Scope and Nature of the ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) Audit

We have performed audits of the financial statements of ***PTM Corporation 401(k) Profit Sharing Plan*** (the "Plan"), an employee benefit plan subject to the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 ("ERISA"), as permitted by ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) ("ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) audit"). The financial statements comprise the statements of net assets available for benefits as of December 31, 2024 and 2023, and the related statements of changes in net assets available for benefits for the years then ended, and the related notes to the financial statements (the "financial statements").

Management, having determined it is permissible in the circumstances, has elected to have the audits of the Plan's financial statements performed in accordance with ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) pursuant to 29 CFR 2520.103-8 of the Department of Labor's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA. Management has obtained certifications from a qualified institution as of December 31, 2024 and 2023, and for the years then ended, stating that the certified investment information, as described in Note 3 to the financial statements, is complete and accurate.



Opinion

Notes to Financial Statements

1. DESCRIPTION OF THE PLAN

The following description of the *PTM Corporation 401(k) Profit Sharing Plan* (the "Plan") provides only general information. Participants should refer to the Plan agreement for a more complete description of the Plan's provisions.

General

The Plan is a defined contribution plan covering all employees of *PTM Corporation* (the "Company") who have completed three months of service beginning with the employee's date of hire and have reached twenty-one years of age. The Plan has an automatic enrollment provision. Once an employee completes three months of service, the employee is automatically entered into the Plan on the first day of the following Plan quarter unless he or she waives their participation. Automatically enrolled participants have their deferral rate set at 3% of eligible compensation and their contributions invested in a designated balanced fund until changed by the participant. All participants who are automatically enrolled are subject to automatic elective contribution increases of 1% per year until the participant reaches 6%. For discretionary profit sharing contributions, the requirement is 1 year of consecutive service, with 1,000 hours constituting a year. Additionally, 500 hours are required to avoid a break in service for the profit sharing contributions. The Plan is subject to the provisions of the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 ("ERISA").

Management of the Plan Sponsor is responsible for oversight of the Plan, determines the appropriateness of the Plan's investment offerings, monitors investment performance and reports to the Plan's Trustees.

Contributions

Each year participants may contribute up to 92% of annual compensation as defined in the Plan subject to certain IRS limitations. Participants who have attained age 50 before the end of the Plan year are eligible to make catch-up contributions. Participants can designate all or any part of their elective deferrals to the Plan as Roth 401(k) deferrals. Participants may also contribute amounts representing distributions from other qualified defined benefit or defined contribution plans (rollover). In 2024 and 2023 the Company elected to make safe harbor non-elective contributions to the Plan in an amount not less than 3% of participants' annual compensation. The Company may, at its discretion, make additional qualified non-elective contributions for the non-highly compensated employees, matching contributions and/or make a profit sharing contribution. No such contributions were made during 2024 and 2023. Participants direct the investment of contributions into various investment options offered by the Plan.

Notes to Financial Statements

Participant Accounts

Each participant's account is credited with the participant's contribution, the Company's safe harbor non-elective contributions, the Company's matching contributions (when made), an allocation of (a) the Company's qualified non-elective contributions for the non-highly compensated employees and profit sharing contributions (when made), (b) Plan earnings, and (c) forfeitures of terminated participant non-vested accounts, and charged with an allocation of administrative expenses. Allocations are based on participant compensation, account balances or specific participant transactions, as defined. Participants who initiate a loan or benefit payment are charged a fee for that transaction. The benefit to which a participant is entitled is the benefit that can be provided from the participant's vested account.

Vesting

Participants are immediately vested in their 401(k) voluntary contributions plus actual earnings thereon. Vesting in Company contributions is based on years of continuous service. For the Company's safe harbor non-elective contributions and qualified non-elective contributions for the non-highly compensated employees, a participant is 100% vested after two years of credited service. For the Company's matching and profit sharing contributions, a participant is 100% vested after six years of credited service, on a 6 year graded scale.

