- Evaluate the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluate the overall presentation of the financial statements.
- Conclude whether, in our judgment, there are conditions or events, considered in the aggregate, that raise substantial doubt about the Plan's ability to continue as a going concern for a reasonable period of time.

Our audits did not extend to the certified investment information, except for obtaining and reading the certification, comparing the certified investment information with the related information presented and disclosed in the financial statements, and reading the disclosures relating to the certified investment information to assess whether they are in accordance with the presentation and disclosure requirements of U.S. GAAP.

Accordingly, the objective of an ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) audit is not to express an opinion about whether the financial statements as a whole are presented fairly, in all material respects, in accordance with U.S. GAAP.

We are required to communicate with those charged with governance regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit, significant audit findings, and certain internal control-related matters that we identified during the audit.

Other Matters - Supplemental Schedule Required by ERISA

The supplemental schedule of Schedule of Assets (Held at End of Year) as of December 31, 2024 is presented for purposes of additional analysis and is not a required part of the financial statements but is supplementary information required by the DOL's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA. Such information is the responsibility of management and was derived from and relates directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements. The information included in the supplemental schedule, other than that agreed to or derived from the certified investment information, has been subjected to auditing procedures applied in the audit of the financial statements and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements or to the financial statements themselves, and other additional procedures in accordance with GAAS. For information included in the supplemental schedule that agreed to or is derived from the certified investment information, we compared such information to the related certified investment information.

1. DESCRIPTION OF PLAN

The following description of Confie Holding II Co. 401(k) Plan (the Plan) provides only general information. Participants should refer to the Plan agreement for a more complete description of the Plan's provisions.

General

The Plan is a defined contribution plan established April 1, 1997 under the provisions of Section 401(a) of the Internal Revenue Code (IRC), which includes a qualified cash or deferred arrangement as described in Section 401(k) of the IRC, for the benefit of eligible employees of Confie Holding II Co. and its U.S. subsidiaries, which are named as participating employers (collectively, the Company). Employees of the Company who have completed six months of service and have attained age 18 are eligible to participate in the Plan. The Plan is subject to the provisions of the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (ERISA), as amended.

On April 1, 2024, investment of \$9,819,129 and participant loan of \$533,167 (total transfer of \$10,352,296) were transferred from First Acceptance Corporation 401(k) Plan as part of a merger into the Plan. The participants from First Acceptance Corporation 401(k) Plan are with the same provisions as existing participants.

Contributions

Participants may elect to reduce their compensation, as defined by the Plan, by a certain amount and have that amount contributed to the Plan as a pre-tax salary deferral or as an after-tax (Roth) salary deferral. Participants who have attained age 50 before the Plan year-end are also eligible to make additional catch-up contributions. Participants may also contribute amounts representing transfers from another qualified plan or an individual retirement account. All eligible employees are automatically enrolled in the Plan unless they affirmatively elect not to participate in the Plan. Automatically enrolled participants have their deferral rate set at 3%. The Company, as determined by the Board of Directors, may make a discretionary matching contribution equal to a percentage of the amount of salary deferrals and/or a discretionary profit sharing contribution for those participants who are employed on the last day of the Plan year. In 2024, the employer match was determined to be 16% of the first 6% deferred by participants.

Participant Accounts

Each participant's account is credited with the participant's contribution and allocations of (a) the Company's contribution, (b) Plan earnings and (c) forfeitures of terminated participants' non-vested accounts and charged with an allocation of administrative expenses. Allocations are based on the participant's compensation, account balances, or specific participant transactions, as defined. The benefit to which a participant is entitled is the benefit that can be provided from the participant's vested account.

1. DESCRIPTION OF PLAN (Continued)

Vesting

Participants are vested immediately in their contributions, and also in any employer qualified non-elective contribution (QNEC), plus actual earnings thereon. Employer matching and profit sharing contributions are subject to the following vesting schedule:

Notes Receivable from Participants

Participants may borrow from their accounts a minimum of \$1,000 up to a maximum equal to the lesser of \$50,000 or 50% of their vested account balance. Loans must be repaid within five years or for a longer repayment term for the purchase of a primary residence. The loans are secured by the balance in the participant's account and bear interest at a rate commensurate with local prevailing rates as determined by the Plan administrator. At December 31, 2024 and 2023, loan interest rates are between 4.25% to 9.50%.

