As permitted by ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C), our audits need not extend to any statements or information related to assets held for investment of the Plan (“investment information”) by a bank or similar institution or insurance carrier that is regulated, supervised, and subject to periodic examination by a state or federal agency, provided the statements or information regarding assets so held are prepared and certified to by the bank or similar institution or insurance carrier in accordance with 29 CFR 2520.103-5 of DOL’s Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA (“qualified institution”).

Management has obtained certifications from a qualified institution as of December 31, 2024 and 2023 and for the year ended December 31, 2024, stating the certified investment information, as described in Note 3 to the financial statements, is complete and accurate.

Opinion

In our opinion, based on our audits and on the procedures performed as described in the *Auditor’s Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements* section:

- The amounts and disclosures in the financial statements referred to above, other than those agreed to or derived from the certified investment information, are presented fairly, in all material respects, in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Responsibilities of Management for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America., and for the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error. Management's election of the ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) audit does not affect management's responsibility for the financial statements.

In preparing the financial statements, management is required to evaluate whether there are conditions or events, considered in the aggregate, that raise substantial doubt about the Plan's ability to continue as a going concern for one year after the date the financial statements are available to be issued.

Management is also responsible for maintaining a current Plan instrument, including all Plan amendments; administering the Plan; and determining the Plan's transactions that are presented and disclosed in the financial statements are in conformity with the Plan's provisions, including maintaining sufficient records with respect to each of the participants, to determine the benefits due or which may become due to such participants.

Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements

Except as described in the Scope and Nature of the ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) Audit section of our report, our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinion. Our audits did not extend to the certified investment information, except for obtaining and reading the certification, comparing the certified investment information with the related information presented and disclosed in the financial statements, and reading the disclosures relating to the certified investment information to assess whether they are in accordance with the presentation and disclosure requirements of accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Accordingly, the objective of an ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) audit is not to express an opinion about whether the financial statements as a whole are presented fairly, in all material respects, in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

We are required to communicate with those charged with governance regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit, significant audit findings, and certain internal control related matters that we identified during the audit.

The information included in the supplemental schedules, other than that agreed to or derived from the certified investment information, has been subjected to auditing procedures applied in the audits of the financial statements and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements or to the financial statements themselves, and other additional procedures in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards. For information included in the supplemental schedules that agreed to or is derived from the certified investment information, we compared such information to the related certified investment information.

In forming our opinion on the supplemental schedules, we evaluated whether the supplemental schedules, other than the information agreed to or derived from the certified investment Information, including its form and content, is presented in conformity with DOL’s Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA.

Note 1—Description of the Plan

The following description of the Pantheon Ventures (US) LP (the “Company” and “Plan administrator”) 401(k) Plan and Trust (the “Plan”) provides only general information. Participants should refer to the Plan agreement for a more complete description of the Plan’s provisions.

General – The Plan is a defined contribution plan covering all employees of the Company who have attained the age of 21 and have completed three months of service. Initial enrollment is available at the beginning of the month after reaching eligibility. To become eligible for the discretionary Company profit sharing contribution, an employee must complete six months of service. The Plan is subject to the provisions of the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (“ERISA”). The Board of Directors is responsible for oversight of the Plan. The Retirement Plan Administrative Committee determines the appropriateness of the Plan’s investment offerings, monitors investment performance, and reports to the Company’s Board of Directors.

Administration – The Company has designated certain employees, who serve without additional compensation, to administer the Plan. The Plan administrator has the overall responsibility and authority as the named fiduciary to manage and control the operations and administration of the Plan and may designate one or more individuals to perform those responsibilities. Fidelity Management Trust Company (“Fidelity”) is the Plan’s trustee.

Contributions – Each year, participants may contribute up to 90% of pretax annual compensation, as defined in the Plan agreement. Participants have the option of contributing a percentage of their taxable compensation as a Roth contribution. Participants who have attained age 50 before the end of the Plan year are eligible to make catch-up contributions. Participants may also contribute amounts representing distributions from other qualified defined benefit or defined contribution plans. Contributions are subject to certain limitations as outlined in the Internal Revenue Code (“IRC”).

The Company has elected to make safe harbor non-elective contributions to all participants in the amount equal to 100% of the first 3% of eligible compensation contributed to the Plan as deferral contributions. The Company made safe harbor matching contributions of \$432,117 to the Plan during the year ended December 31, 2024. The Company at its discretion may also make profit sharing contributions based on a percentage of participant salary up to \$345,000 in accordance with IRC 401(a)(17). During the year ended December 31, 2024 the Company made profit sharing contributions of \$965,476 to the Plan.

