Scope and Nature of the ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) Audit of the 2024 Financial Statements

We have performed an audit of the accompanying financial statements of Physicians Insurance 401(k) Plan, an employee benefit plan subject to the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (ERISA), as permitted by ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C). The financial statements comprise the statement of net assets available for benefits as of December 31, 2024, and the related statement of changes in net assets available for benefits for the year ended December 31, 2024, and the related notes to the financial statements.

Management, having determined it is permissible in the circumstances, has elected to have the 2024 audit of Physicians Insurance 401(k) Plan's financial statements performed in accordance with ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) pursuant to 29 CFR 2520.103-8 of the Department of Labor's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA. As permitted by ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C), our audit need not extend to any statements or information related to assets held for investment of the plan (investment information) by a bank or similar institution or insurance carrier that is regulated, supervised, and subject to periodic examination by a state or federal agency, provided that the statements or information regarding assets so held are prepared and certified to by the bank or similar institution or insurance carrier in accordance with 29 CFR 2520.103-5 of the Department of Labor's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA (qualified institution).

Management has obtained a certification from Fidelity Management Trust Company, the trustee of the Plan, as of December 31, 2024, and for the year ended December 31, 2024, stating that the certified investment information, as described in Note 4 to the financial statements, is complete and accurate.

Opinion on the 2024 Financial Statements

In our opinion, based on our audit and on the procedures performed as described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements section—

- the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements referred to above, other than those agreed to or derived from the certified investment information, are presented fairly, in all material respects, in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.
- the information in the financial statements referred to above related to assets held by and certified to by a qualified institution agrees to, or is derived from, in all material respects, the information prepared and certified by an institution that management determined meets the requirements of ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C).

Basis for Opinion on the 2024 Financial Statements

We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements section of our report. We are required to be independent of Physicians Insurance 401(k) Plan and to meet our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with the relevant ethical requirements relating to our audit. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) audit opinion on the 2024 financial statements.

Responsibilities of Management for the 2024 Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America, and for the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error. Management's election of the ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) audit does not affect management's responsibility for the financial statements.

In preparing the financial statements, management is required to evaluate whether there are conditions or events, considered in the aggregate, that raise substantial doubt about Physicians Insurance 401(k) Plan's ability to continue as a going concern for one year after the date the financial statements are available to be issued.

Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance but is not absolute assurance and therefore is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control. Misstatements are considered material if there is a substantial likelihood that, individually or in the aggregate, they would influence the judgment made by a reasonable user based on the financial statements.

NOTE 1 - DESCRIPTION OF PLAN

The following description of the Physicians Insurance 401(k) Plan (the Plan) provides only general information. Participants should refer to the Plan agreement for a more complete description of the Plan's provisions.

General

The Plan is a defined contribution plan sponsored by Physicians Insurance A Mutual Company (the Plan Sponsor), also known as a salary reduction or 401(k) plan.

An eligible employee is an employee of the Company who has attained age 21, and is not an employee paid on an hourly basis, part of a collective bargaining plan, leased employee, or a non-resident alien. The Plan is subject to the provisions of the Employee Retirement Security Act of 1974 (ERISA).

Contributions

Each year, participants may contribute up to 80% of eligible earnings through pre-tax contributions, after-tax contributions, or a combination of the two contribution types as defined by the Plan, subject to IRS limitations. Participants who have attained age 50 before the end of the Plan year are eligible to make catch-up contributions, as defined in the Plan. Participants direct the investment of their contributions into various investment options offered by the Plan. Effective January 1, 2023, the Plan adopted an auto-enrollment provision whereby all newly eligible employees are automatically enrolled in the Plan unless they affirmatively elect not to participate in the Plan. Automatically enrolled participants have their deferral rate set at 6.6% of eligible compensation and their contributions are invested in a designated balanced fund until changed by the participant.