Payment of Benefits

On termination of service, a participant elects to receive a lump-sum equal to the vested value of his or her account. Under certain conditions, in-service financial hardship distributions are permitted.

Forfeited (Unallocated) Accounts

At December 31, 2024 and 2023, forfeited accounts totaled \$35,877 and \$36,458, respectively. These accounts are used to reduce the payment of Plan expenses or offset employer contributions. During 2024, Plan expenses of \$48,750 were paid from forfeited accounts.

Plan Termination

Although it has not expressed any intent to do so, the Company has the right under the Plan to discontinue its contributions at any time and to terminate the Plan subject to the provisions of ERISA. In the event of Plan termination, participants will become 100% vested in their accounts, if not already.

2. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING PRINCIPLES

Basis of Accounting

The accompanying financial statements have been prepared using the accrual method of accounting.

Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect certain reported assets and liabilities and changes therein, and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities. Accordingly, actual results may differ from those estimates.

Investment Valuation and Income Recognition

The Plan's investments are reported at fair value. Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. See Note 3 for disclosures regarding fair value measurements.

Purchases and sales of investments are recorded on a trade-date basis. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Dividend income is recorded on the ex-dividend date. Net appreciation includes the Plan's gains and losses on investments bought and sold as well as held during the year. Management fees and operating expenses charged to the Plan for investments are deducted from income earned on a daily basis and are not separately reflected. Consequently, such management fees and operating expenses are reflected as a reduction of investment return for such investments.

Notes Receivable from Participants

Notes receivable from participants are stated at the unpaid principal balance. Interest income associated with the notes receivable are recorded when interest payments are received, usually each payroll period. Related fees are recorded as administrative expenses and are expensed when they are incurred. No allowance for credit losses has been recorded as of December 31, 2024 and 2023. If a participant ceases to make loan repayments and the Plan administrator deems the participant loan to be in default, the participant loan balance is reduced and a benefit payment is recorded.

Payment of Benefits

Benefits are recorded when paid or upon distribution.

Expenses

Expenses related to the administration of the Plan are paid by the Plan, unless paid by the Company at its option, and include primarily recordkeeping fees paid to Fidelity Management Trust Company (Fidelity). Fees related to the administration of participant loans are charged directly to the participant's account and are included in administrative expenses. Investment related expenses are included in net appreciation of fair value of investments.

3. FAIR VALUE MEASUREMENTS

Accounting Standards Codification (ASC) 820, Fair Value Measurements and Disclosures, establishes a framework for measuring fair value. The framework for measuring fair value provides a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. The hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets (Level 1 measurements) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (Level 3 measurements). Valuation techniques maximize the use of relevant observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs. The three levels of the fair value hierarchy under ASC 820 with the related inputs to the valuation methodology are described as follows:

Level 1 - Quoted prices (unadjusted) in active markets for identical assets that the Plan has the ability to access.

Level 2 - Significant other observable (directly or indirectly) inputs, including quoted prices for similar assets in active markets or in inactive markets and other market observable inputs such as interest rate, credit risks, etc.

Level 3 - Significant unobservable inputs, including the Plan's own assumptions in determining the fair value of investments.

Following is a description of the valuation methodologies used for the Plan's investment assets measured at fair value. There have been no changes in the methodologies used at December 31, 2024 and 2023.

Mutual Funds

Valued at the daily closing price as reported by the fund. Mutual funds held by the Plan are open-end mutual funds that are registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission. These funds are required to publish their daily net asset value and to transact at that price. The mutual funds held by the Plan are deemed to be actively traded.

Stable Value Common/Collective Trust Fund

The Plan's stable value fund is a common/collective trust which invests solely in the Great Gray Trust Stable Value Fund, which invests in fully benefit-responsive investment contracts and money market trusts that is valued at the net asset value of the units of the common/collective trust. The net asset value is used as a practical expedient to estimate fair value. This practical expedient is not used when it is determined to be probable that the fund will sell the investment for an amount different than the reported net asset value. Participant transactions (purchases and sales) may occur daily. The stable value common/collective trust fund has no unfunded commitments and has daily redemption frequency. However, the Plan is required to provide a five business days redemption notice to liquidate assets exceed \$1,000,000 invested in the fund.

