We have performed audits of the financial statements of Employee Profit Sharing - Retirement Plan of Foster Farms Group (the Plan), an employee benefit plan subject to the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (ERISA), as permitted by ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) (ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) audit). The financial statements comprise the statements of net assets available for benefits as of December 31, 2024 and 2023, the related statement of changes in net assets available for benefits for the year ended December 31, 2024, and the related notes to the financial statements.

Management, having determined it is permissible in the circumstances, has elected to have the audits of the Plan's financial statements performed in accordance with ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) pursuant to 29 CFR 2520.103-8 of the Department of Labor's (DOL) Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA. As permitted by ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C), our audits need not extend to any statements or information related to assets held for investment of the Plan (investment information) by a bank or similar institution or insurance carrier that is regulated, supervised, and subject to periodic examination by a state or federal agency, provided that the statements or information regarding assets so held are prepared and certified to by the bank or similar institution or insurance carrier in accordance with 29 CFR 2520.103-5 of the DOL's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA (qualified institution).

Management has obtained certifications from a qualified institution, Fidelity Management Trust Company, as of December 31, 2024 and 2023, and for the year ended December 31, 2024, stating that the certified investment information, as described in Note 3 to the financial statements, is complete and accurate.

Opinion

- The information in the accompanying financial statements related to assets held by and certified to by a qualified institution agrees to, or is derived from, in all material respects, the information prepared and certified by an institution that management determined meets the requirements of ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C).

Basis for Opinion

Note 1 Description of the Plan

The following descriptions of the Employee Profit Sharing - Retirement Plan of Foster Farms Group (the Plan) provides only general information. Participants should refer to the Plan and Trust Agreement for a more complete description of the Plan's provisions.

General The Plan is subject to the provisions of the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (ERISA). It is a defined contribution plan covering all eligible employees of Foster Farms Group (Foster Farms, LLC, Foster Poultry Farms, Napoleon Poultry Supply, LLC) (the Companies). Per the Plan document, an employee is eligible to contribute salary deferrals and receive employer safe harbor contributions and employer match contributions upon date of hire. Eligible employees are automatically enrolled after meeting eligibility requirements unless they opt-out. The financial statements are prepared in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America. The Administrative Committee is responsible for the oversight of the Plan.

Contributions Eligible employees of the Company may elect to contribute up to the applicable limits allowed under the Internal Revenue Code. Participants who have attained age 50 before the end of the Plan year are eligible to make catch-up contributions. Participants may also contribute amounts representing distributions from other qualified defined benefit contribution plans (rollover). Non-union employees, Delhi, Livingston, and Cherry unions are eligible for an employer safe-harbor contribution equal to 100% of the first 3% and 50% of the next 2% of salary deferral contributions. All other union employees are eligible for an employer matching contribution up to 25% of salary deferral contributions, not to exceed 4% of compensation and additionally are eligible for a discretionary employer match of up to 1% of compensation. All eligible full-time employees who have been credited with at least 1,000 hours worked during a twelve-month period and who are employed on the last day of the plan year are eligible for profit-sharing contributions. Plan entry dates are January 1 and July 1 for profit sharing contributions. The Plan recognizes discretionary employer matching contributions and profit-sharing contributions in the period related to the participant's service or compensation and records it as a receivable as of plan year-end.

Participant Accounts Each participant's account is credited with the participant's contributions and allocation of (a) the Company's contributions, (b) plan earnings, and charged with an allocation of administrative expenses, and (c) any forfeitures. The benefit to which a participant is entitled is the benefit that can be provided from the participant's vested account.

Payment of Benefits On termination of service, if a participant's account balance does not exceed \$1,000 a distribution shall be made in a lump-sum amount equal to the vested value of his or her account. If the balance is greater than \$1,000, the participant may elect to receive a lump-sum payment, defer receipt of payment in accordance with plan provisions, or rollover to another qualified plan or IRA. A participant may elect a hardship distribution prior to his or her separation from service in accordance with the hardship distribution policy.

Investment Options Upon enrollment in the Plan, a participant may direct contributions into numerous investment choices offered by Fidelity Management Trust Company. Participants may change their investment options through Fidelity's customer service center or via the internet.

Administrative Expenses Certain expenses of maintaining the Plan are paid by the Plan, unless otherwise paid by the Companies. Expenses that are paid by the Companies are excluded from these financial statements. Investment related expenses are included in net appreciation in fair value of investments.

