In preparing the financial statements, management is required to evaluate whether there are conditions or events, considered in the aggregate, that raise substantial doubt about the Plan's ability to continue as a going concern within one year after the date that the financial statements are issued or available to be issued.

Management is responsible for maintaining a current plan instrument, including all plan amendments, administering the Plan and determining that the Plan's transactions that are presented and disclosed in the financial statements are in conformity with the Plan's provisions, including maintaining sufficient records with respect to each of the participants, to determine the benefits due or which may become due to such participants.

## **Auditors' Responsibilities for the Audit of the 2024 Financial Statements**

Except as described in the Scope and Nature of the ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) Audit of the 2024 Financial Statements section of our report, our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditors' report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance but is not absolute assurance and therefore is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with GAAS will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control. Our audit did not extend to the certified investment information, except for obtaining and reading the certification, comparing the certified investment information with the related information presented and disclosed in the 2024 financial statements, and reading the disclosures relating to the certified investment information to assess whether they are in accordance with the presentation and disclosure requirements of GAAP.

Accordingly, the objective of an ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) audit is not to express an opinion about whether the 2024 financial statements as a whole are presented fairly, in all material respects, in accordance with GAAP.

We are required to communicate with those charged with governance regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit, significant audit findings, and certain internal control-related matters that we identified during the audit.

#### **Other Matter - 2024 Supplemental Schedule Required by ERISA**

The supplemental schedule, Schedule H, Line 4i - schedule of assets (held at end of year) as of December 31, 2024, is presented for purposes of additional analysis and is not a required part of the financial statements but is supplementary information required by the DOL's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA. Such information is the responsibility of management and was derived from and relates directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements. The information included in the supplemental schedule, other than that agreed to or derived from the certified investment information, has been subjected to auditing procedures applied in the audits of the financial statements and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements or to the financial statements themselves, and other additional procedures in accordance with GAAS. For information included in the supplemental schedule that agreed to or is derived from the certified investment information, we compared such information to the related certified investment information.

In forming our opinion on the supplemental schedule, we evaluated whether the supplemental schedule, other than the information agreed to or derived from the certified investment information, including its form and content, is presented in conformity with the DOL's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA.

In accordance with ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) pursuant to 29 CFR 2520.103-8 of the DOL’s Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA, the prior year audit did not extend to any statements or information related to assets held for investment of the Plan that were certified by a qualified institution. Their report dated August 30, 2024 indicated that (a) the amounts and disclosures in the 2023 financial statements, other than those agreed to or derived from the certified investment information, were presented fairly, in all material respects, in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America, and (b) the information in the 2023 financial statements related to assets held by and certified to by a qualified institution agrees to, or is derived from, in all material respects, the information prepared and certified by an institution that management determined meets the requirements of ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C). Their report also indicated that the form and content of the 2023 supplemental schedule, other than the information in the 2023 supplemental schedule that agreed to or is derived from the certified investment information, were presented, in all material respects, in conformity with the DOL’s Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA; and the information in the 2023 supplemental schedule related to assets held by and certified to by a qualified institution agrees to, or is derived from, in all material respects, the information prepared and certified by an institution that management determined meets the requirements of ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C).

### **1. Description of the Plan**

The following brief description of the RNBW Holdings 401(k) Plan (the Plan) is provided for general information purposes only. Participants should refer to the Plan document for more complete information.

#### ***General***

The Plan is a defined contribution plan and was adopted by RNBW Holdings LLC (the Company) on November 1, 2022, to provide deferred tax benefits, savings, and Company contributions to eligible employees. The Plan is subject to the provisions of the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (ERISA), as amended.

#### ***Eligibility***

The Plan covers all employees who have completed one month of service and are at least 21 years of age. Eligible participants are automatically enrolled in the Plan on the first day of each month following the date in which the participant satisfies the service requirements.

#### ***Contributions***

Participants may elect to contribute, on a pre-tax basis or after-tax basis (Roth contributions), up to 100% of their eligible compensation, as defined by the Plan, through payroll deductions, not to exceed the limit under the Internal Revenue Code (IRC). In addition, eligible participants are permitted to make catch-up contributions. Participants may also contribute amounts representing distributions from other qualified plans (rollovers). Participants direct the investment of their contributions into various investment options offered by the Plan. The Plan includes an automatic enrollment provision whereby all newly eligible employees are automatically enrolled in the Plan unless they affirmatively elect not to participate in the Plan or elect a different percentage. Automatically enrolled participants have their deferral rate set at 6%.

