Scope and Nature of the ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) Audit

We have performed audits of the financial statements of DXP Enterprises, Inc. 401(k) Retirement Plan (the Plan), an employee benefit plan subject to the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (ERISA), as permitted by ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) (ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) audit). The financial statements comprise the statements of net assets available for benefits as of December 31, 2024 and 2023, and the related statement of changes in net assets available for benefits for the year ended December 31, 2024, and the related notes to the financial statements.

We are required to be independent of the Plan and to meet our other ethical responsibilities, in accordance with the relevant ethical requirements relating to our audits. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) audit opinion.

Responsibilities of Management for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America, and for the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error. Management's election of the ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) audit does not affect management's responsibility for the financial statements.

In preparing the financial statements, management is required to evaluate whether there are conditions or events, considered in the aggregate, that raise substantial doubt about the Plan's ability to continue as a going concern for one year from the date the financial statements are available to be issued.

Accordingly, the objective of an ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) audit is not to express an opinion about whether the financial statements as a whole are presented fairly, in all material respects, in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

We are required to communicate with those charged with governance regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit, significant audit findings, and certain internal control-related matters that we identified during the audit.



NOTE 1 – DESCRIPTION OF PLAN

DXP Enterprises, Inc. 401(k) Retirement Plan (the Plan) was established January 1, 1991 and is a qualified plan covering all of the eligible employees of DXP Enterprises, Inc. and its subsidiaries (the Company, or Plan Sponsor) as defined by Section 401(a) of the Internal Revenue Code (IRC) and contains a provision for salary reduction contributions under Section 401(k) of the IRC. The Plan was most recently restated effective April 1, 2020. The Plan is also subject to the provisions of the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (ERISA).

The summary of significant provisions of the Plan presented below provides general information. Participants should refer to the terms of the plan document for a more complete description of the Plan's provisions.

Administration: The Plan is administered by the Retirement Plan Committee (the Committee) which is composed of employees of the Company. The Committee is responsible for the operation and administration of the Plan and the management of the Plan's assets. Fidelity Management Trust Company acts as trustee and Fidelity Investments acts as recordkeeper for the Plan.

Eligibility: Employees of the Company who are not a resident of Puerto Rico or temporary / seasonal employees (specifically employees whose regular scheduled service is less than 1,000 hours per the Plans computation period) are eligible to make elective deferrals upon their date of hire. Upon meeting the eligibility requirements, employees can enter the Plan immediately.

Employee Contributions: Employees may elect to contribute 1% to 80% of their eligible salary to the Plan. Effective July 1, 2006, the Plan was amended to provide for an automatic enrollment contribution of 3% for eligible employees who have not submitted deferral election forms. Employees who are subject to automatic enrollment will be notified approximately 30 days prior to when the Company will begin the automatic 3% deduction. The Plan also allows for elective deferral contributions to be made as Roth contributions. Contributions for each employee are limited in any calendar year to an amount which is adjusted annually by the Internal Revenue Service (IRS). For 2024 and 2023, the maximum contribution allowed for each employee was \$23,000 and \$22,500, respectively. Additionally, participants who attain the age of 50 during the Plan year may make additional catch-up contributions. For 2024 and 2023, the maximum allowed for each participant for catch up contributions was \$7,500. Participants may also contribute amounts representing distributions transferred from other qualified plans.

Employer Contributions: Effective April 3, 2023, the Company increased the employer match to 100% of the first 3% of participants eligible compensation and 50% of the next 2% of eligible compensation. The Company, at the discretion of the Board of Directors, may also make a discretionary profit-sharing contribution to the Plan during the year. To receive the discretionary profit-sharing contribution, the participant must be employed on the last day of the year and complete at least 1,000 hours of service during the Plan year. For 2024, the Company did not make a discretionary profit-sharing contribution to the Plan.

Participant Accounts: Each participant's account is credited with the participant's contributions, an allocation of the Company's contributions, Plan earnings and losses and is charged with his or her withdrawals and an allocation of administrative expenses. Income or loss for each of the investment directives is allocated to the participants' accounts daily and is based on the relative units of participation. Benefits paid to participants under the Plan are limited to the vested balance in each participant's account.

Investment Options: Participants direct the investment of their entire interest in the Plan. Participants may make changes to their investment direction as allowed under the Plan, including transferring any contributions from one investment option to another at any time.

