Significant Risks Identified

The following significant risk was identified as part of our overall risk assessment:

- Management Override of Controls
- Improper Revenue Recognition

A significant risk is an identified risk of material misstatement for which the assessment of inherent risk is close to the upper end of the spectrum of inherent risk due to the degree to which inherent risk factors affect the combination of the likelihood of a misstatement occurring and the magnitude of the potential misstatement should that misstatement occur, or that is to be treated as a significant risk in accordance with the requirements of other audit standards.

We performed the following procedures as a response to this identified risk:

- Reviewed the Plan document, the Plan's accounting policies, and the financial statement disclosures to gain an understanding of the Plan's contributions and income recognition policies.
- Performed substantive testing procedures on a sample of participant contributions, distributions, and substantive analytical procedures on investment income.
- Performed journal entry testing and examined the Plan's financial statement review procedures.

Based on our procedures, we have concluded that we have obtained sufficient evidence to conclude that our audit risk has been reduced to an acceptable low level.

Qualitative Aspects of the Plan's Significant Accounting Practices

Significant Accounting Policies

Management has the responsibility to select and use appropriate accounting policies. A summary of the significant accounting policies adopted by the Plan is included in the notes to the financial statements. As described in Note 2 to the financial statements, the plan changed its basis of accounting from the going-concern basis of accounting used in presenting the 2024 financial statements to the liquidation basis of accounting used in presenting the 2025 financial statements due to plan liquidation. There have been no initial selections of accounting policies and no changes in significant accounting policies or their application during 2025. No matters have come to our attention that would require us, under professional standards, to inform you about (1) the methods used to account for significant unusual transactions and (2) the effect of significant accounting policies in controversial or emerging areas for which there is a lack of authoritative guidance or consensus.

Significant Accounting Estimates and Related Disclosures

Accounting estimates and related disclosures are an integral part of the financial statements prepared by management and are based on management's current judgments. Those judgments are normally based on knowledge and experience about past and current events and assumptions about future events.

Certain accounting estimates are particularly sensitive because of their significance to the financial statements and because of the possibility that future events affecting them may differ markedly from management's current judgments.

There were no significant accounting estimates affecting the financial statements.

Financial Statement Disclosures

Certain financial statement disclosures involve significant judgment and are particularly sensitive because of their significance to financial statement users. We did not identify any disclosures that we found to be particularly sensitive.

Significant Unusual Transactions

For purposes of this communication, professional standards require us to communicate to you significant unusual transactions identified during our audit.

As described in Note 1 to the financial statements, the trustees of the plan approved an amendment to freeze and terminate the plan.

Identified or Suspected Fraud

We have not identified nor have we obtained information that indicates that fraud may have occurred.

Significant Difficulties Encountered During the Audit

We encountered no significant difficulties in dealing with management relating to the performance of the audit.

Uncorrected and Corrected Misstatements

For purposes of this communication, professional standards require us to accumulate all known and likely misstatements identified during the audit, other than those that we believe are trivial, and communicate them to the appropriate level of management. Further, professional standards require us to also communicate the effect of uncorrected misstatements related to prior periods on the relevant classes of transactions, account balances or disclosures, and the financial statements as a whole. Management has corrected all identified misstatements.

In addition, professional standards require us to communicate to you all material, corrected misstatements that were brought to the attention of management as a result of our audit procedures. None of the misstatements identified by us as a result of our audit procedures and corrected by management were material, either individually or in the aggregate to the financial statements as a whole.

No such disagreements arose during the course of the audit.

We have requested certain written representations from management, which are included in the representation letter provided to us.

Management's Consultations with Other Accountants

In some cases, management may decide to consult with other accountants about auditing and accounting matters. Management informed us that, and to our knowledge, there were no consultations with other accountants regarding auditing and accounting matters.

Other Significant Matters, Findings, or Issues

In the normal course of our professional association with the Plan, we generally discuss a variety of matters, including the application of accounting principles and auditing standards, significant events or transactions that occurred during the year, business conditions affecting the Plan, and business plans and strategies that may affect the risks of material misstatement. None of the matters discussed resulted in a condition to our retention as the Plan's auditor.

