We have performed audits of the financial statements of Universal Orlando 401(k) Retirement Plan (the Plan), an employee benefit plan subject to the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (ERISA), as permitted by ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) (ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) audit). The financial statements comprise the statements of net assets available for benefits as of December 31, 2024 and 2023, and the related statement of changes in net assets available for benefits for the year ended December 31, 2024, and the related notes to the financial statements.

Management, having determined it is permissible in the circumstances, has elected to have the audits of the Plan's financial statements performed in accordance with ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) pursuant to 29 CFR 2520.103-8 of the Department of Labor's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA. As permitted by ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C), our audits need not extend to any statements or information related to assets held for investment of the Plan (investment information) by a bank or similar institution or insurance carrier that is regulated, supervised, and subject to periodic examination by a state or federal agency, provided that the statements or information regarding assets so held are prepared and certified to by the bank or similar institution or insurance carrier in accordance with 29 CFR 2520.103-5 of the Department of Labor's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA (qualified institution).

Management has obtained certifications from a qualified institution as of December 31, 2024 and 2023, and for the year ended December 31, 2024, stating that the certified investment information, as described in Note 3 to the financial statements, is complete and accurate.

Opinion

In our opinion, based on our audits and on the procedures performed as described in the *Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit* section:

- the amounts and disclosures in the accompanying financial statements, other than those agreed to or derived from the certified investment information, are presented fairly, in all material respects, in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.
- the information in the accompanying financial statements related to assets held by and certified to by a qualified institution agrees to, or is derived from, in all material respects, the information prepared and certified by an institution that management determined meets the requirements of ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C).

Basis for Opinion

We conducted our audits in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America (GAAS). Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the *Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements* section of our report. We are required to be independent of the Plan and to meet our other ethical responsibilities, in accordance with the relevant ethical requirements relating to our audits. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) audit opinion.

Responsibilities of Management for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America, and for the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal controls relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error. Management's election of the ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) audit does not affect management's responsibility for the financial statements.

In preparing the financial statements, management is required to evaluate whether there are conditions or events, considered in the aggregate, that raise substantial doubt about the Plan's ability to continue as a going concern for one year after the date that the financial statements are available to be issued.

Management is also responsible for maintaining a current Plan instrument, including all Plan amendments, administering the Plan, and determining that the Plan's transactions that are presented and disclosed in the financial statements are in conformity with the Plan's provisions, including maintaining sufficient records with respect to each of the participants, to determine the benefits due or which may become due to such participants.

Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements

Except as described in the *Scope and Nature of the ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) Audit of the Financial Statements* section of our report, our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance but is not absolute assurance and therefore is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with GAAS will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal controls. Misstatements are considered material if, there is a substantial likelihood that, individually or in the aggregate, they would influence the judgment made by a reasonable user based on the financial statements.

In performing an audit in accordance with GAAS, we:

- Exercise professional judgment and maintain professional skepticism throughout the audit.
- Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error, and design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks. Such procedures include examining, on a test basis, evidence regarding the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements.
- Obtain an understanding of internal controls relevant to the audit in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the Plan's internal controls. Accordingly, no such opinion is expressed.
- Evaluate the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluate the overall presentation of the financial statements.
- Conclude whether, in our judgment, there are conditions or events, considered in the aggregate, that raise substantial doubt about the Plan's ability to continue as a going concern for a reasonable period of time.

Our audits did not extend to the certified investment information, except for obtaining and reading the certification, comparing the certified investment information with the related information presented and disclosed in the financial statements, and reading the disclosures relating to the certified investment information to assess whether they are in accordance with the presentation and disclosure requirements of accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Accordingly, the objective of an ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) audit is not to express an opinion about whether the financial statements as a whole are presented fairly, in all material respects, in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

We are required to communicate with those charged with governance regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit, significant audit findings, and certain internal controls-related matters that we identified during the audit.