5. RELATED PARTY AND PARTY-IN INTEREST TRANSACTIONS

Certain Plan investments are shares of mutual funds managed by Fidelity Management and Research Company, who is an affiliate of the trustee. Investment management fees are paid to this affiliate and are included in net appreciation in fair value of investments. In addition, certain administrative services are provided by the trustee and totaled \$255,989 for the year ended December 31, 2024. These transactions, including the notes receivable from participants, qualify as allowable party-in-interest transactions for which there are statutory exceptions.

The Plan's investment advisor is a subsidiary of Confie's parent company, however, their fees are paid directly by the Company.

6. RISKS AND UNCERTAINTIES

The Plan invests in various investment securities. Investment securities are exposed to various risks such as interest rate, market and credit risks. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investment securities, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in the values of investment securities will occur in the near term and that such changes could materially affect participants' account balances and the amounts reported in the statements of net assets available for benefits.

7. TAX STATUS

The Internal Revenue Service has determined and informed the Company by a letter dated June 30, 2020 that the Plan is designed in accordance with applicable requirements of the Internal Revenue Code (IRC). The Plan administrator believes that the Plan is designed and currently being operated in compliance with the Plan terms and the applicable requirements of the IRC. Therefore, no provision for income taxes has been included in the Plan's financial statements.

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require Plan management to evaluate tax positions taken by the Plan and recognize a tax liability if the Plan has taken an uncertain position that more likely than not would not be sustained upon examination by the taxing authorities. The Plan administrator has analyzed the tax positions taken by the Plan, and has concluded that there are no uncertain positions taken or expected to be taken that would require recognition of a liability or disclosure in the financial statements. The Plan is subject to routine audits by taxing jurisdictions; however, there are currently no audits for any tax periods in progress.

8. SUBSEQUENT EVENTS

Effective as of January 1, 2025, eligibility service requirement for deferral contribution, nonelective employer contributions, and matching employer contributions is changed to 3 months.

In preparing these financial statements, the Plan administrator has evaluated subsequent events and transactions for potential recognition or disclosure through October 10, 2025, the date the financial statements were available to be issued.

Scope and Nature of the ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) Audit

We have performed audits of the financial statements of Confie Holding II Co. 401(k) Plan (the Plan), an employee benefit plan subject to the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (ERISA), as permitted by ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) (ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) audit). - The information in the accompanying financial statements related to assets held by and certified to by a qualified institution agrees to, or is derived from, in all material respects, the information prepared and certified by an institution that management determined meets the requirements of ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C).

Accordingly, the objective of an ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) audit is not to express an opinion about whether the financial statements as a whole are presented fairly, in all material respects, in accordance with U.S. GAAP.

We are required to communicate with those charged with governance regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit, significant audit findings, and certain internal control-related matters that we identified during the audit.

1. DESCRIPTION OF PLAN

The following description of Confie Holding II Co. 401(k) Plan (the Plan) provides only general information. Participants should refer to the Plan agreement for a more complete description of the Plan's provisions.

General

The Plan is a defined contribution plan established April 1, 1997 under the provisions of Section 401(a) of the Internal Revenue Code (IRC), which includes a qualified cash or deferred arrangement as described in Section 401(k) of the IRC, for the benefit of eligible employees of Confie Holding II Co. and its U.S. subsidiaries, which are named as participating employers (collectively, the Company). Employees of the Company who have completed six months of service and have attained age 18 are eligible to participate in the Plan. The Plan is subject to the provisions of the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (ERISA), as amended.

On April 1, 2024, investment of \$9,819,129 and participant loan of \$533,167 (total transfer of \$10,352,296) were transferred from First Acceptance Corporation 401(k) Plan as part of a merger into the Plan. The participants from First Acceptance Corporation 401(k) Plan are with the same provisions as existing participants.