Vesting: Participants are immediately vested in their salary deferrals, including Roth deferrals, catch-up contributions and rollover contributions, plus actual earnings thereon. Employer matching contributions and discretionary profit-sharing contributions and actual earnings thereon will be 100% vested after six years of service. Participants become fully vested in all accounts in the event of death, disability, or attainment of normal retirement age (age 55) while actively employed.

Forfeitures: When participants separate from service, any amount that is not vested will be forfeited. Forfeited funds may first be used to pay the administrative expenses of the Plan. Any remaining amount will be used to reduce employer contributions.

Notes Receivable from Participants: Participants may request a participant loan from the Plan. No loan in an amount less than \$1,000 will be made. Any new loan will be limited to the lesser of \$50,000 reduced by the highest outstanding loan balance during the prior 12-month period or 50% of the participant's vested interest in the Plan. Loans are adequately secured by the vested interest in the participant's account and bear a reasonable rate of interest as determined by the Plan administrator based on the prevailing interest rates charged by persons in the business of lending money for loans which would be made under similar circumstances. Loan terms may not exceed five years unless the loan is used to purchase a principal residence. Loan principal and interest repayments are made via payroll deductions.

Payment of Benefits: Upon termination of employment, normal retirement, disability, or death, a participant may receive a distribution of the vested portion of their accounts in the Plan. If a participant's vested account balance does not exceed \$1,000, the Sponsor will distribute their vested account balance in a single lump-sum payment. If a participant's vested account balance exceeds \$1,000, they must consent to any distribution of their account.

Participants who have attained age 59½ may receive an in-service distribution from all vested account balances. Hardship distributions may also be made to satisfy certain immediate and heavy financial needs that a participant may have.

Administrative Expenses: The Plan permits the payment of administrative expenses to be made from the Plan's assets and for them to be allocated either proportionately based on the value of the account balances or as an equal dollar amount based on the number of participants in the Plan. However, substantially all administrative expenses of the Plan are paid by the Sponsor. Expenses that are paid by the Sponsor are excluded from these financial statements. Expenses relating to specific participant transactions (i.e., distribution request, etc.) are charged directly against the appropriate participant's account. Investment management fees are charged to the Plan as a reduction of investment return and are included in the investment income (loss) reported by the Plan.

Plan Termination: Although the Sponsor has not expressed any intent to terminate the Plan, it may do so at any time subject to the provisions of ERISA. If the Plan were terminated, contributions would cease, participants would become 100% vested, and money in the accounts would be distributed to the participants.

Subsequent Events: Plan management has evaluated subsequent events through October 2, 2025, the date the financial statements were available to be issued.

NOTE 2 – SUMMARY OF ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of Accounting: The accompanying financial statements of the Plan are prepared on the accrual basis of accounting.

Use of Estimates: The preparation of financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America (U.S. GAAP) requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect certain reported amounts and disclosures. Accordingly, actual results could differ from those estimates.

Investment Valuation and Income Recognition: The Plan's investments other than the fully benefit responsive investment contract are reported at fair value as further described in Notes 4 and 5. Fair value is the price that would be received by the Plan for an asset or paid by the Plan to transfer a liability (an exit price) in an orderly transaction between market participants on the measurement date in the Plan's principal or most advantageous market for the asset or liability. Contract value is the relevant measure for the Plan's fully benefit-responsive investment contract, because contract value is the amount Plan participants generally receive when executing transactions under the terms of the contract and Plan provisions.

Purchases and sales of securities are recorded on a trade-date basis. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Dividends are recorded on the ex-dividend date. Net appreciation includes the Plan's gains and losses on investments bought and sold as well as held during the year.

Notes Receivable from Participants: Notes receivable from participants are measured at their unpaid principal balance plus any accrued but unpaid interest. Interest income is recorded on an accrual basis. Related fees are recorded as administrative expenses and are expensed when they are incurred.

Payment of Benefits: Benefits were recorded when paid.

Risks and Uncertainties: The Plan invests in various investments. Investments are exposed to various risks such as interest rate, market, credit and risks related to global events. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investments, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in the values of investments will occur in the near term and that such changes could materially affect participants' account balances, and the amounts reported in the statements of net assets available for benefits.

NOTE 3 – CERTIFIED INFORMATION

Certain information related to investments and notes receivable from participants disclosed in the accompanying financial statements and supplemental schedule, including investments and notes receivable from participants held at December 31, 2024 and 2023, and net appreciation in fair value of investments and interest and dividends, and interest income on notes receivable from participants for the year ended December 31, 2024, was obtained or derived from information supplied to the plan administrator and certified as complete and accurate by Fidelity Management Trust Company.

