## 1. Description of Plan

The following description of the Winzer Corporation 401(k) Plan (the Plan) provides only general information. Participants should refer to the plan agreement for a more complete description of the Plan's provisions.

### General

The Plan is a defined contribution plan established effective July 31, 1980, as restated August 26, 2024. The Plan covers all employees, excluding residents of Puerto Rico, employees covered by a collective bargaining agreement, and non-resident aliens, of Winzer Corporation (the Company or Employer). Employees who have completed three months of service and are age 21 or older are eligible to participate in the Plan. Employees must be employed on last day of the plan year and complete 1,000 hours of service to be eligible for profit sharing contributions. Long-term part-time employees who met eligibility requirements under the SECURE Act are also eligible to participate in the Plan. The Plan is subject to the provisions of the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974, as amended (ERISA). The Plan's Administrative Committee is responsible for oversight of the Plan. The Plan's Administrative Committee determines the appropriateness of the Plan's investment offerings and monitors investment performance.

Effective August 26, 2024, the Trustees for the Plan changed from Delaware Charter Guarantee and Trust Company d/b/a Principal Trust Company, Principal Life Insurance Company, and Principal Life Insurance Company on behalf of Principal Global Investors Trust Company to Fidelity Management Trust Company and Principal Life Insurance Company.

### Contributions

Each year, participants may contribute up to 75% of pretax annual compensation, as defined in the plan document, up to the maximum limits of the Internal Revenue Code (IRC). Participants also may designate all or a portion of their deferral contributions as after-tax contributions into a Roth account. Participants who have attained age 50 before the end of the plan year are eligible to make catch-up contributions up to 100% of annual compensation. Participants also may contribute amounts representing distributions from other qualified defined benefit or defined contribution plans (rollover). Participants direct the investment of their contributions into various investment options offered by the Plan.

The Plan includes an automatic enrollment provision whereby all newly eligible employees are automatically enrolled in the Plan unless they affirmatively elect not to participate in the Plan. Automatically enrolled participants have their deferral rate set at 6% of eligible compensation and their contributions invested in the defaulted investment option under plan until changed by the participant.

The Plan allows for discretionary matching and profit sharing contributions in amounts to be determined by the Company. For the year ended December 31, 2024, the Company made discretionary matching contributions in the amount of 50% of participant elective deferrals up to 6% of eligible compensation. For the year ended December 31, 2024, there were no profit sharing contributions made to the Plan. Contributions are subject to certain Internal Revenue Service (IRS) limitations.

### Participant Accounts

Each participant's account is credited with the participant's contributions, the Company's contributions, and an allocation of the Plan's earnings. Participant accounts are charged with an allocation of administrative expenses that are paid by the Plan. Allocations are based on participant earnings, account balances, or specific participant transactions, as defined. The benefit to which a participant is entitled is the benefit that can be provided from the participant's vested account.

## Vesting

Participants are vested immediately in their contributions plus actual earnings thereon. Vesting in the Company's contribution portion of their accounts is based on years of continuous service. A participant is 20% vested after two years of credited service and continues to vest in increments of 20% until 100% vested after six years of credited service.

## Notes Receivable From Participants

Participants may borrow from their fund accounts a minimum of \$1,000 up to a maximum equal to the lesser of \$50,000 or 50% of their vested account balance. The loans are secured by the balance in the participant's account. The loan interest rate, determined by the Plan Administrator, is set at the prevailing interest rates, as defined by the plan document. Principal and interest are paid ratably through payroll deductions. Terms range up to five years or greater for the purchase of a primary residence.

## Payment of Benefits

On termination of service due to death, disability, retirement or other reasons, a participant may elect to receive a lump sum amount, partial payment or distribution in kind equal to the value of the participant's vested interest in his or her account. If a terminated participant's vested balance is less than or equal to \$7,000, the amount may be automatically distributed in the form of lump sum cash payment or rollovers into individual retirement account (IRA), depending on the balance. In addition, the Plan allows for in-service and hardship distributions, if certain criteria are met.

## Forfeited Accounts

At December 31, 2024 and 2023, forfeited nonvested accounts totaled \$55,127 and \$70,009, respectively. Forfeitures are retained in the Plan and may first be used to pay administrative expenses. Any remaining amounts will be used to reduce future Employer contributions payable under the Plan. During 2024, Employer contributions were reduced by \$61,954, and plan administrative expenses were reduced by \$10,430 from forfeited nonvested accounts, in accordance with plan provisions.

## 2. Summary of Accounting Policies

### Basis of Accounting

The financial statements of the Plan are prepared on the accrual basis of accounting.

### Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and changes therein, and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

### Contributions

Contributions from plan participants and the Employer contributions are recorded in the year in which the participant contributions are withheld from compensation.

## Investment Valuation and Income Recognition

Investments are reported at fair value (except for fully benefit-responsive investment contracts, which are reported at contract value). Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. The Plan's Administrative Committee determines the Plan's valuation policies utilizing information provided by the investment advisers, trustee and insurance company, as applicable. See Note 3 for discussion of fair value measurements.

The Plan's investment in a fully benefit-responsive investment contract is reported at contract value. Contract value is the relevant measure for the portion of the net assets available for benefits of a defined contribution plan attributable to fully benefit-responsive investment contracts because contract value is the amount participants normally would receive if they were to initiate permitted transactions under the terms of the Plan.

Purchases and sales of securities are recorded on a trade-date basis. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Dividends are recorded on the ex-dividend date. Net appreciation (depreciation) includes the Plan's gains and losses on investments bought and sold as well as held during the year.

## Notes Receivable From Participants

Notes receivable from participants are measured at their unpaid principal balance plus any accrued but unpaid interest. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Related fees are recorded as administrative expenses and are expensed as incurred.

## Payment of Benefits

Benefits are recorded when paid.

