Scope and Nature of the ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) Audit

We have performed audits of the financial statements of American College of Healthcare Executives SMART 401(k) Plan (the Plan), an employee benefit plan subject to the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (ERISA), as permitted by ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) (ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) audit). The financial statements comprise the statements of net assets available for benefits as of December 31, 2024 and 2023, the related statement of changes in net assets available for benefits for the year ended December 31, 2024, and the related notes to the financial statements.

Management, having determined it is permissible in the circumstances, has elected to have the audits of the Plan's financial statements performed in accordance with ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) pursuant to 29 CFR 2520.103-8 of the Department of Labor's (DOL) Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA. As permitted by ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C), our audits need not extend to any statements or information related to assets held for investment of the Plan (investment information) by a bank or similar institution or insurance carrier that is regulated, supervised, and subject to periodic examination by a state or federal agency, provided that the statements or information regarding assets so held are prepared and certified to by the bank or similar institution or insurance carrier in accordance with 29 CFR 2520.103-5 of the DOL's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA (qualified institution).

Management has obtained certifications from a qualified institution as of December 31, 2024 and 2023, and for the year ended December 31, 2024, stating that the certified investment information, as described in Note 3 to the financial statements, is complete and accurate.

Opinion

In our opinion, based on our audits and on the procedures performed as described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements section:

- The information in the accompanying financial statements related to assets held by and certified to by a qualified institution agrees to, or is derived from, in all material respects, the information prepared and certified by an institution that management determined meets the requirements of ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C).

Basis for Opinion

We conducted our audits in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America (GAAS). Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements section of our report. We are required to be independent of the Plan and to meet our other ethical responsibilities, in accordance with the relevant ethical requirements relating to our audits. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) audit opinion.

Responsibilities of Management for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in accordance with U.S. GAAP, and for the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error. Management's election of the ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) audit does not affect management's responsibility for the financial statements.

In preparing the financial statements, management is required to evaluate whether there are conditions or events, considered in the aggregate, that raise substantial doubt about the Plan's ability to continue as a going concern within one year after the date that the financial statements are issued or available to be issued.

Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance but is not absolute assurance and therefore is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with GAAS will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control. For information included in the supplemental schedule that agreed to or is derived from the certified investment information, we compared such information to the related certified investment information.

In forming our opinion on the supplemental schedule, we evaluated whether the supplemental schedule, other than the information agreed to or derived from the certified investment information, including its form and content, is presented in conformity with the DOL's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA.

Notes to Financial Statements

Note 1. Plan Description

The following description of American College of Healthcare Executives SMART 401(k) Plan (the Plan) provides only general information. Participants should refer to the plan agreement for a more complete description of the Plan's provisions.

General: The Plan is a defined contribution profit sharing and savings plan covering all employees of American College of Healthcare Executives (the Company) and its wholly owned subsidiary, the Foundation of American College of Healthcare Executives. On October 25, 2024, the Plan was amended effective as of December 2, 2024, allowing eligible employees to begin participating immediately following their hire date. Prior to this amendment, eligible employees began participating as of the first day of the following month, subsequent to employment. The Retirement Committee is responsible for the oversight of the Plan, determines the appropriateness of the Plan's investment offering and monitors investment performance. The Plan is subject to the provisions of the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (ERISA).

Contributions: Each year, participants may contribute up to 60% of their annual compensation, as defined by the Plan, as a pretax contribution, subject to Internal Revenue Service (IRS) limitations. On August 24, 2023, the Plan was amended effective as of November 3, 2023, to allow participants to make Roth deferral contributions. Participants may also contribute amounts representing distributions from other qualified defined benefit or defined contribution plans (rollovers). Participants aged 50 or older before the end of the plan year may also contribute catch-up contributions to the Plan. The Plan includes an auto-enrollment provision whereby all newly eligible employees are automatically enrolled in the Plan unless they affirmatively elect not to participate in the Plan. Automatically enrolled participants have their deferral rate set at 5% of eligible compensation and their contributions invested in a designated investment option until changed by the participant. The deferral rate is increased annually by 1% unless the employee elects otherwise, until it reaches 10% of eligible compensation. The Company makes safe harbor matching contributions in an amount equal to 100% up to 5% of eligible compensation, to eligible participants in the Plan. Profit sharing contributions made by the Company are discretionary and are determined by the Board of Governance of the Company. The Company provided profit sharing contributions in an amount equal to 5% of compensation to eligible employees for the year ended December 31, 2024.

