Scope and Nature of the ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) Audit

We have performed an audit of the financial statements of Forever 401(k) Plan, an employee benefit plan subject to the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (ERISA), as permitted by ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) (ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) audit). The financial statements comprise the statements of net assets available for benefits as of December 31, 2024 and 2023, and the related statement of changes in net assets available for benefits for the December 31, 2024 year then ended, and the related notes to the financial statements.

Management, having determined it is permissible in the circumstances, has elected to have the audit of Forever 401(k) Plan's financial statements performed in accordance with ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) pursuant to 29 CFR 2520.103-8 of the Department of Labor's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA. As permitted by ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C), our audit need not extend to any statements or information related to assets held for investment of the plan (investment information) by a bank or similar institution or insurance carrier that is regulated, supervised, and subject to periodic examination by a state or federal agency, provided that the statements or information regarding assets so held are prepared and certified to by the bank or similar institution or insurance carrier in accordance with 29 CFR 2520.103-5 of the Department of Labor's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA (qualified institution).

Management has obtained a certification from a qualified institution as of and for the years ended December 31, 2024 and 2023, stating that the certified investment information, as described in Note 5 to the financial statements, is complete and accurate.

Opinion

In our opinion, based on our audit and on the procedures performed as described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements section -

- the information in the financial statements related to assets held by and certified to by a qualified institution agrees to, or is derived from, in all material respects, the information prepared and certified by an institution that management determined meets the requirements of ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C).

Basis for Opinion

We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements section of our report. We are required to be independent of Forever 401(k) Plan and to meet our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with the relevant ethical requirements relating to our audit. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) audit opinion.

Responsibilities of Management for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America, and for the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error. Management's election of the ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) audit does not affect management's responsibility for the financial statements.

Note 1: Description of Plan

The following description of the Forever 401(k) Plan ("Plan") provides only general information. Participants should refer to the Plan agreement for a more complete description of the Plan's provisions.

General

The Plan is a defined contribution plan covering substantially all full-time employees of the Company who have six months of service and are age eighteen or older. The Plan was effective in November 1996 and qualifies under the Internal Revenue Code as a 401(k) plan. It is subject to the provisions of the Employment Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (ERISA).

Contributions

Each year, participants may elect to make pretax or Roth contributions to the Plan up to 90% of their eligible compensation as defined in the Plan up to the IRS determined annual limits. Effective February 1, 2023, all new eligible participants will be auto enrolled into the Plan with a 2% pre-tax deferral, unless otherwise elected. Participants who have attained age 50 before the end of the Plan year are eligible to make catch-up contributions. Participants may also contribute amounts representing distributions from other qualified defined benefit or contribution plans. Participants direct the investment of their contributions into various investment options offered by the Plan. A discretionary matching and/or a nonelective contribution may be made at the option of the employer.

Administrative Expenses

Certain plan administrative expenses are paid directly by the Plan Sponsor, as provided in the Plan agreement. The Plan is administered by the Plan Sponsor. Certain administrative functions are performed by officers or employees of the Plan Sponsor. No such officer or employee receives compensation from the Plan.

Participant Accounts

Each participant's account is credited with the participant's contributions, employer's contributions, and Plan earnings. Allocations are based on participant earnings or account balances, as defined in the Plan agreement.

Vesting

Participants are immediately vested in their contributions plus actual earnings thereon. Vesting in the Company's discretionary matching and nonelective contribution portion of their accounts plus actual earnings are based on years of continuous service as shown in the schedule below.

Forfeited Accounts

At December 31, 2024 and 2023, forfeited nonvested accounts totaled \$501 and \$1,782, respectively. These accounts will be used to pay administrative expenses and reduce future employer contributions. In 2024, \$1,433 in forfeitures were used by the Company to pay administrative expenses.

Investment Options

Under the Plan, a participant instructs Fidelity as to the investment of the participant's contributions. Participants may change their investment elections at any time. Transfers of account balances between elected investment options may also be made at any time.

Notes Receivable from Participants

Participants may borrow from their fund accounts a minimum of \$1,000 up to a maximum equal to the lesser of \$50,000 or 50% of their vested account balance. Borrowings are secured by the balance in the participant's account and bear interest at rates that range from 4.25% to 9.50% at December 31, 2024, which are commensurate with local prevailing rates as determined by the plan administrator. Principal and interest are paid ratably through payroll deductions. Interest received on participant's notes for the year ended December 31, 2024 totaled \$1,804. Loan terms range from 1 to 5 years, or a reasonable period of time longer than 5 years for a purchase of a principal residence. Notes receivable are stated at their unpaid principal balance plus accrued, but unpaid, interest.

