Scope and Nature of the ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) Audit

The following description of the Cheyenne International LLC (the "Company") 401(k) Profit Sharing Plan and Trust (the "Plan") provides only general information. Participants should refer to the plan agreement, as amended and restated, for a more complete description of the Plan's provisions.

General

The Plan was established January 1, 2007, as a way for the Company to improve their overall benefits package. The Plan is a defined contribution plan covering substantially all employees of the Company who are age eighteen (18) or older with six months of service eligibility for the plan year ended December 31, 2024. The Plan is subject to the provisions of the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 ("ERISA"). Plan entry dates for eligible employees are the first day of each month following eligible entry date.

Administration

The Company serves as the plan sponsor and outsources plan administration to a third-party administrator, Paychex, Inc. The plan administrator has the responsibility to administer the Plan for the exclusive benefit of the participants and their beneficiaries. These duties include, but are not limited to, establishing procedures, maintaining records, interpreting provisions of the Plan, and making determinations regarding questions which may affect eligibility for benefits.

Mid Atlantic Trust Company ("MATC" or "Trustee") serves as trustee of the Plan. MATC receives all contributions made under the Plan, holds plan assets, and pays benefits as directed by the plan administrator.

Contributions

Each year, participants may defer up to 96% of their pretax compensation to the Plan, not to exceed certain Internal Revenue Code ("IRC") limitations. Participants who have attained age fifty (50) before the end of the Plan year are eligible to make catch-up contributions. Participants may also contribute amounts representing distributions from other qualified defined benefit or contribution plans. Participants direct the investment of their contributions into various investment options offered by the Plan. Employee contributions are recorded in the period during which the Company makes payroll deductions from the participant's earnings. The Company may make matching contributions equal to a discretionary percentage, determined by the Company, of the participant's elective deferrals to the Plan. The Company matches 100% of the first 6% of eligible wages per pay period that employees contributed to the Plan. The Company may make additional contributions at its discretion; however, no additional contributions were made for the year ended December 31, 2024. Contributions are subject to certain limitations.

Participant Accounts

Each participant's account is credited with the participant's contribution and allocations of the Company's contribution, if any, and plan earnings. Each participant's account is charged with withdrawals, and an allocation of any plan losses and administrative expenses. Allocations are based on participant earnings or account balances, as defined. The benefit to which a participant is entitled is the benefit that can be provided from the participant's vested account.

Vesting

Participants are immediately vested in their voluntary contributions and match contributions including rollovers, if any, plus actual earnings thereon. Should there be discretionary contributions made by the Company, vesting in the remainder of the participant's account is based on the following schedule:

Investment Options

Participants direct the investment of their accounts into various investment options offered by the Plan. The Plan currently offers mutual funds for participants.

Notes Receivable from Participants

Participants may borrow from their fund accounts at a minimum of \$1,000 up to a maximum equal to the lesser of \$50,000 or their vested account balance. The loans are secured by the balance in the participant's account and bear interest at rates which are commensurate with local prevailing rates as determined by the plan administrator. At December 31, 2024, outstanding loans bore interest ranging from 4.25%–9.50%. Principal and interest is paid ratably through payroll deductions or through ACH deductions directly from participants' bank accounts.

Payment of Benefits

On termination of service due to death, disability or retirement, a participant may elect to receive an amount equal to the value of the participant's vested interest in his or her account in either a lump-sum amount or various installment and annuity options as provided by the Plan. For termination of service due to other reasons, a participant may receive the value of the vested interest in his or her account as a lump-sum distribution. All fully vested balances are available for distribution after the participant reaches the age of 59 ½. Participants receive distributions of their accounts in a single lump sum as early as possible following the date of termination if the account balance is less than \$5,000. If the vested amount exceeds \$5,000, the participant must elect to receive the benefit. An election to defer payment can be made.

Note 2. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Basis of Accounting

The financial statements of the Plan are prepared in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America ("U.S. GAAP").

Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with U.S. GAAP requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect certain reported amounts of assets, liabilities and changes therein, and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities. Accordingly, actual results may differ from those estimates and assumptions.