The Company may elect to make a fixed matching contribution of the participant's contributions, not to exceed 6.6% of the participant's eligible compensation. Employees must make an elective deferral in order to receive the employer matching contribution.

Participant Accounts

Each participant's account is credited with the participant's elected deferrals; the Company's matching contributions and the earnings (losses) from the investment funds selected by the participant. A specified fee is charged to the accounts of individual participants who have initiated a note receivable or other allowable Plan disbursement during the year. Participant accounts would be charged an allocation of administrative expenses, should the Plan Sponsor exercise its right to pass expenses through to the Plan. Each participant is entitled to the benefits that become available as their individual account vests.

Vesting

Participants are immediately vested in their contributions. Vesting in the Company's matching contribution portion of their accounts is based on years of continuous service. Participants are 100% vested after five years of credited service for matching contributions. An employee earns a year of service upon completing 1,000 hours.

Notes Receivable from Participants

Participants may borrow from their account a minimum of \$1,000 up to a maximum equal to the lesser of \$50,000 or 50% of their vested account balance. The notes receivable are secured by the balance in the participant's account and bear interest at the rate in effect in the month each note receivable becomes effective. The interest rate is the prime rate as most recently published in the "The Wall Street Journal" plus one percentage point. Principal and interest are paid ratably through monthly payroll deductions over no more than five years, unless the loan was used to purchase a primary residence in which case the loan may be repaid within a fifteen year period.

Payment of Benefits

A participant's vested account balance is payable to the participant or the participant's beneficiaries in full according to the terms of the Plan upon death, permanent disability, or termination of employment after the normal retirement age of 65 years old. Termination of employment for certain other reasons prior to normal retirement age, death, or disability results in a mandatory distribution of a participant's account with a vested balance of \$1,000 or less.

Forfeitures

The non-vested portion of the Company's contribution for a participant who has terminated employment is forfeited as of the date on which he or she has a five year break-in-service or, if earlier, upon distribution of the vested portion of the participant's employer contribution account. Forfeitures will be used to reduce employer contributions, or to pay Plan expenses if the employer elects not to pay such expenses directly.

NOTE 2 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of Accounting

The accompanying financial statements have been prepared on the accrual basis of accounting.

Notes Receivable from Participants

Notes receivable from participants are measured at their unpaid principal balance plus any accrued but unpaid interest. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Related fees are charged to the Plan participant's account balance when they are incurred. No allowance for credit losses has been recorded as of December 31, 2024 or 2023. If a participant ceases to make loan repayments and the Plan administrator deems the participant loan to be in default, the participant loan balance is reduced and a benefit payment is recorded.

NOTE 2 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Continued)

Investment Valuation and Income Recognition

The Plan's investments are reported at fair value. Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. See Note 3 for discussion of fair value measurements.

Purchases and sales of securities are recorded on a trade-date basis. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Dividends are recorded on the ex-dividend date. Net unrealized appreciation in fair value of investments includes the Plan's gains and losses on investments bought, sold and held during the year.

Payment of Benefits

Benefits are recorded when paid.

Plan Expenses

The Plan Sponsor pays the expenses associated with the administration of the Plan, except for certain investment management fees and loan fees that are directly deducted from the participant's account.

Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires the Plan administrator to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and changes therein, and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities. Accordingly, actual results may differ from those estimates.

Evaluation of Subsequent Events

Management has reviewed subsequent events through September 24, 2025, which is the date that the financial statements were available to be issued.

NOTE 3 - FAIR VALUE MEASUREMENTS

The Fair Value Measurements Topic 820 of the FASB Accounting Standards Codification (ASC) establishes a fair value hierarchy for reporting that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. This hierarchy consists of three broad levels: Level 1 inputs consist of unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets and have the highest priority; Level 2 inputs consist of observable units other than quoted prices for identical assets; and Level 3 inputs have the lowest priority.

The three levels of the fair value hierarchy under FASB ASC 820 are described as follows:

Level 1 - Inputs to the valuation methodology are unadjusted quoted prices for identical assets or liabilities in active markets that the Plan has the ability to access.