## Expenses

Certain expenses of maintaining the Plan are paid by the Plan, unless otherwise paid by the Company. Expenses that are paid by the Company are excluded from these financial statements. Fees related to the administration of notes receivable from participants are charged directly to the participant's account and are included in administrative expenses. Investment related expenses are included in net appreciation (depreciation) in fair value of investments.

## Recent Accounting Standards

The SECURE 2.0 Act of 2022 was signed into law on December 29, 2022. This legislation includes a vast array of provisional changes to retirement plans, becoming effective in 2023 and beyond. Plan management adopted mandatory provisions effective for the year ended December 31, 2024, and continues to evaluate the impact of the adoption and implementation of this legislation on the Plan. The application of SECURE 2.0 Act did not have a material effect on the Plan's financial statements.

## Subsequent Events

Subsequent events were evaluated through September 19, 2025, the date the financial statements were available to be issued.

Effective January 1, 2025, participants aged 60-63 are eligible to make additional catch-up contributions up to the greater of \$10,000 or 150% of standard catch-up amount.

### 3. Fair Value Measurements

The framework for measuring fair value provides a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. The hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (Level 1) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (Level 3). The three levels of the fair value hierarchy under authoritative guidance are described as follows:

Level 1 - Inputs to the valuation methodology are unadjusted quoted prices for identical assets or liabilities in active markets that the Plan has the ability to access.

Level 2 - Inputs other than quoted prices included within Level 1 that are observable for the asset or liability, either directly or indirectly, such as:

- quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities in active markets;
- quoted prices for identical or similar assets or liabilities in inactive markets;
- inputs other than quoted prices that are observable for the asset or liability;
- inputs that are derived principally from or corroborated by observable market data by correlation or other means.

If the asset or liability has a specified (contractual) term, the Level 2 input must be observable for substantially the full term of the asset or liability.

Level 3 - Inputs to the valuation technique are unobservable and significant to the fair value measurement.

The asset or liability's fair value measurement level within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of any input that is significant to the fair value measurement. Valuation techniques maximize the use of relevant observables and minimize the use of unobservable inputs.

Following is a description of the valuation methodologies used for assets measured at fair value. There have been no changes in the methodologies used at December 31, 2024 and 2023.

*Money market fund:* Valued at the quoted net asset value (NAV) of shares held by the Plan at year end.

*Mutual funds:* Valued at the daily closing price as reported by the fund. Mutual funds held by the Plan are open-end mutual funds that are registered with the U.S. Securities and Exchange Commission. These funds are required to publish their daily NAV and to transact at that price. The mutual funds held by the plan are deemed to be actively traded.

*Pooled separate account and common collective trust:* Valued at the NAV of units of an investment collective trust. The NAV, as provided by the Trustee, is based on the fair value of the underlying investments held by the fund less its liabilities. This NAV is not used when it is determined to be probable that the fund will sell the investment for an amount different than the reported NAV. Participant transactions (purchases and sales) may occur daily. Were the Plan to initiate a full redemption of the common collective trust, the Trustee reserves the right to temporarily delay withdrawals from the trust in order to ensure that securities liquidations will be carried out in an orderly business manner.

#### 4. Concentrations

As of December 31, 2024 and 2023, the Plan had investments of \$4,910,849 and \$3,061,210, respectively, that were concentrated in four and three different investments, respectively.

#### 5. Information Certified by Trustees

The plan administrator has elected the method of compliance permitted by 29 CFR 2520.103-8 of the Department of Labor's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA for 2024 and 2023. Accordingly, Fidelity Management Trust Company, the current Trustee of the Plan, has certified to the completeness and accuracy of all investments and notes receivable from participants reported in the accompanying Statement of Net Assets Available for Benefits and the Supplemental Schedule H, Line 4(i) - Schedule of Assets (Held at End of Year) as of December 31, 2024, and the related investment activity and interest income on notes receivable from participants reported in the Statement of Changes in Net Assets Available for Benefits for the period from August 25, 2024 through December 31, 2024.

Delaware Charter Guarantee and Trust Company d/b/a Principal Trust Company, Principal Life Insurance Company, and Principal Life Insurance Company on behalf of Principal Global Investors Trust Company the previous Trustees of the Plan, has certified to the completeness and accuracy of all investments and notes receivable from participants reported in the accompanying Statement of Net Assets Available for Benefits as of December 31, 2023, and the related investment activity and interest income on notes receivable from participants reported in the Statement of Changes in Net Assets Available for Benefits for the period from January 1, 2024 through August 26, 2024.

Principal Life Insurance Company, the Trustee of the Principal Fixed Income Guaranteed Option, has certified to the completeness and accuracy of the Principal Fixed Income Guaranteed Option investment reported in the accompanying Statement of Net Assets Available for Benefits and the supplemental Schedule H, Line 4(i) - Schedule of Assets (Held at End of Year) as of December 31, 2024, and the related investment activity reported in the Statement of Changes in Net Assets Available for Benefits for the year ended December 31, 2024. Such information was obtained by management and agreed to or derived from information certified as complete and accurate by the qualified institutions.

### 6. Fully Benefit-Responsive Investment Contract

The Principal Fixed Income Guaranteed Option is a traditional fully benefit-responsive group insurance contract issued by Principal Life Insurance Company. There are no reserves against contract value for credit risk of the contract issuer or otherwise. The crediting interest rate is based on a formula agreed upon with the issuer but may not be less than minimum guarantee rate. For the year ended December 31, 2024, the crediting interest rate was 1.55%. Such interest rates are continuously reviewed and reset as needed on a monthly to quarterly basis. There is a surrender charge of 5% that may be charged based on cumulative transfer percentages and advance notice of intent to terminate if a plan terminates its interest in the contract unless a 12 month irrevocable advance notice is given. Certain unobservable inputs are assessed through review of contract terms (ex: duration or payout date) while others are substantiated utilizing available market data (ex: swap curve rate).