Payment of Benefits

The Plan allows for distributions upon termination of service, death, disability, or retirement. The Plan allows for in-service withdrawals upon attainment of age 59½ or certain hardship situations. On termination of service, a participant (or designated beneficiary) may elect to receive an amount equal to the value of the participant's vested interest in their account. A participant may elect to receive a lump sum payment or may roll over the value of their account into another qualified plan. Vested participants who separate from employment with the Plan Sponsor, and whose account is more than de minimis, may elect to leave their funds in the Plan. As of December 31, 2024 and 2023, the de minimis amount was \$5,000.

Hardship Withdrawals

The Plan allows, in certain hardship situations as defined in the Plan, participants to withdraw part or all of their deferral contributions while actively employed. These hardship withdrawals are subject to IRC restrictions and penalties.

Secure Act and Secure Act 2.0

The Plan is currently working with their third party administrator to ensure compliance and any required plan changes are made to comply with the Secure Act and the Secure Act 2.0.

Note 2: Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America ("GAAP") requires the plan administrator to make

Use of Estimates (Continued)

estimates and assumptions that affect certain reported amounts of assets and liabilities and changes therein, and disclosures of contingent assets and liabilities. Accordingly, actual results may differ from those estimates.

Valuation of Investments

Investments are reported at fair value and are stated at current quoted market values, which represent the net asset value of shares held by the Plan at year end. The change in the difference between current market value and cost is reported in the Statement of Changes in Net Assets Available for Benefits as net appreciation in fair value of assets. See Note 3 for a discussion of fair value measurements.

The net appreciation in fair value of assets is reported as the change in the difference between the current market value and the prior year's market value adjusted for purchases and sales.

Notes Receivable from Participants

Notes receivable from participants are measured at their unpaid principal balance plus accrued, but unpaid, interest. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Related fees are recorded as administrative expenses and are expensed when they are incurred. No allowance for credit losses has been recorded as of December 31, 2024 or 2023. If a participant does not make loan repayments and the plan administrator considers the participant loan to be in default, the loan balance is reduced, and the delinquent participant note receivable is recorded as a benefit payment based on the terms of the Plan document.

Payment of Benefits

Benefits are recorded when paid.

Basis of Accounting

The financial statements of the Plan are prepared under the accrual basis of accounting.

Operating Expenses

Certain expenses of maintaining the Plan are paid by the Company and are excluded from the financial statements. Investment related expenses are included in net appreciation in fair value of assets. Fees for the administration of notes receivable from participants are charged directly to the participant's account.

Note 3: Fair Value Measurement

The Plan's investments are reported at fair value in the accompanying Statements of Net Assets Available for Benefits. The methods used to measure fair value may produce an amount that may not be indicative of net realizable value or reflective of future fair values. Furthermore, although the Plan believes its valuation methods are appropriate and consistent with other market participants, the use of different methodologies or assumptions to determine the fair value of certain financial instruments could result in a different fair value measurement at the reporting date.

Note 3: Fair Value Measurement (Continued)

The fair value measurement accounting literature establishes a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. This hierarchy consists of three broad levels: Level 1 inputs consist of unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets and have the highest priority, and Level 3 inputs are unobservable and have the lowest priority. The Plan uses appropriate valuation techniques based on the available inputs to measure the fair value of its investments. When available, the Plan measures fair value using Level 1 inputs because they generally provide the most reliable evidence of fair value. No Level 2 or 3 inputs were available to the Plan.

The Plan's policy is to recognize transfer of investments into or out of Level 3 as of the date of the event or change in circumstances that caused the transfer. For the years ended December 31, 2024 and 2023, there were no transfers of investments into or out of Level 3.

Level 1 Fair Value Measurements

The fair value of registered investment companies is based on quoted net asset values of the shares held by the Plan at year-end. Money market funds consist of short-term securities representing high quality, liquid debt and monetary instruments.

Note 4: Tax Status

The Internal Revenue Service has determined and informed the Company by a letter dated June 30, 2020 that the Plan and related trust are designed in accordance with applicable sections of the Internal Revenue Code (IRC). The Plan has been amended since receiving the determination letter. However, the Plan administrator and the Plan's tax counsel believe that the Plan is designed and is currently being operated in compliance with the applicable requirements of the IRC.