Level 2 - Inputs to the valuation methodology include:

- quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities in active markets;
- quoted prices for identical or similar assets or liabilities in inactive markets;
- inputs other than quoted prices that are observable for the asset or liability;
- inputs that are derived principally from or corroborated by observable market data by correlation or other means.

If the asset or liability has a specified (contractual) term, the level 2 input must be observable for substantially the full term of the asset or liability.

Level 3 - Inputs to the valuation methodology are unobservable and significant to the fair value measurement.

The asset or liability's fair value measurement level within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of any input that is significant to the fair value measurement. Valuation techniques maximize the use of relevant observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs.

Following is a description of the valuation methodologies used for assets measured at fair value. There have been no changes in the methodologies used at December 31, 2024 and 2023.

Mutual Funds

The investments in mutual funds are valued utilizing a market approach wherein the Plan uses the quoted prices in the active market for identical assets. All of these investments are traded in active markets at their net asset value per share.

Common Collective Trust Fund

The common collective trust fund is a stable value fund which is composed primarily of guaranteed investment contracts, synthetic investment contracts, and short-term investments which are valued at the net asset value of the fund's underlying net assets. The net asset value is used as a practical expedient to estimate fair value and therefore the fund has not been classified in the fair value hierarchy. The fair value amounts presented in this table are intended to permit reconciliation of the fair value hierarchy to the line items presented in the statement of net assets available for benefits.

Participant transactions (purchases and sales) may occur daily. If the Plan initiates a full redemption of the collective trust, the issuer reserves the right to require 12 months' notification in order to ensure that the securities liquidations will be carried out in an orderly business manner.

NOTE 4 - INFORMATION CERTIFIED BY FIDELITY MANAGEMENT TRUST COMPANY

As permitted by 29 CFR 2520.103-8 of the Department of Labor's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA, the Plan administrator instructed the auditors not to perform any auditing procedures with respect to information which was certified as complete and accurate by Fidelity Management Trust Company, the trustee. The information certified by Fidelity Management Trust Company includes investments, the related investment activity, and notes receivable from participants that are described in the accompanying financial statements.

NOTE 5 - PLAN TERMINATION

Although it has not expressed any intent to do so, the Company has the right under the Plan to discontinue its contributions at any time and to terminate the Plan subject to the provisions of ERISA. In the event of Plan termination, participants would become 100% vested in their profit sharing contributions. Any unallocated assets of the Plan shall be allocated to participant accounts and distributed in such a manner that the Company may determine.

NOTE 6 - TAX STATUS

The IRS has determined and informed the Plan sponsor by a letter dated June 30, 2020, that the Plan and related trust are designed in accordance with applicable sections of the Internal Revenue Code (IRC). Although the Plan has been amended since receiving the determination letter, the Plan administrator and the Plan's tax counsel believe that the Plan is designed, and is currently being operated, in compliance with the applicable requirements of the IRC and, therefore, believe that the Plan is qualified, and the related trust is tax-exempt.

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require Plan management to evaluate tax positions taken by the Plan and recognize a tax liability (or asset) if the Plan has taken an uncertain position that more likely than not would not be sustained upon examination by the Internal Revenue Service or Department of Labor. The Plan administrator has analyzed the tax positions taken by the Plan, and has concluded as of December 31, 2024, there are no uncertain positions taken or expected to be taken that would require recognition of a liability (or asset) or disclosure in the financial statements. The Plan is subject to routine audits by taxing jurisdictions; however, there are currently no audits for any tax periods in progress. The Plan sponsor has filed its Form 5500 return timely with the Department of Labor. The Plan administrator believes it is no longer subject to income tax examinations for years prior to 2021.