Certain events might limit the ability of the Plan to transact at contract value with the contract issuer. Such events include (1) amendments to the plan documents (including complete or partial plan termination or merger with another plan), (2) changes to the Plan's prohibition on competing investment options or deletion of equity wash provisions, (3) bankruptcy of the plan sponsor or other plan sponsor events (for example, divestitures or spinoffs of a subsidiary) that cause a significant withdrawal from the Plan, or (4) the failure of the trust to qualify for exemption from federal income taxes or any required prohibited transaction exemption under ERISA (5) premature termination of the contract.

No events are probable of occurring that might limit the ability of the Plan to transact at contract value with the contract issuers and that also would limit the ability of the Plan to transact at contract value with the participants.

In addition, certain events allow the issuers to terminate the contracts with the Plan and settle at an amount different from contract value. Such events include (1) an uncured violation of the Plan's investment guidelines, (2) a breach of material obligation under the contract, (3) a material misrepresentation, (4) a material amendment to the agreement without the consent of the issuers.

### 7. Related-Party and Party in Interest Transactions

Certain plan investments are managed by Principal Life Insurance Company and Fidelity Investments, an affiliate of Fidelity Management Company, a Trustee, and therefore, these transactions qualify as party in interest transactions.

Additionally, the Plan issues loans to participants, which are secured by the participant's account balances. These transactions qualify as party in interest transactions.

Certain administrative functions of the Plan are performed by officers or employees of the Company or Employer. No such officer or employee receives compensation from the Plan.

### 8. Plan Termination

Although it has not expressed any intent to do so, the Company has the right under the Plan to discontinue its contributions at any time and to terminate the Plan subject to the provisions of ERISA. In the event of plan termination, participants would become 100% vested in their employer contributions.

### 9. Tax Status

Effective August 26, 2024, the Plan adopted a pre-approved plan offered by FMR LLC. The pre-approved plan received an IRS Opinion Letter dated June 30, 2020, that the Plan and related trust are designed in accordance with the applicable sections of the IRC. Although the Plan has been amended since receiving the IRS Opinion Letter, the plan administrator believes that the Plan is designed, and is currently being operated, in compliance with the applicable requirements of the IRC, and therefore, believes that the Plan is qualified, and the related trust is tax-exempt.

Through August 25, 2024, the Plan had adopted a pre-approved Plan offered by Principal Life Insurance Company. The pre-approved plan received an IRS Opinion Letter dated June 30, 2020, that the Plan and related trust were designed in accordance with the applicable sections of the IRC. Although the Plan has been amended since receiving the IRS Opinion Letter, the plan administrator believed that the Plan was designed, and was being operated, in compliance with the applicable requirements of the IRC, and, therefore believed that the Plan was qualified, and the related trust was tax exempt.

Plan management is required to evaluate tax positions taken by the Plan and recognize a tax liability if the Plan has taken an uncertain position that more likely than not would not be sustained upon examination by the IRS. The Plan is subject to routine audits by taxing jurisdictions; however, there are currently no audits for any tax periods in progress.

### 10. Risks and Uncertainties

The Plan invests in various investment securities. Investment securities are exposed to various risks, such as interest rate, market, concentrations, and credit risks. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investment securities, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in the values of investment securities will occur in the near term and that such changes could materially affect participants' account balances and the amounts reported in the Statements of Net Assets Available for Benefits.

### 11. Delinquent Participant Contributions

For the years ended December 31, 2024, 2020 and 2019, the Company did not remit certain participant contributions to the Plan on a timely basis as defined by the DOL's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA. Untimely remittances identified on the Schedule of Delinquent Participant Contributions, which totaled \$24,633, were not corrected in 2024. Additionally, the Company will be compensating participants for lost earnings resulting from the delay in contributions, if not already compensated.

In preparing the financial statements, management is required to evaluate whether there are conditions or events, considered in the aggregate, that raise substantial doubt about Winzer Corporation 401(k) Plan's ability to continue as a going concern for at least one year following the date that the financial statements are available to be issued.

Management is also responsible for maintaining a current plan instrument, including all plan amendments, administering the Plan, and determining that the Plan's transactions that are presented and disclosed in the financial statements are in conformity with the Plan's provisions, including maintaining sufficient records with respect to each of the participants, to determine the benefits due or which may become due to such participants.

## **Auditors' Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements**

Our audits did not extend to the certified investment information, except for obtaining and reading the certification, comparing the certified investment information with the related information presented and disclosed in the financial statements, and reading the disclosures relating to the certified investment information to assess whether they are in accordance with the presentation and disclosure requirements of accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Accordingly, the objective of an ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) audit is not to express an opinion about whether the financial statements as a whole are presented fairly, in all material respects, in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

We are required to communicate with those charged with governance regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit, significant audit findings, and certain internal control-related matters that we identified during the audit.

Such information is the responsibility of management and was derived from and relates directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements. The information included in the supplemental schedules, other than that agreed to or derived from the certified investment information, has been subjected to auditing procedures applied in the audits of the financial statements and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements or to the financial statements themselves, and other additional procedures in accordance with GAAS. For information included in the supplemental schedules that agreed to or is derived from the certified investment information, we compared such information to the related certified investment information.

In forming our opinion on the supplemental schedules, we evaluated whether the supplemental schedules, other than the information agreed to or derived from the certified investment information, including their form and content, are presented in conformity with the DOL's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA.

## 1. Description of Plan

The following description of the Winzer Corporation 401(k) Plan (the Plan) provides only general information. Participants should refer to the plan agreement for a more complete description of the Plan's provisions.