Note 4: Tax Status (Continued)

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require plan management to evaluate tax positions taken by the Plan and recognize a tax liability (or asset) if the organization has taken an uncertain position that more likely than not would not be sustained upon examination. The plan administrator has analyzed the tax positions taken by the Plan, and has concluded that as of December 31, 2024, there are no uncertain positions taken or expected to be taken that would require recognition of a liability (or asset) or disclosure in the financial statements. The Plan is subject to routine audits by taxing jurisdictions; however, there are currently no audits for any tax periods in progress. The plan administrator believes the Plan is no longer subject to income tax examinations for years prior to 2021.

Note 5: Information Prepared and Certified by Trustee

The plan administrator has elected the method of compliance as permitted by 29 CFR 2520.103-8 of the Department of Labor's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA for 2024 and 2023. Accordingly, Fidelity Management Trust Company, the trustee of the Plan, has certified to the completeness and accuracy of all investments and notes receivable from participants reported in the accompanying Statements of Net Assets Available for Benefits as of December 31, 2024 and 2023 and the supplemental Schedule H, Line 4i - Schedule of Assets (Held at End of Year) as of December 31, 2024, and the related investment activity and interest on participant notes reported in the Statement of Changes in Net Assets Available for Benefits for the year ended December 31, 2024.

Note 7: Plan Termination

Although it has not expressed any intentions to do so, the Company has the right under the Plan to discontinue its contributions at any time, and to terminate the Plan subject to the provisions of ERISA. In the event of Plan termination, participants would become fully vested in their accrued benefits.

Note 8: Separated Participants

Amounts allocated to withdrawing participants are recorded on the Schedule H of Form 5500 for benefit claims that have been processed and approved for payment prior to December 31 but not yet paid as of that date.

Note 9: Related Party Transactions

Certain Plan investments are shares of mutual funds managed by Fidelity Management Trust Company. Fidelity Management Trust Company is the trustee as defined by the Plan and, therefore, these transactions qualify as party-in-interest transactions. Fees paid by the Plan amounted to \$4,842 for the year ended December 31, 2024.

Certain administrative functions of the Plan are performed by officers or employees of the Company. No such officer or employee receives compensation from the Plan.

Note 10: Risks and Uncertainties

The Plan invests in various investment securities. Investment securities are exposed to various risks such as interest rate, market, and credit risks. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investment securities, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in the values of investment securities will occur in the near term and that such changes could materially affect participants' account balances and the amounts reported in the statements of net assets available for benefits.

Note 11: Subsequent Events

In preparing these financial statements, management has evaluated events and transactions for recognition or disclosure through September 18, 2025, the date the financial statements were available to be issued.

Note 12: Fidelity Bonding

The Plan maintains a fidelity bond for its operations.

Scope and Nature of the ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) Audit

We have performed an audit of the financial statements of Forever 401(k) Plan, an employee benefit plan subject to the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (ERISA), as permitted by ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) (ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) audit). The financial statements comprise the statements of net assets available for benefits as of December 31, 2024 and 2023, and the related statement of changes in net assets available for benefits for the December 31, 2024 year then ended, and the related notes to the financial statements.

Management, having determined it is permissible in the circumstances, has elected to have the audit of Forever 401(k) Plan's financial statements performed in accordance with ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) pursuant to 29 CFR 2520.103-8 of the Department of Labor's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA. As permitted by ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C), our audit need not extend to any statements or information related to assets held for investment of the plan (investment information) by a bank or similar institution or insurance carrier that is regulated, supervised, and subject to periodic examination by a state or federal agency, provided that the statements or information regarding assets so held are prepared and certified to by the bank or similar institution or insurance carrier in accordance with 29 CFR 2520.103-5 of the Department of Labor's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA (qualified institution).

Management has obtained a certification from a qualified institution as of and for the years ended December 31, 2024 and 2023, stating that the certified investment information, as described in Note 5 to the financial statements, is complete and accurate.

Opinion

In our opinion, based on our audit and on the procedures performed as described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements section -

- the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements, other than those agreed to or derived from the certified investment information, are presented fairly, in all material respects, in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.
- the information in the financial statements related to assets held by and certified to by a qualified institution agrees to, or is derived from, in all material respects, the information prepared and certified by an institution that management determined meets the requirements of ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C).

Basis for Opinion

We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements section of our report. We are required to be independent of Forever 401(k) Plan and to meet our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with the relevant ethical requirements relating to our audit. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) audit opinion.

Responsibilities of Management for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America, and for the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error. Management's election of the ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) audit does not affect management's responsibility for the financial statements.

In preparing the financial statements, management is required to evaluate whether there are conditions or events, considered in the aggregate, that raise substantial doubt about Forever 401(k) Plan's ability to continue as a going concern for one year after the date the financial statements are available to be issued.

