## Scope and Nature of the ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) Audit

## NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

### Note 1 - DESCRIPTION OF PLAN

The following description of the Perdue, Brandon, Fielder, Collins and Mott 401(k) Plan (Plan) provides only general information. Participants should refer to the Plan Agreement for a more complete description of the Plan's provisions.

*General* – The Plan is a defined contribution plan covering all employees of Perdue, Brandon, Field, Collins and Mott, LLC (the Sponsor), age 21 years or older, with the following eligibility requirements: Employee contributions – completion of 30 days of service; Employer contributions – completion of one year of service, defined as 1,000 hours of service in a period of 12 consecutive months. Entry date for the Plan is the first day of the calendar quarter which coincides with, or next follows the date on which an employee meets the eligibility requirements. It is subject to the provisions of the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (ERISA), as amended, and is intended to qualify under Section 401(k) of the Internal Revenue Code (IRC). The Plan Investment Committee is responsible for the oversight of the Plan and determines the appropriateness of and monitors the Plan's investment performance. The Board of Directors delegates authority to the Plan Administrator.

*Contributions* – Each year, participants may contribute either pre-tax or Roth deferrals, as defined in the Plan, but subject to IRC limitations. Participants may also contribute amounts representing distributions from other qualified defined contribution plans (rollover). Participants direct the investment of their contributions into various investment options offered by the Plan.

The Sponsor makes a Safe Harbor matching contribution of 100% of the first 6% of eligible compensation that a participant contributes to the Plan. The Sponsor may also contribute to the Plan such amounts of its current or accumulated profits as determined by the Board of Directors. Contributions are subject to certain limitations. There were discretionary profit sharing contributions of \$500,001 for the year ended December 31, 2024.

*Participant Accounts* – Each participant's account is credited with the participant's contributions, the Sponsor's matching contributions, and allocations of Plan earnings (losses), and is charged with an allocation of administrative expenses that are paid by the Plan. Allocations are based on participant earnings or account balances, as defined in the Plan document. The benefit to which a participant is entitled is the benefit that can be provided from the participant's vested account.

*Vesting* – Participant contributions, employer matching contributions, and earnings thereon are immediately vested. Vesting for profit sharing contributions is based on years of continuous service as follows:

<u>Years of Service</u>	<u>Non-forfeitable Percentage</u>
One year but less than two years	20%
Two years but less than three years	40%
Three years but less than four years	60%
Four years but less than five years	80%
Five years or more	100%

*Notes Receivable from Participants* – Participants may borrow from their accounts a maximum equal to the lesser of \$50,000 or 50% of their vested account balance. The loans are secured by the balance in the participant's account and bear interest at rates as determined by the Plan administrator based on local prevailing interest rates. Principal and interest is paid ratably through payroll deductions.

## NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS (CONT'D.)

### Note 1 - DESCRIPTION OF PLAN (CONT'D.)

*Payment of Benefits* – On termination of service due to death, disability, or retirement, a participant becomes 100% vested in the employer contributions and may elect to receive a lump sum amount equal to the value of the participant's account. Plan provisions permit a participant to withdraw funds from the Plan for reasons of financial hardship. For termination of service for other reasons, a participant may receive the value of the vested interest in his or her account as a lump sum distribution or roll the account into another qualified Plan.

*Forfeited Accounts* – At December 31, 2024 and 2023, forfeited non-vested accounts totaled \$82,634 and \$72,740, respectively. Forfeited balances of terminated participant accounts can be used to reduce future employer contributions or are allocated to remaining participants using a formula based on eligible compensation. For the year ended December 31, 2024, there were fees in the amount of \$33,647 paid from forfeited non-vested funds.

### Note 2 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

*Basis of Accounting* – The financial statements of the Plan are prepared on the accrual basis of accounting.

Investments held by a defined contribution plan are required to be reported at fair value, except for fully benefit-responsive investment contracts. Contract value is the relevant measure for that portion of the net assets available for benefits of a defined contribution plan attributable to fully benefit-responsive investment contracts because contract value is the amount participants normally would receive if they were to initiate permitted transactions under the terms of the Plan.

