Scope and Nature of the ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) Audit of the 2024 Financial Statements

We have performed an audit of the financial statements of HungerRush 401(k) Plan, an employee benefit plan subject to the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 ("ERISA"), as permitted by ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) ("ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) audit"). The financial statements comprise the statement of net assets available for benefits as of December 31, 2024, and the related statement of changes in net assets available for benefits for the year ended December 31, 2024, and the related notes to the financial statements.

Management, having determined it is permissible in the circumstances, has elected to have the audit of the 2024 financial statements performed in accordance with ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) pursuant to 29 CFR 2520.103-8 of the Department of Labor's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA. As permitted by ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C), our audit need not extend to any statements or information related to assets held for investment of the plan ("investment information") by a bank or similar institution or insurance carrier that is regulated, supervised, and subject to periodic examination by a state or federal agency, provided that the statements or information regarding assets so held are prepared and certified to by the bank or similar institution or insurance carrier in accordance with 29 CFR 2520.103-5 of the Department of Labor's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA ("qualified institution").

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America, and for the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error. Management's election of the ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) audit does not affect management's responsibility for the financial statements.

1. DESCRIPTION OF THE PLAN

The following description of HungerRush 401(k) Plan (the “Plan”) provides only general information. Participants should refer to the plan document and trust agreement for a more complete description of the Plan’s provisions.

General

The Plan is a qualified retirement plan whose purpose is to enable eligible employees to save for retirement. The Plan is administered by MerchantWise Solutions, LLC, with HungerRush, LLC and Menufy.com, LLC as participating employers (collectively, the “Company”). The Plan is subject to the provisions of the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (“ERISA”), as amended.

Fidelity Management Trust Company is the trustee of the Plan and is responsible for trusteeing the Plan’s assets. Fidelity Investments is the recordkeeper of the Plan.

Eligibility

All employees of the Company, except for employees who are residents of Puerto Rico, covered by a collective bargaining agreement, nonresident aliens with no U.S. income, leased employees, independent contractors, and seasonal employees are eligible to participate in the Plan upon reaching the age of 18 and completing 1 month of service.

Contributions

Participants may elect to defer a percentage of their eligible compensation into the Plan after they satisfy the Plan’s eligibility requirements. The Plan also contains an automatic enrollment feature. Participants may stop or change this automatic contribution or their elective contributions at any time. The Plan also provides participants who are projected to be age 50 or older by the end of the taxable year to make catch-up contributions.

The Company may make discretionary matching contributions to the Plan. For the year ended December 31, 2024, the Company made a discretionary matching contribution equal to 50% of a participant’s elective deferrals, up to 6% of eligible compensation.

Participants can roll over part or all of an eligible rollover distribution they receive from an eligible retirement plan as a rollover contribution.

Participant Accounts

Participants direct the investment of assets in their account under the Plan and are responsible for their investment decisions. Each participant’s account is credited with the participant’s contribution, employer contributions, rollover contribution, and an allocation of Plan earnings. Participant accounts are charged with an allocation of administrative expenses that are paid by the Plan. Allocations are based on participant earnings, account balances, or specific participant transactions. The benefit to which a participant is entitled is the benefit that can be provided from the participant’s vested account balance.

Vesting

Participants are 100% vested in their contributions, rollover contributions, employer contributions, plus actual earnings thereon.

Notes Receivable from Participants

Participants may apply for a loan by contacting the trustee. The minimum loan is \$1,000 and the maximum amount is the lesser of one-half of the participant's vested account balance or \$50,000 reduced by the highest outstanding loan balance in the participant's account during the prior twelve-month period. All loans bear a reasonable rate of interest. Repayments should be made through after-tax payroll deductions. All loans must be repaid in level payments over no more than a five-year period from the date of the loan.

Distributions to Participants

Participants are eligible to request a distribution of their vested account balance based on death, disability, retirement, required minimum distribution, or termination of employment. Forms of payment include lump sum distributions of the vested account balance as a non-rollover distribution, direct rollover distribution, combination non-rollover distribution and direct rollover, partial withdrawals, or installment distributions.