Management is also responsible for maintaining a current plan instrument, including all plan amendments; administering the plan; and determining that the plan's transactions that are presented and disclosed in the financial statements are in conformity with the plan's provisions, including maintaining sufficient records with respect to each of the participants, to determine the benefits due or which may become due to such participants.

Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements

Except as described in the Scope and Nature of the ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) Audit section of our report, our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance but is not absolute assurance and therefore is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. Accordingly, the objective of an ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) audit is not to express an opinion about whether the financial statements as a whole are presented fairly, in all material respects, in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Note 1: Description of Plan

The following description of the Forever 401(k) Plan ("Plan") provides only general information. Participants should refer to the Plan agreement for a more complete description of the Plan's provisions.

General

The Plan is a defined contribution plan covering substantially all full-time employees of the Company who have six months of service and are age eighteen or older. The Plan was effective in November 1996 and qualifies under the Internal Revenue Code as a 401(k) plan. It is subject to the provisions of the Employment Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (ERISA).

Contributions

Each year, participants may elect to make pretax or Roth contributions to the Plan up to 90% of their eligible compensation as defined in the Plan up to the IRS determined annual limits. Effective February 1, 2023, all new eligible participants will be auto enrolled into the Plan with a 2% pre-tax deferral, unless otherwise elected. Participants who have attained age 50 before the end of the Plan year are eligible to make catch-up contributions. Participants may also contribute amounts representing distributions from other qualified defined benefit or contribution plans. Participants direct the investment of their contributions into various investment options offered by the Plan. A discretionary matching and/or a nonelective contribution may be made at the option of the employer.

Administrative Expenses

Certain plan administrative expenses are paid directly by the Plan Sponsor, as provided in the Plan agreement. The Plan is administered by the Plan Sponsor. Certain administrative functions are performed by officers or employees of the Plan Sponsor. No such officer or employee receives compensation from the Plan.

Participant Accounts

Each participant's account is credited with the participant's contributions, employer's contributions, and Plan earnings. Allocations are based on participant earnings or account balances, as defined in the Plan agreement.

Vesting

Participants are immediately vested in their contributions plus actual earnings thereon. Vesting in the Company's discretionary matching and nonelective contribution portion of their accounts plus actual earnings are based on years of continuous service as shown in the schedule below.

Forfeited Accounts

At December 31, 2024 and 2023, forfeited nonvested accounts totaled \$501 and \$1,782, respectively. These accounts will be used to pay administrative expenses and reduce future employer contributions. In 2024, \$1,433 in forfeitures were used by the Company to pay administrative expenses.

Investment Options

Under the Plan, a participant instructs Fidelity as to the investment of the participant's contributions. Participants may change their investment elections at any time. Transfers of account balances between elected investment options may also be made at any time.

Notes Receivable from Participants

Participants may borrow from their fund accounts a minimum of \$1,000 up to a maximum equal to the lesser of \$50,000 or 50% of their vested account balance. Borrowings are secured by the balance in the participant's account and bear interest at rates that range from 4.25% to 9.50% at December 31, 2024, which are commensurate with local prevailing rates as determined by the plan administrator. Principal and interest are paid ratably through payroll deductions. Interest received on participant's notes for the year ended December 31, 2024 totaled \$1,804. Loan terms range from 1 to 5 years, or a reasonable period of time longer than 5 years for a purchase of a principal residence. Notes receivable are stated at their unpaid principal balance plus accrued, but unpaid, interest.

Payment of Benefits

The Plan allows for distributions upon termination of service, death, disability, or retirement. The Plan allows for in-service withdrawals upon attainment of age 59½ or certain hardship situations. On termination of service, a participant (or designated beneficiary) may elect to receive an amount equal to the value of the participant's vested interest in their account. A participant may elect to receive a lump sum payment or may roll over the value of their account into another qualified plan. Vested participants who separate from employment with the Plan Sponsor, and whose account is more than de minimis, may elect to leave their funds in the Plan. As of December 31, 2024 and 2023, the de minimis amount was \$5,000.

Hardship Withdrawals

The Plan allows, in certain hardship situations as defined in the Plan, participants to withdraw part or all of their deferral contributions while actively employed. These hardship withdrawals are subject to IRC restrictions and penalties.

Secure Act and Secure Act 2.0

The Plan is currently working with their third party administrator to ensure compliance and any required plan changes are made to comply with the Secure Act and the Secure Act 2.0.

Note 2: Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America ("GAAP") requires the plan administrator to make

Use of Estimates (Continued)

estimates and assumptions that affect certain reported amounts of assets and liabilities and changes therein, and disclosures of contingent assets and liabilities. Accordingly, actual results may differ from those estimates.

