INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

To the Plan Administrator
Leonardo US Cyber & Security Solutions 401(k) Plan

Scope and Nature of the ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) Audit

Management's election of the ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) audit does not affect management's responsibility for the financial statements.

In preparing the financial statements, management is required to evaluate whether there are conditions or events, considered in the aggregate, that raise substantial doubt about the Plan's ability to continue as a going concern for one year after the date the financial statements are available to be issued.

Management is also responsible for maintaining a current plan instrument, including all plan amendments; administering the plan; and determining that the plan's transactions that are presented and disclosed in the financial statements are in conformity with the plan's provisions, including maintaining sufficient records with respect to each of the participants, to determine the benefits due or which may become due to such participants.

Except as described in the Scope and Nature of the ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) Audit section of our report, our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance but is not absolute assurance and therefore is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control. Misstatements are considered material if there is a substantial likelihood that, individually or in the aggregate, they would influence the judgment made by a reasonable user based on the financial statements.

In performing an audit in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards, we:

- Exercise professional judgment and maintain professional skepticism throughout the audit.
- Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error, and design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks. Such procedures include examining, on a test basis, evidence regarding the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements.
- Obtain an understanding of internal control relevant to the audit in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the Plan's internal control. Accordingly, no such opinion is expressed.
- Evaluate the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluate the overall presentation of the financial statements.
- Conclude whether, in our judgment, there are conditions or events, considered in the aggregate, that raise substantial doubt about the Plan's ability to continue as a going concern for a reasonable period of time.

Our audits did not extend to the certified investment information, except for obtaining and reading the certification, comparing the certified investment information with the related information presented and disclosed in the financial statements, and reading the disclosures relating to the certified investment information to assess whether they are in accordance with the presentation and disclosure requirements of accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Accordingly, the objective of an ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) audit is not to express an opinion about whether the financial statements as a whole are presented fairly, in all material respects, in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements (Continued)

We are required to communicate with those charged with governance regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit, significant audit findings, and certain internal control-related matters that we identified during the audit.

Other Matter – Supplemental Schedules Required by ERISA

The supplemental schedule of delinquent participant contributions for the year ended December 31, 2024 and the schedule of assets (held at end of year) as of December 31, 2024, are presented for purposes of additional analysis and are not a required part of the financial statements but are supplementary information required by the Department of Labor's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA. Such information is the responsibility of management and was derived from and relates directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements. The information included in the supplemental schedules, other than that agreed to or derived from the certified investment information, has been subjected to auditing procedures applied in the audits of the financial statements and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements or to the financial statements themselves, and other additional procedures in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards. For information included in the supplemental schedules that agreed to or is derived from the certified investment information, we compared such information to the related certified investment information.

In forming our opinion on the supplemental schedules, we evaluated whether the supplemental schedules, other than the information agreed to or derived from the certified investment information, including their form and content, are presented in conformity with the Department of Labor's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA.

NOTE 1 — DESCRIPTION OF PLAN

The following description of the Leonardo US Cyber & Security Solutions 401(k) plan (the Plan) provides only general information. Participants should refer to the Plan document for a more complete description of the Plan's provisions.

General

The Plan is a defined contribution plan covering all eligible employees of Leonardo US Cyber and Security Solutions, LLC, formerly Selex ES Inc., (the Company). All employees of the Company, excluding nonresident aliens and those covered by collective bargaining agreements, are eligible to participate in the Plan provided they have 45 days of service. Employees may enter the Plan on the first day of each month after meeting the eligibility requirements. The Plan is subject to the provisions of the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (ERISA).

Fidelity Workplace Services LLC provides recordkeeping services to the Plan. Fidelity Management Trust Company (FMTTC) is the custodian of the Plan's investments and serves as trustee. The Company is the plan administrator and has overall responsibility for the operation and administration of the Plan. The plan administrator determines the appropriateness of the Plan's investment offerings and monitors investment performance.