NOTE 4 – FAIR VALUE MEASUREMENTS

Fair value measurements are determined by maximizing the use of observable inputs and minimizing the use of unobservable inputs. The hierarchy places the highest priority on unadjusted quoted market prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (Level 1 measurements) and gives the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (Level 3 measurements). The three levels of inputs within the fair value hierarchy are defined as follows:

- *Level 1* – Quoted prices (unadjusted) for identical assets or liabilities in active markets that the Plan has the ability to access as of the measurement date.
- *Level 2* – Significant other observable inputs other than Level 1 prices such as quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities; quoted prices in markets that are not active; or other inputs that are observable or can be corroborated by observable market data.
- *Level 3* – Significant unobservable inputs that reflect the Plan’s own assumptions about the assumptions that market participants would use in pricing an asset or liability.

In some cases, a valuation technique used to measure fair value may include inputs from multiple levels of the fair value hierarchy. The lowest level of significant input determines the placement of the entire fair value measurement in the hierarchy.

The following is a description of the valuation methodologies used for assets measured at fair value. There have been no changes in the methodologies used at December 31, 2024 and 2023.

Mutual Funds: The fair values of mutual fund investments are determined by obtaining quoted prices on nationally recognized securities exchanges.

Common Stock: Valued at the closing price reported on the active market on which the individual securities are traded.

Collective Trust: The fair values of participation units held in the collective trust are based on the net asset values per unit as reported by the fund managers. The collective trusts provide for daily redemptions by the Plan at reported net asset values per share, with no advance notice requirement.

NOTE 5 – FULLY BENEFIT-RESPONSIVE INVESTMENT CONTRACT

The Plan holds a fully benefit-responsive guaranteed investment contract, NYL Anchorage account, with New York Life (NYL). NYL maintains the contributions in a Stable Value Account (pooled separate account No. 25). The account is credited with earnings or losses on the underlying investments and charged for participant withdrawals and administrative expenses. NYL is contractually obligated to repay the principal and a specified interest rate that is guaranteed to the Plan. NYL declares the crediting rate periodically, at least once each year but no more than once per day. The average yield earned by the Plan and average interest rate credited to participants was 3.60% for 2024 and 3.10% for 2023.

The contract meets the fully benefit-responsive traditional investment contract criteria and therefore is reported at contract value. Contract value is the relevant measure for fully benefit-responsive investment contracts because this is the amount received by participants if they were to initiate permitted transactions under the terms of the Plan. Contract value, as reported to the Plan by NYL, represents contributions made under the contract, plus earnings less participant withdrawals, and administrative expenses. Participants may ordinarily direct the withdrawal or transfer of all or a portion of their investment at contract value. The Plan's ability to receive amounts due is dependent on NYL's ability to meet its financial obligations. NYL's ability to meet its contractual obligations may be affected by future economic and regulatory developments.

Certain events may limit the ability of the Plan to transact at contract value with NYL. Such events include, but may not be limited to, a participant termination of employment due to removal of a group of participants from Plan coverage as a result of temporary absence; change in position or other occurrence qualifying as a temporary break in service under the Plan; transfer or other change of position resulting in employment by an entity controlling, controlled by, or under other common control with the employer; or cessation of an employment relationship resulting from a reorganization, merger, layoff or the sale or discontinuance of all or any part of the Company's business.

The Company believes that no events are probable to occur that might limit the ability of the Plan to transact at contract value with NYL and that also would limit the Plan to transact at contract value with the participants. In addition, certain events allow NYL to terminate the contract with the Plan and settle at an amount different from the contract value. Such events include removal from the Plan of one or more groups or classification of participants; partial or complete Plan termination; or Plan disqualification. The Company believes that any events allowing NYL to terminate the contract and settle at an amount different from contract value are probable not occurring.

NOTE 6 – PARTY-IN-INTEREST TRANSACTIONS

Parties-in-interest are defined under DOL regulations as any fiduciary of the Plan, any party rendering service to the Plan, the employer, and certain others. Certain administrative functions are performed by officers or employees of the Sponsor. No such officer or employee receives compensation from the Plan. Some administrative expenses of the Plan are paid directly by the Sponsor. Fidelity Management Trust Company and Fidelity Investments are service providers to the Plan and manage certain Plan investments and, therefore these transactions and the Plan's payment of fees to these service providers qualify as party-in-interest transactions. Such transactions are permitted under the provisions of the Plan and are exempt from the prohibited transaction rules under ERISA. Investments in DXP's Enterprise Stock and Notes receivable from participants also reflect party-in-interest transactions.

