Scope and Nature of the ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) Audits

Presence Learning 401(k) Plan Notes to Financial Statements

1. Description of the Plan

The Presence Learning 401(k) Plan (the Plan) was established by PresenceLearning, Inc. (the Company and Employer) on January 1, 2012, to provide participants with a means to fund their retirement on a tax-deferred basis. The following description of the Plan provides only general information. Participants should refer to the Plan agreement for a more complete description of the Plan's provisions.

General:

The Plan is a defined contribution plan under the provisions of the Internal Revenue Code (the Code) and applicable state laws. The Plan is subject to the provisions of the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (ERISA).

The Company is the Plan sponsor and Plan administrator. The Plan is administered by Company employees and an Investment Committee. Fidelity Management Trust Company (Fidelity) serves as the Plan's trustee and record keeper. Fidelity holds, invests, and reinvests Plan assets in the interest and direction of the participants and their beneficiaries. The Company has engaged Sequoia as an investment advisor. Sequoia assists the Plan Committee in selecting investment options offered under the Plan and monitoring investment performance.

Eligible Participants:

Employees, as defined by the Plan agreement, aged 21 or older, are eligible to participate in the Plan on the first day of the month following their date of hire.

Contributions:

Participants are permitted to make voluntary pre-tax salary deferrals and Roth post-tax contributions up to 100% of their annual eligible compensation, as defined in the Plan agreement. Participants who have reached the age of 50 may also elect to withhold additional "catch-up" contributions under the Code. Participants may also contribute amounts representing distributions from other qualified defined contribution or defined benefit plans (rollovers), excluding rollovers of after-tax contributions, subject to Code regulations.

The Company may make discretionary employer matching and non-elective contributions, at the discretion of the Company's Board of Directors. As of December 31, 2024, employer contributions receivable of \$393,663 represented the Company's 2024 discretionary matching contribution due to the Plan, net of forfeitures to be applied. The 2024 discretionary matching contribution represents up to 50% of each eligible participant's contribution, not to exceed 6% of eligible compensation.

1. Description of the Plan (continued)

Contributions: (continued)

The Company has not made any discretionary nonelective contributions to the Plan through December 31, 2024.

Contributions are subject to certain limitations under the Code.

Participant Accounts:

Participant accounts are credited with participant contributions and rollovers, Company contributions, and an allocation of Plan earnings or losses. Allocations are based on participant earnings or account balances, in accordance with the Plan agreement. The benefit to which participants are entitled is the benefit that can be provided from the participant accounts.

Participants may elect to invest their accounts in a variety of participant-directed investment options offered by the Plan that are designed to provide the participants with a wide range of investment options. Participants may authorize transfers among investment options at any time.

In addition, participants can choose to invest in and manage a broader range of investments through participant-managed Fidelity self-directed brokerage accounts. Investment choices offered to participants in these participant-managed retirement accounts include most equity securities listed on major domestic stock exchanges, additional mutual funds, over-the-counter stocks, bonds, and other fixed-income securities.

Vesting:

Participants are immediately fully (100%) vested in their contributions plus actual earnings (less any losses) thereon. Vesting in Company discretionary matching and nonelective contributions, plus allocated earnings (less any losses) thereon, is based on years of service. Participants vest in Company discretionary matching and nonelective contributions at the rate of 25% after one year of service and 25% annually thereafter. Participants also become fully vested upon death, permanent disability, or normal retirement age.

1. Description of the Plan (continued)

Forfeitures:

Forfeitures of non-vested Company contributions may be used to reduce future Company contributions or to pay Plan expenses. As of December 31, 2024 and 2023, forfeited nonvested accounts totaled \$32,729 and \$61,305, respectively. During 2024, forfeitures of \$1,722 were used to pay Plan administrative expenses and \$61,305 were used to reduce employer contributions. Additionally, forfeitures of \$40,189 were used to offset the Company's 2024 discretionary matching contribution remitted to the Plan in January 2025.