Other Matter – Supplemental Schedule Required by ERISA

The supplemental schedule of Schedule H, Line 4i – Schedule of Assets (Held at End of Year) as of December 31, 2024 is presented for purposes of additional analysis and is not a required part of the financial statements but is supplementary information required by the Department of Labor's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA. Such information is the responsibility of management and was derived from and relates directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements. The information included in the supplemental schedule, other than that agreed to or derived from the certified investment information, has been subjected to auditing procedures applied in the audit of the financial



statements and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements or to the financial statements themselves, and other additional procedures in accordance with GAAS. For information included in the supplemental schedule that agreed to or is derived from the certified investment information, we compared such information to the related certified investment information.

In forming our opinion on the supplemental schedule, we evaluated whether the supplemental schedule, other than the information agreed to or derived from the certified investment information, including their form and content, is presented in conformity with the Department of Labor's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA.

- the form and content of the supplemental schedule, other than the information in the supplemental schedule that agreed to or is derived from the certified investment information, is presented, in all material respects, in conformity with the Department of Labor's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

AS OF DECEMBER 31, 2024 AND 2023, AND FOR THE YEAR ENDED DECEMBER 31, 2024

1. PLAN DESCRIPTION

The following description of the Universal Orlando 401(k) Retirement Plan (the “Plan”) provides only general information. Participants should refer to the Plan document for a more complete description of the Plan's provisions. Copies of these documents are available from the Plan sponsor, Universal City Development Partners, Ltd., d/b/a Universal Orlando (the “Company”).

The Plan is a defined contribution plan qualified under Internal Revenue Code (the “Code”) Sections 401(a), 401(k) and 401(m) and the Plan is subject to the provisions of the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (“ERISA”). The original Plan has been amended and restated to reflect mergers of other plans with and into the Plan and to make certain other technical, compliance and design changes. The date of the last Plan Reinstatement is as of January 1, 2024.

The Plan’s assets are invested in the Comcast Corporation Employee Savings Plans Master Trust (“Master Trust”) that was established by Comcast Corporation (“Comcast”). Fidelity Management Trust Company (“the Trustee”) is the appointed Trustee of the Plan. The Master Trust allows Comcast to have a uniform investment line-up across its various defined contribution plans while allowing varying provisions in plan design.

The Plan covers all eligible employees of Universal Orlando. Non-exempt/hourly employees are eligible to participate in the Plan upon completion of 1,000 hours of service during the 24-month period that commences on their hire date, or during any calendar year that commences after their hire date. Salaried employees of the Plan are eligible to participate in the Plan upon the date of hire. Participation in the Plan is voluntary. Each year, participants may contribute up to the maximum amount of their compensation for the year allowed by law, subject to certain limitations under the Code. Participants who have attained age 50 before the end of the Plan year are eligible to make catch-up contributions. Participants may also contribute amounts representing distributions from other qualified defined benefit or defined contribution plans (rollover). Participants direct the investment of contributions into various investment options offered by the Plan.

Each eligible employee may elect to contribute up to \$10,000 per plan year as voluntary after-tax considerations. In addition, eligible participants may elect an in-plan rollover of all or any portion of their account balances to the participant’s Roth rollover account.

Company matching contributions is equal to 100%, up to 6% of each participants’ eligible compensation.

Each participant’s account is credited with their contributions and the Company’s matching contributions as well as allocations of Plan earnings. Participant accounts are charged with an allocation of administrative expenses that are paid by the Plan. Allocations are based on participant earnings, account balances, or specific participant transactions, as defined. The benefit to which a participant is entitled is the benefit that can be provided from the participant’s vested account.

A self-directed mutual fund window is available to all participants. A participant may elect to invest up to 100% of their contributions and earnings thereon in eligible investment funds offered by the brokerage provider under the self-directed mutual fund window subject to any applicable limitations on available investment funds.

Participants immediately vest in their contributions as well as in any Safe Harbor matching contributions plus actual earnings thereon.

Upon termination of service due to death, disability, or retirement, a participant may elect to receive either a lump-sum payment equal to the value of the participant’s vested interest in his or her account, or a series of installments over time. For termination of service for other reasons, a participant may receive the value of the vested interest in his or her account as a lump-sum distribution.