NOTE 7 – INCOME TAX STATUS

The Company adopted a volume submitter profit sharing plan with CODA sponsored by FMR LLC. The volume submitter plan obtained its latest opinion letter on June 30, 2020. The Plan has not requested its own determination letter from the IRS. Although the Plan has been amended since receiving the opinion letter, the Plan Sponsor believes that the Plan is currently being operated in compliance with the applicable requirements of the IRC.

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require plan management to evaluate tax positions taken by the Plan. The plan administrator has analyzed the tax positions taken by the Plan, and has concluded that as of December 31, 2024 and 2023, there are no uncertain positions taken or expected to be taken that would require recognition of a liability (or asset) or disclosure in the financial statements. The Plan is subject to routine audits by taxing jurisdictions; however, there are currently no audits for any tax periods in progress. The plan administrator believes it is no longer subject to income tax examinations for years prior to 2021.

Management's election of the ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) audit does not affect management's responsibility for the financial statements.

In preparing the financial statements, management is required to evaluate whether there are conditions or events, considered in the aggregate, that raise substantial doubt about the Plan's ability to continue as a going concern for one year from the date the financial statements are available to be issued.

Management is also responsible for maintaining a current plan instrument, including all plan amendments, administering the plan, and determining that the plan's transactions that are presented and disclosed in the financial statements are in conformity with the plan's provisions, including maintaining sufficient records with respect to each of the participants, to determine the benefits due or which may become due to such participants.

Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements

Except as described in the Scope and Nature of the ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) Audit section of our report, our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance but is not absolute assurance and therefore is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with GAAS will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control. Misstatements are considered material if, there is a substantial likelihood that, individually or in the aggregate, they would influence the judgment made by a reasonable user based on the financial statements.

In performing an audit in accordance with GAAS, we:

- Exercise professional judgment and maintain professional skepticism throughout the audit.
- Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error, and design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks. Such procedures include examining, on a test basis, evidence regarding the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements.
- Obtain an understanding of internal control relevant to the audit in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the Plan's internal control. Accordingly, no such opinion is expressed.
- Evaluate the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluate the overall presentation of the financial statements.

- Conclude whether, in our judgment, there are conditions or events, considered in the aggregate, that raise substantial doubt about the Plan's ability to continue as a going concern for a reasonable period of time.

Our audits did not extend to the certified investment information, except for obtaining and reading the certification, comparing the certified investment information with the related information presented and disclosed in the financial statements, and reading the disclosures relating to the certified investment information to assess whether they are in accordance with the presentation and disclosure requirements of accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Accordingly, the objective of an ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) audit is not to express an opinion about whether the financial statements as a whole are presented fairly, in all material respects, in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

We are required to communicate with those charged with governance regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit, significant audit findings, and certain internal control-related matters that we identified during the audit.

Other Matter – Supplemental Schedules Required by ERISA

The supplemental schedule of Schedule H, Line 4i – Schedule of Assets (Held at End of Year) as of December 31, 2024, is presented for purposes of additional analysis and is not a required part of the financial statements but is supplementary information required by the Department of Labor's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA. Such information is the responsibility of management and was derived from, and relates directly to, the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements. The information included in the supplemental schedule, other than that agreed to or derived from the certified investment information, has been subjected to auditing procedures applied in the audits of the financial statements and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements or to the financial statements themselves, and other additional procedures in accordance with GAAS. For information included in the supplemental schedule that agreed to or is derived from the certified investment information, we compared such information to the related certified investment information.

In forming our opinion on the supplemental schedule, we evaluated whether the supplemental schedule, other than the information agreed to or derived from the certified investment information, including its form and content, is presented in conformity with the Department of Labor's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA.

- the form and content of the supplemental schedule, other than the information in the supplemental schedule that agreed to or is derived from the certified investment information, are presented, in all material respects, in conformity with the Department of Labor's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA.