The Company may make a discretionary matching contribution, determined and calculated each Plan year. To receive an allocation of such contributions, a participant generally must be employed on the last day of the Plan year. There were Company discretionary matching contributions of \$2,078,339 during the year ended December 31, 2024.

#### ***Participant Accounts***

Each participant's account is credited with the participant's salary deferral contributions, and any Company discretionary matching contributions, and his/her share of the Plan's income (loss). The Plan's income (loss), with respect to each investment fund, is allocated based on the proportion that each participant's account balance invested in such fund compared to the total of all participants' account balances invested in such fund.

#### ***Vesting***

Participants are immediately vested in their contributions, including rollover contributions and the actual earnings (losses) thereon, as well as Company discretionary matching contributions.

#### ***Benefit Payments***

Participant accounts may be withdrawn upon retirement, death, disability, or termination of employment. Participants may elect to have distributions paid in a lump-sum and are either paid directly to the participant or rolled over to another qualified retirement plan. Installments are permitted only for required minimum distributions. The Plan also allows for in-service withdrawals at age 59<sup>1/2</sup> or upon incurring a disability, along with withdrawals in the event of a financial hardship.

### 1. Description of the Plan (cont.)

#### *Benefit Payments (cont.)*

If a terminated participant's balance is less than or equal to \$7,000, the amount may be automatically distributed in the form of lump-sums as designated by the Company.

#### *Forfeitures*

The Plan allows forfeitures to be used to reduce Company contributions or pay Plan expenses. During the year ended December 31, 2024, no forfeited funds were used. At December 31, 2024 and 2023, forfeited balances totaled \$2,285 of \$0, respectively.

### 2. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

#### *Basis of Accounting*

The accompanying financial statements are prepared on the accrual basis of accounting. The Plan follows accounting standards set by the Financial Accounting Standards Board (FASB). The FASB sets accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America (GAAP).

#### *Use of Estimates*

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with GAAP requires the Plan's management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of net assets available for benefits and changes therein, and disclosures. Accordingly, actual results could differ from those estimates.

#### *Investment Valuation and Income (Loss) Recognition*

Investments are stated at fair value. Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. See Note 4 for information on fair value measurement.

Purchases and sales of securities are recorded on a trade-date basis. Dividends are recorded on the ex-dividend date. Interest income (loss) is recorded on the accrual basis. Net appreciation/(depreciation) includes the Plan's gains and losses on investments bought and sold as well as held during the year.

#### *Plan Expenses and Revenue Credits*

Certain administrative expenses related to distributions and other participant-initiated transactions are charged to the account of the Plan participant. Other administrative expenses and investment management fees are paid by the Company. Investment fees are paid by the Plan in the form of reductions of net investment income (loss) earned by Plan participants.

The Plan participates in a revenue credit program. Income from the revenue credit program can be used to pay Plan administrative expenses or may be allocated to participants. The Plan received \$5,908 of revenue credits for the year ended December 31, 2024, of which \$75 were allocated to participants during 2024. The revenue credit program account balance was \$6,009 and \$8 at December 31, 2024, and 2023, respectively.

#### *Contributions*

Contributions from Plan participants and the matching contributions from the Company are recorded in the year in which the employee contributions are withheld from compensation.

### 2. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (cont.)

#### *Payment Benefits*

Benefit payments to participants are recorded upon distribution.

### 3. Certified Information

The Plan Administrator has elected the method of compliance permitted by 29 CFR 2520.103-8 of the Department of Labor's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA for 2024 and 2023. Accordingly, Fidelity, the Custodian of the Plan, has certified to the completeness and accuracy of all investments and notes receivable from participants reported in the accompanying Statements of Net Assets Available for Benefits as of December 31, 2024 and 2023, and the supplemental Schedule H, Line 4(i) - Schedule of Assets (Held at End of Year) as of December 31, 2024, and the related investment activity and interest income on notes receivable from participants reported in the Statement of Changes in Net Assets Available for Benefits for the year ended December 31, 2024. Such information was obtained by management and agreed to or derived from information certified as complete and accurate by a qualified institution.

### 4. Fair Value Measurement

GAAP establishes a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. The hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (Level 1 measurements) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs in which little or no market data exists (Level 3 measurements). The three levels of the fair value hierarchy under GAAP are described below:

#### *Basis of Fair Value Measurement*

*Level 1* – Unadjusted quoted prices in active markets that are accessible at the measurement date for identical, unrestricted assets or liabilities;

*Level 2* – Quoted prices in markets that are not considered to be active or financial instruments for which all significant inputs are observable, either directly or indirectly;

*Level 3* – Prices or valuations that require inputs that are both significant to the fair value measurement and unobservable.