Notes Receivable from Participants

Participants may borrow from their fund accounts a minimum of \$1,000 up to a maximum equal to the lesser of \$50,000 or 95% of half of their account balance. The notes receivable are secured by the balance in the participant's account and bear interest at a rate of 4.25% to 9.50%, which is commensurate with local prevailing rates at the time the notes are issued, as determined by the Plan Administrator. Principal and interest is paid ratably through payroll deductions.

Payment of Benefits

On termination of service due to death, disability, or retirement, a participant may elect to receive either a lump-sum amount equal to the value of the participant's vested interest in his or her account or annual installment payments, as defined by the Plan agreement. For termination of service or for other reasons, a participant will receive the value of the vested interest in his or her account as a lump-sum distribution. In-service withdrawal of vested balances may be elected by participants who have reached 59½ years of age. The Plan also permits withdrawals of active participants' elective contributions and rollover contributions only in amounts necessary to satisfy financial hardship as defined by the Plan agreement.

Forfeited Accounts

Forfeited non-vested accounts are used to reduce Plan expenses, reduce employer contributions or allocated to qualifying participant's individual accounts on a pro-rata basis, at the Company's discretion. In 2023, approximately \$9,000 of forfeitures were allocated to participants. No such use of forfeitures occurred in 2024. At December 31, 2024 and 2023, there were \$55,000 and \$23,000, respectively, in unused forfeited non-vested accounts.

2. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of Accounting

The financial statements of the Plan are prepared in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America ("GAAP").

Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with GAAP requires Plan management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and changes therein, and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Investment Valuation and Income Recognition

Investments are reported at fair value. Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. Plan management determines the Plan's valuation policies utilizing information provided by the custodian. See Note 4 for discussion of fair value measurements.

Purchases and sales of investments are recorded on a trade-date basis. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Dividends are recorded on the ex-dividend date. The net change in fair value of investments includes the Plan's aggregate gains and losses on investments bought and sold as well as held during the year.

Certain management fees and operating expenses charged to the Plan for investments in mutual funds are deducted from income earned on a daily basis and are not separately reflected. Consequently, such management fees and operating expenses are reflected as an addition to net depreciation or a reduction of net appreciation in the aggregated fair value of such investments.

Notes Receivable from Participants

Notes receivable from participants are measured at their unpaid principal balance plus any accrued but unpaid interest. Related fees are recorded as administrative expenses and are expensed when they are incurred. If a participant ceases to make loan repayments and the Plan Administrator deems the note receivable to be in default, the participant note receivable is reduced and a benefit payment is recorded.

Contributions

Participant contributions are recorded when withheld from compensation. Employer contributions are recorded in the period in which they become the obligations of the Company.

Benefits Paid to Participants

Benefit payments to participants are recorded when paid.

Administrative Expenses

The Plan's administrative expenses are paid either by the Plan or the Company, as provided by the Plan document. Certain administrative expenses, including an allocation of salaries related to Plan administration, legal, and certain audit costs, are paid by the Company and qualify as party-in-interest transactions, which are exempt from prohibited transaction rules. Expenses that are paid directly by the Company are excluded from these financial statements. Fees for custodial, trustee, and record keeping services are paid by the Plan. Participants are charged directly for loan fees and fees related to certain distribution types.

Subsequent Events

In preparing these financial statements, Plan management has evaluated, for potential recognition or disclosure, significant events or transactions that occurred during the period subsequent to the most recent statement of net assets available for benefits presented herein, through the date these financial statements were available to be issued.

3. CERTIFIED INVESTMENTS

Certain information related to investments and notes receivable from participants, as disclosed in the financial statements and ERISA-required supplemental schedule, including investments and notes receivable from participants held at December 31, 2024 and 2023, and net change in fair value of investments, interest and dividends, and interest income on notes receivable from participants for the years then ended, were obtained by management and agreed to and derived from information certified as complete and accurate by Mid Atlantic Trust Company ("MATC").

4. FAIR VALUE MEASUREMENTS

The framework for measuring fair value provides a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. The hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (Level 1 measurements) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (Level 3 measurements). The three levels of the fair value hierarchy under Accounting Standards Codification 820 are described as follows:

Level 1: Inputs to the valuation methodology are unadjusted quoted prices for identical assets or liabilities in active markets that the Plan has the ability to access.