Participant Accounts – Individual accounts are maintained for each Plan participant. Each participant’s account is credited with the participant’s contributions and Company safe harbor non-elective contributions, as well as allocations of the Company’s discretionary profit sharing contribution and Plan earnings (losses). Participant accounts are charged with their withdrawals and an allocation of administrative expenses paid by the Plan. Allocations are based on participant earnings, account balances, or specific participant transactions, as defined. The benefit to which a participant is entitled is the benefit that can be provided from the participant’s vested account.

Investment Options – Upon enrollment in the Plan, participants may direct the investment of their accounts into various investment options offered by the Plan. They may change their investment options among those investments provided at any time during the Plan year.

Vesting – Participants are immediately 100% vested in all contributions plus actual earnings thereon.

Notes Receivable from Participants – Participants may borrow from their fund accounts a minimum of \$1,000 up to a maximum equal to the lesser of \$50,000 or 50% of their vested account balance. The loans are secured by the balance in the participant’s account. The loan interest rate is set at 1% above the prime rate, as defined. Principal and interest are paid via ACH directly from participant bank accounts.

Note 1—Description of the Plan (continued)

Payment of Benefits – On termination of service due to death, disability, or retirement, a participant may elect to receive either a lump sum amount equal to the value of the participant’s vested interest in his or her account, or annual installments in accordance with the Plan agreement. In-service and hardship withdrawals are also allowed as defined in the Plan agreement.

Forfeited Accounts – Forfeited accounts totaled \$12 and \$3,845 at December 31, 2024 and 2023, respectively. These accounts may be used pay administrative expenses or reduce Company matching and nonelective contributions of the Plan. In 2024, \$8,368 of forfeited accounts were utilized to pay administrative expenses.

Note 2—Summary of significant accounting policies

Basis of Presentation – The financial statements of the Plan are prepared on the accrual basis of accounting in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America (“U.S. GAAP”).

Use of Estimates – The preparation of financial statements in accordance with U.S. GAAP requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities, changes therein, and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Investment Valuation and Income Recognition – The Plan’s investments are reported at fair value. U.S. GAAP defined fair value as the exchange price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date.

Purchases and sales of securities are recorded on a trade-date basis. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Dividends are recorded on the ex-dividend date. Net appreciation in fair value of investments includes the Plan’s gains and losses on investments bought and sold as well as held during the year.

Notes Receivable from Participants – Notes receivable from participants are measured at their unpaid principal balance plus any accrued but unpaid interest. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Related fees are charged directly to the borrowing participant’s account and are included in administrative expenses when incurred. If a participant ceases to make loan repayments and the Plan administrator deems the loan to be in default, the participant loan balance is reduced and benefit payment is recorded.

Payment of Benefits – Benefits are recorded when paid. There were no benefit payments requested and not yet disbursed at December 31, 2024 or 2023.

Administrative Expenses – Certain expenses of maintaining the Plan are paid by the Plan, unless otherwise paid by the Company. Expenses that are paid by the Company are excluded from these financial statements. Fees related to the administration of notes receivable from participants are charged directly to the participant’s account and are included in administrative expenses.

Note 3—Information certified by the qualified institution (unaudited)

The Plan administrator has elected the method of annual reporting compliance permitted by ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) pursuant to 29 CFR 2520.103-8 of the Department of Labor’s (“DOL”) Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA. Accordingly, Fidelity Management Trust Company, a qualified institution, has certified to the completeness and accuracy of the following data included in the financial statements and supplemental schedules.

- Investments, at fair value and notes receivable from participants as shown in the statements of net assets available for benefits as of December 31, 2024 and 2023.
- Interest and dividends, net appreciation in fair value of investments, and interest on notes receivable from participants as shown in the statement of changes in net assets available for benefits for the year ended December 31, 2024.
- Schedule of Assets (Held at End of Year) – Form 5500, Schedule H, Part IV, Line 4i as of December 31, 2024.

At the request of the Plan administrator, the Plan’s independent auditors did not perform auditing procedures with respect to the certified investment information, except for comparing such information to the related information included in the financial statements and supplemental schedule.

Note 4—Fair value measurements

U.S. GAAP establishes a framework for measuring fair value. That framework provides a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. The hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (Level 1 measurements) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (Level 3 measurements). The three levels of the fair value hierarchy are described below:

Level 1 – Inputs to the valuation methodology are unadjusted quoted prices for identical assets or liabilities in active markets that the Plan has the ability to access.

Level 2 – Inputs to the valuation methodology include quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities in active markets; quoted prices for identical or similar assets or liabilities in inactive markets; inputs other than quoted prices that are observable for the asset or liability; inputs that are derived principally from or corroborated by observable market data by correlation or other means. If the asset or liability has a specified (contractual) term, the Level 2 input must be observable for substantially the full term of the asset or liability.