NOTE 7 - RELATED PARTIES AND PARTY IN INTEREST TRANSACTIONS

The Plan invested in various investment options managed by Charles Schwab Bank, which served as the trustee, as defined by the Plan through June 30, 2024 and for the year ended December 31, 2023. Effective July 1, 2024, Fidelity Management Trust Company became the trustee of the Plan. Therefore, these transactions are recognized as exempt party-in-interest transactions. In addition, the Plan paid certain expenses to various service providers. These expenses are exempt party-in-interest transactions under ERISA.

NOTE 8 - RISKS AND UNCERTAINTIES

The Plan invests in various investment securities. Investment securities are exposed to various risks such as interest rate, market, and credit risks. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investment securities, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in the values of investment securities will occur in the near term and that such changes could materially affect participants' account balances and the amounts reported in the statement of net assets available for benefits.

The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control. Misstatements are considered material if there is a substantial likelihood that, individually or in the aggregate, they would influence the judgment made by a reasonable user based on the financial statements.

- Obtain an understanding of internal control relevant to the audit in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of Physicians Insurance 401(k) Plan's internal control. Accordingly, no such opinion is expressed.
- Evaluate the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluate the overall presentation of the financial statements.
- Conclude whether, in our judgment, there are conditions or events, considered in the aggregate, that raise substantial doubt about Physicians Insurance 401(k) Plan's ability to continue as a going concern for a reasonable period of time.

Our audit did not extend to the certified investment information, except for obtaining and reading the certification, comparing the certified investment information with the related information presented and disclosed in the financial statements, and reading the disclosures relating to the certified investment information to assess whether they are in accordance with the presentation and disclosure requirements of accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Accordingly, the objective of an ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) audit is not to express an opinion about whether the financial statements as a whole are presented fairly, in all material respects, in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

We are required to communicate with those charged with governance regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit, significant audit findings, and certain internal control-related matters that we identified during the audit.

NOTE 1 - DESCRIPTION OF PLAN

The following description of the Physicians Insurance 401(k) Plan (the Plan) provides only general information. Participants should refer to the Plan agreement for a more complete description of the Plan's provisions.

General

The Plan is a defined contribution plan sponsored by Physicians Insurance A Mutual Company (the Plan Sponsor), also known as a salary reduction or 401(k) plan.

An eligible employee is an employee of the Company who has attained age 21, and is not an employee paid on an hourly basis, part of a collective bargaining plan, leased employee, or a non-resident alien. The Plan is subject to the provisions of the Employee Retirement Security Act of 1974 (ERISA).

Contributions

Each year, participants may contribute up to 80% of eligible earnings through pre-tax contributions, after-tax contributions, or a combination of the two contribution types as defined by the Plan, subject to IRS limitations. Participants who have attained age 50 before the end of the Plan year are eligible to make catch-up contributions, as defined in the Plan. Participants direct the investment of their contributions into various investment options offered by the Plan. Effective January 1, 2023, the Plan adopted an auto-enrollment provision whereby all newly eligible employees are automatically enrolled in the Plan unless they affirmatively elect not to participate in the Plan. Automatically enrolled participants have their deferral rate set at 6.6% of eligible compensation and their contributions are invested in a designated balanced fund until changed by the participant.

The Company may elect to make a fixed matching contribution of the participant's contributions, not to exceed 6.6% of the participant's eligible compensation. Employees must make an elective deferral in order to receive the employer matching contribution.

Participant Accounts

Each participant's account is credited with the participant's elected deferrals; the Company's matching contributions and the earnings (losses) from the investment funds selected by the participant. A specified fee is charged to the accounts of individual participants who have initiated a note receivable or other allowable Plan disbursement during the year. Participant accounts would be charged an allocation of administrative expenses, should the Plan Sponsor exercise its right to pass expenses through to the Plan. Each participant is entitled to the benefits that become available as their individual account vests.

Vesting

Participants are immediately vested in their contributions. Vesting in the Company's matching contribution portion of their accounts is based on years of continuous service. Participants are 100% vested after five years of credited service for matching contributions. An employee earns a year of service upon completing 1,000 hours.