Participants are not permitted to take loans against their account balances. However, if the account balance under another NBCUniversal or Comcast plan is transferred to the Plan and includes an outstanding participant loan, the participant may continue to repay that loan under the Plan. During the year ended December 31, 2024, \$59,199.52 in loans were transferred to the Plan.

Interest accrues at the rate of prime plus 1% as of the month the loan application is approved. Principal and interest are paid through payroll deductions or participant-initiated payments. Interest rates ranged from 4.25% to 9.00% as of December 31, 2024. Maturities on outstanding loans ranged from 2025 to 2028 as of December 31, 2024. Loan transactions are treated as a transfer between the investment fund and notes receivable from participants.

A participant may withdraw all or a portion of their benefits derived from salary reduction on account of hardship, as defined by the Plan and applicable IRS regulations. Under these rules, the participant must exhaust the possibilities of all other distributions, loans, etc. available under the Plan and meet certain other requirements.

Each participant has the right, in accordance with the provisions of the Plan, to direct the investment by the Trustee of the Plan of all amounts allocated to the separate accounts of the participant under the Plan among any one or more of the investment fund options. The Trustee pays benefits and expenses upon the written direction of the Plan Sponsor. The participants in the Plan are assessed an administrative fee of \$23 per Plan year per account.

Forfeitures, consisting of amounts contributed by the Company that are not fully vested upon a participant's separation from service, shall be used to reduce the Company's required contributions. Pending application of the forfeitures, the Company may direct the Trustee to hold the forfeitures in cash or under investment in a suspense account. If the Plan should terminate with any forfeitures not applied against Company contributions, they will be allocated to then current participants in the proportion that each participant's eligible compensation for that Plan year bears to the eligible compensation for all such participants for the Plan year. There were no forfeitures applied for the year ended December 31, 2024. Outstanding forfeitures not yet applied against Company contributions as of December 31, 2024 and 2023, were \$69,416 and \$63,366, respectively.

The Setting Every Community Up for Retirement Enhancement (SECURE) Act was enacted in December 2019, and became effective January 1, 2020. The SECURE Act was designed to encourage investing for retirement by increasing the required minimum distribution age and making certain other changes to certain tax-qualified retirement plans.

The Plan incorporated the SECURE and the Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security (CARES) Act changes in its Plan document during the year. SECURE Act 2.0 was signed into the 2023 Consolidations Appropriations Act under the Securing a Strong Retirement Act on December 29, 2022, with similar retirement provisions designed to increase retirement savings, facilitate access to retirement savings, encourage employees to save for retirement, and lower employers' cost of offering and funding retirement plans.

The Plan's management and those charged with governance have a policy to incorporate legislative changes in its Plan document by the prescribed deadlines.

2. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of Accounting and Presentation

The financial statements of the Plan are presented using the accrual basis of accounting in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America ("GAAP").

Investment Valuation and Income Recognition

The Plan's investments are stated at fair value, except for investment contracts, which are reported at contract value (see below). Fair value of a financial instrument is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. See Note 6 for discussion on fair value measurements.

Investment contracts, such as those included in the Comcast Stable Value Fund, are required by GAAP to be reported at contract value. Contract value is the relevant measure of fully benefit-responsive investment contracts since that is the amount participants would receive if they were to initiate permitted transactions under the terms of the Plan (see Note 5).

The Statement of Changes in Net Assets Available for Benefits reflects the net investment gain (loss) from the Plan's interests in the Master Trust which consists of the realized gains or losses and the unrealized appreciation/(depreciation) in fair value, as well as interest and dividends earned. Purchases and sales of investments are reflected as of the trade date. Realized gains and losses on sales of investments are determined on the moving-average cost basis. Dividend income is recorded on the ex-dividend date. Interest earned on investments is recorded on the accrual basis. Net appreciation/(depreciation) includes gains and losses on investments bought and sold, as well as held during the year.

Management fees and operating expenses charged to the Plan for investments in the mutual funds and common collective trust funds are deducted from income earned and are not separately reflected. Consequently, management fees and operating expenses are reflected as a reduction of investment return for such investments.