Level 3 – Inputs to the valuation methodology are unobservable and significant to the fair value measurement.

The asset or liability’s fair value measurement level within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of any input that is significant to the fair value measurement. Valuation techniques used need to maximize the use of observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs.

Note 4—Fair value measurements (continued)

The following are descriptions of the valuation methodologies used for investments measured at fair value, including the general classification of such assets pursuant to the valuation hierarchy. There have been no changes in the methodologies used at December 31, 2024 or 2023.

Mutual Funds – Valued at the daily closing price as reported by the fund. Mutual funds held by the Plan are open-end mutual funds that are registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission. These funds are required to publish their daily net asset value (“NAV”) and to transact at that price. The mutual funds held by the Plan are deemed to be actively traded and are therefore classified within Level 1 of the valuation hierarchy.

Collective Trust Fund – Valued at NAV of units held by the Plan at year-end provided by the issuer to the fund and, therefore, not reflected in the valuation hierarchy. NAV is used as a practical expedient to estimate fair value and is based on the fair value of the underlying investment held by the fund, minus its liabilities. This practical expedient is not used when it is determined to be probable that the fund will sell the investment for an amount different than the reported NAV. Participant transactions (purchases and sales) may occur daily. Were the Plan to initiate a full redemption of the collective trust, the investment adviser reserves the right to temporarily delay withdrawal from the trust in order to ensure securities liquidations will be carried out in an orderly business manner.

The preceding methods described may produce a fair value calculation that may not be indicative of net realizable value or reflective of future fair values. Furthermore, although the Plan believes its valuation methods are appropriate and consistent with other market participants, the use of different methodologies or assumptions to determine the fair value of certain financial instruments could result in a different fair value measurement at the reporting date.

Note 5—Related party transactions and party-in-interest transactions

Certain administrative services are provided by the Company at no cost to the Plan and certain administrative costs incurred by the Plan are paid by the Company. The Plan has entered into various service agreements with parties-in-interest. Notes receivable from participants and related activity also qualify as party-in-interest transactions.

Fidelity provides recordkeeping and transaction processing services to the Plan and is the Plan’s trustee. Hargrave Fiduciary Advisors provides investment advisory services to the Plan. These transactions qualify as party-in-interest transactions. Fees paid by the Plan for recordkeeping, transaction processing, and investment advisory services amounted to \$22,258 for the year ended December 31, 2024.

These party-in-interest transactions are exempt from the prohibited transaction rules of ERISA.

Note 6—Plan termination

Although it has not expressed any intent to do so, the Company has the right under the Plan to discontinue its contributions at any time and to terminate the Plan subject to the provisions of ERISA.

Note 7—Tax status of Plan

The Internal Revenue Service (“IRS”) ruled on June 30, 2020, that the pre-approved prototype plan, sponsored by FMR, LLC, upon which the Plan is based, is designed in accordance with applicable sections of the IRC. The Plan has been amended since receipt of the opinion letter. However, the Plan administrator believes the Plan is designed, and is currently being operated, in compliance with the applicable requirements of the IRC and, therefore, believes that the Plan is qualified and the related trust is tax-exempt.

U.S. GAAP requires Plan management to evaluate tax positions taken by the Plan and recognize a tax liability (or asset) if the Plan has taken an uncertain position that more likely than not would not be sustained upon examination by the IRS. The Plan administrator has analyzed the tax positions taken by the Plan, and has concluded that as of December 31, 2024 and 2023, there are no uncertain tax positions taken or expected to be taken that would require recognition of a liability (or asset) or disclosure in the financial statements. The Plan is subject to routine audits by taxing jurisdictions; however, there are currently no audits for any tax periods in progress.

Note 8—Risks and uncertainties

The Plan invests in various investment securities. Investment securities, in general, are exposed to various risks such as interest rate, market, and credit risks. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investment securities, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in the values of investment securities will occur in the near term and that such changes could materially affect participants' account balances and the amounts reported in the statements.

Note 9—Subsequent events

The Plan has evaluated all subsequent events through September 15, 2025, which is the date these financial statements were available to be issued and has determined there are no subsequent events that required disclosure.

Note 10—Prohibited transactions

During 2024, 2023, and 2022 the Company failed to timely remit to the Plan's trustee certain participant contributions totaling \$58,132, \$277,892, and \$123,088, respectively, within the period prescribed by DOL's regulations. Delays in remitting contributions to the trustee were due to administrative errors and constitute prohibited transactions. In 2025, the Company remitted lost earnings related to the 2024 Plan year late remittances. In 2024, the Company remitted lost earnings related to the 2023 and 2022 Plan year late remittances.