Notes Receivable from Participants:

Participants may borrow up to one-half of their vested account balance, for a minimum of \$1,000 and a maximum of \$50,000, for a period not to exceed five years, except for notes used to purchase a primary residence for which terms of up to 30 years are permitted. Participant notes are evidenced by a written note, secured by the balance in the participant's account, and bear interest at the prime rate published in The Wall Street Journal, plus 1%. The interest rates on the notes outstanding as of December 31, 2024 ranged from 7.25% to 9.50%. Repayment of principal and interest is generally made through payroll deductions.

Notes receivable from participants are measured at their unpaid principal balances plus any accrued but unpaid interest. Delinquent participant notes are reclassified as distributions based upon the terms of the Plan agreement.

Payment of Benefits:

On termination of service for any reason, benefits are paid to participants in a lump-sum cash distribution equal to the value of the vested account balance. Terminated participant accounts between \$1,001 and \$7,000 may be automatically distributed to individual retirement accounts on behalf of the participants without participant approval. Terminated participant accounts below \$1,000 may be distributed directly to participants without participant approval. The Plan agreement also allows for in-service and hardship withdrawals of benefits to current employees. Benefits are recorded when paid.

1. Description of the Plan (continued)

Administrative Expenses:

Several of the investment fund options are subject to investment fees based on a percentage of invested assets, as disclosed in the fund's prospectus. These fees are charged directly against the fund's investment performance and, thus, are not separately disclosed in the financial statements. Certain administrative expenses are charged to the Plan and allocated to participant accounts. All other administrative expenses related to the Plan are paid by the Company and are not reflected in the Plan's financial statements.

Risks and Uncertainties:

Participants may invest their account balances in a variety of investment options offered by the Plan. Investments are exposed to various risks, such as interest rate, market fluctuation, and credit risks. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investment options offered by the Plan, it is at least reasonably possible changes in risks in the near term could materially affect participant account balances and the amounts reported in the statement of net assets available for benefits.

Plan Termination:

Although it has not expressed any intent to do so, the Company has the right under the Plan to terminate the Plan at any time, subject to the provisions of ERISA. In the event of Plan termination, participants would become fully vested in their accounts and distributions would be made to participants as described in the Plan agreement.

2. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Basis of Accounting:

The financial statements of the Plan are prepared on the accrual method of accounting in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America (GAAP).

Use of Estimates:

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with GAAP requires the Plan administrator to make estimates and assumptions that affect certain reported amounts and disclosures. Accordingly, actual results may differ from those estimates.

2. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (continued)

Investments:

The Plan's investments consist of mutual funds and participant-managed retirement accounts. These investments are accounted for as follows:

Mutual Funds and Money Market Fund: These funds are valued at the net asset value (NAV) of shares held by the Plan at year end, as quoted in active markets.

Participant-Managed Retirement Accounts: These accounts comprise participant-managed Fidelity self-directed brokerage accounts, which may consist of shares in various interest-bearing cash accounts, mutual funds, money market funds, over-the-counter equity securities, bonds and other fixed-income securities that are valued based on quoted prices in active markets.

Fair Value Measurement:

The Plan uses a three-level hierarchy for fair value measurement based on the nature of inputs used in the valuation of an asset or liability as of the measurement date. The three-level hierarchy prioritizes within the measurement of fair value, the use of market-based information over entity-specific information. Fair value focuses on an exit price and is defined as the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants as of the measurement date. The inputs or methodology used for valuing financial instruments are not necessarily an indication of the risk associated with investing in those financial instruments.

The three-level hierarchy for fair value measurement is defined as follows:

- **Level I:** Inputs to the valuation methodology are quoted prices (unadjusted) for identical assets or liabilities in active markets.
- **Level II:** Inputs to the valuation methodology include quoted prices for similar assets and liabilities in active markets, and inputs that are observable for the asset or liability, either directly or indirectly, for substantially the full term of the financial instrument.
- **Level III:** Inputs to the valuation methodology, which are significant to the fair value measurement, are unobservable.

Fair Value Measurement: (continued)

A financial instrument's categorization within the fair value hierarchy is based upon the lowest level of input that is significant to the fair value measurement.

The Plan's investments are recorded at fair value and classified within Level I of the fair value hierarchy as of December 31, 2024 and 2023.

Income Recognition:

Purchases and sales of investments are recorded on a trade date basis. Interest income is recorded on the accrual method of accounting. Dividends are recorded on the ex-dividend date. Net appreciation includes gains and losses on the Plan's investments bought, sold, or held during the year.