Level 2: Inputs to the valuation methodology include:

- quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities in active markets;
- quoted prices for identical or similar assets or liabilities in inactive markets;
- inputs other than quoted prices that are observable for the asset or liability; and
- inputs that are derived principally from or corroborated by observable market data by correlation or other means.

If the asset or liability has a specified (contractual) term, the Level 2 input must be observable for substantially the full term of the asset or liability.

Level 3: Inputs to the valuation methodology are unobservable and significant to the fair value measurement.

The asset's or liability's fair value measurement level within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of any input that is significant to the fair value measurements. Valuation techniques used need to maximize the use of observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs.

The following is a description of the valuation methodologies used for assets measured at fair value. There have been no changes in the methodologies used at December 31, 2024 and 2023.

Mutual funds: Shares held in mutual funds are valued at the daily closing price as reported by the fund. Mutual funds held by the Plan are open-end mutual funds that are registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission ("SEC"). These funds are required to publish their daily Net Asset Value ("NAV") and to transact at that price. The mutual funds held by the Plan are deemed to be actively traded.

Money market fund: Shares held in the money market fund is comprised of short-term debt securities. The composition of securities is structured to maintain a value of \$1 per share and these funds are classified as Level 2.

The preceding methods described may produce a fair value calculation that may not be indicative of net realizable value or reflective of future fair values. Furthermore, although Plan management believes its valuation methods are appropriate and consistent with other market participants, the use of different methodologies or assumptions to determine the fair value of certain financial instruments could result in a different fair value measurement at the reporting date.

The availability of observable market data is monitored to assess the appropriate classification of financial instruments within the fair value hierarchy. Changes in economic conditions or model-based valuation techniques may require the transfer of financial instruments from one fair value level to another. Plan management evaluates the significance of transfers between levels based upon the nature of the financial instrument and size of the transfer relative to total net assets available for benefits. There were no transfers into or out of Level 3 in 2024 and 2023.

5. RELATED PARTY AND PARTY-IN-INTEREST TRANSACTIONS

Certain Plan investments are in funds and accounts that are managed by MATC, the custodian, and record keeping services are performed by Paychex, or their subsidiaries and affiliates. Participant loan and distribution processing fees are paid to Paychex by participants. The Plan paid for custodial, trustee, and record keeping services which qualify as party-in-interest transactions. The Plan also issues loans to participants which are secured by the vested balance of the participants' accounts. Certain management fees in the form of an expense ratio charged to each investment option are paid by the Plan and deducted from earnings on investments. These transactions are party-in-interest transactions, which are exempt from prohibited transaction rules.

6. TAX STATUS

The Company's Board of Directors adopted the Paychex, Inc. Prototype Non-Standardized Profit Sharing Plan document. The Plan document has received an opinion letter from the Internal Revenue Service dated August 31, 2020, stating that the written form of the underlying prototype plan document is qualified under Section 401(a) of the Internal Revenue Code (the "Code") and that any employer adopting this form of the Plan will be considered to have a plan qualified under Section 401(a) of the Code. The Plan is required to operate in conformity with the Code to maintain its qualification. The Plan's Administrator believes the Plan is being operated in compliance with the applicable requirements of the Code and, therefore, believes the Plan is qualified and the related trust is tax-exempt.

GAAP requires Plan management to evaluate and recognize a tax liability (or asset) if the Plan has taken an uncertain position that more likely than not would not be sustained upon examination by the IRS. While the Plan may be subject to routine audits by taking jurisdictions, there are currently no audits for any tax periods in progress.

7. PLAN TERMINATION

Although it has not expressed any intent to do so, the Company has the right under the Plan to discontinue its contributions at any time and to terminate the Plan subject to the provisions of ERISA. In the event of Plan termination, participants would become 100% vested in their accounts. Any unallocated assets of the Plan would be allocated to participant accounts and distributed in such a manner as the Company may determine.