If the participant's vested account balance is \$5,000 or less, the Company will direct the trustee that any account exceeding \$1,000 be distributed to an individual retirement account or annuity. If the vested account balance is \$1,000 or less, the Company will direct the trustee to distribute the amount as a lump sum distribution to the participant. A participant's consent is required for any distribution if the participant's vested account balance is greater than \$5,000.

If a participant has reached age 59½, they may elect to withdraw all or a portion of their entire vested account balance while still employed by the Company. In addition, an active employee may apply to withdraw certain contributions to satisfy specific and heavy financial needs as a hardship withdrawal.

Forfeitures

As of December 31, 2024 and 2023, forfeited nonvested accounts totaled \$70,035 and \$64,498, respectively. Forfeitures are retained in the Plan and may be first used to pay administrative expenses. Any remaining amounts will be used to reduce future employer contributions payable under the Plan. Forfeitures were not used to reduce employer contributions during the year ended December 31, 2024.

2. SUMMARY OF ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of Accounting

The financial statements of the Plan are prepared on the accrual basis of accounting.

Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America ("GAAP") requires the Company to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and changes therein, and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Investment Valuation and Income Recognition

Investments are reported at fair value. Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. See Note 3 for discussion of fair value measurements.

Purchases and sales of securities are recorded on a trade-date basis. Dividends are recorded on the ex-dividend date. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Net appreciation includes the Plan's gains and losses on investments bought and sold as well as held during the year.

Notes Receivable from Participants

Notes receivable from participants are measured at their unpaid principal balance plus any accrued but unpaid interest. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Related fees are recorded as administrative expenses and are expensed when they are incurred.

Payment of Benefits

Benefits are recorded when paid.

Expenses

Certain expenses of maintaining the Plan are paid by the Plan, unless otherwise paid by the Company. Expenses that are paid by the Company are excluded from these financial statements. Fees related to the administration of notes receivable from participants are charged directly to the participant's account and are included in administrative expenses. Investment related expenses are included in net appreciation in fair value of investments.

Subsequent Events

The Plan has evaluated subsequent events through September 16, 2025, the date that the financial statements were available to be issued.

3. FAIR VALUE MEASUREMENTS

The framework for measuring fair value provides a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. The hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (Level 1) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (Level 3). The three levels of the fair value hierarchy under FASB ASC 820 are described as follows:

Level 1 – Inputs to the valuation methodology are unadjusted quoted prices for identical assets or liabilities in active markets that the Plan has the ability to access.

Level 2 – Inputs to the valuation methodology include quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities in active markets; quoted prices for identical or similar assets or liabilities in inactive markets; inputs other than quoted prices that are observable for the asset or liability; or inputs that are derived principally from or corroborated by observable market data by correlation or other means. If the asset or liability has a specified (contractual) term, the Level 2 input must be observable for substantially the full term of the asset or liability.

Level 3 – Inputs to the valuation methodology are unobservable and significant to the fair value measurement.

The asset or liability's fair value measurement level within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of any input that is significant to fair value measurement. Valuation techniques maximize the use of relevant observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs.

Following is a description of the valuation methodologies used for assets measured at fair value. There have been no changes in the methodologies used at December 31, 2024 and 2023.

Mutual funds – Valued at the daily closing price as reported by the fund. Mutual funds held by the Plan are open-end mutual funds that are registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission ("SEC"). These funds are required to publish their daily net asset value ("NAV") and to transact at that price. The mutual funds held by the Plan are deemed to be actively traded.

Money market fund – Valued at the daily closing price as reported by the fund. The money market fund is an open-end mutual fund that is registered with the SEC. This fund is required to publish its daily NAV and to transact at that price. The money market fund is deemed to be actively traded.

Collective trust – Valued at NAV of units held. The NAV is used as a practical expedient to estimate fair value. The NAV is based on the fair value of the underlying investments held by the trust less its liabilities. This practical expedient is not used when it is determined to be probable that the trust will sell the investment for an amount different than the reported NAV.

4. CERTIFIED INVESTMENT INFORMATION

Certain information in the accompanying financial statements and ERISA-required supplemental schedule related to investments and notes receivable from participants held as of December 31, 2024 and 2023, and net appreciation in fair value of investments, dividends and interest, and interest income on notes receivable from participants for the year ended December 31, 2024, was obtained by the Company and agreed to or derived from information certified as complete and accurate by Fidelity Management Trust Company, a qualified institution.

