As permitted by ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C), our audits need not extend to any statements or information related to assets held for investment of the Plan (investment information) by a bank or similar institution or insurance carrier that is regulated, supervised and subject to periodic examination by a state or federal agency, provided that the statements of information regarding assets so held are prepared and certified to by the bank or similar institution or insurance carrier in accordance with 29 CFR 2520.103-5 of the Department of Labor's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA ("qualified institution").

Management has obtained certifications from a qualified institution as of December 31, 2024 and 2023, and for the years then ended, stating that the certified investment information, as described in Note 3 to the financial statements, is complete and accurate.

Opinion

In our opinion, based on our audits and on the procedures performed as described in the *Auditors' Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements* section –

Management is also responsible for maintaining a current Plan instrument, including all Plan amendments, administering the Plan, and determining that the Plan's transactions that are presented and disclosed in the financial statements are in conformity with the Plan's provisions, including maintaining sufficient records with respect to each of the participants, to determine the benefits due or which may become due to such participants.

Auditors' Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements

Our audits did not extend to the certified investment information, except for obtaining and reading the certifications, comparing the certified investment information with the related information presented and disclosed in the financial statements, and reading the disclosures relating to the certified investment information to assess whether they are in accordance with the presentation and disclosure requirements of accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Accordingly, the objective of an ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) audit is not to express an opinion about whether the financial statements as a whole are presented fairly, in all material respects, in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

We are required to communicate with those charged with governance regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit, significant audit findings, and certain internal control-related matters that we identified during the audit.

Supplemental Schedule Required by ERISA

The information included in the supplemental schedule, other than that agreed to or derived from the certified investment information, has been subjected to auditing procedures applied in the audit of the financial statements and certain additional procedures including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements or to the financial statements themselves, and other additional procedures in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards. For information included in the supplemental schedule that agreed to or is derived from the certified investment information, we compared such information to the related certified investment information.

In forming our opinion on the supplemental schedule, we evaluated whether the supplemental schedule, other than the information agreed to or derived from the certified investment information, including its form and content, is presented in conformity with the Department of Labor's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA.

Notes to Financial Statements

1. Description of Plan

The following description of the Boston Bruins Employees 401(k) Savings & Investment Plan (the “Plan”) provides for general information. Participants should refer to the Plan document for a more complete description of the Plan’s provisions.

General– The Plan is a defined contribution plan sponsored by Boston Professional Hockey Association, Inc. (“Plan Sponsor” or the “Company”). The Plan was established effective September 1, 2006, was subsequently amended and restated effective January 1, 2022, and is subject to the provisions of the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (“ERISA”) and the Internal Revenue Code (the “Code”).

As defined in the Plan document, full-time non-union employees of the Company are eligible to participate in the Plan the first of the month following or coinciding with their date of hire, or upon reaching the age of twenty-one. Part-time non-union employees are eligible to participate in the Plan following the completion of one year of service and upon reaching the age of twenty-one.

In response to the impacts of the COVID-19 (Coronavirus) pandemic, the Plan implemented regulations available to employee benefit plans under the Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security (“CARES”) Act during the year ended December 31, 2020. The CARES Act, among other things, temporarily waives all required minimum distributions for calendar year 2020, provides participants with penalty-free access to their balances up to \$100,000 subject to certain eligibility criteria if distributed prior to January 1, 2021, a temporary increase in participant loan limits to the lesser of \$100,000 or 100% of the vested balance if requested by September 23, 2020, and the ability for participants to elect to suspend the repayment of loans for one year. Plan management intends to amend the Plan prior to the fiscal year ended December 31, 2026 to formally adopt the aforementioned relief options.

Additionally, the Setting Every Community Up for Retirement Enhancement (SECURE) Acts 1.0 and 2.0, enacted in 2019 and 2022, respectively, were legislative measures aimed at enhancing the United States retirement system by expanding access to retirement savings plans, increasing plan participation rates, incentivizing higher contribution levels, and reducing administrative complexity for plan sponsors. Plan management intends to amend the Plan prior to the fiscal year ended December 31, 2026 to formally adopt the aforementioned relief options.