Investment Valuation and Income Recognition

Investments are reported at fair value. Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. Plan management determines the Plan's valuation policies utilizing information provided by the Trustee. See Note 3 for discussion of fair value measurements.

Purchases and sales of investment securities are recorded on a trade-date basis. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Dividends are recorded on the ex-dividend date. Net appreciation in fair value of investments includes the Plan's gains and losses on investments bought and sold as well as held during the year.

Payment of Benefits

Benefits are recorded upon distribution.

Notes Receivable from Participants

Notes receivable from participants are measured at their unpaid principal balance. Delinquent participant loans are reclassified as distributions, based upon the terms of the plan document.

Administrative Expenses

The Plan's administrative expenses are paid by either the Plan or the Company, as provided by the plan document. Certain administrative functions are performed by employees of the Company. No such employee receives compensation from the Plan. Expenses relating to specific participant transactions may be charged directly to the participant's account.

Subsequent Events

The Plan has evaluated subsequent events through October 1, 2025, the date the financial statements were available to be issued.

Note 3. Fair Value Measurements

Fair value, as defined under U.S. GAAP, is an exit price representing the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. U.S. GAAP establishes a three-tier fair value hierarchy which prioritizes the inputs used in measuring fair value. These tiers include:

- Level 1** Observable inputs such as quoted prices in active markets.
- Level 2** Inputs other than quoted prices in active markets that are either directly or indirectly observable.
- Level 3** Unobservable inputs about which little or no market data exists, therefore requiring an entity to develop its own assumptions.

Assets and liabilities are classified in their entirety based on the lowest level of input that is significant to the fair value measurement. The Plan's assessment of the significance of a particular input to the fair value measurement requires judgment and may affect the valuation of fair value assets and liabilities and their placement within the fair value hierarchy levels.

Note 5. Exempt Party-in-Interest Transactions

Certain plan investments are managed by the Trustee and, therefore, these transactions qualify as exempt party-in-interest transactions. Fees paid by the Plan for investment management services were included as a reduction of the return earned on each fund. Fees paid to the recordkeeper were \$20,181 for the year ended December 31, 2024. Fees paid to an unrelated advisor were \$32,845 for the year ended December 31, 2024. Fees paid to a third-party contract administrator were \$7,380 for the year ended December 31, 2024.

Note 6. Nonexempt Transactions

Defined contribution plans are required to remit employee contributions to the Plan as soon as they can be reasonably segregated from the employer's general assets, but no later than the 15th business day of the month following the month in which the participant contributions are withheld by the employer. While the Company remitted all employee contributions to the Plan, contributions of \$346 were not remitted within the required time period for the year ended December 31, 2024.

Note 7. Plan Termination

Although it has not expressed any intent to do so, the Company has the right under the Plan to discontinue contributions at any time and to terminate the Plan subject to the provisions of ERISA. In the event of plan termination, participants will become 100% vested in their accounts.

Note 8. Tax Status

The Plan has not obtained a determination letter from the Internal Revenue Service ("IRS") stating that the Plan was in compliance with the applicable requirements of the IRC. The Plan is relying on the IRS approval of the standardized prototype plan that it is utilizing. The IRS has determined and informed the trustee by a letter dated August 31, 2020, that the prototype plan document was designed in accordance with applicable sections of the IRC. The plan administrator believes that the Plan is currently designed and being operated in compliance with the applicable requirements of the IRC. Therefore, the plan administrator believes that the Plan was qualified, and the related trust was tax-exempt as of the financial statement date.

U.S. GAAP requires plan management to evaluate tax positions taken by the Plan and recognize a tax liability (or asset) if the Plan has taken an uncertain position that more likely than not would not be sustained upon examination by the IRS. Plan management has analyzed the tax positions taken by the Plan, and has concluded that as of December 31, 2024, and 2023, there are no uncertain positions taken or expected to be taken that would require recognition of a liability (or asset) or disclosure in the financial statements. The Plan is subject to audits by taxing jurisdictions; however, there are currently no audits for any tax periods in progress.