8. RISKS AND ECONOMIC UNCERTAINTIES

The Plan invests in various investment securities including mutual funds and a money market fund with the underlying assets consisting of any combination of stocks, bonds, fixed income securities, and other investment securities. Investment securities are exposed to various risks, such as interest rate, market and credit risks. Market risks include global events which could impact the value of investment securities, such as a pandemic or international conflict. Due to the level of interest rate, market, and credit risks inherent with certain of the Plan's investment securities, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in the fair values of investment securities will occur in the near term and that such changes could materially affect participants' account balances and the amounts reported in the statements of net assets available for benefits and changes in net assets available for benefits.

1. DESCRIPTION OF THE PLAN

The following description of the *PTM Corporation 401(k) Profit Sharing Plan* (the "Plan") provides only general information. Participants should refer to the Plan agreement for a more complete description of the Plan's provisions.

General

The Plan is a defined contribution plan covering all employees of *PTM Corporation* (the "Company") who have completed three months of service beginning with the employee's date of hire and have reached twenty-one years of age. The Plan has an automatic enrollment provision. Once an employee completes three months of service, the employee is automatically entered into the Plan on the first day of the following Plan quarter unless he or she waives their participation. Automatically enrolled participants have their deferral rate set at 3% of eligible compensation and their contributions invested in a designated balanced fund until changed by the participant. All participants who are automatically enrolled are subject to automatic elective contribution increases of 1% per year until the participant reaches 6%. For discretionary profit sharing contributions, the requirement is 1 year of consecutive service, with 1,000 hours constituting a year. Additionally, 500 hours are required to avoid a break in service for the profit sharing contributions. The Plan is subject to the provisions of the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 ("ERISA").

Management of the Plan Sponsor is responsible for oversight of the Plan, determines the appropriateness of the Plan's investment offerings, monitors investment performance and reports to the Plan's Trustees.

Contributions

Each year participants may contribute up to 92% of annual compensation as defined in the Plan subject to certain IRS limitations. Participants who have attained age 50 before the end of the Plan year are eligible to make catch-up contributions. Participants can designate all or any part of their elective deferrals to the Plan as Roth 401(k) deferrals. Participants may also contribute amounts representing distributions from other qualified defined benefit or defined contribution plans (rollover). In 2024 and 2023 the Company elected to make safe harbor non-elective contributions to the Plan in an amount not less than 3% of participants' annual compensation. The Company may, at its discretion, make additional qualified non-elective contributions for the non-highly compensated employees, matching contributions and/or make a profit sharing contribution. No such contributions were made during 2024 and 2023. Participants direct the investment of contributions into various investment options offered by the Plan.

Participant Accounts

Each participant's account is credited with the participant's contribution, the Company's safe harbor non-elective contributions, the Company's matching contributions (when made), an allocation of (a) the Company's qualified non-elective contributions for the non-highly compensated employees and profit sharing contributions (when made), (b) Plan earnings, and (c) forfeitures of terminated participant non-vested accounts, and charged with an allocation of administrative expenses. Allocations are based on participant compensation, account balances or specific participant transactions, as defined. Participants who initiate a loan or benefit payment are charged a fee for that transaction. The benefit to which a participant is entitled is the benefit that can be provided from the participant's vested account.

Vesting

Participants are immediately vested in their 401(k) voluntary contributions plus actual earnings thereon. Vesting in Company contributions is based on years of continuous service. For the Company's safe harbor non-elective contributions and qualified non-elective contributions for the non-highly compensated employees, a participant is 100% vested after two years of credited service. For the Company's matching and profit sharing contributions, a participant is 100% vested after six years of credited service, on a 6 year graded scale.

Notes Receivable from Participants

Participants may borrow from their fund accounts a minimum of \$1,000 up to a maximum equal to the lesser of \$50,000 or 95% of half of their account balance. The notes receivable are secured by the balance in the participant's account and bear interest at a rate of 4.25% to 9.50%, which is commensurate with local prevailing rates at the time the notes are issued, as determined by the Plan Administrator. Principal and interest is paid ratably through payroll deductions.

