Scope and Nature of the ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) Audit

We have performed an audit of the accompanying financial statements of Springs Food Service, LLC 401(K) Profit Sharing Plan & Trust (the Plan), an employee benefit plan subject to the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (ERISA), as permitted by ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) [ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) audit]. The financial statements comprise the statement of net assets available for benefits as of December 31, 2024 and 2023, and the related statement of changes in net assets available for benefits for the year ended December 31, 2024, and the related notes to the financial statements.

Management, having determined it is permissible in the circumstances, has elected to have the audit of the Plan's financial statements performed in accordance with ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) pursuant to 29 CFR 2520.103-8 of the Department of Labor's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA. Management has obtained a certification from a qualified institution as of December 31, 2024 and 2023, stating that the certified investment information, as described in Note 3 to the financial statements, is complete and accurate.

Opinion

- the information in the financial statements referred to above related to assets held by and certified to by a qualified institution agrees to, or is derived from, in all material respects, the information prepared and certified by an institution that management determined meets the requirements of ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C).

Basis for Opinion

We conducted our audits in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements section of our report. We are required to be independent of the Plan and to meet our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with the relevant ethical requirements relating to our audit. Responsibilities of Management for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America, and for the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error. Management's election of the ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) audit does not affect management's responsibility for the financial statements.

In preparing the financial statements, management is required to evaluate whether there are conditions or events, considered in the aggregate, that raise substantial doubt about the Plan's ability to continue as a going concern for one year after the date the financial statements are available to be issued.

Note 1: DESCRIPTION OF THE PLAN

The following description of the Springs Food Service, LLC 401(K) Profit Sharing Plan & Trust (the Plan) provides only general information. Refer to Plan documents for a more complete description of Plan provisions.

General

The Plan is organized as a profit sharing and 401(K) plan under Section 401(K) of the Internal Revenue Code and covers all eligible employees of Springs Food Service, LLC (the Plan Sponsor, Plan Administrator, Company and Employer). The Plan is subject to the provisions of the Department of Labor's (DOL's) Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (ERISA). The Administrator is responsible for oversight of the Plan. The Plan was adopted January 1, 2014. Effective January 1, 2024, the Plan was amended to become a Safe Harbor 401(K) Plan in accordance with the requirements of the Internal Revenue Code. As a result, the Plan is exempt from annual nondiscrimination testing for elective deferrals and employer matching contributions.

The Plan is administered by the Plan Administrator. The custodian is appointed by the Plan Administrator. Authority for control, management and administration of the Plan is vested in the Plan Administrator. As the Plan's fiduciary, the custodian's responsibility is to maintain the Plan's assets. Some administrative functions are performed by employees of the Plan Sponsor. No compensation is remitted to the Plan Sponsor for these services.

Plan assets are held and managed by Mid Atlantic Trust Company, the trustee or custodian and the qualified institution for the Plan, which invests contributions and Plan earnings, makes investment transactions as directed by the Plan Administrator and provides certain recordkeeping services. Paychex, Inc. acts as the third-party administrator for the Plan, which performs certain plan administration and annual ERISA compliance testing.

Eligibility

The Plan is a defined contribution plan covering all full-time and part-time employees of the Company, who have been employed for 1 year and are at least 18 years of age. However, the Plan excludes employees covered by a collective bargaining agreement as well as nonresident aliens and leased employees.

Note 1: DESCRIPTION OF THE PLAN (Continued)

Contributions

Each year, participants may contribute up to 92 percent of pretax annual compensation, as defined in the Plan. Participants who have attained age 50 before the end of the Plan year are eligible to make catch-up contributions. Participants may also contribute amounts representing distributions from other qualified defined benefit or defined contribution plans (i.e. rollover contributions). Participants direct the investment of their contributions into various investment options offered by the Plan. The Company provides for a safe harbor matching contributions of 100% of salary deferrals up to 3% of compensation, plus 50% of salary deferrals of up to the next 2% of compensation.

Participant Accounts

Each participant's account is credited with the participant's contributions and Company's matching contributions, as well as allocations of the Company's profit sharing contributions and Plan earnings. Participant accounts are charged with an allocation of administrative expenses that are paid by the Plan. Allocations are based on participant earnings, account balances, or specific participant transactions, as defined. The benefit to which a participant is entitled is the benefit that can be provided from the participant's vested account.

Vesting

Participants are immediately 100% vested in both their and any employer matching or profit sharing contributions plus earnings thereon.