Note 9. Risks and Uncertainties

The Plan invests in various investment securities. Investment securities, in general, are exposed to various risks such as interest rate, credit, and overall market volatility. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investment securities, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in the values of investment securities will occur in the near term and that such changes could materially affect participants' account balances and the amounts reported in the Statements of Net Assets Available for Benefits.

The Company serves as the plan sponsor and outsources plan administration to a third-party administrator, Paychex, Inc. The plan administrator has the responsibility to administer the Plan for the exclusive benefit of the participants and their beneficiaries. These duties include, but are not limited to, establishing procedures, maintaining records, interpreting provisions of the Plan, and making determinations regarding questions which may affect eligibility for benefits.

Mid Atlantic Trust Company ("MATC" or "Trustee") serves as trustee of the Plan. MATC receives all contributions made under the Plan, holds plan assets, and pays benefits as directed by the plan administrator.

Contributions

Each year, participants may defer up to 96% of their pretax compensation to the Plan, not to exceed certain Internal Revenue Code ("IRC") limitations. Participants who have attained age fifty (50) before the end of the Plan year are eligible to make catch-up contributions. Participants may also contribute amounts representing distributions from other qualified defined benefit or contribution plans. Participants direct the investment of their contributions into various investment options offered by the Plan. Employee contributions are recorded in the period during which the Company makes payroll deductions from the participant's earnings. The Company may make matching contributions equal to a discretionary percentage, determined by the Company, of the participant's elective deferrals to the Plan. The Company matches 100% of the first 6% of eligible wages per pay period that employees contributed to the Plan. The Company may make additional contributions at its discretion; however, no additional contributions were made for the year ended December 31, 2024. Contributions are subject to certain limitations.

Participant Accounts

Each participant's account is credited with the participant's contribution and allocations of the Company's contribution, if any, and plan earnings. Each participant's account is charged with withdrawals, and an allocation of any plan losses and administrative expenses. Allocations are based on participant earnings or account balances, as defined. The benefit to which a participant is entitled is the benefit that can be provided from the participant's vested account.

Vesting

Participants are immediately vested in their voluntary contributions and match contributions including rollovers, if any, plus actual earnings thereon. Should there be discretionary contributions made by the Company, vesting in the remainder of the participant's account is based on the following schedule:

Investment Options

Participants direct the investment of their accounts into various investment options offered by the Plan. The Plan currently offers mutual funds for participants.

Notes Receivable from Participants

Participants may borrow from their fund accounts at a minimum of \$1,000 up to a maximum equal to the lesser of \$50,000 or their vested account balance. The loans are secured by the balance in the participant's account and bear interest at rates which are commensurate with local prevailing rates as determined by the plan administrator. At December 31, 2024, outstanding loans bore interest ranging from 4.25%–9.50%. Principal and interest is paid ratably through payroll deductions or through ACH deductions directly from participants' bank accounts.

Payment of Benefits

On termination of service due to death, disability or retirement, a participant may elect to receive an amount equal to the value of the participant's vested interest in his or her account in either a lump-sum amount or various installment and annuity options as provided by the Plan. For termination of service due to other reasons, a participant may receive the value of the vested interest in his or her account as a lump-sum distribution. All fully vested balances are available for distribution after the participant reaches the age of 59 ½. Participants receive distributions of their accounts in a single lump sum as early as possible following the date of termination if the account balance is less than \$5,000. If the vested amount exceeds \$5,000, the participant must elect to receive the benefit. An election to defer payment can be made.

Note 2. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Basis of Accounting

The financial statements of the Plan are prepared in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America ("U.S. GAAP").

Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with U.S. GAAP requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect certain reported amounts of assets, liabilities and changes therein, and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities. Accordingly, actual results may differ from those estimates and assumptions.

Investment Valuation and Income Recognition

Investments are reported at fair value. Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. Plan management determines the Plan's valuation policies utilizing information provided by the Trustee. See Note 3 for discussion of fair value measurements.

Purchases and sales of investment securities are recorded on a trade-date basis. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Dividends are recorded on the ex-dividend date. Net appreciation in fair value of investments includes the Plan's gains and losses on investments bought and sold as well as held during the year.