*Use of Estimates* – The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America (GAAP) requires the Plan administrator to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and changes therein, and disclosures of contingent assets and liabilities. Accordingly, actual results may differ from those estimates.

*Investment Valuation and Income Recognition* – Investments are reported at fair value except for the fully benefit-responsive investment contract, which is reported at contract value. Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. See Note 5 for a discussion of fair value measurements.

Purchases and sales of securities are recorded on a trade-date basis. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Dividends are recorded on the ex-dividend date. Interest income and dividends are recorded when received. Net appreciation (depreciation) includes the Plan's gains and losses on investments bought and sold, as well as held during the year.

*Notes Receivable from Participants* – Notes receivable from participants are measured at their unpaid balance plus any accrued but unpaid interest. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Related fees are charged directly to the borrowing participant's account and are included in administrative expenses when incurred. As of December 31, 2024 and 2023, no allowance for credit losses has been recorded. If a participant does not make loan repayments and the Plan administrator considers the participant loan to be in default, the loan balance is reduced, and the delinquent participant note receivable is recorded as a benefit payment based on the terms of the Plan document.

### Note 2 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONT'D.)

*Payment of Benefits* – Benefit payments are recorded when paid.

*Administrative Expenses* – Certain expenses of maintaining the Plan are paid by the Plan, unless otherwise paid by the Sponsor. Expenses that are paid by the Sponsor are excluded from these financial statements. Fees related to the administration of notes receivable from participants are charged directly to the participant's account and are included in administrative expenses. Investment related expenses are included in net appreciation or depreciation in the value of investments.

*Administration of Plan Assets* – The Plan's assets are held and invested by the Trustee and Administrator of the Plan. They are responsible for interpreting Plan provisions, determining Plan benefits and maintaining Plan records. Certain administrative functions are performed by officers or employees of the Sponsor. No such officer or employee receives compensation from the Plan.

*Subsequent Events* – The Plan has evaluated subsequent events through October 8, 2025, the date the financial statements were available to be issued.

### Note 3 - TAX STATUS

The Internal Revenue Service (IRS) has determined and informed the Sponsor by a letter dated June 30, 2020, that the Plan and related trust are designed in accordance with applicable sections of the Internal Revenue Code (IRC). Although the Plan has been amended since receiving the determination letter, the Sponsor and the Plan administrator believe that the Plan is designed and currently being operated in compliance with the applicable requirements of the IRC and, therefore, believe the Plan is qualified and the related trust is tax exempt.

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require the plan administrator to evaluate tax positions taken by the Plan and recognize a tax liability for any uncertain position that more likely than not would not be sustained upon examination by the IRS. The Plan is subject to routine audits by tax authorities; however, there are currently no audits for any tax periods in progress.

### Note 4 - INFORMATION CERTIFIED BY THE TRUSTEE

The Plan management has elected the method of compliance permitted by 29 CFR 2520.103-8 of the Department of Labor's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA. Accordingly, as permitted under such election, the Plan management instructed the Plan's independent auditor not to perform any auditing procedures with respect to the following information certified by Fidelity Management Trust Company (Fidelity), the trustee of the Plan, as complete and accurate, except for comparing such information certified by the trustee with information included in the Plan's financial statements and supplemental schedules:

Note 5 - FAIR VALUE MEASUREMENT

FASB ASC 820, *Fair Value Measurements and Disclosures*, provides the framework for measuring fair value. That framework provides a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. The hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (Level 1) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (Level 3). The three levels of the fair value hierarchy under FASB ASC 820 are described as follows:

Level 1 - Inputs to the valuation methodology are unadjusted quoted prices for identical assets or liabilities in active markets that the Plan has the ability to access.

Level 2 - Inputs to the valuation methodology include:

- Quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities in active markets;
- Quoted prices for identical or similar assets or liabilities in inactive markets;
- Inputs other than quoted prices that are observable for the asset or liability; and
- Inputs that are derived principally from or corroborated by observable market data by correlation or other means.

If the asset or liability has a specified (contractual) term, the Level 2 input must be observable for substantially the full term of the asset or liability.

Level 3 - Inputs to the valuation methodology are unobservable and significant to the fair value measurement.