The financial statements comprises the statements of net assets available for benefits as of December 31, 2024 and 2023 and the related statement of changes in net assets available for benefits for the year ended December 31, 2024, and the related notes to the financial statements.

Note 1—Description of the Plan

The following description of the Pantheon Ventures (US) LP (the “Company” and “Plan administrator”) 401(k) Plan and Trust (the “Plan”) provides only general information. Participants should refer to the Plan agreement for a more complete description of the Plan’s provisions.

General – The Plan is a defined contribution plan covering all employees of the Company who have attained the age of 21 and have completed three months of service. Initial enrollment is available at the beginning of the month after reaching eligibility. To become eligible for the discretionary Company profit sharing contribution, an employee must complete six months of service. The Plan is subject to the provisions of the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (“ERISA”). The Board of Directors is responsible for oversight of the Plan. The Retirement Plan Administrative Committee determines the appropriateness of the Plan’s investment offerings, monitors investment performance, and reports to the Company’s Board of Directors.

Administration – The Company has designated certain employees, who serve without additional compensation, to administer the Plan. The Plan administrator has the overall responsibility and authority as the named fiduciary to manage and control the operations and administration of the Plan and may designate one or more individuals to perform those responsibilities. Fidelity Management Trust Company (“Fidelity”) is the Plan’s trustee.

Contributions – Each year, participants may contribute up to 90% of pretax annual compensation, as defined in the Plan agreement. Participants have the option of contributing a percentage of their taxable compensation as a Roth contribution. Participants who have attained age 50 before the end of the Plan year are eligible to make catch-up contributions. Participants may also contribute amounts representing distributions from other qualified defined benefit or defined contribution plans. Contributions are subject to certain limitations as outlined in the Internal Revenue Code (“IRC”).

The Company has elected to make safe harbor non-elective contributions to all participants in the amount equal to 100% of the first 3% of eligible compensation contributed to the Plan as deferral contributions. The Company made safe harbor matching contributions of \$432,117 to the Plan during the year ended December 31, 2024. The Company at its discretion may also make profit sharing contributions based on a percentage of participant salary up to \$345,000 in accordance with IRC 401(a)(17). During the year ended December 31, 2024 the Company made profit sharing contributions of \$965,476 to the Plan.

Participant Accounts – Individual accounts are maintained for each Plan participant. Each participant’s account is credited with the participant’s contributions and Company safe harbor non-elective contributions, as well as allocations of the Company’s discretionary profit sharing contribution and Plan earnings (losses). Participant accounts are charged with their withdrawals and an allocation of administrative expenses paid by the Plan. Allocations are based on participant earnings, account balances, or specific participant transactions, as defined. The benefit to which a participant is entitled is the benefit that can be provided from the participant’s vested account.

Investment Options – Upon enrollment in the Plan, participants may direct the investment of their accounts into various investment options offered by the Plan. They may change their investment options among those investments provided at any time during the Plan year.

Vesting – Participants are immediately 100% vested in all contributions plus actual earnings thereon.

Notes Receivable from Participants – Participants may borrow from their fund accounts a minimum of \$1,000 up to a maximum equal to the lesser of \$50,000 or 50% of their vested account balance. The loans are secured by the balance in the participant’s account. The loan interest rate is set at 1% above the prime rate, as defined. Principal and interest are paid via ACH directly from participant bank accounts.

Note 1—Description of the Plan (continued)

Payment of Benefits – On termination of service due to death, disability, or retirement, a participant may elect to receive either a lump sum amount equal to the value of the participant’s vested interest in his or her account, or annual installments in accordance with the Plan agreement. In-service and hardship withdrawals are also allowed as defined in the Plan agreement.

Forfeited Accounts – Forfeited accounts totaled \$12 and \$3,845 at December 31, 2024 and 2023, respectively. These accounts may be used pay administrative expenses or reduce Company matching and nonelective contributions of the Plan. In 2024, \$8,368 of forfeited accounts were utilized to pay administrative expenses.

Note 2—Summary of significant accounting policies

Basis of Presentation – The financial statements of the Plan are prepared on the accrual basis of accounting in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America (“U.S. GAAP”).

Use of Estimates – The preparation of financial statements in accordance with U.S. GAAP requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities, changes therein, and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Investment Valuation and Income Recognition – The Plan’s investments are reported at fair value. U.S. GAAP defined fair value as the exchange price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date.

Purchases and sales of securities are recorded on a trade-date basis. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Dividends are recorded on the ex-dividend date. Net appreciation in fair value of investments includes the Plan’s gains and losses on investments bought and sold as well as held during the year.