Non-compliance with Laws and Regulations

No matters involving non-compliance with laws and regulations having a direct and material impact on the financial statements came to our attention during the course of the audit.

Other Information in Documents Containing Audited Financial Statements

Pursuant to professional standards, our responsibility as auditors for other information does not extend beyond the information identified in the audit report, and we are not required to perform any procedures to corroborate such other information.

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in accordance with GAAP, and for the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error. Management’s election of the ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) audit does not affect management’s responsibility for the financial statements.

1 - DESCRIPTION OF PLAN

The following description of the Patient Service Center LLC Savings Plan (“Plan”) provides only general information. Participants should refer to the Plan agreement for a more complete description of the Plan’s provisions.

General

The Plan is a defined contribution 401k (k) plan covering all full-time employees of Patient Service Center LLC (“Company”) with exception of those employees covered under a collective bargaining agreement and leased employees as defined in the Plan document. Employees become eligible to make deferrals and receive a safe harbor matching contribution once they have completed one (1) month of service and have attained age 21. Plan entry dates are the first day of each Plan Year quarter following the attainment of these eligibility requirements. The Plan is subject to the provisions of the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974, as amended (“ERISA”).

On December 11, 2024, the trustees of the Plan approved an amendment to freeze the Plan effective December 31, 2024, in anticipation of its merger into the Johnson & Johnson Savings Plan. Johnson & Johnson acquired the Company in 2024. A frozen plan does not allow new participants, contributions, and transfers from other qualified plans but does permit rollover contributions. The merger of the Plan was subsequently approved in March 2025.

On June 22, 2025, plan participant investment account balances were liquidated and transferred into the Johnson & Johnson Savings Plan. As a result of the merger, participants of the plan were allowed to participate in the Johnson & Johnson Savings Plan, effective June 23, 2025.

Contributions

Plan participants may elect to contribute up to 100% of pre-tax compensation, as defined by the Plan. Contributions are subject to certain Internal Revenue Code (“IRC”) limitations. In addition, in any calendar year in which a participant is age 50 or above, an additional catch-up contribution may be made. The Plan also permits rollover contributions of retirement benefits received from other qualified plans and Roth elective deferrals.

The Company has elected safe harbor nondiscrimination rules under the IRC. The Company provides a 100% match on employee contributions up to 3% of eligible compensation and a 50% match on employee contributions that exceed 3% but do not exceed 5% of eligible compensation.

Participant Accounts

Each participant’s account is credited with their voluntary contributions, Company safe harbor matching contributions, and earnings thereon. Participant accounts are charged with an allocation of administration expenses that are paid by the Plan. Allocations are based on participant account balances, specific participant transactions, or as an equal dollar amount based on the number of Plan participants. The benefit to which a participant is entitled is the benefit that can be provided from the participant’s vested account.

Vesting

Participant contributions and earnings thereon are 100% vested at all times. Safe harbor matching contributions and earning thereon vest after 2 years of service.

1 - DESCRIPTION OF PLAN (CONTINUED)

Payment of Benefits

Upon termination of service due to death, disability, retirement or other reasons, the participant's vested account balance is to be distributed in a manner, as defined in the plan document, chosen by the participant or beneficiary. If the participant's vested account balance is \$5,000 or less, payment is to be paid in a single lump sum. A terminated participant may also elect to retain their vested account balance with the Plan until required to take mandatory distributions at age 73.

Normal retirement occurs at age 67; however, an active employee may begin to receive benefits at age 59 ½.

2 - SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of Presentation

For 2024, the financial statements of the Plan were prepared on the accrual basis of accounting in accordance with U.S. generally accepted accounting principles ("GAAP"). For 2025, the financial statements of the Plan are presented on the liquidation basis of accounting in accordance with GAAP. There were no changes to 2024 financial statements as a result of the change to liquidation basis of accounting.

Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with GAAP requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities, disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements, and the reported amounts of revenue and expenses during the reported period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Investment Valuation and Income Recognition

Investments are reported at fair value. Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. The Plan's management determines the Plan's valuation policies utilizing information provided by the investment advisors, the custodian, and the trustees of the Plan.

Purchases and sales of securities are recorded on a trade-date basis. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Dividends are recorded on the ex-dividend date. Net appreciation in fair value of investments includes the Plan's gains and losses on investments bought and sold as well as held during the year.

Benefit Payments

Benefit payments are recorded when paid.

Administrative Expenses

Certain expenses of maintaining the Plan are paid by the Plan, unless otherwise paid by the Company. Expenses that are paid by the Company are excluded from these financial statements. Investment related expenses are included in net appreciation in fair value of investments.

3 - FAIR VALUE MEASUREMENTS

Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. The framework for measuring fair value provides a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. The hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (Level 1) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (Level 3). The three levels of the fair value hierarchy under authoritative guidance are described as follows:

Level 1 - Inputs to the valuation methodology are unadjusted quoted prices for identical assets or liabilities in active markets that the Plan has the ability to access.

Level 2 - Inputs other than quoted prices included within Level 1 that are observable for the asset or liability, either directly or indirectly, such as:

- Quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities in active markets;
- Quoted prices for identical or similar assets or liabilities in inactive markets;
- Inputs other than quoted prices that are observable for the asset or liability;
- Inputs that are derived principally from or corroborated by observable market data by correlation or other means.

If the asset or liability has a specified (contractual) term, the level 2 input must be observable for substantially the full term of the asset or liability.

Level 3 - Inputs to the valuation methodology are unobservable and significant to the fair value measurement.

The asset or liability's fair value measurement level within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of any input that is significant to the fair value measurement. Valuation techniques maximize the use of relevant observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs.

The following is a description of the valuation methodologies used for assets measured at fair value at December 31, 2024.

Mutual Funds: Valued at the daily closing price as reported by the fund. Mutual funds held by the Plan are open-ended mutual funds that are registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission. These funds are required to publish their daily net asset value ("NAV") and to transact at that price. The mutual funds held by the Plan are deemed to be actively traded.

4 - CERTIFICATION OF FINANCIAL INFORMATION

Principal Trust Company, the custodian of the Plan, has certified that the following investment information included in the accompanying financial statements is complete and accurate:

- Investments as shown in the statements of net assets available for plan benefits as of June 22, 2025 and December 31, 2024.
- Investment income as shown in the statement of changes in net assets available for plan benefits from January 1, 2025 to June 22, 2025.

The Plan's independent auditors did not perform auditing procedures with respect to this certified investment information, except for comparing such information with the related investment information included in the financial statements.

5 - TAX STATUS

The underlying pre-approved plan provider received an opinion letter from the Internal Revenue Service ("IRS") dated June 30, 2020, stating that the form of the Plan is qualified under Section 401 of the IRC. In accordance with IRS pronouncements, the Company has determined that it is eligible to, and has chosen to, rely on the current IRS opinion letter. Once qualified, the Plan is required to operate in conformity with the IRC to maintain its tax-exempt status. The Plan has been amended since receiving the opinion letter. The Plan administrator believes that the Plan is currently designed and being operated in compliance with the applicable requirements of the IRC. Therefore, no provision for income taxes has been included in the Plan's financial statements.

GAAP prescribes rules for the recognition, measurement, classification, and disclosure in the financial statements of uncertain tax positions taken or expected to be taken in the Plan's tax returns. Management has determined that the Plan does not have any uncertain tax positions and associated unrecognized tax benefits that materially impact the financial statements or related disclosures. Since tax matters are subject to some degree of uncertainty, there can be no assurance that the Plan's tax returns will not be challenged by the taxing authorities and that the Plan will not be subject to additional tax, penalties, and interest as a result of such a challenge. Generally, the Plan's federal returns remain open for income tax examination for three years from date of filing.

6 - SUBSEQUENT EVENTS

The accompanying financial statements include an evaluation of events or transactions that have occurred after June 22, 2025, and through September 23, 2025, the date the financial statements were available to be issued.