NOTE 1 – DESCRIPTION OF PLAN

DXP Enterprises, Inc. 401(k) Retirement Plan (the Plan) was established January 1, 1991 and is a qualified plan covering all of the eligible employees of DXP Enterprises, Inc. and its subsidiaries (the Company, or Plan Sponsor) as defined by Section 401(a) of the Internal Revenue Code (IRC) and contains a provision for salary reduction contributions under Section 401(k) of the IRC. The Plan was most recently restated effective April 1, 2020. The Plan is also subject to the provisions of the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (ERISA).

The summary of significant provisions of the Plan presented below provides general information. Participants should refer to the terms of the plan document for a more complete description of the Plan's provisions.

Administration: The Plan is administered by the Retirement Plan Committee (the Committee) which is composed of employees of the Company. The Committee is responsible for the operation and administration of the Plan and the management of the Plan's assets. Fidelity Management Trust Company acts as trustee and Fidelity Investments acts as recordkeeper for the Plan.

Eligibility: Employees of the Company who are not a resident of Puerto Rico or temporary / seasonal employees (specifically employees whose regular scheduled service is less than 1,000 hours per the Plans computation period) are eligible to make elective deferrals upon their date of hire. Upon meeting the eligibility requirements, employees can enter the Plan immediately.

Employee Contributions: Employees may elect to contribute 1% to 80% of their eligible salary to the Plan. Effective July 1, 2006, the Plan was amended to provide for an automatic enrollment contribution of 3% for eligible employees who have not submitted deferral election forms. Employees who are subject to automatic enrollment will be notified approximately 30 days prior to when the Company will begin the automatic 3% deduction. The Plan also allows for elective deferral contributions to be made as Roth contributions. Contributions for each employee are limited in any calendar year to an amount which is adjusted annually by the Internal Revenue Service (IRS). For 2024 and 2023, the maximum contribution allowed for each employee was \$23,000 and \$22,500, respectively. Additionally, participants who attain the age of 50 during the Plan year may make additional catch-up contributions. For 2024 and 2023, the maximum allowed for each participant for catch up contributions was \$7,500. Participants may also contribute amounts representing distributions transferred from other qualified plans.

Employer Contributions: Effective April 3, 2023, the Company increased the employer match to 100% of the first 3% of participants eligible compensation and 50% of the next 2% of eligible compensation. The Company, at the discretion of the Board of Directors, may also make a discretionary profit-sharing contribution to the Plan during the year. To receive the discretionary profit-sharing contribution, the participant must be employed on the last day of the year and complete at least 1,000 hours of service during the Plan year. For 2024, the Company did not make a discretionary profit-sharing contribution to the Plan.

Participant Accounts: Each participant's account is credited with the participant's contributions, an allocation of the Company's contributions, Plan earnings and losses and is charged with his or her withdrawals and an allocation of administrative expenses. Income or loss for each of the investment directives is allocated to the participants' accounts daily and is based on the relative units of participation. Benefits paid to participants under the Plan are limited to the vested balance in each participant's account.

Investment Options: Participants direct the investment of their entire interest in the Plan. Participants may make changes to their investment direction as allowed under the Plan, including transferring any contributions from one investment option to another at any time.

Vesting: Participants are immediately vested in their salary deferrals, including Roth deferrals, catch-up contributions and rollover contributions, plus actual earnings thereon. Employer matching contributions and discretionary profit-sharing contributions and actual earnings thereon will be 100% vested after six years of service. Participants become fully vested in all accounts in the event of death, disability, or attainment of normal retirement age (age 55) while actively employed.

Forfeitures: When participants separate from service, any amount that is not vested will be forfeited. Forfeited funds may first be used to pay the administrative expenses of the Plan. Any remaining amount will be used to reduce employer contributions.

Notes Receivable from Participants: Participants may request a participant loan from the Plan. No loan in an amount less than \$1,000 will be made. Any new loan will be limited to the lesser of \$50,000 reduced by the highest outstanding loan balance during the prior 12-month period or 50% of the participant's vested interest in the Plan. Loans are adequately secured by the vested interest in the participant's account and bear a reasonable rate of interest as determined by the Plan administrator based on the prevailing interest rates charged by persons in the business of lending money for loans which would be made under similar circumstances. Loan terms may not exceed five years unless the loan is used to purchase a principal residence. Loan principal and interest repayments are made via payroll deductions.

