NOTE 1 - DESCRIPTION OF THE PLAN

General

The JULY Business Services 401(k) Plan (the “Plan”) was formed January 1, 1996. The Plan is a defined contribution plan covering all employees who have met certain eligibility requirements. The Plan is subject to the provisions of the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974, as amended (“ERISA”) and is administered by JULY Business Services (the “Organization or Company”), which is a third-party recordkeeping firm for retirement plans. The Plan’s assets are held by Mid Atlantic Trust Company, the custodian of the Plan (the “Custodian”).

Eligibility

All eligible employees are eligible to participate in the Plan as soon as it is administratively practicable after their date of employment. Participants should refer to the Plan Agreement for a more complete description of the Plan’s provisions.

Contributions

The Plan allows for the following types of contributions:

- *Employee Salary Deferral Contributions*
The Plan includes an elective salary deferral arrangement pursuant to Section 401(k) of the Code. Employees may voluntarily contribute a portion of their compensation, subject to various limitations prescribed by the Code.
- *Employee Roth Elective Salary Deferral Contributions*
Participant may make after-tax Roth elective salary deferral contributions to the Plan.
- *Non-Elective Safe Harbor Matching Contributions*
The Plan Sponsor will contribute safe harbor matching contributions equal to 100% of participant salary deferrals up to 5% of compensation. The Plan Sponsor made safe harbor matching contributions (modified cash basis) of approximately \$955,000 for the Plan year ending December 31, 2024.
- *Discretionary Employer Profit Sharing Contributions*
The Plan Sponsor may make a profit-sharing contribution to the Plan. Such contribution shall be determined by the Plan Sponsor and allocated amongst employee classes at the Plan Sponsor’s discretion. The Plan Sponsor made no discretionary employer profit sharing contributions for the Plan year ending December 31, 2024.
- *Discretionary Employer Matching Contributions*
The Plan Sponsor may make a matching contribution. The Plan Sponsor made no discretionary employer matching contributions for the Plan year ending December 31, 2024.
- *Rollover Contributions*
Employees may make rollover contributions from another qualified plan.

Participant Accounts and Allocations

An account is maintained for each participant that consists of contributions, the participant's share of investment gains/losses, interest and dividends, less any distributions to the participant. Investment earnings and losses are allocated to each participant's account based on actual earnings or losses of their selected investments. The Plan allows each participant the ability to self-direct their contributions and investments among various investment options. The Plan allows for certain participants to segregate their investments under a self-directed brokerage account option. All other Plan investments are held in trust by the Mid Atlantic Trust Company. The benefit to which a participant is entitled is limited to the benefit that can be provided from the participant's vested account balance.

Vesting

Participants are immediately vested in their salary deferral contributions and the non-elective safe harbor employer contributions. Participants vest in the discretionary employer profit sharing and matching contributions and gains/losses credited thereon over a six-year period as follows:

Notes Receivables from Participants

Participants may borrow from their accounts a minimum of \$1,000 limited to a maximum equal to the lesser of \$50,000 or 50% of their vested account balance. The loans are secured by the balance in the participant's account and are generally due in installment payments of principal plus interest, at an interest rate of prime plus 1%, with maturity dates ranging from one to five years. The term of the loan may exceed five years if the loan is for the purchase of the participant's principal residence. Principal and interest is paid ratably through payroll deductions.

Payment of Benefits

The full value of a participant's account becomes payable upon retirement age of 65, disability or death. Upon termination of employment for any other reason, a participant's account becomes payable. All benefits will be paid as a lump-sum distribution. In addition, the Plan includes a provision for participants to make withdrawals from their account under certain "hardship" circumstances. The Plan also provides for participants who have attained the age of 59 ½ to make a withdrawal from their account, subject to certain restrictions. On termination of service, if a participant's account is less than \$1,000, the participant must receive a lump-sum amount equal to the value of his or her account balance.

Forfeitures

Employees who terminate prior to complete vesting forfeit the unvested portion of their employer contribution account balances. The Plan provides that forfeitures first be used to pay Plan administrative expenses and any remaining balance shall be applied to reduce employer contributions.

Amounts allocated to participants withdrawn from the Plan

There are no amounts allocated, but not yet paid, to participants withdrawn from the Plan as of December 31, 2024 and 2023.

Administrative Expenses

Currently, the Organization pays the administrative expenses of the Plan with the exception of the expenses charged for participant-directed transactions, such as loan processing fees, distribution fees, and participant set-up fees. The Plan may also pay certain investment management fees, where these expenses are allocated to participant's accounts based on the participant's current fair value. These expenses are reflected in the accompanying statement of changes in net assets available for benefits as administrative expenses.

NOTE 2 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of Presentation

The accompanying financial statements of the Plan have been prepared on the modified cash basis of accounting, which is a comprehensive basis of accounting other than accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America. Contributions and investment income are recognized when received, and disbursements are recognized when made.

Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and changes therein, and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Income Recognition

Purchases and sales of securities are recorded on a settlement-date basis. Dividends are recorded when received. Net appreciation or depreciation, if applicable, includes the Plan's gains and losses on investments bought and sold as well as held during the year.

Notes Receivables from Participants

Notes receivables from participants are measured at their unpaid principal balance plus any accrued but unpaid interest.

Payment of Benefits

Benefits are recorded when paid.

NOTE 3 - SUMMARY OF INFORMATION CERTIFIED BY THE CUSTODIAN (UNAUDITED)

The Plan Administrator has obtained a certification from the Custodian that the information provided to the Plan Administrator by the Custodian is complete and accurate in accordance with 29 CFR 2520.103-5 of the Department of Labor's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA.

Notes receivable, related interest income from notes receivable, and the self-directed accounts investment and investment income (loss) were not certified by the Custodian.

NOTE 4 - FAIR VALUE MEASUREMENTS

Accounting Standards Codification (“ASC”) No. 820 establishes a framework for measuring fair value. That framework provides a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. The hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (Level 1 measurements) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (Level 3 measurements). The three levels of the fair value hierarchy under ASC No. 820 are described below:

Level 1: Inputs to the valuation methodology are unadjusted quoted prices for identical assets or liabilities in active markets that the Plan has the ability to access.

Level 2: Inputs to the valuation methodology include:

- Quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities in active markets;
- Quoted prices for identical or similar assets or liabilities in inactive markets;
- Inputs other than quoted prices that are observable for the asset or liability;
- Inputs that are derived principally from or corroborated by observable market data by correlation or other means.

Level 3: Unobservable inputs for which there is little or no market data, which require the reporting entity to develop its own assumptions.

The asset’s or liability’s fair value measurement level within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of any input that is significant to the fair value measurement. Valuation techniques used need to maximize the use of observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs.

Following is a description of the valuation methodologies used for assets measured at fair value. There have been no changes in the methodologies used at December 31, 2024 and 2023.

Mutual Funds: (including money market mutual funds) – Valued at the daily closing price as reported by the fund. Mutual funds held by the Plan are open-ended mutual funds that are registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission. The funds are required to publish their daily net asset value (NAV) and to transact at that price. The mutual funds held by the Plan are deemed to be actively traded (Level 1).

Self-Directed Brokerage: Valued based on the underlying investments (self-directed brokerage) traded on the active market or inactive markets.

Balanced Funds: Valued at net asset value which is calculated based upon a weighted factor of the unitized value of the underlying funds’ quoted prices in an active market and the cash liquidity of the account. These investments are not classified within the valuation hierarchy, but are presented for reconciliation purposes only.

The methods described above may produce a fair value calculation that may not be indicative of net realizable value or reflective of future fair values. Furthermore, while the Plan believes its valuation methods are appropriate and consistent with other market participants, the use of different methodologies or assumptions to determine the fair value of certain financial instruments could result in a different fair value measurement at the reporting date.

Although it has not expressed any intent to do so, the Organization has the right under the Plan to terminate the Plan at any time subject to the provisions of ERISA. In the event of Plan termination, participants will become 100% vested in their accounts.

NOTE 6 - INCOME TAX STATUS

On June 30, 2020, the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) stated that the prototype adopted by the Plan, as then designated, qualifies under Internal Revenue Code (IRC) Section 401(a). The Plan has not received a determination letter specific to the Plan itself, however, the Plan administrator believes that the Plan was designed and is being operated in compliance with the applicable requirements of the IRC. Therefore, no provision for income tax has been included in the Plan's financial statements.

The Plan accounting guidance requires Plan management to evaluate tax positions taken by the Plan and recognize a tax liability if the Plan has taken an uncertain position that more likely than not would not be sustained upon examination by taxing authorities. The Plan has analyzed the tax positions taken by the Plan, and has concluded that as of December 31, 2024 and 2023, and the years then ended, there are no uncertain positions taken or expected to be taken that would require recognition of a liability or disclosure in the financial statements. The Plan is subject to routine audits by taxing jurisdictions; however, there are currently no audits for any tax periods in progress.

NOTE 7 - RISKS AND UNCERTAINTIES

The Plan invests in various investment securities. Investment securities are exposed to various risks such as interest rate, market, and credit risks. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investment securities, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in the values of investment securities will occur in the near term and that such changes could materially affect participants' account balances and the amounts reported in the Statements of Net Assets Available for Benefits.

The classification of investment and investment earnings reported in the financial statements may differ from the classification on the Form 5500 due to different reporting requirements on Form 5500.

NOTE 8 - PARTY IN INTEREST TRANSACTIONS

Certain Plan investments are shares or units of investments managed by the Custodian. As Mid Atlantic Trust Company is the Custodian of the Plan, the related investment transactions qualify as party-in-interest transactions.

Certain participants have the ability to borrow on their vested account balances. As the individuals are participants in the Plan, these transactions qualify as party-in-interest transactions. As noted in Note 1, the Plan Sponsor is a third-party recordkeeping firm and does their own Plan recordkeeping.