Notes Receivable from Participants

Participants may borrow from their account a minimum of \$1,000 up to a maximum equal to the lesser of \$50,000 or 50% of their vested account balance. The notes receivable are secured by the balance in the participant's account and bear interest at the rate in effect in the month each note receivable becomes effective. The interest rate is the prime rate as most recently published in the "The Wall Street Journal" plus one percentage point. Principal and interest are paid ratably through monthly payroll deductions over no more than five years, unless the loan was used to purchase a primary residence in which case the loan may be repaid within a fifteen year period.

Payment of Benefits

A participant's vested account balance is payable to the participant or the participant's beneficiaries in full according to the terms of the Plan upon death, permanent disability, or termination of employment after the normal retirement age of 65 years old. Termination of employment for certain other reasons prior to normal retirement age, death, or disability results in a mandatory distribution of a participant's account with a vested balance of \$1,000 or less.

Forfeitures

The non-vested portion of the Company's contribution for a participant who has terminated employment is forfeited as of the date on which he or she has a five year break-in-service or, if earlier, upon distribution of the vested portion of the participant's employer contribution account. Forfeitures will be used to reduce employer contributions, or to pay Plan expenses if the employer elects not to pay such expenses directly.

NOTE 2 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of Accounting

The accompanying financial statements have been prepared on the accrual basis of accounting.

Notes Receivable from Participants

Notes receivable from participants are measured at their unpaid principal balance plus any accrued but unpaid interest. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Related fees are charged to the Plan participant's account balance when they are incurred. No allowance for credit losses has been recorded as of December 31, 2024 or 2023. If a participant ceases to make loan repayments and the Plan administrator deems the participant loan to be in default, the participant loan balance is reduced and a benefit payment is recorded.

NOTE 2 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Continued)

Investment Valuation and Income Recognition

The Plan's investments are reported at fair value. Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. See Note 3 for discussion of fair value measurements.

Purchases and sales of securities are recorded on a trade-date basis. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Dividends are recorded on the ex-dividend date. Net unrealized appreciation in fair value of investments includes the Plan's gains and losses on investments bought, sold and held during the year.

Payment of Benefits

Benefits are recorded when paid.

Plan Expenses

The Plan Sponsor pays the expenses associated with the administration of the Plan, except for certain investment management fees and loan fees that are directly deducted from the participant's account.

Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires the Plan administrator to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and changes therein, and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities. Accordingly, actual results may differ from those estimates.

Evaluation of Subsequent Events

Management has reviewed subsequent events through September 24, 2025, which is the date that the financial statements were available to be issued.

NOTE 3 - FAIR VALUE MEASUREMENTS

The Fair Value Measurements Topic 820 of the FASB Accounting Standards Codification (ASC) establishes a fair value hierarchy for reporting that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. This hierarchy consists of three broad levels: Level 1 inputs consist of unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets and have the highest priority; Level 2 inputs consist of observable units other than quoted prices for identical assets; and Level 3 inputs have the lowest priority.

The three levels of the fair value hierarchy under FASB ASC 820 are described as follows:

Level 1 - Inputs to the valuation methodology are unadjusted quoted prices for identical assets or liabilities in active markets that the Plan has the ability to access.

Level 2 - Inputs to the valuation methodology include:

- quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities in active markets;
- quoted prices for identical or similar assets or liabilities in inactive markets;
- inputs other than quoted prices that are observable for the asset or liability;
- inputs that are derived principally from or corroborated by observable market data by correlation or other means.

If the asset or liability has a specified (contractual) term, the level 2 input must be observable for substantially the full term of the asset or liability.

Level 3 - Inputs to the valuation methodology are unobservable and significant to the fair value measurement.

The asset or liability's fair value measurement level within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of any input that is significant to the fair value measurement. Valuation techniques maximize the use of relevant observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs.