The asset or liability's fair value measurement level within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of any input that is significant to the fair value measurement. Valuation techniques maximize the use of relevant observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs.

The following is a description of the valuation methodology used for assets measured at fair value. There have been no changes in the methodology used at December 31, 2024 and 2023.

*Mutual funds and money market mutual fund* - Valued at the daily closing price as reported by the fund. Mutual funds held by the Plan are open-ended mutual funds that are registered with the U.S. Securities and Exchange Commission. These funds are required to publish their daily net asset value (NAV) and to transact at that price. The mutual funds held by the Plan are deemed to be actively traded.

The methodology described above may produce a fair value calculation that may not be indicative of net realizable value or reflective of future fair values. Furthermore, while management believes its valuation methodology is appropriate and consistent with other market participants, the use of a different methodology or assumptions to determine the fair value of certain financial instruments could result in a different fair value measurement at the reporting date.

### 5. Related Parties and Party-In-Interest Transactions

Parties-in-interest are defined under DOL regulations as any fiduciary of the Plan, any party rendering service to the Plan, the Company, and certain others. The recordkeeping and custody functions for the underlying investments held by the Plan are performed by Fidelity. Usual and customary fees were paid for investment management services. Certain Plan investments are managed by Fidelity Investments, a company related to Fidelity. These transactions, as defined by the Plan, qualify as party-in-interest transactions. Such transactions are exempt from the prohibited transaction rules.

### 6. Tax Status

The Plan has adopted a Non-Standardized Pre-Approved Profit Sharing Plan with CODA (Pre-Approved Plan) sponsored by FMR LLC (doing business as Fidelity Institutional Asset Management). The Internal Revenue Service (IRS) has opined and informed FMR LLC by letter dated June 30, 2020, that the Pre-Approved Plan is designed in accordance with the applicable sections of the IRC. Although the Plan has been amended since adopting the Pre-Approved Plan document, the Plan administrator believes the Plan is designed, and is currently being operated, in compliance with the applicable requirements of the IRC and, therefore, believes the Plan is qualified, and the related trust is tax-exempt.

GAAP requires Plan management to evaluate tax positions taken by the Plan and recognize a tax liability if the Plan had taken an uncertain position that more likely than not would not have been sustained upon examination by the IRS. The Plan is subject to routine audits by taxing jurisdictions, however, there are currently no audits for any tax periods in progress.

### 7. Plan Termination

Although it has not expressed an intention to do so, the Company has the right under the Plan to discontinue its contributions at any time and to terminate the Plan subject to the provisions of ERISA. In the event of Plan termination, participants would become 100% vested in their Company contributions.

### **8. Risks and Uncertainties**

The Plan's investments include funds which invest in various types of investment securities and in various companies within various markets. Investment securities are exposed to several risks such as interest rate, market and credit risks. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investment securities, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in the values of investment securities will occur in the near term and those changes could materially affect the amounts reported in the Plan's statements of net assets available for benefits.

At December 31, 2024 and 2023, 23% and 24% of the Plan's investments were invested in the Fidelity Freedom® Index 2055 Fund Investor Fund, respectively.

### **9. SECURE 2.0 Act of 2022**

The SECURE 2.0 Act of 2022 was signed into law on December 29, 2022. This legislation includes a vast array of provisional changes to retirement plans, becoming effective in 2023 and beyond. Plan management continues to evaluate the impact of the adoption and implementation of this legislation to the Plan.

### **10. Subsequent Events**

The Plan has evaluated, for consideration of recognition or disclosure, subsequent events that have occurred through the date of issuance, September 15, 2025, and has determined that, except for the matter noted below, no significant events occurred after December 31, 2024, but prior to the issuance of these financial statements, that would have a material impact on these financial statements.

Effective January 1, 2025, Payment Progress LLC became a participating employer in the Plan.

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in accordance with GAAP, and for the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error. Management's election of the ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) audit does not affect management's responsibility for the financial statements.

In preparing the financial statements, management is required to evaluate whether there are conditions or events, considered in the aggregate, that raise substantial doubt about the Plan's ability to continue as a going concern within one year after the date that the financial statements are issued or available to be issued.