5. TAX STATUS

The pre-approved plan adopted by the Company received its latest opinion letter dated June 30, 2020, in which the Internal Revenue Service (“IRS”) stated that the pre-approved plan, as then designed, was in compliance with the applicable requirements of the Internal Revenue Code (“IRC”). Although the Plan has been amended since receiving the opinion letter, the Company believes that the Plan is designed, and is currently being operated, in compliance with the applicable requirements of the IRC. Therefore, no provision for income taxes have been included in the Plan’s financial statements.

GAAP requires the Company to evaluate tax positions taken by the Plan and recognize a tax liability if the Plan has taken an uncertain position that more than likely than not would not be sustained upon examination by IRS. The Plan is subject to routine audits by taxing jurisdictions; however, there are currently no audits for any tax periods in progress.

6. RELATED PARTY TRANSACTIONS AND PARTY-IN-INTEREST TRANSACTIONS

Certain Plan investments are managed by Fidelity Investments. Fidelity Investments is the recordkeeper for the Plan and, therefore, these transactions qualify as party-in-interest transactions. In addition, the Plan provides for notes receivable from participants, which are party-in-interest transactions that are exempt from the prohibited transaction rules.

9. PLAN TERMINATION

The Company has no legal or contractual obligation to make annual contributions or to continue the Plan. The Company reserves the right to terminate the Plan at any time. In the event the Plan should terminate, each participant affected by such termination shall have a vested interest in their account of 100%. The Company will facilitate the distribution of account balances in single lump sum payments to each participant in accordance with Plan provisions.

10. TRANSFER OF ASSETS TO THIS PLAN

Effective January 1, 2023, the Plan was amended to allow Menufy.com, LLC to become a participating employer in the Plan. In March 2023, the Menufy 401(k) Plan liquidated assets and transferred \$1,497,352 in investments into the Plan. The Menufy 401(k) Plan also transferred \$18,555 in notes receivable from participants to this Plan. In 2024, the Menufy 401(k) Plan transferred an additional \$920 in investments.

Accordingly, the objective of an ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) audit is not to express an opinion about whether the 2024 financial statements as a whole are presented fairly, in all material respects, in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

We are required to communicate with those charged with governance regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit, significant audit findings, and certain internal control-related matters that we identified during the audit.

Other Matters

Such information is the responsibility of management and was derived from and relates directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements. The information included in the supplemental schedule, other than that agreed to or derived from the certified investment information, has been subjected to auditing procedures applied in the audit of the financial statements and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements or to the financial statements themselves, and other additional procedures in accordance with GAAS. For information included in the supplemental schedule that agreed to or is derived from the certified investment information, we compared such information to the related certified investment information.

Their report dated September 6, 2024, indicated that (a) the amounts and disclosures in the 2023 financial statements, other than those agreed to or derived from the certified investment information, were presented fairly in all material respects, in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America, and (b) the information in the 2023 financial statements related to assets held by and certified by a qualified institution agrees to, or is derived from, in all material respects, the information prepared and certified by an institution that management determined meets the requirements of ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C). 1. DESCRIPTION OF THE PLAN

The following description of HungerRush 401(k) Plan (the “Plan”) provides only general information. Participants should refer to the plan document and trust agreement for a more complete description of the Plan’s provisions.

General

The Plan is a qualified retirement plan whose purpose is to enable eligible employees to save for retirement. The Plan is administered by MerchantWise Solutions, LLC, with HungerRush, LLC and Menufy.com, LLC as participating employers (collectively, the “Company”). The Plan is subject to the provisions of the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (“ERISA”), as amended.

Fidelity Management Trust Company is the trustee of the Plan and is responsible for trusteeing the Plan’s assets. Fidelity Investments is the recordkeeper of the Plan.

Eligibility

All employees of the Company, except for employees who are residents of Puerto Rico, covered by a collective bargaining agreement, nonresident aliens with no U.S. income, leased employees, independent contractors, and seasonal employees are eligible to participate in the Plan upon reaching the age of 18 and completing 1 month of service.

