We have performed audits of the financial statements of Quality Sausage Company LLC 401(k) Defined Contribution Plan (the Plan), an employee benefit plan subject to the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (ERISA), as permitted by ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) (ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) audit). The financial statements comprise the statements of net assets available for benefits as of December 31, 2024 and 2023, the related statement of changes in net assets available for benefits for the year ended December 31, 2024, and the related notes to the financial statements.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

December 31, 2024 and 2023

Note 1 – Description of the Plan

Quality Sausage Company LLC (the Company or Employer) sponsors the Quality Sausage Company LLC 401(k) Defined Contribution Plan (the Plan). The following description provides only general information. Participants should refer to the Plan document for a more complete description of the Plan's provisions.

General

The Plan is a defined contribution plan established for the benefit of the Company's employees, except for those not employed as salaried class or hourly class. The Plan is subject to the provisions of the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (ERISA).

The 401(k) Administrative Committee is responsible for the oversight of the Plan. Delaware Charter Guarantee and Trust Company d/b/a Principal Trust Company (Principal) serves as the trustee of the Plan, maintains the records of the participant data, and holds the Plan assets. Principal Life Insurance Company (Principal Life), an affiliate of Principal, issues the guaranteed investment contract held by the Plan.

Eligibility

Nonexcluded employees who have completed 90 days of service are eligible to participate in the Plan. Leased employees who complete one year of service, as defined in the Plan document, are considered employees and are eligible to participate in the Plan. Effective January 1, 2024, long-term part-time employees who complete at least 500 hours of service in three consecutive years are also eligible to participate in the Plan. Participants are automatically enrolled in the Plan on the first day of the month after satisfying eligibility requirements.

Contributions

Participants may contribute up to 100% of their compensation, as defined in the Plan document, as either pretax or Roth deferrals. Participants who have attained age 50 before the end of the Plan year are eligible to make catch-up contributions. Participants may also contribute amounts representing distributions from other qualified plans.

Eligible employees are automatically enrolled in the Plan with a 6% deferral rate. Deferral rates are increased annually by 1% until 10% is reached, unless the participant elects otherwise. Eligible employees who do not wish to participate in the Plan may affirmatively elect to opt out, or they may elect a different deferral percentage.

The Plan also provides for Employer safe harbor matching contributions of 100% of deferrals up to 2% and 50% of deferrals between 2% and 7% of a participant's compensation.

The Plan also provides for discretionary additional Employer matching contributions up to 4% of participant's compensation. There were no additional Employer matching contributions for the year ended December 31, 2024.

Additional amounts may be contributed by the Employer under the Plan's nonelective provisions at the discretion of the Company's board of directors. Unless termination is due to death, disability, or retirement, participants must be employed on the last day of the Plan year to receive an allocation of Employer nonelective contributions. Allocations of Employer nonelective contributions are based on the proportion of each participant's compensation to the total of all eligible participants' compensation. There were no Employer nonelective contributions for the year ended December 31, 2024.

Participants direct the investment of their contributions into various investment options offered by the Plan. Contributions are subject to certain limitations of the Internal Revenue Code (the Code).

Participant accounts

Each participant's account is credited with participant contributions, Employer matching contributions, and allocations of Employer nonelective contributions and Plan earnings. Participant accounts are charged with an allocation of administrative expenses that are paid by the Plan. Allocations are based on participant earnings, account balances, or specific participant transactions, as defined in the Plan document. The benefit to which a participant is entitled is the benefit that can be provided from the participant's vested account.

Vesting

Participants are vested immediately in their contributions plus actual earnings thereon. Participants become fully vested in Employer safe harbor matching contributions after two years of continuous service.

Vesting in discretionary Employer contributions is based upon years of continuous service as follows:

<u>Years of service</u>	<u>Vesting percentage</u>
Less than one year	0%
One, but less than two	33%
Two, but less than three	66%
Three years or more	100%

Participants automatically become 100% vested upon normal retirement (attainment of age 65), disability, death, or early retirement (attainment of age 59½). Participants who terminate for any other reason are entitled to the vested amount of their accounts.

