### ***Basis for Opinion***

Accordingly, the objective of an ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) audit is not to express an opinion about whether the financial statements as a whole are presented fairly, in all material respects, in accordance with GAAP.

We are required to communicate with those charged with governance regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit, significant audit findings, and certain internal control-related matters that we identified during the audit.

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A. DESCRIPTION OF PLAN:

The following description of the American Iron and Metal USA Inc. 401(k) Profit Sharing Plan and Trust (the "Plan") provides only general information. Participants should refer to the plan document for a more complete description of the Plan's provisions.

General

The Plan is a defined contribution retirement plan covering substantially all eligible employees of American Iron and Metal USA Inc. and its participating affiliated entities (collectively the "Company"). Employees are eligible to participate in the Plan after attaining the age of twenty-one. The Plan is subject to the provisions of the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974, as amended ("ERISA").

Contributions

Upon meeting eligibility requirements, participants may contribute up to 92% of their eligible compensation on a pre-tax basis or after-tax ("Roth") basis, subject to Internal Revenue Code ("IRC") limitations. Participants who are at least 50 may make an additional "catch up" contribution subject to IRC limitations. Participants may also contribute funds from another qualified retirement plan ("rollover contributions"), subject to certain requirements.

Prior to August 1, 2024, the Company contributed a fixed matching contribution equal to 100% of participants deferrals up to 2% of plan compensation. Effective August 1, 2024, the Company contributes a fixed matching contribution equal to 100% of participants deferrals up to 3% of plan compensation. The Company may also elect to contribute a discretionary profit sharing contribution. The profit sharing contribution is determined in accordance with a point system based on the participant's age. A participant must have completed one year of service to be eligible for all company contributions. Participants must also be employed on the last day of the plan year in order to be eligible for a profit sharing contribution. The Company did not make a discretionary profit sharing contribution in 2024.

Participant Accounts

Each participant's account is credited or charged with contributions, investment income, and administrative expenses. Investment income, including realized and unrealized gains and losses, and expenses are allocated to participants' accounts based on each participant's account balance within each fund. Participants determine the percentage in which contributions are to be invested in each fund. Participants may change their investment options as set forth in the plan document. The benefit to which a participant is entitled is equal to the value of the participant's vested interest in their account.

Vesting

Participants are fully vested in that portion of their account which represents their contributions and the income earned thereon. Participants become 100% vested in the Company's contributions and earnings thereon upon death, total and permanent disability. Otherwise, a participant's interest in the Company's contributions and earnings thereon vests according to the following schedule:

Forfeitures

When certain terminations of participation in the Plan occur, the nonvested portion of the participant's account represents a forfeiture, as defined by the Plan. Forfeited balances are first used to restore re-employed participants' accounts. Any remaining forfeitures may be used to pay plan expenses or to reduce company contributions. \$7,112 of forfeitures were used during 2024 to pay plan expenses. Unallocated forfeitures at December 31, 2024 and 2023 were \$8,299 and \$7,600, respectively.

Distribution of Benefits

Benefits may be distributed to participants upon termination of employment by reason of retirement, disability, death, or other separation from service. Participants may elect to receive their vested account balance in the form of a lump sum, substantially equal installments, partial payments, or the participant can apply their vested account balance toward the purchase of an annuity contract.

A participant may also request a withdrawal upon attainment of age 59<sup>1/2</sup>. A participant may also withdraw from their rollover account at any time.

Notes Receivable from Participants

Participants may borrow from their fund accounts a minimum of \$1,000 up to a maximum equal to the lesser of \$50,000 or 50 percent of their vested account balance. The loans are secured by the balance in the participant's account. Interest rates are the prime rate plus 1%. The rate is determined on the date the loan is requested and will not change for the duration of the loan repayment period. All loans must be repaid within four and a half years unless the proceeds are used to acquire a principal residence, in which case a longer repayment period is allowed. No more than one loan may be outstanding at any time. Principal and interest is generally paid ratably through payroll deductions each pay period.

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B. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES:

Basis of Accounting

The accompanying financial statements have been prepared using the accrual basis of accounting.

Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and changes therein, and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Investment Valuation and Income Recognition

Investments are reported at fair value. Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants on the measurement date. See Note C for discussion of fair value measurements.

Purchases and sales of securities are recorded on a trade-date basis. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Dividends are recorded on the ex-dividend date. Net appreciation (depreciation) includes the Plan's gains and losses on investments bought and sold as well as held during the year.

Notes Receivable from Participants

Notes receivable from participants are measured at their unpaid principal balance plus any accrued but unpaid interest. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. No allowance for credit losses has been recorded as of December 31, 2024 or 2023. Delinquent participant loans are reclassified as distributions based upon the terms of the plan document.