Notes Receivable from Participants – Notes receivable from participants are measured at their unpaid principal balance plus any accrued but unpaid interest. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Related fees are charged directly to the borrowing participant’s account and are included in administrative expenses when incurred. If a participant ceases to make loan repayments and the Plan administrator deems the loan to be in default, the participant loan balance is reduced and benefit payment is recorded.

Payment of Benefits – Benefits are recorded when paid. There were no benefit payments requested and not yet disbursed at December 31, 2024 or 2023.

Administrative Expenses – Certain expenses of maintaining the Plan are paid by the Plan, unless otherwise paid by the Company. Expenses that are paid by the Company are excluded from these financial statements. Fees related to the administration of notes receivable from participants are charged directly to the participant’s account and are included in administrative expenses.

Note 3—Information certified by the qualified institution (unaudited)

The Plan administrator has elected the method of annual reporting compliance permitted by ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) pursuant to 29 CFR 2520.103-8 of the Department of Labor's ("DOL") Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA. Accordingly, Fidelity Management Trust Company, a qualified institution, has certified to the completeness and accuracy of the following data included in the financial statements and supplemental schedules.

- Investments, at fair value and notes receivable from participants as shown in the statements of net assets available for benefits as of December 31, 2024 and 2023.
- Interest and dividends, net appreciation in fair value of investments, and interest on notes receivable from participants as shown in the statement of changes in net assets available for benefits for the year ended December 31, 2024.
- Schedule of Assets (Held at End of Year) – Form 5500, Schedule H, Part IV, Line 4i as of December 31, 2024.

At the request of the Plan administrator, the Plan's independent auditors did not perform auditing procedures with respect to the certified investment information, except for comparing such information to the related information included in the financial statements and supplemental schedule.

Note 4—Fair value measurements

U.S. GAAP establishes a framework for measuring fair value. That framework provides a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. The hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (Level 1 measurements) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (Level 3 measurements). The three levels of the fair value hierarchy are described below:

Level 1 – Inputs to the valuation methodology are unadjusted quoted prices for identical assets or liabilities in active markets that the Plan has the ability to access.

Level 2 – Inputs to the valuation methodology include quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities in active markets; quoted prices for identical or similar assets or liabilities in inactive markets; inputs other than quoted prices that are observable for the asset or liability; inputs that are derived principally from or corroborated by observable market data by correlation or other means. If the asset or liability has a specified (contractual) term, the Level 2 input must be observable for substantially the full term of the asset or liability.

Level 3 – Inputs to the valuation methodology are unobservable and significant to the fair value measurement.

The asset or liability's fair value measurement level within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of any input that is significant to the fair value measurement. Valuation techniques used need to maximize the use of observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs.

The following are descriptions of the valuation methodologies used for investments measured at fair value, including the general classification of such assets pursuant to the valuation hierarchy. There have been no changes in the methodologies used at December 31, 2024 or 2023.

Mutual Funds – Valued at the daily closing price as reported by the fund. Mutual funds held by the Plan are open-end mutual funds that are registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission. These funds are required to publish their daily net asset value (“NAV”) and to transact at that price. The mutual funds held by the Plan are deemed to be actively traded and are therefore classified within Level 1 of the valuation hierarchy.

Collective Trust Fund – Valued at NAV of units held by the Plan at year-end provided by the issuer to the fund and, therefore, not reflected in the valuation hierarchy. NAV is used as a practical expedient to estimate fair value and is based on the fair value of the underlying investment held by the fund, minus its liabilities. This practical expedient is not used when it is determined to be probable that the fund will sell the investment for an amount different than the reported NAV. Participant transactions (purchases and sales) may occur daily. Were the Plan to initiate a full redemption of the collective trust, the investment adviser reserves the right to temporarily delay withdrawal from the trust in order to ensure securities liquidations will be carried out in an orderly business manner.

The preceding methods described may produce a fair value calculation that may not be indicative of net realizable value or reflective of future fair values. Furthermore, although the Plan believes its valuation methods are appropriate and consistent with other market participants, the use of different methodologies or assumptions to determine the fair value of certain financial instruments could result in a different fair value measurement at the reporting date.

Note 5—Related party transactions and party-in-interest transactions

Certain administrative services are provided by the Company at no cost to the Plan and certain administrative costs incurred by the Plan are paid by the Company. The Plan has entered into various service agreements with parties-in-interest. Notes receivable from participants and related activity also qualify as party-in-interest transactions.