3. Information Prepared and Certified by the Qualified Institution

The Plan administrator has elected the method of compliance permitted by 29 CFR 2520.103-8 of the Department of Labor's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA. Accordingly, Fidelity, the qualified institution of the Plan, has certified to the completeness and accuracy of the:

- Investments and notes receivable from participants reflected on the accompanying statements of net assets available for benefits as of December 31, 2024 and 2023.
- net appreciation in fair value of investments, dividends and interest, and interest on notes receivable from participants on the accompanying statement of changes in net assets available for benefits for the year ended December 31, 2024.
- investment information included in the footnotes and on the supplemental schedule of assets (held at end of year) as of December 31, 2024.

4. Income Tax Status

The Plan administrator has adopted a pre-approved plan document that has received an opinion letter from the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) dated June 30, 2020, stating that the form of the pre-approved plan document was in compliance with the applicable provisions of the Code. The Plan document has been amended and restated since receipt of the letter. However, the Plan administrator believes the Plan is designed and is currently being operated in compliance with the applicable requirements of the Code and related state statutes and is, therefore, qualified, and the trust that forms a part of the Plan is exempt from federal and state income taxes.

GAAP requires the Plan administrator to evaluate tax positions taken by the Plan and recognize a tax liability if the Plan has taken an uncertain position that more likely than not would not be sustained upon examination by the IRS. The Plan administrator has analyzed the tax positions taken by the Plan, and has concluded, as of December 31, 2024, there are no uncertain tax positions taken or expected to be taken that would require recognition of a liability or disclosure in the financial statements. The Plan is subject to routine audits by taxing jurisdictions; however, there are currently no audits for any tax periods in progress. The Plan administrator believes the Plan is no longer subject to income tax examinations for years prior to 2021.

5. Party-In-Interest Transactions

Certain Plan investments include investment options managed by Fidelity. As Fidelity is the Plan trustee, purchases and sales of these investments by the Plan qualify as party-in-interest transactions. Notes receivable transactions with participants also qualify as party-in interest transactions. These transactions are exempt from the prohibited transaction rules of ERISA.

1. Description of the Plan

The Presence Learning 401(k) Plan (the Plan) was established by PresenceLearning, Inc. (the Company and Employer) on January 1, 2012, to provide participants with a means to fund their retirement on a tax-deferred basis. The following description of the Plan provides only general information. Participants should refer to the Plan agreement for a more complete description of the Plan's provisions.

General:

The Plan is a defined contribution plan under the provisions of the Internal Revenue Code (the Code) and applicable state laws. The Plan is subject to the provisions of the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (ERISA).

The Company is the Plan sponsor and Plan administrator. The Plan is administered by Company employees and an Investment Committee. Fidelity Management Trust Company (Fidelity) serves as the Plan's trustee and record keeper. Fidelity holds, invests, and reinvests Plan assets in the interest and direction of the participants and their beneficiaries. The Company has engaged Sequoia as an investment advisor. Sequoia assists the Plan Committee in selecting investment options offered under the Plan and monitoring investment performance.

Eligible Participants:

Employees, as defined by the Plan agreement, aged 21 or older, are eligible to participate in the Plan on the first day of the month following their date of hire.

Contributions:

Participants are permitted to make voluntary pre-tax salary deferrals and Roth post-tax contributions up to 100% of their annual eligible compensation, as defined in the Plan agreement. Participants who have reached the age of 50 may also elect to withhold additional "catch-up" contributions under the Code. Participants may also contribute amounts representing distributions from other qualified defined contribution or defined benefit plans (rollovers), excluding rollovers of after-tax contributions, subject to Code regulations.

The Company may make discretionary employer matching and non-elective contributions, at the discretion of the Company's Board of Directors. As of December 31, 2024, employer contributions receivable of \$393,663 represented the Company's 2024 discretionary matching contribution due to the Plan, net of forfeitures to be applied. The 2024 discretionary matching contribution represents up to 50% of each eligible participant's contribution, not to exceed 6% of eligible compensation.

1. Description of the Plan (continued)

Contributions: (continued)

The Company has not made any discretionary nonelective contributions to the Plan through December 31, 2024.