Participant accounts: Each participant's account is credited with the participant's contributions and allocations of: (a) the Company matching contribution, (b) the Company's discretionary contribution, if any, and (c) plan earnings, and charged with an allocation of administrative expenses that are paid by the Plan, and Plan losses. Allocations are based on participant earnings or account balances, as defined. Transaction-based fees associated with optional services rendered are charged directly to the participant's account. The benefit to which a participant is entitled is the benefit that can be provided from the participant's vested account.

Investment options: Upon enrollment in the Plan, a participant may direct the investment of their account in a variety of investment choices as more fully described in the Plan's literature. Participants may change their investment options at any time.

Vesting: Participants are immediately vested in their contributions and the safe harbor matching contributions plus actual earnings thereon. Vesting in the Company's profit sharing contribution portion of their accounts plus actual earnings thereon is based on years of continuous service. A participant is 100% vested after three years of credited service, with no vesting prior thereto. Participants who attain the age of 59½ or who terminate employment due to death or disability are 100% vested in their account balances.

Note 1. Plan Description (Continued)

Notes receivable from participants: Participants may borrow from their fund accounts a minimum of \$1,000 up to a maximum equal to the lesser of \$50,000 or 50% of their vested account balance. No more than one loan may be outstanding at any time. The loans are secured by the balance in the participant's account and bear interest rates commensurate with the prevailing prime rate plus 1 percentage point at loan origination. The term of any loan granted shall not exceed five years, except when used for the purchase of a principal residence; then the term shall not exceed 10 years. Principal and interest are paid ratably through payroll deductions.

Other income: Pursuant to an agreement with Fidelity Management Trust Company (Fidelity), Fidelity agreed to fund revenue-credits to the Plan to pay administrative expenses that the Plan incurs. The credit amounts are determined using a range of fixed basis point pricing multiplied by the average quarterly balances held in qualified Fidelity and non-Fidelity investment products (i.e., mutual funds), as defined in the agreement, which will be paid in quarterly installments. For the year ended December 31, 2024, the Plan received revenue-sharing payments amounting to \$82,617, \$81,940 of which was used to pay Plan administrative expenses. As of December 31, 2024 and 2023, the balance in the revenue credit account amounted to \$3,317 and \$2,640, respectively.

Payment of benefits: On termination of service due to death, disability, or retirement, or for any other reason, a participant may elect to receive either a lump-sum payment, a single life annuity, a joint and survivor annuity if married, or payments over a reasonable period of time not to exceed the participant's life expectancy, or the life expectancy of the participant and the designated beneficiary.

Forfeited accounts: At December 31, 2024 and 2023, forfeited nonvested accounts amounted to \$992 and \$2,397, respectively. These accounts can be used to reduce future Company matching and discretionary contributions, if any, or to pay administrative expenses of the Plan. During 2024, the Company used \$19,500 of forfeitures to reduce profit sharing contributions.

Note 2. Significant Accounting Policies

Basis of accounting: The financial statements of the Plan are prepared on the accrual basis of accounting.

Use of estimates: The preparation of financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and changes therein, and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Investment valuation and income recognition: Investments are reported at fair value. Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. The Retirement Committee determines the Plan's valuation policies utilizing information provided by the trustee. See Note 4 for discussion of fair value measurements.

Purchases and sales of securities are recorded on a trade-date basis. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Dividends are recorded on the ex-dividend date. Net appreciation includes the Plan's gains and losses on investments bought and sold, as well as held during the year.

Note 2. Significant Accounting Policies (Continued)

Notes receivable from participants: Notes receivable from participants are measured at their unpaid principal balance plus any accrued but unpaid interest. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Related fees are recorded as administrative expenses and are expensed when they are incurred. Notes receivable from participants have been classified as an investment asset for Form 5500 reporting purposes and, accordingly, have been included as an investment in the supplemental schedule of assets (held at end of year).

Contributions: Contributions from Plan participants and the corresponding safe harbor matching contributions from the Company are recorded in the year in which the participant compensation is earned. Company profit sharing contributions are recorded in the year in which the participant compensation is earned.

Payment of benefits: Benefits are recorded when paid.

Administrative expenses: Certain expenses incurred in the administration of the Plan are paid by the Plan as provided in the plan document. Other administrative expenses are paid by the Company on behalf of the Plan, without reimbursement, and are excluded from these financial statements.