Management is responsible for maintaining a current plan instrument, including all plan amendments, administering the Plan and determining that the Plan's transactions that are presented and disclosed in the financial statements are in conformity with the Plan's provisions, including maintaining sufficient records with respect to each of the participants, to determine the benefits due or which may become due to such participants.

## **Auditors' Responsibilities for the Audit of the 2024 Financial Statements**

Except as described in the Scope and Nature of the ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) Audit of the 2024 Financial Statements section of our report, our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditors' report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance but is not absolute assurance and therefore is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with GAAS will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control. Misstatements are considered material if there is a substantial likelihood that, individually or in the aggregate, they would influence the judgment made by a reasonable user based on the financial statements.

In performing an audit in accordance with GAAS, we:

- Conclude whether, in our judgment, there are conditions or events, considered in the aggregate, that raise substantial doubt about the Plan's ability to continue as a going concern for a reasonable period of time.

Our audit did not extend to the certified investment information, except for obtaining and reading the certification, comparing the certified investment information with the related information presented and disclosed in the 2024 financial statements, and reading the disclosures relating to the certified investment information to assess whether they are in accordance with the presentation and disclosure requirements of GAAP.

Accordingly, the objective of an ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) audit is not to express an opinion about whether the 2024 financial statements as a whole are presented fairly, in all material respects, in accordance with GAAP.

We are required to communicate with those charged with governance regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit, significant audit findings, and certain internal control-related matters that we identified during the audit.

#### **Other Matter - 2024 Supplemental Schedule Required by ERISA**

The supplemental schedule, Schedule H, Line 4i - schedule of assets (held at end of year) as of December 31, 2024, is presented for purposes of additional analysis and is not a required part of the financial statements but is supplementary information required by the DOL's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA. Such information is the responsibility of management and was derived from and relates directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements. The information included in the supplemental schedule, other than that agreed to or derived from the certified investment information, has been subjected to auditing procedures applied in the audits of the financial statements and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements or to the financial statements themselves, and other additional procedures in accordance with GAAS. For information included in the supplemental schedule that agreed to or is derived from the certified investment information, we compared such information to the related certified investment information.

In forming our opinion on the supplemental schedule, we evaluated whether the supplemental schedule, other than the information agreed to or derived from the certified investment information, including its form and content, is presented in conformity with the DOL's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA.

In our opinion:

- the form and content of the supplemental schedule, other than the information in the supplemental schedule that agreed to or is derived from the certified investment information, is presented, in all material respects, in conformity with the DOL's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA.

## **Other Matter – Auditors’ Report on the 2023 Financial Statements**

Predecessor auditors performed an audit of the 2023 financial statements of the Plan. In accordance with ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) pursuant to 29 CFR 2520.103-8 of the DOL’s Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA, the prior year audit did not extend to any statements or information related to assets held for investment of the Plan that were certified by a qualified institution. Their report dated August 30, 2024 indicated that (a) the amounts and disclosures in the 2023 financial statements, other than those agreed to or derived from the certified investment information, were presented fairly, in all material respects, in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America, and (b) the information in the 2023 financial statements related to assets held by and certified to by a qualified institution agrees to, or is derived from, in all material respects, the information prepared and certified by an institution that management determined meets the requirements of ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C). Their report also indicated that the form and content of the 2023 supplemental schedule, other than the information in the 2023 supplemental schedule that agreed to or is derived from the certified investment information, were presented, in all material respects, in conformity with the DOL’s Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA; and the information in the 2023 supplemental schedule related to assets held by and certified to by a qualified institution agrees to, or is derived from, in all material respects, the information prepared and certified by an institution that management determined meets the requirements of ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C).

### **1. Description of the Plan**

The following brief description of the RNBW Holdings 401(k) Plan (the Plan) is provided for general information purposes only. Participants should refer to the Plan document for more complete information.

#### ***General***

The Plan is a defined contribution plan and was adopted by RNBW Holdings LLC (the Company) on November 1, 2022, to provide deferred tax benefits, savings, and Company contributions to eligible employees. The Plan is subject to the provisions of the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (ERISA), as amended.

#### ***Eligibility***

The Plan covers all employees who have completed one month of service and are at least 21 years of age. Eligible participants are automatically enrolled in the Plan on the first day of each month following the date in which the participant satisfies the service requirements.