The asset's or liability's fair value measurement level within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of any input that is significant to the fair value measurement. Valuation techniques used need to maximize the use of observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs.

Following is a description of the valuation methodologies used for assets measured at fair value. There have been no changes in the methodologies used at December 31, 2024.

*Mutual funds:* Valued at the daily closing price as reported by the fund. Mutual funds held by the Plan are open-end mutual funds that are registered with the SEC. These funds are required to publish their daily net asset value (NAV) and to transact at that price. The mutual funds held by the Plan are deemed to be actively traded.

### Note 6 - COMMON COLLECTIVE TRUST

The Plan entered into a traditional fully benefit-responsive guaranteed investment contract with Fidelity totaling \$1,278,470 and \$2,456,585 as of December 31, 2024 and 2023, respectively. Fidelity maintains the contributions to the contract in a common collective trust. The accounts are credited with earnings on the underlying investments and charged for participant withdrawals and administrative expenses. The common collective trust contract issuer is contractually obligated to repay the principal and a specified interest rate that is guaranteed to the Plan. The crediting rate is based on a formula established by the contract issuer but may not be less than 1% before expenses. The contract crediting rate is evaluated periodically, typically quarterly, for resetting. The common collective trust contract does not have a maturity date. The contract's provisions do not provide a distribution at book value at some specified future date. The contract continues in force until all assets have been distributed, or no further payments are due.

This contract meets the fully benefit-responsive investment contract criteria and therefore is reported at contract value. Contract value is the relevant measure for fully benefit-responsive investment contracts because this is the amount received by participants if they were to initiate permitted transactions under the terms of the Plan. Contract value, as reported to the Plan by Fidelity, represents contributions made under the contract, plus earnings, less participant withdrawals, and administrative expenses. Participants may ordinarily direct the withdrawal or transfer of all or a portion of their investment at contract value.

Certain events might limit the ability of the Plan to transact at contract value with the issuer. Such events include: (1) amendments to the Plan documents (including complete or partial Plan termination or merger with another plan), (2) changes to the Plan's prohibition on

competing investment options or deletion of equity wash provisions, (3) bankruptcy of the Plan sponsor or other Plan sponsor events (for example, divestitures or spin-offs of a subsidiary) that cause a significant withdrawal from the Plan, or (4) the failure of the trust to qualify for exemption from federal income taxes or any required prohibited transaction exemption under ERISA. No events are probable of occurring that might limit the ability of the Plan to transact at contract value with the contract issuers and that also would limit the ability of the Plan to transact at contract value with the participants.

In addition, certain events allow the issuer to terminate the contract with the Plan and settle at an amount different from contract value. Such events include: (1) an uncured violation of the Plan's investment guidelines, (2) a breach of material obligation under contract, (3) a material misrepresentation, or (4) a material amendment to the agreement without the consent of the issuer.

### Note 7 - RISKS AND UNCERTAINTIES

The Plan provides for various investment options. Investment options are exposed to various risks such as interest rate, market, and credit risks. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investment options, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in the values of investment securities will occur in the near term and that such changes could materially affect participants' account balances and the amounts reported in the statement of net assets available for benefits.

### Note 8 - RELATED PARTY AND PARTY-IN-INTEREST TRANSACTIONS

Certain Plan investments are registered investment companies and a common collective trust managed by Fidelity. Fidelity is the trustee and recordkeeper for the Plan and, therefore, these transactions qualify as party-in-interest transactions. Fees paid by the Plan for the investment management services amounted to \$39,587 for the year ended December 31, 2024.

### Note 9 - PLAN TERMINATION

Although it has not formally expressed any intent to do so, the Sponsor has the right under the Plan to discontinue its contributions at any time and to terminate the Plan subject to the provisions of ERISA. In the event of Plan termination, participants will become 100% vested in their employer contribution.

## Scope and Nature of the ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) Audit

As permitted by ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C), our audits need not extend to any statements or information related to assets held for investment of the plan (investment information) by a bank or similar institution or insurance carrier that is regulated, supervised, and subject to periodic examination by a state or federal agency, provided that the statements or information regarding assets so held are prepared and certified to by the bank or similar institution or insurance carrier in accordance with 29 CFR 2520.103-5 of the Department of Labor's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA (qualified institution).