Contributions – Participants may elect to contribute between 1% and 50% of their annual compensation on a pre-tax basis and/or in the form of Roth (post-tax) deferrals, limited to the amount imposed by law. Participants age 50 or older may also elect to make a catch-up contribution limited to the amount imposed by law. Participants may also contribute amounts representing distributions from other qualified defined benefit or contribution plans (i.e., rollovers). Rollover contributions totaled \$20,839 and \$38,656 for the years ended December 31, 2024 and 2023, respectively.

Notes to Financial Statements (continued)

1. Description of Plan (continued)

In accordance with the Plan document, the Company matches 100% of the first 3% of each participant's voluntary contribution, plus 50% of the next 2% of a participant's voluntary contribution. Participants are eligible to participate in the Company match after one year of completed service. Such contributions comply with the Plan's safe harbor provisions.

The Company may also make non-elective profit-sharing contributions at its discretion in accordance with the Plan Document. No profit-sharing contributions were made for the years ended December 31, 2024 and 2023.

Participant Accounts – Individual accounts are maintained for each Plan participant. Participant accounts are increased by participant contributions, Plan Sponsor contributions, transfers from other plans and earnings on the participant-directed investments. Participant accounts are decreased by participant distributions, transfers to other plans, losses on the participant-directed investments and certain administrative expenses, if applicable. The allocation of earnings and losses to participant accounts is based on the value of an individual account in relation to the total assets of the Plan. The benefit to which a participant is entitled is the benefit that can be provided from the participant's vested account.

Vesting – Participants are immediately fully vested in their voluntary salary deferrals, rollover contributions, safe harbor matching contributions and actual earnings thereon. Based upon affiliated employer requirements as defined by the Plan document, employer profit-sharing contributions fully vest upon completion of three to five years of service. All Company contributions are fully vested upon the occurrence of certain events which include completion of the required participation service, attainment of normal retirement age, death or permanent disability.

Notes Receivable from Participants – Participants may borrow a maximum amount equal to the lesser of \$50,000 or 50% of their vested account balance. Loan terms shall not exceed 5 years or a maximum of 10 years for the purchase of a primary residence. The loans are secured by the vested balance in the participant's account and bear interest at the prime rate plus 1%. Principal and interest are required to be repaid in equal installments over the term of the loan.

Payment of Benefits – Upon termination of service due to retirement, death, disability or as required by law, a participant may elect to receive installment distributions or a lump-sum distribution in an amount equal to the vested value of their account. The Plan permits in-service distributions for participants older than age 59½. Hardship withdrawals, as defined by the Code, are available to participants only from their deferral contributions account. If a participant's vested account does not exceed \$5,000, the entire vested account shall be distributed to the participant in a lump-sum payment as soon as administratively practicable following the date the participant retires, dies or otherwise terminates employment with the Plan Sponsor.

1. Description of Plan (continued)

Forfeitures – The non-vested balances of participants who have ceased employment with the Company are forfeited upon the occurrence of a five-year break in service. In accordance with the Plan document, forfeitures arising during any Plan year may be used to reduce the Company’s contributions and/or pay the Plan’s administrative expenses. Forfeitures totaled \$0 for each of the years ended December 31, 2024 and 2023.

Tax Status – The Plan obtained a favorable determination letter dated September 23, 2022, in which the Internal Revenue Service (“IRS”) stated that the Plan is designed in accordance with applicable sections of the Code.

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America (“U.S. GAAP”) requires Plan management to evaluate tax positions taken by the Plan and recognize a tax liability if the Plan has taken an uncertain position that more likely than not would not be sustained upon examination. The Plan is subject to routine audits by taxing jurisdictions; however, there are currently no audits for any tax periods in progress. The Plan Sponsor is not aware of any uncertain tax positions that would cause the Plan to lose its tax status or to otherwise be subject to other taxes or penalties.

Plan Termination – Although it has not expressed any intent to do so, the Plan Sponsor has the right to terminate the Plan at any time subject to the provisions of ERISA. In the event of Plan termination, participants would become 100% vested in their accounts as of the effective date of termination, to the extent required by applicable law.

2. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Basis of Accounting – The accompanying financial statements are prepared on the accrual basis of accounting in accordance with U.S. GAAP.

Investment Valuation and Income Recognition – The Plan’s investments in mutual funds and collective investment trusts are stated at fair value. Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. See Note 4 for a discussion of fair value measurements.

The Plan’s investment in a stable value fund consists of holdings in a fully benefit-responsive investment contract, and is reported at contract value in the accompanying statements of net assets available for benefits.

Notes to Financial Statements (continued)

2. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (continued)

Contract value is the relevant measurement attribute for that portion of the net assets available for benefits of a defined contribution plan attributable to fully benefit-responsive investment contract because contract value is the amount participants would receive if they were to initiate permitted transactions under the terms of the Plan.

The Plan presents in the accompanying statements of changes in net assets available for benefits the net appreciation or depreciation in the fair value of its investments which consists of the realized gains and losses and the unrealized net appreciation and depreciation of those investments.

Purchases and sales of securities are recorded on a trade-date basis. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Dividends are recorded on the ex-dividend date.

Notes Receivable from Participants – Notes receivable from participants are measured at their unpaid principal balance plus any unpaid accrued interest. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. No allowance for credit losses has been recorded as of December 31, 2024 and 2023. Delinquent notes receivable from participants are recorded as a distribution based upon the terms of the Plan document.

Benefit Payments – Benefits are recorded when paid.

Administrative Expenses – Substantially all expenses of the Plan including investment advisory, legal expenses and audit fees are funded as a percentage of total assets under the provisions of the Plan. Loan maintenance and setup fees are paid directly from participant accounts. The Plan may be awarded service credits payable to the Plan from John Hancock Trust Company LLC (“John Hancock” or the “Trustee”), that can be used for eligible Plan expenses. To the extent that the service credits exceed the Plan’s administrative expenses, the excess may be allocated to participant accounts. The Plan received credits as part of this agreement totaling \$6,156 and \$6,137 for the years ended December 31, 2024 and 2023, respectively. Administrative expenses in the accompanying financial statements are reduced by these amounts.

Party-in-Interest Transactions – Certain Plan investments are units of a stable value fund managed by New York Life Insurance Company (“New York Life”), which is owned by John Hancock. John Hancock is the Plan Trustee as defined by the Plan and, therefore, these transactions qualify as party-in-interest transactions.

2. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (continued)

Risks and Uncertainties – Investments are exposed to various risks, such as interest, market and credit risks. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investments, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in the values of investments will occur in the near term and that such changes in the values of investments could materially affect participants’ account balances and the amounts reported in the statements of net assets available for benefits and the statements of changes in net assets available for benefits.

Use of Estimates – The preparation of financial statements in accordance with U.S. GAAP requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect certain reported amounts of net assets available for benefits and changes therein, and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities. Accordingly, actual results could differ from those estimates.

Subsequent Events – Plan management has evaluated the effects of all subsequent events, for recognition or disclosure, through September 30, 2025, the date the accompanying financial statements were available to be issued, and determined that no additional recognition or disclosure was necessary.

3. Information Certified by the Trustee (Unaudited)

The Plan Administrator has elected the method of annual reporting compliance permitted by 29 CFR 2520.103-8 of the Department of Labor (“DOL”) Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA. Accordingly, the Trustee has certified that the following data included in the accompanying financial statements and supplemental schedule are complete and accurate:

4. Fair Value Measurements

Accounting Standards Codification (“ASC”) 820, *Fair Value Measurements*, establishes a framework for measuring fair value. That framework provides a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. The hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (Level 1 measurements) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (Level 3 measurements). The three levels of the fair value hierarchy are described below:

- **Level 1** – Unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical, unrestricted assets or liabilities that are accessible at the measurement date. Investments measured at Level 1 inputs include mutual funds and collective investment trust funds totaling \$19,273,031 and \$16,964,024 at December 31, 2024 and 2023, respectively.
- **Level 2** – Quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities in active markets or quoted prices for identical or similar assets or liabilities in markets that are not active. This level also includes inputs other than quoted prices that are observable, either directly or indirectly, for substantially the full term through corroboration with observable, independent market data. This includes investments valued at quoted prices adjusted for legal or contractual restrictions specific to the security. There were no assets of the Plan that utilized Level 2 inputs as its primary basis for calculating fair value as of December 31, 2024 and 2023.