#### ***Contributions***

Participants may elect to contribute, on a pre-tax basis or after-tax basis (Roth contributions), up to 100% of their eligible compensation, as defined by the Plan, through payroll deductions, not to exceed the limit under the Internal Revenue Code (IRC). In addition, eligible participants are permitted to make catch-up contributions. Participants may also contribute amounts representing distributions from other qualified plans (rollovers). Participants direct the investment of their contributions into various investment options offered by the Plan. The Plan includes an automatic enrollment provision whereby all newly eligible employees are automatically enrolled in the Plan unless they affirmatively elect not to participate in the Plan or elect a different percentage. Automatically enrolled participants have their deferral rate set at 6%.

The Company may make a discretionary matching contribution, determined and calculated each Plan year. To receive an allocation of such contributions, a participant generally must be employed on the last day of the Plan year. There were Company discretionary matching contributions of \$2,078,339 during the year ended December 31, 2024.

#### ***Participant Accounts***

Each participant's account is credited with the participant's salary deferral contributions, and any Company discretionary matching contributions, and his/her share of the Plan's income (loss). The Plan's income (loss), with respect to each investment fund, is allocated based on the proportion that each participant's account balance invested in such fund compared to the total of all participants' account balances invested in such fund.

#### ***Vesting***

Participants are immediately vested in their contributions, including rollover contributions and the actual earnings (losses) thereon, as well as Company discretionary matching contributions.

#### ***Benefit Payments***

Participant accounts may be withdrawn upon retirement, death, disability, or termination of employment. Participants may elect to have distributions paid in a lump-sum and are either paid directly to the participant or rolled over to another qualified retirement plan. Installments are permitted only for required minimum distributions. The Plan also allows for in-service withdrawals at age 59<sup>1/2</sup> or upon incurring a disability, along with withdrawals in the event of a financial hardship.

### 1. Description of the Plan (cont.)

#### *Benefit Payments (cont.)*

If a terminated participant's balance is less than or equal to \$7,000, the amount may be automatically distributed in the form of lump-sums as designated by the Company.

#### *Forfeitures*

The Plan allows forfeitures to be used to reduce Company contributions or pay Plan expenses. During the year ended December 31, 2024, no forfeited funds were used. At December 31, 2024 and 2023, forfeited balances totaled \$2,285 of \$0, respectively.

### 2. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

#### *Basis of Accounting*

The accompanying financial statements are prepared on the accrual basis of accounting. The Plan follows accounting standards set by the Financial Accounting Standards Board (FASB). The FASB sets accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America (GAAP).

#### *Use of Estimates*

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with GAAP requires the Plan's management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of net assets available for benefits and changes therein, and disclosures. Accordingly, actual results could differ from those estimates.

#### *Investment Valuation and Income (Loss) Recognition*

Investments are stated at fair value. Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. See Note 4 for information on fair value measurement.

Purchases and sales of securities are recorded on a trade-date basis. Dividends are recorded on the ex-dividend date. Interest income (loss) is recorded on the accrual basis. Net appreciation/(depreciation) includes the Plan's gains and losses on investments bought and sold as well as held during the year.

#### *Plan Expenses and Revenue Credits*

Certain administrative expenses related to distributions and other participant-initiated transactions are charged to the account of the Plan participant. Other administrative expenses and investment management fees are paid by the Company. Investment fees are paid by the Plan in the form of reductions of net investment income (loss) earned by Plan participants.

The Plan participates in a revenue credit program. Income from the revenue credit program can be used to pay Plan administrative expenses or may be allocated to participants. The Plan received \$5,908 of revenue credits for the year ended December 31, 2024, of which \$75 were allocated to participants during 2024. The revenue credit program account balance was \$6,009 and \$8 at December 31, 2024, and 2023, respectively.

#### *Contributions*

Contributions from Plan participants and the matching contributions from the Company are recorded in the year in which the employee contributions are withheld from compensation.

### 2. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (cont.)

#### *Payment Benefits*

Benefit payments to participants are recorded upon distribution.

### 3. Certified Information

The Plan Administrator has elected the method of compliance permitted by 29 CFR 2520.103-8 of the Department of Labor's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA for 2024 and 2023. Accordingly, Fidelity, the Custodian of the Plan, has certified to the completeness and accuracy of all investments and notes receivable from participants reported in the accompanying Statements of Net Assets Available for Benefits as of December 31, 2024 and 2023, and the supplemental Schedule H, Line 4(i) - Schedule of Assets (Held at End of Year) as of December 31, 2024, and the related investment activity and interest income on notes receivable from participants reported in the Statement of Changes in Net Assets Available for Benefits for the year ended December 31, 2024. Such information was obtained by management and agreed to or derived from information certified as complete and accurate by a qualified institution.