Contributions

Participants may elect to defer a percentage of their eligible compensation into the Plan after they satisfy the Plan’s eligibility requirements. The Plan also contains an automatic enrollment feature. Participants may stop or change this automatic contribution or their elective contributions at any time. The Plan also provides participants who are projected to be age 50 or older by the end of the taxable year to make catch-up contributions.

The Company may make discretionary matching contributions to the Plan. For the year ended December 31, 2024, the Company made a discretionary matching contribution equal to 50% of a participant’s elective deferrals, up to 6% of eligible compensation.

Participants can roll over part or all of an eligible rollover distribution they receive from an eligible retirement plan as a rollover contribution.

Participant Accounts

Participants direct the investment of assets in their account under the Plan and are responsible for their investment decisions. Each participant’s account is credited with the participant’s contribution, employer contributions, rollover contribution, and an allocation of Plan earnings. Participant accounts are charged with an allocation of administrative expenses that are paid by the Plan. Allocations are based on participant earnings, account balances, or specific participant transactions. The benefit to which a participant is entitled is the benefit that can be provided from the participant’s vested account balance.

Vesting

Participants are 100% vested in their contributions, rollover contributions, employer contributions, plus actual earnings thereon.

Notes Receivable from Participants

Participants may apply for a loan by contacting the trustee. The minimum loan is \$1,000 and the maximum amount is the lesser of one-half of the participant's vested account balance or \$50,000 reduced by the highest outstanding loan balance in the participant's account during the prior twelve-month period. All loans bear a reasonable rate of interest. Repayments should be made through after-tax payroll deductions. All loans must be repaid in level payments over no more than a five-year period from the date of the loan.

Distributions to Participants

Participants are eligible to request a distribution of their vested account balance based on death, disability, retirement, required minimum distribution, or termination of employment. Forms of payment include lump sum distributions of the vested account balance as a non-rollover distribution, direct rollover distribution, combination non-rollover distribution and direct rollover, partial withdrawals, or installment distributions.

If the participant's vested account balance is \$5,000 or less, the Company will direct the trustee that any account exceeding \$1,000 be distributed to an individual retirement account or annuity. If the vested account balance is \$1,000 or less, the Company will direct the trustee to distribute the amount as a lump sum distribution to the participant. A participant's consent is required for any distribution if the participant's vested account balance is greater than \$5,000.

If a participant has reached age 59½, they may elect to withdraw all or a portion of their entire vested account balance while still employed by the Company. In addition, an active employee may apply to withdraw certain contributions to satisfy specific and heavy financial needs as a hardship withdrawal.

Forfeitures

As of December 31, 2024 and 2023, forfeited nonvested accounts totaled \$70,035 and \$64,498, respectively. Forfeitures are retained in the Plan and may be first used to pay administrative expenses. Any remaining amounts will be used to reduce future employer contributions payable under the Plan. Forfeitures were not used to reduce employer contributions during the year ended December 31, 2024.

2. SUMMARY OF ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of Accounting

The financial statements of the Plan are prepared on the accrual basis of accounting.

Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America ("GAAP") requires the Company to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and changes therein, and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Investment Valuation and Income Recognition

Investments are reported at fair value. Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. See Note 3 for discussion of fair value measurements.

Purchases and sales of securities are recorded on a trade-date basis. Dividends are recorded on the ex-dividend date. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Net appreciation includes the Plan's gains and losses on investments bought and sold as well as held during the year.

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Notes to Financial Statements

December 31, 2024 and 2023

Notes Receivable from Participants

Notes receivable from participants are measured at their unpaid principal balance plus any accrued but unpaid interest. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Related fees are recorded as administrative expenses and are expensed when they are incurred.

Payment of Benefits

Benefits are recorded when paid.

Expenses

Certain expenses of maintaining the Plan are paid by the Plan, unless otherwise paid by the Company. Expenses that are paid by the Company are excluded from these financial statements. Fees related to the administration of notes receivable from participants are charged directly to the participant's account and are included in administrative expenses. Investment related expenses are included in net appreciation in fair value of investments.

Subsequent Events

The Plan has evaluated subsequent events through September 16, 2025, the date that the financial statements were available to be issued.

