Note A – Description of Plan

The following description of the Quality Tool & Stamping Company, Inc. 401(k) Profit Sharing Plan (Plan) provides only general information. Participants should refer to the Summary Plan Description for a more complete description of the Plan's provisions.

General

The Plan is a defined contribution profit sharing and 401(k) plan covering substantially all employees of Quality Tool & Stamping Company, Inc. (the Plan's sponsor). Eligible employees can become participants in the 401(k) portion of the Plan and become eligible to receive discretionary matching contributions on the first day of the quarter upon completion of six months of service and attainment of age 21. Participants become eligible to receive discretionary profit-sharing contributions from the Company if employed on the last day of the year and upon completion of 1,000 hours of service and attainment of age 21. The Plan is subject to the provisions of the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (ERISA).

Contributions

A participant may elect to make contributions to the Plan through payroll deductions from each participant's compensation, as defined, subject to statutory limitations. An employee meeting the eligibility requirements shall make an automatic deferral of 6% of eligible compensation, escalating by 1% each plan year until reaching the default percentage of 10%, unless the employee has instructed otherwise. The Plan also allows participants to transfer funds from other employer qualified plans into the Plan.

The Company may make a matching contribution based on the participant's contribution. This matching contribution amount is discretionary and is determined annually. A matching contribution of 50% of a maximum of \$2,470 deferred by each participant was made for the years ended December 31, 2024 and 2023. Additional profit-sharing amounts may be contributed at the option of the Company's Board of Directors.

Plan Operations

The Company has appointed Delaware Charter Guarantee and Trust Company d/b/a Principal Trust Company (Custodian) to serve as custodian, certain employees to act as trustee and the Company to act as plan administrator. The Custodian is responsible for holding the investment assets of the Plan, executing investment transactions, and making distributions to participants. The plan administrator interprets and communicates the provisions of the Plan, ensuring that all government and participant reporting requirements are fulfilled. The Plan's fiduciary committee is responsible for oversight of the Plan, determines the appropriateness of the Plan's investment strategy and monitors investment performance.

Participant Accounts

Individual accounts are maintained for each participant, with benefits limited to the amount contributed to the participant's account plus or minus any allocation of income, expenses, gains, or losses. Allocations to participant accounts are based on compensation or account balances, as specified by the plan document. The benefit to which a participant is entitled is the benefit that can be provided from the participant's vested account.

The Plan allows a participant to self-direct investment transactions associated with separate investment fund options made available by the employer for this purpose.

Vesting

Participants are immediately vested in their voluntary contributions and company matching contributions plus actual earnings thereon. Vesting in any other Company nonelective contribution portion of their accounts including profit sharing is based on years of continuous service, as follows:

Less than 2 years	0%
2 years	20%
3 years	40%
4 years	60%
5 years	80%
6 or more years	100%

A participant also becomes fully vested at the time of the participant's death, if the participant becomes disabled while employed, or upon attainment of normal retirement age.

Loans to Participants

Under certain conditions, a participant may obtain a loan from the Plan. A participant's loan cannot exceed the lesser of \$50,000 or one half of the participant's nonforfeitable interest in the Plan and must be a minimum of \$1,000. The loan will bear a reasonable interest rate, be adequately secured, and not exceed a period of five years (unless used for the purchase of a primary residence). Principal and interest is paid ratably through payroll deductions.

Payment of Benefits

On termination of service, retirement, total and permanent disability, attainment of age 65, or death, a participant may elect to receive a lump sum amount equal to the value of the participant's vested interest in his or her account. In-service withdrawals are permitted upon attaining age 59½ or in cases of financial hardship.

Costs and Expenses

Certain transaction fees and administrative expenses are paid by the Plan and are based on reasonable and customary rates. Certain other costs and expenses incurred in connection with the operation of the Plan are borne by the Company.

Forfeited Accounts

Forfeited balances of terminated participants' nonvested accounts are treated as additional nonelective contributions and typically allocated in the same plan year in which the designated forfeiture occurs. The balance in the forfeiture account at December 31, 2024 and 2023 was \$447 and \$354, respectively. No forfeitures were allocated to contributions during the years ended December 31, 2024 and 2023.