Effective July 1, 2024, the plan document was amended to change the name of the Plan from Selex ES Inc. Savings Plan to Leonardo US Cyber & Security Solutions 401(k) plan and the name of the Plan Sponsor from Selex ES Inc. to Leonardo US Cyber and Security Solutions, LLC. There were no changes to the provisions of the Plan.

Contributions

Participants may contribute up to 75% of annual eligible compensation, as defined in the Plan, and designate those contributions as either pre-tax or Roth. Participants who have attained age 50 before the end of the Plan year are eligible to make catch-up contributions. Participants may also contribute amounts representing distributions from other qualified retirement plans (rollover).

The Plan provides a discretionary matching contribution which is determined as a percentage of participant elected deferrals. For the year ended December 31, 2024, the Company made a matching contribution equal to 100% of employee deferrals up to 6% of eligible compensation.

Discretionary profit sharing contributions are determined annually by the Board of Directors. Profit sharing contributions are allocated to each participant based upon the ratio of the participant's compensation to the total compensation for the Company. There were no profit sharing contributions for the year ended December 31, 2024.

Contributions are subject to certain Internal Revenue Service (IRS) limitations. Participants elect investment accounts in which their contributions, as well as Company contributions, are invested. The investment account options comprise various degrees of risk and return.

NOTE 1 — DESCRIPTION OF PLAN (Continued)

Participant Accounts

Each participant's account is credited with the participant's contribution and Company matching contributions, as well as allocations of the Company's profit sharing contribution, and investment earnings based on their selected investments. Participant accounts may be charged with an allocation of administrative expenses that are paid by the Plan. Allocations are based on participant earnings, account balances, or specific participant transactions, as defined. The benefit to which a participant is entitled is the benefit that can be provided from the participant's vested account.

Notes Receivable From Participants

Participants may borrow from their accounts a minimum of \$1,000 up to a maximum equal to \$50,000 or 50% of the participant's vested account balance, whichever is less. The loans are secured by the balance in the participant's account. The loan interest rate is set at 1% above the prime rate that was effective at the time the loan was issued, as defined. Principal and interest is paid ratably through monthly payroll deductions.

Vesting

Participants are immediately vested in all contributions and earnings thereon.

Payment of Benefits

On termination of service, death, disability or retirement, participants may elect to receive an amount equal to the value of the vested interest in their accounts in either a lump sum amount or in installments, depending on the size of the participant's account balance at the time of termination. Participants with a vested account balance of less than \$7,000 must take a lump-sum distribution. The account of a participant with a vested account balance between \$1,000 and \$7,000 who does not request distribution will be rolled to an individual retirement account in the participant's name.

The Company may authorize certain withdrawals from a participant's account in the event of proven financial hardship. Hardship withdrawals are allowed from a participant's elective deferral account and are subject to specific statutory and regulatory requirements.

In-service distributions are permitted from all vested accounts when a participant has attained age 59½.

Forfeitures

Forfeited nonvested accounts relate to participants terminated prior to January 1, 2016 who were not fully vested in the Plan. Forfeitures may be used to reduce Company contributions. For the year ended December 31, 2024, no forfeitures were used to reduce Company contributions. Unallocated forfeitures were \$861 and \$838 at December 31, 2024 and 2023, respectively.

NOTE 2 — SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of Accounting

The financial statements of the Plan are prepared on the accrual basis of accounting.

Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect certain reported amounts and disclosures. Accordingly, actual results may differ from those estimates.

Investment Valuation and Income Recognition

Investments are reported at fair value. Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date.

Purchases and sales of securities are recorded on a trade-date basis. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Dividends are recorded on the ex-dividend date. Net appreciation includes the Plan's gains and losses on investments bought and sold as well as held during the year.

Notes Receivable From Participants

Notes receivable from participants are measured at their unpaid principal balance plus any accrued but unpaid interest. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Related fees are recorded as administrative expenses when they are incurred.

Contributions

Contributions from participants and the associated Company contributions are recorded in the year in which the employee contributions are withheld from compensation.

Payment of Benefits

Benefits are recorded when paid.