Notes receivable from participants

Participants may borrow from their vested accounts a minimum of \$1,000 up to a maximum equal to the lesser of \$50,000, reduced by the excess of the highest outstanding loan balance during the preceding 12-month period over the loan balance on the date of the loan, or 50% of their vested account balance. The loans are secured by the balance in the participant's account and bear interest at rates that range from 5.75% to 9.50%, which is based on prime rate plus 1% on the date of origination. Prior to February 1, 2024, participants could only have one loan outstanding at any given time. Effective February 1, 2024, participants may have up to two loans outstanding at any given time. Terms range from one to five years. Principal and interest is paid ratably through payroll deductions.

Payment of benefits

Upon retirement, termination, disability, or death, a participant, or his or her beneficiary in the event of death, may elect to receive a lump-sum amount equal to the value of the participant's vested interest in his or her account. Additionally, participants may take in-service distributions upon reaching age 59½. Upon

termination, automatic distributions are required for balances of less than \$5,000. Automatic distributions above \$1,000 made without the participant's consent are rolled into an individual retirement account designated by Principal. The Plan allows hardship withdrawals, subject to account balance limits and applicable laws.

Forfeitures

Forfeitures may be used to restore participant balances previously forfeited, to pay Plan administrative expenses, to reduce Employer contributions, or may be allocated to participants as an additional Employer contribution. There was \$140 and \$0 of unallocated forfeitures as of December 31, 2024 and 2023, respectively. For the year ended December 31, 2024, forfeitures in the amount of \$7,736 and \$45,208 were used to pay Plan administrative expenses and to reduce Employer contributions.

Administrative expenses

The Plan allows certain administrative expenses to be paid from Plan assets. Investment expenses netted against investment income represent amounts associated with the net expense ratios of the investments in the Plan's fund lineup.

Note 2 – Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Basis of accounting

The financial statements of the Plan have been prepared on the accrual basis of accounting in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America (U.S. GAAP).

Use of estimates

The preparation of the financial statements in conformity with U.S. GAAP requires Plan management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and changes therein, and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Investment valuation and income recognition

Investments are reported at fair value, except for fully benefit responsive investment contracts, which are reported at contract value. Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. Plan management determines the valuation policies utilizing information provided by Principal and Principal Life. See Note 4 for discussion of fair value measurements and Note 6 for contract value measurements.

Purchases and sales of securities are recorded on a trade-date basis. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Dividends are recorded on the ex-dividend date. Net appreciation includes the Plan's gains and losses on investments bought and sold, as well as held during the year.

Notes receivable from participants

Notes receivable from participants are measured at their unpaid principal balance plus any accrued but unpaid interest. No allowance for delinquent notes receivable from participants has been recorded as of December 31, 2024 and 2023. Delinquent notes receivable from participants are recorded as a distribution based upon the terms of the Plan document.

Contributions

Participant contributions, and the related Employer matching contributions, are recorded in the year in which the participant deferrals are withheld from compensation. Employer nonelective contributions are recorded as contributions once approved by the Company's board of directors for the respective Plan year.

Payment of benefits

Benefit payments are recorded when paid. There were no benefits requested before year-end that were not paid.

Subsequent events

The Plan administrator has evaluated subsequent events through September 15, 2025, the date the financial statements were available to be issued.

Effective January 1, 2025, long-term part-time employees who have completed at least 500 hours in two consecutive years are eligible to participate in the Plan.

Note 3 – Information Certified by Principal and Principal Life

The Plan administrator has elected the method of annual reporting compliance permitted by 29 CFR 2520.103-8 of the Department of Labor's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA. Accordingly, Principal and Principal Life have certified that the following data included in the accompanying financial statements and supplemental schedule of assets (held at end of year) is complete and accurate:

- Investments and notes receivable from participants as shown on the statements of net assets available for benefits as of December 31, 2024 and 2023;
- Net investment activity and interest income on notes receivable from participants as shown in the statement of changes in net assets available for benefits for the year ended December 31, 2024;
- Investment information included in the footnotes and on the supplemental schedule of assets (held at end of year) as of December 31, 2024.