Fidelity provides recordkeeping and transaction processing services to the Plan and is the Plan’s trustee. Hargrave Fiduciary Advisors provides investment advisory services to the Plan. These transactions qualify as party-in-interest transactions. Fees paid by the Plan for recordkeeping, transaction processing, and investment advisory services amounted to \$22,258 for the year ended December 31, 2024.

These party-in-interest transactions are exempt from the prohibited transaction rules of ERISA.

Note 6—Plan termination

Although it has not expressed any intent to do so, the Company has the right under the Plan to discontinue its contributions at any time and to terminate the Plan subject to the provisions of ERISA.

Note 7—Tax status of Plan

The Internal Revenue Service (“IRS”) ruled on June 30, 2020, that the pre-approved prototype plan, sponsored by FMR, LLC, upon which the Plan is based, is designed in accordance with applicable sections of the IRC. The Plan has been amended since receipt of the opinion letter. However, the Plan administrator believes the Plan is designed, and is currently being operated, in compliance with the applicable requirements of the IRC and, therefore, believes that the Plan is qualified and the related trust is tax-exempt.

U.S. GAAP requires Plan management to evaluate tax positions taken by the Plan and recognize a tax liability (or asset) if the Plan has taken an uncertain position that more likely than not would not be sustained upon examination by the IRS. The Plan administrator has analyzed the tax positions taken by the Plan, and has concluded that as of December 31, 2024 and 2023, there are no uncertain tax positions taken or expected to be taken that would require recognition of a liability (or asset) or disclosure in the financial statements. The Plan is subject to routine audits by taxing jurisdictions; however, there are currently no audits for any tax periods in progress.

Note 8—Risks and uncertainties

The Plan invests in various investment securities. Investment securities, in general, are exposed to various risks such as interest rate, market, and credit risks. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investment securities, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in the values of investment securities will occur in the near term and that such changes could materially affect participants' account balances and the amounts reported in the statements.

Note 9—Subsequent events

The Plan has evaluated all subsequent events through September 15, 2025, which is the date these financial statements were available to be issued and has determined there are no subsequent events that required disclosure.

Note 10—Prohibited transactions

During 2024, 2023, and 2022 the Company failed to timely remit to the Plan's trustee certain participant contributions totaling \$58,132, \$277,892, and \$123,088, respectively, within the period prescribed by DOL's regulations. Delays in remitting contributions to the trustee were due to administrative errors and constitute prohibited transactions. In 2025, the Company remitted lost earnings related to the 2024 Plan year late remittances. In 2024, the Company remitted lost earnings related to the 2023 and 2022 Plan year late remittances.

Note 1—Description of the Plan

The following description of the Pantheon Ventures (US) LP (the “Company” and “Plan administrator”) 401(k) Plan and Trust (the “Plan”) provides only general information. Participants should refer to the Plan agreement for a more complete description of the Plan’s provisions.

General – The Plan is a defined contribution plan covering all employees of the Company who have attained the age of 21 and have completed three months of service. Initial enrollment is available at the beginning of the month after reaching eligibility. To become eligible for the discretionary Company profit sharing contribution, an employee must complete six months of service. The Plan is subject to the provisions of the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (“ERISA”). The Board of Directors is responsible for oversight of the Plan. The Retirement Plan Administrative Committee determines the appropriateness of the Plan’s investment offerings, monitors investment performance, and reports to the Company’s Board of Directors.

Administration – The Company has designated certain employees, who serve without additional compensation, to administer the Plan. The Plan administrator has the overall responsibility and authority as the named fiduciary to manage and control the operations and administration of the Plan and may designate one or more individuals to perform those responsibilities. Fidelity Management Trust Company (“Fidelity”) is the Plan’s trustee.

Contributions – Each year, participants may contribute up to 90% of pretax annual compensation, as defined in the Plan agreement. Participants have the option of contributing a percentage of their taxable compensation as a Roth contribution. Participants who have attained age 50 before the end of the Plan year are eligible to make catch-up contributions. Participants may also contribute amounts representing distributions from other qualified defined benefit or defined contribution plans. Contributions are subject to certain limitations as outlined in the Internal Revenue Code (“IRC”).

The Company has elected to make safe harbor non-elective contributions to all participants in the amount equal to 100% of the first 3% of eligible compensation contributed to the Plan as deferral contributions. The Company made safe harbor matching contributions of \$432,117 to the Plan during the year ended December 31, 2024. The Company at its discretion may also make profit sharing contributions based on a percentage of participant salary up to \$345,000 in accordance with IRC 401(a)(17). During the year ended December 31, 2024 the Company made profit sharing contributions of \$965,476 to the Plan.