Note 1 Description of the Plan (Continued)

Notes Receivable from Participants The Plan does not allow participant notes receivable.

Vesting Participants are immediately 100% vested in their elective deferrals, rollover contributions, and employer safe harbor matching contributions. Participants are 100% vested in their profit-sharing contributions after six years of credited service (20% per year after two years of credited service). Participants are 100% vested in their employer matching contribution and discretionary contribution after five years of credited service (20% per year after one year of credited service). A participant is 100% vested after reaching normal retirement age, or upon death or disability.

Forfeitures At December 31, 2024 and 2023, the Plan had \$244,488 and \$46,611 in unallocated forfeitures, respectively, to be allocated to participants in accordance with Plan provisions. The Plan allocates participant forfeitures, if any, to reduce employer contributions for the Plan year in which the forfeiture occurs. Forfeitures of \$161,043 were used to pay plan expenses for the year ended December 31, 2024.

Secure 2.0 Act On December 29, 2022, the Consolidated Appropriations Act of 2023 was signed into law, which includes the package of retirement provisions referred to as Secure 2.0. These provisions continue the themes and reforms that began with the 2019 Secure Act, focusing on getting more participants into the retirement system and finding ways for them to accumulate more assets. These changes have various effective dates starting in 2023 and forward. Since the provisions include both required and optional elements, the Plan Administrator will determine the optional provisions to elect.

Note 2 Summary of Accounting Policies

Basis of Accounting The financial statements are prepared on the accrual basis of accounting.

Investment Valuations and Income Recognition Investments are reported at fair value, except for fully benefit-responsive investment contracts, which are reported at contract value. Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. The Plan Sponsor determines the Plan's valuation policies utilizing information provided by the investment advisers, custodians, or trustees.

Purchases and sales of securities are recorded on a trade-date basis. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Dividends are recorded on the ex-dividend date. Net appreciation includes the Plan's gains and losses on investments purchased and sold as well as held during the year.

Excess Contributions Payable Amounts payable to participants for contributions in excess of amounts allowed by the IRS are recorded as a liability with a corresponding reduction to contributions. The Plan distributed the excess contributions to the applicable participants in accordance with plan provisions.

Payment of Benefits The Plan records benefits when paid. The total vested benefits due to terminated participants but not paid was \$146,172,546 at December 31, 2024.

Accounting for Uncertainty in Income Taxes Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require Plan management to evaluate tax positions taken by the Plan and recognize a tax liability if the Plan has taken an uncertain position that more likely than not would not be sustained upon examination. The Plan is subject to routine audits by taxing jurisdictions; however, there are currently no audits for any tax periods in progress.

Use of Estimates The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of net assets available for benefits and changes therein. Accordingly, actual results could differ from those estimates.

Subsequent Events In preparing these financial statements, the Plan has evaluated events and transactions for potential recognition or disclosure through October 8, 2025, the date the financial statements were available to be issued.

Note 3 Information Prepared and Certified by the Trustee

The following is a summary of the Plan's asset information at December 31, 2024 and 2023, and for the year ended December 31, 2024, included throughout the Plan's financial statements and the supplemental schedules, that was prepared by or derived from information provided by the trustee and furnished to the Plan Administrator. The Plan Administrator has obtained certifications from the trustee that information provided to the Plan Administrator by the trustee related to the following assets is complete and accurate. Accordingly, as permitted by 29 CFR 2520.103-8 of the DOL's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA, the Plan Administrator instructed the Plan's independent auditors not to perform any auditing procedures with respect to information which appears throughout the financial statements and the supplemental schedules related to the following assets at December 31:

Note 5 Income Tax Status

The Plan obtained its latest determination letter on May 20, 2015, in which the Internal Revenue Service stated that the Plan, designed as of February 14, 2014, was in compliance with the applicable requirements of the Internal Revenue Code. The Plan has been restated since receiving the determination letter. However, the Plan Administrator and the Plan's tax counsel believe that the Plan is currently designed and being operated in compliance with the applicable requirements of the Internal Revenue Code. Therefore, the Plan Administrator and Plan's tax counsel believe that the Plan is qualified and the related trust is tax-exempt at the financial statement date.

Note 6 Risks and Uncertainties

The Plan invests in various investment securities. Investment securities are exposed to various risks such as interest rate, market, and credit risks. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investment securities, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in the values of investment securities will occur in the near term and that such changes could materially affect participants' account and balances and the amounts reported in the statements of net assets available for benefits.

