENT OF BENEFITS

Upon retirement, death, disability, or termination of service, subject to the terms of the Plan, a participant may receive a single lump-sum payment amount equal to the value of the participant's vested interest in his or her account, or installment payments. Active participants may withdraw their employee contributions and vested non-elective contributions under the hardship provisions as defined by the Plan.

FORFEITED ACCOUNTS

At December 31, 2024 and 2023, forfeited nonvested accounts totaled \$82,752 and \$59,411, respectively. These accounts will be used to reduce future Company contributions. During 2024, Company contributions were reduced by \$30,000 from forfeited nonvested accounts.

**Note 2 SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES**

BASIS OF ACCOUNTING

The accompanying financial statements have been prepared on a modified cash basis of accounting, which is a comprehensive basis of accounting other than accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America. That basis differs from accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America in that contributions are recognized when received and payments of benefits and expenses are recognized when paid.

USE OF ESTIMATES

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with the modified cash basis of accounting requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and changes therein, and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities. Actual results could differ from such estimates.

CONTRIBUTIONS

Contributions from Plan participants and Company contributions are recorded in the year in which the contributions are received into the Plan.

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**INVESTMENT VALUATION AND INCOME RECOGNITION**

Investments are reported at fair value. Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. The Plan's Investment Committee determines the Plan's valuation policies utilizing information provided by the investment advisers, custodians and insurance company. See Note 4 for discussion of fair value measurements.

Purchases and sales of securities are recorded on a trade-date basis. Interest income is recorded on the cash basis. Dividends are recorded on the ex-dividend date. Net appreciation includes the Plan's gains and losses on investments bought and sold as well as held during the year.

**NOTES RECEIVABLE FROM PARTICIPANTS**

Notes receivable from participants are recorded at their unpaid principal balance. Interest income is recorded on the cash basis. Related fees are recorded as administrative expenses and are expensed when they are incurred. No allowance for credit losses has been recorded as of December 31, 2024 and 2023. Delinquent participant loans are recorded as distributions based on the terms of the Plan agreement.

**PAYMENT OF BENEFITS**

Benefits are recorded when paid.

**EXPENSES**

Certain expenses of maintaining the Plan are paid by the Plan, unless otherwise paid by the Company. Expenses paid by the Company are excluded from these financial statements. Fees related to the administration of notes receivable from participants are charged directly to the participant's account and are included in administrative expenses. Investment related expenses are included in net appreciation of fair value of investments.

**SUBSEQUENT EVENTS**

Plan management has evaluated subsequent events through September 12, 2025, the date the financial statements were available to be issued.

**Note 3 CERTIFIED INVESTMENTS**

Certain information in the accompanying financial statements and ERISA-required supplemental schedules, related to investments and notes receivable from participants held at December 31, 2024 and 2023, and net appreciation in fair value of investments, interest and dividends, and interest income on notes receivable from participants for the year ended December 31, 2024, was obtained by management and agreed to or derived from information certified as complete and accurate by Fidelity Management Trust Company (the trustee of the Plan), a qualified institution.

**Note 4 FAIR VALUE MEASUREMENTS**

The framework for measuring fair value provides a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. The hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (level 1) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (level 3). The three levels of the fair value hierarchy under FASB ASC 820 are described as follows:

Level 1- Inputs to the valuation methodology are unadjusted quoted prices for identical assets or liabilities in active markets that the Plan has the ability to access.

Level 2- Inputs to the valuation methodology include:

- Quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities in active markets;
- Quoted prices for identical or similar assets or liabilities in inactive markets;
- Inputs other than quoted prices that are observable for the asset or liability;
- Inputs that are derived principally from or corroborated by observable market data by correlation or other means.

If the asset or liability has a specified (contractual) term, the Level 2 input must be observable for substantially the full term of the asset or liability.

Level 3- Inputs to the valuation methodology are unobservable and significant to the fair value measurement.

The asset's or liability's fair value measurement level within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of any input that is significant to the fair value measurement. Valuation techniques maximize the use of relevant observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs.

Following is a description of the valuation methodologies used for assets measured at fair value. There have been no changes to valuation methodologies used at December 31, 2024 and 2023.