Contributions

Participants may elect to reduce their compensation, as defined by the Plan, by a certain amount and have that amount contributed to the Plan as a pre-tax salary deferral or as an after-tax (Roth) salary deferral. Participants who have attained age 50 before the Plan year-end are also eligible to make additional catch-up contributions. Participants may also contribute amounts representing transfers from another qualified plan or an individual retirement account. All eligible employees are automatically enrolled in the Plan unless they affirmatively elect not to participate in the Plan. Automatically enrolled participants have their deferral rate set at 3%. The Company, as determined by the Board of Directors, may make a discretionary matching contribution equal to a percentage of the amount of salary deferrals and/or a discretionary profit sharing contribution for those participants who are employed on the last day of the Plan year. In 2024, the employer match was determined to be 16% of the first 6% deferred by participants.

Participant Accounts

Each participant's account is credited with the participant's contribution and allocations of (a) the Company's contribution, (b) Plan earnings and (c) forfeitures of terminated participants' non-vested accounts and charged with an allocation of administrative expenses. Allocations are based on the participant's compensation, account balances, or specific participant transactions, as defined. The benefit to which a participant is entitled is the benefit that can be provided from the participant's vested account.

1. DESCRIPTION OF PLAN (Continued)

Vesting

Participants are vested immediately in their contributions, and also in any employer qualified non-elective contribution (QNEC), plus actual earnings thereon. Employer matching and profit sharing contributions are subject to the following vesting schedule:

Notes Receivable from Participants

Participants may borrow from their accounts a minimum of \$1,000 up to a maximum equal to the lesser of \$50,000 or 50% of their vested account balance. Loans must be repaid within five years or for a longer repayment term for the purchase of a primary residence. The loans are secured by the balance in the participant's account and bear interest at a rate commensurate with local prevailing rates as determined by the Plan administrator. At December 31, 2024 and 2023, loan interest rates are between 4.25% to 9.50%.

Payment of Benefits

On termination of service, a participant elects to receive a lump-sum equal to the vested value of his or her account. Under certain conditions, in-service financial hardship distributions are permitted.

Forfeited (Unallocated) Accounts

At December 31, 2024 and 2023, forfeited accounts totaled \$35,877 and \$36,458, respectively. These accounts are used to reduce the payment of Plan expenses or offset employer contributions. During 2024, Plan expenses of \$48,750 were paid from forfeited accounts.

Plan Termination

Although it has not expressed any intent to do so, the Company has the right under the Plan to discontinue its contributions at any time and to terminate the Plan subject to the provisions of ERISA. In the event of Plan termination, participants will become 100% vested in their accounts, if not already.

2. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING PRINCIPLES

Basis of Accounting

The accompanying financial statements have been prepared using the accrual method of accounting.

Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect certain reported assets and liabilities and changes therein, and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities. Accordingly, actual results may differ from those estimates.

Investment Valuation and Income Recognition

The Plan's investments are reported at fair value. Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. See Note 3 for disclosures regarding fair value measurements.

Purchases and sales of investments are recorded on a trade-date basis. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Dividend income is recorded on the ex-dividend date. Net appreciation includes the Plan's gains and losses on investments bought and sold as well as held during the year. Management fees and operating expenses charged to the Plan for investments are deducted from income earned on a daily basis and are not separately reflected. Consequently, such management fees and operating expenses are reflected as a reduction of investment return for such investments.

Notes Receivable from Participants

Notes receivable from participants are stated at the unpaid principal balance. Interest income associated with the notes receivable are recorded when interest payments are received, usually each payroll period. Related fees are recorded as administrative expenses and are expensed when they are incurred. No allowance for credit losses has been recorded as of December 31, 2024 and 2023. If a participant ceases to make loan repayments and the Plan administrator deems the participant loan to be in default, the participant loan balance is reduced and a benefit payment is recorded.

Payment of Benefits

Benefits are recorded when paid or upon distribution.

Expenses

Expenses related to the administration of the Plan are paid by the Plan, unless paid by the Company at its option, and include primarily recordkeeping fees paid to Fidelity Management Trust Company (Fidelity). Fees related to the administration of participant loans are charged directly to the participant's account and are included in administrative expenses. Investment related expenses are included in net appreciation of fair value of investments.