Note B – Summary of Accounting Policies

Basis of Accounting

The financial statements of the Plan are prepared using the accrual basis of accounting.

Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires the plan administrator to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and changes therein, and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities. Accordingly, actual results could differ from those estimates.

Investments and Income Recognition

Investments are reported in the Plan's financial statements at fair value (except for the fully benefit-responsive contract, which is reported at contract value). Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. See Note C for discussion of fair value measurements.

Investments and Income Recognition (Continued)

Income from interest is recorded as it is earned. Dividends are recorded on the ex-dividend date. Purchases and sales of securities are recorded on a trade date basis. Net appreciation or depreciation of investments is determined using the value at the beginning of the year or purchase price if acquired since that date. Management fees and operating expenses charged to the Plan for investments in the mutual funds are deducted from income earned on a daily basis and are not separately reflected. Consequently, management fees and operating expenses are reflected as a reduction of investment return for such investments.

Notes Receivable from Participants

Notes receivable from participants are measured at their unpaid principal balance plus any accrued but unpaid interest. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Related fees are charged directly to the participant's account and are included in administrative expense when incurred. Delinquent notes receivable from participants are recorded as a distribution based upon the terms of the plan document; therefore, an allowance for credit losses is not considered necessary at December 31, 2024 and 2023.

Benefits

Benefits are recorded when paid.

Subsequent Events

Management evaluates events occurring subsequent to the date of the financial statements in determining the accounting for and disclosure of transactions and events that affect the financial statements. Subsequent events have been evaluated through October 1, 2025, which is the date the financial statements were available to be issued.

Note C – Fair Value Measurements

The Plan's investments, with the exception of the fully benefit-responsive contract, are reported at fair value in the accompanying Statements of Assets Available for Benefits. The methods used to measure fair value may produce an amount that may not be indicative of net realizable value or reflective of future fair values. Furthermore, although the Plan believes its valuation methods are appropriate and consistent with other market participants, the use of different methodologies or assumptions to determine the fair value of certain financial instruments could result in a different fair value measurement at the reporting date.

The fair value measurement accounting literature establishes a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. The hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (level 1 measurements) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (level 3 measurements). The three levels of the fair value hierarchy are described as follows:

Level 1 – inputs are unadjusted quoted prices for identical assets or liabilities in active markets that the Plan has the ability to access.

Level 2 – inputs to the valuation methodology include:

- quoted prices for similar assets and liabilities in active markets
- quoted prices for identical or similar assets and liabilities in markets that are not active
- other inputs that are observable or can be corroborated by observable market data
- inputs that are derived principally from or corroborated by observable market data by correlation or other means.

If the asset or liability has a specified (contractual) term, the Level 2 input must be observable for substantially the full term of the asset or liability.

Level 3 – inputs are generally unobservable and significant to the fair value measurement. Such inputs typically reflect management's estimates of assumptions that market participants would use in pricing the asset or liability, including certain pricing models, discounted cash flow methodologies, and similar techniques that use significant unobservable inputs.

The asset's or liability's fair value measurement level within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of any input that is significant to the fair value measurement. Valuation techniques used need to maximize the use of observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs.

Following is a description of the valuation methodologies used for investments measured at fair value. There have been no changes in the methodologies used at December 31, 2024 and 2023.

Mutual funds: Valued based on quoted net asset values of the shares held by the Plan on the last business day of the plan year.

Note D - Investment Contracts with Insurance Companies

Plan assets include a fully benefit-responsive group annuity fixed income contract issued by the Principal Life Insurance Company (Principal Life) for the Principal Fixed Income Guaranteed Option. Principal Life maintains the contributions in a general account. The guaranteed investment contract issuer is contractually obligated to repay the principal and a specified interest rate that is guaranteed to the Plan based on a formula agreed upon with the issuer. The net crediting rate at December 31, 2024 and 2023 was 1.55%.