The Plan's independent auditors did not perform auditing procedures with respect to this information, except for comparing such information to the related information included in the financial statements and supplemental schedule of assets (held at end of year).

Note 4 – Fair Value Measurements

Accounting guidance provides a framework for measuring fair value and provides a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. The hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (Level 1 measurements) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (Level 3 measurements). The three levels of the fair value hierarchy are described as follows:

Level 1	Unadjusted quoted prices for identical, unrestricted assets or liabilities in active markets that a plan has the ability to access.

Level 2	Quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities in active markets; quoted prices for identical or similar assets or liabilities in inactive markets; inputs other than quoted prices that are observable for the asset or liability; and inputs that are derived principally from or corroborated by observable market data by correlation or other means for substantially the full term of the assets or liabilities.
Level 3	Significant unobservable inputs.

The asset or liability's fair value measurement level within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of any input that is significant to the fair value measurement. Valuation techniques used need to maximize the use of observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs. There have been no changes in the methodologies used as of December 31, 2024 and 2023. During the year ended December 31, 2024, there were no transfers of financial instruments into or out of Level 3. Following is a description of the valuation methodologies used for assets measured at fair value:

Collective investment trust – Stated at fair value as determined by the issuer of the collective investment trust based on the fair market value of the underlying investments, which is valued at the net asset value (NAV) of units of the collective investment trust. The NAV is used as a practical expedient to estimate fair value. This practical expedient would not be used if it is determined to be probable that the fund will sell the investment for an amount different from the reported NAV. Participant transactions (purchases and sales) may occur daily.

Mutual funds – Valued at quoted market prices, which represent the NAV of shares held by the Plan at year-end.

Pooled separate account – Stated at fair value as determined by the issuer of the pooled separate account based on the fair market value of the underlying investments, which is valued at the NAV of units of the pooled separate account. The NAV is used as a practical expedient to estimate fair value. This practical expedient would not be used if it is determined to be probable that the fund will sell the investment for an amount different from the reported NAV. Participant transactions (purchases and sales) may occur daily.

The preceding methods described may produce a fair value calculation that may not be indicative of net realizable value or reflective of future fair values. Furthermore, although the Plan believes its valuation methods are appropriate and consistent with other market participants, the use of different methodologies or assumptions to determine the fair value of certain financial instruments could result in a different fair value measurement at the reporting date.

Note 6 – Fully Benefit Responsive Investment Contract

The Plan holds a traditional guaranteed investment contract issued by Principal Life. This contract meets the fully benefit responsive investment contract criteria and therefore is reported at contract value. Contract value is the relevant measure for fully benefit responsive investment contracts because this is the amount received by the participants if they were to initiate permitted transactions under the terms of the contract. Contract value represents contributions made under the contract, plus earnings, less participant withdrawals, and administrative expenses.

Principal Life is contractually obligated to repay the principal and interest at a specified interest rate that is guaranteed to the Plan. The crediting rate is based on a formula established by Principal Life but may not be less than 1% or greater than 3%. The crediting rate is reviewed on a semi-annual basis for resetting. The contract cannot be terminated before the scheduled maturity date.

The Plan's ability to receive amounts due in accordance with the fully benefit responsive investment contract is dependent on Principal Life's ability to meet its financial obligations. Principal Life's ability to meet its contraction obligations may be affected by future economic and regulatory developments.

Certain events might limit the ability of the Plan to transact at contract value with Principal Life. Examples of such events include, but are not limited to the following:

- Transfers in excess of 10% of the accumulated Plan sponsor's transfer percentage as of the date of the transfer
- Annual withdrawals exceed 20% of the account balance
- Premature termination of the contract
- Plan termination or merger

No events are probable of occurring that might limit the ability of the Plan to transact at contract value with Principal Life and that also would limit the ability of the Plan to transact at contract value with the participants.