Risks and Uncertainties

Investment securities are exposed to various risks, such as interest rate, market and credit risks. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investment securities, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in the values of investment securities will occur in the near term and such changes could materially affect the amounts reported in the financial statements.

Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with GAAP requires Plan management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets, liabilities, and changes therein. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Contributions

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with GAAP requires that contributions be reported on the accrual basis.

Administrative Expenses

All fees and expenses incurred in connection with the operation and administration of the Plan, including, but not limited to Investment Committee, legal, accounting, actuarial, investment, Trustee, management, and administrative fees are paid out of the Plan, to the extent legally permissible, or by the Company. Administrative expenses are recorded when paid.

Payment of Benefits

Benefit payments to participants are recorded upon distribution.

Subsequent Events

Effective January 1, 2025, employees as defined by the IRS as highly compensated employees (HCEs) will no longer be eligible to contribute to after-tax contributions.

Plan management have evaluated subsequent events through October 3, 2025 and determined there were no other matters that require disclosure.

3. INFORMATION CERTIFIED BY THE TRUSTEE

Certain information related to investments disclosed in the accompanying financial statements and ERISA-required supplemental schedule, including investments and notes receivable from participants held as of December 31, 2024 and 2023, and net appreciation (depreciation) in fair value of investments and interests and dividends and interest income on notes receivable from participants for the year ended December 31, 2024 was obtained or derived from information and certified as complete and accurate by Fidelity Management Trust Company.

4. INVESTMENTS

Comcast established the Master Trust to manage the assets of a number of Comcast and NBCUniversal Media, LLC (“NBCUniversal”) defined contribution plans. The Trustee was appointed by Comcast to hold, administer and invest the assets of the Master Trust. As of December 31, 2024 and 2023, the Master Trust included the investment assets of the Plan, Comcast Corporation Retirement-Investment Plan and NBCUniversal Capital Accumulation Plan. Each of the plans in the Master Trust maintains a divided interest in the Master Trust (segregated asset portfolio within the Master Trust). Realized gains (losses) on sales of investments, unrealized appreciation (depreciation) of investments, interest and dividend income, other receipts, other disbursements and administrative expenses are allocated to the segregated asset portfolios within the Master Trust.

Because the Plan’s portfolio is segregated from the other plans that participate in the Master Trust, the Plan does not have an undivided interest in each investment in the Master Trust. Rather, the Plan has a specific percentage interest in each investment that differs from the overall percentage interest in the Master Trust.

5. COMCAST STABLE VALUE FUND

As described in Note 2, included in the Comcast Stable Value Fund are benefit-responsive investment contracts issued by insurance companies and other financial institutions, fixed income securities, and money market funds. The fund seeks to preserve the principal investment while earning a level of interest income that is consistent with principal preservation. The fund seeks to maintain a stable net asset value (NAV) of \$1 per share.

In order to maintain the contract issuers' promise to pay withdrawals and exchanges at book value, the contracts subject the fund and its participants to certain restrictions. For example, withdrawals prompted by certain events (e.g. layoffs, early retirement windows, spin-offs, sale of a division, facility closings, plan terminations, partial plan terminations, changes in laws or regulations) may be paid at the market value of the fund's securities, which may be less than the book value balance.

A contract issuer may terminate a contract at any time. Settlement upon termination will be at contract value unless the terms of the contract were not met or the Trustee's authority over the Plan is limited or terminated. The total contract value of the Stable Value Fund included in the Master Trust as of December 31, 2024 and 2023, was \$632,589,564 and \$714,107,398, respectively.

6. FAIR VALUE MEASUREMENTS

GAAP establishes a hierarchy that prioritizes fair value measurements based on the types of inputs used for the various valuation techniques. The levels of the hierarchy are described below:

- Level 1 Consists of financial instruments whose values are based on quoted market prices for identical financial instruments in an active market.
- Level 2 Consists of financial instruments that are valued using models or other valuation methodologies. These models use inputs that are observable either directly or indirectly and include:

- Quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities in active markets;
- Quoted prices for identical or similar assets or liabilities in markets that are not active;
- Pricing models whose inputs are observable for substantially the full term of the financial instrument; and
- Pricing models whose inputs are derived principally from or corroborated by observable market data through correlation or other means for substantially the full term of the financial instrument.