Payment of Benefits

On termination of service due to death, disability, or retirement, a participant may elect to receive either a lump-sum amount equal to the value of the participant's vested interest in his or her account or annual installment payments, as defined by the Plan agreement. For termination of service or for other reasons, a participant will receive the value of the vested interest in his or her account as a lump-sum distribution. In-service withdrawal of vested balances may be elected by participants who have reached 59½ years of age. The Plan also permits withdrawals of active participants' elective contributions and rollover contributions only in amounts necessary to satisfy financial hardship as defined by the Plan agreement.

Forfeited Accounts

Forfeited non-vested accounts are used to reduce Plan expenses, reduce employer contributions or allocated to qualifying participant's individual accounts on a pro-rata basis, at the Company's discretion. In 2023, approximately \$9,000 of forfeitures were allocated to participants. No such use of forfeitures occurred in 2024. At December 31, 2024 and 2023, there were \$55,000 and \$23,000, respectively, in unused forfeited non-vested accounts.

2. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of Accounting

The financial statements of the Plan are prepared in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America ("GAAP").

Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with GAAP requires Plan management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and changes therein, and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Investment Valuation and Income Recognition

Investments are reported at fair value. Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. Plan management determines the Plan's valuation policies utilizing information provided by the custodian. See Note 4 for discussion of fair value measurements.

Purchases and sales of investments are recorded on a trade-date basis. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Dividends are recorded on the ex-dividend date. The net change in fair value of investments includes the Plan's aggregate gains and losses on investments bought and sold as well as held during the year.

Certain management fees and operating expenses charged to the Plan for investments in mutual funds are deducted from income earned on a daily basis and are not separately reflected. Consequently, such management fees and operating expenses are reflected as an addition to net depreciation or a reduction of net appreciation in the aggregated fair value of such investments.

Notes Receivable from Participants

Notes receivable from participants are measured at their unpaid principal balance plus any accrued but unpaid interest. Related fees are recorded as administrative expenses and are expensed when they are incurred. If a participant ceases to make loan repayments and the Plan Administrator deems the note receivable to be in default, the participant note receivable is reduced and a benefit payment is recorded.

Contributions

Participant contributions are recorded when withheld from compensation. Employer contributions are recorded in the period in which they become the obligations of the Company.

Benefits Paid to Participants

Benefit payments to participants are recorded when paid.

Administrative Expenses

The Plan's administrative expenses are paid either by the Plan or the Company, as provided by the Plan document. Certain administrative expenses, including an allocation of salaries related to Plan administration, legal, and certain audit costs, are paid by the Company and qualify as party-in-interest transactions, which are exempt from prohibited transaction rules. Expenses that are paid directly by the Company are excluded from these financial statements. Fees for custodial, trustee, and record keeping services are paid by the Plan. Participants are charged directly for loan fees and fees related to certain distribution types.

Subsequent Events

In preparing these financial statements, Plan management has evaluated, for potential recognition or disclosure, significant events or transactions that occurred during the period subsequent to the most recent statement of net assets available for benefits presented herein, through the date these financial statements were available to be issued.

3. CERTIFIED INVESTMENTS

Certain information related to investments and notes receivable from participants, as disclosed in the financial statements and ERISA-required supplemental schedule, including investments and notes receivable from participants held at December 31, 2024 and 2023, and net change in fair value of investments, interest and dividends, and interest income on notes receivable from participants for the years then ended, were obtained by management and agreed to and derived from information certified as complete and accurate by Mid Atlantic Trust Company ("MATC").

4. FAIR VALUE MEASUREMENTS

The framework for measuring fair value provides a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. The hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (Level 1 measurements) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (Level 3 measurements). The three levels of the fair value hierarchy under Accounting Standards Codification 820 are described as follows:

Level 1: Inputs to the valuation methodology are unadjusted quoted prices for identical assets or liabilities in active markets that the Plan has the ability to access.

Level 2: Inputs to the valuation methodology include:

- quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities in active markets;
- quoted prices for identical or similar assets or liabilities in inactive markets;
- inputs other than quoted prices that are observable for the asset or liability; and
- inputs that are derived principally from or corroborated by observable market data by correlation or other means.

If the asset or liability has a specified (contractual) term, the Level 2 input must be observable for substantially the full term of the asset or liability.