Subsequent events: The Plan Administrator has evaluated subsequent events for potential recognition and/or disclosure through October 8, 2025, the date the financial statements were available to be issued.

Note 4. Fair Value Measurements

The framework for measuring fair value provides a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. The hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (Level 1) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (Level 3). Valuation techniques maximize the use of relevant observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs. The three levels of the fair value hierarchy are described below:

Level 1: Inputs to the valuation methodology are unadjusted quoted prices for identical assets or liabilities in active markets that the Plan has the ability to access.

Level 2: Inputs to the valuation methodology include:

- Quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities in active markets
- Quoted prices for identical or similar assets or liabilities in inactive markets
- Inputs other than quoted prices that are observable for the asset or liability and
- Inputs that are derived principally from or corroborated by observable market data by correlation or other means. If the asset or liability has a specified (contractual) term, the Level 2 input must be observable for substantially the full term of the asset or liability.

Level 3: Inputs to the valuation methodology are unobservable and significant to the fair value measurement.

The asset's or liability's fair value measurement level within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of any input that is significant to the fair value measurement. Valuation techniques maximize the use of observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs.

The following is a description of the valuation methodologies used for assets measured at fair value. There have been no changes in the methodologies used at December 31, 2024 and 2023:

Registered investment companies: Valued at the daily closing price as reported by the fund. Registered investment companies held by the Plan are open-end mutual funds that are registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission. These funds are required to publish their daily net asset value (NAV) and to transact at that price. Registered investment companies held by the Plan are deemed to be actively traded.

Common investment trust: Valued at the NAV of units of the common investment trust. The NAV, as provided by the trustee, is used as a practical expedient to estimate fair value. The NAV is based on the fair value of the common investment trust's underlying investments less its liabilities. This practical expedient is not used when it is determined to be probable that the fund will sell the investment for an amount different than the reported NAV.

Participants can redeem at the stated unit value as of the close of business on any business day.

To assess the appropriate classification of investments within the fair value hierarchy, the availability of market data is monitored. Changes in economic conditions or valuation techniques may require the transfer of investments from one fair value level to another.

The Plan evaluates the significance of transfers between levels based upon the nature of the investment and size of the transfer relative to total net assets available for benefits. For the year ended December 31, 2024, there were no transfers in or out of Level 3.

Note 5. Related-Party and Party-In-Interest Transactions

Certain plan investments are issued and managed by Fidelity Management Trust Company, the Plan's trustee, and affiliates, therefore, these transactions qualify as party-in-interest transactions.

The Plan made a direct payment to an affiliate of the trustee of the Plan, the recordkeeper, of approximately \$41,000 during the year ended December 31, 2024.

Certain administrative services, principally the maintenance of the Plan's accounting records, are performed by the employees of the Company at no charge to the Plan.

Note 6. Plan Termination

Although it has not expressed any intent to do so, the Company has the right under the Plan to discontinue its contributions at any time and to terminate the Plan subject to the provisions of ERISA. In the event of plan termination, participants will become 100% vested in their accounts.

Note 7. Tax Status

The Plan has adopted a preapproved plan document that has received an opinion letter from the IRS dated June 30, 2020, stating that the form of the preapproved plan document was in compliance with applicable requirements of the Internal Revenue Code (IRC). The Plan has been amended since adopting the preapproved plan document; however, the Plan Administrator believes that the Plan is designed, and is being operated, in compliance with the applicable requirements of the IRC.

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require plan management to evaluate tax positions taken by the Plan and recognize a tax liability if the Plan has taken an uncertain position that more likely than not would not be sustained upon examination. The Plan is subject to routine audits by taxing jurisdictions; however, there are currently no audits for any tax periods in progress.

Note 8. Risks and Uncertainties

The Plan invests in various investment securities. Investment securities are exposed to various risks such as interest rate, market and credit risks. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investment securities, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in the values of investment securities will occur in the near term and that such changes could materially affect participants' account balances and the amounts reported in the statements of net assets available for benefits.

In preparing the financial statements, management is required to evaluate whether there are conditions or events, considered in the aggregate, that raise substantial doubt about the Plan's ability to continue as a going concern within one year after the date that the financial statements are issued or available to be issued.

Management is also responsible for maintaining a current plan instrument, including all plan amendments, administering the Plan, and determining that the Plan's transactions that are presented and disclosed in the financial statements are in conformity with the Plan's provisions, including maintaining sufficient records with respect to each of the participants, to determine the benefits due or which may become due to such participants.

Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements

Except as described in the Scope and Nature of the ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) Audit section of our report, our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance but is not absolute assurance and therefore is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with GAAS will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control. Misstatements are considered material if, there is a substantial likelihood that, individually or in the aggregate, they would influence the judgment made by a reasonable user based on the financial statements.

In performing an audit in accordance with GAAS, we:

- Exercise professional judgment and maintain professional skepticism throughout the audit.
- Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error, and design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks. Such procedures include examining, on a test basis, evidence regarding the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements.
- Obtain an understanding of internal control relevant to the audit in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the Plan's internal control. Accordingly, no such opinion is expressed.
- Evaluate the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluate the overall presentation of the financial statements.

- Conclude whether, in our judgment, there are conditions or events, considered in the aggregate, that raise substantial doubt about the Plan's ability to continue as a going concern for a reasonable period of time.

Our audits did not extend to the certified investment information, except for obtaining and reading the certification, comparing the certified investment information with the related information presented and disclosed in the financial statements, and reading the disclosures relating to the certified investment information to assess whether they are in accordance with the presentation and disclosure requirements of U.S. GAAP.

Accordingly, the objective of an ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) audit is not to express an opinion about whether the financial statements as a whole are presented fairly, in all material respects, in accordance with U.S. GAAP.

We are required to communicate with those charged with governance regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit, significant audit findings, and certain internal control-related matters that we identified during the audit.

Other Matter—Supplemental Schedule Required by ERISA

The supplemental schedule of assets (held at end of year) as of December 31, 2024, is presented for purposes of additional analysis and is not a required part of the financial statements but is supplementary information required by the DOL's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA. Such information is the responsibility of management and was derived from and relates directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements. The information included in the supplemental schedule, other than that agreed to or derived from the certified investment information, has been subjected to auditing procedures applied in the audit of the financial statements and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements or to the financial statements themselves, and other additional procedures in accordance with GAAS. For information included in the supplemental schedule that agreed to or is derived from the certified investment information, we compared such information to the related certified investment information.

In forming our opinion on the supplemental schedule, we evaluated whether the supplemental schedule, other than the information agreed to or derived from the certified investment information, including its form and content, is presented in conformity with the DOL's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA.

In our opinion:

- The form and content of the supplemental schedule, other than the information in the supplemental schedule that agreed to or is derived from the certified investment information, are presented, in all material respects, in conformity with the DOL's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA.
- The information in the supplemental schedule related to assets held by and certified to by a qualified institution agrees to, or is derived from, in all material respects, the information prepared and certified by an institution that management determined meets the requirements of ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C).

Notes to Financial Statements

Note 1. Plan Description

The following description of American College of Healthcare Executives SMART 401(k) Plan (the Plan) provides only general information. Participants should refer to the plan agreement for a more complete description of the Plan's provisions.

General: The Plan is a defined contribution profit sharing and savings plan covering all employees of American College of Healthcare Executives (the Company) and its wholly owned subsidiary, the Foundation of American College of Healthcare Executives. On October 25, 2024, the Plan was amended effective as of December 2, 2024, allowing eligible employees to begin participating immediately following their hire date. Prior to this amendment, eligible employees began participating as of the first day of the following month, subsequent to employment. The Retirement Committee is responsible for the oversight of the Plan, determines the appropriateness of the Plan's investment offering and monitors investment performance. The Plan is subject to the provisions of the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (ERISA).

Contributions: Each year, participants may contribute up to 60% of their annual compensation, as defined by the Plan, as a pretax contribution, subject to Internal Revenue Service (IRS) limitations. On August 24, 2023, the Plan was amended effective as of November 3, 2023, to allow participants to make Roth deferral contributions. Participants may also contribute amounts representing distributions from other qualified defined benefit or defined contribution plans (rollovers). Participants aged 50 or older before the end of the plan year may also contribute catch-up contributions to the Plan. The Plan includes an auto-enrollment provision whereby all newly eligible employees are automatically enrolled in the Plan unless they affirmatively elect not to participate in the Plan. Automatically enrolled participants have their deferral rate set at 5% of eligible compensation and their contributions invested in a designated investment option until changed by the participant. The deferral rate is increased annually by 1% unless the employee elects otherwise, until it reaches 10% of eligible compensation. The Company makes safe harbor matching contributions in an amount equal to 100% up to 5% of eligible compensation, to eligible participants in the Plan. Profit sharing contributions made by the Company are discretionary and are determined by the Board of Governance of the Company. The Company provided profit sharing contributions in an amount equal to 5% of compensation to eligible employees for the year ended December 31, 2024.