3. FAIR VALUE MEASUREMENTS

The framework for measuring fair value provides a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. The hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (Level 1) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (Level 3). The three levels of the fair value hierarchy under FASB ASC 820 are described as follows:

Level 1 – Inputs to the valuation methodology are unadjusted quoted prices for identical assets or liabilities in active markets that the Plan has the ability to access.

Level 2 – Inputs to the valuation methodology include quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities in active markets; quoted prices for identical or similar assets or liabilities in inactive markets; inputs other than quoted prices that are observable for the asset or liability; or inputs that are derived principally from or corroborated by observable market data by correlation or other means. If the asset or liability has a specified (contractual) term, the Level 2 input must be observable for substantially the full term of the asset or liability.

Level 3 – Inputs to the valuation methodology are unobservable and significant to the fair value measurement.

The asset or liability's fair value measurement level within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of any input that is significant to fair value measurement. Valuation techniques maximize the use of relevant observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs.

Following is a description of the valuation methodologies used for assets measured at fair value. There have been no changes in the methodologies used at December 31, 2024 and 2023.

Mutual funds – Valued at the daily closing price as reported by the fund. Mutual funds held by the Plan are open-end mutual funds that are registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission ("SEC"). These funds are required to publish their daily net asset value ("NAV") and to transact at that price. The mutual funds held by the Plan are deemed to be actively traded.

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December 31, 2024 and 2023

Money market fund – Valued at the daily closing price as reported by the fund. The money market fund is an open-end mutual fund that is registered with the SEC. This fund is required to publish its daily NAV and to transact at that price. The money market fund is deemed to be actively traded.

Collective trust – Valued at NAV of units held. The NAV is used as a practical expedient to estimate fair value. The NAV is based on the fair value of the underlying investments held by the trust less its liabilities. This practical expedient is not used when it is determined to be probable that the trust will sell the investment for an amount different than the reported NAV.

4. CERTIFIED INVESTMENT INFORMATION

Certain information in the accompanying financial statements and ERISA-required supplemental schedule related to investments and notes receivable from participants held as of December 31, 2024 and 2023, and net appreciation in fair value of investments, dividends and interest, and interest income on notes receivable from participants for the year ended December 31, 2024, was obtained by the Company and agreed to or derived from information certified as complete and accurate by Fidelity Management Trust Company, a qualified institution.

5. TAX STATUS

The pre-approved plan adopted by the Company received its latest opinion letter dated June 30, 2020, in which the Internal Revenue Service (“IRS”) stated that the pre-approved plan, as then designed, was in compliance with the applicable requirements of the Internal Revenue Code (“IRC”). Although the Plan has been amended since receiving the opinion letter, the Company believes that the Plan is designed, and is currently being operated, in compliance with the applicable requirements of the IRC. Therefore, no provision for income taxes have been included in the Plan’s financial statements.

GAAP requires the Company to evaluate tax positions taken by the Plan and recognize a tax liability if the Plan has taken an uncertain position that more than likely than not would not be sustained upon examination by IRS. The Plan is subject to routine audits by taxing jurisdictions; however, there are currently no audits for any tax periods in progress.

6. RELATED PARTY TRANSACTIONS AND PARTY-IN-INTEREST TRANSACTIONS

Certain Plan investments are managed by Fidelity Investments. Fidelity Investments is the recordkeeper for the Plan and, therefore, these transactions qualify as party-in-interest transactions. In addition, the Plan provides for notes receivable from participants, which are party-in-interest transactions that are exempt from the prohibited transaction rules.

9. PLAN TERMINATION

The Company has no legal or contractual obligation to make annual contributions or to continue the Plan. The Company reserves the right to terminate the Plan at any time. In the event the Plan should terminate, each participant affected by such termination shall have a vested interest in their account of 100%. The Company will facilitate the distribution of account balances in single lump sum payments to each participant in accordance with Plan provisions.

10. TRANSFER OF ASSETS TO THIS PLAN

Effective January 1, 2023, the Plan was amended to allow Menufy.com, LLC to become a participating employer in the Plan. In March 2023, the Menufy 401(k) Plan liquidated assets and transferred \$1,497,352 in investments into the Plan. The Menufy 401(k) Plan also transferred \$18,555 in notes receivable from participants to this Plan. In 2024, the Menufy 401(k) Plan transferred an additional \$920 in investments.