Note 7 Plan Termination

Although they have not expressed any intent to do so, the Plan Sponsor has the right under the Plan to discontinue its contributions at any time and to terminate the Plan subject to the provisions of ERISA. In the event of plan termination, participants will become 100% vested in their accounts.

Note 8 Fair Value Measurements

The framework for measuring fair value provides a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. The hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (level 1 measurements) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (level 3 measurements). Valuation techniques maximize the use of relevant observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs.

The three levels of the fair value hierarchy are described below:

- Level 1 Inputs to the valuation methodology are unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities that the Plan can access at the measurement date.

- Level 2 Inputs other than quoted prices included within Level 1 that are observable for the asset or liability, either directly or indirectly, such as:

- Quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities in active markets;
- Quoted prices for identical or similar assets or liabilities in inactive markets;
- Inputs other than quoted prices that are observable for the asset or liability;
- Inputs that are derived principally from or corroborated by observable market data by correlation or other means.

If the asset or liability has a specified (contractual) term, the Level 2 input must be observable for substantially the full term of the asset or liability.

Level 3 Inputs that are unobservable inputs for the asset or liability.

The asset's or liability's fair value measurement level within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of any input that is significant to the fair value measurement. Valuation techniques maximize the use of relevant observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs.

There have been no changes in the methodologies used at December 31, 2024 and 2023. Following is a description of the valuation methodologies used for assets measured at fair value.

Mutual funds Valued at the daily closing price as reported by the fund. Mutual funds held by the Plan are open-end mutual funds that are registered with the U.S. Securities and Exchange Commission. These funds are required to publish their daily net asset value (NAV) and to transact at that price. The mutual funds held by the Plan are deemed to be actively traded.

Money market funds Determined using a market approach and is based upon unadjusted quoted prices for identical assets in active markets.

We have performed audits of the financial statements of Employee Profit Sharing - Retirement Plan of Foster Farms Group (the Plan), an employee benefit plan subject to the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (ERISA), as permitted by ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) (ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) audit). The financial statements comprise the statements of net assets available for benefits as of December 31, 2024 and 2023, the related statement of changes in net assets available for benefits for the year ended December 31, 2024, and the related notes to the financial statements.

Note 1 Description of the Plan

The following descriptions of the Employee Profit Sharing - Retirement Plan of Foster Farms Group (the Plan) provides only general information. Participants should refer to the Plan and Trust Agreement for a more complete description of the Plan's provisions.

General The Plan is subject to the provisions of the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (ERISA). It is a defined contribution plan covering all eligible employees of Foster Farms Group (Foster Farms, LLC, Foster Poultry Farms, Napoleon Poultry Supply, LLC) (the Companies). Per the Plan document, an employee is eligible to contribute salary deferrals and receive employer safe harbor contributions and employer match contributions upon date of hire. Eligible employees are automatically enrolled after meeting eligibility requirements unless they opt-out. The financial statements are prepared in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America. The Administrative Committee is responsible for the oversight of the Plan.

Contributions Eligible employees of the Company may elect to contribute up to the applicable limits allowed under the Internal Revenue Code. Participants who have attained age 50 before the end of the Plan year are eligible to make catch-up contributions. Participants may also contribute amounts representing distributions from other qualified defined benefit contribution plans (rollover). Non-union employees, Delhi, Livingston, and Cherry unions are eligible for an employer safe-harbor contribution equal to 100% of the first 3% and 50% of the next 2% of salary deferral contributions. All other union employees are eligible for an employer matching contribution up to 25% of salary deferral contributions, not to exceed 4% of compensation and additionally are eligible for a discretionary employer match of up to 1% of compensation. All eligible full-time employees who have been credited with at least 1,000 hours worked during a twelve-month period and who are employed on the last day of the plan year are eligible for profit-sharing contributions. Plan entry dates are January 1 and July 1 for profit sharing contributions. The Plan recognizes discretionary employer matching contributions and profit-sharing contributions in the period related to the participant's service or compensation and records it as a receivable as of plan year-end.

Participant Accounts Each participant's account is credited with the participant's contributions and allocation of (a) the Company's contributions, (b) plan earnings, and charged with an allocation of administrative expenses, and (c) any forfeitures. The benefit to which a participant is entitled is the benefit that can be provided from the participant's vested account.