Expenses

Plan expenses primarily consist of administration fees. Fees related to the administration of notes receivable from participants and benefit payments to participants are charged directly to the participant's account and are included in administrative expenses. Investment related expenses are included in net appreciation of fair value of investments. Certain expenses of maintaining the Plan are paid directly by the Company and are excluded from these financial statements.

Subsequent Events

Subsequent events were evaluated through September 16, 2025, which is the date the financial statements were available to be issued.

NOTE 3 — INFORMATION CERTIFIED BY THE TRUSTEE

Certain information disclosed in the accompanying financial statements and ERISA-required supplemental schedules, including investments and notes receivable from participants held at December 31, 2024 and 2023, and net appreciation in fair value of investments, dividends, and interest income on notes receivable from participants for the year ended December 31, 2024, was obtained by management and agreed to or derived from information certified as complete and accurate by FMTC.

NOTE 4 — FAIR VALUE MEASUREMENTS

The framework for measuring fair value provides a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. The hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (level 1) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (level 3).

Level 1 inputs consist of unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets and have the highest priority. Level 2 inputs consist of observable inputs other than quoted prices for identical assets. Level 3 inputs are unobservable and have the lowest priority. The Plan uses appropriate valuation techniques based on the available inputs to measure the fair value of its investments. When available, the Plan measures fair value using Level 1 inputs because they generally provide the most reliable evidence of fair value. Level 2 inputs are used for investments for which Level 1 inputs were not available. Level 3 inputs would only be used if Level 1 or Level 2 inputs were not available.

Following is a description of the valuation methodologies used for assets measured at fair value. There have been no changes in the methodology used at December 31, 2024 and 2023.

Mutual funds: Valued at the daily closing price reported by the fund, which is the quoted net asset value (NAV) of shares.

Common/collective trust: The stable value common/collective trust invests in a fund in which the underlying assets consist primarily of fully benefit-responsive investment contracts. The fund is valued at NAV, the practical expedient to estimate fair value. Participant transactions may occur daily.

NOTE 5 — PLAN TERMINATION

Although it has not expressed any intention to do so, the Company has the right under the Plan to discontinue its contributions at any time and to terminate the Plan subject to the provisions of ERISA.

NOTE 6 — TAX STATUS

As this Plan is a pre-approved defined contribution plan, the IRS issued an opinion letter dated June 30, 2020, stating that while they do not issue a determination as to whether a specific employer's plan is qualified, any employer who adopts this plan document will be considered to have a plan qualified under code Section 401(a) of the Internal Revenue Code (IRC) provided all the terms are not more favorable for officers, owners, or highly compensated employees than for other employees. Management believes that the Plan is operating in compliance with all the terms provided in the nonstandardized plan agreement. Although the Plan has been amended since receiving the opinion letter, the plan administrator believes that the Plan is designed and is currently being operated in compliance with the applicable requirements of the IRC.

The Plan is subject to examination by the IRS for the statutory period.

NOTE 7 — PARTY-IN-INTEREST TRANSACTIONS

Fidelity Workplace Services LLC is the recordkeeper of the Plan. CSG Capital Partners of Janney Montgomery Scott LLC is the investment advisor of the Plan. Total fees paid from the Plan to these entities for the year ended December 31, 2024 were \$46,656. These transactions qualify as party-in-interest transactions.

NOTE 8 — RISKS AND UNCERTAINTIES

The Plan invests in various types of investment securities. Investment securities are exposed to various risks such as interest rate, market, and credit risks. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investment securities, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in the values of investment securities will occur in the near term and that such changes could materially affect participants' account balances and the amounts reported in the statements of net assets available for benefits.

NOTE 9 — DELINQUENT CONTRIBUTIONS

During the year ended December 31, 2022, the Company failed to remit to the Plan's custodian certain employee contributions and loan repayments totaling \$28,909 within the period prescribed by the Department of Labor's regulations. The Company corrected these prohibited transactions on September 9, 2024, by restoring the affected participants' accounts for potential lost income in the amount of \$50.

INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

To the Plan Administrator

Scope and Nature of the ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) Audit

Basis for Opinion

- Conclude whether, in our judgment, there are conditions or events, considered in the aggregate, that raise substantial doubt about the Plan's ability to continue as a going concern for a reasonable period of time.

Our audits did not extend to the certified investment information, except for obtaining and reading the certification, comparing the certified investment information with the related information presented and disclosed in the financial statements, and reading the disclosures relating to the certified investment information to assess whether they are in accordance with the presentation and disclosure requirements of accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Accordingly, the objective of an ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) audit is not to express an opinion about whether the financial statements as a whole are presented fairly, in all material respects, in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements (Continued)

We are required to communicate with those charged with governance regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit, significant audit findings, and certain internal control-related matters that we identified during the audit.

Such information is the responsibility of management and was derived from and relates directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements. The information included in the supplemental schedules, other than that agreed to or derived from the certified investment information, has been subjected to auditing procedures applied in the audits of the financial statements and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements or to the financial statements themselves, and other additional procedures in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards. For information included in the supplemental schedules that agreed to or is derived from the certified investment information, we compared such information to the related certified investment information.

NOTE 1 — DESCRIPTION OF PLAN

The following description of the Leonardo US Cyber & Security Solutions 401(k) plan (the Plan) provides only general information. Participants should refer to the Plan document for a more complete description of the Plan's provisions.

General

The Plan is a defined contribution plan covering all eligible employees of Leonardo US Cyber and Security Solutions, LLC, formerly Selex ES Inc., (the Company). All employees of the Company, excluding nonresident aliens and those covered by collective bargaining agreements, are eligible to participate in the Plan provided they have 45 days of service. Employees may enter the Plan on the first day of each month after meeting the eligibility requirements. The Plan is subject to the provisions of the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (ERISA).

Fidelity Workplace Services LLC provides recordkeeping services to the Plan. Fidelity Management Trust Company (FMTTC) is the custodian of the Plan's investments and serves as trustee. The Company is the plan administrator and has overall responsibility for the operation and administration of the Plan. The plan administrator determines the appropriateness of the Plan's investment offerings and monitors investment performance.

Effective July 1, 2024, the plan document was amended to change the name of the Plan from Selex ES Inc. Savings Plan to Leonardo US Cyber & Security Solutions 401(k) plan and the name of the Plan Sponsor from Selex ES Inc. to Leonardo US Cyber and Security Solutions, LLC. There were no changes to the provisions of the Plan.

Contributions

Participants may contribute up to 75% of annual eligible compensation, as defined in the Plan, and designate those contributions as either pre-tax or Roth. Participants who have attained age 50 before the end of the Plan year are eligible to make catch-up contributions. Participants may also contribute amounts representing distributions from other qualified retirement plans (rollover).

The Plan provides a discretionary matching contribution which is determined as a percentage of participant elected deferrals. For the year ended December 31, 2024, the Company made a matching contribution equal to 100% of employee deferrals up to 6% of eligible compensation.

Discretionary profit sharing contributions are determined annually by the Board of Directors. Profit sharing contributions are allocated to each participant based upon the ratio of the participant's compensation to the total compensation for the Company. There were no profit sharing contributions for the year ended December 31, 2024.

Contributions are subject to certain Internal Revenue Service (IRS) limitations. Participants elect investment accounts in which their contributions, as well as Company contributions, are invested. The investment account options comprise various degrees of risk and return.

NOTE 1 — DESCRIPTION OF PLAN (Continued)

Participant Accounts

Each participant's account is credited with the participant's contribution and Company matching contributions, as well as allocations of the Company's profit sharing contribution, and investment earnings based on their selected investments. Participant accounts may be charged with an allocation of administrative expenses that are paid by the Plan. Allocations are based on participant earnings, account balances, or specific participant transactions, as defined. The benefit to which a participant is entitled is the benefit that can be provided from the participant's vested account.