4. Fair Value Measurements (continued)

- **Level 3** – Pricing inputs are unobservable for the asset or liability. That is, inputs that reflect the reporting entity’s own assumptions about the assumptions that market participants would use in pricing the asset or liability. There were no assets of the Plan that utilized Level 3 inputs as its primary basis for calculating fair value as of December 31, 2024 and 2023.

The asset or liability’s fair value measurement level within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of any input that is significant to the fair value measurement. Valuation techniques used need to maximize the use of observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs.

There have been no changes in the methodologies used at December 31, 2024 and 2023. The following is a description of the valuation methodologies used for assets measured at fair value.

- *Mutual Funds*: Shares of mutual funds are valued at quoted market prices which represent the net asset value (“NAV”) of shares held by the Plan at year end.
- *Collective Investment Trusts (“CITs”)*: CITs are valued daily at net asset value based on the market value of the underlying assets. The underlying securities are listed on national securities exchanges and valued on the basis of year-end closing prices. The Plan has concluded that the net asset value as adjusted (for mutual fund dividends, mutual fund splits and administrative maintenance charges and other items) and reported by the insurance companies approximates fair value of the investments.

5. Fully Benefit-Responsive Investment Contract

The Plan maintains a fully benefit-responsive investment contract (the “Contract”) with New York Life Insurance Company (“New York Life”), referred to as the Guaranteed Interest Account (“GIA”) or stable value fund. Contributions to the GIA are invested in a broadly diversified fixed income portfolio within the New York Life general account, which is invested primarily in an array of securities and cash equivalent investments. The Contract issuer is contractually obligated to repay the principal and specified interest rate that is guaranteed to the Plan.

Because the Contract is fully benefit-responsive, contract value is the relevant measurement attribute for that portion of the net assets available for benefits attributable to the Contract. Contract value, as reported to the Plan by New York Life, represents contributions made under the Contract, plus earnings, less participant withdrawals, and administrative expenses. Participants may ordinarily direct the withdrawal or transfer of all or a portion of their investment at contract value.

Notes to Financial Statements (continued)

5. Fully Benefit-Responsive Investment Contract (continued)

Certain events could limit the ability of the Plan to transact at contract value with the issuer. Such events include the following: (1) the Plan's failure to qualify under Section 401(a) of the Code or the failure of the trust to be tax-exempt under Section 501(a) of the Code; (2) premature termination of the Contract; (3) Plan termination or mergers; (4) changes to the Plan's prohibition on competing investment options; and (5) bankruptcy of the Plan Sponsor or other Plan Sponsor events (for example, divestitures or spinoffs of a subsidiary) that significantly affect the Plan's normal operations.

No events are probable of occurring that might limit the ability of the Plan to transact at contract value with the Contract issuers and that also would limit the ability of the Plan to transact at contract value with the participants.

In addition, certain events allow the issuer to terminate the Contract with the Plan and settle at an amount different from contract value. Examples of such events include the following: (1) an uncured violation of the Plan's investment guidelines; (2) a breach of material obligation under the Contract; (3) a material misrepresentation; and (4) a material amendment to the agreements without the consent of the issuer.

6. Reconciliation with Form 5500

The accompanying financial statements, which are prepared in accordance with U.S. GAAP, calculate realized gains and losses on sales of securities and unrealized gains and losses (change in market value on securities held at year end) using historical cost. However, Form 5500, Annual Return/Report of Employee Benefit Plan, requires the calculation of such gains and losses to be measured on the basis of revalued cost on Schedule H. Revalued cost is calculated based on the market value of a security on the first day of the fiscal year plus the cost of any current year purchases, less the beginning market value of any current year sales. In total, however, the financial statement calculation of gains and losses and the calculation for Form 5500 are the same.

Supplemental Information