*Mutual funds:* Valued at the daily closing price as reported by the fund. Mutual funds held by the Plan are open-end mutual funds that are registered with the SEC. These funds are required to publish their fair net asset value (NAV) and to transact at that price. The mutual funds held by the Plan are deemed to be actively traded.

*Common/collective trust:* Valued at the Net Asset Value (NAV) of units of a bank collective trust. The NAV, as provided by the trustee, is used as a practical expedient to estimate fair value. The NAV is based on the fair value of the underlying investments held by the fund less its liabilities. This practical expedient is not used when it is determined to be probable that the fund will sell the investment for an amount different than the reported NAV. Participant transactions (purchases and sales) may occur daily. Were the Plan to initiate a full redemption of the collective trust, the investment advisor reserves the right to temporarily delay withdrawal from the trust in order to ensure that securities liquidations will be carried out in an orderly business manner.

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**Note 5 RELATED-PARTY AND PARTY-IN-INTEREST TRANSACTIONS**

Certain Plan investments are managed by Fidelity Management Trust Company, the trustee of the Plan. Therefore, these transactions qualify as party-in-interest transactions. As described in Note 2, fees incurred by the Plan for administration of the Plan are included in net appreciation in fair value of the investment, as they are paid through revenue sharing, rather than a direct payment. The Plan made a direct payment to the third party administrators of \$14,357 for the year ended December 31, 2024. The Company pays directly any other fees related to the Plan's operations.

**Note 6 PLAN TERMINATION**

Although they have not expressed any intent to do so, the Company has the right under the Plan to discontinue their contributions at any time and to terminate the Plan subject to the provisions of ERISA. In the event of Plan termination, all participants would become 100 percent vested in their employer discretionary non-elective contributions.

**Note 7 INCOME TAX STATUS**

The IRS has determined and informed the Company by a letter dated June 30, 2020, that the Plan and related trust are designed in accordance with applicable sections of the Internal Revenue Code. Although the Plan has been amended since receiving the determination letter; the Plan administrator believes that the Plan is designed, and is currently being operated, in compliance with the applicable requirements of the Internal Revenue Code and, therefore, believe that the Plan is qualified and that the related trust is tax-exempt.

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require plan management to evaluate tax positions taken by the Plan and recognize a liability if the Plan has taken an uncertain position that more likely than not would not be sustained upon examination by the Internal Revenue Service. The Plan is subject to routine audits by taxing jurisdictions; however, there are currently no audits for any tax periods in progress.

**Note 8 RISKS AND UNCERTAINTIES**

The Plan invests in various investment securities. Investment securities are exposed to various risks, such as interest rate, market, and credit risk. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investment securities, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in the values of the investment securities will occur in the near term and that such changes could materially affect participants' account balances and the amounts reported in the statements of net assets available for benefits.

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**Note 1 DESCRIPTION OF THE PLAN**

The following description of the Wilson Tool International, Inc. Profit Sharing Plan (the Plan) provides only general information. Participants should refer to the Plan agreement for a more complete description of the Plan's provisions.

GENERAL

The Plan is a defined contribution plan covering all eligible employees of the participating companies (collectively the Company). Employees are eligible to participate in deferrals on the date of their employment. Those who have 1,000 hours are eligible to receive the Company safe harbor and discretionary contributions as defined in the Plan. The Plan is subject to the provisions of the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (ERISA). The Investment Committee determines the appropriateness of the Plan's investment offerings and monitors investment performance.

Companies covered by the Plan are as follows:

- Wilson Tool International, Inc.
- Wilson Tool Enterprises, Inc.
- Wilson Golf Group Limited Partnership and its subsidiaries
- Doering Company, LLC
- aspectLED, Inc.

CONTRIBUTIONS

Each year, participants are allowed to make pre-tax or Roth elective deferral contributions up to 80 percent of eligible compensation, as defined by the Plan. Participants who have attained age 50 before the end of the Plan year are eligible to make catch-up contributions. Participants may also contribute amounts representing distributions from other qualified defined benefit or defined contribution plans (rollover). Participants direct the investment of their contributions into various investment options offered by the Plan. The Plan includes an auto-enrollment provision whereby all newly eligible employees are automatically enrolled in the Plan unless they affirmatively elect not to participate in the Plan. Automatically enrolled participants have their deferral rate set at 6 percent of eligible compensation with annual increases of 1 percent, up to 10 percent, and their contributions invested in a designated balanced fund until changed by the participant. The Company annually contributes 3 percent of participants' eligible compensation as a safe harbor contribution. The Company may also make an annual matching contribution and an annual discretionary non-elective profit sharing contribution. Participants must have 1,000 hours of service and be employed on the last day of the plan year to share in employer matching and discretionary non-elective contributions. The amount of such contributions is determined by the Board of Directors of the Company prior to the end of the Plan year. During 2024, the Company contributed \$2,795,987 of discretionary non-elective profit sharing contributions. Contributions are subject to certain IRS limitations.