Notes Receivable From Participants

Participants may borrow from their accounts a minimum of \$1,000 up to a maximum equal to \$50,000 or 50% of the participant's vested account balance, whichever is less. The loans are secured by the balance in the participant's account. The loan interest rate is set at 1% above the prime rate that was effective at the time the loan was issued, as defined. Principal and interest is paid ratably through monthly payroll deductions.

Vesting

Participants are immediately vested in all contributions and earnings thereon.

Payment of Benefits

On termination of service, death, disability or retirement, participants may elect to receive an amount equal to the value of the vested interest in their accounts in either a lump sum amount or in installments, depending on the size of the participant's account balance at the time of termination. Participants with a vested account balance of less than \$7,000 must take a lump-sum distribution. The account of a participant with a vested account balance between \$1,000 and \$7,000 who does not request distribution will be rolled to an individual retirement account in the participant's name.

The Company may authorize certain withdrawals from a participant's account in the event of proven financial hardship. Hardship withdrawals are allowed from a participant's elective deferral account and are subject to specific statutory and regulatory requirements.

In-service distributions are permitted from all vested accounts when a participant has attained age 59½.

Forfeitures

Forfeited nonvested accounts relate to participants terminated prior to January 1, 2016 who were not fully vested in the Plan. Forfeitures may be used to reduce Company contributions. For the year ended December 31, 2024, no forfeitures were used to reduce Company contributions. Unallocated forfeitures were \$861 and \$838 at December 31, 2024 and 2023, respectively.

NOTE 2 — SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of Accounting

The financial statements of the Plan are prepared on the accrual basis of accounting.

Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect certain reported amounts and disclosures. Accordingly, actual results may differ from those estimates.

Investment Valuation and Income Recognition

Investments are reported at fair value. Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date.

Purchases and sales of securities are recorded on a trade-date basis. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Dividends are recorded on the ex-dividend date. Net appreciation includes the Plan's gains and losses on investments bought and sold as well as held during the year.

Notes Receivable From Participants

Notes receivable from participants are measured at their unpaid principal balance plus any accrued but unpaid interest. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Related fees are recorded as administrative expenses when they are incurred.

Contributions

Contributions from participants and the associated Company contributions are recorded in the year in which the employee contributions are withheld from compensation.

Payment of Benefits

Benefits are recorded when paid.

Expenses

Plan expenses primarily consist of administration fees. Fees related to the administration of notes receivable from participants and benefit payments to participants are charged directly to the participant's account and are included in administrative expenses. Investment related expenses are included in net appreciation of fair value of investments. Certain expenses of maintaining the Plan are paid directly by the Company and are excluded from these financial statements.

Subsequent Events

Subsequent events were evaluated through September 16, 2025, which is the date the financial statements were available to be issued.

NOTE 3 — INFORMATION CERTIFIED BY THE TRUSTEE

Certain information disclosed in the accompanying financial statements and ERISA-required supplemental schedules, including investments and notes receivable from participants held at December 31, 2024 and 2023, and net appreciation in fair value of investments, dividends, and interest income on notes receivable from participants for the year ended December 31, 2024, was obtained by management and agreed to or derived from information certified as complete and accurate by FMTC.

NOTE 4 — FAIR VALUE MEASUREMENTS

The framework for measuring fair value provides a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. The hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (level 1) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (level 3).

Level 1 inputs consist of unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets and have the highest priority. Level 2 inputs consist of observable inputs other than quoted prices for identical assets. Level 3 inputs are unobservable and have the lowest priority. The Plan uses appropriate valuation techniques based on the available inputs to measure the fair value of its investments. When available, the Plan measures fair value using Level 1 inputs because they generally provide the most reliable evidence of fair value. Level 2 inputs are used for investments for which Level 1 inputs were not available. Level 3 inputs would only be used if Level 1 or Level 2 inputs were not available.

Following is a description of the valuation methodologies used for assets measured at fair value. There have been no changes in the methodology used at December 31, 2024 and 2023.

Mutual funds: Valued at the daily closing price reported by the fund, which is the quoted net asset value (NAV) of shares.