### General

The Plan is a defined contribution plan established effective July 31, 1980, as restated August 26, 2024. The Plan covers all employees, excluding residents of Puerto Rico, employees covered by a collective bargaining agreement, and non-resident aliens, of Winzer Corporation (the Company or Employer). Employees who have completed three months of service and are age 21 or older are eligible to participate in the Plan. Employees must be employed on last day of the plan year and complete 1,000 hours of service to be eligible for profit sharing contributions. Long-term part-time employees who met eligibility requirements under the SECURE Act are also eligible to participate in the Plan. The Plan is subject to the provisions of the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974, as amended (ERISA). The Plan's Administrative Committee is responsible for oversight of the Plan. The Plan's Administrative Committee determines the appropriateness of the Plan's investment offerings and monitors investment performance.

Effective August 26, 2024, the Trustees for the Plan changed from Delaware Charter Guarantee and Trust Company d/b/a Principal Trust Company, Principal Life Insurance Company, and Principal Life Insurance Company on behalf of Principal Global Investors Trust Company to Fidelity Management Trust Company and Principal Life Insurance Company.

### Contributions

Each year, participants may contribute up to 75% of pretax annual compensation, as defined in the plan document, up to the maximum limits of the Internal Revenue Code (IRC). Participants also may designate all or a portion of their deferral contributions as after-tax contributions into a Roth account. Participants who have attained age 50 before the end of the plan year are eligible to make catch-up contributions up to 100% of annual compensation. Participants also may contribute amounts representing distributions from other qualified defined benefit or defined contribution plans (rollover). Participants direct the investment of their contributions into various investment options offered by the Plan.

The Plan includes an automatic enrollment provision whereby all newly eligible employees are automatically enrolled in the Plan unless they affirmatively elect not to participate in the Plan. Automatically enrolled participants have their deferral rate set at 6% of eligible compensation and their contributions invested in the defaulted investment option under plan until changed by the participant.

The Plan allows for discretionary matching and profit sharing contributions in amounts to be determined by the Company. For the year ended December 31, 2024, the Company made discretionary matching contributions in the amount of 50% of participant elective deferrals up to 6% of eligible compensation. For the year ended December 31, 2024, there were no profit sharing contributions made to the Plan. Contributions are subject to certain Internal Revenue Service (IRS) limitations.

### Participant Accounts

Each participant's account is credited with the participant's contributions, the Company's contributions, and an allocation of the Plan's earnings. Participant accounts are charged with an allocation of administrative expenses that are paid by the Plan. Allocations are based on participant earnings, account balances, or specific participant transactions, as defined. The benefit to which a participant is entitled is the benefit that can be provided from the participant's vested account.

## Vesting

Participants are vested immediately in their contributions plus actual earnings thereon. Vesting in the Company's contribution portion of their accounts is based on years of continuous service. A participant is 20% vested after two years of credited service and continues to vest in increments of 20% until 100% vested after six years of credited service.

## Notes Receivable From Participants

Participants may borrow from their fund accounts a minimum of \$1,000 up to a maximum equal to the lesser of \$50,000 or 50% of their vested account balance. The loans are secured by the balance in the participant's account. The loan interest rate, determined by the Plan Administrator, is set at the prevailing interest rates, as defined by the plan document. Principal and interest are paid ratably through payroll deductions. Terms range up to five years or greater for the purchase of a primary residence.

## Payment of Benefits

On termination of service due to death, disability, retirement or other reasons, a participant may elect to receive a lump sum amount, partial payment or distribution in kind equal to the value of the participant's vested interest in his or her account. If a terminated participant's vested balance is less than or equal to \$7,000, the amount may be automatically distributed in the form of lump sum cash payment or rollovers into individual retirement account (IRA), depending on the balance. In addition, the Plan allows for in-service and hardship distributions, if certain criteria are met.

## Forfeited Accounts

At December 31, 2024 and 2023, forfeited nonvested accounts totaled \$55,127 and \$70,009, respectively. Forfeitures are retained in the Plan and may first be used to pay administrative expenses. Any remaining amounts will be used to reduce future Employer contributions payable under the Plan. During 2024, Employer contributions were reduced by \$61,954, and plan administrative expenses were reduced by \$10,430 from forfeited nonvested accounts, in accordance with plan provisions.

## 2. Summary of Accounting Policies

### Basis of Accounting

The financial statements of the Plan are prepared on the accrual basis of accounting.

### Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and changes therein, and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

### Contributions

Contributions from plan participants and the Employer contributions are recorded in the year in which the participant contributions are withheld from compensation.

## Investment Valuation and Income Recognition

Investments are reported at fair value (except for fully benefit-responsive investment contracts, which are reported at contract value). Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. The Plan's Administrative Committee determines the Plan's valuation policies utilizing information provided by the investment advisers, trustee and insurance company, as applicable. See Note 3 for discussion of fair value measurements.

The Plan's investment in a fully benefit-responsive investment contract is reported at contract value. Contract value is the relevant measure for the portion of the net assets available for benefits of a defined contribution plan attributable to fully benefit-responsive investment contracts because contract value is the amount participants normally would receive if they were to initiate permitted transactions under the terms of the Plan.

Purchases and sales of securities are recorded on a trade-date basis. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Dividends are recorded on the ex-dividend date. Net appreciation (depreciation) includes the Plan's gains and losses on investments bought and sold as well as held during the year.

## Notes Receivable From Participants

Notes receivable from participants are measured at their unpaid principal balance plus any accrued but unpaid interest. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Related fees are recorded as administrative expenses and are expensed as incurred.

## Payment of Benefits

Benefits are recorded when paid.

## Expenses

Certain expenses of maintaining the Plan are paid by the Plan, unless otherwise paid by the Company. Expenses that are paid by the Company are excluded from these financial statements. Fees related to the administration of notes receivable from participants are charged directly to the participant's account and are included in administrative expenses. Investment related expenses are included in net appreciation (depreciation) in fair value of investments.

## Recent Accounting Standards

The SECURE 2.0 Act of 2022 was signed into law on December 29, 2022. This legislation includes a vast array of provisional changes to retirement plans, becoming effective in 2023 and beyond. Plan management adopted mandatory provisions effective for the year ended December 31, 2024, and continues to evaluate the impact of the adoption and implementation of this legislation on the Plan. The application of SECURE 2.0 Act did not have a material effect on the Plan's financial statements.