Contributions are subject to certain limitations under the Code.

Participant Accounts:

Participant accounts are credited with participant contributions and rollovers, Company contributions, and an allocation of Plan earnings or losses. Allocations are based on participant earnings or account balances, in accordance with the Plan agreement. The benefit to which participants are entitled is the benefit that can be provided from the participant accounts.

Participants may elect to invest their accounts in a variety of participant-directed investment options offered by the Plan that are designed to provide the participants with a wide range of investment options. Participants may authorize transfers among investment options at any time.

In addition, participants can choose to invest in and manage a broader range of investments through participant-managed Fidelity self-directed brokerage accounts. Investment choices offered to participants in these participant-managed retirement accounts include most equity securities listed on major domestic stock exchanges, additional mutual funds, over-the-counter stocks, bonds, and other fixed-income securities.

Vesting:

Participants are immediately fully (100%) vested in their contributions plus actual earnings (less any losses) thereon. Vesting in Company discretionary matching and nonelective contributions, plus allocated earnings (less any losses) thereon, is based on years of service. Participants vest in Company discretionary matching and nonelective contributions at the rate of 25% after one year of service and 25% annually thereafter. Participants also become fully vested upon death, permanent disability, or normal retirement age.

1. Description of the Plan (continued)

Forfeitures:

Forfeitures of non-vested Company contributions may be used to reduce future Company contributions or to pay Plan expenses. As of December 31, 2024 and 2023, forfeited nonvested accounts totaled \$32,729 and \$61,305, respectively. During 2024, forfeitures of \$1,722 were used to pay Plan administrative expenses and \$61,305 were used to reduce employer contributions. Additionally, forfeitures of \$40,189 were used to offset the Company's 2024 discretionary matching contribution remitted to the Plan in January 2025.

Notes Receivable from Participants:

Participants may borrow up to one-half of their vested account balance, for a minimum of \$1,000 and a maximum of \$50,000, for a period not to exceed five years, except for notes used to purchase a primary residence for which terms of up to 30 years are permitted. Participant notes are evidenced by a written note, secured by the balance in the participant's account, and bear interest at the prime rate published in The Wall Street Journal, plus 1%. The interest rates on the notes outstanding as of December 31, 2024 ranged from 7.25% to 9.50%. Repayment of principal and interest is generally made through payroll deductions.

Notes receivable from participants are measured at their unpaid principal balances plus any accrued but unpaid interest. Delinquent participant notes are reclassified as distributions based upon the terms of the Plan agreement.

Payment of Benefits:

On termination of service for any reason, benefits are paid to participants in a lump-sum cash distribution equal to the value of the vested account balance. Terminated participant accounts between \$1,001 and \$7,000 may be automatically distributed to individual retirement accounts on behalf of the participants without participant approval. Terminated participant accounts below \$1,000 may be distributed directly to participants without participant approval. The Plan agreement also allows for in-service and hardship withdrawals of benefits to current employees. Benefits are recorded when paid.

1. Description of the Plan (continued)

Administrative Expenses:

Several of the investment fund options are subject to investment fees based on a percentage of invested assets, as disclosed in the fund's prospectus. These fees are charged directly against the fund's investment performance and, thus, are not separately disclosed in the financial statements. Certain administrative expenses are charged to the Plan and allocated to participant accounts. All other administrative expenses related to the Plan are paid by the Company and are not reflected in the Plan's financial statements.

Risks and Uncertainties:

Participants may invest their account balances in a variety of investment options offered by the Plan. Investments are exposed to various risks, such as interest rate, market fluctuation, and credit risks. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investment options offered by the Plan, it is at least reasonably possible changes in risks in the near term could materially affect participant account balances and the amounts reported in the statement of net assets available for benefits.

Plan Termination:

Although it has not expressed any intent to do so, the Company has the right under the Plan to terminate the Plan at any time, subject to the provisions of ERISA. In the event of Plan termination, participants would become fully vested in their accounts and distributions would be made to participants as described in the Plan agreement.

2. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Basis of Accounting:

The financial statements of the Plan are prepared on the accrual method of accounting in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America (GAAP).