Common/collective trust: The stable value common/collective trust invests in a fund in which the underlying assets consist primarily of fully benefit-responsive investment contracts. The fund is valued at NAV, the practical expedient to estimate fair value. Participant transactions may occur daily.

NOTE 5 — PLAN TERMINATION

Although it has not expressed any intention to do so, the Company has the right under the Plan to discontinue its contributions at any time and to terminate the Plan subject to the provisions of ERISA.

NOTE 6 — TAX STATUS

As this Plan is a pre-approved defined contribution plan, the IRS issued an opinion letter dated June 30, 2020, stating that while they do not issue a determination as to whether a specific employer's plan is qualified, any employer who adopts this plan document will be considered to have a plan qualified under code Section 401(a) of the Internal Revenue Code (IRC) provided all the terms are not more favorable for officers, owners, or highly compensated employees than for other employees. Management believes that the Plan is operating in compliance with all the terms provided in the nonstandardized plan agreement. Although the Plan has been amended since receiving the opinion letter, the plan administrator believes that the Plan is designed and is currently being operated in compliance with the applicable requirements of the IRC.

The Plan is subject to examination by the IRS for the statutory period.

NOTE 7 — PARTY-IN-INTEREST TRANSACTIONS

Fidelity Workplace Services LLC is the recordkeeper of the Plan. CSG Capital Partners of Janney Montgomery Scott LLC is the investment advisor of the Plan. Total fees paid from the Plan to these entities for the year ended December 31, 2024 were \$46,656. These transactions qualify as party-in-interest transactions.

NOTE 8 — RISKS AND UNCERTAINTIES

The Plan invests in various types of investment securities. Investment securities are exposed to various risks such as interest rate, market, and credit risks. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investment securities, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in the values of investment securities will occur in the near term and that such changes could materially affect participants' account balances and the amounts reported in the statements of net assets available for benefits.

NOTE 9 — DELINQUENT CONTRIBUTIONS

During the year ended December 31, 2022, the Company failed to remit to the Plan's custodian certain employee contributions and loan repayments totaling \$28,909 within the period prescribed by the Department of Labor's regulations. The Company corrected these prohibited transactions on September 9, 2024, by restoring the affected participants' accounts for potential lost income in the amount of \$50.

INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

To the Plan Administrator

Scope and Nature of the ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) Audit

We have performed audits of the accompanying financial statements of Leonardo US Cyber & Security Solutions 401(k) Plan (the Plan), an employee benefit plan subject to the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (ERISA), as permitted by ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) [ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) audit]. The financial statements comprise the statements of net assets available for benefits as of December 31, 2024 and 2023, and the related statement of changes in net assets available for benefits for the year ended December 31, 2024, and the related notes to the financial statements.

Management, having determined it is permissible in the circumstances, has elected to have the audits of the Plan's financial statements performed in accordance with ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) pursuant to 29 CFR 2520.103-8 of the Department of Labor's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA. Accordingly, the objective of an ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) audit is not to express an opinion about whether the financial statements as a whole are presented fairly, in all material respects, in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

NOTE 1 — DESCRIPTION OF PLAN

The following description of the Leonardo US Cyber & Security Solutions 401(k) plan (the Plan) provides only general information. Participants should refer to the Plan document for a more complete description of the Plan's provisions.

General

The Plan is a defined contribution plan covering all eligible employees of Leonardo US Cyber and Security Solutions, LLC, formerly Selex ES Inc., (the Company). All employees of the Company, excluding nonresident aliens and those covered by collective bargaining agreements, are eligible to participate in the Plan provided they have 45 days of service. Employees may enter the Plan on the first day of each month after meeting the eligibility requirements. The Plan is subject to the provisions of the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (ERISA).

Fidelity Workplace Services LLC provides recordkeeping services to the Plan. Fidelity Management Trust Company (FMTTC) is the custodian of the Plan's investments and serves as trustee. The Company is the plan administrator and has overall responsibility for the operation and administration of the Plan. The plan administrator determines the appropriateness of the Plan's investment offerings and monitors investment performance.