As described above, because the fixed income contract is fully benefit-responsive, contract value is the relevant measurement attribute for that portion of the assets available for benefits attributable to the contract. Contract value, as reported to the Plan by the Custodian, represents contributions made under the contract, plus earnings at guaranteed crediting rates, less participant withdrawals and fees. Participants may ordinarily direct permitted withdrawal or transfer of all or a portion of their investment at contract value within reasonable timeframes.

By definition, the fixed income contract is an insurance contract. As a result, the plan may transact or terminate the contract according to the terms defined in the contract at any time.

Note E - Information Certified by Custodian

All investment information disclosed in the accompanying financial statements and supplemental schedule, including investments held at December 31, 2024 and 2023, and net appreciation in fair value of investments and interest and dividends for the years then ended, were obtained or derived from information supplied to the plan administrator and certified as complete and accurate by the Custodian.

Note F - Risks and Uncertainties

Investment securities are exposed to various risks such as interest rate, market, and credit risks. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investment securities, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in the values of investment securities will occur in the near term and that such changes could materially affect participants' account balances and the amount reported in the Statements of Assets Available for Benefits.

Note G - Party-In-Interest Transactions

Plan investments include mutual funds and insurance company unallocated contracts managed by affiliates of Principal Trust, who hold the Plan's investments. Therefore, these transactions qualify as party-in-interest transactions.

Note G – Party-In-Interest Transactions (Continued)

Fees paid by the Plan to parties-in-interest for services rendered to the Plan were \$61,698 and \$51,724 for the years ended December 31, 2024 and 2023, respectively. Such fees were based on reasonable and customary rates.

In addition, the Plan maintains notes receivable from participants. Those party-in-interest transactions are exempt from ERISA.

Note H – Plan Termination

Although it has not expressed any intent to do so, the Company has the right under the Plan to discontinue its contributions at any time and to terminate the Plan subject to the provisions of ERISA. In the event of plan termination, participants would become 100 percent vested in their accounts.

Note I – Tax Status

The prototype plan used by the Plan obtained an opinion letter dated June 30, 2020, in which the Internal Revenue Service stated that the prototype plan, as then designed, was in compliance with the applicable requirements of the Internal Revenue Code. The Plan has not requested or received an individual determination letter. However, the plan administrator and the Plan's tax counsel believe that the Plan is currently designed and being operated in compliance with the applicable requirements of the Internal Revenue Code. Therefore, no provision for income taxes has been included in the Plan's financial statements.

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require plan management to evaluate tax positions taken by the Plan and recognize a tax liability (or asset) if the Plan has taken an uncertain position that more likely than not would not be sustained upon examination by the Internal Revenue Service. The plan administrator has analyzed the tax positions taken by the Plan, and has concluded that as of December 31, 2024, there are no uncertain positions taken or expected to be taken that would require recognition of a liability (or asset) or disclosure in the financial statements. The Plan is subject to routine audits by taxing jurisdictions; however, there are currently no audits for any tax period in progress. The plan administrator believes it is no longer subject to income tax examinations for years prior to 2021.

Scope and Nature of the ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) Audit

We have performed audits of the financial statements of Quality Tool & Stamping Company, Inc. 401(k) Profit Sharing Plan, an employee benefit plan subject to the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (ERISA), as permitted by ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) (ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) audit). The financial statements comprise the statements of assets available for benefits as of December 31, 2024 and 2023, and the related statements of changes in assets available for benefits for the years then ended, and the related notes to the financial statements.

Management, having determined it is permissible in the circumstances, has elected to have the audits of Quality Tool & Stamping Company, Inc. 401(k) Profit Sharing Plan's financial statements performed in accordance with ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) pursuant to 29 CFR 2520.103-8 of the Department of Labor's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA. As permitted by ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C), our audits need not extend to any statements or information related to assets held for investment of the plan (investment information) by a bank or similar institution or insurance carrier that is regulated, supervised, and subject to periodic examination by a state or federal agency, provided that the statements or information regarding assets so held are prepared and certified to by the bank or similar institution or insurance carrier in accordance with 29 CFR 2520.103-5 of the Department of Labor's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA (qualified institution).