Participant accounts: Each participant's account is credited with the participant's contributions and allocations of: (a) the Company matching contribution, (b) the Company's discretionary contribution, if any, and (c) plan earnings, and charged with an allocation of administrative expenses that are paid by the Plan, and Plan losses. Allocations are based on participant earnings or account balances, as defined. Transaction-based fees associated with optional services rendered are charged directly to the participant's account. The benefit to which a participant is entitled is the benefit that can be provided from the participant's vested account.

Investment options: Upon enrollment in the Plan, a participant may direct the investment of their account in a variety of investment choices as more fully described in the Plan's literature. Participants may change their investment options at any time.

Vesting: Participants are immediately vested in their contributions and the safe harbor matching contributions plus actual earnings thereon. Vesting in the Company's profit sharing contribution portion of their accounts plus actual earnings thereon is based on years of continuous service. A participant is 100% vested after three years of credited service, with no vesting prior thereto. Participants who attain the age of 59½ or who terminate employment due to death or disability are 100% vested in their account balances.

Note 1. Plan Description (Continued)

Notes receivable from participants: Participants may borrow from their fund accounts a minimum of \$1,000 up to a maximum equal to the lesser of \$50,000 or 50% of their vested account balance. No more than one loan may be outstanding at any time. The loans are secured by the balance in the participant's account and bear interest rates commensurate with the prevailing prime rate plus 1 percentage point at loan origination. The term of any loan granted shall not exceed five years, except when used for the purchase of a principal residence; then the term shall not exceed 10 years. Principal and interest are paid ratably through payroll deductions.

Other income: Pursuant to an agreement with Fidelity Management Trust Company (Fidelity), Fidelity agreed to fund revenue-credits to the Plan to pay administrative expenses that the Plan incurs. The credit amounts are determined using a range of fixed basis point pricing multiplied by the average quarterly balances held in qualified Fidelity and non-Fidelity investment products (i.e., mutual funds), as defined in the agreement, which will be paid in quarterly installments. For the year ended December 31, 2024, the Plan received revenue-sharing payments amounting to \$82,617, \$81,940 of which was used to pay Plan administrative expenses. As of December 31, 2024 and 2023, the balance in the revenue credit account amounted to \$3,317 and \$2,640, respectively.

Payment of benefits: On termination of service due to death, disability, or retirement, or for any other reason, a participant may elect to receive either a lump-sum payment, a single life annuity, a joint and survivor annuity if married, or payments over a reasonable period of time not to exceed the participant's life expectancy, or the life expectancy of the participant and the designated beneficiary.

Forfeited accounts: At December 31, 2024 and 2023, forfeited nonvested accounts amounted to \$992 and \$2,397, respectively. These accounts can be used to reduce future Company matching and discretionary contributions, if any, or to pay administrative expenses of the Plan. During 2024, the Company used \$19,500 of forfeitures to reduce profit sharing contributions.

Note 2. Significant Accounting Policies

Basis of accounting: The financial statements of the Plan are prepared on the accrual basis of accounting.

Use of estimates: The preparation of financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and changes therein, and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Investment valuation and income recognition: Investments are reported at fair value. Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. The Retirement Committee determines the Plan's valuation policies utilizing information provided by the trustee. See Note 4 for discussion of fair value measurements.

Purchases and sales of securities are recorded on a trade-date basis. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Dividends are recorded on the ex-dividend date. Net appreciation includes the Plan's gains and losses on investments bought and sold, as well as held during the year.

Note 2. Significant Accounting Policies (Continued)

Notes receivable from participants: Notes receivable from participants are measured at their unpaid principal balance plus any accrued but unpaid interest. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Related fees are recorded as administrative expenses and are expensed when they are incurred. Notes receivable from participants have been classified as an investment asset for Form 5500 reporting purposes and, accordingly, have been included as an investment in the supplemental schedule of assets (held at end of year).

Contributions: Contributions from Plan participants and the corresponding safe harbor matching contributions from the Company are recorded in the year in which the participant compensation is earned. Company profit sharing contributions are recorded in the year in which the participant compensation is earned.

Payment of benefits: Benefits are recorded when paid.

