NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

1. DESCRIPTION OF THE PLAN

The following description of The Tire Guys 401(k) Plan (the Plan) provides only general information. Participants should refer to the Plan agreement for a complete description of the Plan's provisions.

General The Plan is a defined contribution plan covering substantially all employees of The Tire Guys, Inc. (the Company) who have one year of service. The Plan is subject to the provisions of the *Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974* (ERISA), as amended. The Plan was originally established as of January 1, 1992, and has been subsequently amended and restated. The Plan administrator is responsible for oversight of the Plan, including the appropriateness of the Plan's investment offerings and investment performance.

Contributions Participants may elect to contribute to the Plan, in the form of pre-tax and after-tax contributions up to the lesser of 75% of their eligible compensation or the maximum amount allowable by law. Participants who have attained age 50 before the end of the Plan year are eligible to make catch-up contributions. Participants may also contribute amounts representing distributions from other qualified retirement plans. Participants direct the investment of their contributions into various investment options offered by the Plan. Effective January 1, 2024, the Company makes safe harbor matching contributions equal to 100% of the first 3% of the eligible participant's compensation contributed to the Plan and 50% of the next 2% of the eligible participants compensation contributed to the Plan. Prior to January 1, 2024, the Company made safe harbor nonelective contributions equal to 3% of eligible compensation for each qualifying participant. The Company made safe harbor matching contributions of \$332,309 for the year ended December 31, 2024, and safe harbor nonelective contributions of \$485,874 for the year ended December 31, 2023. Additionally, each year, at the option of the Company's Board of Directors, the Company may make a discretionary matching contribution to the Plan. For the years ended December 31, 2024 and 2023, the Board of Directors did not authorize a discretionary matching contribution. Company contributions are invested as directed by each participant. Contributions are subject to certain limitations.

Participant Accounts Each participant's account is credited with the participant's contributions, Company contributions, and account earnings, and may be charged with an allocation of administrative expenses that are paid by the Plan. The Company's allocations are based on participant earnings, account balances, or specific participant transactions, as defined. The benefit to which a participant is entitled is the benefit that can be provided from the participant's vested account.

Vesting Participants are immediately vested in their contributions, Company safe harbor matching and safe harbor nonelective contributions, and earnings thereon. Discretionary non-safe harbor matching contributions are subject to vesting. A participant is 100% vested after six years of credited service. Participants are credited with one year of service for each year of employment.

Notes Receivable From Participants Participants may borrow from their accounts a minimum of \$1,000 up to a maximum equal to the lesser of \$50,000 or 50% of their vested account balance. Note receivable repayment terms generally may not exceed five years, except in the case of the purchase of a primary residence. The notes receivable are secured by the balances in the participants' accounts. The notes receivable bear a reasonable rate of interest set at the date the note receivable is approved. Principal and interest are paid ratably through bi-weekly payroll deductions. Additionally, participants cannot have more than one note receivable outstanding at any given time.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

(Continued)

Payment of Benefits Withdrawals are allowed in the event of termination, disability, death, retirement, or attainment of age 59½. Depending on the event, the withdrawal may be subject to early withdrawal penalties imposed by the *Internal Revenue Code* (IRC). Payments are made in the form of a lump-sum distribution or annual installments over a period of time of not more than the participant's life expectancy.

At December 31, 2024 and 2023, there were no amounts allocated to participants who elected to withdraw from the Plan but had not yet been paid.

Forfeitures Forfeitures from undeliverable distributions are retained in the Plan and may be used to pay administrative expenses or reduce Company contributions. During the Plan years ended December 31, 2024 and 2023, forfeitures of \$1,400 and \$251, respectively, were used to reduce administrative expenses. At December 31, 2024 and 2023, there were unallocated forfeitures of \$1,472 and \$833, respectively.

Plan Termination Although it has not expressed any intent to do so, the Company has the right to discontinue contributions at any time and to terminate the Plan subject to the provisions of ERISA. In the event of a plan termination, participants would become 100% vested in their Company contributions.

2. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of Accounting The Plan uses the accrual method of accounting in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America (GAAP).