Management has obtained certifications from a qualified institution as of December 31, 2024 and 2023, and for the years then ended, stating that the certified investment information, as described in Note E to the financial statements, is complete and accurate.

Opinion

In our opinion, based on our audits and on the procedures performed as described in the *Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements* section—

- the amounts and disclosures in the accompanying financial statements, other than those agreed to or derived from the certified investment information, are presented fairly, in all material respects, in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.
- the information in the accompanying financial statements related to assets held by and certified to by a qualified institution agrees to, or is derived from, in all material respects, the information prepared and certified by an institution that management determined meets the requirements of ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C).

Basis for Opinion

We conducted our audits in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the *Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements* section of our report. We are required to be independent of Quality Tool & Stamping Company, Inc. 401(k) Profit Sharing Plan and to meet our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with the relevant ethical requirements relating to our audits. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) audit opinion.

Responsibilities of Management for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America, and for the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error. Management's election of the ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) audit does not affect management's responsibility for the financial statements.

In preparing the financial statements, management is required to evaluate whether there are conditions or events, considered in the aggregate, that raise substantial doubt about Quality Tool & Stamping Company, Inc. 401(k) Profit Sharing Plan's ability to continue as a going concern for one year after the date the financial statements are available to be issued.

Note A – Description of Plan

The following description of the Quality Tool & Stamping Company, Inc. 401(k) Profit Sharing Plan (Plan) provides only general information. Participants should refer to the Summary Plan Description for a more complete description of the Plan's provisions.

General

The Plan is a defined contribution profit sharing and 401(k) plan covering substantially all employees of Quality Tool & Stamping Company, Inc. (the Plan's sponsor). Eligible employees can become participants in the 401(k) portion of the Plan and become eligible to receive discretionary matching contributions on the first day of the quarter upon completion of six months of service and attainment of age 21. Participants become eligible to receive discretionary profit-sharing contributions from the Company if employed on the last day of the year and upon completion of 1,000 hours of service and attainment of age 21. The Plan is subject to the provisions of the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (ERISA).

Contributions

A participant may elect to make contributions to the Plan through payroll deductions from each participant's compensation, as defined, subject to statutory limitations. An employee meeting the eligibility requirements shall make an automatic deferral of 6% of eligible compensation, escalating by 1% each plan year until reaching the default percentage of 10%, unless the employee has instructed otherwise. The Plan also allows participants to transfer funds from other employer qualified plans into the Plan.

The Company may make a matching contribution based on the participant's contribution. This matching contribution amount is discretionary and is determined annually. A matching contribution of 50% of a maximum of \$2,470 deferred by each participant was made for the years ended December 31, 2024 and 2023. Additional profit-sharing amounts may be contributed at the option of the Company's Board of Directors.

Plan Operations

The Company has appointed Delaware Charter Guarantee and Trust Company d/b/a Principal Trust Company (Custodian) to serve as custodian, certain employees to act as trustee and the Company to act as plan administrator. The Custodian is responsible for holding the investment assets of the Plan, executing investment transactions, and making distributions to participants. The plan administrator interprets and communicates the provisions of the Plan, ensuring that all government and participant reporting requirements are fulfilled. The Plan's fiduciary committee is responsible for oversight of the Plan, determines the appropriateness of the Plan's investment strategy and monitors investment performance.

Participant Accounts

Individual accounts are maintained for each participant, with benefits limited to the amount contributed to the participant's account plus or minus any allocation of income, expenses, gains, or losses. Allocations to participant accounts are based on compensation or account balances, as specified by the plan document. The benefit to which a participant is entitled is the benefit that can be provided from the participant's vested account.

The Plan allows a participant to self-direct investment transactions associated with separate investment fund options made available by the employer for this purpose.

Vesting

Participants are immediately vested in their voluntary contributions and company matching contributions plus actual earnings thereon. Vesting in any other Company nonelective contribution portion of their accounts including profit sharing is based on years of continuous service, as follows:

Less than 2 years	0%
2 years	20%
3 years	40%
4 years	60%
5 years	80%
6 or more years	100%

A participant also becomes fully vested at the time of the participant's death, if the participant becomes disabled while employed, or upon attainment of normal retirement age.