Note 7 – Related Party and Party-in-Interest Transactions

Certain administrative functions are performed by officers and employees of the Company. No officer or employee receives compensation from the Plan for these services. Certain administrative expenses, totaling approximately \$63,300, were paid by the Company on behalf of the Plan for the year ended December 31, 2024. The Company does not expect reimbursement from the Plan for these expenses.

Certain investments are managed or issued by Principal and Principal Life. The Plan also holds notes receivable from participants. These transactions qualify as party-in-interest transactions.

Certain fees incurred by the Plan are included in net appreciation in fair value of investments. The Plan also made direct payments to service providers.

Note 8 – Plan Termination

Although it has not expressed any intent to do so, the Company has the right under the Plan to discontinue its contributions at any time and to terminate the Plan subject to the provisions of ERISA. In the event of Plan termination, participants would become 100% vested in the Employer contribution portion of their accounts.

Note 9 – Tax Status

The Company adopted a preapproved profit sharing plan (the Preapproved Plan) sponsored by Principal Life. The Internal Revenue Service has determined and informed the Preapproved Plan sponsor by a favorable opinion letter dated June 30, 2020, that the Preapproved Plan is designed in accordance with the applicable sections of the Code. The Preapproved Plan's opinion letter is being relied on by the Plan. Although the Plan has been amended since receiving the opinion letter, Plan management believes the Plan is designed and is currently being operated in compliance with the applicable requirements of the Code and, therefore, believes that the Plan is qualified and the related trust is tax-exempt. The Plan administrator has indicated that it will take the necessary steps, if any, to maintain the Plan's tax-exempt status.

Note 10 – Risks and Uncertainties

The Plan invests in various investment securities. Investment securities are exposed to various risks, such as interest rate, market and credit risks. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investment securities, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in the values of investment securities will occur in the near term and that such changes could materially affect participant account balances and the amounts reported on the statements of net assets available for benefits.

The Plan is exposed to concentration risk in that the Principal Life Fixed Income Guaranteed Option represents 32% of the Plan's net assets available for benefits as of December 31, 2024 and 2023.

Scope and Nature of the ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) Audit

We have performed audits of the financial statements of Quality Sausage Company LLC 401(k) Defined Contribution Plan (the Plan), an employee benefit plan subject to the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (ERISA), as permitted by ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) (ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) audit). The financial statements comprise the statements of net assets available for benefits as of December 31, 2024 and 2023, the related statement of changes in net assets available for benefits for the year ended December 31, 2024, and the related notes to the financial statements.

Management, having determined it is permissible in the circumstances, has elected to have the audits of the Plan's financial statements performed in accordance with ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) pursuant to 29 CFR 2520.103-8 of the Department of Labor's (DOL) Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA. As permitted by ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C), our audits need not extend to any statements or information related to assets held for investment of the Plan (investment information) by a bank or similar institution or insurance carrier that is regulated, supervised, and subject to periodic examination by a state or federal agency, provided that the statements or information regarding assets so held are prepared and certified to by the bank or similar institution or insurance carrier in accordance with 29 CFR 2520.103-5 of the DOL's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA (qualified institution).

Management has obtained certifications from qualified institutions, as of December 31, 2024 and 2023, and for the year ended December 31, 2024, stating that the certified investment information, as described in Note 3 to the financial statements, is complete and accurate.

Opinion

In our opinion, based on our audits and on the procedures performed as described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements section:

- The amounts and disclosures in the accompanying financial statements, other than those agreed to or derived from the certified investment information, are presented fairly, in all material respects, in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America (U.S. GAAP).
- The information in the accompanying financial statements related to assets held by and certified to by qualified institutions agrees to, or is derived from, in all material respects, the information prepared and certified by institutions that management determined meets the requirements of ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C).

Basis for Opinion

We conducted our audits in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America (GAAS). Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements section of our report. We are required to be independent of the Plan and to meet our other ethical responsibilities, in accordance with the relevant ethical requirements relating to our audits. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) audit opinion.

Responsibilities of Management for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in accordance with U.S. GAAP, and for the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error. Management's election of the ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) audit does not affect management's responsibility for the financial statements.