Payment of Benefits On termination of service, if a participant's account balance does not exceed \$1,000 a distribution shall be made in a lump-sum amount equal to the vested value of his or her account. If the balance is greater than \$1,000, the participant may elect to receive a lump-sum payment, defer receipt of payment in accordance with plan provisions, or rollover to another qualified plan or IRA. A participant may elect a hardship distribution prior to his or her separation from service in accordance with the hardship distribution policy.

Investment Options Upon enrollment in the Plan, a participant may direct contributions into numerous investment choices offered by Fidelity Management Trust Company. Participants may change their investment options through Fidelity's customer service center or via the internet.

Administrative Expenses Certain expenses of maintaining the Plan are paid by the Plan, unless otherwise paid by the Companies. Expenses that are paid by the Companies are excluded from these financial statements. Investment related expenses are included in net appreciation in fair value of investments.

Notes Receivable from Participants The Plan does not allow participant notes receivable.

Vesting Participants are immediately 100% vested in their elective deferrals, rollover contributions, and employer safe harbor matching contributions. Participants are 100% vested in their profit-sharing contributions after six years of credited service (20% per year after two years of credited service). Participants are 100% vested in their employer matching contribution and discretionary contribution after five years of credited service (20% per year after one year of credited service). A participant is 100% vested after reaching normal retirement age, or upon death or disability.

Forfeitures At December 31, 2024 and 2023, the Plan had \$244,488 and \$46,611 in unallocated forfeitures, respectively, to be allocated to participants in accordance with Plan provisions. The Plan allocates participant forfeitures, if any, to reduce employer contributions for the Plan year in which the forfeiture occurs. Forfeitures of \$161,043 were used to pay plan expenses for the year ended December 31, 2024.

Secure 2.0 Act On December 29, 2022, the Consolidated Appropriations Act of 2023 was signed into law, which includes the package of retirement provisions referred to as Secure 2.0. These provisions continue the themes and reforms that began with the 2019 Secure Act, focusing on getting more participants into the retirement system and finding ways for them to accumulate more assets. These changes have various effective dates starting in 2023 and forward. Since the provisions include both required and optional elements, the Plan Administrator will determine the optional provisions to elect.

Note 2 Summary of Accounting Policies

Basis of Accounting The financial statements are prepared on the accrual basis of accounting.

Investment Valuations and Income Recognition Investments are reported at fair value, except for fully benefit-responsive investment contracts, which are reported at contract value. Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. The Plan Sponsor determines the Plan's valuation policies utilizing information provided by the investment advisers, custodians, or trustees.

Purchases and sales of securities are recorded on a trade-date basis. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Dividends are recorded on the ex-dividend date. Net appreciation includes the Plan's gains and losses on investments purchased and sold as well as held during the year.

Excess Contributions Payable Amounts payable to participants for contributions in excess of amounts allowed by the IRS are recorded as a liability with a corresponding reduction to contributions. The Plan distributed the excess contributions to the applicable participants in accordance with plan provisions.

Payment of Benefits The Plan records benefits when paid. The total vested benefits due to terminated participants but not paid was \$146,172,546 at December 31, 2024.

Accounting for Uncertainty in Income Taxes Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require Plan management to evaluate tax positions taken by the Plan and recognize a tax liability if the Plan has taken an uncertain position that more likely than not would not be sustained upon examination. The Plan is subject to routine audits by taxing jurisdictions; however, there are currently no audits for any tax periods in progress.

Use of Estimates The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of net assets available for benefits and changes therein. Accordingly, actual results could differ from those estimates.

Subsequent Events In preparing these financial statements, the Plan has evaluated events and transactions for potential recognition or disclosure through October 8, 2025, the date the financial statements were available to be issued.

Note 3 Information Prepared and Certified by the Trustee

The following is a summary of the Plan's asset information at December 31, 2024 and 2023, and for the year ended December 31, 2024, included throughout the Plan's financial statements and the supplemental schedules, that was prepared by or derived from information provided by the trustee and furnished to the Plan Administrator. The Plan Administrator has obtained certifications from the trustee that information provided to the Plan Administrator by the trustee related to the following assets is complete and accurate. Accordingly, as permitted by 29 CFR 2520.103-8 of the DOL's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA, the Plan Administrator instructed the Plan's independent auditors not to perform any auditing procedures with respect to information which appears throughout the financial statements and the supplemental schedules related to the following assets at December 31:

Note 5 Income Tax Status

The Plan obtained its latest determination letter on May 20, 2015, in which the Internal Revenue Service stated that the Plan, designed as of February 14, 2014, was in compliance with the applicable requirements of the Internal Revenue Code. The Plan has been restated since receiving the determination letter. However, the Plan Administrator and the Plan's tax counsel believe that the Plan is currently designed and being operated in compliance with the applicable requirements of the Internal Revenue Code. Therefore, the Plan Administrator and Plan's tax counsel believe that the Plan is qualified and the related trust is tax-exempt at the financial statement date.