PARTICIPANT ACCOUNTS

Each participant's account is credited with the participant's contributions and the allocations of Company contributions and plan earnings. Allocations are based on participant earnings, account balances, or specific participant transactions, as defined. The benefit to which a participant is entitled is the benefit that can be provided from the participant's vested account.

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VESTING

Participants are vested immediately in their participant contributions, safe harbor contributions and Company matching contributions plus actual earnings thereon. Vesting in discretionary non-elective contributions, forfeitures and earnings thereon is based on years of service. A participant is 100 percent vested after five years of credited service.

NOTES RECEIVABLE FROM PARTICIPANTS

Participants may borrow from their fund accounts a minimum of \$1,000 up to a maximum equal to the lesser of \$50,000 or 50 percent of their vested account balance. The loans are secured by the balance in the participant's account and bear interest at rates ranging from 4.25 to 9.50 percent, which are commensurate with local prevailing rates. The term of a loan cannot exceed five years. Principal and interest is paid ratably through payroll deductions.

PAYMENT OF BENEFITS

Upon retirement, death, disability, or termination of service, subject to the terms of the Plan, a participant may receive a single lump-sum payment amount equal to the value of the participant's vested interest in his or her account, or installment payments. Active participants may withdraw their employee contributions and vested non-elective contributions under the hardship provisions as defined by the Plan.

FORFEITED ACCOUNTS

At December 31, 2024 and 2023, forfeited nonvested accounts totaled \$82,752 and \$59,411, respectively. These accounts will be used to reduce future Company contributions. During 2024, Company contributions were reduced by \$30,000 from forfeited nonvested accounts.

**Note 2 SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES**

BASIS OF ACCOUNTING

The accompanying financial statements have been prepared on a modified cash basis of accounting, which is a comprehensive basis of accounting other than accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America. That basis differs from accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America in that contributions are recognized when received and payments of benefits and expenses are recognized when paid.

USE OF ESTIMATES

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with the modified cash basis of accounting requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and changes therein, and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities. Actual results could differ from such estimates.

CONTRIBUTIONS

Contributions from Plan participants and Company contributions are recorded in the year in which the contributions are received into the Plan.

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**INVESTMENT VALUATION AND INCOME RECOGNITION**

Investments are reported at fair value. Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. The Plan's Investment Committee determines the Plan's valuation policies utilizing information provided by the investment advisers, custodians and insurance company. See Note 4 for discussion of fair value measurements.

Purchases and sales of securities are recorded on a trade-date basis. Interest income is recorded on the cash basis. Dividends are recorded on the ex-dividend date. Net appreciation includes the Plan's gains and losses on investments bought and sold as well as held during the year.

**NOTES RECEIVABLE FROM PARTICIPANTS**

Notes receivable from participants are recorded at their unpaid principal balance. Interest income is recorded on the cash basis. Related fees are recorded as administrative expenses and are expensed when they are incurred. No allowance for credit losses has been recorded as of December 31, 2024 and 2023. Delinquent participant loans are recorded as distributions based on the terms of the Plan agreement.

**PAYMENT OF BENEFITS**

Benefits are recorded when paid.

**EXPENSES**

Certain expenses of maintaining the Plan are paid by the Plan, unless otherwise paid by the Company. Expenses paid by the Company are excluded from these financial statements. Fees related to the administration of notes receivable from participants are charged directly to the participant's account and are included in administrative expenses. Investment related expenses are included in net appreciation of fair value of investments.

**SUBSEQUENT EVENTS**

Plan management has evaluated subsequent events through September 12, 2025, the date the financial statements were available to be issued.