Management has obtained certifications from a qualified institution as of December 31, 2024 and 2023, and for the year ended December 31, 2024, stating that the certified investment information, as described in Note 4 to the financial statements, is complete and accurate.

## Opinion

## NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

### Note 1 - DESCRIPTION OF PLAN

The following description of the Perdue, Brandon, Fielder, Collins and Mott 401(k) Plan (Plan) provides only general information. Participants should refer to the Plan Agreement for a more complete description of the Plan's provisions.

*General* – The Plan is a defined contribution plan covering all employees of Perdue, Brandon, Field, Collins and Mott, LLC (the Sponsor), age 21 years or older, with the following eligibility requirements: Employee contributions – completion of 30 days of service; Employer contributions – completion of one year of service, defined as 1,000 hours of service in a period of 12 consecutive months. Entry date for the Plan is the first day of the calendar quarter which coincides with, or next follows the date on which an employee meets the eligibility requirements. It is subject to the provisions of the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (ERISA), as amended, and is intended to qualify under Section 401(k) of the Internal Revenue Code (IRC). The Plan Investment Committee is responsible for the oversight of the Plan and determines the appropriateness of and monitors the Plan's investment performance. The Board of Directors delegates authority to the Plan Administrator.

*Contributions* – Each year, participants may contribute either pre-tax or Roth deferrals, as defined in the Plan, but subject to IRC limitations. Participants may also contribute amounts representing distributions from other qualified defined contribution plans (rollover). Participants direct the investment of their contributions into various investment options offered by the Plan.

The Sponsor makes a Safe Harbor matching contribution of 100% of the first 6% of eligible compensation that a participant contributes to the Plan. The Sponsor may also contribute to the Plan such amounts of its current or accumulated profits as determined by the Board of Directors. Contributions are subject to certain limitations. There were discretionary profit sharing contributions of \$500,001 for the year ended December 31, 2024.

*Participant Accounts* – Each participant's account is credited with the participant's contributions, the Sponsor's matching contributions, and allocations of Plan earnings (losses), and is charged with an allocation of administrative expenses that are paid by the Plan. Allocations are based on participant earnings or account balances, as defined in the Plan document. The benefit to which a participant is entitled is the benefit that can be provided from the participant's vested account.

*Vesting* – Participant contributions, employer matching contributions, and earnings thereon are immediately vested. Vesting for profit sharing contributions is based on years of continuous service as follows:

<u>Years of Service</u>	<u>Non-forfeitable Percentage</u>
One year but less than two years	20%
Two years but less than three years	40%
Three years but less than four years	60%
Four years but less than five years	80%
Five years or more	100%

*Notes Receivable from Participants* – Participants may borrow from their accounts a maximum equal to the lesser of \$50,000 or 50% of their vested account balance. The loans are secured by the balance in the participant's account and bear interest at rates as determined by the Plan administrator based on local prevailing interest rates. Principal and interest is paid ratably through payroll deductions.

### Note 1 - DESCRIPTION OF PLAN (CONT'D.)

*Payment of Benefits* – On termination of service due to death, disability, or retirement, a participant becomes 100% vested in the employer contributions and may elect to receive a lump sum amount equal to the value of the participant's account. Plan provisions permit a participant to withdraw funds from the Plan for reasons of financial hardship. For termination of service for other reasons, a participant may receive the value of the vested interest in his or her account as a lump sum distribution or roll the account into another qualified Plan.

*Forfeited Accounts* – At December 31, 2024 and 2023, forfeited non-vested accounts totaled \$82,634 and \$72,740, respectively. Forfeited balances of terminated participant accounts can be used to reduce future employer contributions or are allocated to remaining participants using a formula based on eligible compensation. For the year ended December 31, 2024, there were fees in the amount of \$33,647 paid from forfeited non-vested funds.

### Note 2 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

*Basis of Accounting* – The financial statements of the Plan are prepared on the accrual basis of accounting.