Note 6 Risks and Uncertainties

The Plan invests in various investment securities. Investment securities are exposed to various risks such as interest rate, market, and credit risks. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investment securities, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in the values of investment securities will occur in the near term and that such changes could materially affect participants' account and balances and the amounts reported in the statements of net assets available for benefits.

Note 7 Plan Termination

Although they have not expressed any intent to do so, the Plan Sponsor has the right under the Plan to discontinue its contributions at any time and to terminate the Plan subject to the provisions of ERISA. In the event of plan termination, participants will become 100% vested in their accounts.

Note 8 Fair Value Measurements

The framework for measuring fair value provides a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. The hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (level 1 measurements) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (level 3 measurements). Valuation techniques maximize the use of relevant observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs.

The three levels of the fair value hierarchy are described below:

- Level 1 Inputs to the valuation methodology are unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities that the Plan can access at the measurement date.
- Level 2 Inputs other than quoted prices included within Level 1 that are observable for the asset or liability, either directly or indirectly, such as:

- Quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities in active markets;
- Quoted prices for identical or similar assets or liabilities in inactive markets;
- Inputs other than quoted prices that are observable for the asset or liability;
- Inputs that are derived principally from or corroborated by observable market data by correlation or other means.

If the asset or liability has a specified (contractual) term, the Level 2 input must be observable for substantially the full term of the asset or liability.

Level 3 Inputs that are unobservable inputs for the asset or liability.

The asset's or liability's fair value measurement level within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of any input that is significant to the fair value measurement. Valuation techniques maximize the use of relevant observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs.

There have been no changes in the methodologies used at December 31, 2024 and 2023. Following is a description of the valuation methodologies used for assets measured at fair value.

Mutual funds Valued at the daily closing price as reported by the fund. Mutual funds held by the Plan are open-end mutual funds that are registered with the U.S. Securities and Exchange Commission. These funds are required to publish their daily net asset value (NAV) and to transact at that price. The mutual funds held by the Plan are deemed to be actively traded.

Money market funds Determined using a market approach and is based upon unadjusted quoted prices for identical assets in active markets.

Common collective trusts Consists of investments in collective trust funds which include growth or value stocks as well as a variety of mutual funds using an asset allocation strategy. The fair value of the common collective trusts are publicly quoted pricing inputs and these investments are considered to have readily determinable fair value.

Scope and Nature of the ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) Audit

The financial statements comprise the statements of net assets available for benefits as of December 31, 2024 and 2023, the related statement of changes in net assets available for benefits for the year ended December 31, 2024, and the related notes to the financial statements.

Management has obtained certifications from a qualified institution, Fidelity Management Trust Company, as of December 31, 2024 and 2023, and for the year ended December 31, 2024, stating that the certified investment information, as described in Note 3 to the financial statements, is complete and accurate.

Opinion

In our opinion, based on our audits and on the procedures performed as described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements section:

Note 1 Description of the Plan

The following descriptions of the Employee Profit Sharing - Retirement Plan of Foster Farms Group (the Plan) provides only general information. Participants should refer to the Plan and Trust Agreement for a more complete description of the Plan's provisions.

General The Plan is subject to the provisions of the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (ERISA). It is a defined contribution plan covering all eligible employees of Foster Farms Group (Foster Farms, LLC, Foster Poultry Farms, Napoleon Poultry Supply, LLC) (the Companies). Per the Plan document, an employee is eligible to contribute salary deferrals and receive employer safe harbor contributions and employer match contributions upon date of hire. Eligible employees are automatically enrolled after meeting eligibility requirements unless they opt-out. The financial statements are prepared in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America. The Administrative Committee is responsible for the oversight of the Plan.