## Subsequent Events

Subsequent events were evaluated through September 19, 2025, the date the financial statements were available to be issued.

Effective January 1, 2025, participants aged 60-63 are eligible to make additional catch-up contributions up to the greater of \$10,000 or 150% of standard catch-up amount.

### 3. Fair Value Measurements

The framework for measuring fair value provides a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. The hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (Level 1) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (Level 3). The three levels of the fair value hierarchy under authoritative guidance are described as follows:

Level 1 - Inputs to the valuation methodology are unadjusted quoted prices for identical assets or liabilities in active markets that the Plan has the ability to access.

Level 2 - Inputs other than quoted prices included within Level 1 that are observable for the asset or liability, either directly or indirectly, such as:

- quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities in active markets;
- quoted prices for identical or similar assets or liabilities in inactive markets;
- inputs other than quoted prices that are observable for the asset or liability;
- inputs that are derived principally from or corroborated by observable market data by correlation or other means.

If the asset or liability has a specified (contractual) term, the Level 2 input must be observable for substantially the full term of the asset or liability.

Level 3 - Inputs to the valuation technique are unobservable and significant to the fair value measurement.

The asset or liability's fair value measurement level within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of any input that is significant to the fair value measurement. Valuation techniques maximize the use of relevant observables and minimize the use of unobservable inputs.

Following is a description of the valuation methodologies used for assets measured at fair value. There have been no changes in the methodologies used at December 31, 2024 and 2023.

*Money market fund:* Valued at the quoted net asset value (NAV) of shares held by the Plan at year end.

*Mutual funds:* Valued at the daily closing price as reported by the fund. Mutual funds held by the Plan are open-end mutual funds that are registered with the U.S. Securities and Exchange Commission. These funds are required to publish their daily NAV and to transact at that price. The mutual funds held by the plan are deemed to be actively traded.

*Pooled separate account and common collective trust:* Valued at the NAV of units of an investment collective trust. The NAV, as provided by the Trustee, is based on the fair value of the underlying investments held by the fund less its liabilities. This NAV is not used when it is determined to be probable that the fund will sell the investment for an amount different than the reported NAV. Participant transactions (purchases and sales) may occur daily. Were the Plan to initiate a full redemption of the common collective trust, the Trustee reserves the right to temporarily delay withdrawals from the trust in order to ensure that securities liquidations will be carried out in an orderly business manner.

#### 4. Concentrations

As of December 31, 2024 and 2023, the Plan had investments of \$4,910,849 and \$3,061,210, respectively, that were concentrated in four and three different investments, respectively.

#### 5. Information Certified by Trustees

The plan administrator has elected the method of compliance permitted by 29 CFR 2520.103-8 of the Department of Labor's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA for 2024 and 2023. Accordingly, Fidelity Management Trust Company, the current Trustee of the Plan, has certified to the completeness and accuracy of all investments and notes receivable from participants reported in the accompanying Statement of Net Assets Available for Benefits and the Supplemental Schedule H, Line 4(i) - Schedule of Assets (Held at End of Year) as of December 31, 2024, and the related investment activity and interest income on notes receivable from participants reported in the Statement of Changes in Net Assets Available for Benefits for the period from August 25, 2024 through December 31, 2024.

Delaware Charter Guarantee and Trust Company d/b/a Principal Trust Company, Principal Life Insurance Company, and Principal Life Insurance Company on behalf of Principal Global Investors Trust Company the previous Trustees of the Plan, has certified to the completeness and accuracy of all investments and notes receivable from participants reported in the accompanying Statement of Net Assets Available for Benefits as of December 31, 2023, and the related investment activity and interest income on notes receivable from participants reported in the Statement of Changes in Net Assets Available for Benefits for the period from January 1, 2024 through August 26, 2024.

Principal Life Insurance Company, the Trustee of the Principal Fixed Income Guaranteed Option, has certified to the completeness and accuracy of the Principal Fixed Income Guaranteed Option investment reported in the accompanying Statement of Net Assets Available for Benefits and the supplemental Schedule H, Line 4(i) - Schedule of Assets (Held at End of Year) as of December 31, 2024, and the related investment activity reported in the Statement of Changes in Net Assets Available for Benefits for the year ended December 31, 2024. Such information was obtained by management and agreed to or derived from information certified as complete and accurate by the qualified institutions.

### 6. Fully Benefit-Responsive Investment Contract

The Principal Fixed Income Guaranteed Option is a traditional fully benefit-responsive group insurance contract issued by Principal Life Insurance Company. There are no reserves against contract value for credit risk of the contract issuer or otherwise. The crediting interest rate is based on a formula agreed upon with the issuer but may not be less than minimum guarantee rate. For the year ended December 31, 2024, the crediting interest rate was 1.55%. Such interest rates are continuously reviewed and reset as needed on a monthly to quarterly basis. There is a surrender charge of 5% that may be charged based on cumulative transfer percentages and advance notice of intent to terminate if a plan terminates its interest in the contract unless a 12 month irrevocable advance notice is given. Certain unobservable inputs are assessed through review of contract terms (ex: duration or payout date) while others are substantiated utilizing available market data (ex: swap curve rate).

Certain events might limit the ability of the Plan to transact at contract value with the contract issuer. Such events include (1) amendments to the plan documents (including complete or partial plan termination or merger with another plan), (2) changes to the Plan's prohibition on competing investment options or deletion of equity wash provisions, (3) bankruptcy of the plan sponsor or other plan sponsor events (for example, divestitures or spinoffs of a subsidiary) that cause a significant withdrawal from the Plan, or (4) the failure of the trust to qualify for exemption from federal income taxes or any required prohibited transaction exemption under ERISA (5) premature termination of the contract.