In preparing the financial statements, management is required to evaluate whether there are conditions or events, considered in the aggregate, that raise substantial doubt about the Plan's ability to continue as a going concern within one year after the date that the financial statements are issued or available to be issued.

Management is also responsible for maintaining a current plan instrument, including all plan amendments, administering the Plan, and determining that the Plan's transactions that are presented and disclosed in the financial statements are in conformity with the Plan's provisions, including maintaining sufficient records with respect to each of the participants, to determine the benefits due or which may become due to such participants.

Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements

Except as described in the Scope and Nature of the ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) Audit section of our report, our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance but is not absolute assurance and therefore is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with GAAS will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control. - Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error, and design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks. - Conclude whether, in our judgment, there are conditions or events, considered in the aggregate, that raise substantial doubt about the Plan's ability to continue as a going concern for a reasonable period of time.

Our audits did not extend to the certified investment information, except for obtaining and reading the certification, comparing the certified investment information with the related information presented and disclosed in the financial statements, and reading the disclosures relating to the certified investment information to assess whether they are in accordance with the presentation and disclosure requirements of U.S. GAAP.

Accordingly, the objective of an ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) audit is not to express an opinion about whether the financial statements as a whole are presented fairly, in all material respects, in accordance with U.S. GAAP.

We are required to communicate with those charged with governance regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit, significant audit findings, and certain internal control-related matters that we identified during the audit.

Other Matter – Supplemental Information Required by ERISA

The supplemental information, schedule of assets (held at end of year) as of December 31, 2024, is presented for purposes of additional analysis and is not a required part of the financial statements but is supplementary information required by the DOL's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA. Such information is the responsibility of management and was derived from and relates directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements. The supplemental information, other than that agreed to or derived from the certified investment information, has been subjected to auditing procedures applied in the audit of the financial statements and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements or to the financial statements themselves, and other additional procedures in accordance with GAAS. For information included in the supplemental information that agreed to or is derived from the certified investment information, we compared such information to the related certified investment information.

In forming our opinion on the supplemental information, we evaluated whether the supplemental information, other than the information agreed to or derived from the certified investment information, including its form and content, is presented in conformity with the DOL's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA.

In our opinion:

- The form and content of the supplemental information, other than the information in the supplemental information that agreed to or is derived from the certified investment information, are presented, in all material respects, in conformity with the DOL's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA.
- The information in the supplemental information related to assets held by and certified to by qualified institutions agrees to, or is derived from, in all material respects, the information prepared and certified by institutions that management determined meets the requirements of ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C).

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

December 31, 2024 and 2023

Note 1 – Description of the Plan

Quality Sausage Company LLC (the Company or Employer) sponsors the Quality Sausage Company LLC 401(k) Defined Contribution Plan (the Plan). The following description provides only general information. Participants should refer to the Plan document for a more complete description of the Plan's provisions.

General

The Plan is a defined contribution plan established for the benefit of the Company's employees, except for those not employed as salaried class or hourly class. The Plan is subject to the provisions of the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (ERISA).

The 401(k) Administrative Committee is responsible for the oversight of the Plan. Delaware Charter Guarantee and Trust Company d/b/a Principal Trust Company (Principal) serves as the trustee of the Plan, maintains the records of the participant data, and holds the Plan assets. Principal Life Insurance Company (Principal Life), an affiliate of Principal, issues the guaranteed investment contract held by the Plan.

Eligibility

Nonexcluded employees who have completed 90 days of service are eligible to participate in the Plan. Leased employees who complete one year of service, as defined in the Plan document, are considered employees and are eligible to participate in the Plan. Effective January 1, 2024, long-term part-time employees who complete at least 500 hours of service in three consecutive years are also eligible to participate in the Plan. Participants are automatically enrolled in the Plan on the first day of the month after satisfying eligibility requirements.

Contributions

Participants may contribute up to 100% of their compensation, as defined in the Plan document, as either pretax or Roth deferrals. Participants who have attained age 50 before the end of the Plan year are eligible to make catch-up contributions. Participants may also contribute amounts representing distributions from other qualified plans.