Use of Estimates The preparation of financial statements in conformity with GAAP requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets, liabilities, and changes therein, and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Investment Valuation and Income Recognition Investments are reported at fair value. Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset, or paid to transfer a liability, in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. The Plan administrator determines the Plan's valuation policies utilizing information provided by the investment advisors and the trustee. Fair value measurements are discussed below.

Purchases and sales of securities are recorded on a trade-date basis. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Dividends are recorded on the ex-dividend date. Net appreciation in fair value of investments includes the Plan's gains and losses on investments purchased and sold, as well as held during the year.

Fair Value Measurements The framework for measuring fair value provides a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. The hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (level 1) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (level 3). The three levels of the fair value hierarchy are described below:

Level 1: Inputs to the valuation methodology are unadjusted quoted prices for identical assets or liabilities in active markets that the Plan has the ability to access.

Level 2: Inputs to the valuation methodology include quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities in active markets; quoted prices for identical or similar assets or liabilities in inactive markets; inputs other than quoted prices that are observable for the asset or liability; or inputs that are derived principally from, or corroborated by, observable market data by correlation or other means.

If the asset or liability has a specified (contractual) term, the level 2 input must be observable for substantially the full term of the asset or liability.

Level 3: Inputs to the valuation methodology are unobservable and significant to the fair value measurement.

The asset or liability's fair value measurement level within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of any input that is significant to the fair value measurement. Valuation techniques maximize the use of relevant observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs.

Following is a description of the valuation methodologies used for assets measured at fair value. There have been no changes in the methodologies used at December 31, 2024 and 2023.

Interest-Bearing Cash: Assets are money market mutual funds which are valued at the net asset value (NAV), generally \$1 per share, and are reported on the active market on which securities are traded.

Mutual Funds: Assets are valued at the daily closing price as reported by the fund. Mutual funds held by the Plan are open-ended mutual funds that are registered with the U.S. Securities and Exchange Commission. These funds are required to publish their daily NAV and to transact at that price. The mutual funds held by the Plan are deemed to be actively traded.

Stable Value Fund: Valued at the NAV per share as of the close of business on the valuation date. The NAV is used as a practical expedient to estimate fair value. The NAV is based on the fair value of the underlying investments held by the fund less its liabilities.

See note 4 for the classification of these assets within the fair value hierarchy.

The methods described above may produce a fair value calculation that may not be indicative of net realizable value or reflective of future fair values. Furthermore, while the Plan believes its valuation methods are appropriate and consistent with other market participants, the use of different methodologies or assumptions to determine the fair value of certain financial instruments could result in a different fair value measurement at the reporting date.

Notes Receivable From Participants Notes receivable from participants are measured at their unpaid principal balance plus any accrued but unpaid interest. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Fees related to the administration of notes receivable from participants are charged directly to the participant's account and are included in administrative expenses. Delinquent participant notes receivable are recorded as distributions in accordance with the terms of the Plan agreement.

Payment of Benefits Benefits are recorded when paid.

Expenses Certain operating expenses of the Plan are deducted from participant accounts and the remaining expenses are paid by the Company. Expenses that are paid by the Company are excluded from these financial statements. Investment-related expenses are included in net appreciation in fair value of investments.

Evaluation of Subsequent Events The Plan has evaluated subsequent events through September 26, 2025, the date the financial statements were available to be issued.

3. INFORMATION CERTIFIED BY TRUSTEE

The Plan administrator has elected the method of compliance permitted by 29 CFR 2520.103-8 of the Department of Labor's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA. Accordingly, as permitted under such an election, the investments and notes receivable from participants included in the statements of net assets available for benefits, and the investment income (loss) and interest income on notes receivable from participants included in the statements of changes in net assets available for benefits as of and for the years ended December 31, 2024 and 2023, were not subject to auditing procedures and have been certified as complete and accurate by Fidelity Management Trust Company (Fidelity). Fidelity is a qualified institution that prepared and certified the information in accordance with 29 CFR 2520.103-5.