Participant Accounts – Individual accounts are maintained for each Plan participant. Each participant’s account is credited with the participant’s contributions and Company safe harbor non-elective contributions, as well as allocations of the Company’s discretionary profit sharing contribution and Plan earnings (losses). Participant accounts are charged with their withdrawals and an allocation of administrative expenses paid by the Plan. Allocations are based on participant earnings, account balances, or specific participant transactions, as defined. The benefit to which a participant is entitled is the benefit that can be provided from the participant’s vested account.

Investment Options – Upon enrollment in the Plan, participants may direct the investment of their accounts into various investment options offered by the Plan. They may change their investment options among those investments provided at any time during the Plan year.

Vesting – Participants are immediately 100% vested in all contributions plus actual earnings thereon.

Notes Receivable from Participants – Participants may borrow from their fund accounts a minimum of \$1,000 up to a maximum equal to the lesser of \$50,000 or 50% of their vested account balance. The loans are secured by the balance in the participant’s account. The loan interest rate is set at 1% above the prime rate, as defined. Principal and interest are paid via ACH directly from participant bank accounts.

Note 1—Description of the Plan (continued)

Payment of Benefits – On termination of service due to death, disability, or retirement, a participant may elect to receive either a lump sum amount equal to the value of the participant’s vested interest in his or her account, or annual installments in accordance with the Plan agreement. In-service and hardship withdrawals are also allowed as defined in the Plan agreement.

Forfeited Accounts – Forfeited accounts totaled \$12 and \$3,845 at December 31, 2024 and 2023, respectively. These accounts may be used pay administrative expenses or reduce Company matching and nonelective contributions of the Plan. In 2024, \$8,368 of forfeited accounts were utilized to pay administrative expenses.

Note 2—Summary of significant accounting policies

Basis of Presentation – The financial statements of the Plan are prepared on the accrual basis of accounting in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America (“U.S. GAAP”).

Use of Estimates – The preparation of financial statements in accordance with U.S. GAAP requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities, changes therein, and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Investment Valuation and Income Recognition – The Plan’s investments are reported at fair value. U.S. GAAP defined fair value as the exchange price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date.

Purchases and sales of securities are recorded on a trade-date basis. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Dividends are recorded on the ex-dividend date. Net appreciation in fair value of investments includes the Plan’s gains and losses on investments bought and sold as well as held during the year.

Notes Receivable from Participants – Notes receivable from participants are measured at their unpaid principal balance plus any accrued but unpaid interest. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Related fees are charged directly to the borrowing participant’s account and are included in administrative expenses when incurred. If a participant ceases to make loan repayments and the Plan administrator deems the loan to be in default, the participant loan balance is reduced and benefit payment is recorded.

Payment of Benefits – Benefits are recorded when paid. There were no benefit payments requested and not yet disbursed at December 31, 2024 or 2023.

Administrative Expenses – Certain expenses of maintaining the Plan are paid by the Plan, unless otherwise paid by the Company. Expenses that are paid by the Company are excluded from these financial statements. Fees related to the administration of notes receivable from participants are charged directly to the participant’s account and are included in administrative expenses.

Note 3—Information certified by the qualified institution (unaudited)

The Plan administrator has elected the method of annual reporting compliance permitted by ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) pursuant to 29 CFR 2520.103-8 of the Department of Labor's ("DOL") Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA. Accordingly, Fidelity Management Trust Company, a qualified institution, has certified to the completeness and accuracy of the following data included in the financial statements and supplemental schedules.

- Investments, at fair value and notes receivable from participants as shown in the statements of net assets available for benefits as of December 31, 2024 and 2023.
- Interest and dividends, net appreciation in fair value of investments, and interest on notes receivable from participants as shown in the statement of changes in net assets available for benefits for the year ended December 31, 2024.
- Schedule of Assets (Held at End of Year) – Form 5500, Schedule H, Part IV, Line 4i as of December 31, 2024.

At the request of the Plan administrator, the Plan's independent auditors did not perform auditing procedures with respect to the certified investment information, except for comparing such information to the related information included in the financial statements and supplemental schedule.

Note 4—Fair value measurements

U.S. GAAP establishes a framework for measuring fair value. That framework provides a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. The hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (Level 1 measurements) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (Level 3 measurements). The three levels of the fair value hierarchy are described below:

Level 1 – Inputs to the valuation methodology are unadjusted quoted prices for identical assets or liabilities in active markets that the Plan has the ability to access.

Level 2 – Inputs to the valuation methodology include quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities in active markets; quoted prices for identical or similar assets or liabilities in inactive markets; inputs other than quoted prices that are observable for the asset or liability; inputs that are derived principally from or corroborated by observable market data by correlation or other means. If the asset or liability has a specified (contractual) term, the Level 2 input must be observable for substantially the full term of the asset or liability.