Payment of Benefits: Upon termination of employment, normal retirement, disability, or death, a participant may receive a distribution of the vested portion of their accounts in the Plan. If a participant's vested account balance does not exceed \$1,000, the Sponsor will distribute their vested account balance in a single lump-sum payment. If a participant's vested account balance exceeds \$1,000, they must consent to any distribution of their account.

Participants who have attained age 59½ may receive an in-service distribution from all vested account balances. Hardship distributions may also be made to satisfy certain immediate and heavy financial needs that a participant may have.

Administrative Expenses: The Plan permits the payment of administrative expenses to be made from the Plan's assets and for them to be allocated either proportionately based on the value of the account balances or as an equal dollar amount based on the number of participants in the Plan. However, substantially all administrative expenses of the Plan are paid by the Sponsor. Expenses that are paid by the Sponsor are excluded from these financial statements. Expenses relating to specific participant transactions (i.e., distribution request, etc.) are charged directly against the appropriate participant's account. Investment management fees are charged to the Plan as a reduction of investment return and are included in the investment income (loss) reported by the Plan.

Plan Termination: Although the Sponsor has not expressed any intent to terminate the Plan, it may do so at any time subject to the provisions of ERISA. If the Plan were terminated, contributions would cease, participants would become 100% vested, and money in the accounts would be distributed to the participants.

Subsequent Events: Plan management has evaluated subsequent events through October 2, 2025, the date the financial statements were available to be issued.

NOTE 2 – SUMMARY OF ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of Accounting: The accompanying financial statements of the Plan are prepared on the accrual basis of accounting.

Use of Estimates: The preparation of financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America (U.S. GAAP) requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect certain reported amounts and disclosures. Accordingly, actual results could differ from those estimates.

Investment Valuation and Income Recognition: The Plan's investments other than the fully benefit responsive investment contract are reported at fair value as further described in Notes 4 and 5. Fair value is the price that would be received by the Plan for an asset or paid by the Plan to transfer a liability (an exit price) in an orderly transaction between market participants on the measurement date in the Plan's principal or most advantageous market for the asset or liability. Contract value is the relevant measure for the Plan's fully benefit-responsive investment contract, because contract value is the amount Plan participants generally receive when executing transactions under the terms of the contract and Plan provisions.

Purchases and sales of securities are recorded on a trade-date basis. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Dividends are recorded on the ex-dividend date. Net appreciation includes the Plan's gains and losses on investments bought and sold as well as held during the year.

Notes Receivable from Participants: Notes receivable from participants are measured at their unpaid principal balance plus any accrued but unpaid interest. Interest income is recorded on an accrual basis. Related fees are recorded as administrative expenses and are expensed when they are incurred.

Payment of Benefits: Benefits were recorded when paid.

Risks and Uncertainties: The Plan invests in various investments. Investments are exposed to various risks such as interest rate, market, credit and risks related to global events. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investments, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in the values of investments will occur in the near term and that such changes could materially affect participants' account balances, and the amounts reported in the statements of net assets available for benefits.

NOTE 3 – CERTIFIED INFORMATION

Certain information related to investments and notes receivable from participants disclosed in the accompanying financial statements and supplemental schedule, including investments and notes receivable from participants held at December 31, 2024 and 2023, and net appreciation in fair value of investments and interest and dividends, and interest income on notes receivable from participants for the year ended December 31, 2024, was obtained or derived from information supplied to the plan administrator and certified as complete and accurate by Fidelity Management Trust Company.

NOTE 4 – FAIR VALUE MEASUREMENTS

Fair value measurements are determined by maximizing the use of observable inputs and minimizing the use of unobservable inputs. The hierarchy places the highest priority on unadjusted quoted market prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (Level 1 measurements) and gives the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (Level 3 measurements). The three levels of inputs within the fair value hierarchy are defined as follows:

- *Level 1* – Quoted prices (unadjusted) for identical assets or liabilities in active markets that the Plan has the ability to access as of the measurement date.
- *Level 2* – Significant other observable inputs other than Level 1 prices such as quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities; quoted prices in markets that are not active; or other inputs that are observable or can be corroborated by observable market data.
- *Level 3* – Significant unobservable inputs that reflect the Plan’s own assumptions about the assumptions that market participants would use in pricing an asset or liability.

In some cases, a valuation technique used to measure fair value may include inputs from multiple levels of the fair value hierarchy. The lowest level of significant input determines the placement of the entire fair value measurement in the hierarchy.