No events are probable of occurring that might limit the ability of the Plan to transact at contract value with the contract issuers and that also would limit the ability of the Plan to transact at contract value with the participants.

In addition, certain events allow the issuers to terminate the contracts with the Plan and settle at an amount different from contract value. Such events include (1) an uncured violation of the Plan's investment guidelines, (2) a breach of material obligation under the contract, (3) a material misrepresentation, (4) a material amendment to the agreement without the consent of the issuers.

### 7. Related-Party and Party in Interest Transactions

Certain plan investments are managed by Principal Life Insurance Company and Fidelity Investments, an affiliate of Fidelity Management Company, a Trustee, and therefore, these transactions qualify as party in interest transactions.

Additionally, the Plan issues loans to participants, which are secured by the participant's account balances. These transactions qualify as party in interest transactions.

Certain administrative functions of the Plan are performed by officers or employees of the Company or Employer. No such officer or employee receives compensation from the Plan.

### 8. Plan Termination

Although it has not expressed any intent to do so, the Company has the right under the Plan to discontinue its contributions at any time and to terminate the Plan subject to the provisions of ERISA. In the event of plan termination, participants would become 100% vested in their employer contributions.

### 9. Tax Status

Effective August 26, 2024, the Plan adopted a pre-approved plan offered by FMR LLC. The pre-approved plan received an IRS Opinion Letter dated June 30, 2020, that the Plan and related trust are designed in accordance with the applicable sections of the IRC. Although the Plan has been amended since receiving the IRS Opinion Letter, the plan administrator believes that the Plan is designed, and is currently being operated, in compliance with the applicable requirements of the IRC, and therefore, believes that the Plan is qualified, and the related trust is tax-exempt.

Through August 25, 2024, the Plan had adopted a pre-approved Plan offered by Principal Life Insurance Company. The pre-approved plan received an IRS Opinion Letter dated June 30, 2020, that the Plan and related trust were designed in accordance with the applicable sections of the IRC. Although the Plan has been amended since receiving the IRS Opinion Letter, the plan administrator believed that the Plan was designed, and was being operated, in compliance with the applicable requirements of the IRC, and, therefore believed that the Plan was qualified, and the related trust was tax exempt.

Plan management is required to evaluate tax positions taken by the Plan and recognize a tax liability if the Plan has taken an uncertain position that more likely than not would not be sustained upon examination by the IRS. The Plan is subject to routine audits by taxing jurisdictions; however, there are currently no audits for any tax periods in progress.

### 10. Risks and Uncertainties

The Plan invests in various investment securities. Investment securities are exposed to various risks, such as interest rate, market, concentrations, and credit risks. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investment securities, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in the values of investment securities will occur in the near term and that such changes could materially affect participants' account balances and the amounts reported in the Statements of Net Assets Available for Benefits.

### 11. Delinquent Participant Contributions

For the years ended December 31, 2024, 2020 and 2019, the Company did not remit certain participant contributions to the Plan on a timely basis as defined by the DOL's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA. Untimely remittances identified on the Schedule of Delinquent Participant Contributions, which totaled \$24,633, were not corrected in 2024. Additionally, the Company will be compensating participants for lost earnings resulting from the delay in contributions, if not already compensated.

### Scope and Nature of the ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) Audit

We have performed audits of the financial statements of Winzer Corporation 401(k) Plan (the Plan), an employee benefit plan subject to the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (ERISA), as permitted by ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) (ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) audit). The financial statements comprise the statements of net assets available for benefits as of December 31, 2024 and 2023, and the related statement of changes in net assets available for benefits for the year ended December 31, 2024, and the related notes to the financial statements.

## 1. Description of Plan

The following description of the Winzer Corporation 401(k) Plan (the Plan) provides only general information. Participants should refer to the plan agreement for a more complete description of the Plan's provisions.

### General

The Plan is a defined contribution plan established effective July 31, 1980, as restated August 26, 2024. The Plan covers all employees, excluding residents of Puerto Rico, employees covered by a collective bargaining agreement, and non-resident aliens, of Winzer Corporation (the Company or Employer). Employees who have completed three months of service and are age 21 or older are eligible to participate in the Plan. Employees must be employed on last day of the plan year and complete 1,000 hours of service to be eligible for profit sharing contributions. Long-term part-time employees who met eligibility requirements under the SECURE Act are also eligible to participate in the Plan. The Plan is subject to the provisions of the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974, as amended (ERISA). The Plan's Administrative Committee is responsible for oversight of the Plan. The Plan's Administrative Committee determines the appropriateness of the Plan's investment offerings and monitors investment performance.

Effective August 26, 2024, the Trustees for the Plan changed from Delaware Charter Guarantee and Trust Company d/b/a Principal Trust Company, Principal Life Insurance Company, and Principal Life Insurance Company on behalf of Principal Global Investors Trust Company to Fidelity Management Trust Company and Principal Life Insurance Company.

### Contributions

Each year, participants may contribute up to 75% of pretax annual compensation, as defined in the plan document, up to the maximum limits of the Internal Revenue Code (IRC). Participants also may designate all or a portion of their deferral contributions as after-tax contributions into a Roth account. Participants who have attained age 50 before the end of the plan year are eligible to make catch-up contributions up to 100% of annual compensation. Participants also may contribute amounts representing distributions from other qualified defined benefit or defined contribution plans (rollover). Participants direct the investment of their contributions into various investment options offered by the Plan.

The Plan includes an automatic enrollment provision whereby all newly eligible employees are automatically enrolled in the Plan unless they affirmatively elect not to participate in the Plan. Automatically enrolled participants have their deferral rate set at 6% of eligible compensation and their contributions invested in the defaulted investment option under plan until changed by the participant.

The Plan allows for discretionary matching and profit sharing contributions in amounts to be determined by the Company. For the year ended December 31, 2024, the Company made discretionary matching contributions in the amount of 50% of participant elective deferrals up to 6% of eligible compensation. For the year ended December 31, 2024, there were no profit sharing contributions made to the Plan. Contributions are subject to certain Internal Revenue Service (IRS) limitations.