Level 3 – Inputs to the valuation methodology are unobservable and significant to the fair value measurement.

The asset or liability's fair value measurement level within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of any input that is significant to the fair value measurement. Valuation techniques used need to maximize the use of observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs.

The following are descriptions of the valuation methodologies used for investments measured at fair value, including the general classification of such assets pursuant to the valuation hierarchy. There have been no changes in the methodologies used at December 31, 2024 or 2023.

Mutual Funds – Valued at the daily closing price as reported by the fund. Mutual funds held by the Plan are open-end mutual funds that are registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission. These funds are required to publish their daily net asset value (“NAV”) and to transact at that price. The mutual funds held by the Plan are deemed to be actively traded and are therefore classified within Level 1 of the valuation hierarchy.

Collective Trust Fund – Valued at NAV of units held by the Plan at year-end provided by the issuer to the fund and, therefore, not reflected in the valuation hierarchy. NAV is used as a practical expedient to estimate fair value and is based on the fair value of the underlying investment held by the fund, minus its liabilities. This practical expedient is not used when it is determined to be probable that the fund will sell the investment for an amount different than the reported NAV. Participant transactions (purchases and sales) may occur daily. Were the Plan to initiate a full redemption of the collective trust, the investment adviser reserves the right to temporarily delay withdrawal from the trust in order to ensure securities liquidations will be carried out in an orderly business manner.

The preceding methods described may produce a fair value calculation that may not be indicative of net realizable value or reflective of future fair values. Furthermore, although the Plan believes its valuation methods are appropriate and consistent with other market participants, the use of different methodologies or assumptions to determine the fair value of certain financial instruments could result in a different fair value measurement at the reporting date.

Note 5—Related party transactions and party-in-interest transactions

Certain administrative services are provided by the Company at no cost to the Plan and certain administrative costs incurred by the Plan are paid by the Company. The Plan has entered into various service agreements with parties-in-interest. Notes receivable from participants and related activity also qualify as party-in-interest transactions.

Fidelity provides recordkeeping and transaction processing services to the Plan and is the Plan’s trustee. Hargrave Fiduciary Advisors provides investment advisory services to the Plan. These transactions qualify as party-in-interest transactions. Fees paid by the Plan for recordkeeping, transaction processing, and investment advisory services amounted to \$22,258 for the year ended December 31, 2024.

These party-in-interest transactions are exempt from the prohibited transaction rules of ERISA.

Note 6—Plan termination

Although it has not expressed any intent to do so, the Company has the right under the Plan to discontinue its contributions at any time and to terminate the Plan subject to the provisions of ERISA.

Note 7—Tax status of Plan

The Internal Revenue Service (“IRS”) ruled on June 30, 2020, that the pre-approved prototype plan, sponsored by FMR, LLC, upon which the Plan is based, is designed in accordance with applicable sections of the IRC. The Plan has been amended since receipt of the opinion letter. However, the Plan administrator believes the Plan is designed, and is currently being operated, in compliance with the applicable requirements of the IRC and, therefore, believes that the Plan is qualified and the related trust is tax-exempt.

U.S. GAAP requires Plan management to evaluate tax positions taken by the Plan and recognize a tax liability (or asset) if the Plan has taken an uncertain position that more likely than not would not be sustained upon examination by the IRS. The Plan administrator has analyzed the tax positions taken by the Plan, and has concluded that as of December 31, 2024 and 2023, there are no uncertain tax positions taken or expected to be taken that would require recognition of a liability (or asset) or disclosure in the financial statements. The Plan is subject to routine audits by taxing jurisdictions; however, there are currently no audits for any tax periods in progress.

Note 8—Risks and uncertainties

The Plan invests in various investment securities. Investment securities, in general, are exposed to various risks such as interest rate, market, and credit risks. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investment securities, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in the values of investment securities will occur in the near term and that such changes could materially affect participants' account balances and the amounts reported in the statements.

Note 9—Subsequent events

The Plan has evaluated all subsequent events through September 15, 2025, which is the date these financial statements were available to be issued and has determined there are no subsequent events that required disclosure.

Note 10—Prohibited transactions

During 2024, 2023, and 2022 the Company failed to timely remit to the Plan's trustee certain participant contributions totaling \$58,132, \$277,892, and \$123,088, respectively, within the period prescribed by DOL's regulations. Delays in remitting contributions to the trustee were due to administrative errors and constitute prohibited transactions. In 2025, the Company remitted lost earnings related to the 2024 Plan year late remittances. In 2024, the Company remitted lost earnings related to the 2023 and 2022 Plan year late remittances.