The following is a description of the valuation methodologies used for assets measured at fair value. There have been no changes in the methodologies used at December 31, 2024 and 2023.

Mutual Funds: The fair values of mutual fund investments are determined by obtaining quoted prices on nationally recognized securities exchanges.

Common Stock: Valued at the closing price reported on the active market on which the individual securities are traded.

Collective Trust: The fair values of participation units held in the collective trust are based on the net asset values per unit as reported by the fund managers. The collective trusts provide for daily redemptions by the Plan at reported net asset values per share, with no advance notice requirement.

NOTE 5 – FULLY BENEFIT-RESPONSIVE INVESTMENT CONTRACT

The Plan holds a fully benefit-responsive guaranteed investment contract, NYL Anchorage account, with New York Life (NYL). NYL maintains the contributions in a Stable Value Account (pooled separate account No. 25). The account is credited with earnings or losses on the underlying investments and charged for participant withdrawals and administrative expenses. NYL is contractually obligated to repay the principal and a specified interest rate that is guaranteed to the Plan. NYL declares the crediting rate periodically, at least once each year but no more than once per day. The average yield earned by the Plan and average interest rate credited to participants was 3.60% for 2024 and 3.10% for 2023.

The contract meets the fully benefit-responsive traditional investment contract criteria and therefore is reported at contract value. Contract value is the relevant measure for fully benefit-responsive investment contracts because this is the amount received by participants if they were to initiate permitted transactions under the terms of the Plan. Contract value, as reported to the Plan by NYL, represents contributions made under the contract, plus earnings less participant withdrawals, and administrative expenses. Participants may ordinarily direct the withdrawal or transfer of all or a portion of their investment at contract value. The Plan's ability to receive amounts due is dependent on NYL's ability to meet its financial obligations. NYL's ability to meet its contractual obligations may be affected by future economic and regulatory developments.

Certain events may limit the ability of the Plan to transact at contract value with NYL. Such events include, but may not be limited to, a participant termination of employment due to removal of a group of participants from Plan coverage as a result of temporary absence; change in position or other occurrence qualifying as a temporary break in service under the Plan; transfer or other change of position resulting in employment by an entity controlling, controlled by, or under other common control with the employer; or cessation of an employment relationship resulting from a reorganization, merger, layoff or the sale or discontinuance of all or any part of the Company's business.

The Company believes that no events are probable to occur that might limit the ability of the Plan to transact at contract value with NYL and that also would limit the Plan to transact at contract value with the participants. In addition, certain events allow NYL to terminate the contract with the Plan and settle at an amount different from the contract value. Such events include removal from the Plan of one or more groups or classification of participants; partial or complete Plan termination; or Plan disqualification. The Company believes that any events allowing NYL to terminate the contract and settle at an amount different from contract value are probable not occurring.

NOTE 6 – PARTY-IN-INTEREST TRANSACTIONS

Parties-in-interest are defined under DOL regulations as any fiduciary of the Plan, any party rendering service to the Plan, the employer, and certain others. Certain administrative functions are performed by officers or employees of the Sponsor. No such officer or employee receives compensation from the Plan. Some administrative expenses of the Plan are paid directly by the Sponsor. Fidelity Management Trust Company and Fidelity Investments are service providers to the Plan and manage certain Plan investments and, therefore these transactions and the Plan's payment of fees to these service providers qualify as party-in-interest transactions. Such transactions are permitted under the provisions of the Plan and are exempt from the prohibited transaction rules under ERISA. Investments in DXP's Enterprise Stock and Notes receivable from participants also reflect party-in-interest transactions.

NOTE 7 – INCOME TAX STATUS

The Company adopted a volume submitter profit sharing plan with CODA sponsored by FMR LLC. The volume submitter plan obtained its latest opinion letter on June 30, 2020. The Plan has not requested its own determination letter from the IRS. Although the Plan has been amended since receiving the opinion letter, the Plan Sponsor believes that the Plan is currently being operated in compliance with the applicable requirements of the IRC.

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require plan management to evaluate tax positions taken by the Plan. The plan administrator has analyzed the tax positions taken by the Plan, and has concluded that as of December 31, 2024 and 2023, there are no uncertain positions taken or expected to be taken that would require recognition of a liability (or asset) or disclosure in the financial statements. The Plan is subject to routine audits by taxing jurisdictions; however, there are currently no audits for any tax periods in progress. The plan administrator believes it is no longer subject to income tax examinations for years prior to 2021.