### 4. Fair Value Measurement

GAAP establishes a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. The hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (Level 1 measurements) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs in which little or no market data exists (Level 3 measurements). The three levels of the fair value hierarchy under GAAP are described below:

#### *Basis of Fair Value Measurement*

*Level 1* – Unadjusted quoted prices in active markets that are accessible at the measurement date for identical, unrestricted assets or liabilities;

*Level 2* – Quoted prices in markets that are not considered to be active or financial instruments for which all significant inputs are observable, either directly or indirectly;

*Level 3* – Prices or valuations that require inputs that are both significant to the fair value measurement and unobservable.

The asset or liability's fair value measurement level within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of any input that is significant to the fair value measurement. Valuation techniques maximize the use of relevant observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs.

The following is a description of the valuation methodology used for assets measured at fair value. There have been no changes in the methodology used at December 31, 2024 and 2023.

*Mutual funds and money market mutual fund* - Valued at the daily closing price as reported by the fund. Mutual funds held by the Plan are open-ended mutual funds that are registered with the U.S. Securities and Exchange Commission. These funds are required to publish their daily net asset value (NAV) and to transact at that price. The mutual funds held by the Plan are deemed to be actively traded.

The methodology described above may produce a fair value calculation that may not be indicative of net realizable value or reflective of future fair values. Furthermore, while management believes its valuation methodology is appropriate and consistent with other market participants, the use of a different methodology or assumptions to determine the fair value of certain financial instruments could result in a different fair value measurement at the reporting date.

### 5. Related Parties and Party-In-Interest Transactions

Parties-in-interest are defined under DOL regulations as any fiduciary of the Plan, any party rendering service to the Plan, the Company, and certain others. The recordkeeping and custody functions for the underlying investments held by the Plan are performed by Fidelity. Usual and customary fees were paid for investment management services. Certain Plan investments are managed by Fidelity Investments, a company related to Fidelity. These transactions, as defined by the Plan, qualify as party-in-interest transactions. Such transactions are exempt from the prohibited transaction rules.

### 6. Tax Status

The Plan has adopted a Non-Standardized Pre-Approved Profit Sharing Plan with CODA (Pre-Approved Plan) sponsored by FMR LLC (doing business as Fidelity Institutional Asset Management). The Internal Revenue Service (IRS) has opined and informed FMR LLC by letter dated June 30, 2020, that the Pre-Approved Plan is designed in accordance with the applicable sections of the IRC. Although the Plan has been amended since adopting the Pre-Approved Plan document, the Plan administrator believes the Plan is designed, and is currently being operated, in compliance with the applicable requirements of the IRC and, therefore, believes the Plan is qualified, and the related trust is tax-exempt.

GAAP requires Plan management to evaluate tax positions taken by the Plan and recognize a tax liability if the Plan had taken an uncertain position that more likely than not would not have been sustained upon examination by the IRS. The Plan is subject to routine audits by taxing jurisdictions, however, there are currently no audits for any tax periods in progress.

### 7. Plan Termination

Although it has not expressed an intention to do so, the Company has the right under the Plan to discontinue its contributions at any time and to terminate the Plan subject to the provisions of ERISA. In the event of Plan termination, participants would become 100% vested in their Company contributions.

### **8. Risks and Uncertainties**

The Plan's investments include funds which invest in various types of investment securities and in various companies within various markets. Investment securities are exposed to several risks such as interest rate, market and credit risks. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investment securities, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in the values of investment securities will occur in the near term and those changes could materially affect the amounts reported in the Plan's statements of net assets available for benefits.

At December 31, 2024 and 2023, 23% and 24% of the Plan's investments were invested in the Fidelity Freedom® Index 2055 Fund Investor Fund, respectively.

### **9. SECURE 2.0 Act of 2022**

The SECURE 2.0 Act of 2022 was signed into law on December 29, 2022. This legislation includes a vast array of provisional changes to retirement plans, becoming effective in 2023 and beyond. Plan management continues to evaluate the impact of the adoption and implementation of this legislation to the Plan.

### **10. Subsequent Events**

The Plan has evaluated, for consideration of recognition or disclosure, subsequent events that have occurred through the date of issuance, September 15, 2025, and has determined that, except for the matter noted below, no significant events occurred after December 31, 2024, but prior to the issuance of these financial statements, that would have a material impact on these financial statements.

Effective January 1, 2025, Payment Progress LLC became a participating employer in the Plan.