### Participant Accounts

Each participant's account is credited with the participant's contributions, the Company's contributions, and an allocation of the Plan's earnings. Participant accounts are charged with an allocation of administrative expenses that are paid by the Plan. Allocations are based on participant earnings, account balances, or specific participant transactions, as defined. The benefit to which a participant is entitled is the benefit that can be provided from the participant's vested account.

## Vesting

Participants are vested immediately in their contributions plus actual earnings thereon. Vesting in the Company's contribution portion of their accounts is based on years of continuous service. A participant is 20% vested after two years of credited service and continues to vest in increments of 20% until 100% vested after six years of credited service.

## Notes Receivable From Participants

Participants may borrow from their fund accounts a minimum of \$1,000 up to a maximum equal to the lesser of \$50,000 or 50% of their vested account balance. The loans are secured by the balance in the participant's account. The loan interest rate, determined by the Plan Administrator, is set at the prevailing interest rates, as defined by the plan document. Principal and interest are paid ratably through payroll deductions. Terms range up to five years or greater for the purchase of a primary residence.

## Payment of Benefits

On termination of service due to death, disability, retirement or other reasons, a participant may elect to receive a lump sum amount, partial payment or distribution in kind equal to the value of the participant's vested interest in his or her account. If a terminated participant's vested balance is less than or equal to \$7,000, the amount may be automatically distributed in the form of lump sum cash payment or rollovers into individual retirement account (IRA), depending on the balance. In addition, the Plan allows for in-service and hardship distributions, if certain criteria are met.

## Forfeited Accounts

At December 31, 2024 and 2023, forfeited nonvested accounts totaled \$55,127 and \$70,009, respectively. Forfeitures are retained in the Plan and may first be used to pay administrative expenses. Any remaining amounts will be used to reduce future Employer contributions payable under the Plan. During 2024, Employer contributions were reduced by \$61,954, and plan administrative expenses were reduced by \$10,430 from forfeited nonvested accounts, in accordance with plan provisions.

## 2. Summary of Accounting Policies

### Basis of Accounting

The financial statements of the Plan are prepared on the accrual basis of accounting.

### Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and changes therein, and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

### Contributions

Contributions from plan participants and the Employer contributions are recorded in the year in which the participant contributions are withheld from compensation.

## Investment Valuation and Income Recognition

Investments are reported at fair value (except for fully benefit-responsive investment contracts, which are reported at contract value). Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. The Plan's Administrative Committee determines the Plan's valuation policies utilizing information provided by the investment advisers, trustee and insurance company, as applicable. See Note 3 for discussion of fair value measurements.

The Plan's investment in a fully benefit-responsive investment contract is reported at contract value. Contract value is the relevant measure for the portion of the net assets available for benefits of a defined contribution plan attributable to fully benefit-responsive investment contracts because contract value is the amount participants normally would receive if they were to initiate permitted transactions under the terms of the Plan.

Purchases and sales of securities are recorded on a trade-date basis. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Dividends are recorded on the ex-dividend date. Net appreciation (depreciation) includes the Plan's gains and losses on investments bought and sold as well as held during the year.

## Notes Receivable From Participants

Notes receivable from participants are measured at their unpaid principal balance plus any accrued but unpaid interest. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Related fees are recorded as administrative expenses and are expensed as incurred.

## Payment of Benefits

Benefits are recorded when paid.

## Expenses

Certain expenses of maintaining the Plan are paid by the Plan, unless otherwise paid by the Company. Expenses that are paid by the Company are excluded from these financial statements. Fees related to the administration of notes receivable from participants are charged directly to the participant's account and are included in administrative expenses. Investment related expenses are included in net appreciation (depreciation) in fair value of investments.

## Recent Accounting Standards

The SECURE 2.0 Act of 2022 was signed into law on December 29, 2022. This legislation includes a vast array of provisional changes to retirement plans, becoming effective in 2023 and beyond. Plan management adopted mandatory provisions effective for the year ended December 31, 2024, and continues to evaluate the impact of the adoption and implementation of this legislation on the Plan. The application of SECURE 2.0 Act did not have a material effect on the Plan's financial statements.

## Subsequent Events

Subsequent events were evaluated through September 19, 2025, the date the financial statements were available to be issued.

Effective January 1, 2025, participants aged 60-63 are eligible to make additional catch-up contributions up to the greater of \$10,000 or 150% of standard catch-up amount.

### 3. Fair Value Measurements

The framework for measuring fair value provides a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. The hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (Level 1) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (Level 3). The three levels of the fair value hierarchy under authoritative guidance are described as follows:

Level 1 - Inputs to the valuation methodology are unadjusted quoted prices for identical assets or liabilities in active markets that the Plan has the ability to access.

Level 2 - Inputs other than quoted prices included within Level 1 that are observable for the asset or liability, either directly or indirectly, such as:

- quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities in active markets;
- quoted prices for identical or similar assets or liabilities in inactive markets;
- inputs other than quoted prices that are observable for the asset or liability;
- inputs that are derived principally from or corroborated by observable market data by correlation or other means.

If the asset or liability has a specified (contractual) term, the Level 2 input must be observable for substantially the full term of the asset or liability.

Level 3 - Inputs to the valuation technique are unobservable and significant to the fair value measurement.

The asset or liability's fair value measurement level within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of any input that is significant to the fair value measurement. Valuation techniques maximize the use of relevant observables and minimize the use of unobservable inputs.

Following is a description of the valuation methodologies used for assets measured at fair value. There have been no changes in the methodologies used at December 31, 2024 and 2023.

*Money market fund:* Valued at the quoted net asset value (NAV) of shares held by the Plan at year end.