Investments held by a defined contribution plan are required to be reported at fair value, except for fully benefit-responsive investment contracts. Contract value is the relevant measure for that portion of the net assets available for benefits of a defined contribution plan attributable to fully benefit-responsive investment contracts because contract value is the amount participants normally would receive if they were to initiate permitted transactions under the terms of the Plan.

*Use of Estimates* – The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America (GAAP) requires the Plan administrator to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and changes therein, and disclosures of contingent assets and liabilities. Accordingly, actual results may differ from those estimates.

*Investment Valuation and Income Recognition* – Investments are reported at fair value except for the fully benefit-responsive investment contract, which is reported at contract value. Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. See Note 5 for a discussion of fair value measurements.

Purchases and sales of securities are recorded on a trade-date basis. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Dividends are recorded on the ex-dividend date. Interest income and dividends are recorded when received. Net appreciation (depreciation) includes the Plan's gains and losses on investments bought and sold, as well as held during the year.

*Notes Receivable from Participants* – Notes receivable from participants are measured at their unpaid balance plus any accrued but unpaid interest. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Related fees are charged directly to the borrowing participant's account and are included in administrative expenses when incurred. As of December 31, 2024 and 2023, no allowance for credit losses has been recorded. If a participant does not make loan repayments and the Plan administrator considers the participant loan to be in default, the loan balance is reduced, and the delinquent participant note receivable is recorded as a benefit payment based on the terms of the Plan document.

### Note 2 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONT'D.)

*Payment of Benefits* – Benefit payments are recorded when paid.

*Administrative Expenses* – Certain expenses of maintaining the Plan are paid by the Plan, unless otherwise paid by the Sponsor. Expenses that are paid by the Sponsor are excluded from these financial statements. Fees related to the administration of notes receivable from participants are charged directly to the participant's account and are included in administrative expenses. Investment related expenses are included in net appreciation or depreciation in the value of investments.

*Administration of Plan Assets* – The Plan's assets are held and invested by the Trustee and Administrator of the Plan. They are responsible for interpreting Plan provisions, determining Plan benefits and maintaining Plan records. Certain administrative functions are performed by officers or employees of the Sponsor. No such officer or employee receives compensation from the Plan.

*Subsequent Events* – The Plan has evaluated subsequent events through October 8, 2025, the date the financial statements were available to be issued.

### Note 3 - TAX STATUS

The Internal Revenue Service (IRS) has determined and informed the Sponsor by a letter dated June 30, 2020, that the Plan and related trust are designed in accordance with applicable sections of the Internal Revenue Code (IRC). Although the Plan has been amended since receiving the determination letter, the Sponsor and the Plan administrator believe that the Plan is designed and currently being operated in compliance with the applicable requirements of the IRC and, therefore, believe the Plan is qualified and the related trust is tax exempt.

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require the plan administrator to evaluate tax positions taken by the Plan and recognize a tax liability for any uncertain position that more likely than not would not be sustained upon examination by the IRS. The Plan is subject to routine audits by tax authorities; however, there are currently no audits for any tax periods in progress.

### Note 4 - INFORMATION CERTIFIED BY THE TRUSTEE

The Plan management has elected the method of compliance permitted by 29 CFR 2520.103-8 of the Department of Labor's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA. Accordingly, as permitted under such election, the Plan management instructed the Plan's independent auditor not to perform any auditing procedures with respect to the following information certified by Fidelity Management Trust Company (Fidelity), the trustee of the Plan, as complete and accurate, except for comparing such information certified by the trustee with information included in the Plan's financial statements and supplemental schedules:

Note 5 - FAIR VALUE MEASUREMENT

FASB ASC 820, *Fair Value Measurements and Disclosures*, provides the framework for measuring fair value. That framework provides a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. The hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (Level 1) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (Level 3). The three levels of the fair value hierarchy under FASB ASC 820 are described as follows:

Level 1 - Inputs to the valuation methodology are unadjusted quoted prices for identical assets or liabilities in active markets that the Plan has the ability to access.

Level 2 - Inputs to the valuation methodology include:

- Quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities in active markets;
- Quoted prices for identical or similar assets or liabilities in inactive markets;
- Inputs other than quoted prices that are observable for the asset or liability; and
- Inputs that are derived principally from or corroborated by observable market data by correlation or other means.