5. RELATED-PARTY AND PARTY-IN-INTEREST TRANSACTIONS

The Company is the administrator of the Plan. The Plan's administrator may designate other persons to carry out the day-to-day operations of the Plan. The Plan has an investment contract with Fidelity. Fidelity, as the Plan's broker, qualifies as a party in interest with respect to the investments managed by them; however, they are exempt from the prohibited transaction rules under ERISA. Fees paid by the Plan for investment management services amounted to \$28,046 and \$23,476 for the years ended December 31, 2024 and 2023, respectively. The Plan paid fees to DA Davidson & Company for consulting services amounting to \$31,753 and \$28,368 for the years ended December 31, 2024 and 2023, respectively.

6. TAX STATUS

The Plan has adopted a pre-approved non-standardized profit sharing plan established by Fidelity. The pre-approved plan obtained an opinion letter on June 30, 2020, in which the Internal Revenue Service stated that the form of the pre-approved plan, as then designed, was acceptable under Section 401 of the IRC. Although the Plan has been amended since adopting the pre-approved plan, the Plan administrator believes that the Plan is currently designed and operating in compliance with the applicable requirements of the IRC. Therefore, they believe that the Plan is qualified and the related trust is tax exempt.

7. RISKS AND UNCERTAINTIES

The Plan invests in various investment securities. Investment securities are exposed to various risks such as interest rate, market, and credit risks. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investment securities, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in the values of investment securities will occur in the near term, and that such changes could materially affect participants' account balances and the amounts reported in the statements of net assets available for benefits.

8. PLAN AMENDMENTS

Effective January 1, 2024, the Plan was amended to change from Company safe harbor nonelective contributions to Company safe harbor matching contributions. The Company makes safe harbor matching contributions equal to 100% of the first 3% of the eligible participant's compensation contributed to the Plan and 50% of the next 2% of the eligible participant's compensation contributed to the Plan.

As permitted by ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C), our audits need not extend to any statements or information related to assets held for investment of the Plan (investment information) by a bank or similar institution or insurance carrier that is regulated, supervised, and subject to periodic examination by a state or federal agency, provided that the statements or information regarding assets so held are prepared and certified to by the bank or similar institution or insurance carrier in accordance with 29 CFR 2520.103-5 of the DOL's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA (qualified institution).

1. DESCRIPTION OF THE PLAN

The following description of The Tire Guys 401(k) Plan (the Plan) provides only general information. Participants should refer to the Plan agreement for a complete description of the Plan's provisions.

General The Plan is a defined contribution plan covering substantially all employees of The Tire Guys, Inc. (the Company) who have one year of service. The Plan is subject to the provisions of the *Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974* (ERISA), as amended. The Plan was originally established as of January 1, 1992, and has been subsequently amended and restated. The Plan administrator is responsible for oversight of the Plan, including the appropriateness of the Plan's investment offerings and investment performance.

Contributions Participants may elect to contribute to the Plan, in the form of pre-tax and after-tax contributions up to the lesser of 75% of their eligible compensation or the maximum amount allowable by law. Participants who have attained age 50 before the end of the Plan year are eligible to make catch-up contributions. Participants may also contribute amounts representing distributions from other qualified retirement plans. Participants direct the investment of their contributions into various investment options offered by the Plan. Effective January 1, 2024, the Company makes safe harbor matching contributions equal to 100% of the first 3% of the eligible participant's compensation contributed to the Plan and 50% of the next 2% of the eligible participants compensation contributed to the Plan. Prior to January 1, 2024, the Company made safe harbor nonelective contributions equal to 3% of eligible compensation for each qualifying participant. The Company made safe harbor matching contributions of \$332,309 for the year ended December 31, 2024, and safe harbor nonelective contributions of \$485,874 for the year ended December 31, 2023. Additionally, each year, at the option of the Company's Board of Directors, the Company may make a discretionary matching contribution to the Plan. For the years ended December 31, 2024 and 2023, the Board of Directors did not authorize a discretionary matching contribution. Company contributions are invested as directed by each participant. Contributions are subject to certain limitations.