Valuation of Investments

Investments are reported at fair value and are stated at current quoted market values, which represent the net asset value of shares held by the Plan at year end. The change in the difference between current market value and cost is reported in the Statement of Changes in Net Assets Available for Benefits as net appreciation in fair value of assets. See Note 3 for a discussion of fair value measurements.

The net appreciation in fair value of assets is reported as the change in the difference between the current market value and the prior year's market value adjusted for purchases and sales.

Notes Receivable from Participants

Notes receivable from participants are measured at their unpaid principal balance plus accrued, but unpaid, interest. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Related fees are recorded as administrative expenses and are expensed when they are incurred. No allowance for credit losses has been recorded as of December 31, 2024 or 2023. If a participant does not make loan repayments and the plan administrator considers the participant loan to be in default, the loan balance is reduced, and the delinquent participant note receivable is recorded as a benefit payment based on the terms of the Plan document.

Payment of Benefits

Benefits are recorded when paid.

Basis of Accounting

The financial statements of the Plan are prepared under the accrual basis of accounting.

Operating Expenses

Certain expenses of maintaining the Plan are paid by the Company and are excluded from the financial statements. Investment related expenses are included in net appreciation in fair value of assets. Fees for the administration of notes receivable from participants are charged directly to the participant's account.

Note 3: Fair Value Measurement

The Plan's investments are reported at fair value in the accompanying Statements of Net Assets Available for Benefits. The methods used to measure fair value may produce an amount that may not be indicative of net realizable value or reflective of future fair values. Furthermore, although the Plan believes its valuation methods are appropriate and consistent with other market participants, the use of different methodologies or assumptions to determine the fair value of certain financial instruments could result in a different fair value measurement at the reporting date.

Note 4: Tax Status (Continued)

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require plan management to evaluate tax positions taken by the Plan and recognize a tax liability (or asset) if the organization has taken an uncertain position that more likely than not would not be sustained upon examination. The plan administrator has analyzed the tax positions taken by the Plan, and has concluded that as of December 31, 2024, there are no uncertain positions taken or expected to be taken that would require recognition of a liability (or asset) or disclosure in the financial statements. The Plan is subject to routine audits by taxing jurisdictions; however, there are currently no audits for any tax periods in progress. The plan administrator believes the Plan is no longer subject to income tax examinations for years prior to 2021.

Note 5: Information Prepared and Certified by Trustee

The plan administrator has elected the method of compliance as permitted by 29 CFR 2520.103-8 of the Department of Labor's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA for 2024 and 2023. Accordingly, Fidelity Management Trust Company, the trustee of the Plan, has certified to the completeness and accuracy of all investments and notes receivable from participants reported in the accompanying Statements of Net Assets Available for Benefits as of December 31, 2024 and 2023 and the supplemental Schedule H, Line 4i - Schedule of Assets (Held at End of Year) as of December 31, 2024, and the related investment activity and interest on participant notes reported in the Statement of Changes in Net Assets Available for Benefits for the year ended December 31, 2024.

Note 7: Plan Termination

Although it has not expressed any intentions to do so, the Company has the right under the Plan to discontinue its contributions at any time, and to terminate the Plan subject to the provisions of ERISA. In the event of Plan termination, participants would become fully vested in their accrued benefits.

Note 8: Separated Participants

Amounts allocated to withdrawing participants are recorded on the Schedule H of Form 5500 for benefit claims that have been processed and approved for payment prior to December 31 but not yet paid as of that date.

Note 9: Related Party Transactions

Certain Plan investments are shares of mutual funds managed by Fidelity Management Trust Company. Fidelity Management Trust Company is the trustee as defined by the Plan and, therefore, these transactions qualify as party-in-interest transactions. Fees paid by the Plan amounted to \$4,842 for the year ended December 31, 2024.

Certain administrative functions of the Plan are performed by officers or employees of the Company. No such officer or employee receives compensation from the Plan.

Note 10: Risks and Uncertainties

The Plan invests in various investment securities. Investment securities are exposed to various risks such as interest rate, market, and credit risks. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investment securities, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in the values of investment securities will occur in the near term and that such changes could materially affect participants' account balances and the amounts reported in the statements of net assets available for benefits.

Note 11: Subsequent Events

In preparing these financial statements, management has evaluated events and transactions for recognition or disclosure through September 18, 2025, the date the financial statements were available to be issued.

Note 12: Fidelity Bonding

The Plan maintains a fidelity bond for its operations.