Contributions Eligible employees of the Company may elect to contribute up to the applicable limits allowed under the Internal Revenue Code. Participants who have attained age 50 before the end of the Plan year are eligible to make catch-up contributions. Participants may also contribute amounts representing distributions from other qualified defined benefit contribution plans (rollover). Non-union employees, Delhi, Livingston, and Cherry unions are eligible for an employer safe-harbor contribution equal to 100% of the first 3% and 50% of the next 2% of salary deferral contributions. All other union employees are eligible for an employer matching contribution up to 25% of salary deferral contributions, not to exceed 4% of compensation and additionally are eligible for a discretionary employer match of up to 1% of compensation. All eligible full-time employees who have been credited with at least 1,000 hours worked during a twelve-month period and who are employed on the last day of the plan year are eligible for profit-sharing contributions. Plan entry dates are January 1 and July 1 for profit sharing contributions. The Plan recognizes discretionary employer matching contributions and profit-sharing contributions in the period related to the participant's service or compensation and records it as a receivable as of plan year-end.

Participant Accounts Each participant's account is credited with the participant's contributions and allocation of (a) the Company's contributions, (b) plan earnings, and charged with an allocation of administrative expenses, and (c) any forfeitures. The benefit to which a participant is entitled is the benefit that can be provided from the participant's vested account.

Payment of Benefits On termination of service, if a participant's account balance does not exceed \$1,000 a distribution shall be made in a lump-sum amount equal to the vested value of his or her account. If the balance is greater than \$1,000, the participant may elect to receive a lump-sum payment, defer receipt of payment in accordance with plan provisions, or rollover to another qualified plan or IRA. A participant may elect a hardship distribution prior to his or her separation from service in accordance with the hardship distribution policy.

Investment Options Upon enrollment in the Plan, a participant may direct contributions into numerous investment choices offered by Fidelity Management Trust Company. Participants may change their investment options through Fidelity's customer service center or via the internet.

Administrative Expenses Certain expenses of maintaining the Plan are paid by the Plan, unless otherwise paid by the Companies. Expenses that are paid by the Companies are excluded from these financial statements. Investment related expenses are included in net appreciation in fair value of investments.

Notes Receivable from Participants The Plan does not allow participant notes receivable.

Vesting Participants are immediately 100% vested in their elective deferrals, rollover contributions, and employer safe harbor matching contributions. Participants are 100% vested in their profit-sharing contributions after six years of credited service (20% per year after two years of credited service). Participants are 100% vested in their employer matching contribution and discretionary contribution after five years of credited service (20% per year after one year of credited service). A participant is 100% vested after reaching normal retirement age, or upon death or disability.

Forfeitures At December 31, 2024 and 2023, the Plan had \$244,488 and \$46,611 in unallocated forfeitures, respectively, to be allocated to participants in accordance with Plan provisions. The Plan allocates participant forfeitures, if any, to reduce employer contributions for the Plan year in which the forfeiture occurs. Forfeitures of \$161,043 were used to pay plan expenses for the year ended December 31, 2024.

Secure 2.0 Act On December 29, 2022, the Consolidated Appropriations Act of 2023 was signed into law, which includes the package of retirement provisions referred to as Secure 2.0. These provisions continue the themes and reforms that began with the 2019 Secure Act, focusing on getting more participants into the retirement system and finding ways for them to accumulate more assets. These changes have various effective dates starting in 2023 and forward. Since the provisions include both required and optional elements, the Plan Administrator will determine the optional provisions to elect.

Note 2 Summary of Accounting Policies

Basis of Accounting The financial statements are prepared on the accrual basis of accounting.

Investment Valuations and Income Recognition Investments are reported at fair value, except for fully benefit-responsive investment contracts, which are reported at contract value. Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. The Plan Sponsor determines the Plan's valuation policies utilizing information provided by the investment advisers, custodians, or trustees.

Purchases and sales of securities are recorded on a trade-date basis. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Dividends are recorded on the ex-dividend date. Net appreciation includes the Plan's gains and losses on investments purchased and sold as well as held during the year.

Excess Contributions Payable Amounts payable to participants for contributions in excess of amounts allowed by the IRS are recorded as a liability with a corresponding reduction to contributions. The Plan distributed the excess contributions to the applicable participants in accordance with plan provisions.

Payment of Benefits The Plan records benefits when paid. The total vested benefits due to terminated participants but not paid was \$146,172,546 at December 31, 2024.