Contributions

Contributions from plan participants and company contributions are recorded in the year in which the participant contributions are withheld from compensation.

Expenses of the Plan

Substantially all expenses incurred in the administration of the Plan are paid by the Company. Certain investment fees and participant transaction fees are paid by the participants. Investment related expenses are included in net appreciation (depreciation) in fair value of investments. Expenses that are paid by the Company are excluded from these financial statements.

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Payment of Benefits

Benefits are recorded when paid.

C. FAIR VALUE MEASUREMENTS:

The framework for measuring fair value provides a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. The hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (level 1) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (level 3). The three levels of the fair value hierarchy under FASB ASC 820 are described as follows:

*Level 1* - Inputs to the valuation methodology are unadjusted quoted prices for identical assets or liabilities in active markets that the Plan has the ability to access.

*Level 2* - Inputs to the valuation methodology include quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities in active markets; quoted prices for identical or similar assets or liabilities in inactive markets; inputs other than quoted prices that are observable for the asset or liability; inputs that are derived principally from or corroborated by observable market data by correlation or other means. If the asset or liability has a specified (contractual) term, the level 2 input must be observable for substantially the full term of the asset or liability.

*Level 3* - Inputs to the valuation methodology are unobservable and significant to the fair value measurement.

The asset or liability's fair value measurement level within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of any input that is significant to the fair value measurement. Valuation techniques maximize the use of relevant observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs.

Following is a description of the valuation methodologies used by the Plan. There have been no changes in the methodologies used at December 31, 2024 and 2023.

*Mutual funds* –Valued at the daily closing price as reported by the fund. Mutual funds held by the Plan are open-end mutual funds that are registered with the SEC. These funds are required to publish their daily net asset value (NAV) and to transact at that price. The mutual funds held by the Plan are deemed to be actively traded.

**D. TAX STATUS:**

The Company adopted a restated pre-approved plan document of Paychex Inc., and the Internal Revenue Service ("IRS") has determined and informed the sponsor of the pre-approved plan document by a letter dated August 31, 2020, that the pre-approved plan document is designed in accordance with applicable sections of the IRC. Although the Plan has been amended since the date of the opinion letter, the plan administrator believes that the Plan is designed and being operated in compliance with the applicable requirements of the IRC, and that the related trust is therefore tax-exempt.

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require plan management to evaluate tax positions taken by the plan and recognize a tax liability if the plan has taken an uncertain position that more likely than not would not be sustained upon examination by the IRS. The Plan is subject to routine audits by taxing jurisdictions; however, there are currently no audits for any tax periods in progress.

**E. CERTIFIED INVESTMENTS:**

Certain information related to investments disclosed in the accompanying financial statements and ERISA-required supplemental schedule, including investments held at December 31, 2024 and 2023, and net appreciation (depreciation) in fair value of investments, and interest and dividends, for the year ended December 31, 2024, was obtained by management and agreed to or derived from information certified as complete and accurate by Mid Atlantic Trust Company, the trustee of the Plan.

**F. RELATED-PARTY AND PARTY IN INTEREST TRANSACTIONS:**

Section 3(14) of ERISA defines a party in interest to include, among others, fiduciaries or employees of the Plan, any person who provides services to the Plan or an employer whose employees are covered by the Plan. Accordingly, loans to participants and transactions with investment funds managed and held by the trustee are considered party in interest transactions.

G. PLAN TERMINATION:

Although the Plan was established with the intention that it will continue indefinitely, the Company retains the right to discontinue its contributions at any time or to terminate the Plan, subject to the provisions of ERISA. In the event of plan termination, all participants will become 100% vested in their accounts.

H. RISKS AND UNCERTANTIES:

The Plan invests in various investment securities. Investment securities are exposed to various risks, such as interest rate, market, and credit risk. Market risks include global events which could impact the value of investment securities. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investment securities, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in the values of investment securities will occur in the near term and that such changes could materially affect participants' account balances and the amounts reported in the statements of net assets available for benefits.

I. SUBSEQUENT EVENTS:

The Plan has evaluated subsequent events through September 25, 2025, the date these financial statements were available for issuance.

Effective December 31, 2024, the Company spun off their participating employer AIM Metals & Alloys USA Inc. Assets were subsequently transferred out of the Plan in 2025 totaling approximately \$2,850,000.

J. EXCESS CONTRIBUTIONS PAYABLE:

Amounts payable to participants for contributions in excess of amounts allowed by the IRS are recorded as a liability with a corresponding reduction to contributions. Excess participant contributions were refunded subsequent to year end.