If the asset or liability has a specified (contractual) term, the Level 2 input must be observable for substantially the full term of the asset or liability.

Level 3 - Inputs to the valuation methodology are unobservable and significant to the fair value measurement.

The asset's or liability's fair value measurement level within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of any input that is significant to the fair value measurement. Valuation techniques used need to maximize the use of observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs.

Following is a description of the valuation methodologies used for assets measured at fair value. There have been no changes in the methodologies used at December 31, 2024.

*Mutual funds:* Valued at the daily closing price as reported by the fund. Mutual funds held by the Plan are open-end mutual funds that are registered with the SEC. These funds are required to publish their daily net asset value (NAV) and to transact at that price. The mutual funds held by the Plan are deemed to be actively traded.

### Note 6 - COMMON COLLECTIVE TRUST

The Plan entered into a traditional fully benefit-responsive guaranteed investment contract with Fidelity totaling \$1,278,470 and \$2,456,585 as of December 31, 2024 and 2023, respectively. Fidelity maintains the contributions to the contract in a common collective trust. The accounts are credited with earnings on the underlying investments and charged for participant withdrawals and administrative expenses. The common collective trust contract issuer is contractually obligated to repay the principal and a specified interest rate that is guaranteed to the Plan. The crediting rate is based on a formula established by the contract issuer but may not be less than 1% before expenses. The contract crediting rate is evaluated periodically, typically quarterly, for resetting. The common collective trust contract does not have a maturity date. The contract's provisions do not provide a distribution at book value at some specified future date. The contract continues in force until all assets have been distributed, or no further payments are due.

This contract meets the fully benefit-responsive investment contract criteria and therefore is reported at contract value. Contract value is the relevant measure for fully benefit-responsive investment contracts because this is the amount received by participants if they were to initiate permitted transactions under the terms of the Plan. Contract value, as reported to the Plan by Fidelity, represents contributions made under the contract, plus earnings, less participant withdrawals, and administrative expenses. Participants may ordinarily direct the withdrawal or transfer of all or a portion of their investment at contract value.

Certain events might limit the ability of the Plan to transact at contract value with the issuer. Such events include: (1) amendments to the Plan documents (including complete or partial Plan termination or merger with another plan), (2) changes to the Plan's prohibition on

competing investment options or deletion of equity wash provisions, (3) bankruptcy of the Plan sponsor or other Plan sponsor events (for example, divestitures or spin-offs of a subsidiary) that cause a significant withdrawal from the Plan, or (4) the failure of the trust to qualify for exemption from federal income taxes or any required prohibited transaction exemption under ERISA. No events are probable of occurring that might limit the ability of the Plan to transact at contract value with the contract issuers and that also would limit the ability of the Plan to transact at contract value with the participants.

In addition, certain events allow the issuer to terminate the contract with the Plan and settle at an amount different from contract value. Such events include: (1) an uncured violation of the Plan's investment guidelines, (2) a breach of material obligation under contract, (3) a material misrepresentation, or (4) a material amendment to the agreement without the consent of the issuer.

### Note 7 - RISKS AND UNCERTAINTIES

The Plan provides for various investment options. Investment options are exposed to various risks such as interest rate, market, and credit risks. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investment options, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in the values of investment securities will occur in the near term and that such changes could materially affect participants' account balances and the amounts reported in the statement of net assets available for benefits.

### Note 8 - RELATED PARTY AND PARTY-IN-INTEREST TRANSACTIONS

Certain Plan investments are registered investment companies and a common collective trust managed by Fidelity. Fidelity is the trustee and recordkeeper for the Plan and, therefore, these transactions qualify as party-in-interest transactions. Fees paid by the Plan for the investment management services amounted to \$39,587 for the year ended December 31, 2024.

### Note 9 - PLAN TERMINATION

Although it has not formally expressed any intent to do so, the Sponsor has the right under the Plan to discontinue its contributions at any time and to terminate the Plan subject to the provisions of ERISA. In the event of Plan termination, participants will become 100% vested in their employer contribution.