3. FAIR VALUE MEASUREMENTS

Accounting Standards Codification (ASC) 820, Fair Value Measurements and Disclosures, establishes a framework for measuring fair value. The framework for measuring fair value provides a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. The hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets (Level 1 measurements) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (Level 3 measurements). Valuation techniques maximize the use of relevant observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs. The three levels of the fair value hierarchy under ASC 820 with the related inputs to the valuation methodology are described as follows:

Level 1 - Quoted prices (unadjusted) in active markets for identical assets that the Plan has the ability to access.

Level 2 - Significant other observable (directly or indirectly) inputs, including quoted prices for similar assets in active markets or in inactive markets and other market observable inputs such as interest rate, credit risks, etc.

Level 3 - Significant unobservable inputs, including the Plan's own assumptions in determining the fair value of investments.

Following is a description of the valuation methodologies used for the Plan's investment assets measured at fair value. There have been no changes in the methodologies used at December 31, 2024 and 2023.

Mutual Funds

Valued at the daily closing price as reported by the fund. Mutual funds held by the Plan are open-end mutual funds that are registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission. These funds are required to publish their daily net asset value and to transact at that price. The mutual funds held by the Plan are deemed to be actively traded.

Stable Value Common/Collective Trust Fund

The Plan's stable value fund is a common/collective trust which invests solely in the Great Gray Trust Stable Value Fund, which invests in fully benefit-responsive investment contracts and money market trusts that is valued at the net asset value of the units of the common/collective trust. The net asset value is used as a practical expedient to estimate fair value. This practical expedient is not used when it is determined to be probable that the fund will sell the investment for an amount different than the reported net asset value. Participant transactions (purchases and sales) may occur daily. The stable value common/collective trust fund has no unfunded commitments and has daily redemption frequency. However, the Plan is required to provide a five business days redemption notice to liquidate assets exceed \$1,000,000 invested in the fund.

5. RELATED PARTY AND PARTY-IN INTEREST TRANSACTIONS

Certain Plan investments are shares of mutual funds managed by Fidelity Management and Research Company, who is an affiliate of the trustee. Investment management fees are paid to this affiliate and are included in net appreciation in fair value of investments. In addition, certain administrative services are provided by the trustee and totaled \$255,989 for the year ended December 31, 2024. These transactions, including the notes receivable from participants, qualify as allowable party-in-interest transactions for which there are statutory exceptions.

The Plan's investment advisor is a subsidiary of Confie's parent company, however, their fees are paid directly by the Company.

6. RISKS AND UNCERTAINTIES

The Plan invests in various investment securities. Investment securities are exposed to various risks such as interest rate, market and credit risks. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investment securities, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in the values of investment securities will occur in the near term and that such changes could materially affect participants' account balances and the amounts reported in the statements of net assets available for benefits.

7. TAX STATUS

The Internal Revenue Service has determined and informed the Company by a letter dated June 30, 2020 that the Plan is designed in accordance with applicable requirements of the Internal Revenue Code (IRC). The Plan administrator believes that the Plan is designed and currently being operated in compliance with the Plan terms and the applicable requirements of the IRC. Therefore, no provision for income taxes has been included in the Plan's financial statements.

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require Plan management to evaluate tax positions taken by the Plan and recognize a tax liability if the Plan has taken an uncertain position that more likely than not would not be sustained upon examination by the taxing authorities. The Plan administrator has analyzed the tax positions taken by the Plan, and has concluded that there are no uncertain positions taken or expected to be taken that would require recognition of a liability or disclosure in the financial statements. The Plan is subject to routine audits by taxing jurisdictions; however, there are currently no audits for any tax periods in progress.

8. SUBSEQUENT EVENTS

Effective as of January 1, 2025, eligibility service requirement for deferral contribution, nonelective employer contributions, and matching employer contributions is changed to 3 months.

In preparing these financial statements, the Plan administrator has evaluated subsequent events and transactions for potential recognition or disclosure through October 10, 2025, the date the financial statements were available to be issued.