Eligible employees are automatically enrolled in the Plan with a 6% deferral rate. Deferral rates are increased annually by 1% until 10% is reached, unless the participant elects otherwise. Eligible employees who do not wish to participate in the Plan may affirmatively elect to opt out, or they may elect a different deferral percentage.

The Plan also provides for Employer safe harbor matching contributions of 100% of deferrals up to 2% and 50% of deferrals between 2% and 7% of a participant's compensation.

The Plan also provides for discretionary additional Employer matching contributions up to 4% of participant's compensation. There were no additional Employer matching contributions for the year ended December 31, 2024.

Additional amounts may be contributed by the Employer under the Plan's nonelective provisions at the discretion of the Company's board of directors. Unless termination is due to death, disability, or retirement, participants must be employed on the last day of the Plan year to receive an allocation of Employer nonelective contributions. Allocations of Employer nonelective contributions are based on the proportion of each participant's compensation to the total of all eligible participants' compensation. There were no Employer nonelective contributions for the year ended December 31, 2024.

Participants direct the investment of their contributions into various investment options offered by the Plan. Contributions are subject to certain limitations of the Internal Revenue Code (the Code).

Participant accounts

Each participant's account is credited with participant contributions, Employer matching contributions, and allocations of Employer nonelective contributions and Plan earnings. Participant accounts are charged with an allocation of administrative expenses that are paid by the Plan. Allocations are based on participant earnings, account balances, or specific participant transactions, as defined in the Plan document. The benefit to which a participant is entitled is the benefit that can be provided from the participant's vested account.

Vesting

Participants are vested immediately in their contributions plus actual earnings thereon. Participants become fully vested in Employer safe harbor matching contributions after two years of continuous service.

Vesting in discretionary Employer contributions is based upon years of continuous service as follows:

<u>Years of service</u>	<u>Vesting percentage</u>
Less than one year	0%
One, but less than two	33%
Two, but less than three	66%
Three years or more	100%

Participants automatically become 100% vested upon normal retirement (attainment of age 65), disability, death, or early retirement (attainment of age 59½). Participants who terminate for any other reason are entitled to the vested amount of their accounts.

Notes receivable from participants

Participants may borrow from their vested accounts a minimum of \$1,000 up to a maximum equal to the lesser of \$50,000, reduced by the excess of the highest outstanding loan balance during the preceding 12-month period over the loan balance on the date of the loan, or 50% of their vested account balance. The loans are secured by the balance in the participant's account and bear interest at rates that range from 5.75% to 9.50%, which is based on prime rate plus 1% on the date of origination. Prior to February 1, 2024, participants could only have one loan outstanding at any given time. Effective February 1, 2024, participants may have up to two loans outstanding at any given time. Terms range from one to five years. Principal and interest is paid ratably through payroll deductions.

Payment of benefits

Upon retirement, termination, disability, or death, a participant, or his or her beneficiary in the event of death, may elect to receive a lump-sum amount equal to the value of the participant's vested interest in his or her account. Additionally, participants may take in-service distributions upon reaching age 59½. Upon

termination, automatic distributions are required for balances of less than \$5,000. Automatic distributions above \$1,000 made without the participant's consent are rolled into an individual retirement account designated by Principal. The Plan allows hardship withdrawals, subject to account balance limits and applicable laws.

Forfeitures

Forfeitures may be used to restore participant balances previously forfeited, to pay Plan administrative expenses, to reduce Employer contributions, or may be allocated to participants as an additional Employer contribution. There was \$140 and \$0 of unallocated forfeitures as of December 31, 2024 and 2023, respectively. For the year ended December 31, 2024, forfeitures in the amount of \$7,736 and \$45,208 were used to pay Plan administrative expenses and to reduce Employer contributions.

Administrative expenses

The Plan allows certain administrative expenses to be paid from Plan assets. Investment expenses netted against investment income represent amounts associated with the net expense ratios of the investments in the Plan's fund lineup.

Note 2 – Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Basis of accounting

The financial statements of the Plan have been prepared on the accrual basis of accounting in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America (U.S. GAAP).