## Independent Auditor's Report

To the Plan Administrator of the American Iron and Metal USA Inc. 401(k) Profit Sharing Plan and Trust:

### **Scope and Nature of the ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) Audit**

As permitted by ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C), our audits need not extend to any statements or information related to assets held for investment of the plan (investment information) by a bank or similar institution or insurance carrier that is regulated, supervised, and subject to periodic examination by a state or federal agency, provided that the statements or information regarding assets so held are prepared and certified to by the bank or similar institution or insurance carrier in accordance with 29 CFR 2520.103-5 of the DOL's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA ("qualified institution").

Management has obtained certifications from a qualified institution as of December 31, 2024 and 2023, and for the year ended December 31, 2024, stating that the certified investment information, as described in Note E to the financial statements, is complete and accurate.

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A. DESCRIPTION OF PLAN:

The following description of the American Iron and Metal USA Inc. 401(k) Profit Sharing Plan and Trust (the "Plan") provides only general information. Participants should refer to the plan document for a more complete description of the Plan's provisions.

General

The Plan is a defined contribution retirement plan covering substantially all eligible employees of American Iron and Metal USA Inc. and its participating affiliated entities (collectively the "Company"). Employees are eligible to participate in the Plan after attaining the age of twenty-one. The Plan is subject to the provisions of the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974, as amended ("ERISA").

Contributions

Upon meeting eligibility requirements, participants may contribute up to 92% of their eligible compensation on a pre-tax basis or after-tax ("Roth") basis, subject to Internal Revenue Code ("IRC") limitations. Participants who are at least 50 may make an additional "catch up" contribution subject to IRC limitations. Participants may also contribute funds from another qualified retirement plan ("rollover contributions"), subject to certain requirements.

Prior to August 1, 2024, the Company contributed a fixed matching contribution equal to 100% of participants deferrals up to 2% of plan compensation. Effective August 1, 2024, the Company contributes a fixed matching contribution equal to 100% of participants deferrals up to 3% of plan compensation. The Company may also elect to contribute a discretionary profit sharing contribution. The profit sharing contribution is determined in accordance with a point system based on the participant's age. A participant must have completed one year of service to be eligible for all company contributions. Participants must also be employed on the last day of the plan year in order to be eligible for a profit sharing contribution. The Company did not make a discretionary profit sharing contribution in 2024.

Participant Accounts

Each participant's account is credited or charged with contributions, investment income, and administrative expenses. Investment income, including realized and unrealized gains and losses, and expenses are allocated to participants' accounts based on each participant's account balance within each fund. Participants determine the percentage in which contributions are to be invested in each fund. Participants may change their investment options as set forth in the plan document. The benefit to which a participant is entitled is equal to the value of the participant's vested interest in their account.

Vesting

Participants are fully vested in that portion of their account which represents their contributions and the income earned thereon. Participants become 100% vested in the Company's contributions and earnings thereon upon death, total and permanent disability. Otherwise, a participant's interest in the Company's contributions and earnings thereon vests according to the following schedule:

Forfeitures

When certain terminations of participation in the Plan occur, the nonvested portion of the participant's account represents a forfeiture, as defined by the Plan. Forfeited balances are first used to restore re-employed participants' accounts. Any remaining forfeitures may be used to pay plan expenses or to reduce company contributions. \$7,112 of forfeitures were used during 2024 to pay plan expenses. Unallocated forfeitures at December 31, 2024 and 2023 were \$8,299 and \$7,600, respectively.

Distribution of Benefits

Benefits may be distributed to participants upon termination of employment by reason of retirement, disability, death, or other separation from service. Participants may elect to receive their vested account balance in the form of a lump sum, substantially equal installments, partial payments, or the participant can apply their vested account balance toward the purchase of an annuity contract.

A participant may also request a withdrawal upon attainment of age 59<sup>1/2</sup>. A participant may also withdraw from their rollover account at any time.

Notes Receivable from Participants

Participants may borrow from their fund accounts a minimum of \$1,000 up to a maximum equal to the lesser of \$50,000 or 50 percent of their vested account balance. The loans are secured by the balance in the participant's account. Interest rates are the prime rate plus 1%. The rate is determined on the date the loan is requested and will not change for the duration of the loan repayment period. All loans must be repaid within four and a half years unless the proceeds are used to acquire a principal residence, in which case a longer repayment period is allowed. No more than one loan may be outstanding at any time. Principal and interest is generally paid ratably through payroll deductions each pay period.

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B. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES:

Basis of Accounting

The accompanying financial statements have been prepared using the accrual basis of accounting.

Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and changes therein, and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Investment Valuation and Income Recognition

Investments are reported at fair value. Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants on the measurement date. See Note C for discussion of fair value measurements.

Purchases and sales of securities are recorded on a trade-date basis. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Dividends are recorded on the ex-dividend date. Net appreciation (depreciation) includes the Plan's gains and losses on investments bought and sold as well as held during the year.