Effective July 1, 2024, the plan document was amended to change the name of the Plan from Selex ES Inc. Savings Plan to Leonardo US Cyber & Security Solutions 401(k) plan and the name of the Plan Sponsor from Selex ES Inc. to Leonardo US Cyber and Security Solutions, LLC. There were no changes to the provisions of the Plan.

Contributions

Participants may contribute up to 75% of annual eligible compensation, as defined in the Plan, and designate those contributions as either pre-tax or Roth. Participants who have attained age 50 before the end of the Plan year are eligible to make catch-up contributions. Participants may also contribute amounts representing distributions from other qualified retirement plans (rollover).

The Plan provides a discretionary matching contribution which is determined as a percentage of participant elected deferrals. For the year ended December 31, 2024, the Company made a matching contribution equal to 100% of employee deferrals up to 6% of eligible compensation.

Discretionary profit sharing contributions are determined annually by the Board of Directors. Profit sharing contributions are allocated to each participant based upon the ratio of the participant's compensation to the total compensation for the Company. There were no profit sharing contributions for the year ended December 31, 2024.

Contributions are subject to certain Internal Revenue Service (IRS) limitations. Participants elect investment accounts in which their contributions, as well as Company contributions, are invested. The investment account options comprise various degrees of risk and return.

NOTE 1 — DESCRIPTION OF PLAN (Continued)

Participant Accounts

Each participant's account is credited with the participant's contribution and Company matching contributions, as well as allocations of the Company's profit sharing contribution, and investment earnings based on their selected investments. Participant accounts may be charged with an allocation of administrative expenses that are paid by the Plan. Allocations are based on participant earnings, account balances, or specific participant transactions, as defined. The benefit to which a participant is entitled is the benefit that can be provided from the participant's vested account.

Notes Receivable From Participants

Participants may borrow from their accounts a minimum of \$1,000 up to a maximum equal to \$50,000 or 50% of the participant's vested account balance, whichever is less. The loans are secured by the balance in the participant's account. The loan interest rate is set at 1% above the prime rate that was effective at the time the loan was issued, as defined. Principal and interest is paid ratably through monthly payroll deductions.

Vesting

Participants are immediately vested in all contributions and earnings thereon.

Payment of Benefits

On termination of service, death, disability or retirement, participants may elect to receive an amount equal to the value of the vested interest in their accounts in either a lump sum amount or in installments, depending on the size of the participant's account balance at the time of termination. Participants with a vested account balance of less than \$7,000 must take a lump-sum distribution. The account of a participant with a vested account balance between \$1,000 and \$7,000 who does not request distribution will be rolled to an individual retirement account in the participant's name.

The Company may authorize certain withdrawals from a participant's account in the event of proven financial hardship. Hardship withdrawals are allowed from a participant's elective deferral account and are subject to specific statutory and regulatory requirements.

In-service distributions are permitted from all vested accounts when a participant has attained age 59½.

Forfeitures

Forfeited nonvested accounts relate to participants terminated prior to January 1, 2016 who were not fully vested in the Plan. Forfeitures may be used to reduce Company contributions. For the year ended December 31, 2024, no forfeitures were used to reduce Company contributions. Unallocated forfeitures were \$861 and \$838 at December 31, 2024 and 2023, respectively.

NOTE 2 — SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of Accounting

The financial statements of the Plan are prepared on the accrual basis of accounting.

Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect certain reported amounts and disclosures. Accordingly, actual results may differ from those estimates.

Investment Valuation and Income Recognition

Investments are reported at fair value. Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date.

Purchases and sales of securities are recorded on a trade-date basis. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Dividends are recorded on the ex-dividend date. Net appreciation includes the Plan's gains and losses on investments bought and sold as well as held during the year.

Notes Receivable From Participants

Notes receivable from participants are measured at their unpaid principal balance plus any accrued but unpaid interest. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Related fees are recorded as administrative expenses when they are incurred.

Contributions

Contributions from participants and the associated Company contributions are recorded in the year in which the employee contributions are withheld from compensation.

Payment of Benefits

Benefits are recorded when paid.