Use of estimates

The preparation of the financial statements in conformity with U.S. GAAP requires Plan management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and changes therein, and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Investment valuation and income recognition

Investments are reported at fair value, except for fully benefit responsive investment contracts, which are reported at contract value. Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. Plan management determines the valuation policies utilizing information provided by Principal and Principal Life. See Note 4 for discussion of fair value measurements and Note 6 for contract value measurements.

Purchases and sales of securities are recorded on a trade-date basis. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Dividends are recorded on the ex-dividend date. Net appreciation includes the Plan's gains and losses on investments bought and sold, as well as held during the year.

Notes receivable from participants

Notes receivable from participants are measured at their unpaid principal balance plus any accrued but unpaid interest. No allowance for delinquent notes receivable from participants has been recorded as of December 31, 2024 and 2023. Delinquent notes receivable from participants are recorded as a distribution based upon the terms of the Plan document.

Contributions

Participant contributions, and the related Employer matching contributions, are recorded in the year in which the participant deferrals are withheld from compensation. Employer nonelective contributions are recorded as contributions once approved by the Company's board of directors for the respective Plan year.

Payment of benefits

Benefit payments are recorded when paid. There were no benefits requested before year-end that were not paid.

Subsequent events

The Plan administrator has evaluated subsequent events through September 15, 2025, the date the financial statements were available to be issued.

Effective January 1, 2025, long-term part-time employees who have completed at least 500 hours in two consecutive years are eligible to participate in the Plan.

Note 3 – Information Certified by Principal and Principal Life

The Plan administrator has elected the method of annual reporting compliance permitted by 29 CFR 2520.103-8 of the Department of Labor's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA. Accordingly, Principal and Principal Life have certified that the following data included in the accompanying financial statements and supplemental schedule of assets (held at end of year) is complete and accurate:

- Investments and notes receivable from participants as shown on the statements of net assets available for benefits as of December 31, 2024 and 2023;
- Net investment activity and interest income on notes receivable from participants as shown in the statement of changes in net assets available for benefits for the year ended December 31, 2024;
- Investment information included in the footnotes and on the supplemental schedule of assets (held at end of year) as of December 31, 2024.

The Plan's independent auditors did not perform auditing procedures with respect to this information, except for comparing such information to the related information included in the financial statements and supplemental schedule of assets (held at end of year).

Note 4 – Fair Value Measurements

Accounting guidance provides a framework for measuring fair value and provides a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. The hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (Level 1 measurements) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (Level 3 measurements). The three levels of the fair value hierarchy are described as follows:

Level 1	Unadjusted quoted prices for identical, unrestricted assets or liabilities in active markets that a plan has the ability to access.
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Level 2	Quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities in active markets; quoted prices for identical or similar assets or liabilities in inactive markets; inputs other than quoted prices that are observable for the asset or liability; and inputs that are derived principally from or corroborated by observable market data by correlation or other means for substantially the full term of the assets or liabilities.
Level 3	Significant unobservable inputs.

The asset or liability's fair value measurement level within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of any input that is significant to the fair value measurement. Valuation techniques used need to maximize the use of observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs. There have been no changes in the methodologies used as of December 31, 2024 and 2023. During the year ended December 31, 2024, there were no transfers of financial instruments into or out of Level 3. Following is a description of the valuation methodologies used for assets measured at fair value:

Collective investment trust – Stated at fair value as determined by the issuer of the collective investment trust based on the fair market value of the underlying investments, which is valued at the net asset value (NAV) of units of the collective investment trust. The NAV is used as a practical expedient to estimate fair value. This practical expedient would not be used if it is determined to be probable that the fund will sell the investment for an amount different from the reported NAV. Participant transactions (purchases and sales) may occur daily.

Mutual funds – Valued at quoted market prices, which represent the NAV of shares held by the Plan at year-end.

Pooled separate account – Stated at fair value as determined by the issuer of the pooled separate account based on the fair market value of the underlying investments, which is valued at the NAV of units of the pooled separate account. The NAV is used as a practical expedient to estimate fair value. This practical expedient would not be used if it is determined to be probable that the fund will sell the investment for an amount different from the reported NAV. Participant transactions (purchases and sales) may occur daily.