Notes Receivable from Participants

Participants may borrow from their fund accounts a minimum of \$1,000. The maximum amount of loans outstanding cannot exceed the lesser of 95% of one-half of the participant's vested account balance or \$50,000. Participants may not have more than two loans outstanding at a time. The loans are secured by the balance in the participant's account and bear interest at prime (as stated in the Wall Street Journal at the date of the loan) plus 1%, ranging from 4.25% to 9.50%.

Benefit Payments

Benefits become payable upon retirement, termination of employment, death, disability, or in-service distributions for those 59½ or older. Benefit payments are recorded when paid. The amount of benefits to which a participant is entitled is equal to the vested portion of the participant's account balance.

Forfeitures

At December 31, 2024 and 2023, forfeited nonvested accounts totaled \$299 and \$0, respectively. These accounts will be used to reduce future employer contributions.

Hardship Withdrawals

As permitted by the Internal Revenue Code (IRC) and in accordance with the plan agreement, a participant may request a financial hardship withdrawal if they experience a severe financial hardship. The financial hardship withdrawal may not exceed the amount of the financial hardship or the value of the vested portion of the participant's balance, whichever is less.

Note 2: SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of Accounting

The accompanying financial statements have been prepared on the accrual basis of accounting in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America (U.S. GAAP). The Financial Accounting Standards Board (FASB) provides authoritative guidance regarding U.S. GAAP through the Accounting Standards Codification (ASC) and related Accounting Standards Updates (ASUs).

Use of Estimates

The preparation of U.S. GAAP financial statements requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and changes therein, and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Investment Valuation and Income Recognition

Investments generally are reported at fair value, but may also be reported at contract value or net asset value (NAV). Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. See Note 4 for further discussions of fair value measurements and NAV. The Plan's Administrative Committee determines the Plan's valuation policies utilizing information provided by the investment advisers, custodians and insurance company.

Purchases and sales of securities are recorded on a trade-date basis. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Dividends are recorded on the ex-dividend date. Net appreciation (depreciation) includes the Plan's gains and losses on investments bought and sold as well as held during the year.

Notes Receivable from Participants

Notes receivable from participants are measured at their unpaid principal balance plus any accrued but unpaid interest. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Related fees are recorded as administrative expenses and are expensed when they are incurred.

Payment of Benefits

Distributions to participants are recorded when paid.

Administrative Expenses

Certain expenses of maintaining the Plan are paid by the Plan, unless otherwise paid by the Company. Expenses that are paid by the Company are excluded from these financial statements. Fees related to the administration of notes receivable from participants are charged directly to the participant's account and are included in administrative expenses. Investment related expenses are included in net appreciation of fair value investments.

Risks and Uncertainties

The Plan invests in various investment securities. Investment securities, in general, are exposed to various risks, such as interest rate, credit and overall market volatility. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investment securities, it is reasonably possible that changes in value of investment securities will occur in the near term and that these changes could materially affect amounts reported in the Plan's financial statements.

Subsequent Events

Management has evaluated subsequent events through the date that the financial statements were available to be issued, August 21, 2025, and determined there were no events that occurred that require disclosure. No subsequent events occurring after this date have been evaluated for inclusion in these financial statements.

The Plan Administrator has elected the method of compliance, as permitted by 29 CFR 2520.103-8 of the DOL's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA. The following financial information included in the Plan's financial statements was obtained by management and agreed to or derived from information certified as complete and accurate by Mid Atlantic Trust Company, the qualified institution:

- a) Total investments at fair value, included in the statements of net assets available for benefits at December 31, 2024 and 2023.
- b) Investment income, net appreciation in the value of investments, information included in the statement of changes in net assets available for benefits for the year ended December 31, 2024.
- c) All amounts included in Note 4, *Fair Value Measurements*.
- d) All information included in the supplemental schedule of assets (held at end of year) as of December 31, 2024, excluding notes receivable.

Note 4: FAIR VALUE MEASUREMENTS

Fair value is the exchange price that would be received for an asset or paid to transfer a liability (exit price) in the principal or most advantageous market for the asset or liability in an orderly transaction between market participants on the measurement date. There are three levels of inputs that may be used to measure fair values:

Level 1: Quoted prices (unadjusted) for identical assets or liabilities in active markets that the entity has the ability to access as of the measurement date.

Level 2: Significant other observable inputs other than Level 1 prices, such as:

- Quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities in active markets;
- Quoted prices for identical or similar assets or liabilities in inactive markets;
- Inputs, other than quoted prices, that are:
 - observable; or
 - can be corroborated by observable market data.

If the asset or liability has a specified (contractual) term, the Level 2 input must be observable for substantially the full term of the asset or liability.

Level 3: Inputs to the valuation methodology are unobservable and significant to the fair value measurement.