Expenses

Plan expenses primarily consist of administration fees. Fees related to the administration of notes receivable from participants and benefit payments to participants are charged directly to the participant's account and are included in administrative expenses. Investment related expenses are included in net appreciation of fair value of investments. Certain expenses of maintaining the Plan are paid directly by the Company and are excluded from these financial statements.

Subsequent Events

Subsequent events were evaluated through September 16, 2025, which is the date the financial statements were available to be issued.

NOTE 3 — INFORMATION CERTIFIED BY THE TRUSTEE

Certain information disclosed in the accompanying financial statements and ERISA-required supplemental schedules, including investments and notes receivable from participants held at December 31, 2024 and 2023, and net appreciation in fair value of investments, dividends, and interest income on notes receivable from participants for the year ended December 31, 2024, was obtained by management and agreed to or derived from information certified as complete and accurate by FMTC.

NOTE 4 — FAIR VALUE MEASUREMENTS

The framework for measuring fair value provides a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. The hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (level 1) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (level 3).

Level 1 inputs consist of unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets and have the highest priority. Level 2 inputs consist of observable inputs other than quoted prices for identical assets. Level 3 inputs are unobservable and have the lowest priority. The Plan uses appropriate valuation techniques based on the available inputs to measure the fair value of its investments. When available, the Plan measures fair value using Level 1 inputs because they generally provide the most reliable evidence of fair value. Level 2 inputs are used for investments for which Level 1 inputs were not available. Level 3 inputs would only be used if Level 1 or Level 2 inputs were not available.

Following is a description of the valuation methodologies used for assets measured at fair value. There have been no changes in the methodology used at December 31, 2024 and 2023.

Mutual funds: Valued at the daily closing price reported by the fund, which is the quoted net asset value (NAV) of shares.

Common/collective trust: The stable value common/collective trust invests in a fund in which the underlying assets consist primarily of fully benefit-responsive investment contracts. The fund is valued at NAV, the practical expedient to estimate fair value. Participant transactions may occur daily.

NOTE 5 — PLAN TERMINATION

Although it has not expressed any intention to do so, the Company has the right under the Plan to discontinue its contributions at any time and to terminate the Plan subject to the provisions of ERISA.

NOTE 6 — TAX STATUS

As this Plan is a pre-approved defined contribution plan, the IRS issued an opinion letter dated June 30, 2020, stating that while they do not issue a determination as to whether a specific employer's plan is qualified, any employer who adopts this plan document will be considered to have a plan qualified under code Section 401(a) of the Internal Revenue Code (IRC) provided all the terms are not more favorable for officers, owners, or highly compensated employees than for other employees. Management believes that the Plan is operating in compliance with all the terms provided in the nonstandardized plan agreement. Although the Plan has been amended since receiving the opinion letter, the plan administrator believes that the Plan is designed and is currently being operated in compliance with the applicable requirements of the IRC.

The Plan is subject to examination by the IRS for the statutory period.

NOTE 7 — PARTY-IN-INTEREST TRANSACTIONS

Fidelity Workplace Services LLC is the recordkeeper of the Plan. CSG Capital Partners of Janney Montgomery Scott LLC is the investment advisor of the Plan. Total fees paid from the Plan to these entities for the year ended December 31, 2024 were \$46,656. These transactions qualify as party-in-interest transactions.

NOTE 8 — RISKS AND UNCERTAINTIES

The Plan invests in various types of investment securities. Investment securities are exposed to various risks such as interest rate, market, and credit risks. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investment securities, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in the values of investment securities will occur in the near term and that such changes could materially affect participants' account balances and the amounts reported in the statements of net assets available for benefits.

NOTE 9 — DELINQUENT CONTRIBUTIONS

During the year ended December 31, 2022, the Company failed to remit to the Plan's custodian certain employee contributions and loan repayments totaling \$28,909 within the period prescribed by the Department of Labor's regulations. The Company corrected these prohibited transactions on September 9, 2024, by restoring the affected participants' accounts for potential lost income in the amount of \$50.