Administrative expenses: Certain expenses incurred in the administration of the Plan are paid by the Plan as provided in the plan document. Other administrative expenses are paid by the Company on behalf of the Plan, without reimbursement, and are excluded from these financial statements.

Subsequent events: The Plan Administrator has evaluated subsequent events for potential recognition and/or disclosure through October 8, 2025, the date the financial statements were available to be issued.

Note 4. Fair Value Measurements

The framework for measuring fair value provides a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. The hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (Level 1) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (Level 3). Valuation techniques maximize the use of relevant observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs. The three levels of the fair value hierarchy are described below:

Level 1: Inputs to the valuation methodology are unadjusted quoted prices for identical assets or liabilities in active markets that the Plan has the ability to access.

Level 2: Inputs to the valuation methodology include:

- Quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities in active markets
- Quoted prices for identical or similar assets or liabilities in inactive markets
- Inputs other than quoted prices that are observable for the asset or liability and
- Inputs that are derived principally from or corroborated by observable market data by correlation or other means. If the asset or liability has a specified (contractual) term, the Level 2 input must be observable for substantially the full term of the asset or liability.

Level 3: Inputs to the valuation methodology are unobservable and significant to the fair value measurement.

The asset's or liability's fair value measurement level within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of any input that is significant to the fair value measurement. Valuation techniques maximize the use of observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs.

The following is a description of the valuation methodologies used for assets measured at fair value. There have been no changes in the methodologies used at December 31, 2024 and 2023:

Registered investment companies: Valued at the daily closing price as reported by the fund. Registered investment companies held by the Plan are open-end mutual funds that are registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission. These funds are required to publish their daily net asset value (NAV) and to transact at that price. Registered investment companies held by the Plan are deemed to be actively traded.

Common investment trust: Valued at the NAV of units of the common investment trust. The NAV, as provided by the trustee, is used as a practical expedient to estimate fair value. The NAV is based on the fair value of the common investment trust's underlying investments less its liabilities. This practical expedient is not used when it is determined to be probable that the fund will sell the investment for an amount different than the reported NAV.

Were the Plan to initiate a full redemption of the common/collective trust, the investment adviser reserves the right to temporarily delay withdrawal from the trust in order to ensure that securities liquidations will be carried out in an orderly business manner. Participants can redeem at the stated unit value as of the close of business on any business day.

To assess the appropriate classification of investments within the fair value hierarchy, the availability of market data is monitored. Changes in economic conditions or valuation techniques may require the transfer of investments from one fair value level to another.

The Plan evaluates the significance of transfers between levels based upon the nature of the investment and size of the transfer relative to total net assets available for benefits. For the year ended December 31, 2024, there were no transfers in or out of Level 3.

Note 5. Related-Party and Party-In-Interest Transactions

Certain plan investments are issued and managed by Fidelity Management Trust Company, the Plan's trustee, and affiliates, therefore, these transactions qualify as party-in-interest transactions.

The Plan made a direct payment to an affiliate of the trustee of the Plan, the recordkeeper, of approximately \$41,000 during the year ended December 31, 2024.

Certain administrative services, principally the maintenance of the Plan's accounting records, are performed by the employees of the Company at no charge to the Plan.

Note 6. Plan Termination

Although it has not expressed any intent to do so, the Company has the right under the Plan to discontinue its contributions at any time and to terminate the Plan subject to the provisions of ERISA. In the event of plan termination, participants will become 100% vested in their accounts.

Note 7. Tax Status

The Plan has adopted a preapproved plan document that has received an opinion letter from the IRS dated June 30, 2020, stating that the form of the preapproved plan document was in compliance with applicable requirements of the Internal Revenue Code (IRC). The Plan has been amended since adopting the preapproved plan document; however, the Plan Administrator believes that the Plan is designed, and is being operated, in compliance with the applicable requirements of the IRC.

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require plan management to evaluate tax positions taken by the Plan and recognize a tax liability if the Plan has taken an uncertain position that more likely than not would not be sustained upon examination. The Plan is subject to routine audits by taxing jurisdictions; however, there are currently no audits for any tax periods in progress.

Note 8. Risks and Uncertainties

The Plan invests in various investment securities. Investment securities are exposed to various risks such as interest rate, market and credit risks. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investment securities, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in the values of investment securities will occur in the near term and that such changes could materially affect participants' account balances and the amounts reported in the statements of net assets available for benefits.