The asset or liability's fair value measurement level within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of any input that is significant to the fair value measurement. Valuation techniques maximize the use of relevant observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs.

Following is a description of the valuation methodologies used for assets measured at fair value. There have been no changes in the methodologies used at December 31, 2024 and 2023.

Money market funds: Valued at the daily closing price as reported by the fund sponsor from an actively traded exchange.

Mutual funds: Valued at the daily closing price as reported by the fund. Mutual funds held by the Plan are open-end mutual funds that are registered with the SEC. These funds are required to publish their daily NAV and to transact at that price. The mutual funds held by the Plan are deemed to be actively traded.

Model funds: Investments are made up of shares of individual mutual funds. These are valued based on NAV per share or unit as reported by the individual fund managers, multiplied by the number of shares or units held as of the measurement date. The trust in which these funds are held is the unit of account for these investments. As the trust is not readily traded or audited the investments (trusts) are considered level 3.

The preceding methods described may produce a fair value calculation that may not be indicative of net realizable value or reflective of future fair values. Furthermore, although the Plan Administrator believes its valuation methods are appropriate and consistent with other market participants, the use of different methodologies or assumptions to determine fair value of certain financial instruments could result in different fair value measurements at the reporting date.

Note 5: TAX STATUS

The IRS has determined and informed the Company by a letter dated October 31, 2011 that the Plan and related trust are designed in accordance with applicable sections of the IRC. Although the Plan has been amended since receiving the determination letter, the Plan administrator and the Plan's tax counsel believe that the Plan is designed, and is currently being operated, in compliance with the applicable requirements of the IRC and, therefore, believe that the Plan is qualified, and the related trust is tax-exempt.

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require plan management to evaluate tax positions taken by the Plan and recognize a tax liability if the plan has taken an uncertain position that more likely than not would not be sustained upon examination. The Plan is subject to routine audits by taxing jurisdictions; however, there are currently no audits for any tax periods in progress.

Note 6: RELATED PARTY AND PARTY-IN-INTEREST TRANSACTIONS

Mid Atlantic Trust Company, the Custodian of the Plan, provides investment services to the Plan and also manages and invests contributions and other cash received as directed, records interest and dividend income, and makes distributions to participants. Investments of the Plan were invested in mutual funds, model funds and money market funds with the custodian at December 31, 2024 and 2023.

Certain Plan investments are shares of model funds managed by 401k Generation. 401k Generation is investment advisor of the Plan and therefore, these transactions qualify as party-in-interest transactions.

In general, the administrative expenses for the Plan are paid from the Plans' assets. From time to time, certain expenses of the Plan, including legal and accounting fees, are paid by the Plan Sponsor. In addition, certain services to the Plan by the Plan Sponsor were performed at no charge.

Note 7: PLAN TERMINATION

Although it has not expressed any intent to do so, the Company has the right under the Plan to discontinue its contributions at any time and to terminate the Plan subject to the provisions of ERISA. In the event of Plan termination, participants would become 100% vested in their employer contributions.

Note 1: DESCRIPTION OF THE PLAN

The following description of the Springs Food Service, LLC 401(K) Profit Sharing Plan & Trust (the Plan) provides only general information. Refer to Plan documents for a more complete description of Plan provisions.

General

The Plan is organized as a profit sharing and 401(K) plan under Section 401(K) of the Internal Revenue Code and covers all eligible employees of Springs Food Service, LLC (the Plan Sponsor, Plan Administrator, Company and Employer). The Plan is subject to the provisions of the Department of Labor's (DOL's) Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (ERISA). The Administrator is responsible for oversight of the Plan. The Plan was adopted January 1, 2014. Effective January 1, 2024, the Plan was amended to become a Safe Harbor 401(K) Plan in accordance with the requirements of the Internal Revenue Code. As a result, the Plan is exempt from annual nondiscrimination testing for elective deferrals and employer matching contributions.

The Plan is administered by the Plan Administrator. The custodian is appointed by the Plan Administrator. Authority for control, management and administration of the Plan is vested in the Plan Administrator. As the Plan's fiduciary, the custodian's responsibility is to maintain the Plan's assets. Some administrative functions are performed by employees of the Plan Sponsor. No compensation is remitted to the Plan Sponsor for these services.

Plan assets are held and managed by Mid Atlantic Trust Company, the trustee or custodian and the qualified institution for the Plan, which invests contributions and Plan earnings, makes investment transactions as directed by the Plan Administrator and provides certain recordkeeping services. Paychex, Inc. acts as the third-party administrator for the Plan, which performs certain plan administration and annual ERISA compliance testing.