Participant Accounts Each participant's account is credited with the participant's contributions, Company contributions, and account earnings, and may be charged with an allocation of administrative expenses that are paid by the Plan. The Company's allocations are based on participant earnings, account balances, or specific participant transactions, as defined. The benefit to which a participant is entitled is the benefit that can be provided from the participant's vested account.

Vesting Participants are immediately vested in their contributions, Company safe harbor matching and safe harbor nonelective contributions, and earnings thereon. Discretionary non-safe harbor matching contributions are subject to vesting. A participant is 100% vested after six years of credited service. Participants are credited with one year of service for each year of employment.

Notes Receivable From Participants Participants may borrow from their accounts a minimum of \$1,000 up to a maximum equal to the lesser of \$50,000 or 50% of their vested account balance. Note receivable repayment terms generally may not exceed five years, except in the case of the purchase of a primary residence. The notes receivable are secured by the balances in the participants' accounts. The notes receivable bear a reasonable rate of interest set at the date the note receivable is approved. Principal and interest are paid ratably through bi-weekly payroll deductions. Additionally, participants cannot have more than one note receivable outstanding at any given time.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Payment of Benefits Withdrawals are allowed in the event of termination, disability, death, retirement, or attainment of age 59½. Depending on the event, the withdrawal may be subject to early withdrawal penalties imposed by the *Internal Revenue Code* (IRC). Payments are made in the form of a lump-sum distribution or annual installments over a period of time of not more than the participant's life expectancy.

At December 31, 2024 and 2023, there were no amounts allocated to participants who elected to withdraw from the Plan but had not yet been paid.

Forfeitures Forfeitures from undeliverable distributions are retained in the Plan and may be used to pay administrative expenses or reduce Company contributions. During the Plan years ended December 31, 2024 and 2023, forfeitures of \$1,400 and \$251, respectively, were used to reduce administrative expenses. At December 31, 2024 and 2023, there were unallocated forfeitures of \$1,472 and \$833, respectively.

Plan Termination Although it has not expressed any intent to do so, the Company has the right to discontinue contributions at any time and to terminate the Plan subject to the provisions of ERISA. In the event of a plan termination, participants would become 100% vested in their Company contributions.

2. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of Accounting The Plan uses the accrual method of accounting in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America (GAAP).

Use of Estimates The preparation of financial statements in conformity with GAAP requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets, liabilities, and changes therein, and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Investment Valuation and Income Recognition Investments are reported at fair value. Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset, or paid to transfer a liability, in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. The Plan administrator determines the Plan's valuation policies utilizing information provided by the investment advisors and the trustee. Fair value measurements are discussed below.

Purchases and sales of securities are recorded on a trade-date basis. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Dividends are recorded on the ex-dividend date. Net appreciation in fair value of investments includes the Plan's gains and losses on investments purchased and sold, as well as held during the year.

Fair Value Measurements The framework for measuring fair value provides a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. The hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (level 1) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (level 3). The three levels of the fair value hierarchy are described below:

Level 1: Inputs to the valuation methodology are unadjusted quoted prices for identical assets or liabilities in active markets that the Plan has the ability to access.

Level 2: Inputs to the valuation methodology include quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities in active markets; quoted prices for identical or similar assets or liabilities in inactive markets; inputs other than quoted prices that are observable for the asset or liability; or inputs that are derived principally from, or corroborated by, observable market data by correlation or other means.

If the asset or liability has a specified (contractual) term, the level 2 input must be observable for substantially the full term of the asset or liability.

Level 3: Inputs to the valuation methodology are unobservable and significant to the fair value measurement.

The asset or liability's fair value measurement level within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of any input that is significant to the fair value measurement. Valuation techniques maximize the use of relevant observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs.

Following is a description of the valuation methodologies used for assets measured at fair value. There have been no changes in the methodologies used at December 31, 2024 and 2023.

Interest-Bearing Cash: Assets are money market mutual funds which are valued at the net asset value (NAV), generally \$1 per share, and are reported on the active market on which securities are traded.