*Mutual funds:* Valued at the daily closing price as reported by the fund. Mutual funds held by the Plan are open-end mutual funds that are registered with the U.S. Securities and Exchange Commission. These funds are required to publish their daily NAV and to transact at that price. The mutual funds held by the plan are deemed to be actively traded.

*Pooled separate account and common collective trust:* Valued at the NAV of units of an investment collective trust. The NAV, as provided by the Trustee, is based on the fair value of the underlying investments held by the fund less its liabilities. This NAV is not used when it is determined to be probable that the fund will sell the investment for an amount different than the reported NAV. Participant transactions (purchases and sales) may occur daily. Were the Plan to initiate a full redemption of the common collective trust, the Trustee reserves the right to temporarily delay withdrawals from the trust in order to ensure that securities liquidations will be carried out in an orderly business manner.

Principal Life Insurance Company, the Trustee of the Principal Fixed Income Guaranteed Option, has certified to the completeness and accuracy of the Principal Fixed Income Guaranteed Option investment reported in the accompanying Statement of Net Assets Available for Benefits and the supplemental Schedule H, Line 4(i) - Schedule of Assets (Held at End of Year) as of December 31, 2024, and the related investment activity reported in the Statement of Changes in Net Assets Available for Benefits for the year ended December 31, 2024. Such information was obtained by management and agreed to or derived from information certified as complete and accurate by the qualified institutions.

## 6. Fully Benefit-Responsive Investment Contract

The Principal Fixed Income Guaranteed Option is a traditional fully benefit-responsive group insurance contract issued by Principal Life Insurance Company. There are no reserves against contract value for credit risk of the contract issuer or otherwise. The crediting interest rate is based on a formula agreed upon with the issuer but may not be less than minimum guarantee rate. For the year ended December 31, 2024, the crediting interest rate was 1.55%. Such interest rates are continuously reviewed and reset as needed on a monthly to quarterly basis. There is a surrender charge of 5% that may be charged based on cumulative transfer percentages and advance notice of intent to terminate if a plan terminates its interest in the contract unless a 12 month irrevocable advance notice is given. Certain unobservable inputs are assessed through review of contract terms (ex: duration or payout date) while others are substantiated utilizing available market data (ex: swap curve rate).

Certain events might limit the ability of the Plan to transact at contract value with the contract issuer. Such events include (1) amendments to the plan documents (including complete or partial plan termination or merger with another plan), (2) changes to the Plan's prohibition on competing investment options or deletion of equity wash provisions, (3) bankruptcy of the plan sponsor or other plan sponsor events (for example, divestitures or spinoffs of a subsidiary) that cause a significant withdrawal from the Plan, or (4) the failure of the trust to qualify for exemption from federal income taxes or any required prohibited transaction exemption under ERISA (5) premature termination of the contract.

No events are probable of occurring that might limit the ability of the Plan to transact at contract value with the contract issuers and that also would limit the ability of the Plan to transact at contract value with the participants.

In addition, certain events allow the issuers to terminate the contracts with the Plan and settle at an amount different from contract value. Such events include (1) an uncured violation of the Plan's investment guidelines, (2) a breach of material obligation under the contract, (3) a material misrepresentation, (4) a material amendment to the agreement without the consent of the issuers.

## 7. Related-Party and Party in Interest Transactions

Certain plan investments are managed by Principal Life Insurance Company and Fidelity Investments, an affiliate of Fidelity Management Company, a Trustee, and therefore, these transactions qualify as party in interest transactions.

Additionally, the Plan issues loans to participants, which are secured by the participant's account balances. These transactions qualify as party in interest transactions.

Certain administrative functions of the Plan are performed by officers or employees of the Company or Employer. No such officer or employee receives compensation from the Plan.

### 8. Plan Termination

Although it has not expressed any intent to do so, the Company has the right under the Plan to discontinue its contributions at any time and to terminate the Plan subject to the provisions of ERISA. In the event of plan termination, participants would become 100% vested in their employer contributions.

### 9. Tax Status

Effective August 26, 2024, the Plan adopted a pre-approved plan offered by FMR LLC. The pre-approved plan received an IRS Opinion Letter dated June 30, 2020, that the Plan and related trust are designed in accordance with the applicable sections of the IRC. Although the Plan has been amended since receiving the IRS Opinion Letter, the plan administrator believes that the Plan is designed, and is currently being operated, in compliance with the applicable requirements of the IRC, and therefore, believes that the Plan is qualified, and the related trust is tax-exempt.

Through August 25, 2024, the Plan had adopted a pre-approved Plan offered by Principal Life Insurance Company. The pre-approved plan received an IRS Opinion Letter dated June 30, 2020, that the Plan and related trust were designed in accordance with the applicable sections of the IRC. Although the Plan has been amended since receiving the IRS Opinion Letter, the plan administrator believed that the Plan was designed, and was being operated, in compliance with the applicable requirements of the IRC, and, therefore believed that the Plan was qualified, and the related trust was tax exempt.

Plan management is required to evaluate tax positions taken by the Plan and recognize a tax liability if the Plan has taken an uncertain position that more likely than not would not be sustained upon examination by the IRS. The Plan is subject to routine audits by taxing jurisdictions; however, there are currently no audits for any tax periods in progress.

### 10. Risks and Uncertainties

The Plan invests in various investment securities. Investment securities are exposed to various risks, such as interest rate, market, concentrations, and credit risks. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investment securities, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in the values of investment securities will occur in the near term and that such changes could materially affect participants' account balances and the amounts reported in the Statements of Net Assets Available for Benefits.

### 11. Delinquent Participant Contributions

For the years ended December 31, 2024, 2020 and 2019, the Company did not remit certain participant contributions to the Plan on a timely basis as defined by the DOL's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA. Untimely remittances identified on the Schedule of Delinquent Participant Contributions, which totaled \$24,633, were not corrected in 2024. Additionally, the Company will be compensating participants for lost earnings resulting from the delay in contributions, if not already compensated.