Eligibility

The Plan is a defined contribution plan covering all full-time and part-time employees of the Company, who have been employed for 1 year and are at least 18 years of age. However, the Plan excludes employees covered by a collective bargaining agreement as well as nonresident aliens and leased employees.

Note 1: DESCRIPTION OF THE PLAN (Continued)

Contributions

Each year, participants may contribute up to 92 percent of pretax annual compensation, as defined in the Plan. Participants who have attained age 50 before the end of the Plan year are eligible to make catch-up contributions. Participants may also contribute amounts representing distributions from other qualified defined benefit or defined contribution plans (i.e. rollover contributions). Participants direct the investment of their contributions into various investment options offered by the Plan. The Company provides for a safe harbor matching contributions of 100% of salary deferrals up to 3% of compensation, plus 50% of salary deferrals of up to the next 2% of compensation.

Participant Accounts

Each participant's account is credited with the participant's contributions and Company's matching contributions, as well as allocations of the Company's profit sharing contributions and Plan earnings. Participant accounts are charged with an allocation of administrative expenses that are paid by the Plan. Allocations are based on participant earnings, account balances, or specific participant transactions, as defined. The benefit to which a participant is entitled is the benefit that can be provided from the participant's vested account.

Vesting

Participants are immediately 100% vested in both their and any employer matching or profit sharing contributions plus earnings thereon.

Notes Receivable from Participants

Participants may borrow from their fund accounts a minimum of \$1,000. The maximum amount of loans outstanding cannot exceed the lesser of 95% of one-half of the participant's vested account balance or \$50,000. Participants may not have more than two loans outstanding at a time. The loans are secured by the balance in the participant's account and bear interest at prime (as stated in the Wall Street Journal at the date of the loan) plus 1%, ranging from 4.25% to 9.50%.

Benefit Payments

Benefits become payable upon retirement, termination of employment, death, disability, or in-service distributions for those 59½ or older. Benefit payments are recorded when paid. The amount of benefits to which a participant is entitled is equal to the vested portion of the participant's account balance.

Forfeitures

At December 31, 2024 and 2023, forfeited nonvested accounts totaled \$299 and \$0, respectively. These accounts will be used to reduce future employer contributions.

Hardship Withdrawals

As permitted by the Internal Revenue Code (IRC) and in accordance with the plan agreement, a participant may request a financial hardship withdrawal if they experience a severe financial hardship. The financial hardship withdrawal may not exceed the amount of the financial hardship or the value of the vested portion of the participant's balance, whichever is less.

Note 2: SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of Accounting

The accompanying financial statements have been prepared on the accrual basis of accounting in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America (U.S. GAAP). The Financial Accounting Standards Board (FASB) provides authoritative guidance regarding U.S. GAAP through the Accounting Standards Codification (ASC) and related Accounting Standards Updates (ASUs).

Use of Estimates

The preparation of U.S. GAAP financial statements requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and changes therein, and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Investment Valuation and Income Recognition

Investments generally are reported at fair value, but may also be reported at contract value or net asset value (NAV). Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. See Note 4 for further discussions of fair value measurements and NAV. The Plan's Administrative Committee determines the Plan's valuation policies utilizing information provided by the investment advisers, custodians and insurance company.

Purchases and sales of securities are recorded on a trade-date basis. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Dividends are recorded on the ex-dividend date. Net appreciation (depreciation) includes the Plan's gains and losses on investments bought and sold as well as held during the year.

Notes Receivable from Participants

Notes receivable from participants are measured at their unpaid principal balance plus any accrued but unpaid interest. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Related fees are recorded as administrative expenses and are expensed when they are incurred.

Payment of Benefits

Distributions to participants are recorded when paid.

Administrative Expenses

Certain expenses of maintaining the Plan are paid by the Plan, unless otherwise paid by the Company. Expenses that are paid by the Company are excluded from these financial statements. Fees related to the administration of notes receivable from participants are charged directly to the participant's account and are included in administrative expenses. Investment related expenses are included in net appreciation of fair value investments.

Risks and Uncertainties

The Plan invests in various investment securities. Investment securities, in general, are exposed to various risks, such as interest rate, credit and overall market volatility. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investment securities, it is reasonably possible that changes in value of investment securities will occur in the near term and that these changes could materially affect amounts reported in the Plan's financial statements.

Subsequent Events

Management has evaluated subsequent events through the date that the financial statements were available to be issued, August 21, 2025, and determined there were no events that occurred that require disclosure. No subsequent events occurring after this date have been evaluated for inclusion in these financial statements.