**Note 3 CERTIFIED INVESTMENTS**

Certain information in the accompanying financial statements and ERISA-required supplemental schedules, related to investments and notes receivable from participants held at December 31, 2024 and 2023, and net appreciation in fair value of investments, interest and dividends, and interest income on notes receivable from participants for the year ended December 31, 2024, was obtained by management and agreed to or derived from information certified as complete and accurate by Fidelity Management Trust Company (the trustee of the Plan), a qualified institution.

**Note 4 FAIR VALUE MEASUREMENTS**

The framework for measuring fair value provides a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. The hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (level 1) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (level 3). The three levels of the fair value hierarchy under FASB ASC 820 are described as follows:

Level 1- Inputs to the valuation methodology are unadjusted quoted prices for identical assets or liabilities in active markets that the Plan has the ability to access.

Level 2- Inputs to the valuation methodology include:

- Quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities in active markets;
- Quoted prices for identical or similar assets or liabilities in inactive markets;
- Inputs other than quoted prices that are observable for the asset or liability;
- Inputs that are derived principally from or corroborated by observable market data by correlation or other means.

If the asset or liability has a specified (contractual) term, the Level 2 input must be observable for substantially the full term of the asset or liability.

Level 3- Inputs to the valuation methodology are unobservable and significant to the fair value measurement.

The asset's or liability's fair value measurement level within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of any input that is significant to the fair value measurement. Valuation techniques maximize the use of relevant observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs.

Following is a description of the valuation methodologies used for assets measured at fair value. There have been no changes to valuation methodologies used at December 31, 2024 and 2023.

*Mutual funds:* Valued at the daily closing price as reported by the fund. Mutual funds held by the Plan are open-end mutual funds that are registered with the SEC. These funds are required to publish their fair net asset value (NAV) and to transact at that price. The mutual funds held by the Plan are deemed to be actively traded.

*Common/collective trust:* Valued at the Net Asset Value (NAV) of units of a bank collective trust. The NAV, as provided by the trustee, is used as a practical expedient to estimate fair value. The NAV is based on the fair value of the underlying investments held by the fund less its liabilities. This practical expedient is not used when it is determined to be probable that the fund will sell the investment for an amount different than the reported NAV. Participant transactions (purchases and sales) may occur daily. Were the Plan to initiate a full redemption of the collective trust, the investment advisor reserves the right to temporarily delay withdrawal from the trust in order to ensure that securities liquidations will be carried out in an orderly business manner.

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**Note 5 RELATED-PARTY AND PARTY-IN-INTEREST TRANSACTIONS**

Certain Plan investments are managed by Fidelity Management Trust Company, the trustee of the Plan. Therefore, these transactions qualify as party-in-interest transactions. As described in Note 2, fees incurred by the Plan for administration of the Plan are included in net appreciation in fair value of the investment, as they are paid through revenue sharing, rather than a direct payment. The Plan made a direct payment to the third party administrators of \$14,357 for the year ended December 31, 2024. The Company pays directly any other fees related to the Plan's operations.

**Note 6 PLAN TERMINATION**

Although they have not expressed any intent to do so, the Company has the right under the Plan to discontinue their contributions at any time and to terminate the Plan subject to the provisions of ERISA. In the event of Plan termination, all participants would become 100 percent vested in their employer discretionary non-elective contributions.

**Note 7 INCOME TAX STATUS**

The IRS has determined and informed the Company by a letter dated June 30, 2020, that the Plan and related trust are designed in accordance with applicable sections of the Internal Revenue Code. Although the Plan has been amended since receiving the determination letter; the Plan administrator believes that the Plan is designed, and is currently being operated, in compliance with the applicable requirements of the Internal Revenue Code and, therefore, believe that the Plan is qualified and that the related trust is tax-exempt.

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require plan management to evaluate tax positions taken by the Plan and recognize a liability if the Plan has taken an uncertain position that more likely than not would not be sustained upon examination by the Internal Revenue Service. The Plan is subject to routine audits by taxing jurisdictions; however, there are currently no audits for any tax periods in progress.

**Note 8 RISKS AND UNCERTAINTIES**

The Plan invests in various investment securities. Investment securities are exposed to various risks, such as interest rate, market, and credit risk. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investment securities, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in the values of the investment securities will occur in the near term and that such changes could materially affect participants' account balances and the amounts reported in the statements of net assets available for benefits.