Payment of Benefits

Benefits are recorded upon distribution.

Notes Receivable from Participants

Notes receivable from participants are measured at their unpaid principal balance. Delinquent participant loans are reclassified as distributions, based upon the terms of the plan document.

Administrative Expenses

The Plan's administrative expenses are paid by either the Plan or the Company, as provided by the plan document. Certain administrative functions are performed by employees of the Company. No such employee receives compensation from the Plan. Expenses relating to specific participant transactions may be charged directly to the participant's account.

Subsequent Events

The Plan has evaluated subsequent events through October 1, 2025, the date the financial statements were available to be issued.

Note 3. Fair Value Measurements

Fair value, as defined under U.S. GAAP, is an exit price representing the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. U.S. GAAP establishes a three-tier fair value hierarchy which prioritizes the inputs used in measuring fair value. These tiers include:

- Level 1** Observable inputs such as quoted prices in active markets.
- Level 2** Inputs other than quoted prices in active markets that are either directly or indirectly observable.
- Level 3** Unobservable inputs about which little or no market data exists, therefore requiring an entity to develop its own assumptions.

Assets and liabilities are classified in their entirety based on the lowest level of input that is significant to the fair value measurement. The Plan's assessment of the significance of a particular input to the fair value measurement requires judgment and may affect the valuation of fair value assets and liabilities and their placement within the fair value hierarchy levels.

Mutual Funds

Mutual funds are publicly traded investments and are valued daily at the closing price reported on the active market on which the funds are traded.

Note 5. Exempt Party-in-Interest Transactions

Certain plan investments are managed by the Trustee and, therefore, these transactions qualify as exempt party-in-interest transactions. Fees paid by the Plan for investment management services were included as a reduction of the return earned on each fund. Fees paid to the recordkeeper were \$20,181 for the year ended December 31, 2024. Fees paid to an unrelated advisor were \$32,845 for the year ended December 31, 2024. Fees paid to a third-party contract administrator were \$7,380 for the year ended December 31, 2024.

Note 6. Nonexempt Transactions

Defined contribution plans are required to remit employee contributions to the Plan as soon as they can be reasonably segregated from the employer's general assets, but no later than the 15th business day of the month following the month in which the participant contributions are withheld by the employer. While the Company remitted all employee contributions to the Plan, contributions of \$346 were not remitted within the required time period for the year ended December 31, 2024.

Note 7. Plan Termination

Although it has not expressed any intent to do so, the Company has the right under the Plan to discontinue contributions at any time and to terminate the Plan subject to the provisions of ERISA. In the event of plan termination, participants will become 100% vested in their accounts.

Note 8. Tax Status

The Plan has not obtained a determination letter from the Internal Revenue Service ("IRS") stating that the Plan was in compliance with the applicable requirements of the IRC. The Plan is relying on the IRS approval of the standardized prototype plan that it is utilizing. The IRS has determined and informed the trustee by a letter dated August 31, 2020, that the prototype plan document was designed in accordance with applicable sections of the IRC. The plan administrator believes that the Plan is currently designed and being operated in compliance with the applicable requirements of the IRC. Therefore, the plan administrator believes that the Plan was qualified, and the related trust was tax-exempt as of the financial statement date.

U.S. GAAP requires plan management to evaluate tax positions taken by the Plan and recognize a tax liability (or asset) if the Plan has taken an uncertain position that more likely than not would not be sustained upon examination by the IRS. Plan management has analyzed the tax positions taken by the Plan, and has concluded that as of December 31, 2024, and 2023, there are no uncertain positions taken or expected to be taken that would require recognition of a liability (or asset) or disclosure in the financial statements. The Plan is subject to audits by taxing jurisdictions; however, there are currently no audits for any tax periods in progress.

Note 9. Risks and Uncertainties

The Plan invests in various investment securities. Investment securities, in general, are exposed to various risks such as interest rate, credit, and overall market volatility. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investment securities, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in the values of investment securities will occur in the near term and that such changes could materially affect participants' account balances and the amounts reported in the Statements of Net Assets Available for Benefits.