Level 3 Consists of financial instruments whose values are determined using pricing models that use significant inputs that are primarily unobservable, discounted cash flow methodologies, or similar techniques, as well as instruments for which the determination of fair value requires significant judgment or estimation.

The asset's or liability's fair value measurement level within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of any input that is significant to the fair value measurement.

The valuation methodologies used for assets measured at fair value are as follows:

Mutual funds: Valued at the closing price of shares held by the Plan at year-end. The mutual funds held by the Plan are classified as Level 1 investments as their investment values are based on quoted market prices for identical financial instruments in an active market.

Self-directed brokerage accounts: Valued at the closing price of shares held by the Plan at year-end. The self-directed brokerage account funds are classified as Level 1 investments as their investment values are based on quoted market prices for identical financial instruments in an active market.

Separate accounts and common collective trusts: Valued at the net asset value of shares held by the Plan at year-end. The net asset value as provided by the Trustee is used as a practical expedient to estimate fair value and, as a result, all are included in the investments measured at net asset value. The redemption frequency of each of these investments is daily. There are no unfunded commitments. Certain withdrawals for other than normal benefit payments and participant-directed transfers may require up to 30 days' notice.

The methods described above may produce a calculated fair value that may not be indicative of net realizable value or reflective of future fair values. Furthermore, while the Plan believes these valuation methods are appropriate and consistent with other market participants, the use of different methodologies or assumptions to determine the fair value of certain financial instruments could result in a different fair value measurement at the reporting date. There have been no changes in the methodologies used as of December 31, 2024 and 2023.

The availability of observable market data is monitored to assess the appropriate classification of financial instruments within the fair value hierarchy. Changes in economic conditions or model-based valuation techniques may require the transfer of financial instruments from one fair value level to another. In such instances, the transfer is reported at the beginning of the reporting period. For the year ended December 31, 2024, there were no transfers between levels.

- (b) The **Separate Accounts** includes multiple investment vehicles including Large Cap Stock fund: designed for long-term growth of capital with primarily investments in common stocks of large cap companies, Small/Mid Cap stock fund: for long-term growth with primary investments common stocks of small and mid-cap companies, and International Fund with capital growth with investments in non-U.S. equity securities. The Plan can redeem daily from the fund, at the participants request, based on the asset value of the underlying funds, and there are no short-term redemption fees.

8. ADMINISTRATION OF THE PLAN

The Benefits Fiduciary Committee, as the Plan Administrator, has the authority to control and manage the operation and administration of the Plan and may delegate all or a portion of these responsibilities to one or more persons.

9. RELATED-PARTY AND PARTY-IN-INTEREST TRANSACTIONS

The Plan allows for transactions with certain parties who may perform services or have fiduciary responsibilities to the Plan, including the Company. Certain Plan investments are shares of various mutual funds that are owned and managed by the Trustee, who has been designated investment manager.

10. PLAN TERMINATION

Although it has not expressed any intent to do so, the Company has the right under the Plan to discontinue its contributions at any time and to terminate the Plan subject to the provisions of ERISA. In the event of Plan termination, each affected participant's account balance will become fully vested.

11. FEDERAL TAX CONSIDERATIONS

The IRS has determined and informed the Company by a letter dated September 2, 2010, that the Plan and related trust are designed in accordance with applicable sections of the Internal Revenue Code (IRC). Although the Plan has been amended since receiving the determination letter, the Plan Administrator and the Plan's tax counsel believe that the Plan is designed, and is currently being operated, in compliance with the applicable requirements of the IRS and, therefore, believe that the Plan is qualified, and the related trust is tax-exempt.

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require plan management to evaluate tax positions taken by the plan and recognize a tax liability if the plan has taken an uncertain position that more likely than not would not be sustained upon examination by the Internal Revenue Service. The Plan is subject to routine audits by taxing jurisdictions; however, there are currently no audits for any tax periods in progress. The Plan Administrator believes it is no longer subject to income tax considerations for years prior to 2021.