Loans to Participants

Under certain conditions, a participant may obtain a loan from the Plan. A participant's loan cannot exceed the lesser of \$50,000 or one half of the participant's nonforfeitable interest in the Plan and must be a minimum of \$1,000. The loan will bear a reasonable interest rate, be adequately secured, and not exceed a period of five years (unless used for the purchase of a primary residence). Principal and interest is paid ratably through payroll deductions.

Payment of Benefits

On termination of service, retirement, total and permanent disability, attainment of age 65, or death, a participant may elect to receive a lump sum amount equal to the value of the participant's vested interest in his or her account. In-service withdrawals are permitted upon attaining age 59½ or in cases of financial hardship.

Costs and Expenses

Certain transaction fees and administrative expenses are paid by the Plan and are based on reasonable and customary rates. Certain other costs and expenses incurred in connection with the operation of the Plan are borne by the Company.

Forfeited Accounts

Forfeited balances of terminated participants' nonvested accounts are treated as additional nonelective contributions and typically allocated in the same plan year in which the designated forfeiture occurs. The balance in the forfeiture account at December 31, 2024 and 2023 was \$447 and \$354, respectively. No forfeitures were allocated to contributions during the years ended December 31, 2024 and 2023.

Note B – Summary of Accounting Policies

Basis of Accounting

The financial statements of the Plan are prepared using the accrual basis of accounting.

Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires the plan administrator to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and changes therein, and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities. Accordingly, actual results could differ from those estimates.

Investments and Income Recognition

Investments are reported in the Plan's financial statements at fair value (except for the fully benefit-responsive contract, which is reported at contract value). Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. See Note C for discussion of fair value measurements.

Investments and Income Recognition (Continued)

Income from interest is recorded as it is earned. Dividends are recorded on the ex-dividend date. Purchases and sales of securities are recorded on a trade date basis. Net appreciation or depreciation of investments is determined using the value at the beginning of the year or purchase price if acquired since that date. Management fees and operating expenses charged to the Plan for investments in the mutual funds are deducted from income earned on a daily basis and are not separately reflected. Consequently, management fees and operating expenses are reflected as a reduction of investment return for such investments.

Notes Receivable from Participants

Notes receivable from participants are measured at their unpaid principal balance plus any accrued but unpaid interest. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Related fees are charged directly to the participant's account and are included in administrative expense when incurred. Delinquent notes receivable from participants are recorded as a distribution based upon the terms of the plan document; therefore, an allowance for credit losses is not considered necessary at December 31, 2024 and 2023.

Benefits

Benefits are recorded when paid.

Subsequent Events

Management evaluates events occurring subsequent to the date of the financial statements in determining the accounting for and disclosure of transactions and events that affect the financial statements. Subsequent events have been evaluated through October 1, 2025, which is the date the financial statements were available to be issued.

Note C – Fair Value Measurements

The Plan's investments, with the exception of the fully benefit-responsive contract, are reported at fair value in the accompanying Statements of Assets Available for Benefits. The methods used to measure fair value may produce an amount that may not be indicative of net realizable value or reflective of future fair values. Furthermore, although the Plan believes its valuation methods are appropriate and consistent with other market participants, the use of different methodologies or assumptions to determine the fair value of certain financial instruments could result in a different fair value measurement at the reporting date.

The fair value measurement accounting literature establishes a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. The hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (level 1 measurements) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (level 3 measurements). The three levels of the fair value hierarchy are described as follows:

Level 1 – inputs are unadjusted quoted prices for identical assets or liabilities in active markets that the Plan has the ability to access.

Level 2 – inputs to the valuation methodology include:

- quoted prices for similar assets and liabilities in active markets
- quoted prices for identical or similar assets and liabilities in markets that are not active
- other inputs that are observable or can be corroborated by observable market data
- inputs that are derived principally from or corroborated by observable market data by correlation or other means.

If the asset or liability has a specified (contractual) term, the Level 2 input must be observable for substantially the full term of the asset or liability.