Use of Estimates:

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with GAAP requires the Plan administrator to make estimates and assumptions that affect certain reported amounts and disclosures. Accordingly, actual results may differ from those estimates.

2. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (continued)

Investments:

The Plan's investments consist of mutual funds and participant-managed retirement accounts. These investments are accounted for as follows:

Mutual Funds and Money Market Fund: These funds are valued at the net asset value (NAV) of shares held by the Plan at year end, as quoted in active markets.

Participant-Managed Retirement Accounts: These accounts comprise participant-managed Fidelity self-directed brokerage accounts, which may consist of shares in various interest-bearing cash accounts, mutual funds, money market funds, over-the-counter equity securities, bonds and other fixed-income securities that are valued based on quoted prices in active markets.

Fair Value Measurement:

The Plan uses a three-level hierarchy for fair value measurement based on the nature of inputs used in the valuation of an asset or liability as of the measurement date. The three-level hierarchy prioritizes within the measurement of fair value, the use of market-based information over entity-specific information. Fair value focuses on an exit price and is defined as the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants as of the measurement date. The inputs or methodology used for valuing financial instruments are not necessarily an indication of the risk associated with investing in those financial instruments.

The three-level hierarchy for fair value measurement is defined as follows:

- **Level I:** Inputs to the valuation methodology are quoted prices (unadjusted) for identical assets or liabilities in active markets.
- **Level II:** Inputs to the valuation methodology include quoted prices for similar assets and liabilities in active markets, and inputs that are observable for the asset or liability, either directly or indirectly, for substantially the full term of the financial instrument.
- **Level III:** Inputs to the valuation methodology, which are significant to the fair value measurement, are unobservable.

Fair Value Measurement: (continued)

A financial instrument's categorization within the fair value hierarchy is based upon the lowest level of input that is significant to the fair value measurement.

The Plan's investments are recorded at fair value and classified within Level I of the fair value hierarchy as of December 31, 2024 and 2023.

Income Recognition:

Purchases and sales of investments are recorded on a trade date basis. Interest income is recorded on the accrual method of accounting. Dividends are recorded on the ex-dividend date. Net appreciation includes gains and losses on the Plan's investments bought, sold, or held during the year.

3. Information Prepared and Certified by the Qualified Institution

The Plan administrator has elected the method of compliance permitted by 29 CFR 2520.103-8 of the Department of Labor's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA. Accordingly, Fidelity, the qualified institution of the Plan, has certified to the completeness and accuracy of the:

- Investments and notes receivable from participants reflected on the accompanying statements of net assets available for benefits as of December 31, 2024 and 2023.
- net appreciation in fair value of investments, dividends and interest, and interest on notes receivable from participants on the accompanying statement of changes in net assets available for benefits for the year ended December 31, 2024.
- investment information included in the footnotes and on the supplemental schedule of assets (held at end of year) as of December 31, 2024.

4. Income Tax Status

The Plan administrator has adopted a pre-approved plan document that has received an opinion letter from the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) dated June 30, 2020, stating that the form of the pre-approved plan document was in compliance with the applicable provisions of the Code. The Plan document has been amended and restated since receipt of the letter. However, the Plan administrator believes the Plan is designed and is currently being operated in compliance with the applicable requirements of the Code and related state statutes and is, therefore, qualified, and the trust that forms a part of the Plan is exempt from federal and state income taxes.

GAAP requires the Plan administrator to evaluate tax positions taken by the Plan and recognize a tax liability if the Plan has taken an uncertain position that more likely than not would not be sustained upon examination by the IRS. The Plan administrator has analyzed the tax positions taken by the Plan, and has concluded, as of December 31, 2024, there are no uncertain tax positions taken or expected to be taken that would require recognition of a liability or disclosure in the financial statements. The Plan is subject to routine audits by taxing jurisdictions; however, there are currently no audits for any tax periods in progress. The Plan administrator believes the Plan is no longer subject to income tax examinations for years prior to 2021.

5. Party-In-Interest Transactions

Certain Plan investments include investment options managed by Fidelity. As Fidelity is the Plan trustee, purchases and sales of these investments by the Plan qualify as party-in-interest transactions. Notes receivable transactions with participants also qualify as party-in interest transactions. These transactions are exempt from the prohibited transaction rules of ERISA.