Level 3: Inputs to the valuation methodology are unobservable and significant to the fair value measurement.

The asset's or liability's fair value measurement level within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of any input that is significant to the fair value measurements. Valuation techniques used need to maximize the use of observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs.

The following is a description of the valuation methodologies used for assets measured at fair value. There have been no changes in the methodologies used at December 31, 2024 and 2023.

Mutual funds: Shares held in mutual funds are valued at the daily closing price as reported by the fund. Mutual funds held by the Plan are open-end mutual funds that are registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission ("SEC"). These funds are required to publish their daily Net Asset Value ("NAV") and to transact at that price. The mutual funds held by the Plan are deemed to be actively traded.

Money market fund: Shares held in the money market fund is comprised of short-term debt securities. The composition of securities is structured to maintain a value of \$1 per share and these funds are classified as Level 2.

The preceding methods described may produce a fair value calculation that may not be indicative of net realizable value or reflective of future fair values. Furthermore, although Plan management believes its valuation methods are appropriate and consistent with other market participants, the use of different methodologies or assumptions to determine the fair value of certain financial instruments could result in a different fair value measurement at the reporting date.

The availability of observable market data is monitored to assess the appropriate classification of financial instruments within the fair value hierarchy. Changes in economic conditions or model-based valuation techniques may require the transfer of financial instruments from one fair value level to another. Plan management evaluates the significance of transfers between levels based upon the nature of the financial instrument and size of the transfer relative to total net assets available for benefits. There were no transfers into or out of Level 3 in 2024 and 2023.

5. RELATED PARTY AND PARTY-IN-INTEREST TRANSACTIONS

Certain Plan investments are in funds and accounts that are managed by MATC, the custodian, and record keeping services are performed by Paychex, or their subsidiaries and affiliates. Participant loan and distribution processing fees are paid to Paychex by participants. The Plan paid for custodial, trustee, and record keeping services which qualify as party-in-interest transactions. The Plan also issues loans to participants which are secured by the vested balance of the participants' accounts. Certain management fees in the form of an expense ratio charged to each investment option are paid by the Plan and deducted from earnings on investments. These transactions are party-in-interest transactions, which are exempt from prohibited transaction rules.

6. TAX STATUS

The Company's Board of Directors adopted the Paychex, Inc. Prototype Non-Standardized Profit Sharing Plan document. The Plan document has received an opinion letter from the Internal Revenue Service dated August 31, 2020, stating that the written form of the underlying prototype plan document is qualified under Section 401(a) of the Internal Revenue Code (the "Code") and that any employer adopting this form of the Plan will be considered to have a plan qualified under Section 401(a) of the Code. The Plan is required to operate in conformity with the Code to maintain its qualification. The Plan's Administrator believes the Plan is being operated in compliance with the applicable requirements of the Code and, therefore, believes the Plan is qualified and the related trust is tax-exempt.

GAAP requires Plan management to evaluate and recognize a tax liability (or asset) if the Plan has taken an uncertain position that more likely than not would not be sustained upon examination by the IRS. While the Plan may be subject to routine audits by taking jurisdictions, there are currently no audits for any tax periods in progress.

7. PLAN TERMINATION

Although it has not expressed any intent to do so, the Company has the right under the Plan to discontinue its contributions at any time and to terminate the Plan subject to the provisions of ERISA. In the event of Plan termination, participants would become 100% vested in their accounts. Any unallocated assets of the Plan would be allocated to participant accounts and distributed in such a manner as the Company may determine.

8. RISKS AND ECONOMIC UNCERTAINTIES

The Plan invests in various investment securities including mutual funds and a money market fund with the underlying assets consisting of any combination of stocks, bonds, fixed income securities, and other investment securities. Investment securities are exposed to various risks, such as interest rate, market and credit risks. Market risks include global events which could impact the value of investment securities, such as a pandemic or international conflict. Due to the level of interest rate, market, and credit risks inherent with certain of the Plan's investment securities, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in the fair values of investment securities will occur in the near term and that such changes could materially affect participants' account balances and the amounts reported in the statements of net assets available for benefits and changes in net assets available for benefits.