Following is a description of the valuation methodologies used for assets measured at fair value. There have been no changes in the methodologies used at December 31, 2024 and 2023.

Mutual Funds

The investments in mutual funds are valued utilizing a market approach wherein the Plan uses the quoted prices in the active market for identical assets. All of these investments are traded in active markets at their net asset value per share.

Common Collective Trust Fund

The common collective trust fund is a stable value fund which is composed primarily of guaranteed investment contracts, synthetic investment contracts, and short-term investments which are valued at the net asset value of the fund's underlying net assets. The net asset value is used as a practical expedient to estimate fair value and therefore the fund has not been classified in the fair value hierarchy. The fair value amounts presented in this table are intended to permit reconciliation of the fair value hierarchy to the line items presented in the statement of net assets available for benefits.

Common Collective Trust Fund (Continued)

Participant transactions (purchases and sales) may occur daily. If the Plan initiates a full redemption of the collective trust, the issuer reserves the right to require 12 months' notification in order to ensure that the securities liquidations will be carried out in an orderly business manner.

NOTE 4 - INFORMATION CERTIFIED BY FIDELITY MANAGEMENT TRUST COMPANY

As permitted by 29 CFR 2520.103-8 of the Department of Labor's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA, the Plan administrator instructed the auditors not to perform any auditing procedures with respect to information which was certified as complete and accurate by Fidelity Management Trust Company, the trustee. The information certified by Fidelity Management Trust Company includes investments, the related investment activity, and notes receivable from participants that are described in the accompanying financial statements.

NOTE 5 - PLAN TERMINATION

Although it has not expressed any intent to do so, the Company has the right under the Plan to discontinue its contributions at any time and to terminate the Plan subject to the provisions of ERISA. In the event of Plan termination, participants would become 100% vested in their profit sharing contributions. Any unallocated assets of the Plan shall be allocated to participant accounts and distributed in such a manner that the Company may determine.

NOTE 6 - TAX STATUS

The IRS has determined and informed the Plan sponsor by a letter dated June 30, 2020, that the Plan and related trust are designed in accordance with applicable sections of the Internal Revenue Code (IRC). Although the Plan has been amended since receiving the determination letter, the Plan administrator and the Plan's tax counsel believe that the Plan is designed, and is currently being operated, in compliance with the applicable requirements of the IRC and, therefore, believe that the Plan is qualified, and the related trust is tax-exempt.

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require Plan management to evaluate tax positions taken by the Plan and recognize a tax liability (or asset) if the Plan has taken an uncertain position that more likely than not would not be sustained upon examination by the Internal Revenue Service or Department of Labor. The Plan administrator has analyzed the tax positions taken by the Plan, and has concluded as of December 31, 2024, there are no uncertain positions taken or expected to be taken that would require recognition of a liability (or asset) or disclosure in the financial statements. The Plan is subject to routine audits by taxing jurisdictions; however, there are currently no audits for any tax periods in progress. The Plan sponsor has filed its Form 5500 return timely with the Department of Labor. The Plan administrator believes it is no longer subject to income tax examinations for years prior to 2021.

NOTE 7 - RELATED PARTIES AND PARTY IN INTEREST TRANSACTIONS

The Plan invested in various investment options managed by Charles Schwab Bank, which served as the trustee, as defined by the Plan through June 30, 2024 and for the year ended December 31, 2023. Effective July 1, 2024, Fidelity Management Trust Company became the trustee of the Plan. Therefore, these transactions are recognized as exempt party-in-interest transactions. In addition, the Plan paid certain expenses to various service providers. These expenses are exempt party-in-interest transactions under ERISA.

NOTE 8 - RISKS AND UNCERTAINTIES

The Plan invests in various investment securities. Investment securities are exposed to various risks such as interest rate, market, and credit risks. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investment securities, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in the values of investment securities will occur in the near term and that such changes could materially affect participants' account balances and the amounts reported in the statement of net assets available for benefits.