Mutual Funds: Assets are valued at the daily closing price as reported by the fund. Mutual funds held by the Plan are open-ended mutual funds that are registered with the U.S. Securities and Exchange Commission. These funds are required to publish their daily NAV and to transact at that price. The mutual funds held by the Plan are deemed to be actively traded.

Stable Value Fund: Valued at the NAV per share as of the close of business on the valuation date. The NAV is used as a practical expedient to estimate fair value. The NAV is based on the fair value of the underlying investments held by the fund less its liabilities.

See note 4 for the classification of these assets within the fair value hierarchy.

The methods described above may produce a fair value calculation that may not be indicative of net realizable value or reflective of future fair values. Furthermore, while the Plan believes its valuation methods are appropriate and consistent with other market participants, the use of different methodologies or assumptions to determine the fair value of certain financial instruments could result in a different fair value measurement at the reporting date.

Notes Receivable From Participants Notes receivable from participants are measured at their unpaid principal balance plus any accrued but unpaid interest. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Fees related to the administration of notes receivable from participants are charged directly to the participant's account and are included in administrative expenses. Delinquent participant notes receivable are recorded as distributions in accordance with the terms of the Plan agreement.

Payment of Benefits Benefits are recorded when paid.

Expenses Certain operating expenses of the Plan are deducted from participant accounts and the remaining expenses are paid by the Company. Expenses that are paid by the Company are excluded from these financial statements. Investment-related expenses are included in net appreciation in fair value of investments.

Evaluation of Subsequent Events The Plan has evaluated subsequent events through September 26, 2025, the date the financial statements were available to be issued.

3. INFORMATION CERTIFIED BY TRUSTEE

The Plan administrator has elected the method of compliance permitted by 29 CFR 2520.103-8 of the Department of Labor's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA. Accordingly, as permitted under such an election, the investments and notes receivable from participants included in the statements of net assets available for benefits, and the investment income (loss) and interest income on notes receivable from participants included in the statements of changes in net assets available for benefits as of and for the years ended December 31, 2024 and 2023, were not subject to auditing procedures and have been certified as complete and accurate by Fidelity Management Trust Company (Fidelity). Fidelity is a qualified institution that prepared and certified the information in accordance with 29 CFR 2520.103-5.

5. RELATED-PARTY AND PARTY-IN-INTEREST TRANSACTIONS

The Company is the administrator of the Plan. The Plan's administrator may designate other persons to carry out the day-to-day operations of the Plan. The Plan has an investment contract with Fidelity. Fidelity, as the Plan's broker, qualifies as a party in interest with respect to the investments managed by them; however, they are exempt from the prohibited transaction rules under ERISA. Fees paid by the Plan for investment management services amounted to \$28,046 and \$23,476 for the years ended December 31, 2024 and 2023, respectively. The Plan paid fees to DA Davidson & Company for consulting services amounting to \$31,753 and \$28,368 for the years ended December 31, 2024 and 2023, respectively.

6. TAX STATUS

The Plan has adopted a pre-approved non-standardized profit sharing plan established by Fidelity. The pre-approved plan obtained an opinion letter on June 30, 2020, in which the Internal Revenue Service stated that the form of the pre-approved plan, as then designed, was acceptable under Section 401 of the IRC. Although the Plan has been amended since adopting the pre-approved plan, the Plan administrator believes that the Plan is currently designed and operating in compliance with the applicable requirements of the IRC. Therefore, they believe that the Plan is qualified and the related trust is tax exempt.

7. RISKS AND UNCERTAINTIES

The Plan invests in various investment securities. Investment securities are exposed to various risks such as interest rate, market, and credit risks. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investment securities, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in the values of investment securities will occur in the near term, and that such changes could materially affect participants' account balances and the amounts reported in the statements of net assets available for benefits.

8. PLAN AMENDMENTS

Effective January 1, 2024, the Plan was amended to change from Company safe harbor nonelective contributions to Company safe harbor matching contributions. The Company makes safe harbor matching contributions equal to 100% of the first 3% of the eligible participant's compensation contributed to the Plan and 50% of the next 2% of the eligible participant's compensation contributed to the Plan.