Note 3: INFORMATION CERTIFIED BY QUALIFIED INSTITUTION

The Plan Administrator has elected the method of compliance, as permitted by 29 CFR 2520.103-8 of the DOL's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA. The following financial information included in the Plan's financial statements was obtained by management and agreed to or derived from information certified as complete and accurate by Mid Atlantic Trust Company, the qualified institution:

- a) Total investments at fair value, included in the statements of net assets available for benefits at December 31, 2024 and 2023.
- b) Investment income, net appreciation in the value of investments, information included in the statement of changes in net assets available for benefits for the year ended December 31, 2024.
- c) All amounts included in Note 4, *Fair Value Measurements*.
- d) All information included in the supplemental schedule of assets (held at end of year) as of December 31, 2024, excluding notes receivable.

Note 4: FAIR VALUE MEASUREMENTS

Fair value is the exchange price that would be received for an asset or paid to transfer a liability (exit price) in the principal or most advantageous market for the asset or liability in an orderly transaction between market participants on the measurement date. There are three levels of inputs that may be used to measure fair values:

Level 1: Quoted prices (unadjusted) for identical assets or liabilities in active markets that the entity has the ability to access as of the measurement date.

Level 2: Significant other observable inputs other than Level 1 prices, such as:

- Quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities in active markets;
- Quoted prices for identical or similar assets or liabilities in inactive markets;
- Inputs, other than quoted prices, that are:
 - observable; or
 - can be corroborated by observable market data.

If the asset or liability has a specified (contractual) term, the Level 2 input must be observable for substantially the full term of the asset or liability.

Level 3: Inputs to the valuation methodology are unobservable and significant to the fair value measurement.

The asset or liability's fair value measurement level within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of any input that is significant to the fair value measurement. Valuation techniques maximize the use of relevant observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs.

Following is a description of the valuation methodologies used for assets measured at fair value. There have been no changes in the methodologies used at December 31, 2024 and 2023.

Money market funds: Valued at the daily closing price as reported by the fund sponsor from an actively traded exchange.

Mutual funds: Valued at the daily closing price as reported by the fund. Mutual funds held by the Plan are open-end mutual funds that are registered with the SEC. These funds are required to publish their daily NAV and to transact at that price. The mutual funds held by the Plan are deemed to be actively traded.

Model funds: Investments are made up of shares of individual mutual funds. These are valued based on NAV per share or unit as reported by the individual fund managers, multiplied by the number of shares or units held as of the measurement date. The trust in which these funds are held is the unit of account for these investments. As the trust is not readily traded or audited the investments (trusts) are considered level 3.

The preceding methods described may produce a fair value calculation that may not be indicative of net realizable value or reflective of future fair values. Furthermore, although the Plan Administrator believes its valuation methods are appropriate and consistent with other market participants, the use of different methodologies or assumptions to determine fair value of certain financial instruments could result in different fair value measurements at the reporting date.

Note 5: TAX STATUS

The IRS has determined and informed the Company by a letter dated October 31, 2011 that the Plan and related trust are designed in accordance with applicable sections of the IRC. Although the Plan has been amended since receiving the determination letter, the Plan administrator and the Plan's tax counsel believe that the Plan is designed, and is currently being operated, in compliance with the applicable requirements of the IRC and, therefore, believe that the Plan is qualified, and the related trust is tax-exempt.

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require plan management to evaluate tax positions taken by the Plan and recognize a tax liability if the plan has taken an uncertain position that more likely than not would not be sustained upon examination. The Plan is subject to routine audits by taxing jurisdictions; however, there are currently no audits for any tax periods in progress.

Note 6: RELATED PARTY AND PARTY-IN-INTEREST TRANSACTIONS

Mid Atlantic Trust Company, the Custodian of the Plan, provides investment services to the Plan and also manages and invests contributions and other cash received as directed, records interest and dividend income, and makes distributions to participants. Investments of the Plan were invested in mutual funds, model funds and money market funds with the custodian at December 31, 2024 and 2023.

Certain Plan investments are shares of model funds managed by 401k Generation. 401k Generation is investment advisor of the Plan and therefore, these transactions qualify as party-in-interest transactions.

In general, the administrative expenses for the Plan are paid from the Plans' assets. From time to time, certain expenses of the Plan, including legal and accounting fees, are paid by the Plan Sponsor. In addition, certain services to the Plan by the Plan Sponsor were performed at no charge.

Note 7: PLAN TERMINATION

Although it has not expressed any intent to do so, the Company has the right under the Plan to discontinue its contributions at any time and to terminate the Plan subject to the provisions of ERISA. In the event of Plan termination, participants would become 100% vested in their employer contributions.