Accounting for Uncertainty in Income Taxes Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require Plan management to evaluate tax positions taken by the Plan and recognize a tax liability if the Plan has taken an uncertain position that more likely than not would not be sustained upon examination. The Plan is subject to routine audits by taxing jurisdictions; however, there are currently no audits for any tax periods in progress.

Use of Estimates The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of net assets available for benefits and changes therein. Accordingly, actual results could differ from those estimates.

Subsequent Events In preparing these financial statements, the Plan has evaluated events and transactions for potential recognition or disclosure through October 8, 2025, the date the financial statements were available to be issued.

Note 3 Information Prepared and Certified by the Trustee

The following is a summary of the Plan's asset information at December 31, 2024 and 2023, and for the year ended December 31, 2024, included throughout the Plan's financial statements and the supplemental schedules, that was prepared by or derived from information provided by the trustee and furnished to the Plan Administrator. The Plan Administrator has obtained certifications from the trustee that information provided to the Plan Administrator by the trustee related to the following assets is complete and accurate. Accordingly, as permitted by 29 CFR 2520.103-8 of the DOL's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA, the Plan Administrator instructed the Plan's independent auditors not to perform any auditing procedures with respect to information which appears throughout the financial statements and the supplemental schedules related to the following assets at December 31:

Fidelity Management Trust Company, the Plan's trustee, Atherton & Associates, LLP, independent auditor, and Cook Street Consulting, Inc., investment advisers, are parties-in-interest according to Section 3(14) of ERISA.

Note 5 Income Tax Status

The Plan obtained its latest determination letter on May 20, 2015, in which the Internal Revenue Service stated that the Plan, designed as of February 14, 2014, was in compliance with the applicable requirements of the Internal Revenue Code. The Plan has been restated since receiving the determination letter. However, the Plan Administrator and the Plan's tax counsel believe that the Plan is currently designed and being operated in compliance with the applicable requirements of the Internal Revenue Code. Therefore, the Plan Administrator and Plan's tax counsel believe that the Plan is qualified and the related trust is tax-exempt at the financial statement date.

Note 6 Risks and Uncertainties

The Plan invests in various investment securities. Investment securities are exposed to various risks such as interest rate, market, and credit risks. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investment securities, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in the values of investment securities will occur in the near term and that such changes could materially affect participants' account and balances and the amounts reported in the statements of net assets available for benefits.

Note 7 Plan Termination

Although they have not expressed any intent to do so, the Plan Sponsor has the right under the Plan to discontinue its contributions at any time and to terminate the Plan subject to the provisions of ERISA. In the event of plan termination, participants will become 100% vested in their accounts.

Note 8 Fair Value Measurements

The framework for measuring fair value provides a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. The hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (level 1 measurements) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (level 3 measurements). Valuation techniques maximize the use of relevant observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs.

The three levels of the fair value hierarchy are described below:

- Level 1 Inputs to the valuation methodology are unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities that the Plan can access at the measurement date.
- Level 2 Inputs other than quoted prices included within Level 1 that are observable for the asset or liability, either directly or indirectly, such as:

- Quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities in active markets;
- Quoted prices for identical or similar assets or liabilities in inactive markets;
- Inputs other than quoted prices that are observable for the asset or liability;
- Inputs that are derived principally from or corroborated by observable market data by correlation or other means.

If the asset or liability has a specified (contractual) term, the Level 2 input must be observable for substantially the full term of the asset or liability.

Level 3 Inputs that are unobservable inputs for the asset or liability.

The asset's or liability's fair value measurement level within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of any input that is significant to the fair value measurement. Valuation techniques maximize the use of relevant observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs.

There have been no changes in the methodologies used at December 31, 2024 and 2023. Following is a description of the valuation methodologies used for assets measured at fair value.

Mutual funds Valued at the daily closing price as reported by the fund. Mutual funds held by the Plan are open-end mutual funds that are registered with the U.S. Securities and Exchange Commission. These funds are required to publish their daily net asset value (NAV) and to transact at that price. The mutual funds held by the Plan are deemed to be actively traded.

Money market funds Determined using a market approach and is based upon unadjusted quoted prices for identical assets in active markets.

Common collective trusts Consists of investments in collective trust funds which include growth or value stocks as well as a variety of mutual funds using an asset allocation strategy. The fair value of the common collective trusts are publicly quoted pricing inputs and these investments are considered to have readily determinable fair value.