Level 3 – inputs are generally unobservable and significant to the fair value measurement. Such inputs typically reflect management's estimates of assumptions that market participants would use in pricing the asset or liability, including certain pricing models, discounted cash flow methodologies, and similar techniques that use significant unobservable inputs.

The asset's or liability's fair value measurement level within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of any input that is significant to the fair value measurement. Valuation techniques used need to maximize the use of observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs.

Following is a description of the valuation methodologies used for investments measured at fair value. There have been no changes in the methodologies used at December 31, 2024 and 2023.

Mutual funds: Valued based on quoted net asset values of the shares held by the Plan on the last business day of the plan year.

Note D - Investment Contracts with Insurance Companies

Plan assets include a fully benefit-responsive group annuity fixed income contract issued by the Principal Life Insurance Company (Principal Life) for the Principal Fixed Income Guaranteed Option. Principal Life maintains the contributions in a general account. The guaranteed investment contract issuer is contractually obligated to repay the principal and a specified interest rate that is guaranteed to the Plan based on a formula agreed upon with the issuer. The net crediting rate at December 31, 2024 and 2023 was 1.55%.

As described above, because the fixed income contract is fully benefit-responsive, contract value is the relevant measurement attribute for that portion of the assets available for benefits attributable to the contract. Contract value, as reported to the Plan by the Custodian, represents contributions made under the contract, plus earnings at guaranteed crediting rates, less participant withdrawals and fees. Participants may ordinarily direct permitted withdrawal or transfer of all or a portion of their investment at contract value within reasonable timeframes.

By definition, the fixed income contract is an insurance contract. As a result, the plan may transact or terminate the contract according to the terms defined in the contract at any time.

Note E - Information Certified by Custodian

All investment information disclosed in the accompanying financial statements and supplemental schedule, including investments held at December 31, 2024 and 2023, and net appreciation in fair value of investments and interest and dividends for the years then ended, were obtained or derived from information supplied to the plan administrator and certified as complete and accurate by the Custodian.

Note F - Risks and Uncertainties

Investment securities are exposed to various risks such as interest rate, market, and credit risks. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investment securities, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in the values of investment securities will occur in the near term and that such changes could materially affect participants' account balances and the amount reported in the Statements of Assets Available for Benefits.

Note G - Party-In-Interest Transactions

Plan investments include mutual funds and insurance company unallocated contracts managed by affiliates of Principal Trust, who hold the Plan's investments. Therefore, these transactions qualify as party-in-interest transactions.

Note G – Party-In-Interest Transactions (Continued)

Fees paid by the Plan to parties-in-interest for services rendered to the Plan were \$61,698 and \$51,724 for the years ended December 31, 2024 and 2023, respectively. Such fees were based on reasonable and customary rates.

In addition, the Plan maintains notes receivable from participants. Those party-in-interest transactions are exempt from ERISA.

Note H – Plan Termination

Although it has not expressed any intent to do so, the Company has the right under the Plan to discontinue its contributions at any time and to terminate the Plan subject to the provisions of ERISA. In the event of plan termination, participants would become 100 percent vested in their accounts.

Note I – Tax Status

The prototype plan used by the Plan obtained an opinion letter dated June 30, 2020, in which the Internal Revenue Service stated that the prototype plan, as then designed, was in compliance with the applicable requirements of the Internal Revenue Code. The Plan has not requested or received an individual determination letter. However, the plan administrator and the Plan's tax counsel believe that the Plan is currently designed and being operated in compliance with the applicable requirements of the Internal Revenue Code. Therefore, no provision for income taxes has been included in the Plan's financial statements.

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require plan management to evaluate tax positions taken by the Plan and recognize a tax liability (or asset) if the Plan has taken an uncertain position that more likely than not would not be sustained upon examination by the Internal Revenue Service. The plan administrator has analyzed the tax positions taken by the Plan, and has concluded that as of December 31, 2024, there are no uncertain positions taken or expected to be taken that would require recognition of a liability (or asset) or disclosure in the financial statements. The Plan is subject to routine audits by taxing jurisdictions; however, there are currently no audits for any tax period in progress. The plan administrator believes it is no longer subject to income tax examinations for years prior to 2021.