The preceding methods described may produce a fair value calculation that may not be indicative of net realizable value or reflective of future fair values. Furthermore, although the Plan believes its valuation methods are appropriate and consistent with other market participants, the use of different methodologies or assumptions to determine the fair value of certain financial instruments could result in a different fair value measurement at the reporting date.

Note 6 – Fully Benefit Responsive Investment Contract

The Plan holds a traditional guaranteed investment contract issued by Principal Life. This contract meets the fully benefit responsive investment contract criteria and therefore is reported at contract value. Contract value is the relevant measure for fully benefit responsive investment contracts because this is the amount received by the participants if they were to initiate permitted transactions under the terms of the contract. Contract value represents contributions made under the contract, plus earnings, less participant withdrawals, and administrative expenses.

Principal Life is contractually obligated to repay the principal and interest at a specified interest rate that is guaranteed to the Plan. The crediting rate is based on a formula established by Principal Life but may not be less than 1% or greater than 3%. The crediting rate is reviewed on a semi-annual basis for resetting. The contract cannot be terminated before the scheduled maturity date.

The Plan's ability to receive amounts due in accordance with the fully benefit responsive investment contract is dependent on Principal Life's ability to meet its financial obligations. Principal Life's ability to meet its contraction obligations may be affected by future economic and regulatory developments.

Certain events might limit the ability of the Plan to transact at contract value with Principal Life. Examples of such events include, but are not limited to the following:

- Transfers in excess of 10% of the accumulated Plan sponsor's transfer percentage as of the date of the transfer
- Annual withdrawals exceed 20% of the account balance
- Premature termination of the contract
- Plan termination or merger

No events are probable of occurring that might limit the ability of the Plan to transact at contract value with Principal Life and that also would limit the ability of the Plan to transact at contract value with the participants.

Note 7 – Related Party and Party-in-Interest Transactions

Certain administrative functions are performed by officers and employees of the Company. No officer or employee receives compensation from the Plan for these services. Certain administrative expenses, totaling approximately \$63,300, were paid by the Company on behalf of the Plan for the year ended December 31, 2024. The Company does not expect reimbursement from the Plan for these expenses.

Certain investments are managed or issued by Principal and Principal Life. The Plan also holds notes receivable from participants. These transactions qualify as party-in-interest transactions.

Certain fees incurred by the Plan are included in net appreciation in fair value of investments. The Plan also made direct payments to service providers.

Note 8 – Plan Termination

Although it has not expressed any intent to do so, the Company has the right under the Plan to discontinue its contributions at any time and to terminate the Plan subject to the provisions of ERISA. In the event of Plan termination, participants would become 100% vested in the Employer contribution portion of their accounts.

Note 9 – Tax Status

The Company adopted a preapproved profit sharing plan (the Preapproved Plan) sponsored by Principal Life. The Internal Revenue Service has determined and informed the Preapproved Plan sponsor by a favorable opinion letter dated June 30, 2020, that the Preapproved Plan is designed in accordance with the applicable sections of the Code. The Preapproved Plan's opinion letter is being relied on by the Plan. Although the Plan has been amended since receiving the opinion letter, Plan management believes the Plan is designed and is currently being operated in compliance with the applicable requirements of the Code and, therefore, believes that the Plan is qualified and the related trust is tax-exempt. The Plan administrator has indicated that it will take the necessary steps, if any, to maintain the Plan's tax-exempt status.

Note 10 – Risks and Uncertainties

The Plan invests in various investment securities. Investment securities are exposed to various risks, such as interest rate, market and credit risks. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investment securities, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in the values of investment securities will occur in the near term and that such changes could materially affect participant account balances and the amounts reported on the statements of net assets available for benefits.

The Plan is exposed to concentration risk in that the Principal Life Fixed Income Guaranteed Option represents 32% of the Plan's net assets available for benefits as of December 31, 2024 and 2023.