Notes Receivable from Participants

Notes receivable from participants are measured at their unpaid principal balance plus any accrued but unpaid interest. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. No allowance for credit losses has been recorded as of December 31, 2024 or 2023. Delinquent participant loans are reclassified as distributions based upon the terms of the plan document.

Contributions

Contributions from plan participants and company contributions are recorded in the year in which the participant contributions are withheld from compensation.

Expenses of the Plan

Substantially all expenses incurred in the administration of the Plan are paid by the Company. Certain investment fees and participant transaction fees are paid by the participants. Investment related expenses are included in net appreciation (depreciation) in fair value of investments. Expenses that are paid by the Company are excluded from these financial statements.

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Payment of Benefits

Benefits are recorded when paid.

C. FAIR VALUE MEASUREMENTS:

The framework for measuring fair value provides a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. The hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (level 1) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (level 3). The three levels of the fair value hierarchy under FASB ASC 820 are described as follows:

*Level 1* - Inputs to the valuation methodology are unadjusted quoted prices for identical assets or liabilities in active markets that the Plan has the ability to access.

*Level 2* - Inputs to the valuation methodology include quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities in active markets; quoted prices for identical or similar assets or liabilities in inactive markets; inputs other than quoted prices that are observable for the asset or liability; inputs that are derived principally from or corroborated by observable market data by correlation or other means. If the asset or liability has a specified (contractual) term, the level 2 input must be observable for substantially the full term of the asset or liability.

*Level 3* - Inputs to the valuation methodology are unobservable and significant to the fair value measurement.

The asset or liability's fair value measurement level within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of any input that is significant to the fair value measurement. Valuation techniques maximize the use of relevant observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs.

Following is a description of the valuation methodologies used by the Plan. There have been no changes in the methodologies used at December 31, 2024 and 2023.

*Mutual funds* –Valued at the daily closing price as reported by the fund. Mutual funds held by the Plan are open-end mutual funds that are registered with the SEC. These funds are required to publish their daily net asset value (NAV) and to transact at that price. The mutual funds held by the Plan are deemed to be actively traded.

**D. TAX STATUS:**

The Company adopted a restated pre-approved plan document of Paychex Inc., and the Internal Revenue Service ("IRS") has determined and informed the sponsor of the pre-approved plan document by a letter dated August 31, 2020, that the pre-approved plan document is designed in accordance with applicable sections of the IRC. Although the Plan has been amended since the date of the opinion letter, the plan administrator believes that the Plan is designed and being operated in compliance with the applicable requirements of the IRC, and that the related trust is therefore tax-exempt.

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require plan management to evaluate tax positions taken by the plan and recognize a tax liability if the plan has taken an uncertain position that more likely than not would not be sustained upon examination by the IRS. The Plan is subject to routine audits by taxing jurisdictions; however, there are currently no audits for any tax periods in progress.

**E. CERTIFIED INVESTMENTS:**

Certain information related to investments disclosed in the accompanying financial statements and ERISA-required supplemental schedule, including investments held at December 31, 2024 and 2023, and net appreciation (depreciation) in fair value of investments, and interest and dividends, for the year ended December 31, 2024, was obtained by management and agreed to or derived from information certified as complete and accurate by Mid Atlantic Trust Company, the trustee of the Plan.

**F. RELATED-PARTY AND PARTY IN INTEREST TRANSACTIONS:**

Section 3(14) of ERISA defines a party in interest to include, among others, fiduciaries or employees of the Plan, any person who provides services to the Plan or an employer whose employees are covered by the Plan. Accordingly, loans to participants and transactions with investment funds managed and held by the trustee are considered party in interest transactions.

G. PLAN TERMINATION:

Although the Plan was established with the intention that it will continue indefinitely, the Company retains the right to discontinue its contributions at any time or to terminate the Plan, subject to the provisions of ERISA. In the event of plan termination, all participants will become 100% vested in their accounts.

H. RISKS AND UNCERTANTIES:

The Plan invests in various investment securities. Investment securities are exposed to various risks, such as interest rate, market, and credit risk. Market risks include global events which could impact the value of investment securities. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investment securities, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in the values of investment securities will occur in the near term and that such changes could materially affect participants' account balances and the amounts reported in the statements of net assets available for benefits.

I. SUBSEQUENT EVENTS:

The Plan has evaluated subsequent events through September 25, 2025, the date these financial statements were available for issuance.

Effective December 31, 2024, the Company spun off their participating employer AIM Metals & Alloys USA Inc. Assets were subsequently transferred out of the Plan in 2025 totaling approximately \$2,850,000.

J. EXCESS CONTRIBUTIONS PAYABLE:

Amounts payable to participants for contributions in excess of amounts allowed by the IRS are recorded as a liability with a corresponding reduction to contributions. Excess participant contributions were refunded subsequent to year end.
